In Re: Highway Matters

Chairman Fore stated the Board of Supervisors met at 5:00 with VDOT for a work session, and as the VDOT representatives had to attend another meeting elsewhere, the Board discussed the issues at that meeting. He then asked for any comments to forward to VDOT.

In Re: Request from STEPS, Inc.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, said STEPS, Inc. is in the process of creating a secure document destruction and shredding business. Congressman Perriello obtained a \$300,000 earmark for STEPS, Inc. to be used to purchase equipment and training needed for the new business.

Mr. Bartlett explained that the Department of Education has been assigned the oversight of these funds, and has informed STEPS, Inc. that it will be several months before these funds will be dispersed to STEPS, Inc. To move the process along, Ms. Sharon Harrup, CEO of STEPS, Inc., requested an interest-free “bridge loan” of \$150,000 to allow STEPS to obtain the equipment; the full amount will be repaid in full after the funds are received from the Department of Education. Mr. Bartlett added that the earmarked funds may be expended prior to the funds being received.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to approve provision of an interest-free loan to STEPS, Inc. in the amount of \$150,000 as requested.

Supervisor Simpson inquired as to the length of time until the funds will be released from the Department of Education.

Ms. Harrup said that she is unable to give a specific time; she added that forms must be filled out and submitted. Ms. Harrup said these funds have been set aside for STEPS; no one can take the funds and the Federal government cannot rescind these funds.

Ms. Harrup said \$150,000 loan would go to the purchase of shredding and baling equipment and bins, which have been ordered. The other \$150,000 earmarked for STEPS, Inc. is for training and obtaining FBI clearance for all employees. She added that STEPS has interested customers, and a delay in the schedule to get the business operational could force those customers to look elsewhere for the service.

Discussion followed.

In Re: Public Hearing – School Board Appointments

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing on the School Board appointments and called on Supervisor Simpson to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 101, consisting of William W. Poulston, Chair, LaVaonna H. Lyle, and Kate L. Shorter; and Supervisor Wiley to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 801, consisting of Michelle Raybold, Chair, Ernestine Herndon, Patricia Holcomb, Nancy Phaup, and Ruth Watkins. No nominations were received from the floor.

Chairman Fore closed the public hearing and asked the Committees to report at the April 2010 meeting with the lists of candidates for consideration for appointment to the Prince Edward County School Board.

In Re: Public Hearing – Motor Vehicle License Tax

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Simpson asked about a provision for disabled veterans; Mr. Bartlett stated disabled veterans are automatically exempt on one vehicle by State Code, as long as the vehicle is registered with the DMV as such.

Supervisor Simpson then asked about antique vehicles that are being restored or that have an antique license. Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, stated this ordinance applies only to licensed vehicles.

Supervisor Gantt said the tax rate on farm trucks is proposed at \$30, and it would be simpler to have all rates set at \$25. Mrs. Beverly Booth, Commissioner of Revenue, stated farmers get a reduction on the real estate tax assessment. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to approve the amendments to the Vehicle License Ordinance and to approve the tax rates with a change in the “farm trucks” rate set at \$25.

Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said two amendments are necessary to the Vehicle License Ordinance: Division 2, Section 74-51 (c) should be deleted; and Section 74-52 should read as follows: “The license tax provided for in this division shall be due and payable annually on the same date as the County Personal Property Tax, as allowed by the state.”

Supervisor Gantt restated his motion to reduce the farm truck tax from \$30 to \$25; delete Section 74-51 (c); and amend Section 74-52; the motion carried:

ARTICLE II: VEHICLE LICENSE

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Section 74-51. Levy of License Tax.

- a) For each year beginning with January 1 thereof and ending with December 31 following until otherwise changed, there is hereby levied and there shall be collected from every person owning a licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer, which is normally garaged, stored or parked within the county, a license tax on such licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer, at the rates set forth in this division.
- b) If it cannot be determined where the licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer is normally garaged, stored or parked, or if the owner is a student attending an institution of higher learning, the situs for the imposition of this license tax shall be the domicile of the owner. For the purposes of this division the term "domicile" shall mean:
 - 1) A place of abode in the county of more than 60 days irrespective of any intention on the part of that person to return to or establish a residence outside the county at some future date; or
 - 2) The office or place of business in the county of any corporation or firm.

Section 74-52. Date license tax due.

The license tax provided for in this division shall be due and payable annually on the same date as the County Personal Property Tax, as allowed by the state.

Section 74-53. Amount of license tax

An annual license tax to be paid to the county by owners of licensed motor vehicles and trailers shall be as follows:

These taxes shall be in effect as of January 1, 2010.

Section 74-54. Exemptions.

Specifically exempt from the terms of this division are the following:

- 1) All persons who are residents of the Town of Farmville or Town of Pamplin and have paid a motor vehicle license tax on vehicles to the Town of Farmville or Town of Pamplin.
- 2) Any motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer owned by a nonresident and used exclusively for transporting into and within the county for sale, in person or by employees, wood, meats, poultry, fruits, flowers, vegetables, milk, butter, cream or eggs produced or grown by that individual and not purchased for sale.
- 3) Any vehicle exempt from licensing requirements by the commonwealth.
- 4) Motor vehicles, trailers or semitrailers owned by an officer or employee of the commonwealth who is a nonresident of the county and uses the vehicle in the performance of his duties for the commonwealth under an agreement for such use.
- 5) Any motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer owned by a dealer or manufacturer for sale or sales demonstration.
- 6) All active members of volunteer fire departments and rescue squads located in or serving the county on one automobile owned by such active member, but shall secure license plates and decals as required by this article and pay license fees on all other vehicles owned by such active member.
- 7) Any motor vehicle owned by a new resident moving to the county from another state locality and having paid a license fee to that locality for that motor vehicle shall be exempt until the prior locality's expiration date.

Section 74-55. Payment of county property tax.

The license tax provided for in this division shall be in addition to any other county property tax. No motor vehicle shall be licensed under this division until the applicant for such license shall have paid all personal property taxes properly assessed or assessable against the applicant by the county.

Section 74-56. Refunds.

There shall be no refund or proration of any license tax paid for any vehicle disposed of or moved out of the county after January 1 of each year.

In Re: Public Hearing – Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls CDA

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls CDA. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 12, 2010, February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore stated that at the February 9, 2010 meeting, the Board approved a request from the Prince Edward County IDA to consider amending the Ordinance which created the Granite Falls CDA.

The first proposed amendment to the ordinance is in regard to Facilities and Services; the second amendment is in regard to changes in the membership of the CDA.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Henry Shelton, Prospect District, expressed his concern on the appearance of a conflict of interest since the CDA Board is comprised of Board of Supervisors members. He asked if any of the Board members are shareholders. Mr. Shelton then asked if the citizens would be responsible in the event of default.

Chairman Fore said the County has no money involved through the CDA. Mr. Bartlett said a specific state statute exempts the County from obligations of the CDA.

Mr. Shelton then expressed his concern regarding the increase in property tax assessments and regarding the Water Authority.

Mr. Kenneth Jackson, Leigh District, expressed his concern regarding how citizens will be protected if the entire Board of Supervisors membership is on the Granite Falls CDA.

Mr. Bartlett stated when the Board of Supervisors meets as the Board of Supervisors, it would adjourn that meeting and would need to reconvene as the CDA in order to discuss CDA business. There would be two separate, advertised meetings, and the public would be invited.

Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Gantt said he would be more comfortable with the appointment of a citizen to the CDA. He said there is no conflict of interest, but there may be an appearance of a conflict of interest.

Discussion followed on the appointment of citizens to the CDA. Chairman Fore stated the Board of Supervisors or the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors makes the appointments to the CDA.

Mr. Bartlett recommended approval of the ordinance and to allow himself and the County Attorney to research state code regarding succession protocol.

Mr. James Ennis, County Attorney, said the initial CDA Board would hold the election of officers and would set up the Articles of Incorporation and the bylaws. He said the bylaws would provide for succession. Mr. Ennis said the members would then have the option to resign.

Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development, said the funding issue has a deadline two-months out.

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AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ORDINANCE CREATING THE GRANITE FALLS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia (the “Board of Supervisors”) authorized the creation of the Granite Falls Community Development Authority (the “CDA”) by ordinance entitled “Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls Community Development Authority”, adopted November 17, 2009 (the “Ordinance”); and

WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the “Authority”), as the owner of the land in the CDA and Prince Edward Development LLC (the “Purchaser”) as the proposed purchaser of such land submitted a Petition, dated August 14, 2009 (the “Petition”) requesting the Board of Supervisors to create the CDA; and

WHEREAS, the Authority and the Purchaser have submitted an Amendment to Petition requesting that the CDA be authorized to finance certain additional facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors desires to provide that the members of the CDA Board shall consist of the members of the Board of Supervisors, each such DCA board member to be appointed for a term of office coterminous with such member’s term of office as a member of the Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing has been held on March 9, 2010, by the Board of Supervisors on the adoption of this Ordinance and notice has been duly published in accordance with the requirements of Section 15.2-5156 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the “Act”); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia as follows:

1. Amendment of Paragraph 3 of Ordinance. The Ordinance is hereby amended so that the first sentence of Paragraph 3 of the Ordinance reads as follows:

The CDA is created for the purpose of exercising the powers set forth in the Act, including financing, construction, acquiring and developing, and owning and maintaining if necessary, certain public improvements in connection with the development of a hotel and conference center, which

public improvements may include sewer system improvements, roads and road improvements, landscaping, parking, the Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center and such other facilities and services as are permitted by the Act, as set forth in the Petition, as amended by the Amendment to the Petition.

2. Amendment of Paragraph 6 of the Ordinance. Paragraph 6 of the Ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

6. Membership of the Authority

- a) The powers of the CDA shall be exercised by an authority board consisting of eight members, such number being equal to the number of members of the Board of Supervisors, and such alternate members as the Board of Supervisors may appoint. The members of the Board of Supervisors shall constitute the members of the CDA Board and the term of each member of the CDA Board shall be coterminous with such member's term of office as a member of the Board of Supervisors, unless provided otherwise by resolution of the Board of Supervisors in accordance with the provision of Section 15.2-5113 of the Act.
- b) The initial members of the CDA board shall be as set forth in the Articles of Incorporation for the terms set forth therein.

3. Articles of Incorporation. The County Administrator is authorized and directed to execute and file Articles of Incorporation with the State Corporation Commission in substantially the form on file with the County Administrator with such changes or corrections as the County Administrator may approve prior to filing.

4. Recordation of Ordinance. In accordance with Section 15.2-5157 of the Act, a copy of this Amending Ordinance, together with the Ordinance, shall be recorded in the land records of the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of the County of Prince Edward for each tax map parcel in the CDA District and the CDA District shall be noted on the land records of the County.

5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Mr. Ennis stated the settlement agreements and petitions for the Bush 4-B project were prepared, signed, filed with the Circuit Court, the Judge has entered an order confirming the easements to the County, and the funds have been disbursed to the landowners.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said the Board of Supervisors approved a request at the November 17, 2009 meeting to the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) requesting an amendment to the CRC's by-laws and charter allowing citizen representatives to serve as members of the Council. The CRC has denied the request.

Mr. Bartlett then said the U.S. Census Bureau will send the 2010 Census questionnaires in mid-March. He said these are very important as the eligibility and funding available to a locality from various federal programs are based on population numbers or other demographic information collected during the Census. Census data are used to reapportion seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and for the subsequent redistricting of state and local governments. Census data help to determine how more than \$400 billion per year in federal funding is distributed to tribal, state and local governments for important social services that affect local communities. Census data can help fund services for people in poverty, establish facilities for people with disabilities, determine locations for hospitals and senior centers, and forecast transportation needs, such as new roads and public transit options. He said it is imperative the citizens complete the questionnaires or surveys.

In Re: Delinquent Real Estate Taxes

Chairman Fore stated the Treasurer, Mrs. Shanaberger, presented a list of real estate parcels that are delinquent for at least three years and will commence proceedings under the authority of Section 58.1-3965 et seq. of the Code of Virginia to sell these parcels for payment of delinquent taxes. Notification has been mailed to each delinquent taxpayer informing them of impending legal action, and will be advertised in the March 12, 2010 printing of The Farmville Herald.

Mrs. Shanaberger stated the landowners can redeem the property at any time by paying all taxes, penalties, interest, and collection costs.
