At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House, thereof, on Tuesday, the 14th day of November, 2013; at 7:10 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

Chairman Fore read a letter which was then presented by Supervisor Simpson and Supervisor Jones to Mrs. Machelle J. Eppes and Miss DaVida A. Eppes, as follows:

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward wishes to express to you our great sadness on the passing of your husband and father, David Edward Eppes.

David was a highly experienced and deeply respected law enforcement professional.

During his twenty-four years with the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Office, Major Eppes served with great diligence and distinction. He was well-known throughout the County for his loyal service to our citizens.

It will be hard for us to imagine the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Office without the presence of Major Eppes. He was respected by his co-workers, and his colleagues from other law enforcement agencies throughout the Commonwealth. David exemplified bravery,

selflessness and dedication to his duty to protect and serve his community. He devoted countless hours of his life to help the citizens of this County. We will all miss him.

We, the undersigned members of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, wish to convey to you our high regard, deep respect and great admiration for the memory of your husband and father, David Edward Eppes.

Sheriff Reed presented a shadowbox put together by the Sheriff's Department, showing the many accomplishments in the life of Major Eppes as he worked for the Department.

Mrs. Eppes thanked the County, the Board of Supervisors and the Sheriff's Department.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting: Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

Dr. David Smith, Superintendent, Prince Edward County Schools, presented information pertaining to Capital Improvements, primarily at the Middle School, to include the roof and HVAC systems. Discussion followed.

Kenneth Jackson, Lockett District, stated this county's future must be based on serious economic development. He stated career jobs are needed in the County, and expressed concern about the County's priorities, adding that funding was cut from the Fire Departments. Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator,

stated there have been no cuts to the Fire Department funding, adding the Fire Department funds will be increased this year.

Dempsey Jones, realtor with Remax Advantage Plus and President of South Central Association of Realtors, expressed his concern regarding the Corridor Overlay District. He stated his opposition to the implementation of the design guide and application of the Corridor Overlay to the whole county. He stated the Association agreed with the recommendation to delete the design guide and only apply the Overlay District to Highway 15 South to Farmville Lake Road. He requested that realtors be included in proposals that have to do with housing or business because of their daily involvement.

Bemeché Hicks, Lockett District, expressed his concern regarding the lack of economic growth in the county, and a need for living-wage jobs in the county. He also stated there are still problems on High Rock Road, Route 736, between the entrance of High Rock Road from Route 460 and Haskin Lane. He said there are pot holes and it appears the road is sinking. He said the trees are overhanging the road along High Rock Road and he anticipates it could cause problems this winter.

Vivian Swane, Tammy Beasley and Gail Dummore, of Elam County Estate on Elam Drive, requested the road be taken over by the State due to the poor condition of the road. Discussion followed.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

There were no Board of Supervisors comments.

In Re: Public Hearing – Amendments to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a continued public hearing on the proposed amendment to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, September 20, 2013 and the Friday, September 27, 2013 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mrs. Alecia Daves-Johnson stated that at the October 8, 2013 Board of Supervisors meeting, questions were raised by the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District regarding the impact on a dam's hazard rating of allowing one single family residence to be constructed below a regulated dam. The Board also asked the County Attorney to determine if the Board's definition of "development" could be

stricter than that of the Code of Virginia. Mr. Ennis has determined that the County does not have the

authority to impose a stricter definition than the Code of Virginia; therefore the Board cannot completely

prohibit construction in an inundation zone.

In light of that information, the proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance ARTICLE VI:

DEFINITIONS AND USE TYPES, Section 6-100 Definitions, to modify the existing Zoning Ordinance

definition of Development is withdrawn.

Additionally, the proposed amendment to Section 4-100 (A) that was submitted to the Board at the

October meeting remains unchanged:

Insert #1. All new development in every zoning district except for single family dwellings which are not located within a dam break inundation zone, and structures used solely for agricultural

purposes except where required by Section 3-100.1 Commercial Feedlots.

It should be noted that Section 4-100 (A) 6 requires that any development proposed within a dam break

inundation zone be required to submit a site plan.

The Planning Commission, at its July 16, 2013 meeting, unanimously voted to recommend the

Board of Supervisors adopt Amendments to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance. These

amendments pertain to sections of the Zoning Ordinance which need to be revised to comply with the Code

of Virginia and state regulations; these are in the areas of Dam Break Inundation Zones, Temporary Family

Health Care Structures, and Floodplain Management. One amendment pertains to the requirements of a

preliminary site plan. Mrs. Daves-Johnson said there are three items presently required on Final Site Plans

and should also be included at the Preliminary Site Plan review stage, and include location of signs,

exterior site lighting, and buffer yards and site landscaping.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

In Re: Public Hearing: Amendment to Subdivision Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a continued Public

Hearing on the proposed amendments to the Prince Edward County Subdivision Ordinance. Notice of this

hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, September 20, 2013 and the Friday, September 27,

2013 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mrs. Daves-Johnson requested the Board to adopt the amendments to the Subdivision Ordinance

as they were proposed at the October Public Hearing, and to add the definition of "development" used by

the State Code as there is not presently a definition for "development" in the Subdivision Ordinance. The

definition in the State Code is as follows:

"Development" means a tract of land developed or to be developed as a unit under single

ownership or unified control which is to be used for any business or industrial purpose or is to contain three or more residential dwelling units. The term "development" shall not

be construed to include any tract of land which will be principally devoted to agricultural

production.

The Planning Commission, at its July 16, 2013 meeting, unanimously voted to recommend that the

Board of Supervisors adopt amendments to the Prince Edward County Subdivision Ordinance. The

proposed amendments pertain to sections of the Subdivision Ordinance which need to be revised to comply

with state requirements for the mapping of dam break inundation zones and developments in dam break

inundation zones: Code of Virginia Sections 10.1-606.2, 10.1-606.3, 15.2-2201, 15.2-2241, 15.2-2243.1

In Re: Highway Matters

Supervisor Campbell reported the need for a deceleration lane, eastbound off Route 460 onto Sulphur Springs Road, Route 657. Mr. Kevin Wright stated VDOT recently evaluated several turning lane locations throughout the Lynchburg district; the ones that will be focused on will be the ones with a current high-accident rate.

Mr. Wright stated the Six Year Plan Public Hearing will be held on November 21 at the Kirkley Hotel in Lynchburg; the County Administrator will attend.

Supervisor Jones stated citizens on Pinebrook Road up to the intersection with Routes 307 and 460 are concerned with the steep drop-offs on Route 307 that need guard rails. Mr. Wright stated guard rail reviews will be done at other areas and will add that area to the list.

Supervisor Campbell stated the Prospect Christian Academy has requested a sign be place on Route 460; Mr. Wright stated he will contact the school administration; the request will need a study to be performed.

Mr. Wright discussed VDOT's new policy regarding the installation of "Watch for Children" signs. He stated that until recently, *Virginia Code* § 33.1-210.2 provided that the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) would install and maintain "Watch for Children" signs requested by localities. In 2012, *Virginia Code* § 33.1-210.2 was amended to make localities responsible for the installation and maintenance costs of new "Watch for Children" signs.

The Virginia Supplement to the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) authorizes the installation of "Watch for Children" signs in residential areas on VDOT-maintained secondary routes to alert motorists that children may be in the vicinity. As recently amended, Virginia Code § 33.1-210.2 now allows localities to assume responsibility for the installation and maintenance of these signs; VDOT will no longer install or maintain new signs.

To assume this responsibility, localities must enter into an agreement with VDOT identifying the specific locations of any new sign(s). VDOT retains the authority to approve the location of the signs. If the locality's agreement is approved by VDOT, the locality would be responsible for all costs associated with the installation and maintenance of the new signs. For future additional signs, the locality would submit an addendum to the original agreement to VDOT for its approval. A land use permit is also required. The VDOT Agreement specifies that these signs may be installed in two locations:

- Within a subdivision: a single sign may be placed on streets that are major entry points if the statutory or posted speed limit is 35 mph or less.
- Not within a subdivision: a single sign may be placed beyond the speed limit sign at the major approach to a residential development where there is 1/3 mile or more residential development (either side of roadway) with direct frontage/access if the speed limit is 35 mph or less.

These signs may not be installed:

• On any roadway where the speed limit exceeds 35 mph;

- In lieu of a standard Playground sign used to warn motorists of a designated playground;
- At a location where school warning signs are in place;
- In combination (same pole) with any other regulatory or warning signs;
- Preceding any existing regulatory or warning signs; and
- Closer than 200 feet to any existing regulatory or warning signs.

Maintenance of existing signs that were previously installed by VDOT will remain the responsibility of VDOT until such signs have reached the end of their useful life or until its current inventory of signs is exhausted.

Prior to July 1, 2012, the Board considered every "Watch for Children" sign request because a Board Resolution requesting VDOT to install and maintain those signs was required. If the Board would like for the County to install new "Watch for Children" signs at the County's expense, staff recommends that County staff administer the program through the following process:

- Watch for Children sign requests are submitted to the County Administrator's Office;
- Staff will evaluate each request to determine whether it meets the criteria listed above;
- Following staff review, staff submits request to the Board of Supervisors for approval;
- Following Board action, an addendum to the VDOT Agreement and the required land use permit is submitted to VDOT for its approval;
- County staff installs and maintains any approved signs.

If the Board should so choose, signs could also be installed and maintained at County expense without additional Board review or approval, if the request meets the siting criteria and is approved by VDOT.

VDOT estimates the cost for materials and labor to install each sign in FY 14 to be approximately \$850.00. VDOT has no historical data regarding the number of signs it installed during any given year or the number of existing signs that had to be repaired. If the Board wishes to assume the cost of these signs, staff proposes appropriating \$4,240.00 (the cost of five sets) to a new line item in the General Properties Department's funding to cover the cost of any signs installed during this fiscal year. For signs in future years, the funding for the program would need to be included in the operating budget.

The Board may also choose to not have additional "Watch for Children" signs installed in Prince Edward County, or the Board may choose to require that the requesting individual assume the cost of the sign installation and future maintenance or replacement if needed. Under this option it would still be the responsibility of County staff to install and maintain the signs.

Supervisor Campbell stated a sign needs to be posted at Route 615 and 657. Mr. Wright stated that in order for an area to qualify for a speed study, the traffic count has to be over 400 vehicles per day and it has to meet a certain crash rate. He said VDOT will review that area. He said there are other options.

Supervisor Simpson questioned the School Bus Stop Sign located on Route 600 in Rice; Mr. Wright said that is a separate issue. Supervisor Simpson stated that a mile down Route 619 and to the left, where Route 600 continues straight, there is dense population and requested the area be reviewed for a 45mph speed limit.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones made a motion to approve the Resolution to Assume the "Watch for Children" Signs Program.

RESOLUTION TO ASSUME THE "WATCH FOR CHILDREN" SIGNS PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Virginia Code § 33.1210.2 was amended in 2012 to make localities responsible for the installation and maintenance of "Watch for Children" signs, which was previously the responsibility of the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT); and

WHEREAS, any locality that wishes to assume the responsibility for the installation and maintenance of new "Watch for Children" signs must enter into an agreement with VDOT identifying the specific location of any new signs, which must be approved by VDOT, and must submit addendums for any future additional signs to VDOT for its approval; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors finds it is in the best interest of the County of Prince Edward for the County to assume the responsibility for the installation and maintenance of new "Watch for Children" signs in the County of Prince Edward;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the County to administer the "Watch for Children" signs program and authorizes the County Administrator to execute VDOT's Agreement for the Installation and Maintenance of "Watch for Children" Signs in a form approved by the County Attorney and to execute future Addendums to that Agreement to be submitted to VDOT after determining that the sign request meets the siting criteria.

Discussion followed regarding adding further criteria.

Chairman Fore appointed Supervisor Gantt, Supervisor McKay and Supervisor Wilck to a Committee to come up with County policy for answering requests for "Watch for Children" signs.

Mr. Wright and Supervisor Campbell will go look at the location at Route 615 and Route 657.

<u>In Re: Donation Request – New Horizons Community Action Partnership</u>

Mr. Bartlett stated the County received a letter from Henry J. Featherston, Interim Executive

Director of the New Horizons Community Action Partnership, requesting a donation from the County.

New Horizons Community Action Partnership is formerly known as H.O.P.E. Community Services, Inc.

and is the community action agency created to promote job training, work experience, education and

nutrition, housing and economic development programs to better the general welfare of people of south

central Virginia (Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway, and Prince Edward Counties).

Mr. Featherston stated the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides approximately

\$301,000; there is a requirement of a 20% match from the Counties served by New Horizons Community

Action Partnership, which would equal \$60,000. He requested approval of providing Prince Edward

County's share which would be \$10,000.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to table this request until budget time. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Simpson made a substitute motion to authorize the 20% match when notice of the grant

is approved, with the County to pay \$10,000. Discussion followed.

Chairman Fore stated a vote would be taken to determine the main motion; he called for a vote on Supervisor Gantt's motion to table this request until budget time. The motion carried:

In Re: Request from Sheriff

Mr. Bartlett stated the Personnel Committee met on October 2, 2013; the Personnel Committee comprises Supervisor Simpson (Chair), Supervisor Campbell and Supervisor Wilck.

One item on the Personnel Committee agenda was a request from Sheriff Reed to increase the hourly pay of Deputy Gary Dudley, a part-time Court Officer, from \$15.89 to \$20.00 per hour. This deputy worked 1,025 hours last year. The result of this request will increase expenses to the County by \$4,535 annually and approximately \$3,400 this fiscal year. The Board considered this request at its October meeting and voted to table it until the November meeting.

Sheriff Reed presented a recommendation for Officer Dudley, stating that he is instrumental to the safety of the Courthouse and that Officer Dudley is a certified police officer and is a retired State Police officer.

Supervisor Gantt stated the Board voted unanimously on November 1, 2012 that there would be no increases until the budget came up again in March and April. Sheriff Reed responded by saying the funding comes from the Court money.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to authorize the increase in Officer Dudley's pay from \$15.89 to \$20.00 per hour.

Supervisor Gantt made the recommendation to change the policy and that the previous policy be added to the minutes prior to the vote.

Excerpt: November 15, 2012 Board of Supervisors Meeting Minutes:

In Re: Salary Adjustments

Mr. Bartlett stated that Vice Chairman Simpson and Chairman Fore requested that the discussion of adjusting the salaries by two steps of the three employees who are responsible for the cleaning of the AG building be revisited.

During the October Board meeting, the duties of these three employees were increased when the part-time employee who cleaned one-half of the building retired. That position will not be filled and the responsibility of the position was divided between the three full-time employees. Not filling the part-time position equates to an annual savings to the County of \$19,639.

Mr. Bartlett said with the increase in duties it is proposed to increase the three workers' salary by two steps. This equates to approximately a 4.5% increase for each employee. The total cost increase for all three including benefits of the proposal is \$4,460. After this proposed increase the County would realize a net savings of \$15,179 annually.

Discussion followed.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion to grant the proposed increase in salary to two maintenance staff.

Supervisor Gantt made a substitute motion to grant the proposed increase in salary to two maintenance staff members and to make a policy for handling of salary increases only at budget time.

After some discussion, Supervisor Wilck withdrew his motion.

Supervisor Gantt amended his motion, seconded by Supervisor Wilck, to grant the proposed increase in salary and to make a policy to not allow salary increases, bonuses, vacation days, benefits or any other monetary changes in pay except as set forth in the County's annual

budget, effective November 1, 2012; the motion carried:

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated the *Code of Virginia* states the funding can be used for courtroom security and other increases in salary have been granted.

Mr. Bartlett stated the County collects less than \$100,000 in that fund; much more is spent from local funding on Courthouse security.

Chairman Fore then called for the vote on Supervisor Simpson's motion, to authorize the increase in Officer Dudley's pay from \$15.89 to \$20.00 per hour. The motion carried:

In Re: Corridor Overlay District

Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated that at its May meeting, the Board of Supervisors conducted a Public

Hearing on the Corridor Overlay District that was prepared by the Planning Commission and recommended

to the Board as an Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance. Following the Public Hearing, the Board voted to

table the Corridor Overlay District for six months and asked that it be placed on the November Board

agenda.

The Planning Commission's recommendation is that the Board of Supervisors approve an

amendment to the Zoning Ordinance which will provide for a Highway Corridor Overlay District and for

the Board to determine whether it wishes to apply the Highway Corridor Overlay District to the specified

sections of all of the proposed corridors - U.S. 15 (Northern and Southern sections), U.S. 360 and U.S.

460, or to phase it in beginning with Route 15 South of Farmville.

Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated that if the Board wishes to proceed with the recommendation of the

Planning Commission, the Board may wish to consider authorizing a Public Hearing on the proposed

amendment to the County Zoning Ordinance since six months have lapsed since the first public hearing.

She stated the County Administration recommends the Corridor Overlay District only apply to U.S. 15

from the U.S. 460 by-pass south to State Route 646, Farmville Lake Road and State Route 786, Granite

Falls Boulevard and all references to the design guide be removed. The design guide could still be provided to any developer but the removal makes it clear it is not mandatory. It is recommended these changes be made prior to advertising the public hearing; this recommendation is made due to the inherent differences between a four-lane divided highway and a two lane road, greater development pressures for U.S. 15, differences in residential densities and existing development.

Discussion followed.

In Re: Upcoming Public Hearings

Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated the Planning Commission has advertised a Public Hearing for its November 19, 2013 meeting to consider a Special Use Permit application by Patricia Cheatham to operate a flea market use with a restaurant use on a parcel in the A-2 (Agricultural Residential) District and further identified as Tax Map Parcel 50-A-101, located at 18 County Shop Road. This Special Use Permit application is a Compliance Permit because these uses have already begun on this parcel.

Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated the Planning Commission has scheduled two Public Hearings at its December 17, 2013 meeting to consider two Special Use Permit applications from National Communication Towers to construct two Tower Uses on properties in the A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) district. The first proposed tower location is on a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel 120-A-43, owned by Mildred B. Hampton, and located in the Simplicity area on West Patrick Henry Highway in Meherrin. The second proposed tower location is on a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel 122-A-20, Bruceville Tract #18, owned by David and Caraletta Orton, and located in the Bruceville area on West Patrick Henry Highway in Meherrin.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing at their October 15, 2013 meeting to consider an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the use of communication towers for county emergency operations equipment. There were public comments which led to changes in the draft language. This is being reviewed at their November 19, 2013 meeting and should be ready for Public Hearing by the Board of Supervisors at its December 10, 2013 meeting.

In Re: Helton House Inc. TROF Grant

Mrs. Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development, stated that at the July 9, 2013 Board of Supervisors Meeting, the Board approved incentives, which also included Local Incentives for Helton House, Inc. Since that time, the owners of Helton House, Inc. have reconsidered their potential investment and job creation commitment and have revised their performance levels. Helton House, Inc. is prepared to commit to \$1,025,000 in land, building; building improvements and vehicle investments. Helton House, Inc. is also willing to commit to the creation of 28 new positions.

Mrs. Carney said that, in addition, Prince Edward County has recently been notified of the Tobacco Commission's award for a Tobacco Regional Opportunity Fund (TROF) grant on behalf of Helton House, Inc. in the amount of \$80,000. The TROF award by the Tobacco Commission takes into consideration the revised commitments of August 22, 2013. Helton House, Inc. was not eligible for Governor's Opportunity Funds (GOF).

The Tobacco Commission will hold Prince Edward County liable for the reimbursement of TROF funds in the event of a failure by Helton House, Inc. to meet certain performance agreement provisions. To

protect the County from any potential "claw-back" implications, Michael and Edward Helton have agreed to provide a Letter of Credit or a Performance Bond, suitable to the County, with Prince Edward County named as the beneficiary, in an amount equal to the \$80,000 grant award. The Letter of Credit or Performance Bond will not be released until the County is released by the Tobacco Commission from any obligation for the TROF funds. All requirements must be met within 36 months, commencing no later than December 23, 2013 and ending December 2016.

Virginia's Growth Alliance:

Virginia Local Disability Program (VLDP):

Mr. Bartlett stated that during the October meeting the Board of Supervisors decided to opt out of the state

run VLDP program and provide the mandated benefit through the VACORP program to be run by Standard

Insurance. Since the Board's decision, VRS has lowered its rate from .91% to .60%. This then prompted

VACORP/Standard to decrease their rates from .79% to .59%. No other part of either program was

changed. The VACORP/Standard program still provides more benefits at a lower cost.

This change by VRS validates the belief that the only way to control future cost increases is with

open competition. Only by opting out of the state program can the County maintain competition in the

future. County staff recommends the County opt-out of the VRS-administered VLDP. If the Board

approves this recommendation no action is required.

The Board concurred with opting out of the VRS-administered VLDP.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, Norfolk Southern Corporation is considering the abandonment of 1.00 mile of rail line between Milepost N 167.9 and Milepost N 168.9 in Prince Edward County, Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Norfolk Southern Corporation previously abandoned approximately 31 miles of adjoining rail line between the Town of Burkeville, Virginia and the Town of Pamplin, Virginia, which has become *High Bridge Trail State Park*, a 31-mile rails-to-trails, linear state park; and

WHEREAS, the development of *High Bridge Trail State Park* along this abandoned rail corridor has resulted in the creation of one of Virginia's premier outdoor recreational and heritage tourism attractions, and has provided for the protection of High Bridge, the iconic and historically significant railroad bridge structure; and

WHEREAS, the proposed abandonment of 1.00 mile of rail line between Milepost N 167.9 and Milepost 168.9 could enable the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation to extend *High Bridge Trail State Park* the last mile into the Town of Pamplin, thus enhancing economic and recreational opportunities in this community;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, has determined that the abandonment of the 1.00 mile of rail line between Milepost N 167.9 and Milepost N 168.9 in Prince Edward County, Virginia is consistent with existing land use plans and the long-range strategic vision of the Board of Supervisors, which is that the abandoned rail corridor will be conveyed to the Commonwealth of Virginia for the singular purpose of extending *High Bridge Trail State Park* into the Town of Pamplin; and

BE IT RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, wholeheartedly endorses the abandonment of the 1.00 mile of rail line between Milepost N 167.9 and Milepost N 168.9 in Prince Edward County, Virginia, and hereby respectfully requests that Norfolk Southern corporation give all possible consideration to immediately conveying the resulting abandoned rail corridor to the Commonwealth of Virginia for the express purpose of extending *High Bridge Trail State Park* into the Town of Pamplin.
