Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official

record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for

follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate

response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board

agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the

opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public

information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any

factual error that might occur.

There were no citizens wishing to speak at this time.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Campbell inquired about the limit on the real estate tax relief for the elderly. Mr. Wade

Bartlett, County Administrator, said a limit is placed on the total assets for the household; he will contact

the Commissioner of Revenue for details to report to Supervisor Campbell.

Supervisor Wilck stated citizens have expressed concerns regarding the amount that could be

required of the taxpayers if the developer cannot pay the bonds for the debt service [on the Granite Falls

project]. He stated a public hearing is needed in advance of the second vote on the bonds. The developer

has refused to give him the names of his associates and his lending source. He contacted an attorney who

stated as there are taxpayer funds involved, the developer is required to disclose those names so we have

time to vet the people and make sure the lending source is credible.

Supervisor Wilck, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, made a motion to hold a public hearing

on the funding of the Granite Falls Project four weeks in advance of the second bond vote, and that the

developer be present at the meeting to disclose who his associates are and the lending institution.

Discussion followed on the County's liability for the debt if the bonds fail. Supervisor McKay

asked if a public hearing was already required. Mr. Bartlett stated there already must be a public hearing in

the process; he said the County's bond attorneys and financial advisors will be asked what the timeline will

be.

Chairman Fore restated Supervisor Wilck's motion to hold a public hearing on the Granite Falls

Project four weeks in advance of the second bond vote, and that the developer is present at the meeting to

disclose the associates and lending institution; the motion carried:

In Re: Economic Development Department Report

Mrs. Sharon Carney, Economic Development Director, presented an update on the activities of the Prince Edward Economic Development Office from 2004 through April 2012, including active projects, inquiries and grant projects closed out. She stated there has been a marked increase in inquiries regarding business and industries locating to Prince Edward County. She stated the strong support demonstrated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors has been the primary reason for the success in acquiring financing and grants for economic development projects, even in tough economic times. She stated the office is working with 12 business and industry recruitment projects and from 2004 through 2010, there have been 42 Enterprise Zone grants totaling over \$3,032,000.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Kevin Wright, VDOT, gave a verbal update on the recent activities, including mowing and resurfacing of secondary roadways, and normal maintenance. There is no major construction.

Supervisor Jones stated that on Route 736, trees are over-hanging the road and there are several potholes that need filled. He questioned the funding allotted for snow removal and where it will be used since there was none needed. Mr. Wright stated the funding went to repairs and VDOT was able to continue working through the winter doing surfacing; he added there was not a huge savings.

Supervisor Simpson asked about the status of Scott Drive; Mr. Wright said he has not received information at this time.

Supervisor Campbell reported a large oak tree appears ready to fall on the eastbound lane of Route 460; he added Route 663 is now in very poor shape, down to Rosson Mill; it appears the road is giving away.

Mr. Wright stated slope-clearing is being completed; more clean-up will be done in addition to the trees that have been removed along the highway.

Supervisor Campbell reported that along Route 460 Eastbound, near Dowdy's Corner and the Tuggle Road Bridge, several dead trees have been cut down but not removed.

Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, April 27, 2012 and Friday, May 4, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the Public Hearing.

Mr. Kevin Wright reviewed the Secondary Six Year Plan; the draft Six Year Plan shows revenues of only about \$50,000 each year in Telefees, which is utility usage of the Right of Way. He said there are two projects currently: Route 643 (Back Hampden-Sydney Road), which is in the design stage; and Route 601 (Aspen Hill Road), which is also in the design stage and is expected to begin construction next spring. He stated there were funds available to develop a new project; the Route 725, Watson Bridge Road, project matched well with the funding available. The project is in draft plan and is expected to begin in June 2015. It is in the draft Plan that the road be added.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

Chairman Fore stated the nominees submitted by the Citizen Committees are, for District 301: Timothy Corbett, MD, and Harriett Fentress; for District 501: Russell L. Dove, and Melvin R. Reynolds, Jr.

Chairman Fore opened the Public Hearing.

Dr. Timothy Corbett stated his involvement in and familiarity with the community, and expressed his passion for the schools.

Harriett Fentress stated she is a retired educator and that during the course of her time on the School Board, she has earned 96 credits from the School Board Association. She then questioned the criteria for School Board selection.

Chairman Fore explained that in April, the Citizen Committees presented their lists of candidates interested after they had been interviewed. Mr. Bartlett added the Citizen Committees had not met to interview all of the candidates by the April 10 regular meeting date. Discussion followed.

Melvin Reynolds, Jr., stated his reason to serve on the School Board is that change is needed in the schools.

Russell Dove stated he has the passion and commitment to serve all of the students at Prince Edward County Schools.

Virginia Dillard, Leigh District, questioned the process of the School Board appointments; Chairman Fore explained that the Citizen Committee is to interview the nominees and have the task of finding people that qualify for the position. The entire Board of Supervisors has the sole responsibility of appointing the candidate; neither the Supervisor for the district nor the Citizen Committee selects the candidate. Discussion followed.

Virginia Dillard, Donna Pride, Brenda Gray, and Barbara Shepperson spoke in support of Mrs. Fentress.

Craig Reed, Pamela Hurak, Sasha Trent, Kenneth Jackson, Jerry Townsend, and Bemeche Hicks spoke in support of both incumbents, Mrs. Fentress and Mr. Dove.

Brock Robinson stated the School Board needed new members because the schools are failing.

Billy Sublett and Wayne O'Brien expressed their support for Mr. Dove.

Supervisor Gantt stated that many citizens requested change in the schools and that the Prince Edward County Schools are in the bottom five percent in the nation. He stated the mission statement states we have a world class school system but there is a wide difference between expectation and delivery.

Chairman Fore stated that during this public hearing, he broke protocol of allowing only the normal three to five minutes for a citizen to present their opinion, because this is an important issue.

Supervisor Simpson and Chairman Fore explained the process for the School Board selection in further detail. Discussion followed. Supervisor Gantt stated that he wanted five members on the Citizen Committee to better represent the entire district; he said all was done publicly and nothing was done inappropriately.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

In Re: School Budget Procedures

Mr. Bartlett stated the Board of Supervisors discussed, during its April 26, 2012 meeting, the procedures currently in place for appropriating funds to the schools. There were two major points of discussion; the first was regarding the appropriation of funds annually by Category, as is the current practice, vice appropriating funds in a lump sum. The school desires the funds to be appropriated in a lump sum vice by category. This would allow the School Board greater flexibility in the use of funds and allow a faster response whenever situations arise that would require a shift in funds between categories. Currently, for funds to be moved between categories, the School Board would have to meet and approve such a request from the Superintendent and then request a meeting of the Board of Supervisors to request approval of the same action.

Supervisor Gantt said they should provide the school any relief possible.

Dr. Smith stated passing the first topic provides more flexibility for the School Board. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett then said that the second topic of discussion was to allow the School Board to retain any unspent funds in the School Fund. Current practice is for the General Fund to only provide the exact amount required to balance the School Fund after taking into account the state and federal revenues received and comparing them to the actual expenses, subject to the maximum amount of local funds approved and appropriated by the Board of Supervisors. This request would require the Board of Supervisors to appropriate the entire amount of local funds when all budget items are appropriated, normally during the June Board of Supervisors meeting. While all funds would be appropriated, due to cash flow purposes the funds would not be moved from the General Fund to the Schools fund except on a monthly or quarterly as the Board desires.

At the end of the fiscal year, any funds not expended from the School Fund would be retained in the School Fund. This would allow the School Board flexibility in building the school budget for the next year. If the Board of Supervisors approves this request, it is recommended that the Board of Supervisors requires the School Board to make a specific request for the use of any funds from the fund balance which would require the Board of Supervisors to vote on the request. Mr. Bartlett also recommended such funds only be used for one-time costs such as capital items (equipment or projects costing \$5,000 or greater) until such time as the fund balance accumulates to an amount sufficient enough to allow funding operational expenses during times of economic downturn.

Discussion followed regarding the current practice and the proposed change.

Supervisor Jones questioned the effect it would have if a decision would be delayed until next month; Dr. Smith indicated that he understood this would not apply to the current years' ending balances.

The Board concurred to table this agenda item until the June 12, 2012 meeting.
