At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House,

Chairman Fore called the May meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

Jeannette Tarlton, Prospect District, expressed her concern regarding the proposed tax increases. She said the recent purchase of the "senior citizen building" would not benefit all County citizens, and said the people coming to the conference center would have nothing to do in the community to bring revenue to the community.

Sam Campbell, Buffalo District, said he opposes the proposed tax increase, and asked the Board to not pass the budget with the increases.

Henry Shelton, Prospect District, spoke against the proposed tax increase and the recent reassessment. He said it is difficult to meet the requirements to qualify for the elderly tax relief program. He also stressed the need for improvement in the schools.

Kenneth Jackson, President of the Mary E. Branch Community Center, gave a brief history of the Center and asked for financial support from the Board of Supervisors. He said 150 children rely on the six-week summer program offered by the Center.

Supervisor Simpson inquired about the number of certified employees; Mr. Jackson said three are being certified. Further discussion followed regarding the curriculum and programs offered by the Center.

Bemeche Hicks, Lockett District, expressed his support for the Mary E. Branch Community Center.

Deborah Hicks-Sheely, Leigh District, spoke in support of the Mary E. Branch Community Center, and asked the Board to consider funding the Center.

Russell Smith, Farmville District, spoke in support of the Mary E. Branch Community Center.

Michelle Raybold, Farmville District, asked the Board to consider an amendment to the way health insurance coverage is handled for families when both adults work for the County government.

Lacy B. Ward, Prospect District, gave a brief history of the Bush 4-B Access Road, and asked the Board to find out why the issue has not yet been resolved.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Campbell announced there will be a Prospect Community meeting at the Prospect Fire House at 7:00 p.m. He said the Highway Department will be in attendance.

In Re: Highway Matters

Kevin Wright, Kevin Wright, Interim Residency Administrator, VDOT, said the VDOT reorganization is going well; he will remain the point of contact until a liaison to the County can be appointed. He said the call center is also working well.

Mr. Wright said the Route 751 reconstruction project is on schedule; bids were received and are being reviewed. The Route 628 Revenue Sharing Project is being reviewed, and approval is forthcoming.

Supervisor Campbell said citizens have informed him citizens are pleased with the bush hogging efforts of the VDOT staff.

In Re: Public Hearing: School Board Appointments

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board Appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the April 23, 2010, April 30, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Peter Gur, candidate for District 101, expressed his concern for Prince Edward County Schools' failed academic record. He said the school must change the curriculum to raise the SOLs.

Linda Leatherwood, candidate for District 101, said she was glad to serve and would like to continue.

Dr. Lawrence Varner, candidate for District 801, said it has been an honor to serve on the Prince Edward County School Board and he felt it would be a privilege to be appointed to continue to serve.

Lacy B. Ward said that he was shocked that Prince Edward County Schools rank near the bottom of the list, and that someone is failing the Prince Edward County School system. He said it is a crucial thing and has great bearing on economic development. He expressed his support for Mr. Gur, a teacher at the Governor's School.

Phoebe Gur-Chiang stated she witnessed a lock-down of the school and expressed her concern about the school safety issues. She said a change is needed, and the students are the hope for the future. Michelle Raybold said the Prince Edward County School Board is working hard on the safety issues at the schools.

Reverend Dr. Deborah Hicks-Sheely spoke in support of Mr. Gur; she said change is needed, and suggested a change be made from appointment of school board members by the Board of Supervisors to a vote by the citizens.

Kate Shorter spoke in support of Linda Leatherwood.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Chairman Fore said the appointments would be made at the June 8, 2010 meeting.

In Re: Public Hearing - Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on the Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the April 28, 2010 and May 5, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore said that at the April 20, 2010 Board meeting, the Board discussed amendments to the County's Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance, which would effectively increase the tax on most vehicle classifications by \$10.00, as an alternative to solely raising the tax rate on real estate.

Chairman Fore then opened the public hearing.

Jeannette Tarlton, Leigh District, expressed her concern about an increase in taxes and said since the County did away with the paper decals, there should be a savings.

Sharon Dotson, Leigh District, said that no one wants an increase in their taxes, but if there must be an increase, the increase in the vehicle tax would make the tax burden spread more equally than just raising taxes for the landowners.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing. No action was taken at this time.

In Re: Public Hearing: Amendment to the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the April 23, 2010, April 30, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said that at its April meeting, the Board was informed the county had received a request to consider an amendment to the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance relating to the siting of sewerage systems within 500 feet of the reservoir's normal pool. Presently, this is not permitted per Board action in 2005. The Board authorized a public hearing on an amendment which would reduce the setback for dwellings using advanced technologies such as alternative on-site sewage systems. Specifically, the amendment would allow the siting of dwellings up to 200 feet from the reservoir as long as the soil treatment area is located not less than 500 feet of the reservoir.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Supervisor McKay requested information regarding the alternative on-site sewage system that would be used. Paul Freed, Prince Edward County Health Department, said the waste is treated within the system prior to being released to the drain field. He asked Paul Louis, a private soils scientist and Soils Consultant, to explain in more detail. Discussion followed.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to approve the amendment to the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance as presented; the motion carried:

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.1-13 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA 1950, AS AMENDED

Sec. 82.31.

- a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
 - 1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
 - 2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy river Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640, at the end of Route 792, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
 - 3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
 - 4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward.
 - 5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
 - 6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind or description.
 - 7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
 - 8) Operation in or on the reservoir of a windsurfer, sailboard or any wind-propelled vessel, other than a sailboat, length of which shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet.
 - 9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
 - 10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the Countyowned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - 11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - 12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
 - 13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
 - 14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.
 - 15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicle, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the

reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.

- 16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads. Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measures and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.
- 17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- 18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners with express written permission from Prince Edward County may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- 19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the County-owned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
- 20) The siting of dwellings using "conventional onsite sewage systems,: as defined by Virginia Board of Health Regulations, within 500 feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir. Dwellings utilizing an "alternative on-site sewage system" with "secondary effluent" or better as defined by Virginia Board of Health Regulations, and approved by the Virginia Department of Health, may be sited not closer than 200 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir, so long as the soil treatment area is located not less than 500 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- 21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-woned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of authorization, and shall maintain the area in that condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall, on conviction of a first offense of a violation of this section, be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor, as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

In Re: Public Hearing: Request to Rezone Worsham School Property

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the request of Watts Contractors, Inc. and Ross Fickenscher to rezone the Worsham School property. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the April 23, 2010, April 30, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Pickett said that at its April 19, 2010 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing on a request by Watts Contractors, Inc. and Ross Fickenscher to rezone the Worsham School property, at 8832 Abilene Road, from A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) to R-3 (Medium Density Residential) and on an amendment to Section 3.100.3 of the County Zoning Ordinance to allow apartments to be served by private water and sewer. He said the County Zoning Ordinance currently requires multi-family dwellings be served by public water and sewer. The purpose of the rezoning requuest is to allow for the rehabilitation of the school building, agricultural building and cannery into a total of 20 apartment units.

Mr. Pickett said the County Attorney recommended the rezoning request and the proposed Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance be advertised for separate public hearings; he said the applicant is aware of the recommendation.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to cancel the public hearing on the rezoning and the amendment to the zoning ordinance originally scheduled for May 11, 2010 at 7:30 p.m.; the motion carried:

# In Re: Bush River 4-B Access Drive

• Item #15: New addition to By-Laws addressing Planning Commissioner's attendance at a Virginia Certified Planning Commissioner's Training Program. (On-line versions also offered.)

Bylaws Of Prince Edward County Planning Commission

- 1. Meetings shall be held on a monthly basis, normally on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:30 P.M. in the Board of Supervisor's room. The schedule may be altered at any regularly scheduled meeting. Meetings may be cancelled due to lack of business, but the Commission shall meet at least every two months.
- 2. Additional meetings may be held at any time upon the call of the chairman, or by a majority of the members of the commission, or upon request of the Board of Supervisors following at least twenty-four hours' notice to each member of the commission.
- 3. The commission at its regular meeting in January of each year shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman. The recording secretary shall be the Director of Planning and Community Development or a designated alternate, who shall make an audiotape of the proceedings of each meeting and prepare minutes for the permanent records of the commission.
- 4. The duties and powers of the officers of the planning commission shall be as follows:
  - a. Chairman
    - Preside at all meetings of the commission.
    - Call special meetings of the commission in accordance with the bylaws.
    - Sign documents of the commission.
    - See that all actions of the commission are properly taken.
  - b. Vice-Chairman

During the absence, disability, or disqualification of the chairman, the vicechairman shall exercise or perform all duties and be subject to all the responsibilities of the chairman.

c. Recording Secretary

- Prepare an audiotape of the proceedings of each meeting of the commission.
- Prepare minutes from the audiotape of each meeting in detail sufficient to include the tenor of public comments and the commission's reasoning underlying each decision or recommendation.
- Circulate a copy of the minutes to each member of the commission before the next meeting.
- Prepare the agenda for all commission meetings.
- Be custodian of commission records.
- Inform the commission of correspondence relating to business of the commission and attend to such correspondence.
- Handle funds allocated to the commission in accordance with its directives, state law, and county ordinances.
- Sign official documents of the commission.
- 5. All maps, plats, site plans, and other materials submitted to the commission shall be filed in the office of the Director of Planning and Community Development and maintained for public access until the project to which they relate has been completed or vacated. Minutes of the commission's meetings shall be permanently filed in the office of the planner and maintained for public access.
- 6. Matters referred to the commission by the Board of Supervisors shall be placed on the calendar for consideration and possible action at the first meeting of the commission after the referral and appropriate public notification.
- 7. A majority of the members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but no quorum shall be required for informational meetings at which no action is to be taken.
- 8. Reconsideration of any decision of the commission may be taken when the interested party for such reconsideration makes a showing satisfactory to the chairman that, without fault or deliberate omission on his own part, essential facts were not presented to the chairman.
- 9. <u>*Roberts Rules of Order for Committees*</u> shall govern the commission's proceedings in all cases not specifically ordered by these bylaws.
- 10. Order of consideration of agenda items in a public hearing:
  - Director of Planning and Community Development or other staff member presents report including summary of all comments (written, electronic and verbal) received from interested parties and makes a recommendation.
  - Commission members may question the staff member on the presentation.
  - Proponent(s) of the agenda item make presentations as appropriate.
  - Opponent(s) of the agenda item make presentations as appropriate.
  - Applicant make rebuttal of objections not previously covered.
  - Commission members may question applicant, proponents, or opponents or may offer comments on the agenda item.
  - Commission may opt to gather additional information about the matter and take action at a future meeting, or vote on recommendation, whether approving or denying request, to Board of Supervisors.
- 11) Any member of the commission who has any personal or financial interest in any matter before the commission shall declare the nature of that interest and shall if the interest constitutes a legal conflict of interest by Virginia law recuse him/herself from the

deliberations on that matter, including lobbying other members, participating in the discussions, or voting on the matter. In cases where the interests do not raise to the level of legal conflict of interest by Virginia law, a member may voluntarily recuse him/herself in the interest of avoiding the appearance of conflict. All commission members shall be sensitive to the importance of impartiality and shall endeavor to always avoid any actual or appearance of conflict of interest.

- 12) Each member of the commission who has knowledge that he/she will be unable to attend a scheduled meeting of the commission shall notify the County Administrator's office at the earliest opportunity. The Director of Planning and Community Development shall notify the chairman if projected absences will produce a lack of quorum. Members who are absent from three consecutive meetings, or who are absent from more than half of the commission's meetings during a calendar year, will be referred to the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors for possible replacement.
- 13) The vice-chairman shall succeed the chairman if he vacates his office before his term is completed. A new vice-chairman shall be elected at the next regular meeting.
- 14) These bylaws may be recommended for amendment at any meeting having a quorum present by a majority vote, provided that notice of such proposed amendment has been given to each member in writing at least two weeks prior to its consideration. If recommended for approval, proposed amendments must then be adopted by the Board of Supervisors before becoming effective.
- 15) Planning Commission members are strongly encouraged to attend a Virginia Certified Planning Commissioner's Training Program within two years of their appointment to the Planning Commission. This certification course will provide a basic foundation of planning law, history, and technical expertise needed by planning commissioners to maximize their competency and ability to render legally defensible decisions and recommendations. Costs associated with the program will normally be paid by Prince Edward County.

### In Re: Appointment – Workforce Investment Board

Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development, said her term as a member of the Workforce

Investment Board will expire June 30, 2010. She said she is willing and eligible to serve another two-year

term, if nominated, as an Economic Development representative.

**WHEREAS,** the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission was created to help foster economic development in the tobacco dependent communities of Southside and Southeast Virginia; and

**WHEREAS**, the County of Prince Edward Board of Supervisors would like to submit a grant application for \$4 million to the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission from the "Special Projects Program" due June 2, 2010;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, does hereby support a grant application to the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission for costs associated with the construction of the Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia does hereby authorize the Board Chairman and/or County Administrator to sign all necessary grant documents to execute the application, grant reports and grant contract.

### In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett reported that BB&T agreed to amend the County's line of credit originally obtained in December 2008 to allow an additional draw of up to \$2.1 million to be used to finance the interim agreement with Crowder Construction. He added the County would be able to reimburse itself, and there would be no interest charged until the funds are drawn down.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to amend the line of credit with BB&T and to adopt the Resolution requesting the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia to modify its \$2,500,000 Lease Revenue Note (County of Prince Edward, Virginia Facilities) Series 2008; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said the purchase of the SCOPE building is not yet closed; once the County obtains ownership, he recommended the Board of Supervisors appoint a committee to develop policies for operating the building and running the programs desired by the Board.

Chairman Fore appointed himself, Supervisor Simpson, Supervisor Gantt, and Supervisor Wiley to the committee to develop policies for building and program operation. The Board concurred.

Mr. Bartlett then reported the transition for the County employees' parking has gone smoothly. He said there is more than enough space for all employees. Mr. Bartlett said the changes to paid parking by the Town will cause the County to make changes to Courthouse and Visitor Center lot; he asked if the Board wished the changes to be Board responsibility or an Administrative issue.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion to authorize the County Administration implement necessary changes to the Courthouse and Visitor Center parking lot; the motion carried:

Mr.Bartlett said Bugg's Island Telephone was awarded \$18.9 million to implement a Wireless Broadband network in a 15 county area, one of which is Prince Edward County. They have two years to spend the funding; they have already completed a lot of the background work. He said they want to use the existing 230 towers as much as possible; some will need to be built to fill in the "dead areas." Mr. Bartlett said the rate of speed is up to 10MB, which is about eight times as fast as a T1 line.

Mr. Bartlett then said that in May 2009, the Board authorized the award of the County's audit contract to Robinson, Farmer, Cox renewable for two years. He recommended renewal of the contract.

**Summary:** At is April 19, 2010 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing on a proposed amendment to Section 3-100.3 of the County Zoning Ordinance to allow multi-family dwellings to be served by private water and sewer systems. Currently, the County Zoning Ordinance requires multi-family dwellings be served by public water and sewer.

The amendment has been requested by Watts Contractor's Inc. and Ross Fickenscher who are proposing to rehabilitate the former Worsham school building, agricultural building and cannery into a total of 20 apartment units. Public Water and sewer are not currently available at the former Worsham School property, and the closest public system is Hampden-Sydney College, which is a little over a mile away.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE (in italics)

#### Multi-Family Dwellings

- (A) Intent: The following minimum standards are intended to create a safe and healthy multi-family living environment. Setback and density regulations have been established to ensure an adequate separation between buildings
- (B) General Standards:
  - Applicants for multi-family developments shall submit a site plan in accordance with Sec. 4-100 of this ordinance. The submitted site plan shall be approved by the County prior to commencing development of the site.
  - The following minimum lot areas shall be required for all multi-family dwelling units. The listed square footage requirements shall be in addition to a base minimum lot area required by the district regulations.

Number of Bedrooms in Unit	Square feet Required			
Efficiency	1,500			
One Bedroom	2,000			
Two Bedroom	2,500			
Three Bedrooms	3,000			
Four or more Bedrooms	3,500			

For the purposes of calculating minimum lot area requirements, any room, other than a living room, dining room or area, kitchen, or bathroom that could be used for sleeping purposes shall be counted as a bedroom.

- All multi-family dwellings shall be served by public water and sewer. Exceptions may be considered during the rezoning process for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures.
- 4. A minimum 40 foot separation shall be provided between buildings containing multi-family dwellings. This minimum separation may be reduced to 20 feet if both facing walls contain no windows, doors or balconies, or the corners of adjacent buildings are at right angles to one another.
- Any new or expanded multi-family use containing over 20 units shall devote a minimum of 10 percent of the area of the development to recreational and open space uses.
- 6. Open space and recreation areas may be passive or active. The location and character of open space and recreation areas should be appropriate to meet the needs of residents and shall include such facilities as recreation centers, swimming pools, athletic courts, bikeways, walking trails, picnic areas, tot lots and other similar facilities.

#### REVISED STAFF REPORT BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING AMENDMENT TO SECTION 3-100.3 OF COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE

### 1) Summary of Request

Section 3-100.3 of the zoning ordinance requires multi-family dwellings be served by public water and sewer. Neither is available at the Worsham School location, therefore, an amendment to this section of the zoning ordinance is requested.

#### 2) Public Comments

Prior to the planning commission meeting, staff was made aware that the Prince Edward County Area Firgeighters Association, as well as Hampden-Sydney College (e-mail attached), were not against the project per se, but were against amending the county zoning ordinance to allow private water and sewer to serve the site. The fighfighters felt public water should be required to assist in firefighting; and the college felt it could provide the water from it's existing system, if the developer extended the water lines. At the public hearing, a representative from the firefighters spoke. He still felt public water would be most beneficial, but was encouraged to hear that the applicant was willing to install additional water storage, should the project go forward without public water. No one from the college attended the hearing.

3) Planning Commission Hearing and Recommendations

A soil scientist spoke on the sewage disposal system planned for the project. Following the hearing, the commission voted unanimously to recommend the following:

a) Approval of amending Section 3-100.3 of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance to allow private water and sewer to serve multi-family projects, as long as the project involves the rehabilitation of existing structures. Specifically item # 3 on page 74 of the ordinance, would read:

"All multi-family dwellings shall be served by public water and sewer. Exceptions may be considered during the rezoning process for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures."

# STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Concerning the request to amend Section 3-100.3 of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, staff recommends approval. However, staff feels the amendment should be narrowly tailored to this type of development. My reasoning is that the provision requiring public water and sewer for multi-family dwellings was included in the ordinance, so large residential buildings would be sited in parts of the county where services were adequate and where growth is encouraged. My recommendation is to add the following provision after the water and sewer requirement on page 74: *"Exceptions may be considered during the rezoning process, for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures".* This language greatly restricts the development of multi-family housing in areas of the county without public water and sewer, while at the same time, giving the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors flexibility in dealing with unique projects, such as the one being proposed. New construction of multi-family dwellings would still not be permitted, unless public utilities are available.

If public water and sewer is required, then this project will probably not proceed. The cost of running water alone is estimated at between \$200,000 and \$300,000. While public utilities at this site would be ideal, staff feels the benefits of the project outweigh the negatives of not having these utilities. In addition, the applicant is willing to provide additional water storage. I have been inside all the buildings, and the school and agriculture buildings are suffering considerable water damage. As time goes by, this situation will only worsen, therefore, any delays in the project will likely only increase the cost of rehabilitation.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by Chairman Porterfield.

Chairman Porterfield asked for any changes to the minutes of the March 16, 2010 meeting. Hearing none he declared them approved.

Chairman Porterfield opened the public hearing, the purpose of which is described below: Request of Watts Contractors, Inc. and Ross M Fickenscher to rezone from A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) to R-3 (Medium Density Residential) an 8.96 acre parcel, owned by Watts Contractors, Inc., located at 8832 Abilene Road (Worsham School property; tax map # 064-A-59). The purpose of this request is to permit the applicants to convert the school building, as well as the former agricultural building and cannery building, into a total of 20 apartments.

Chairman Porterfield postponed the staff report and acknowledged the speaker representing the applicant. Ross Fichenscher approached the podium and introduced himself. He provided an overview of the project. The former Worsham School building, circa 1927, has achieved a state and federal historic building designation. The project will include rehabilitation of the school and two accessory buildings, resulting in a total of 20 apartment units, designed as luxury units, and intended for rent by young professionals. It is proposed to have sixteen 1-bedroom units, and four 2-bedroom units. The rent will be structured as an all-inclusive rent payment, so the owner has an incentive to rehabilitate the structure as energy efficiently as possible. Mr. Fickenscher showed examples of similar rehabilitation projects in which he has played a role.

Following the overview, Mr. Coleman inquired about the occupancy rates of the other example projects. Mr. Fickenscher replied that 123 units in Petersburg has a 95% occupancy.

Ms. Gilfillan asked whether the applicant had investigated the occupancy rate of other apartment rental properties in the Farmville area; (yes) and what would stop college students from renting these units and overloading them, emphasizing her concern for water consumption. Mr. Fickenscher agreed that there would be no restriction prohibiting college students from renting the units but added that the water supply well design criteria would be based on a 2 person per bedroom occupancy rate.

Mr. Leatherwood inquired whether a property manager would occupy the building. (No.)

Chairman Porterfield inquired about plans for the sawdust presently stored on site by Longwood University. Mr. Fickenscher explained that the stockpile contract would not be renewed if the rezoning request was approved and the proposed project moved forward.

Ms. Gilfillan expressed her concerns again about an adequate water supply. Mr. Fickenscher explained that the VA Dept of Health called for 3 wells at the site to serve the 24 bedroom building. He offered that the building is situated on 9 acres, so finding satisfactory well sites is anticipated, and reiterated the compliance requirements with VA Dept of Health. Mr. Fickenscher turned to Mr. Paul Louis to discuss the site assessment and on-site waste water system planned.

Mr. Louis, a certified professional soil scientist and licensed Authorized Onsite Soil Evaluator, explained the evaluation conducted at the Worsham School property. He distributed a hand-out which detailed the on-site waste water treatment system designed for the estimated 3,300 gallons per day of effluent from this project. The system included a 4,000 gallon capacity septic tank, followed by a 2,000 gallon Flow Equalization Tank, two reactor tanks for treatment, and a 4,000 gallon pump tank before the effluent was sent to the drain field. The plan included a 100% Reserve Drain Field Area, and the primary and reserve drain fields were both located within the property.

Chairman Porterfield asked Jonathan about estimated costs to provide a water line to the project. Mr. Pickett provided an estimate of \$300,000 to extend service from the Hampden-Sydney system to this site.

Chairman Porterfield called for questions from the Planning Commissioners. A speaker from the audience asked a question pertaining to an evergreen buffer along the northwest property boundary closest to her home. A dense vegetated buffer exists presently. The applicant agreed to plant evergreens.

Various speakers from the audience commenced in direct questioning of the applicant, asking whether the applicant had project examples from rural projects or only "city". The applicant replied that all past project experience was in the urban setting. Another asked where the parking lot would be located. Applicant answered that it was to be determined based on the grading design.

Chairman Porterfield asked the Planning Commissioners for further questions.

Planning Commissioner Townsend asked what effect the loss of power would have on the fire suppression sprinkler system. Chairman Porterfield added a question of whether a back-up generator with an automatic transfer is planned. The applicant admitted that there were presently no plans to provide a generator at the site.

Following this discussion, Chairman Porterfield invited public comment. Mr. Pickett requested that members of the audience approach the podium and use the microphone for their comments. Mrs. Chernault asked about the asbestos concerns and how it would be disposed. Mr. Fickenscher will contract a certified lead abatement and asbestos abatement firm to identify the materials and remove and dispose of the materials properly.

Mr. Tony Williams introduced himself as a member of the Prince Edward IDA, a PE Volunteer Fire Department, the Prince Edward Area Firefighters Association and a full-time firefighter in Dinwiddle County. He reminded the Commissioners of several recent fires in large housing units in this area and pointed out that "water put the fires out." He distributed a hand-out proposing costs and benefits of extending the water line from the HSC system. If the public water was not made available, he recommended an underground tank with a fire pump and suggested the tank be a cistern which would collect the rainwater from the building's roof.

Commissioner Gilliam asked for clarification that if the water line was extended, the three private wells would not be needed which could be an area of cost transfer. Mr. Williams noted that the three wells would not be needed if public water supply was available.

Mr. Williams continued to suggest that PE County, the Public Water Authority, HSC, and the Developer could share construction costs, then transfer ownership of the line to the water authority with an agreement that any water taps installed on the line during a certain period of time would direct funds to the developer to reimburse his percentage of expenses associated with the line extension. The extension would also bring public water closer to Sage Brook, a HSC student housing complex, and the Prince Edward County Cannery.

Mr. L.L. Irving identified himself as the property owner across Rt 665 from the project and asked the applicant why this project "in the country" was chosen. Mr. Fickenscher replied that the size and price was not available elsewhere in Farmville and that their business was to rehabilitate old properties, so this was an ideal project for his first break. Mr. Irving also asked what the asbestos abatement would cost. The applicant replied that it is estimated between \$50,000 and \$75,000.

Commissioner Coleman asked whether the applicant could foresee building additional units on the 9 acre site if public water and wastewater became available. Mr. Fickenscher stated it was not in the current plan.

Commissioner Gilfillan asked whether the developer was willing to discuss terms and conditions of extending the public water service with the County. Mr. Fickenscher stated that he was willing to enter those discussions.

Mr. Pickett interjected that there was some doubt about the Health Department allowing the expansion of the HSC system, citing a previous conversation with the regional office as it pertained to a large community development in the nearby area.

Chairman Porterfield inquired about how secure the construction financing is for the project. Mr. Fickenscher assured him that full support was available through a community bank in Richmond.

Vice-Chairman Mason asked whether Hampden-Sydney College had offered any assistance toward the line extension. Mr. Pickett replied that they had not, and that HSC hasn't expressed any interest in extending the line to the Sage Brook residences in the years that the student duplexes had been occupied.

Chairman Porterfield closed the public hearing at 8:52 p.m. He offered a motion recommending the Board of Supervisors approve the conditional re-zoning of the former Worsham School Property (Tax map #064-A-59) from Agricultural Conservation to Medium-Density Residential for the purpose of renovation of the three Worsham School buildings to one- and two-bedroom

apartments, subject to a satisfactory site plan with the condition that adequate water be available for fire suppression purposes.

There was discussion from Commissioners, clarifying that the wording "rehabilitation" would prevent new construction of additional units on the site and that the requirement for the developer to enter into a conversation with the County about the public water supply be added to the conditions.

The following motion was finalized and approved by unanimous vote of the Commission: "The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of a conditional rezoning of the former Worsham School property from Agricultural Conservation to Medium-Density Residential for the purpose of rehabilitation of the three Worsham School buildings to twenty units of one- and two-bedroom apartments, subject to agreement with the county planner on buffer planting, light spill, adequacy of water supply, and storage for firefighting emergency."

## **RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:**

The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of a conditional rezoning of the former Worsham School property from Agricultural Conservation (A-1) to Medium-Density Residential (R-3) for the purpose of rehabilitation of the three Worsham School buildings to twenty units of one- and two-bedroom apartments, subject to agreement with the county planner on buffer planting, light spill, adequacy of water supply, and water storage for firefighting emergency.

Chairman Porterfield called for discussion concerning the Worsham School Re-zoning applicants' request for an amendment to Sec. 3-100.3 of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, to allow the project to be served by private water and sewer. Presently, the ordinance (page 73) requires multi-family dwellings be served by public water and sewer. Mr. Pickett had provided a staff report containing proposed language which narrowly tailored any change in the ordinance to projects which involved rehabilitation of existing structures, but would not encourage new construction of multi-family housing in areas without public water and sewer service.

Chairman Porterfield moved to adopt language to amend Section 3-100.3 of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance by adding the following language after the water and sewer requirement presently found on page 74 of the ordinance, "Exceptions may be considered for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures." The motion was met with unanimous approval by Commission vote.

## **RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:**

The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of an amendment to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, adding the following language, "Exceptions may be considered for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures." to Section 3-100.3 following the water and sewer requirement presently found on page 74 of the ordinance.

#### **By-Laws:**

Mr. Pickett identified a proposed change in the By-Laws concerning meeting frequency which would not comply with state requirements. Two of the planning commissioners who recently completed the certification course reminded the staff of a Code of Virginia Section 15.2-2214, which requires the local planning commission shall meet at least every two months.

Commissioner Gilfillan made a motion to add the meeting frequency per state code to the Bylaws.

The motion was approved with a unanimous vote from the Commissioners.

#### Information Items:

Chairman Porterfield called for any additional business or information items. Hearing none, the meeting was adjourned at 9:01 p.m.

Tony,

I spoke with Norm Krueger, Hampden-Sydney's Vice President for Business Affairs, about the Worsham school and your proposal to seek a proffer requiring the developer to install municipal water. Mr. Krueger was highly supportive of your proposal, and offers the College's endorsement. I am including Mr. Krueger as a recipient of this email, so that in case I misstate our understanding, he can quickly correct matters.

Mr. Krueger and Hampden-Sydney College join the Prince Edward Area Firefighter's Association in its opposition to the developer's request for an exemption of the requirement to provide municipal water to a multi-family residential occupancy. Mr. Kruger expressed deep concern over the request, noting that it would defeat the obvious and salutary purposes of the requirement. Hampden-Sydney College also is willing to have the developer connect to Hampden-Sydney's water system. As Mr. Kruger noted, not only would this meet the code requirements for the developer, it would also provide municipal water to the residents along Kingsville Road and Abilene Road as far as the cannery. There are quite a few houses and some substantial occupancies there, not the least of which is the Sagebrook, which houses Hampden-Sydney students. The ability to provide a hydrant and fire sprinklers to the Sagebrook is certainly attractive to the College.

Mr. Kruger and I spent quite some time discussing the future of municipal water in Prince Edward county, and the certainty that responsibility for municipal water would be transferred from the Town of Farmville and Hampden-Sydney College to the county. At that time the two separate water systems would be linked along Farmville Road. We discussed the possibility of continuing that line down Farmville Road to Worsham. I think that would serve the county's interests, if they desire to stimulate development south of Farmville. From an admittedly narrow perspective, it would also provide the H-SVFD with a fill site which would greatly increase the efficiency of water shuttle operations for the southern end of the county. Of course, this is outside the scope of the Association's proposal.

In short, Hampden-Sydney College is in complete agreement with the Prince Edward Area Firefighter's Association over the issue of the zoning request for the old Worsham High School. Moreover, the College is perfectly willing to permit the developer to connect to its water system. And you are free to indicate the College's support for the Association's proposal at the meeting of the Planning Commission.

### 1) Summary of Request

The applicants are proposing to convert the three buildings on the Worsham School property (8832 Abilene Rd), into a total of 20 apartments. The buildings will be renovated and the equipment and debris on the property removed. Under the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, apartments are permitted in only the R-3 (Medium Density Residential) zone. Therefore, a rezoning is needed for this project to proceed.

2) Adherence to Comprehensive Plan

The property is located adjacent to the Development Area identified in the county's land use map. It is also located within a quarter mile of Route 15, at the western edge of the Worsham community. These areas are targeted for future residential and commercial development. Specifically, the following classes in the comprehensive plan support this request:

- Page 72 Development area proposes encouraging new residential development. The project location is adjacent to this area on the county's land use map.
- b) Page 83 Objective # 8 Enhance community appearance and property maintenance.
- c) Page 84 Objective # 1 Ensure that adequate land is available for housing of various styles and densities.
- d) Page 84 Objective # 2 Promote innovative housing designs and residential communities
- 3) Zoning and Existing Land Use

The property is presently zoned A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) and is used as an equipment storage area. Longwood University also stores sawdust on the property, which is used as fuel in the University boilers.

4) Adjoining Properties and Uses

The property to the north is zoned A-2 (Agricultural Residential) and is presently used for agricultural purposes. The properties to the east, south and west are zoned A-1. A farm is located to the south and west of the property, while a vacant lot is located to the east.

### 5) Utilities

Neither public water nor sewer is available at the site, with the closest such systems located at Hampden-Sydney College, which is a little over one mile away. Private wells will supply water to the apartments, and a 600-gallon storage tank will be located on-site for fire suppression purposes. An alternate on-site disposal system, utilizing a mass drain field, is proposed for sewage treatment. These plans are being prepared for health department review.

### 6) Transportation Access / Traffic Generator

The site is located at the intersection of Abilene Rd. and Marshall Rd. The main access point will be the current entrance to the property on Abilene Rd., with a secondary access onto Marshall Rd.

Traffic generation for this project is projected at 6.72 per dwelling unit. The proposal calls for 16 one-bedroom and 4 two-bedroom apartments, which equate to about 161 trips per day. This amount of traffic should have little impact on traffic patterns.

## 7) Emergency Services

The proposed project is 1.2 miles form the Hampden-Sydney Fire Department, and 7.8 miles from the Prince Edward Rescue Squad. The fire department also has a first responder emergency medical unit.

The request is not expected to have a significant impact on emergency response delivery. However, the fire department is concerned about adequate water capacity, in the event of a fire. The applicant is agreeable to providing additional water storage on-site for fire fighting purposes. The exact amount of storage provided will be determined during the site review process, should the project be approved.

8) Schools

The project will have little, if any, impact on schools. With mainly one bedroom apartments, very few, if any, children would be expected to reside at the project location.

#### 9) Public Comment

As of May 3, 2010, I have received three phone calls from nearby property owners, all of which occurred prior to the planning commission public hearings. The three individuals I spoke with were generally in favor of the project, but two did have questions about sewage disposal. Both of them spoke at the planning commission hearing and seemed to have their questions answered satisfactorily.

10) Planning Commission Hearing and Recommendations

The three speakers discussed above spoke at the hearing, as well as another individual, who inquired about buffering on the south side of the site. While some natural buffer already exists, the applicants were agreeable to planting some additional evergreens in that area.

A soil scientist spoke on the sewage disposal system planned for the project. Following the hearing, the commission voted unanimously to recommend the following:

a) Approval of a conditional rezoning of the former Worsham School property from Agricultural Conservation (A-1) to Medium Density Residential (R-3) for the purpose of rehabilitation of the three Worsham School buildings, to twenty units of one and two-bedroom apartments, subject to agreement with the county planner or buffer planting, light spill, adequacy of water supply, and water storage for firefighting emergency.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends approval of the rezoning request. The project itself will provide a significant benefit to the community for the following reasons:

• Rehabilitation of Existing Structures

The three buildings on the property continue to deteriorate, due to lack of use and maintenance. The project will restore these structures to usable condition and provide 20 housing units.

• Clean-up of Property

As part of the project, the property will be cleaned. This will benefit everyone in the area by greatly improving the overall appearance of the property.

• Economic Benefit

The construction phase of the project is estimated at \$2 million, some of which will likely flow to local businesses.

In addition, the assessed value of the property will increase significantly from the current value of \$ 160,200.

Again, staff recommends approval of the rezoning, but with the condition the property be used only for multi-family housing, resulting from the rehabilitation of existing structures and that additional water storage be provided on-site.

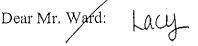

## ANNUAL RESOLUTION OF APPROPRIATION OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2011

A resolution to appropriate designated funds and accounts from specified estimated revenues for FY 2011 for the operating budget and the Capital Improvements Program for the County of Prince Edward and to authorize and empower County officers to expend funds and manage cash assets; and to establish policies under which funds will be expended and managed.

The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors does hereby resolve on this 8th day of June, 2010 that, for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2010, and ending on June 30, 2011, the following sections are hereby adopted.

- Section 1. The cost centers shown on the attached letter labeled FY2010-2011 Appropriations are hereby appropriated from the designated estimated revenues as approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 8, 2010 for FY 20109-2011.
- Section 2. Appropriations, in addition to those contained in this general Appropriations Resolution, may be made by the Board of Supervisors only if deemed appropriate and there is available in the fund unencumbered or unappropriated sums sufficient to meet such appropriations.
- Section 3. All appropriations herein authorized shall be on the basis of cost centers for all departments and agencies and by Category for the Schools.
- Section 4. The Social Services Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. By this resolution the Social Services Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within its respective funds in any amount.

- Section 5. The School Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. Appropriations for the School Board are by Category. By this resolution the School Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within a category. Transfer of funds between categories requires prior Approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 6. The County Administrator is expressly authorized to approve transfers of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within the same Fund with the exception of Constitutional Officers for the efficient operation of government. Transfers into or out of a department of a Constitutional Officer requires prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 7. All outstanding encumbrances, both operating and capital, at June 30, 2010* shall be re-appropriated to the FY2011 fiscal year to the same cost center and account for which they are encumbered in the previous year.
- Section 8. At the close of the fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriations lapse for budget items other than those involving ongoing operational projects, or programs supported by grants or County funds, which must be preapproved by the County Administrator or his designee and submitted to the Board of Supervisors for final approval. Such funds must be applied to the purpose for which they were originally approved.
- Section 9. Appropriations previously designated for capital projects will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until the completion of the project if funding is available from all planned sources, or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate ordinance, resolution or other action changes or eliminates the appropriation. Upon completion of a capital project, the County Administrator is hereby authorized to close out the project and return to the funding source any remaining balances. This section applies to all existing appropriations for capital projects at June 30, 2010 and appropriations as they are made in the FY 2011 Budget. The County Administrator is hereby authorized to contracts up to an increase of \$10,000.00 as long as funds are available from the funding sources and approve all change orders for reduction of contracts.
- Section 10. The approval of the Board of Supervisors of any grant of funds to the County shall constitute the appropriation of both the revenue to be received from the grant and the County's expenditure required by the terms of the grant, if any. The appropriation of grant funds will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until completion of the project or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate action, changes or eliminates the appropriation. The County Administrator may increase or reduce any grant appropriation to the level approved by the granting agency during the fiscal year. The County Administrator may approve necessary accounting transfers between departments and funds to enable the grant to be accounted for in the correct manner. Upon completion of a

grant project, the County Administrator is authorized to close out the grant and return to the funding source any remaining balance. This section applies to appropriations for grants outstanding at June 30, 2010 and appropriations in the FY 2011 Budget.

- Section 11. The County Administrator may reduce revenue and expenditure appropriations related to programs funded all or in part by the Commonwealth of Virginia and/or the Federal Government to the level approved by the responsible state or federal agency.
- Section 12. The County Administrator is authorized to make transfers to the various funds for which there are transfers budgeted. The County Administrator shall transfer funds as deemed necessary up to amounts budgeted or in accordance with any existing bond resolutions that specify the matter in which transfers are to be made.
- Section 13. The Treasurer may advance monies to and from the various funds of the County to allow maximum cash flow efficiency. The advances must not violate County bond covenants or other legal restrictions that would prohibit an advance. The Treasurer is authorized and directed to credit all interest received from the investment of all County funds to the General fund, with the exception of the School Fund (which will be allowed to maintain a fund balance) School Construction Fund, Economic Development Fund, Recreation Fund, Forfeited Assets Fund, Landfill Fund, D.A.R.E. Fund, VDOT Revenue Sharing Fund (non-local money only) and the Piedmont Court Services Fund, wherein all interest earned will be credited to the respective funds.
- Section 14. All procurement activities with funds appropriated herein shall be made in accordance with the County purchasing policy and applicable state statutes.
- Section 15 It is the intent of this resolution that funds be expended for the purpose indicated in the budget; therefore, budgeted funds may not be transferred from operating expenditures to capital projects or from capital projects to operating expenses without the prior approval from the Board of Supervisors. Also, funds may not be transferred from one capital project to another without the prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 16. The County Administrator is authorized, pursuant to State statute, to issue orders and checks for payments where funds have been budgeted, appropriated, and where sufficient funds are available. A listing of vendor payments shall be presented to the Board of Supervisors for information not less frequently than monthly.
- Section 17 Subject to the qualifications in this resolution contained, all appropriations are declared to be maximum, conditional and proportionate appropriations the purpose being to make the appropriations payable in full in the amount named herein if necessary and then only in the event the aggregate revenues collected

and available during the fiscal year for which the appropriations are made are sufficient to pay all the appropriations in full. Otherwise, the said appropriations shall be deemed to be payable in such proportions as the total sum of all realized revenue of the respective funds is to the total amount of revenue estimated to be available in the said fiscal year by the Board of Supervisors.

- Section 18. All revenues received by an agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board not included in its estimate of revenue for the financing of the fund budget as submitted- to the Board of Supervisors may not be expended by said agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board without the consent of the Board of Supervisors being first obtained, and those sums appropriated to the budget. Any grant approved by the Board for application shall not be expended until the grant is approved by the funding agency for drawdown. Nor may any of these agencies or boards make expenditures which will exceed a specific item of an appropriation.
- Section 19. Allowances out of any of the appropriations made in this resolution by any or all County departments, commissions, bureaus, or agencies under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors to any of their officers and employees for expense on account of the use of such officers and employees of their personal automobiles in the discharge of their official duties shall be paid at the same rate as that established by the internal revenue service and shall be subject to change by the County Administrator from time to time to maintain like rates.
- Section 20. All previous appropriation ordinances or resolutions to the extent that they are inconsistent with the provisions *of* this resolution shall be and the same are hereby repealed.
- Section 21. This resolution shall become effective on July 1, 2010.

Fund, VDOT Revenue Sharing Fund (non-local money only) and the Piedmont Court Services Fund, wherein all interest earned will be credited to the respective funds.

Issue:	Virginia Retirement System (VRS)

Summary:

During the 2010 session of the General Assembly HB1189 and SB232 were passed. This legislation implements new VRS plan provisions for employees hired or rehired on or after July 1, 2010. The new plan is called VRS Plan 2. VRS Plan 1 includes employees hired before July 1, 2010. Plan 1 benefits and policies were not changed by this legislation. Most notably the 5% member contribution must still be paid by Prince Edward County for the current employees and cannot be changed.

Per the legislation the Board must make a decision in regard to payment of the member contribution for Plan 2 employees. The Board must pass a resolution declaring its intent by June 30, 2010. There are three options regarding payment of Plan 2 member contributions

- (1) Employees are required to pay the full 5% member contribution into VRS. This option requires no action by the Board except checking the first box on attachment 1 and authorizing a signature on attachment 1.
- (2) The Board can elect to pay between 1-5% of the member contribution rate into VRS with the balance (if any) paid by the employee. This requires passage of the resolution found in attachment 2. Unlike Plan 1 employees, this election can be changed each fiscal year by submission of a new resolution to VRS.
- (3) The Board elects to pay the full 5% member contribution rate on a 6 year, phase-in schedule. This requires passage of the resolution contained in attachment 3 and must include the phase-in schedule.

Other changes concerning VRS provisions that were changed for Plan 2 employees are listed in attachment 4. These changes do not affect current expenses on the part of the County.

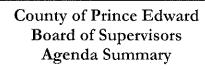

Summary:

There has been a request to amend the County's Insurance Plan to allow members of the Board of Supervisors to participate in the county's Health Insurance Program know as The Local Choice (TLC).

Elected officials can be covered as a "special class". The classification can be as either a part-time or fulltime employee but cannot be classified as retirees. If Board members are classified as full-time you must pay the same amounts for them as you do for all other active full-time employees. Currently the County pays 100% of the premium for full-time employees

If the classification is as part-time, you must pay the same amount as you do for all other part-time participants. We currently do not allow part-time employees to participate in the Health Insurance Plan. But since Board members can be placed in a special classification we can allow Board members to be classified as part-time and be covered but not cover any other part-time employees. The minimum employer contribution for part-time employees is 40% of the average single employee premium rate or \$196.40 per month.

II. ELIGIBILITY

A. ELIGIBLE EMPLOYEES

The Local Employer defines the categories of employees and retirees eligible to enroll when the Employer Application is completed and forwarded to the Department of Human Resource Management (DHRM) / The Local Choice (TLC).

<u>Full-time employees of participating employers</u> are eligible to participate in the Program and some or all classifications of part-time employees of Local Employers may participate in the Program if the employer elects. The employer determines conditions of participation for these employees. However, all part-time employees in the same classification must be treated similarly.

<u>Retired Employees</u> – Effective July 1, 2006: TLC eligibility will mirror the retirement requirements of VRS whether or not a group participates with VRS. Those requirements will be:

A retiring employee must meet the employer's criteria for retirement to be eligible for health benefits coverage through the employer "Retiree Group." In addition to meeting the Local Employer criteria, the retiree must be:

At least 55 years of age, have at least five (5) years of service with the participating employer and be eligible for and receive an immediate annuity through the group's primary employer-sponsored retirement program or at least 50 years of age have at least ten (10) years of service with the participating employer and be eligible for and receive an immediate annuity through the group's primary employer-sponsored retirement program or at least 50 years of age have at least ten (10) years of service with the participating employer and be eligible for and receive an immediate annuity through the group's primary employer-sponsored retirement program.

Employees who defer retirement are not eligible to enroll in The Local Employer's Retiree Group. A deferred retirement is one where the employee terminates service and does not elect or is ineligible for an immediate retirement annuity.

Unless a future effective date for retiree coverage is stated on the application, current retirees who are eligible for participation on the effective date of your Group will be offered a one-time opportunity to enroll in one of The Local Choice Health Benefits Program plans.

Future retirees must apply for retiree health benefits within 31 days of the separation from active service. Medicare will be the primary payer for retiree's age 65 or older (or those who are otherwise eligible for Medicare). The Program's plans will serve as a complement to Medicare's coverage.

NOTE: Elected officials that make up the governing body of a Local Employer may be eligible as either a special class of full-time employee or as part-time employees. They may not, however, participate in the retiree classification. Temporary employees, appointed board members or appointed commissions are not eligible for coverage under The Local Choice.

B. EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTIONS

Groups may select any combination of our Key Advantage plan offerings but the required minimum funding will be based on the un-weighted average single rate of the plans offered. For example, if a group offers Key Advantage Expanded and Key Advantage 500, you would add the single rates for each and divide by two. The minimum requirement would then be 80% of the average single rate.

The required minimum employer contributions are:

Full Time Employees

- 80% of the average single employee premium rate
- 20% of the average additional dependent cost, if applicable *

Part Time Employees

- 40% of the average single employee premium rate
- 10% of the average additional dependent cost, if applicable *

Groups selecting the High Deductible Health Plan may not use the averaging method to determine contributions. HDHP requires the employer to pay at least 80% of single premium and 20% of dependent premiums.

C. GROUP WITHDRAWAL – NOTICE TIMING AND ADVERSE EXPERIENCE ADJUSTMENT

To protect current TLC groups, an Adverse Experience Adjustment (AEA) may be applied to groups terminating participation in TLC. The AEA assures that current groups will not be penalized for a terminating group's losses.

THE LOCAL CHOICE PROGRAM Procedures for Determining Adverse Experience Adjustment

The Local Choice Program (TLC) requires an employer who withdraws from the program to reimburse the program if the employer's premiums are less than the employer's share of losses for the last full fiscal year of membership. This is called the Adverse Experience Adjustment (AEA).

The AEA amount is determined by 1) the amount of the appropriate pool's loss, if any, for the most recent plan year, 2) the experience of the employer who is withdrawing, and 3) the ratio of the employer's enrollment to the total enrollment in the applicable rating pool. An employer falls into one of four rating pools:

- 1. 1-49 enrollees
- 2. 50 299 enrollees
- 3. 300 1499 enrollees
- 4. Over 1,500 enrollees (with effective dates of 7/1/2006 or later)

There is no AEA if the appropriate pool ends the fiscal year with a surplus.

^{*} If 75% of all eligible employees enroll, the dependent contribution requirement is waived.

RESOLUTION NO. ______ RESOLUTION OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VA APPROVING THE ASSIGNMENT OF THE CABLE TELEVISION FRANCHISE

WHEREAS, JetBroadband VA, LLC ("Franchisee") owns, operates, and maintains a cable television system ("System") serving Prince Edward County, VA (the "Franchise Authority"), and Franchisee is the duly authorized holder of the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, on April 16, 2010, JetBroadband VA, LLC entered into an Asset Purchase Agreement (the "Agreement") with Shentel Cable Company ("Shentel") in which, among other things, the Franchisee proposes to sell and assign to Shentel certain of the assets, including the Franchise, used by Franchisee in the operation of the System (the "Transaction"); and

WHEREAS, Franchisee and Shentel have requested the consent of the Franchise Authority for the assignment of the Franchise in accordance with the requirements of the Franchise and applicable law and have filed with the Franchise Authority a franchise assignment application on FCC Form 394 that includes relevant information concerning the Transaction and the legal, technical and financial qualifications of Shentel (collectively, the "Application"); and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority has reviewed the Application, examined the legal, financial and technical qualifications of Shentel, followed all required procedures to consider and act upon the Application and considered the comments of all interested parties; and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority believes that it is in the interest of the community to approve the Application and the assignment of the Franchise and the System to Shentel, as described in the Application.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FRANCHISE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The Franchise Authority hereby approves the Application and consents to the assignment of the Franchise and System to Shentel; all in accordance with the terms of the Franchise and applicable law.

SECTION 2: The Franchise Authority confirms that (a) the Franchise was properly granted or assigned to Franchisee and is in full force and effect, (b) the Franchise represents the entire understanding of the parties and the Franchisee has no obligations to the Franchise Authority other than those specifically stated in the Franchise; and (c) the Franchisee is materially in compliance with the provisions of the Franchise and applicable law, and there exists no fact or circumstance known to the Franchise Authority which constitutes or which, with the passage of time or the giving of notice or both, would constitute a default or breach under the Franchise or would allow the Franchise Authority to cancel or terminate the rights of the Franchisee thereunder.

SECTION 3: The Franchise Authority hereby consents to and approves (a) the pledge or grant of a security interest to, or the exercise of associated remedies by, any lender(s) of Shentel or its affiliates in Shentel's assets, including, but not limited to, the Franchise, or of interests in Shentel, for purposes of securing any indebtedness; and (b) the assignment or transfer of Shentel's assets, including the Franchise, provided that such assignment or transfer is to an entity directly or indirectly controlling, controlled by or under common control with Shentel.

SECTION 4: The Franchise Authority's approval of the Application and its consent to the assignment of the Franchise to Shentel shall be effective immediately, and Shentel shall notify the Franchise Authority upon the Closing Date.

SECTION 5: The Franchise Authority releases the Franchisee, effective upon the Closing Date, from all obligations and liabilities under the Franchise and applicable law that accrue on and after the Closing Date; provided that Shentel shall be responsible for any obligations and liabilities under the Franchise that accrue on and after the Closing Date.

SECTION 6: This Resolution shall have the force of a continuing agreement with Franchisee and Shentel, and the Franchising Authority shall not revoke, amend or otherwise alter this Resolution without the consent of the Franchisee and Shentel.

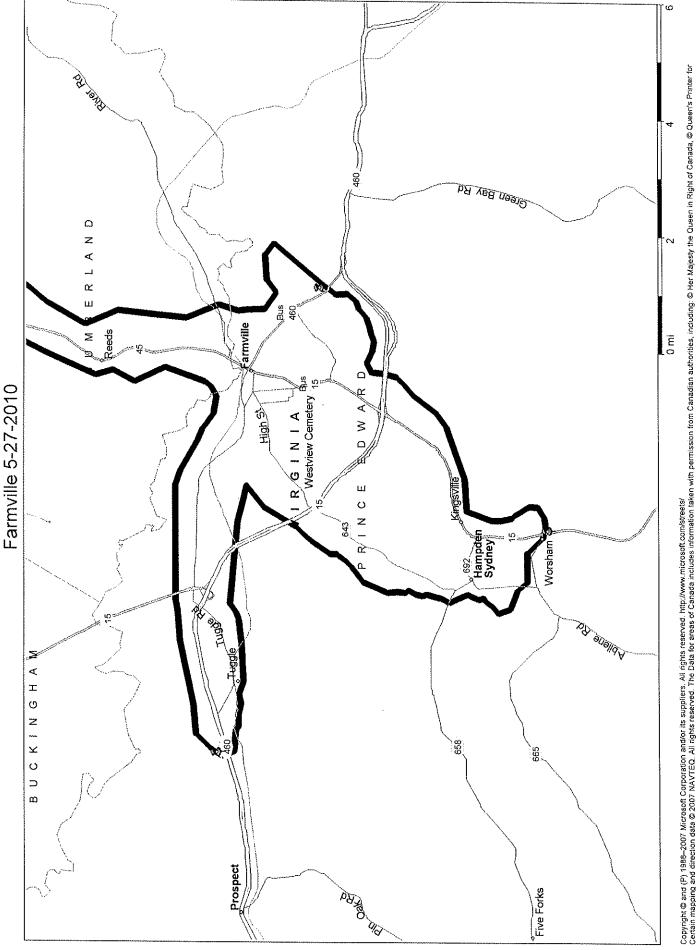

District Mission:

The function of the SWCD is to take available technical, financial and educational resources, whatever their source, and focus or coordinate them so that they meet the needs of local land users. The District Director plays a leadership role in finding resources and working with local land users to ensure that these resources are used with maximum effect to meet the District's goals. Chapter 10.1-500 of the Code of Virginia defines a soil and water conservation district as a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia. March Financial Statements: No action was taken.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: No Report.

Executive Committee Report: Ms. Hickman stated the Executive Committee took action on a request during March that was time sensitive. A Buckingham County Request to Provide Grant Writing Services to Buckingham Volunteer Rescue Squad was approved by the Committee. The deadline for submission was due by March 15, 2010. This Grant has been written and submitted on behalf of the Buckingham County Rescue Squad.

<u>Budget Committee Report</u>: The Budget Committee did meet during March, however, due to the lack of quorum, no report was given at the meeting.

Appointment of Nominating Committee: The Chairman reported he had appointed Dr. Bates, Mr. Osl and himself to the Nominating Committee.

Report on Chief Administrative Officer's Committee Meeting: Ms. Hickman reported that the Chief Administrative Officer's meeting was well attended and included Ms. Debra Crowder, Executive Director of the South Central Workforce Investment Board as speaker. An agenda for the meeting was included as an attachment in the Council members packet.

Old Business

President & Staff Reports:

<u>Discussion – Farmville/Hampden-Sydney Membership:</u> Ms. Hickman stated she had not received any new information on either former member.

<u>Status of PDC Funding – Virginia General Assembly 2010-2012</u>: Ms. Hickman referred members present to the enclosed attachment in Council members' packet. Ms. Hickman stated the Virginia General Assembly adopted the Budget Conference Report on March 14, 2010. Ms. Hickman stated the budget did not eliminate PDC funding. The adopted Budget did include additional cuts each year for PDCs with the CRC's receiving a 15% reduction. The CRC will receive \$66,062 For FY 11 & 12 assuming no changes are made during the Special Session that will be held in late April 2010. It was pointed out that several PDC's received a larger reduction in funding (the highest was 52%) for the upcoming biennium. Ms. Hickman thanked Council members for their support.

Town of Dillwyn 2010 CDBG Business District Revitalization Application Submission: Mr. Fortune stated the CRC prepared and submitted the Dillwyn 2010 CDBG Business District Revitalization Application by the March 31st deadline to DHCD.

<u>Update on CRC Rural Long Range Transportation Plan</u>: Ms. Foster stated the CRC's Transportation Committee met on March 24, 2010. The Committee is beginning work on an update to the 2000 Regional Bicycle Plan. This is one of the activities the CRC is responsible to complete under the 2010 Scope of Work, Rural Transportation Planning Funds. Local units of government have been contacted to provide input on updating the Plan. Ms. Foster also stated the State Consultant will be conducting traffic counts in April and May on the Identified Transportation Deficiency areas. It was also reiterated that VDOT will be undergoing the last phases of changes in operations in April.

<u>CRC Project Status Report</u>: Ms. Hickman went over the Status Report on Projects as of April 1, 2010. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC staff have been very busy and noted the CRC had assisted in submitting 12 grant applications since August of 2009.

<u>CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update:</u> Mr. Fortune reported the Hazard Mitigation Committee Kick-Off meeting will be held on April 5, 2010. Mr. Fortune stated the purpose of the meeting will be to go over the process involved in the Plan update, a project schedule, and some of the information that will be needed from localities.

Council Member Comments: None.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

<u>Longwood University – Letter of Non-Membership FY 10-11:</u> Ms. Hickman reported the CRC has been notified, by letter, that Longwood University will not be able to pay dues and continue to be a member of the CRC. It was noted this was due to tough economic times.

<u>Status of CRC Members FY 10-11:</u> Ms. Hickman reported that she had polled all of the member localities to find out the status of the Request for Membership Investment Fees for FY 10-11. Ms. Hickman reported that Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Lunenburg and Prince Edward had all confirmed that they would be recommending level funding to the CRC in their budgets. Ms. Hickman stated and Mr. Osl confirmed, that as of the current date Cumberland County did not have funding in their budget for CRC Membership in FY 10-11. Mr. Osl stated the budget had not been finalized.

<u>-CRC FY 10-11 Rural Transportation Planning Assistance Program Scope of Work:</u> Ms. Foster went over the presented Scope of Work for the CRC FY 10-11 Rural Transportation Planning Assistance Program. It was noted some of the activities for the upcoming year included: a Sidewalk Survey in the Richmond VDOT District localities in the PD#14 region, Study of Future Park-n-Ride Locations, and GIS Training. Ms. Foster noted the CRC is scheduled to receive the same funding as last year \$58,000 (VDOT), with the CRC matching of \$14,500 for a total budget of \$72,500 for the Rural Transportation Planning Program.

Mr. Kessler was present to be available for questions. There were none.

Ms. Foster noted without a quorum the CRC would not be able to approve the Scope of Work and Resolution and provide them to VDOT by the April 15th deadline. There was discussion on the matter. It was noted that the CRC Executive Committee would need to take action on the matter before the deadline. Ms. Hickman was asked to notify the Executive Committee members.

<u>Cumberland County Request for Assistance on Land Use Education Workshops:</u> Ms. Hickman directed members present to the attachment provided in the Council packet regarding the request. Cumberland is planning to host a workshop series entitled "Growth Management and Rural Preservation in Rural Communities." The purpose of the workshops if to facilitate a better understanding of land use planning in rural communities. The audience for the workshops would be county staff and officials from around the CRC region as well as the general public. Ms. Hickman stated Cumberland County is requesting the CRC's assistance in securing appropriate speakers and assisting in the facilitation of workshops. Ms. Hickman stated due to the lack of quorum this matter could be addressed by the Executive Committee if a time constraint is noted.

<u>Tourism/Marketing Update</u>: Ms. Terry stated the information is provided in Council packets for review. Ms. Terry also noted the Fast Facility membership ended March 31, 2010, therefore, there would be no future information from this website.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

<u>Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRPS)</u>: It was noted with a lack of quorum that action could not be taken. Ms. Hickman stated staff would check to verify if the Executive Committee would need to take action on any time sensitive reviews.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

Other Business:

Ms. Hickman stated Zoe Rogers with Virginia State Parks Central Virginia Region has notified the CRC that the High Bridge Trail State Park is hosting the 2nd Annual High Bridge Trail National Trails Day Celebration on Saturday, June 5th in Farmville. Ms. Rogers invited the CRC to participate as an exhibitor. There was discussion on the matter. The Chairman left the matter to Ms. Hickman's discretion as whether the Staff would participate in the event.

Ms. Hickman stated the CRC received an invitation to a Celebration Honoring James C. Moore would be held on Saturday, April 24, 2010 at the Meherrin Fire Department. Ms. Hickman was asked if she could take a letter of appreciation for Mr. Moore's service to the CRC to the event.

February Financial Statements: Dr. Bates referred members to the Treasurer's report enclosed in the Council packet for comments. Dr. Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded the approval of the report as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: No Report.

Executive Committee Report: The Executive Committee did not meet in February, therefore there was no report.

Budget Committee Report: No meeting was held in February, therefore there was no report. Ms. Hickman stated she will be meeting with the Budget Committee in March.

Report on Chief Administrative Officer's Committee Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated the meeting was well attended and included Ms. Sherri McGuire, Executive Director of the Longwood Small Business Development Center, as the guest speaker. Ms. Hickman stated the guest speaker for March will be Ms. Debra Crowder with the South Central Workforce Investment Board.

Old Business

President & Staff Reports:

<u>Discussion – Farmville/Hampden-Sydney Membership:</u> Ms. Hickman stated she had contacted Hampden-Sydney's President's Office again and was now notified that the President would not be available until this Summer for a meeting. There was discussion on the matter and it was decided to have Ms. Hickman to continue to try and set up a meeting.

Ms. Hickman stated additional budget request letters were sent to Farmville, Hampden-Sydney, Nottoway and Blackstone this past month to consider membership in the CRC.

Update on CRC Rural Long Range Transportation Plan

Ms. Foster stated the CRC's Transportation Committee met on February 24th. The Committee reviewed the State Consultant's traffic count locations for the Identified Transportation Deficiency areas in the CRC's Rural Long Range Transportation Plan. Also discussed at the Committee meeting was information provided by the VDOT Residencies that April 23, 2010, is the day the transitions will begin for the final cuts to VDOT. It was however noted, that this transition of change in services will take several months and will likely continue into the Fall. It was stated the level of service by Residencies that many counties currently enjoy will change somewhat over the coming months. One example noted was that VDOT Residency personnel will only attend Board of Supervisors meeting when specifically requested for a specific item or report.

CRC Sidewalk Survey Results, Partnership with Longwood University, Dr. Walter Witschey: Ms. Foster gave a PowerPoint presentation on the CRC Sidewalk Survey Results. Slides were created by Longwood students participating in the project. Ms. Foster stated VDOT requested that CRC conduct a sidewalk survey in the CRC region to obtain data on the sidewalk locations. It was stated that currently VDOT did not have very accurate information on the locations of sidewalks in the region. Due to large land area in the CRC region the project was broken up into the two VDOT regions: Lynchburg and Richmond districts. It was decided to survey the Lynchburg VDOT District region first which includes Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland and Prince Edward counties. During this process it was also decided to collaborate with Longwood University to complete the project. Ms. Foster stated Dr. Walter Witschey, Professor of Anthropology and Science Education, with Longwood University was contacted to assist in the project. Dr. Witschey's Fall Class of Introduction to Geographic Information Systems (GIS) was selected to assist in the project. Dr. Witschey stated this was an opportunity for the students to use GIS in a real world example and also to assist the CRC in completing a project goal. Dr. Witschey stated 14 students used handheld GPS units in the field to accurately map the locations of the sidewalks. Students were accompanied in the field by CRC staff. Students also utilized Google Earth technology to prepare field maps of locations before going out in the field. Ms. Foster stated the project was very successfull and thanked Dr. Witschey and Longwood University for allowing the CRC the opportunity to collaborate on this project. Ms. Foster stated because of the successful project, VDOT has already been notified that the CRC will be requesting similar assistance from Dr. Witschey in mapping the sidewalks in the Richmond District during the coming fiscal year. Dr. Witschey also thanked the CRC for the opportunity his students were provided in participating in this project. Ms. Foster stated maps of the sidewalk locations will be provided to the localities in the coming months.

<u>CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update:</u> Mr. Fortune stated the State has contacted FEMA and requested an amendment to the CRC contract to reflect in-kind match by some of the localities in the project. Mr. Fortune stated Lunenburg County is the only county that will not be supplying an in-kind match. Mr. Fortune stated he has contacted the rest of the localities to request hourly rates of assigned staff in order to provide estimates to FEMA. Mr. Fortune stated he had not received the information as of this date from Charlotte, Buckingham or Prince Edward. A kick-off meeting is planned for late March or early April.

<u>Report on 2010 Local Food Systems Symposium</u>: Ms. Terry stated Prince Edward previously requested the CRC assist in facilitating a workshop on sustainable agricultural opportunities.

Ms. Martha Walker with Virginia Cooperative Extension was contacted to assist the CRC in this endeavor. Ms. Terry stated Ms. Walker put together the speakers for the program and coordinated with the CRC to make the arrangements for the Symposium. Ms. Terry stated the 2010 Local Food Systems Symposium was held on March 2, 2010, in the Mill Street Conference Room (downstairs). Ms. Terry stated the Symposium was attended by 35 people and 12 presenters. Ms. Terry stated there was good feedback from participants.

VAPDC 2010 Winter Conference: Ms. Hickman reported that Ms. Foster and herself attended the VAPDC 2010 Winter Conference in Richmond on February 17, 2010. Ms. Hickman stated the conference had a variety of good topics. Ms. Hickman stated two items were noted. There is a Virginia Liaison Office which keeps track of Federal legislation and regulations and keeps Virginia Cabinet members abreast of issues dealing with federal policies and funding. The new appointee, Ms. Jeannemarie Davis, pointed out since funding is scarce right now localities may be able to address mandates by talking to representatives about policies that can loosen regulations rather than asking for more funding. Also, Bill Shelton of the Department of Housing and Community Development gave a legislative report. Mr. Shelton came to the meeting directly from the General Assembly where the Governor had just released his budget proposal. Mr. Shelton noted several themes of focus relating to planning including: focus on development and commercial growth in new land development; several bills relating to tracking and monitoring growth in Urban Development Areas; new opportunities for economic development in agribusiness; capitalizing on cultural tourism; tax credits for clean energy and an emphasis on small business expansion. It was also noted there appeared to be a swing toward regulatory relief in land issues and mandates.

Ms. Hickman stated since the release of the Governor's budget it is apparent that many issues will have a major impact on the localities in this region. The final outcome will not be known until the close of the session.

Council Member Comments: None.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

<u>Call To Action – Senate Budget Amendment to Eliminate State Funding for all PDC's:</u> Ms. Hickman stated staff issued a call to action to CRC Council Members, local administrative chiefs as well as other agencies and related individuals to notify them of the Senate Budget Bill that proposes to eliminate all state funding for the PDCs across the State of Virginia. The House Budget Bill proposes a 15% cut in funding for PDCs. Ms. Hickman stated the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions has been very active in fighting this measure as well as keeping the PDCs informed of updates. It was also noted that the Virginia Association of Counties has also endorsed the PDCs continued funding.

Ms. Hickman stated State funding as well as member investments is utilized by the CRC as flexible funding to provide match to other funding received by the CRC. Ms. Hickman stated based on the current adopted budget, State funding equates to 20% of the budget. Ms. Hickman stated currently the conferees are negotiating the final budget. The General Assembly is scheduled to adjourn on Saturday, March 13, 2010, however, every indication is that there

will be an extension. Ms. Hickman encouraged members to contact legislators and request they endorse the House Budget Bill and help defeat the Senate Budget Bill.

Ms. Hickman stated staff would watch this closely and would provide an update.

<u>Request from Amelia County for CRC Contract Amendment for the Amelia County CDBG</u> <u>Telecommunications Planning Project</u>: Mr. Fortune stated last year the CRC assisted Amelia County in applying and implementing a CDBG Planning Grant for Telecommunications. Mr. Fortune stated the County has since that time applied for and received an additional \$22,000 in planning grant funds. Amelia has requested that the CRC assist in implementing this grant. Mr. Fortune stated enclosed in the Council packet is the request from Amelia County to amend the original CRC's contract with the County.

Mr. Bennett moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the contract amendment between the CRC and Amelia County. Motion carried.

<u>Prince Edward Request for a Letter of Support for the IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training</u> <u>Center</u>: Ms. Hickman stated enclosed in the Council packet is a request from Prince Edward County for a letter of support for the IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center project. The Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center is a part of a public/private partnership to build a full service 175 room Hotel, Conference and Hospitality Training Center in Prince Edward County. The County intends on applying for grant funds and requests this letter of support for the project.

Mr. Fore moved and Mr. Osl seconded for the CRC to provide a letter of support for the Prince Edward County IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center project. Motion carried.

<u>2010 CDBG Regional Priorities Resolution:</u> Ms. Terry stated each year the Department of Housing and Community Development requests that Planning Districts solicit input on regional priorities from the localities for the upcoming Community Development Block Grant competition. Ms. Terry stated all of the localities in the CRC region were notified and requested to provide input. Ms. Terry stated 11 comments were received. Enclosed in the Council packet is the final proposed Regional Priorities for Planning District 14.

Mr. Osl moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the proposed 2010 CDBG Regional Priorities Resolution. Motion carried.

<u>Tourism/Marketing Update</u>: The Chairman stated the information is provided in Council packets for review.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRPS): There were no local CIRPS.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

Other Business:

<u>Request from the Town of Kenbridge</u>: Ms. Hickman stated the Town of Kenbridge has requested assistance for grant writing services to the Virginia Tobacco Commission, Department of Environmental Quality, Department of Housing and Community Development and the USDA for an emergency wastewater project to include replacement of five pump stations and 9,500 feet of existing sewer line. Ms. Hickman stated the Town has discussed the project with all of the agencies and has been requested to submit applications. Ms. Hickman stated this request was not received in time to be included in the Council packet.

Mr. Wingold moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the request for Grant Writing Services from the Town of Kenbridge. Motion carried.

Dr. Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded to go into closed session pursuant to VA Code Section 2.2-3711.5. to discuss matters dealing with Economic Development. Motion carried.
