Chairman Fore called the June meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

Mattie P. Wiley

Chairman Fore presented a Resolution of Respect to Dr. Patricia P. Cormier to honor her tenure as President of Longwood University. Dr. Cormier expressed her deep appreciation for the recognition and said her accomplishments at Longwood University were a team effort with the Board of Supervisors. She said Brigadier General Patrick Finnegan, who will become the 25th president of Longwood University, "not to follow in my footsteps, but to create his own pathway."

A RESOLUTION OF RESPECT

DR. PATRICIA PICARD CORMIER PRESIDENT, LONGWOOD UNIVERSITY

WHEREAS, Dr. Patricia Picard Cormier, the 24th president of Longwood University, has been a resident of Prince Edward County and the Town of Farmville since 1996; and

WHEREAS, during her tenure as president, Dr. Cormier has led Longwood University to new levels of academic excellence; through the rebuilding as a result of the "Great Fire of 2001"; from college to university status; to NCAA Division 1 status; to accomplishing Brock Commons, the Chichester Science Center, Longwood Landings, Lancer Park, the new Health & Fitness Center, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program and a permanent home for the Longwood Center for the Visual Arts; to name a few; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Cormier, who will retire from the presidency of Longwood University on June 30, 2010, leaves an extraordinary legacy not only to Longwood University, but also to the Prince Edward-Farmville community; and

WHEREAS, her energy, leadership, generosity, and indomitable spirit will be keenly missed, Dr. Cormier will be fondly remembered by the Prince Edward-Farmville community;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, hereby expresses its sincere appreciation to Dr. Patricia P. Cormier for her exemplary leadership and vision as president of Longwood University and for her significant contributions to the Prince Edward-Farmville community; and

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER, that a copy of this resolution be prepared for presentation to Dr. Patricia P. Cormier, as an expression of respect by the members of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for

follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

Brenda Clark, Lockett District, requested the Board of Supervisors to consider an amendment to the County Animal Control Ordinance to include prohibition of fowl running at large. She said she is not opposed to her neighbor having the fowl but asks that they be kept on their property by whatever means necessary.

Susan Borum, Hampden District, asked the Board to amend the confinement law in regards to the fowl; she said the County also needs to further investigate the erroneous assessment request of Anne Bowman. Mrs. Borum then expressed her concern regarding the Prince Edward County Schools, and asked the Board to change from an appointed to an elected School Board with limited terms.

Anne Bowman, Hampden District, asked the Board to investigate the reimbursement of real estate taxes she paid for the past 41 years; she stated she does not hold clear title to the property.

Sam Campbell, Buffalo District, expressed his concern on the proposed increase in taxes, and asked the Board to cut spending.

Ralph Hines, Lockett District, expressed his concern on the proposed increase in taxes, and asked the Board to reduce county spending in an equal amount, to include the Board's salaries.

Henry Shelton, Prospect District, expressed his concern on the problem with values and wasteful spending by the County, giving an example of a dual 911 system and said the current economy does not allow for \$10,000 bonuses to employees. He asked the Board to consider raising the sales tax. He then questioned the cost of the Interim Water Agreement, asked why the County is paying \$45,000 for the CDA, and asked if the County is spending taxpayer money for daycare "disguised as a Community Center."

Joe Huddleston, Buffalo District, expressed his concern about the proposed increase in taxes and an erroneous assessment.

Patrick Murphy, Prospect District, expressed his concern regarding the proposed increase in taxes and asked the Board to balance the budget at its current level. He said the 10% increase to landowners should be distributed across the board if the taxes must be raised. He then spoke regarding the waste in the system and his embarrassment of the school system; he suggested a pay-for-performance policy.

Jack Houghton, Farmville District, requested a water project update and expressed his continued concern that there are more studies needed and there are still no partners nor customers.

Kenneth Jackson, Leigh District, said the Mary E. Branch Community Center is not a "daycare in disguise" and they are obtaining a license because they will be taking care of and instructing children; the curriculum is education-based. He added 230 applications have been distributed; 140 applications have been received. Mr. Jackson said they are working with the schools and the YMCA.

Mr. Jackson then said the School Board is a separate entity and the Board of Supervisors cannot dictate to the School Board. He added citizens bring problems to the Board, and they should also bring solutions for consideration.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Campbell thanked all who attended the Community meeting in Prospect on Monday, May 24, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. He said the meeting was beneficial to his constituents.

Supervisor McKay said there were several untruths told and asked Mr. Bartlett to give the proper information.

Mr. Bartlett said no bonuses are given to any County employee or Constitutional Officer. He said there are salary supplements (for Constitutional Officers) which are part of their salary, which are more than what is reimbursed by the State. He said the sales tax cannot be raised except by the General Assembly; the request has been made previously and has been denied to allow the County to have authority to raise the sales tax. He added the County requests increased state funding; the County receives what the State provides. He said that was a major problem in this year's budget as there were a lot of reductions from the state to local governments because of the issues the state is facing and their reduced revenues from their various taxes.

Supervisor Wilck said he attended the Prospect Community meeting on May 24 (2010) and was pleasantly surprised and impressed. He said approximately 60 people attended and the questions posed by the citizens were handled well.

Supervisor Jones thanked the Board and the community for the expressions of sympathy on the loss of his mother. He then clarified that the Town and County do not have a dual 911 system; the Town handles all 911 calls. He said the County and the Town do have separate dispatcher units.

Kevin Wright, Kevin Wright, Interim Residency Administrator, VDOT, updated the Board on several projects:

In Re: Public Hearing: Amendment to County Zoning Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board Appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the May 21, 2010 and May 28, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said that at its April 19, 2010 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing on a proposed amendment to Section 3-100.3 of the County Zoning Ordinance to allow multi-family dwellings to be served by private water and sewer systems. Currently the County Zoning Ordinance requires multi-family dwellings be served by public water and sewer. He said the amendment has been requested by Watts Contractor's, Inc. and Ross Fickenscher who are proposing to rehabilitate the former Worsham school building, agricultural building and cannery into a total of 20 apartment units. Public water and sewer are not currently available at the former Worsham school property, and the closest public system is Hampden-Sydney, which is a little more than a mile away.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Tony Williams, Buffalo District, expressed his concern regarding that the change in verbiage in the ordinance will cause the public to lose the ability to speak on proposed developments such as this.

Warner Winborne, Hampden District, said the developer would be required to meet existing code, but requested the developer be required to install a water sprinkler system hooked into the public system at Hampden Sydney or to install tanks sufficient to meet the needs of the sprinkler system. He expressed concern the power would be lost and asked the Board to insist on the installation of a backup pump powered by a generator with a transfer switch if the water tank would be installed. Mr. Winborne then reviewed the benefits of a water line extended to Worsham, not just for the proposed project but for the southern end of the county.

Discussion followed on ownership and maintenance of a line.

Mr. Ennis said this discussion is exactly a consideration that the Zoning Ordinance currently prohibits; the amendment would allow for this type of consideration.

Mr. Pickett said exceptions would be in the zoning issue and decided on a case by case basis.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE (CHANGE IN ITALICS)

Multi-Family Dwellings

A. Intent: The following minimum standards are intended to create a safe and healthy multi-family living environment. Setback and density regulations have been established to ensure an adequate separation between buildings.

B. General Standards:

- 1. Applicants for multi-family developments shall submit a site plan in accordance with Sec. 4-100 of this ordinance. The submitted site plan shall be approved by the County prior to commencing development of the site.
- The following minimum lot areas shall be required for all multi-family dwelling units. The listed square footage requirements shall be in addition to a base minimum lot area required by the district regulations.

Efficiency 1,5	500
One Bedroom 2,0	000
Two Bedroom 2,5	500
Three Bedroom 3,0	000
Four or more Bedrooms 3,5	500

For the purposes of calculating minimum lot area requirements, any room, other than a living room, dining room or area, kitchen, or bathroom that could be used for sleeping purposes shall be counted as a bedroom.

- 3. All multi-family dwellings shall be served by public water and sewer. *Exceptions may be considered during the rezoning process for projects involving the rehabilitation of existing structures.*
- 4. A minimum 40 foot separation shall be provided between buildings containing multi-family dwellings. This minimum separation may be

- reduced to 20 feet if both facing walls contain no windows, doors or balconies, or the corners of adjacent buildings are at right angles to one another.
- 5. Any new or expanded multi-family use containing over 20 units shall devote a minimum of 10 percent of the area of the development to recreational and open space uses.
- 6. Open space and recreation areas may be passive or active. The location and character of open space and recreation areas should be appropriate to meet the needs of residents and shall include such facilities as recreation centers, swimming pools, athletic courts, bikeways, walking trails, picnic areas, tot lots and other similar facilities.

In Re: Public Hearing: Rezoning Request

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the request of Watts Contractors, Inc. and Ross Fickenscher to rezone the Worsham School property from A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) to R-3 (Medium Density Residential). Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the May 21, 2010 and May 28, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Pickett said that at its April 19, 2010 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing on a request by Watts Contractors, Inc. and Ross Fickenscher to rezone the Worsham School property, at 8832 Abilene Road, from A-1 (Agricultural Conservation) to R-3 (Medium Density Residential), to allow for the rehabilitation of the former Worsham school building, agricultural building and cannery into 20 apartment units. Following the public hearing, the Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the request conditional on the applicants providing additional water storage on-site for fire-fighting purposes.

Mr. Pickett said the plans submitted by the developer do include additional water storage on-site, and a request to require generator cannot be passed at the current time. He said the Building Inspector will inspect; it is uncertain as to whether a generator will be required as part of the project. The developer will offer additional water storage capacity onsite; it will be limited to 20 units and limited to the existing buildings.

Mr. Ross Fickenscher said the adaptive reuse of the buildings which would have a sprinkler system throughout and would use a 13-R system; a fire pump, generator system and transfer switch with a

series of wells are included in the plans. He said the estimated cost of \$200,000 for a water line would be cost-prohibitive to the project.

Supervisor Campbell asked about the cost of a generator and maintenance agreement; Mr. Fickenscher said the generators require periodic maintenance and industry standards will be followed.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Tony Williams, Buffalo District, expressed his concern over the ability of the wells to adequately produce water in the event of a fire, and reviewed the cost for the wells, generator and maintenance in comparison with public water lines. Further discussion followed.

Warner Winborne, Hampden District, said the 13-R system would be minimally acceptable; the sprinkler heads pull about 13 gallons per minute. The average fire-flow sprinkler uses 300 gallons. He said that if the lines are extended to Worsham, it would offer significantly improved fire service to the southern end of the county. He added a cistern is minimally acceptable.

Mr. Bartlett said the \$200,000 estimated cost for a line of that length would be about \$22 per foot, which is approximately one-third of the actual cost. Mr. Fred Pribble, Draper Aden Associates, said currently the price is approximately \$40 per foot, and right of way and easements would need to be secured.

Mr. Fickenscher said he is taking all necessary steps to ensure the building and fire codes are met to international as well as U.S. standards.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to turn over the matter to the Water Authority and to conduct a study with the developer. Discussion followed regarding the time frame for the project and water storage for fire safety.

Supervisor Gantt made a substitute motion to approve the rezoning request per the Planning Commission's recommendations.

ANNUAL RESOLUTION OF APPROPRIATION OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2011

A resolution to appropriate designated funds and accounts from specified estimated revenues for FY 2011 for the operating budget and the Capital Improvements Program for the County of Prince Edward and to authorize and empower County officers to expend funds and manage cash assets; and to establish policies under which funds will be expended and managed.

The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors does hereby resolve on this 8th day of June, 2010 that, for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2010, and ending on June 30, 2011, the following sections are hereby adopted.

- Section 1. The cost centers shown on the attached letter labeled FY 2010-2011 Appropriations are hereby appropriated from the designated estimated revenues as approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 8, 2010 for FY 2010-2011.
- Section 2. Appropriations, in addition to those contained in this general Appropriations Resolution, may be made by the Board of Supervisors only if deemed appropriate and there is available in the fund unencumbered or unappropriated sums sufficient to meet such appropriations.
- Section 3. All appropriations herein authorized shall be on the basis of cost centers for all departments and agencies and by Category for the Schools.
- Section 4. The Social Services Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. By this resolution the Social Services Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within its respective funds in any amount.

- Section 5. The School Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. Appropriations for the School Board are by Category. By this resolution the School Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within a category. Transfer of funds between categories requires prior Approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 6. The County Administrator is expressly authorized to approve transfers of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within the same Fund with the exception of Constitutional Officers for the efficient operation of government. Transfers into or out of a department of a Constitutional Officer requires prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 7. All outstanding encumbrances, both operating and capital, at June 30, 2010* shall be reappropriated to the FY2011 fiscal year to the same cost center and account for which they are encumbered in the previous year.
- Section 8. At the close of the fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriations lapse for budget items other than those involving ongoing operational projects, or programs supported by grants or County funds, which must be preapproved by the County Administrator or his designee and submitted to the Board of Supervisors for final approval. Such funds must be applied to the purpose for which they were originally approved.
- Section 9. Appropriations previously designated for capital projects will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until the completion of the project if funding is available from all planned sources, or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate ordinance, resolution or other action changes or eliminates the appropriation. Upon completion of a capital project, the County Administrator is hereby authorized to close out the project and return to the funding source any remaining balances. This section applies to all existing appropriations for capital projects at June 30, 2010 and appropriations as they are made in the FY 2011 Budget. The County Administrator is hereby authorized to approve construction change orders to contracts up to an increase of \$10,000.00 as long as funds are available from the funding sources and approve all change orders for reduction of contracts.
- Section 10. The approval of the Board of Supervisors of any grant of funds to the County shall constitute the appropriation of both the revenue to be received from the grant and the County's expenditure required by the terms of the grant, if any. The appropriation of grant funds will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until completion of the project or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate action, changes or eliminates the appropriation. The County Administrator may increase or reduce any grant appropriation to the level approved by the granting agency during the fiscal year. The County Administrator may approve necessary accounting transfers between department and funds to enable the grant to be accounted for in the correct manner. Upon completion of a grant project, the County Administrator is authorized to close out the grant and return to the funding source any remaining balance. This section applies to appropriations for grants outstanding at June 30, 2010 and appropriations in the FY 2011 Budget.
- Section 11. The County Administrator may reduce revenue and expenditure appropriations related to programs funded all or in part by the Commonwealth of Virginia

and/or the Federal Government to the level approved by the responsible state or federal agency.

- Section 12. The County Administrator is authorized to make transfers to the various funds for which there are transfers budgeted. The County Administrator shall transfer funds as deemed necessary up to amounts budgeted or in accordance with any existing bond resolutions that specify the matter in which transfers are to be made.
- Section 13. The Treasurer may advance monies to and from the various funds of the County to allow maximum cash flow efficiency. The advances must not violate County bond covenants or other legal restrictions that would prohibit an advance. The Treasurer is authorized and directed to credit all interest received from the investment of all County funds to the General fund, with the exception of the School Fund (which will be allowed to maintain a fund balance), School Construction Fund, Economic Development Fund, Recreation Fund, Forfeited Assets Fund, Landfill Fund, D.A.R.E. Fund, VDOT Revenue Sharing Fund (non-local money only) and the Piedmont Court Services Fund, wherein all interest earned will be credited to the respective funds.
- Section 14. All procurement activities with funds appropriated herein shall be made in accordance with the County purchasing policy and applicable state statutes.
- Section 15. It is the intent of this resolution that funds be expended for the purpose indicated in the budget; therefore, budgeted funds may not be transferred from operating expenditures to capital projects or from capital projects to operating expenses without the prior approval from the Board of Supervisors. Also, funds may not be transferred from one capital project to another without the prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 16. The County Administrator is authorized, pursuant to State statute, to issue orders and checks for payments where funds have been budgeted, appropriated, and where sufficient funds are available. A listing of vendor payments shall be presented to the Board of Supervisors not less frequently than monthly.
- Section 17. Subject to the qualifications in this resolution contained, all appropriations are declared to be maximum, conditional and proportionate appropriations the purpose being to make the appropriations payable in full in the amount named herein if necessary and then only in the event the aggregate revenues collected and available during the fiscal year for which the appropriations are made are sufficient to pay all the appropriations in full. Otherwise, the said appropriations shall be deemed to be payable in such proportions as the total sum of all realized revenue of the respective funds is to the total amount of revenue estimated to be available in the said fiscal year by the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 18. All revenues received by an agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board not included in its estimate of revenue for the financing of the fund budget as submitted to the Board of Supervisors may not be expended by said agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board without the consent of the Board of Supervisors being first obtained, and those sums appropriated to the budget. Any grant approved by the Board for application shall not be expended until the grant is approved by the funding agency for drawdown. Nor may any of these agencies or boards make expenditures which will exceed a specific item of an appropriation.

- Section 19. Allowances out of any of the appropriations made in this resolution by any or all County departments, commissions, bureaus, or agencies under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors to any of their officers and employees for expense on account of the use of such officers and employees of their personal automobiles in the discharge of their official duties shall be paid at the same rate as that established by the internal revenue service and shall be subject to change by the County Administrator from time to time to maintain like rates.
- Section 20. All previous appropriation ordinances or resolutions to the extent that they are inconsistent with the provisions of this resolution shall be and the same are hereby repealed.
- Section 21. This resolution shall become effective on July 1, 2010.

Mr. Jim Ennis, Commonwealth's Attorney and Mr. Ernest Toney, Superintendent of the Piedmont Regional Jail requested authority to establish a Workforce Program to be managed by the Piedmont Regional Jail.

Mr. Ennis said the Workforce Program would permit the change of status of inmates serving their sentences in jail on weekends to providing work-hours on weekends; only those with 60 days or less would be eligible for the program. In lieu of serving a jail sentence, individuals convicted of misdemeanors and traffic offenses would have the opportunity to volunteer for the workforce program and would be charged \$12.50 per day to participate, and go out and work in the community on public property or for non-profit

organizations. No violent-crime offenders would be eligible. Mr. Ennis said eligibility would be determined at time of sentencing, and would be on a case by case basis, with each reviewed and approved by his office.

Mr. Toney said the cost savings between housing Prince Edward County offenders for the weekend and their working through the Workforce Program would be approximately \$75,000 per year.

Authorization to Pick-up the Employee's Contribution to VRS Under § 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code For Plan 2 Employees

WHEREAS, the Virginia General Assembly, in its 2010 session passed legislation creating a separate retirement plan for employees hired on or after July 1, 2010 (hereafter referred to as "Plan 2 Employees"). The legislation stipulates that Plan 2 Employees will pay their 5 percent member contribution and that, absent other action by the employer, such contribution will be paid through salary reduction according to Internal Revenue Code § 414 (h) on a pre-tax basis; and

WHEREAS, the legislation allows certain employers, including the County of Prince Edward, to pick-up and pay all or a portion of the member contributions on behalf of its Plan 2 Employees as an additional benefit not paid as salary; and

WHEREAS, the election to pick-up and pay all or a portion of the member contributions on behalf of its Plan 2 Employees as an additional benefit not paid as salary shall, once made, remain in effect for the applicable fiscal year (July 1 – June 30) and shall continue in effect beyond the end of such fiscal year absent a subsequent resolution changing the way the 5 percent member contribution is paid; and

WHEREAS, employee contributions that are picked-up as an additional benefit not paid as salary are not considered wages for purposes of VA Code § 51.1 -100 et seq. nor shall they be considered salary for purposes of VA Code § 51.1 -100 et seq; and

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward desires to pick-up and pay its Plan 2 Employees' member contributions to VRS as an additional benefit not paid as salary in an amount equal to 1% of creditable compensation; and

WHEREAS, VRS tracks such picked-up member contributions and is prepared to treat such contributions as employee contributions for all purposes of VRS.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that effective the first day of July 1, 2010, the County of Prince Edward shall pick-up member contributions of its Plan 2 Employees to VRS as an additional benefit not paid as salary in an amount equal to 1% of creditable compensation subject to the terms and conditions described above: and it is further

RESOLVED that such contributions, although designated as member contributions, are to be made by the County of Prince Edward in lieu of member contributions; and it is further

RESOLVED that nothing herein shall be construed so as to permit or extend an option to VRS members to receive the picked-up contributions made by the County of Prince Edward directly instead of having them paid to VRS.

In Re: Amendment to County Health Insurance Program

WHEREAS, on April 16, 2010, JetBroadband, VA, LLC entered into an Asset Purchase Agreement (the "Agreement") with Shentel Cable Company ("Shentel") in which, among other things, the Franchisee proposes to sell and assign to Shentel certain of the assets, including the Franchise, used by Franchisee in the operation of the System (the "Transaction"); and

WHEREAS, Franchisee and Shentel have requested the consent of the Franchise Authority for the assignment of the Franchise in accordance with the requirements of the Franchise and applicable law and have filed with the Franchise Authority a franchise assignment application on FCC Form 394 that includes relevant information concerning the Transaction and the legal, technical and financial qualifications of Shentel (collectively, the "Application"); and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority has reviewed the Application, examined the legal, financial and technical qualifications of Shentel, followed all required procedures to consider and act upon the Application and considered the comments of all interested parties; and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority believes that it is in the interest of the community to approve the Application and the assignment of the Franchise and the System to Shentel, as described in the Application.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FRANCHISE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The Franchise Authority hereby approves the Application and consents to the assignment of the Franchise and System to Shentel; all in accordance with the terms of the Franchise and applicable law.

SECTION 2: The Franchise Authority confirms that (a) the Franchise was properly granted or assigned to Franchisee and is in full force and effect, (b) the Franchise represents the entire understanding of the parties and the Franchisee has no obligation to the Franchise Authority other than those specifically stated in the Franchise; and (c) the Franchisee is materially in compliance with the provisions of the Franchise and applicable law, and there exists no fact or circumstance known to the Franchise Authority which constitutes or which, with the passage of time or the giving of notice or both, would constitute a default or breach under the Franchise or would allow the Franchise Authority to cancel or terminate the rights of the Franchisee thereunder.

SECTION 3: The Franchise Authority hereby consents to and approves (a) the pledge or grant of a security interest to, or the exercise of associated remedies by, any lender(s) of Shentel or its affiliates in Shentel's assets, including, but not limited to, the Franchise, or of interests in Shentel, for purposes of securing any indebtedness; and (b) the assignment or transfer of Shentel's assets, including the Franchise, provided that such assignment or transfer is to an entity directly or indirectly controlling, controlled by or under common control with Shentel.

SECTION 4: The Franchise Authority's approval of the Application and its consent to the assignment of the Franchise to Shentel shall be effective immediately, and Shentel shall notify the Franchise Authority upon the Closing Date.

SECTION 5: The Franchise Authority releases the Franchisee, effective upon the Closing Date, from all obligations and liabilities under the Franchise and applicable law that accrue on and after the Closing Date; provided that Shentel shall be responsible for any obligations and liabilities under the Franchise that accrue on and after the Closing Date.

SECTION 6: This Resolution shall have the force of a continuing agreement with Franchisee and Shentel, and the Franchising Authority shall not revoke, amend or otherwise alter this Resolution without the consent of the Franchisee and Shentel.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett introduced Fred Pribble, Draper Aden Associates, who gave a brief history and an update on the PPEA Project.

Mr. Pribble said the study includes a survey, geo-technical work and sampling to determine the most effective treatment process. He said the Preliminary Engineering Report must be presented to the Health Department and funding agencies, and will address the scope of the cost and capital operating expenses, which in part will determine who the customers will be. He said meetings have been held with representatives from the Health Department, Crewe, Burkeville, Hampden Sydney, the hospitals, Rural Development as customers and partners, and with funding agencies, such as the Tobacco Commission, STAG, the Health Department grants, DEQ, and Block grants to name a few. He said another option is New Market Tax Credits, an option where the contractors themselves would potentially fund the project. He said regional partners will bring a larger customer base and will increase the opportunity for grant funding.

Mr. Pribble said filtration will be used and the existing landfill in the vicinity will be closely monitored; there is no indication of any concern from the landfill. He said the landfill investigation and the preliminary estimate should be complete in the next few weeks.

Mr. Bartlett said he met with Burkeville; the representatives showed enthusiasm for the project as they will have significant capital costs if they don't join. He said a meeting will be held with the new mayor of Crewe.

Mr. Bartlett briefly reviewed the New Market Tax Credit Financing Structure.

Discussion about costs followed; Mr. Bartlett suggested the Board schedule a work session for more detailed information. Discussion turned to concerns about the adjacent landfill; Mr. Pribble said a hole will be drilled next week. Mr. Bartlett added that no volatile constituents have been found.

In Re: Water Project Update

Fred Pribble, Draper Aden Associates, reviewed the background of the project, the PPEA process,

and discussed the project scope.

Discussion followed regarding interest from the towns of Crewe and Burkeville to become

partners and a projected schedule. Linnell Stanhope, Crowder Construction, said the Preliminary

Engineering Report (PER) will be ready around the end of July 2010, and will then be submitted to

Virginia Department of Health (VDH). She said they expect to have the final cost estimates in December

2010, which will allow them to seek out funding opportunities. It is also at that time that the County will

have the opportunity to refine the costs.

Ms. Stanhope explained the PPEA process in more detail and reviewed the benefits of using a

PPEA.

Discussion followed on the current economy; Ms. Stanhope said the market is markedly

competitive due to the current economy which will allow the county to take advantage of lower costs.

Mr. Pribble explained the Interim Agreement will provide:

• 100% design of the water intake structure, "ready to construct"

- Geotechnical investigations
- Approved VDH Preliminary Engineering Report
- Total Organic Carbon (TOC) and Water Quality Sampling
- Submittal of required environmental permits to required agencies
- Field surveying
- Assistance with development of partnerships
- Assistance with developing funding options
- "Ready to construct" water line to HSC/Route 15 corridor
- Financial analysis to determine the impact on County taxpayers and potential customers
- Development of scope of project that meets the County's requirements
- Development of design (Intake, 100%; Route 15 water line, 100%; WTP, 30%; Water mains, 15%)
- Accurate, professionally developed construction costs, not just Engineer's Opinion of Probable Cost

- Guaranteed Lump Sum price to construct the system one point of responsibility, Crowder Construction
- Two step process minimizing risks for everyone

Mr. Pribble then reviewed the cost reductions:

- Identified alternative route for waterline
- Reduction of finished water storage
- Eliminated distribution system pump station
- · Significantly reduced size of raw water contactor
- Jar testing provided confidence in a more conventional treatment process
- Field testing and geotechnical investigations minimized costs associated with risk
- Detailed treatment building design achieved through architectural programming with County
- Detailed intake structure design allows for more precise cost estimate

Further topics of discussion followed on potential pipe routes, VDH issues, potential partner impacts, and potential funding sources. Ms. Sheryl Stephens reviewed funding scenarios with three different options.

Mr. Pribble reviewed the next steps to be taken:

- Preliminary Engineering Report Submitted to VDH July 19 (Review and discussion with VDH expected to take 60-90 days)
- Submit preliminary cost estimate to County July 19
- Financial evaluation
- Complete landfill investigation
- Discussions with VDH on Preliminary Engineering Report
- Continued discussion with potential partners
- Continued discussions with funding agencies
- Move forward with designs
- Guaranteed Lump Sum Price Fall 2010

Mr. Bartlett discussed his findings of a regression analysis of the flow in the Appomattox River. He said the data results suggest the Appomattox River and probably most other creeks and streams are becoming more dependent upon precipitation for their flow. At the same time, each inch of rainfall is increasing the river flow significantly more than in the past, which suggests the precipitation is running off the land and into the Appomattox much more quickly and that water then flows out of Prince Edward County toward the ocean; this implies less of the rain is soaking into the ground contributing to the

decrease in ground water levels. At the same time, an increase in wells is drawing more water out of the

ground, accelerating the lowering of ground water levels.

Discussion followed regarding the financing of the water project. Mr. Jimmy Sanderson,

Davenport, said revenues will be generated by the users rather than the costs being covered solely by the

taxpayers. Mr. Sanderson recommended the County extend the current line of credit instead of paying cash

for the project. He explained that current low interest rates minimize interest expense and in today's

economic environment cash is king and having a good reserve increases the County's flexibility.

Re: Anne Bowman Application for Real Estate Tax Refund 2.00 acres

Dear Board Members:

As you no doubt will recall, at the June meeting of the Board, Mrs. Anne Bowman appeared during the public participation portion of the meeting and represented to the Board that she had paid the real estate taxes on a two acre parcel of land for the past 41 years only to find that the two acre parcel did not belong to her. This two acre parcel was purported to lay in the middle of the Lacy property through which alternate Rt. 628 is proposed to run. An examination of the records in the Circuit Court Clerk's Office does not show any record of ownership of this property by Mrs. Bowman. In fact, if Mrs. Bowman had any ownership interest in the property, it was extinguished by a suit to quiet title filed in the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County by Glad Hill Properties, LLC. By decree entered on July 26, 2004, the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County determined that the title to 2.39 acres, more or less, was perfected in Glad Hill Properties, LLC. By virtue of this Court decree, the Board of Supervisors is without the ability to address Mrs. Bowman's claim of ownership.

Pursuant to current Virginia law, Mrs. Bowman is entitled to be reimbursed for the erroneous payment of real estate taxes for the tax years, 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009. Section 58.1-3990 of the Code of Virginia limits the refund of erroneously assessed taxes to the present tax year plus three years. The Board may also authorize the refund of any penalty and interest paid by the taxpayer.

It is the opinion of this office that the Board of Supervisors should approve the payment of the erroneously assessed taxes for the years 2006, 2007,2008 and 2009 as requested by the Commissioner of Revenue.

Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan Chapter V PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Primary highways in the County, as well as proposed Alternate Route 628, are briefly discussed below.

U.S. 460 – This is a major east-west highway that provides access to the northern part of the county. It is a major commerce route. The road is a dual highway, with bypasses around the towns of Farmville and Pamplin. The entire route has speed limits of 60 mph (65 mph on Farmville bypass) and the road is a major asset in the County's efforts to promote economic development.

U.S. Route 15 – This highway is a major two-lane north-south route, which goes across the central part of the county. The county's major anticipated growth corridor extends along Route 15 from Farmville to the Hampden-Sydney area. One of the county's long-term goals is to have this route four-laned, especially the section from Route 628 near Farmville, to Route 133 at Kingsville. This goal/request is presented to the Commonwealth Transportation Board annually.

U. S. Route 360 – This four-lane highway is located in the southeastern part of the county and serves as the main transportation route between Richmond and Danville. Commercial development along this route in Prince Edward County is limited.

Virginia Route 307 – This two-lane highway serves a short-cut between U.S. 360 in Amelia County and U.S. 460 at Rice. The road is hilly and receives a great deal of truck traffic.

Virginia Route 45 – Only a small section of this road is actually located in Prince Edward County, all within the Town of Farmville. The highway extends north from Farmville into Cumberland and Goochland counties.

Virginia Route 133 – This road is only 1.2 miles in length, and basically serves as a bypass around the Hampden-Sydney College campus.

Proposed Alternate Route 628 – This project would reduce the traffic flow through the school complex, by providing an alternate route to the south of existing route 628 (Zion Hill Road). As proposed, the new road would branch off of existing Route 628, near the Poplar Forest Apartments and go west intersecting Route 15 at the Dominion Drive traffic signal. This is a priority project for the county and state revenue sharing funds are being sought to assist in construction costs.

Major secondary roads in the county, in addition to Route 628, include: Routes 665, 696, 658 630, 626, and 604. Funding for secondary road improvements is allocated to Prince Edward County on the basis of a six-year funding plan prepared jointly by VDOT and the County. In addition, the county on occasion seeks state revenue sharing funds for priority projects.

Current FY 05-06 funding for County secondary improvements is approximately \$837, 000 with projected five year funding at 4.4 million dollars. Most projects in the six year plan are minor road enhancements The six-year plan contains no new highway segments, or new major road improvements.

The 2010 General Assembly established the Transitional Benefits Program that allows school divisions and VRS-participating political subdivisions to provide a transitional severance benefit or an enhanced retirement benefit to employees who are involuntarily separated from employment. You can elect to offer this program to your employees by submitting a formal resolution to VRS. Sheriffs, treasurers, commissioners of revenue, commonwealth attorneys and circuit court clerks are not eligible for the Transitional Benefits Program. However, personnel reporting to these employees are eligible for the program.

If you elect this program, the cost of enhanced retirement benefits will be factored into your future employer contribution rate. This resolution packet provides the following information to assist you in your deliberations regarding program election:

2010 Appropriations Act (2008-2010 Biennium)

Transitional Benefits Program

Item 472.10 F of House Bill 29*

- F. The purpose of this paragraph is to provide a transitional severance benefit, under the conditions specified, to eligible city, county, school division or other political subdivision employees who are involuntarily separated from employment with their employer.
- 1.a. "Involuntary separation" includes, but is not limited to, terminations and layoffs from employment with the employer, or being placed on leave without pay-layoff or equivalent status, due to budget reductions, employer reorganizations, workforce downsizings, or other causes not related to the job performance or misconduct of the employee, but shall not include voluntary resignations. As used in this paragraph, a "terminated employee" shall mean an employee who is involuntarily separated from employment with his employer.
- b. The governing authority of a city, county, school division or other political subdivision electing to cover its employees under the provisions of this paragraph shall adopt a resolution, as prescribed by the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Retirement System, to that effect. An election by a school division shall be evidenced by a resolution approved by the Board of such school division and its local governing authority.
- 2.a. Any (i) "eligible employee" as defined in § 51.1-132, (ii) "teacher" as defined in § 51.1-124.3, and (iii) any "local officer" as defined in § 51.1.124.3 except for the treasurer, commissioner of the revenue, attorney for the Commonwealth, clerk of a circuit court, or sheriff of any county or city, and (a) for whom reemployment with his employer is not possible because there is no available position for which the employee is qualified or the position offered to the employee requires relocation or a reduction in salary and (b) whose involuntary separation was due to causes other than job performance or misconduct, shall be eligible, under the conditions specified, for the transitional severance benefit conferred by this paragraph. The date of involuntary separation shall mean the date an employee was terminated from employment or placed on leave without pay-layoff or equivalent status.
- b. Eligibility shall commence on the date of involuntary separation.
- 3.a. On his date of involuntary separation, an eligible employee with (i) two years' service or less to the employer shall be entitled to receive a transitional severance benefit equivalent to four weeks of salary; (ii) three years through and including nine years of consecutive service to the employer shall be entitled to receive a transitional severance benefit equivalent to four weeks of salary plus one additional week of salary for every year of service over two years; (iii) ten years through and including fourteen years of consecutive service to the employer shall be entitled to receive a transitional severance benefit equivalent to twelve weeks of salary plus

two additional weeks of salary for every year of service over nine years; or (iv) fifteen years or more of consecutive service to the employer shall be entitled to receive a transitional severance benefit equivalent to two weeks of salary for every year of service, not to exceed thirty-six weeks of salary.

- b. Transitional severance benefits shall be computed by the terminating employer's payroll department. Partial years of service shall be rounded up to the next highest year of service.
- c. Transitional severance benefits shall be paid by the employer in the same manner as normal salary. In accordance with § 60.2-229, transitional severance benefits shall be allocated to the date of involuntary separation. The right of any employee who receives a transitional severance benefit to also receive unemployment compensation pursuant to § 60.2-100 et seq. shall not be denied, abridged, or modified in any way due to receipt of the transitional severance benefit; however, any employee who is entitled to unemployment compensation shall have his transitional severance benefit reduced by the amount of such unemployment compensation. Any offset to a terminated employee's transitional severance benefit due to reductions for unemployment compensation shall be paid in one lump sum at the time the last transitional severance benefit payment is made.
- d. For twelve months after the employee's date of involuntary separation, the employee shall continue to be covered under the (i) health insurance plan administered by the employer for its employees, if he participated in such plan prior to his date of involuntary separation, and (ii) group life insurance plan administered by the Virginia Retirement System pursuant to Chapter 5 (§ 51.1-500 et seq.) of Title 51.1, or such other group life insurance plan as may be administered by the employer. During such twelve months, the terminating employer shall continue to pay its share of the terminated employee's premiums. Upon expiration of such twelve month period, the terminated employee shall be eligible to purchase continuing health insurance coverage under COBRA.
- e. Transitional severance benefit payments shall cease if a terminated employee is reemployed or hired in an individual capacity as an independent contractor or consultant by the employer during the time he is receiving such payments.
- f. All transitional severance benefits payable pursuant to this section shall be subject to applicable federal laws and regulations.
- 4.a. In lieu of the transitional severance benefit provided in subparagraph 3 of this paragraph, any otherwise eligible employee who, on the date of involuntary separation, is also (i) a vested member of the Virginia Retirement System, including a member eligible for the benefits described in subsection B of § 51.1-138, and (ii) at least fifty years of age, may elect to have the employer purchase on his behalf years to be credited to either his age or creditable service or a combination of age and creditable service, except that any years of credit purchased on behalf of a member of the Virginia Retirement System, including a member eligible for the benefits

described in subsection B of § 51.1-138, who is eligible for unreduced retirement shall be added to his creditable service and not his age. The cost of each year of age or creditable service purchased by the employer shall be equal to fifteen percent of the employee's present annual compensation. The number of years of age or creditable service to be purchased by the employer shall be equal to the quotient obtained by dividing (i) the cash value of the benefits to which the employee would be entitled under subparagraphs 3.a. and 3.d. of this paragraph by (ii) the cost of each year of age or creditable service. Partial years shall be rounded up to the next highest year. Deferred retirement under the provisions of subsection C of §§ 51.1-153 and 51.1-205, and disability retirement under the provisions of § 51.1-156 et seq., shall not be available under this paragraph.

- b. In lieu of the (i) transitional severance benefit provided in subparagraph 3 of this paragraph and (ii) the retirement program provided in this subsection, any employee who is otherwise eligible may take immediate retirement pursuant to §§ 51.1-155.1 or 51.1-155.2.
- c. The retirement allowance for any employee electing to retire under this paragraph who, by adding years to his age, is between ages fifty-five and sixty-five, shall be reduced on the actuarial basis provided in subdivision A. 2. of § 51.1-155.
- d. The retirement program provided in this subparagraph shall be otherwise governed by policies and procedures developed by the Virginia Retirement System.
- e. Costs associated with the provisions of this subparagraph shall be factored into the employer contribution rates paid to the Virginia Retirement System beginning with the June 30, 2011 actuarial evaluation.
- *The same language is also provided in Item 469 Q of House Bill 30, the 2010-2012 biennial budget.

Guide Resolution Political Subdivisions Transitional Benefits Program

As set out by the General Assembly in the Appropriations Act, participating localities may offer a Transitional Severance Benefit or Enhanced Retirement Benefit to eligible employees who are involuntarily separated from their jobs due to budget reductions, employer reorganizations, workforce downsizings or other causes not related to job performance or misconduct of the employee, according to the terms and conditions of the Act.

Transitional Benefits Program (TBP)

May 2010

The 2010 General Assembly established the Transitional Benefits Program to allow school divisions and VRS-participating political subdivisions to provide a transitional severance benefit or an enhanced retirement benefit to employees who are involuntarily separated from employment. Involuntary separation is a layoff because of a budget reduction, agency reorganization, workforce downsizing or other causes not related to job performance or misconduct. The program is effective through June 30, 2012. The General Assembly may or may not continue the program in subsequent budgets or establish it as a permanent program under the *Code of Virginia*.

Teachers, other school employees (cafeteria workers, bus drivers and maintenance workers) and political subdivision employees are eligible for benefits under the program, depending on your election. Sheriffs, treasurers, commissioners of revenue, commonwealth attorneys and circuit court clerks are not eligible for the Transitional Benefits Program. However, personnel reporting to these employees are eligible for the program. If you elect this program, the cost of enhanced retirement benefits will be factored into your future employer contribution rate. For teachers, the costs associated with benefits provided by electing school divisions will be factored into the future pooled VRS contribution rate for teachers.

Submitting the Resolution

A political subdivision can elect the program for its employees by submitting a signed resolution. A school division can elect the program for teachers, other school employees or both groups by submitting a signed resolution from the school board and the local governing body, which also must approve the school board's election.

Once elected, the program is effective on the date indicated in the resolution. You may enter an end date of no later than June 30, 2012 in the resolution, or you can later revoke your election by submitting another resolution to VRS. As long as your election is in effect, employees who are involuntarily separated from employment will be eligible for the Transitional Benefits Program. The resolution to elect the program must contain the following information:

- 1. For schools, intent to provide the Transitional Benefits Program to the following employees:
 - Professional employees only (4-code);
 - School support staff only (5-code); or
 - Both employee groups.

- 2. For political subdivisions, intent to provide the Transitional Benefits Program to eligible employees.
- 3. The dates of coverage, which can include a start and end date (up to June 30, 2012 when the program ends). The effective start date can be any day of the month. Separations must occur after the start date you include. Enhanced retirements must be effective the first of the month following the employee's layoff.

Example: You elect the program to begin May 15, 2010 and end November 30, 2010. Separations may occur on or after May 15 up to, but not later than, November 30, 2010. Enhanced retirements may occur beginning June 1, 2010 up to, but not later than, December 1, 2010.

- 4. Agreement to accept any and all liability resulting from participation in the program, including any current and future changes in contribution rates.
- 5. Appropriate signatures witnessed and signed by the clerks of one or both governing bodies, as applicable.

For more information about the resolution process, contact your VRS Employer Representative.

Transitional Severance Benefits

Employees who are under age 50 and not vested are eligible for a transitional severance benefit at the time of layoff. The severance benefit amount is based on the employee's consecutive years of service under his or her current employer as follows:

- Two years or less of consecutive service = Four weeks of salary
- Three to nine years of consecutive service = Four weeks of salary plus one additional week for every year over two years
- 10-14 years of consecutive service = 12 weeks of salary plus two additional weeks for every year over nine years
- 15 years or more of consecutive service = Two weeks of salary for every year of service, not to exceed 36 weeks of salary

Service credit with other employers cannot be used in calculating the severance benefit. Employees who are eligible for VRS retirement at the time of the layoff may elect to receive the severance benefit without the enhanced retirement credit, in addition to a retirement benefit (see Enhanced Retirement on page 3).

Health Insurance

You will continue to pay your portion of the health insurance premiums for employees who receive the transitional severance benefit for up to 12 months. Encourage employees receiving this benefit to contact you before the end of their 12-month period to discuss health insurance options following the severance period.

Group Life Insurance

If the employee is covered under the VRS Group Life Insurance Program, submit the Employer Certification of VRS Basic Group Life Insurance Coverage Under the Transitional Benefits Program (VRS-11C) to VRS. Note that:

- Any VRS optional group life insurance coverage will end and can be converted within 31 days of the layoff date.
- If the employee does not meet retirement eligibility at the time of layoff, the employee has the option to convert group life insurance coverage to an individual whole-life policy. He or she must submit the Conversion of Group Life Insurance Enrollment (VRS-35E) to Minnesota Life within 31 days after the severance benefit ends. This option is not available after 31 days. If the employee dies within 31 days after the severance benefit ends, his or her beneficiary will receive the natural death benefit.
- Some basic group life insurance benefits continue into retirement for employees retiring
 under the program who are covered under the VRS Group Life Insurance Program. The
 employee may be eligible to continue all or a portion of the optional life insurance coverage, if
 applicable. Read more about Insurance in Retirement.

If an employee is covered under an employer-administered group life insurance plan, coverage will continue for 12 months following the layoff date.

Forfeiture of Severance Benefits

If you rehire an employee for whom you are paying a transitional severance benefit in the same or a similar position or as an independent contractor performing the same or similar duties, the employee's severance benefit will end.

Enhanced Retirement

Employees who are at least age 50 and vested at their layoff date are eligible for enhanced retirement under the Transitional Benefits Program. They may elect one of the following:

• Enhanced retirement credit, which will be applied to their age, service credit or both to enhance their retirement benefit;

- Transitional severance benefit without the enhanced retirement credit, in addition to the retirement benefit;
- Transitional severance benefit with deferred retirement; or
- Transitional severance benefit without retirement.

If the additional retirement credit does not bring an employee to retirement eligibility, he or she is eligible for the transitional severance benefit only. Employees retiring with the enhanced retirement credit cannot defer their retirement or retire on disability. Employees retiring under the program who are eligible for an unreduced retirement benefit at their layoff date will receive additional service credit only.

Enhanced Retirement Credit Calculation

The enhanced retirement credit is calculated using the employee's salary, years of consecutive service with you rounded up to a whole year and the employer's portion of health insurance and life insurance premiums. You can use the Transitional Benefits Calculator at www.varetire.org/tbpcalc to determine the amount of additional credit for an enhanced retirement. You enter the employee's information. If you are authorized to use <a href="https://www.wyver.edu.com/myvver.edu.com/my

Health Insurance Credit and Hazardous Duty Supplement

- If the employee elects the enhanced retirement credit, the portion of the enhanced credit applied to service credit, if applicable, will count toward the health insurance credit. The employee must retire with at least 15 years of service credit to be eligible for the health insurance credit, if offered by the employer.
- If the employee elects the enhanced retirement credit and is covered under enhanced benefits
 for hazardous duty service, the portion of the enhanced retirement credit applied to service will
 count toward eligibility for the hazardous duty supplement.

Life Insurance

Some basic group life insurance benefits continue into retirement for employees retiring under the program who are covered under the VRS Group Life Insurance Program. If they have elected optional group life insurance coverage, they also may be eligible to continue all or a portion of this coverage. For more information, employees can call Minnesota Life toll free at 1-800-441-2258.

Forfeiture of Benefits

Employees retiring under the program who return to covered employment with any VRS-participating employer in any capacity will forfeit the enhanced retirement credits when they retire again.

Retirement Application

Employees may elect the Basic Benefit, Survivor Option, Partial Lump-Sum Option Payment (PLOP) or the Advance Pension Option. The benefit payout option is irrevocable, which means the employee cannot change it, except for the Survivor Option under some conditions. To qualify for the PLOP under the Transitional Benefits Program, employees must have worked at least one year beyond the date they become eligible for an unreduced retirement benefit before their layoff date. Enhanced retirement credits cannot be used to meet the service requirements for the PLOP. If an employee is age 55 or older and has at least five years of service credit or at least age 50 with 30 or more years of service, or is eligible for enhanced coverage for hazardous duty service and is age 50 or older with at least five years of service credit, he or she can elect the Advance Pension Option.

The employee should complete and submit all required documents and service retirement forms, including the Application for Service Retirement (VRS-5), to you. You will certify the application and enclose a completed Employer Certification of Involuntary Separation Under the Transitional Benefits Program (VRS-11B) or include a printout of the Transitional Benefits Calculator results with the employee's application and submit it to VRS. Please write "Transitional Benefits Program" at the top of the VRS-5. The employee should not submit the retirement application directly to VRS. VRS requires your certification of the application and the enhanced retirement credit calculation to process the application.

The effective date of retirement is the first of the month following the month the employee is laid off.

Purchasing Prior Service

Employees retiring under the Transitional Benefits Program who are purchasing prior service must complete their purchase for the prior service credit to count toward their retirement benefit calculation. Employees purchasing service through a payroll contract have the following options:

- They can forfeit the remaining service.
- If they are purchasing service through an after-tax payroll deduction contract, they can purchase the remaining service in a lump sum before retirement. They must send a letter indicating their intent to purchase the remaining service and the last day of employment to VRS at P.O. Box 2500, Richmond, VA 23218-2500. VRS will send a cost letter to the employee with payment instructions.

• If they are purchasing service through a pre-tax salary reduction contract, they may be eligible to claim a hardship and purchase the remaining service in a lump sum with after-tax funds or suspend the contract, as provided under the Internal Revenue Code. To claim a hardship, they must send a letter to VRS indicating their intent to purchase the remaining service in a lump sum or request that the contract be suspended. They must enclose a completed and signed Employer Certification of Involuntary Separation (VRS-11B) certifying the involuntary separation to VRS with their letter.

457 Deferred Compensation and Virginia Cash Match Plans

Employees participating in the Commonwealth of Virginia 457 Deferred Compensation and Cash Match Plans have the following options:

- They may keep their funds in the 457 Plan and continue to manage their investments. They cannot contribute to the plan unless they return to salaried or wage employment with an employer that offers the plan.
- If they have a Virginia Cash Match Plan account, they may request a rollover of their 457 Plan funds to their cash match account, an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) or another qualified retirement or tax-deferred savings plan.
- They may request a payment of their 457 plan funds and any cash match funds by electing a lump sum, a periodic payment or a combination of these distribution methods. Funds paid directly to them are subject to federal and state income taxes. Cash match funds also may be subject to a 10 percent federal tax penalty if the participant withdraws them before age 59%. Payments from the 457 Plan are not subject to this tax penalty.
- They may roll over payments for unused sick leave or annual leave into the 457 Plan account. This
 is allowed only if employees, prior to their last date of employment, provide their employer with a
 properly completed Payroll Authorization- One-Time Deferral form. The form must be submitted
 to the employer no later than the month prior to the month in which the contribution will be sent
 to the plan.

As provided under the Internal Revenue Code, participants cannot contribute cash severance payments to the 457 Plan.

- Involuntarily separated under the Transitional Benefits Program,
- Covered under the Virginia Retirement System (VRS) Basic Group Life Insurance Program at time of separation, and

Involuntarily separated employees who do not meet minimum age and service requirements for retirement at the time of separation are eligible to convert basic group life coverage to an individual policy. Employees must complete this conversion within 31 days following the earlier of 1) the end of the month in which the 12 months of continued coverage expires or 2) the date transitional severance benefits end.

Employers must report the employee to VRS on a leave without pay (LWOP) status for the duration of the leave without pay layoff period.

Transitional Benefits Program FAQs

Q1. What is the Transitional Benefits Program?	The 2010 General Assembly established the Transitional Benefits Program to allow school divisions and VRS-participating political subdivisions to provide a transitional severance benefit or an enhanced retirement benefit to employees who are involuntarily separated from employment. The program is effective through June 30, 2012. The General Assembly may or may not continue the program in subsequent budgets or establish it as a permanent program under the Code of Virginia.
Q2. What is an involuntary separation from employment?	Involuntary separation is a layoff because of a budget reduction, agency reorganization, workforce downsizing or another cause not related to job performance or misconduct.
Q3. How do I elect the program?	A political subdivision can elect the program for its employees by submitting a signed resolution. A school division can elect the program for teachers, other school employees or both groups by submitting a signed resolution from the school board and the local governing body, which also must approve the school board's election. Sheriffs, treasurers, commissioners of revenue, commonwealth attorneys and circuit court clerks are not eligible. However, personnel reporting to these employees are eligible.
Q4. When does the program begin and end?	Once elected, the program is effective on the date indicated in the resolution. You may enter an end date in the resolution or you can later revoke your election by submitting another resolution to VRS. As long as your election is in effect, employees who are involuntarily separated from employment will be eligible for the Transitional Benefits Program. The program is effective through June 30, 2012 unless it is extended by the General Assembly or you indicate an earlier end date on your resolution.
Q5. How does the transitional severance benefit work?	A transitional severance benefit is a cash severance payment. Employers will determine the value of this benefit based on an employee's years of consecutive service:
	Two years of consecutive service or less = Four weeks of salary

- Three to nine years of consecutive service = Four weeks of salary plus one additional week for every year over two years
- 10-14 years of consecutive service = 12 weeks of salary plus two additional weeks for every year over nine years
- 15 years or more of consecutive service = Two weeks of salary for every year of service, not to exceed 36 weeks

In addition to the cash severance benefit, you must continue to pay your portion of the health insurance premiums for employees who receive the benefit for up to 12 months following the layoff date. Any employer-paid basic group life insurance coverage also will continue for 12 months following the layoff date.

Q6. How does the enhanced retirement benefit work?

Employees who are at least age 50 and vested at their layoff date may be eligible for enhanced retirement under the Transitional Benefits Program. They may receive additional credit, which will be applied to age, service or a combination of both to enhance the VRS retirement benefit. Employees who are eligible for an unreduced retirement benefit at their layoff date are eligible for additional service credit only.

If the additional credit does not bring an employee to retirement eligibility, he or she is eligible only for the transitional severance benefit.

The enhanced retirement credit is calculated using the employee's salary, years of consecutive service with the employer rounded up to a whole year and the employer's portion of health insurance and life insurance premiums.

You can use the Transitional Benefits Calculator at www.varetire.org/etpb to determine the amount of additional credit. You enter the employee's information. If you are authorized to use *my*VRS for Employers, you can include the additional credit and create an estimate for VRS retirement benefits based on all the components of the calculation provided through *my*VRS.

Q7. What is the cost to employers who provide the program?	The cost of the enhanced retirements will be factored into your VRS retirement contribution rate. For teachers, the costs associated with benefits provided by electing school divisions will be factored into the future pooled VRS contribution rate for teachers. You also are responsible for the transitional severance payments to employees.
Q8. Do the years of additional service credit provided through the enhanced retirement benefit count toward the health insurance credit and hazardous duty supplement?	If the employee elects the enhanced retirement credit, the portion of the enhanced credit applied to service credit, if applicable, will count toward the health insurance credit. The employee must retire with at least 15 years of service credit to be eligible for the health insurance credit, if offered by the employer.
	If the employee elects the enhanced retirement credit and is covered under enhanced benefits for hazardous duty service, the portion of the enhanced credit applied to service credit, if applicable, will count toward eligibility for the hazardous duty supplement.
Q9. Can an employee retire on disability or defer retirement under the program?	An employee that receives the transitional severance benefit can defer retirement or retire on disability under the program. However, a person who receives the enhanced retirement cannot defer retirement or retire on disability.
Q10. What benefit payout options are available to employees who retire under the program?	Employees may elect the Basic Benefit, Survivor Option, Partial Lump-Sum Option Payment (PLOP) or the Advance Pension Option. The benefit payout option is irrevocable, which means the employee cannot change it, except for the Survivor Option under some conditions. To qualify for the PLOP under the Transitional Benefits Program, employees must have worked at least one year beyond the date they become eligible for an unreduced retirement benefit before their layoff date. Enhanced retirement credits cannot be used to meet the service requirements for the PLOP. If an employee is age 55 or older and has at least five years of service credit or at least age 50 with 30 or more years of service, or is eligible for enhanced coverage for hazardous duty service and is age 50 or older with at least five years of service credit, he or she can elect the Advance Pension Option.

Q11. How do employees retire under the program?

The employee should complete and submit all required documents and service retirement forms, including the Application for Service Retirement (VRS-5), to you. You will certify the application and enclose a completed Employer Certification of Involuntary Separation Under the Transitional Benefits Program (VRS-11B) or include a printout of the Transitional Benefits Calculator results with the employee's application and submit it to VRS. Please write "Transitional Benefits Program" at the top of the VRS-5. The employee should not submit the retirement application directly to VRS. VRS requires your certification of the application and the enhanced retirement credit calculation to process the application. The effective date of retirement is the first of the month following the month the employee is laid off.

Q12. Can an employee who is eligible to retire choose to receive the transitional severance benefit?

Employees who are eligible to retire at the time of layoff may elect one of the following:

- Enhanced retirement credit, which will be applied to their age, service credit or both to enhance their retirement benefit;
- Transitional severance benefit without the enhanced retirement credit, in addition to the retirement benefit;
- Transitional severance benefit with deferred retirement; or
- Transitional severance benefit without retirement.

Q13. Can I rehire employees who are laid off or retire under the program?

If you rehire an employee for whom you are paying a transitional severance benefit in the same or a similar position or as an independent contractor performing the same or similar duties, the employee's severance benefit will end.

Employees retiring under the program who return to covered employment with any VRS-participating employer in any capacity will forfeit the enhanced retirement credits when they retire again.

Q14. Are superintendents and city and county managers who are involuntarily separated from employment after 20 years of service eligible for both the Transitional Benefits Program and the exception from general early retirement provisions that allows them to retire upon attaining age 50 with an unreduced retirement benefit?	No, these employees are only eligible for one of the programs and will need to choose between the two.

Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP)

Summary: The ERRP was established by Congress as part of the Health Care reform Law. The program has a funding limit of \$5 billion, starts on June 1, 2010 and expires on January 1, 2014 or when funds are exhausted. The program reimburses employers for a portion of the costs of providing health insurance to early retirees age 55 and older who are not eligible for Medicare, and their eligible spouses, surviving spouses, and dependents.

The program reimburses 80% of the aggregate claims incurred by each early retiree during the plan year that are actually paid by the plan, the insurer, or early retiree, that exceed a \$15,000 threshold and that are less than \$90,000.

The County has only one current retiree eligible and two current employees that could retire and become eligible during the 4 year period of the program. Due to the temporary nature of the program and the limited funding it is being recommended the application be submitted as quickly as possible.

This is a complex program with detailed application requirements. The attachments detail this program.

The following information is only for TLC groups that offer Early Retiree Coverage:

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has issued an interim final rule implementing the temporary Early Retirement Reinsurance Program (Program) established by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) as part of the Health Care Reform Law. The Program, which has an overall funding limit of \$5 billion, starts on June 1, 2010, and will expire on January 1, 2014 (or when the \$5 billion funding allocation is exhausted, whichever comes first). The Program provides reimbursement to participating sponsors of employment-based plans for a portion of the costs of providing health coverage to early retirees age 55 and older who are not eligible for Medicare, and their eligible spouses, surviving spouses, and dependents. The Program will apply to claims incurred on or after June 1, 2010 in plan years ending after that date that fall between the cost threshold and the cost limit for the plan year.

While a significant amount of further clarification is needed before an application can be submitted, an overall program description prepared by Aon Consulting is attached along with an *Aon Alert* summary of the guidance issued by HHS. For those who wish to apply for the ERRP Program, TLC will work with Aon to develop access to the claims data which will be available to you upon request. While we will provide you with much of the information needed to apply, TLC will not be able to assist you with the preparation and filing of the application with HHS.

Health Care Reform: Early Retiree Reinsurance Program Application

The Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") has recently posted on its website a draft application and related instructions for sponsors of eligible employment-based plans ("Sponsors") to participate in the federal Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (the "Program") established by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. The draft application and instructions can be found at:

The application is currently only in draft form. It is expected that there will be a lag period between the posting of the final version of the application on the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services ("HHS") website, and the date that HHS will begin accepting any applications.

Points to Consider

The temporary Program enables certified Sponsors of certified plans to obtain reimbursement of eligible health expenses for eligible early retirees (generally, from age 55 through age 64) and their eligible spouses, surviving spouses, and dependents. The draft application provides certain insights into what the final version of the application likely will require. For example, the draft indicates that:

- The application must include certain information regarding:
 - Each benefit option under the plan for which reimbursement is sought.
 - Cost-reduction programs and procedures for participants with chronic and high-cost conditions.
 - Projected Program reimbursements for the first two plan year cycles.
 - The Sponsor's intended use of Program proceeds to offset increased Sponsor costs, or reduce participant costs, under the plan.
 - How the Sponsor will maintain its current level of contributions to the plan.

The application currently does not require an initial list of eligible retirees.

- The Sponsor must submit a separate application for each plan for which it will be seeking reimbursement under the Program.
- The application likely will be a paper copy, although HHS may try to develop an online version.
- A "Plan Sponsor Agreement" (committing to Program requirements) is part of the application.
- The Sponsor must have in place policies and procedures (which must be produced to HHS upon request) to detect and reduce fraud, waste, and abuse related to the Program.
- The Sponsor must enter into a written agreement with its plan or insurer regarding disclosure of certain information and documents to HHS under the Program.
- The Sponsor must implement safeguards regarding HIPAA protected health information and the unauthorized use and disclosure of information and documents exchanged under the application.



- Similar to the current Retiree Drug Subsidy application:
 - An "Authorized Representative" of the Sponsor must complete and sign the application.
 - The Sponsor must name an employee or nonemployee "Account Manager" for coordinating the
 application process and serving as its primary contact with HHS regarding the application.
- The Authorized Representative or Account Manager may designate an individual to assist with certain delegated functions regarding the application.
- Reimbursements will be made based on a plan year cycle that will be determined depending on whether or not the plan year is specified in an existing plan document.
- HHS may deny an application if Program funds are insufficient (a total of \$5 billion has been allocated to fund the Program).

Next Steps

HHS will soon be announcing when and how Sponsors can begin submitting applications. HHS also is expected shortly to issue Questions and Answers regarding the Program. Nevertheless, it is essential that Sponsors prepare <u>now</u> (such as by gathering relevant information, reviewing plan documents and business associate agreements, determining what alternate approaches may be appropriate to address Program requirements, etc.), so that they will be ready to submit complete and accurate applications as soon as practicable. This is important, since Program applications will be processed in the order received by HHS, incomplete or inadequate applications will be returned by HHS, and applications might not be accepted by HHS once projected reimbursements by the Program for plans that submit applications are determined by HHS to exceed Program funding limits.

HHS Issues Interim Final Rule on Early Retiree Reinsurance Program Employer Summary and Next Steps

The information below was provided for The Local Choice (TLC) by Aon Consulting. It is intended for employers with early retirees covered by a group health plan who may be interested in the reinsurance program. Other information sources are listed at the end of this document.

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has issued an interim final rule implementing the temporary Early Retirement Reinsurance Program (Program) established by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) as part of the Health Care Reform Law. The Program, which has an overall funding limit of \$5 billion, will start on June 1, 2010, and will expire on January 1, 2014, or when the Program's \$5 billion in funding is exhausted, whichever comes first. The Program provides reimbursement to participating sponsors of employment-based plans for a portion of the costs of providing health coverage to early retirees age 55 and older who are not eligible for Medicare, and their eligible spouses, surviving spouses, and dependents. The Program will apply to claims incurred on or after June 1, 2010 in plan years ending after that date that fall between the cost threshold and the cost limit for the plan year.

The interim final rule sets out the framework of the Program, including the types of sponsors and plans covered, the application and certification process for participation in the Program, and the reimbursement process. Even though the guidance is in the form of an interim final rule, there is a 30-day comment period that ends on June 4, 2010.

Highlights of the Program

- Sponsors must apply to, and their employment-based plan must be certified by, HHS before a reimbursement claim is submitted.
- Applications will be reviewed on a first-come/first-serve basis. Incomplete applications will be rejected and the applicant will be required to refile. [Note: This is a critical feature of the Program. HHS will use the first 2 plan-year cycle reimbursement projections that have to be included in the application in determining if and when to stop accepting applications due to the overall funding limitations. Once applications become available there will likely be a very short window of time to submit applications.]
- A separate application must be submitted for each employment-based plan; however, the application can cover more than one plan year.
- As part of the application process, the sponsor must describe its programs and procedures
 that have or may generate cost-savings with respect to plan participants with chronic and
 high-cost conditions, and its policies and procedures to protect against fraud, waste, and
 abuse under the Program.
- The employer must agree to extensive disclosure requirements regarding information, data, documents, and records (including protected health information (PHI)), and to execute a sponsor agreement with HHS or its designee that includes certain assurances made by the sponsor (similar to the agreement currently required under the Retiree Drug Subsidy Program). The sponsor must also have a disclosure agreement with its health insurer or employment-based plan.
- Reimbursements under the Program must be used to reduce the sponsor's health benefit
 premiums or cost, and/or reduce health benefit premiums, copayments, deductibles,
 coinsurance or other out-of-pocket costs of plan participants (not limited to early

- retirees). However, sponsors are expected to provide at least the same level of contributions to support the plan as before the Program.
- Applicants must project their reimbursement amounts for the first 2 plan-year cycles.
 [Note: This will likely require some actuarial analysis that will need to be prepared in advance of the application process.]
- The Program will reimburse 80% of the aggregate claims incurred by each early retiree during the plan year that are actually paid by the plan, the insurer, or early retiree, that exceed a \$15,000 cost threshold, and that are less than a \$90,000 cost limit. There is only one cost threshold and one cost limit per plan year for each early retiree. [Note: It is presently unclear whether each covered dependent of a retiree has a separate threshold and cost limit, or whether a retiree and all his dependents are aggregated for Program purposes.]
- Claims will only be reimbursed until the Program funding runs out. [Note: This is another critical element of the Program, and requires that claims for reimbursement be submitted as soon as possible.]
- Aggregate paid claims for an early retiree for a plan year must exceed \$15,000 before the claim can be submitted for reimbursement.
- For a plan year beginning before June 1, 2010 and ending after that date, claims incurred
 on or after June 1, 2010 can be reimbursed under the Program, and claims up to \$15,000
 incurred prior to that date will be applied to the \$15,000 cost threshold and \$90,000 cost
 limit.
- The term "early retiree" includes not only the former employee, but also his or her enrolled spouse, surviving spouse, and dependents.
- Any appeal of a rejected application or reimbursement claim must be filed in writing with HHS within 15 calendar days after the sponsor receives an adverse reimbursement determination [Note: sponsors cannot appeal an adverse reimbursement determination based on the unavailability of funds.].
- The sponsor is required to maintain records supporting the application and claims
 incurred during a plan year for 6 years after the end of the plan year in which the costs
 were incurred, or longer if otherwise required by law.
- The sponsor has a continuing obligation to update any inaccurate data provided in connection with a claim, and HHS can reopen a reimbursement determination within varying periods of time, depending on the reason.
- If a sponsor undergoes an ownership change, HHS must be notified at least 60 days in advance of the change.

Eligible Employer-Based Plans

<u>Sponsors</u>. The Program applies to sponsors and their employment-based plans. A sponsor is generally the employer in the case of a single employer plan or an employee organization (e.g., a union) in the case of a plan maintained by an employee organization. In the case of a plan maintained jointly by one employer and an employee organization and for which the employer is the primary source of funding, the sponsor is the employer.

<u>Plans</u>. An employment-based plan is a group health plan that provides health benefits to early retirees, but excludes Federal governmental plans. For this purpose, health benefits include medical, surgical, hospital, prescription drug, and other benefits that may be specified by HHS, whether self-funded, fully insured, or otherwise. Such benefits include benefits for the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, or prevention of physical or mental disease or condition with respect to any

structure or function of the body. Health benefits do not include excepted benefits under HIPAA, such as long-term care and limited scope dental and visions benefits.

Early Retiree. An early retiree is a plan participant age 55 and older who is enrolled for health benefits in a certified employment-based plan, who is not eligible for Medicare benefits, and who is not an active employee of an employer maintaining or currently contributing to the plan or an employer that has made substantial contributions to the plan. The participant's enrolled spouse, surviving spouse, and dependents (based on the rules of the plan; these individuals need not be tax dependents) are also considered to be early retirees, although it is not clear under the regulation whether they are each treated as separate early retirees, or if the family unit is treated as one early retiree for Program reimbursement purposes.

The Reimbursement Process Employment-Based Plans -Approval by HHS

<u>Certification</u>. In order to participate in the Program, a sponsor's employment-based plan must be certified (approved) by HHS, and must include programs and procedures that have generated, or have the potential to generate, cost-savings with respect to plan participants with chronic and high-cost conditions (conditions for which \$15,000 or more in health claims are likely to be incurred during a plan year by one plan participant). However, there is no need to have a program that addresses all conditions likely to result in claims of \$15,000, or to implement new-cost-savings programs. To secure certification of its employment-based plan, a sponsor must:

- Make available information, data, documents, and records (including PHI) to HHS;
- Have a written agreement with its health insurance issuer (for fully-insured coverages) or employment-based plan (for self-insured coverages) regarding disclosure of information, data, documents, and records to HHS, and the health insurance issuer or employmentbased plan must disclose such information to HHS, on behalf of the sponsor, at a time and in a manner specified by HHS for approval;
- Ensure that policies and procedures to protect against fraud, waste, and abuse under the Program are in place, and comply timely with any request from HHS to produce such policies and procedures and substantiate their implementation and effectiveness; and
- Submit an application to HHS.

<u>Applications</u>. Applications will be processed on a first-come/first-serve basis, and must comply with the requirements described below at the time submitted or they will be rejected. An application must be submitted once for each employment-based plan to be covered by the Program. The application must be signed by an authorized representative of the applicant and must include:

- Applicant-specific information, such as tax identification number, name and address, contact name, telephone number, and email address;
- The plan year start and end dates (but not the year);
- A summary of how the applicant will use any reimbursement received under the Program

 i.e., how the reimbursement will be used to reduce premium contributions,
 co-payments, deductibles, coinsurance, or other out-of-pocket costs for plan participants
 (not limited to early retirees), to reduce health benefit or premium costs for the sponsor,
 or to reduce any combination of these costs (but not for general revenues);
- An explanation of how the reimbursement will be applied to maintain the sponsor's level of effort in contributing to support the plan;
- Projected amount of reimbursement to be received under the Program for the first 2 plan year cycles, with specific amounts for each cycle;

- List of all benefit options that may cover any early retiree under the employment-based plan for whom the sponsor may claim reimbursement;
- Plan sponsor agreement (see below) signed by an authorized representative; and
- Other information that HHS may require.

Sponsor Agreement. The plan sponsor agreement is between the sponsor and HHS. The agreement is to be submitted as part of the application and must include the following provisions: (1) assurance of a written agreement between the sponsor and health insurance issuer or employment-based plan, regarding the sponsor's disclosure obligations to HHS, (2) acknowledgment that the application is being provided to obtain Federal funds and that all subcontractors acknowledge that information provided in connection with a subcontract is used for such purpose, (3) attestation of the anti-fraud, waste, and abuse policies in place, and (4) other terms and conditions required by HHS.

HHS' Reimbursement Process

<u>Certification Required</u>. A reimbursement request can only be made after the sponsor and employment-based plan have been certified by HHS.

Amount of Reimbursement. The reimbursement amount is 80% of the costs for health benefits (net of negotiated price concessions) for claims incurred during the plan year attributable to health benefit costs between the cost threshold (\$15,000) and up to the cost limit (\$90,000) for each early retiree enrolled in the certified plan in a plan year. Reimbursable costs include health benefit costs (not premiums) paid by the employment-based plan, the insurer (if an insured plan), and by the early retiree. Both the cost threshold and cost limit will be adjusted for inflation for plan years beginning on or after October 1, 2011.

<u>Incurring a Claim</u>. A claim is incurred only when the sponsor, health insurance issuer, employment-based plan, plan participant, or a combination of these or similar stakeholders, becomes responsible for payment of the claim.

<u>Application of Threshold/Limit</u>. All health benefit costs paid by the employment-based plan or health insurer, or by or on behalf of the early retiree for all benefit options the early retiree is enrolled in under the certified plan for a plan year, are combined in applying the threshold/limit. For each early retiree, there is only one cost threshold and one cost limit per plan year regardless of the number of benefit options available under the plan.

Timing of Incurred Claims/Special Transition Rule. The reimbursement amount is based only on claims incurred on or after June 1, 2010. However, under a special transition rule, for plan years beginning before and ending after June 1, 2010, up to \$15,000 of claims incurred before June 1, 2010, count toward the cost threshold and cost limit. Claims incurred before June 1, 2010 that are in excess of \$15,000 are disregarded in applying the cost threshold and cost limit.

<u>Claims Submission for Reimbursement</u>. HHS has not yet issued a model claims form; however, the regulations provide that the claims submission must include a list of early retirees for whom claims are submitted, and documentation of the actual costs of the items and services for the submitted claims. Only claims that have been incurred and paid may be submitted for reimbursement. Claims may only be submitted after the cost threshold has been reached, and then must include claims both above and below the cost threshold. Claims should not be submitted for early retirees that total more than the applicable cost limit for the year.

Maintenance of Records. All documentation, data, and other information required in the application and claims process must be maintained by the sponsor (or its subcontractor) for 6 years after the end of the plan year in which the costs were incurred, or longer if otherwise required by law. The sponsor must require its health insurance issuer or employment-based plan to maintain and produce upon request these required records.

<u>Appeals Process</u>. A complete or partial denial of a reimbursement request must be appealed in writing within 15 calendar days after receipt of the HHS determination. However, if a claim is rejected due to the exhaustion of Program funding, the claim rejection is not appealable. The decision of HHS on appeal is final and binding.

<u>Update Inaccurate Data</u>. The sponsor is required to disclose any data inaccuracies upon which a reimbursement determination is made, including inaccurate claims data and negotiated price concessions. HHS can reopen and may revise a reimbursement determination at its own behest or upon request of the sponsor within 1 year after the determination for any reason, within 4 years for good cause, and at any time for fraud or similar fault.

Use of Reimbursement Proceeds

Maintenance of Effort. A key part of the application process is determining how the reimbursement proceeds will be used. HHS indicates that sponsors should provide at least the same level of contribution to support the plan as they did before the Program (and, as indicated above, the application must include an explanation of how the reimbursement will be applied to maintain the sponsor's level of effort in contributing to support the plan). Consequently, reimbursements can be used to offset premium and cost increases for the sponsor and/or to reduce the premiums, co-payments, deductibles, coinsurance, or out-of-pocket costs for plan participants (not limited to early retirees). However, a sponsor may not use reimbursements to reduce its current contribution level. [Note: From an employer prospective, the maintenance of effort obligation should be carefully considered, and the implications to future postretirement health plan modifications or future collective bargaining fully evaluated before committing to current contribution levels.]

<u>ERISA Implications</u>. It is unclear, in the case of a health plan that is subject to ERISA, whether any portion of a reimbursement (e.g., where early retirees contribute to the plan) would be treated as a plan asset and required to be used solely for the benefit of plan participants.

Change of Sponsor Ownership

A change in the ownership of a sponsor (including the removal, addition, or substitution of a partner in a partnership) triggers a notice requirement if the sponsor has a sponsor agreement in effect. The sponsor must notify HHS of a potential ownership change at least 60 days before the anticipated effective date of the change. Failure to notify HHS in advance of the effective date of the change may result in HHS recovering funds paid under the Program. If the ownership change results in a transfer of liability for health benefits to a new owner, such change automatically assigns an existing sponsor agreement to the new owner.

Noncompliance

If there is any failure to comply with Program requirements, or there is fraud, waste, abuse, or similar fault, HHS can recoup or withhold funds, terminate or deny an application, or take any combination of these actions. Other Federal laws or consequences may also apply

Recommended Next Steps

Employers with health plans that cover early retirees need to move very quickly to evaluate their claims experience and determine whether it makes sense to apply for certification under the Program. A single early retiree with aggregate claims exceeding \$90,000 in a plan year would generate a \$60,000 reimbursement. Due to the temporary nature of the Program, limited funding available, and the detailed application process this decision should be made as quickly as possible. Employers should keep in mind, however, that due to Program funding limits, there is no guarantee that their application will be approved or that their anticipated reimbursements will be realized.

Once the decision is made to participate in the Program, the employer should:

- Policies and Procedures. Ensure it has programs and procedures in place to generate cost savings with respect to chronic and high-cost conditions, and to address fraud, waste, and abuse in the Program.
- <u>Disclosure Agreement.</u> Draft and have the appropriate agreement in place to require
 disclosure of required information to HHS. Because PHI disclosure triggers HIPAA
 concerns, business associate agreements may need to be reviewed to ensure that they
 address this disclosure obligation.
- Sponsor Agreement. Execute a sponsor agreement with HHS.
- Use of Reimbursements. Determine the manner in which it will use reimbursements to reduce plan costs.
- <u>Submit an application to HHS Time is of the Essence</u>. Application forms should be available from HHS in early June 2010.
- Track Costs. Put procedures in place to (1) track benefit costs incurred by and for early retirees, (2) document costs paid by the early retirees, and (3) file for reimbursement when cost thresholds are exceeded.
- <u>Record Maintenance</u>. Ensure that it maintains the appropriate records to satisfy the records maintenance requirements,
- <u>Tax and Accounting.</u> Determine the appropriate tax and accounting treatment for Program reimbursements. PPACA provides that reimbursements are not included in the gross income of the sponsor; however, it is less clear whether sponsors that are taxable entities can currently deduct health plan costs that are or will be submitted to HHS for reimbursement.

AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE ADMINISTRATIVE/TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

SERVICES FOR THE

VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF MINES, MINERALS AND ENERGY ENERGY-EFFICIENCY AND CONSERVATION BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM (EECBG) "PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY IMPROVING ENERGY EFFICIENCY TO FACILITATE JOB RETENTION & JOB CREATION"

- 1. <u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions of Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) services required for the execution of the project.
- II. PROJECT: The project referred to as the "Prince Edward County Improving Energy Efficiency to Facilitate Job Retention & Job Creation," consists generally of the installation of a new Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) System to cover the entire STEPS, Inc. Job Training and Manufacturing Facility located in Prince Edward County. This project is to be funded in part through an Energy-Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) in the amount of \$708,002 from the Virginia Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy (VDMME). The project is to be developed in accordance with all pertinent Federal and State laws, regulations, and procedures.
- III. <u>PARTIES:</u> The parties to this agreement shall be Prince Edward County, Virginia, hereafter referred to as the County, and the Commonwealth Regional Council, hereafter referred to as the Council.
- IV. <u>COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITIES</u>: It shall be the Council's responsibility to perform the following activities:
 - 1) <u>Administrative Assistance</u>: The Council will provide administrative assistance in support of the project implementation to include the following:
 - a) Assistance in completion of EECBG pre-contract requirements.
 - b) Assistance in completion of EECBG project compliance requirements, (Davis-Bacon, Buy American, Historic Preservation, National Environmental Policy Act - NEPA, and Waste Stream Management) and the obtainment of clearances as may be required and the reporting to VDMME.

- c) Assistance in establishing and maintaining project files at the Council office location, in accordance with Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) program requirements. All original documents shall be made available to the County.
- d) Assistance in preparing project progress reports (reporting metrics, frequency, formats, jobs created, emission reductions, energy savings, etc.), attending technical assistance and compliance review meetings with VDMME as it relates to this project.
- e) Assistance in preparing miscellaneous project related VDMME/EECBG documentation and correspondences.
- f) Assistance in preparing EECBG drawdown requests.
- g) Coordinate and advise as may be required with the County's designated financial person to ensure proper allocation of EECBG funds.
- h) Coordinate EECBG grant related requirements with the County as may be required or appropriate in support of the project implementation.
- i) Serve as a liaison between VDMME and the County on any matters that need to be addressed or resolved in regards to the project.
- 2) <u>Construction Coordination</u>: The Commission will provide construction coordination services in support of the project to include the following:
 - a) Assist the County as may be required in procuring services relating to the EECBG project and compliance with 10 CFR 600.236.
 - b) Assist the County and its consultants in the development of plans, specifications, and construction bid documents and required federal and state documentation.
 - Assist the County with the pre-bid and pre-construction conferences with the contractors.
 - d) Assist the County in the bidding of the new HVAC System. This activity shall include the opening of bids, witnessing, certification and filing of bids with VDMME.

- e) Assist the County in the award of the construction contract.
- f) Assist the County in the compliance of labor standards (Davis Bacon) for contractors and subcontractors which includes obtaining wage determination, weekly reviews of payrolls, monthly employee interviews, obtaining documentation on apprenticeship training programs, obtaining/reviewing employee authorization forms, obtaining/reviewing register of assigned employees, obtaining/reviewing register of contractors, subcontractors, and suppliers, etc.
- Assist the County on the clearance of any identified Davis-Bacon noncompliance issues by contractors and subcontractors.
- h) Assist the County in the construction close-out including the preparation all required EECBG forms as it relates to this project.
- V. <u>COUNTY'S RESPONSIBILITIES</u>: It shall be the County's responsibility to perform the following activities:
 - 1) The County is the project EECBG grantee and is solely responsible for the overall implementation of the project.
 - 2) The County will be responsible for notifying the Council of all meetings pertaining to the project.
 - 3) The County will meet and confer with the Council on a mutually agreed upon basis to review project progress issues and to make decisions (as may be required) for the effective implementation of the project.
 - 4) The County will maintain an official set of financial records of the expenditures of the EECBG funds for this project, along with matching funds from other sources (to ensure that all project costs and disbursements are accurately documented).
 - 5) The County will be responsible for preparing and authorizing all requests for grant fund disbursements and for issuing payments for approved invoices for project services and implementation activities.

- 6) The County will provide the Council with all information and documents relevant to the implementation of the project and shall ensure that correspondences and project related documents received during the implementation of the project are provided to the Council in a timely fashion. Copies of all documents shall be available for the Council for placement in the permanent project file.
- 7) The County will be responsible for providing the Council with the necessary data so that the Council can prepare the required EECBG reports and forms.
- VI. <u>TERM OF AGREEMENT</u>: The term shall be from the effective date of this contract to the conditional close-out of the Energy-Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Project. This time period shall not be more than twenty-four (24) months from the date of the contract or close-out, whichever is later. All administrative activities completed on this project, prior to execution, are solely the responsibility of the COUNTY.
- VII. <u>COMPENSATION</u>: The County agrees to compensate the Council in the sum of \$40,000 for the Council's work and activities as set forth herein including typical expenses for supplies and materials. This total compensation is EECBG grant eligible. Compensation payments, in part or in full, shall be made by the County on receipt of the Council's statement. Statements for partial payment shall be commensurate with services rendered and progress toward project completion.
- VIII. <u>RETENTION OF COST RECORDS</u>: The Council shall maintain all records of personnel and other direct expenses relating to the project and make such records available to the County upon request. Such records shall be maintained for a period of three (3) years following the completion of the project and be available at reasonable times for inspection and audit.
- IX. <u>DIRECT EXPENSES</u>: Direct expenses for advertisements, supplies, materials, etc. required for the implementation of the project shall be paid by the County. If needed, the Council shall obtain prior approval from the County of any specific project needs and the related direct costs. In the event that such direct costs are needed and approved by the County, the Council shall, upon the presentation of appropriate documentation, be entitled to reimbursement for such costs.
- X. <u>STATUS OF PROJECT DOCUMENTS</u>: All project documents produced under this agreement become the property of the County upon completion. The Council is entitled to permanently retain appropriate copies of all project documents for reference purposes.

XI. <u>AMENDMENTS:</u> This document represents the agreement between the County and the Council in its entirety. This agreement may be amended only in writing and executed both parties.

Prince Edward County Planning Commission Meeting Minutes June 15, 2010 7:30 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by Chairman Porterfield.

Chairman Porterfield asked for any changes to the minutes of the April 19, 2010 meeting. Hearing none he declared them approved.

Public Hearing:

Chairman Porterfield opened the public hearing, the purpose of which is described below:

An amendment to Chapter V (pages 45-46) of the Prince Edward County Comprehensive
Plan is proposed, specifically identifying Alternative Route 628 as a transportation priority.
This proposed project would allow through-traffic on existing Route 628 (Zion Hill Road)
to bypass the public schools complex. The exact language of the proposed amendment
is attached hereto and made part of the minutes.

Jonathan Pickett stepped forward and offered a staff report. He explained that the funding sources necessary to build the road required that transportation improvements be included in the County's Comprehensive Plan or Six Year Plan. An alternative route around the public school complex was discussed when the Comprehensive Plan was last updated, but a solution was not prepared and Alternative 628 was therefore not included in the Plan.

The County, IDA, or developer of the proposed Granite Falls conference center will be applying for revenue sharing funds. However, if the Granite Falls project fell through, it is still a priority of the County Board of Supervisors to route through traffic away from the public schools complex.

The Comprehensive Plan is due for a five-year review so there will be a chance this year to make other changes to the Transportation section, but the purpose of this Public Hearing is to include Alternate Route 628 in the Comprehensive Plan as a priority for the County.

Chairman Porterfield asked if a transportation priority such as this should be included in a Capital Improvement Plan.

Mr. Pickett indicated that Sharon Carney, Prince Edward Director of Economic Development, and Bob Fowler, Prince Edward Development, LLC, were present to discuss the road in more detail and provide a project update.

Chairman Porterfield directed a question to Ms. Carney concerning cost for the road alignment project. She explained that Hurt & Proffitt engineering firm prepared the road plan. The estimated cost for the road is \$2.8 million. A revenue sharing grant in the amount of \$1.0 million has been awarded to the project, leaving a shortfall of \$1.8 million. The developer has agreed to pay 55% of the project cost. Ms. Carney's analysis estimated the County responsibility between \$200,000 and \$300,000 for the new road project. She projected that the road would be built within the next eighteen (18) months.

Commissioner Coleman raised questions targeting possible cost savings in the road design, such as the divided road with a median. Ms. Carney explained that there are wants and needs and right now the divided road was the basis for the cost estimate; if it wasn't possible, then another design could be considered. Mr. Pickett added that this design better facilitated future construction of turn lanes. Mr. Fowler explained the grass median design is the choice while he is sharing funding responsibilities. He provided an update on the conference center construction, reporting that the 176 room facility with amenities is planned to open in April 2012.

Commissioner Leatherwood wanted to clarify whether Prince Edward County was the General Contractor for the conference center construction project. Ms. Carney replied no.

Commissioner Coleman inquired about the estimated tax revenues. Ms. Carney had not estimated that because there are incentives being offered to the developer and they are updating their PKF use and sources study which analyzes the hotel viability. She reiterated that the desire for the road relocation is a priority for the County, whether or not the conference center is successful, and that to obtain the revenue sharing grant it needed to be included in the Comprehensive Plan.

Chairman Porterfield closed the Public Hearing, then directed the Commissioners' attention to the draft text of the amendment. He asked for comments. Hearing none, he called for a vote, "All those in favor of recommending approval the language as given to proposed amendment to Chapter five of CP signify by raising right hand." Unanimous favor.

RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of an amendment to Chapter V of the Comprehensive Plan to include the proposed Alternate Route 628 as a County transportation priority.

Comprehensive Plan Review:

Chairman Porterfield inquired about a schedule for the five year review of the Comprehensive Plan (CP). Mr. Pickett recommended that the Commissioners begin reviewing it now, adding that unfortunately the Census Data won't be ready until next year. He specifically suggested that they review the Goals and Objectives sections. Chairman Porterfield asked how to handle sections in the plan which anticipated a Sandy River Reservoir Overlay District. Mr. Pickett

suggested leaving the language intact. The discussion concluded with an estimated date of August for reviewing the CP.

Worsham School Rehabilitation:

Commissioner Coleman asked for an update on the Worsham School project. Mr. Pickett reported that the project was approved by the BOS; the two dissenting votes were concerned with fire-fighting issues. Porterfield asked if water negotiations were active. Mr. Pickett confirmed the negotiations were underway and explained that the sprinkler systems in the building will comply with building codes. Work should begin in late summer or early fall. Several Commissioners urged Mr. Pickett to get all of the water discussions and agreements in writing.

By-Laws:

Chairman Porterfield called for a motion to adopt the By-Laws as approved by the Board of Supervisors. The motion was approved with the unanimous vote from the Commissioners.

Information Items:

Capital Improvement Plan

Commissioner Gilfillan clarified that a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), in conjunction with the Comprehensive Plan, would enable the County to receive proffers. Chairman Porterfield requested that the staff provide a copy of another locality's CIP for reference.

Commissioner Gilfillan offered a motion that the Planning Commission request the Board of Supervisors to authorize the Planning Commission to begin work on the structure of a CIP for the County. The motion was approved with unanimous favor from the Commissioners.

RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

Request from the Planning Commission for the Board of Supervisors to authorize the Planning Commission to begin work on the structure of a Capital Improvement Plan for Prince Edward County.

Corridor Overlay District

Commissioner Coleman expressed interest in the Corridor Overlay Plan for the Route 15 section. Mr. Pickett explained the status for the four-lane project and acknowledged progress on the overlay plan. Chairman Porterfield asked whether a traffic circle would be a wise device for the Route 15 improvements.

Chairman Porterfield called for any additional business or information items. Hearing none, the meeting was adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan Chapter V PROPOSED AMENDMENT shown in bold with underlining

Primary highways in the County, <u>as well as proposed Alternate Route 628</u>, are briefly discussed below.

- U.S. 460 This is a major east-west highway that provides access to the northern part of the county. It is a major commerce route. The road is a dual highway, with bypasses around the towns of Farmville and Pamplin. The entire route has speed limits of 60 mph (65 mph on Farmville bypass) and the road is a major asset in the County's efforts to promote economic development.
- U.S. Route 15 This highway is a major two-lane north-south route, which goes across the central part of the county. The county's major anticipated growth corridor extends along Route 15 from Farmville to the Hampden-Sydney area. One of the county's long-term goals is to have this route four-laned, especially the section from Route 628 near Farmville, to Route 133 at Kingsville. This goal/request is presented to the Commonwealth Transportation Board annually.
- U. S. Route 360 This four-lane highway is located in the southeastern part of the county and serves as the main transportation route between Richmond and Danville. Commercial development along this route in Prince Edward County is limited.

Virginia Route 307 – This two-lane highway serves a short-cut between U.S. 360 in Amelia County and U.S. 460 at Rice. The road is hilly and receives a great deal of truck traffic.

Virginia Route 45 – Only a small section of this road is actually located in Prince Edward County, all within the Town of Farmville. The highway extends north from Farmville into Cumberland and Goochland counties.

Virginia Route 133 – This road is only 1.2 miles in length, and basically serves as a bypass around the Hampden-Sydney College campus.

Proposed Alternate Route 628 – This project would reduce the traffic flow through the school complex, by providing an alternate route to the south of existing route 628 (Zion Hill Road). As proposed, the new road would branch off of existing Route 628, near the Poplar Forest Apartments and go west intersecting Route 15 at the Dominion Drive traffic signal. This is a priority project for the county and state revenue sharing funds are being sought to assist in construction costs.

Major secondary roads in the county, <u>in addition to Route 628</u>, include: Routes 665, 696, 658 630, 626, and 604. Funding for secondary road improvements is allocated to Prince Edward County on the basis of a six—year funding plan prepared jointly by VDOT and the County. <u>In addition, the county on occasion seeks state revenue sharing funds for priority projects.</u>

Current FY 05-06 funding for County secondary improvements is approximately \$837, 000 with projected five year funding at 4.4 million dollars. Most projects in the six year plan are minor road enhancements. The six-year plan contains no new highway segments, or new major road improvements.

DIVISION 4(A). FOWL RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-72. Prohibited

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a fowl shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person who continues to permit fowl owned or controlled by him to run at large following notification of such violation by any animal control officer or other law enforcement officer shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.
- (b) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§3.1-796.128, 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as fully set forth in this section.

Optional language allowing for seizure of fowl from repeat offenders:

(c) Multiple violations of this section by an individual within a one year period shall result in the impoundment and confiscation of any such fowl found at large within the county in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §3.2-6544.

The County of Prince Edward would like to request assistance from Norfolk Southern with the maintenance required on the highway bridge structure located at railroad milepost 6.92 on Route 623 in Prince Edward County, Virginia (VA Structure No 6019). The bridge structure is owned and maintained by Norfolk Southern.

According to the Virginia Department of Transportation, a safety inspection was conducted on April 29, 2010, which revealed critical maintenance conditions requiring immediate attention. The attached Bridge Critical Recommendation Form was sent to Norfolk Southern on May 4, 2010 and as of June 1, 2010, VDOT has not received a response.

The effect of the maintenance deficiencies has caused the bridge to be load posted for 3 tons, down from the original 10 tons. This means that school buses and emergency vehicles are prohibited from crossing the bridge.

The Prince Edward County Public Schools will open on August 16, 2010. If the buses have to be re-routed around this bridge, this will require an eight to nine mile detour – one way – twice a day for each day that the bridge is inaccessible to school buses. This easily adds twenty to thirty minutes to the bus route every morning and every afternoon.

While the mileage of the detour for emergency vehicles is shorter, approximately four to five miles, the timing is far more critical. Houses just over the bridge are looking at an eight to ten minute delay for emergency response because the detour to reach them is on secondary roads.

We are most appreciative of any assistance you might provide with having the bridge repairs completed at the earliest possible time. Please do not hesitate to call me or Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, if we may provide additional information.

The April 29, 2010 safety inspection revealed the following critical conditions requiring your attention:

- Stringer bearing clip angles and connection rivets have severe corrosion/section loss.
- Floor beam webs behind stringers have severe section loss in area behind stringers adjacent to bearing clip angles.

Several stringers have severe decay.

Please complete the lower portion of the enclosed form indicating what action the railroad will take regarding the recommended repairs, and return a copy to this office as soon as possible. Follow-up documentation via the enclosed form as to the action taken to correct critical bridge conditions is required by VDOT policy, and must be reported to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). We will forward a copy of your form to the FHWA upon notification the recommended repairs have completed.

The recommended repairs should be completed within the next 90 days.





Here are the highlights of each presentation:

VACo/VML Presentation

Two significant water quality issues of which local officials should be aware are the Soil and
Water Conservation Board's new stormwater management regulations (still under
development) and the development by U.S. EPA of the "pollution diet" or TMDL (Total
Maximum Daily Loading) limits by <u>December 31, 2010</u> for the entire Chesapeake Bay watershed
to correct impairments caused by excess loadings of nitrogen, phosphorus and sediment.

- The following deadlines are critical: July 1, 2010 when EPA is due to issue allocations for
 nitrogen and phosphorus loading limits to Virginia; August 15 when EPA is scheduled to issue
 allocations for sediments; September 1, 2010, the deadline for Virginia to submit draft "Phase 1"
 Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP) to EPA; November 29 when final "Phase 1" WIP is to be
 submitted by VA to EPA.
- Pursuant to SB 395 (Wagner)/HB 1220 (Hugo) passed by the 2010 General Assembly, Virginia's final stormwater regulations are to be adopted by the Soil and Water Conservation Board within 280 days after establishment by EPA of the Chesapeake Bay TMDL, but no later than <u>December 1</u>, 2011.

Katherine Antos, U.S. EPA

- While progress has been made by Virginia and all other watershed states between 1985 and 2009 in the reduction of nutrient loadings to the Chesapeake Bay, these reductions have not met Tributary Strategy goals and the waters of the Chesapeake Bay have remained impaired.
- Failure of states to achieve pollutant loading targets within specified time-frames could be subject to certain "consequences" imposed by EPA (permit denial, losses in funding are a possibility).
- The final "Phase 1" WIP to be submitted by Virginia to EPA by November 29 will be essentially
 focused on state actions. The "Phase 2" implementation plan to be submitted to EPA in
 November, 2011 will be more focused on local targets and controls.

David Hirschman, Center for Watershed Protection

- The Center for Watershed Protection is an eighteen year old non-profit 501(c)3 non-advocacy organization working with local watershed groups, local, state and federal governments to help communities protect lakes, rivers, streams and estuaries.
- Menu of preferred stormwater management practices in urban or urbanizing areas are watershed forestry, rainwater harvesting, bioretention, Turf/Nutrient management, and nutrient trading.
- In protection of water quality, the preservation and planting of trees as part of a riparian vegetative buffer system is one of the most effective way to protect water quality.

Jack Frye, Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) - Non Point Source Responsibilities

- In re-working the proposed VSMP (VA Stormwater Management Permit) program regulations
 for adoption no later than 12/1/11, DCR "may be required to adjust the regulations and run-off
 reduction spreadsheet to address TMDL requirements including Nitrogen and Sediment
 reduction requirements.
- In reworking the proposed VSMP regulations a new Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) will be convened this summer.
- All sectors (local governments, waste water, land developers, agriculture) are very concerned about how TMDL/re-vamped VSMP regulations will have on their future activities and how the costs will be paid.
- The eight elements that are likely to be in the Phase 1 WIP: Interim and Final Nutrient and Sediment target loads; Current Loading Baseline and Program Capacity; Assumptions about Growth; "Gap Analysis;" Commitment and strategy to fill gaps; Tracking and Reporting protocols; contingencies for slow or incomplete implementation; and appendix with detailed targets and schedule.
- The 36 member Stakeholder Advisory Group (SAG of which VACo and VML are members) will be working this summer with the Secretary of Natural Resources to help develop the Phase 1 WIP.

Allan Pollock, Department of Environmental Quality - Point Source Responsibilities

- EPA expects states to develop plans that provide a roadmap on how the Chesapeake Bay TMDL will be achieved.
- For wastewater plants (point sources) EPA expects states to identify gaps between current capacity and capacity necessary to fully attain the interim and final target loads.
- The following are possible federal consequences if there is a failure by Virginia to meet pollutant loading limits under TMDL: expand NPDES (national pollutant discharge elimination system) coverage to currently unregulated sources; object to NPDES discharge permits and increase federal program oversight; establish more stringent waste load allocations (wla) for non point sources and load allocations (l.a.) for point sources; require additional loading reductions from point sources; redirect EPA grants; federal promulgation of nutrient water quality standards.

Chris Pomeroy, VA Association of Municipal Wastewater/Stormwater Agencies

- For both point source and non point sources, estimated implementation costs for Virginia for Bay-wide TMDL is \$10 billion, which – divided by 15 years = \$667 million/year.
- The Bay-wide TMDL represents the first-ever attempt to issue hard regulatory deadlines for implementation by states and sources to meeting pollutant reduction goals according to the following schedule: 60% by 2017; 100% by 2025 while meeting 2 year milestones.
- The program carries major implications for economic development in Virginia.

Key Questions and Concerns generated through the meeting

- How will local governments be brought in, perhaps on a regional basis, in the development of Watershed Implementation Plans?
- When evaluating state and local government performance in improving water quality, will EPA
 take into consideration naturally caused events (major storms) that are likely to overwhelm local
 control structures (BMPs) built to reduce pollutant loadings?
- Where will the money be found to pay for requirements that will be imposed upon local governments?
- Will currently unregulated entities be regulated sometime in the future because of TMDL related requirements?
- When considering the 2-Year milestones what happens if despite good faith efforts, made evident by practices on the ground, water quality standards are not being met? Will EPA still invoke certain consequences?
- As the basis for determining limits on pollutant loadings from all source sectors, it is imperative that EPA's 5.3 watershed model be accurate.
- According to Chris Pomeroy, a list of what localities should do during 2010:
 - > Begin now urging Federal and State governments to provide:
 - ❖ A stable regulatory environment
 - Maintain VA's basin-wide allocations for all basins.

- > For wastewater systems
 - Support VA's proposal to maintain current wastewater caps.
- For Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4s)
 - ❖ Watch out for any "retrofit" requirements for existing development (beyond improvements from normal redevelopment.
 - Anticipate funding needs.
- Local governments should comment on Virginia's DRAFT WIP due for submission to EPA by 9/1/10, followed by a public comment period.
