Chairman Fore called the July meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

#### In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

**Doralease Jackson**, Farmville District, expressed her concern regarding the closing of the existing Route 628 after the Alternate 628 is built. She said it had been inconvenient when the road had been closed for bridge repairs, and asked the Board to reconsider and leave the road as it is.

**Brenda Clark**, Lockett District, requested the Board move forward with enacting an ordinance regarding fowl running at large.

Wilkie Chaffin, Buffalo District, requested a sign be placed in the Five Forks community; he said signs had been posted before but they were stolen.

**Kenneth Jackson**, Lockett District, presented a Certificate of Appreciation from the Mary E. Branch Community Center to the Board of Supervisors in appreciation of financial and civic support. He said the Center should be licensed next week, and 120 children are enrolled.

### In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Wiley commended the progress made at the Mary E. Branch Community Center; she said the inspectors did find a few stipulations that needed to be corrected, but that the workers will put items in their proper place and it is expected that the Center will get its license.

Supervisor Simpson asked the Chair to appoint a committee to gather information on the entire student committee involved in the walk-out in 1951, along with Barbara Johns. He said a resolution should be prepared for each of the 17 students.

Chairman Fore asked that the same committee that worked on the Light of Reconciliation (Vice Chairman Howard Simpson, Supervisor Mattie Wiley, Sarah Puckett, and Magi Van Eps) be appointed to study this issue; the Board concurred.

Supervisor Wilck said Supervisor Gantt was absent from the meeting due to his father-in-law having open heart surgery in Pennsylvania.

#### In Re: Highway Matters

Kevin Wright, Interim Residency Administrator, VDOT, said maintenance and patching in various areas is the main focus of the VDOT staff. He said mowing is complete along primary and secondary roads, and gravel roads will be mowed and cut-back in the fall. He said the Route 628 project is on schedule; he said he will place an order for the Five Forks community sign as requested by Mr. Chaffin.

Supervisor Jones asked how long will work be done on the bridge on Route 460 into Farmville; Mr. Wright said the work will be completed in one day.

Supervisor McKay said a complaint was made about tree limbs hanging over the road on Route 671 close to a curve in the road; he asked VDOT to check and possibly remove the limbs.

## In Re: Public Hearing: Amendment to County Comprehensive Plan

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Amendment to the County Comprehensive Plan. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the June 25, 2010 and July 2, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said Prince Edward County is seeking to have an Alternate Route 628 constructed to the south of the public school complex which would benefit the county by reducing the amount of traffic going through the school complex, as well as serving the Granite Falls project and other economic development projects along the new corridor. He said the County Comprehensive Plan does not currently mention Alternate Route 628 as a specific transportation priority. In order to enhance the County's ability to secure additional grant funding for the project, this priority should be included in the Comprehensive Plan.

Mr. Pickett said that at its June 15, 2010 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing and received no comments on this proposed amendment. Following the public hearing, the commission voted unanimously to recommend approval to the Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Pickett added that if Alt. Route 628 is built, it does not mean the existing Route 628 will be closed. He said he personally would not recommend its closing as emergency access is necessary.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

# PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN CHAPTER V AMENDMENT

Primary highways in the County, <u>as well as proposed Alternate Route 628</u>, are briefly discussed below.

U.S. 460 – This is a major east-west highway that provides access to the northern part of the county. It is a major commercial route. The road is a dual highway, with bypasses around the towns of Farmville and Pamplin. The entire route has speed limits of 60 mph (65 mph on Farmville bypass) and the road is a major asset in the County's efforts to promote economic development.

U.S. Route 15 – This highway is a major two-lane north-south route, which goes across the central part of the county. The county's major anticipated growth corridor extends along Route 15 from Farmville to the Hampden-Sydney area. One of the county's long-term goals is to have this route four-laned, especially the section from Route 628 near Farmville, to Route 133 at Kingsville. This goal/request is presented to the Commonwealth Transportation Board annually.

U.S. Route 360 – This four-lane highway is located in the southeastern part of the county and serves as the main transportation route between Richmond and Danville. Commercial development along this route in Prince Edward County is limited.

Virginia Route 307 – This two-lane highway serves a short-cut between U.S. 360 in Amelia County and U.S. 460 at Rice. The road is hilly and receives a great deal of truck traffic.

Virginia Route 45 – Only a small section of this road is actually located in Prince Edward County, all within the Town of Farmville. The highway extends north from Farmville into Cumberland and Goochland Counties.

Virginia Route 133 – This road is only 1.2 miles in length, and basically serves as a bypass around the Hampden-Sydney College campus.

Proposed Alternate Route 628 – This project would reduce the traffic flow through the school complex, by providing an alternate route to the south of existing Route 628 (Zion Hill Road). As proposed, the new road would branch off of existing Route 628, near the Poplar Forest Apartments and go west intersecting Route 15 at the Dominion Drive traffic signal. This is a priority project for the county and state revenue sharing funds are being sought to assist in construction costs.

<u>Major secondary roads in the county, in addition to Route 628,</u> include: Routes 665, 696, 658, 630, 626, and 604. Funding for secondary road improvements is allocated to Prince Edward County on the basis of a six-year funding plan prepared jointly by VDOT and the County. <u>In addition, the county on occasion seeks state revenue sharing funds for priority projects.</u>

Current FY 05-06 funding for County secondary improvements is approximately \$837,000 with projected five year funding at 4.4 million dollars. Most projects in the six-year plan are minor road enhancements. The six-year plan contains no new highway segments, or new major road improvements.

# In Re: VRS TRANSITIONAL BENEFITS PROGRAM

Mr. Bartlett said the 2010 General Assembly established a VRS benefit program that allows school divisions and local governments to offer a severance benefit or an enhanced retirement benefit to employees who are involuntarily separated from employment. The program is effective through June 30, 2012. The General Assembly may or may not continue this program past that date. He said if the program is authorized and used, it would increase the cost of the program and will be factored into the VRS retirement contribution rates.

Mr. Bartlett said there are short-term and long-term costs associated with this Program; there are severance costs that must be paid at the time of separation plus the County would have to pay both Health and Life Insurance for 12 months. He said there is also an enhanced retirement option that will increase the long-term retirement costs of the County.

Mr. Bartlett explained an involuntary separation is a layoff because of a budget reduction, agency reorganization, workforce downsizing or another cause not related to job performance or misconduct. He said employees of the Constitutional Officers are covered but the Officers are not eligible. Mr. Bartlett said the decision could be made as long as the election to enroll in the program is made before the involuntary separation. He added no other locality has yet signed up for the program.

### In Re: Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP)

Mr. Bartlett said the Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP) was established by Congress as part of the Health Care Reform Law. The program has a funding limit of \$5 billion, begins on June 1, 2010 and expires on January 1, 2014 or when funds are exhausted. The program reimburses employers for a portion of the costs of providing health insurance to early retirees age 55 and older who are not eligible for Medicare, and their eligible spouses, surviving spouses, and dependents. The program reimburses 80% of the aggregate claims incurred by each early retiree during the plan year that are actually paid by the plan, the insurer, or early retiree, that exceed a \$15,000 threshold and that are less than \$90,000. He said the reimbursement funds must be spent on other programs to help reduce the cost, and the County must agree to not decrease the amount of coverage for any future retirees. To qualify for the program, a retiree would have to work for Prince Edward County for 30 years and obtain the age of 60 before Prince Edward County would pay the premiums for insurance.

Mr. Bartlett said the County only has one current retiree eligible and two current employees that could retire and become eligible during the four-year period of the program. He said if the program is passed changes could no longer be made to the benefits provided; Mr. Bartlett recommended the Board not authorize the program.

#### In Re: Grant Management Services for EECBG Project

### In Re: Planning Department Report

Mr. Pickett said a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), in conjunction with the Comprehensive Plan, would allow the County to receive proffers. He said the Planning Commission met on June 15, 2010 and requested the Board of Supervisors to authorize the Planning Commission to begin work on the structure of a Capital Improvement Plan for Prince Edward County.

Mr. Pickett then said there is a grant program from the U. S. Department of Transportation called the Tiger II Discretionary Grant Program, which is funding for federally funded highways. He said the application process is easy and there is \$600 million nationwide, with \$140 million to rural areas, but the project must be at least \$10 million. He requested Board authorization to put in two pre-applications for the grant. He recommended the project applications would be submitted for Route 15 South to Kingsville which would include VDOT matching funds, and Route 658, Five Forks Road, which needs resurfacing. Mr. Pickett said if chosen for possible consideration, he would be notified and he would then make full application. He said the pre-applications are due Friday, July 16, 2010; he added no county funds would be expended.

DIVISION 4(A). FOWL RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-72. Prohibited

- a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a fowl shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodian's immediate control. Any person who continues to permit fowl owned or controlled by him to run at large following notification of such violation by any animal control officer or other law enforcement officer shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.
- b) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, §§3.1-796.128, 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as fully set forth in this section.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said Governor Bob McDonnell's Commission on Government Reform and Restructuring will hold town hall forums; he said the meeting for Southside Virginia will be in South Hill on July 16<sup>th</sup>. He asked the Board to forward any issues to be presented at the town hall meeting in South Hill.

Mr. Bartlett said the Town of Crewe sent a letter of interest in the Sandy River Reservoir Water Treatment and Distribution Project, dated July 6, 2010, expressing their interest in joining the project. He said that in July 2005, the Town of Burkeville had submitted a letter of support for Prince Edward County's water intake permit application and expressed interest in continuing discussions with Prince Edward County. He said a request for an updated letter of interest was made to the Town of Burkeville; their meeting coincides with the Board of Supervisors meeting.

Mr. Bartlett then said the Recovery Zone Facility Bond Allocation for the Granite Falls Inn and Conference Center Project has been awarded to Prince Edward County in the amount of \$16,750,000. He said the funds will be used by Prince Edward Development, LLC for the hotel portion of the Granite Falls Inn and Conference Center. He said a letter was submitted to the Governor from the Bank of Prager Sealy and Company that the project has been reviewed and they can do a private placement of the bonds. Mr. Bartlett stressed that it is not a debt of the County. He said it is a major step forward and covers more than one half of the hotel portion of the project. He then said Farmers Bank approved a \$1.5 million loan to be used for site development for the hotel portion of the project, and is a government guaranteed loan.

Mr. Bartlett then reported the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission Special Projects Fund posted the Staff Recommendations; the County requested \$2.5 million for the Workforce Training Center; their recommendation was to table the award. He said plans were made to travel to Wytheville on Thursday, July 15, to present the case for the project to qualify for the funds.

Mr. Bartlett said a part-time cannery assistant position will be advertised; the position is budgeted as approved.

Mr. Bartlett then said the HVAC system installation will begin at the SCOPE building on Wednesday [July 14, 2010] and should be complete by the following Wednesday.

Mr. Bartlett said the Central Virginia Arts Association has requested to place art in offices, the atrium and hallways of the Courthouse. He recommended putting a plan in place regarding concerns about building maintenance and security issues.

Supervisor Wiley said strict guidelines must be in place as to the type of art that may be placed in the courthouse. Supervisor Campbell expressed concern about the liability issues if the artwork is destroyed. Supervisor McKay said the County must have full control and needs a foolproof plan in place.

Mr. Bartlett said staff can work on a policy to be presented to the Board. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett then reported an email was received from Mr. John Prengaman regarding the eGolf Professional Tour, hosted by The Manor Golf Club in September 2010. He said 156 golfers are anticipated to participate; the tournament spans four days, September 8 through September 11, during which time the participants will seek accommodations at hotels and dining at local restaurants.

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said that she spoke with Mr. Jimmy Gantt, USDA Farm Service Agency, regarding the current drought conditions in the County. ### A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

#### ~ 2010 DROUGHT DISASTER ~

**WHEREAS**, an analysis of crop and livestock conditions in the County of Prince Edward has determined that insufficient rainfalls, coupled with the sustained high temperatures during the month of June and early, have caused significant losses to many crops; and

WHEREAS, there are substantial economic losses to hay pasture, corn, soybean and tobacco crops that will escalate if adverse growing conditions persist; and

**WHEREAS**, it is incumbent upon the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia to request that the Governor of Virginia declare the County of Prince Edward a drought disaster area;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward does hereby direct the County Administrator to file with the Governor of Virginia a request that the County of Prince Edward be designated a drought disaster area.

# In Re: Emergency Ordinance Banning Outdoor Burning

Mrs. Puckett said recent weather conditions have resulted in dangerous fire conditions in Prince Edward County.

Henry Womack, Virginia Department of Forestry, said the combination of the drought and the temperatures has local firefighters concerned; he reported there had been a fire on July 4 that destroyed seven acres of fields and woods and threatened three homes; the heat index that day was 112 degrees, which further endangered firefighters. He requested the Board adopt an emergency ordinance banning outdoor burning until the Board sees fit to allow burning, with the exception of whoever applies for a permit.

Mrs. Puckett asked the Board to also consider an amendment to the emergency ordinance presented in the Board pack to authorize the County Administrator, the County Attorney, in consultation with the Virginia Department of Forestry to establish a permit process. Mr. Womack said a permit process would specify what can be burned, where it may be burned, and at what time of day. He said contractors would remain liable if the fire escapes, which should have 50' of bare dirt surrounding a burn pit deep enough to hold all burning debris; the contractor must remain with the burn at all times.

Mrs. Puckett said there are a number of counties that have this process in place. She proposed, if adopted, the ordinance and Declaration of Local Emergency will be published in Friday, July 16<sup>th</sup> issue of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, and once the following week; WFLO would also be notified and it would be placed on the County's web site. Notification would also go to all fire departments, the E-911 center, the Sheriff's department and the Department of Forestry. Mrs. Puckett recommended that, as part of the permit process, any time the County issues a permit while the ban is in place, a copy would be faxed to the Virginia Department of Forestry, to the appropriate fire department, to the E-911 Center, and the Sheriff's department. Chairman Fore said a letter should also be sent to all contractors and excavators.

Supervisor Wiley asked if private homeowners or farmers could still burn; Mrs. Puckett said the permit would be for construction only. All others should and would be expected to wait until the ban is lifted. Mr. Womack said signs could be put up; he has worked with VDOT in the past to put up flashing signs.

# ~ DECLARATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY ~

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward does hereby find that:

- 1. The lack of rainfall, low humidity and potential for winds has caused the County of Prince Edward to face a dangerous fire condition; and
- 2. Due to the lack of moisture, a state of extreme peril for life and property necessitates the proclamation of the existence of an emergency; and
- 3. The Board of Supervisors has the duty to declare a local emergency to protect the citizens and their property located in the County of Prince Edward

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward does hereby declare that an emergency now exists throughout the County; and that open air fires, to include camp fires, are prohibited; and

**IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED**, that during the existence of said emergency, the powers, functions and duties of the Director of Emergency Services of the County of Prince Edward shall be those prescribed by state law and the ordinances, resolutions and approved plans of the County of Prince Edward in order to mitigate the effects of said emergency.

### EMERGENCY ORDINANCE BANNING OUTDOOR BURNING IN THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

# COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. -- CHAPTER 83, ARTICLE 1

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward does hereby find that:

- 1. The lack of rainfall, low humidity and potential for wind is causing the County of Prince Edward to face dangerous fire conditions; and
- 2. Due to the lack of moisture, a state of extreme peril for life and property necessitates the proclamation of the existence of an emergency; and
- 3. There is no appreciable amount of rain forecast for the County of Prince Edward; and
- 4. On July 13, 2010, the Board of Supervisors declared a local fire emergency to protect the citizens and their property located in the County of Prince Edward; and
- 5. The County Director of Emergency Services has requested the ban on outdoor burning on both public and private property, which the Virginia Department of Forestry has supported;

**WHEREAS**, §15.2-1427 of the *Code of Virginia* enables the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward to enact emergency ordinances without the normal public notice; and

**WHEREAS**, §15.2-922.1 of the *Code of Virginia* permits the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward to enact an ordinance that regulates the making of fires in street, alleys, and other public places and, when a declared emergency exists, pursuant to §44-146.21, regulate the making of fires on private property;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia does hereby declare that the lack of precipitation coupled with dry vegetation, warm temperatures and windy conditions has created a high risk of forest and field fires, which endanger persons and property, and hereby declares a fire emergency and ORDAINS as follows:

- 1. Effective Wednesday, July 14, 2010 at 12:01 a.m., all outdoor burning and all outdoor fires on both public and private property, including camp fires, are prohibited, except within a grill or stove designed and used for food preparation which contain fuel and fire within a metal or masonry container and except those open air fires authorized and issued a permit by the County of Prince Edward;
- 2. Any violation of this ordinance is a Class 1 misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,500;
- 3. This ordinance shall expire sixty (60) days from the date of enactment, unless sooner declared void by the County Administrator upon his determination that a fire emergency no longer exists, or unless lawfully extended by action of the Board of Supervisors; and
- 4. This ordinance shall be published in *The Farmville Herald* for the next two consecutive weeks following enactment.

# In Re: Granite Falls - DHCD Planning Grant

Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development, said the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD) offers a number of grant opportunities to help develop community economic development facilities, such as the proposed Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center. She said representatives from VDHCD suggested Prince Edward County re-apply for a \$25,000 Planning Grant to assist with the expenses associated with making a future CDBG Construction grant application due in late March 2011. The Planning Grant Program has an open submittal with no matching funds required; the future CDBG Construction grant will have a maximum of \$700,000, also with no match percentage requirement.

Mrs. Carney said that in November 2009, the IDA voted to request the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors to apply for a \$25,000 VDHCD Planning Grant to be used in the preparation of a future CDBG Construction grant for the Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center. The original Planning Grant was declined because the planning for the Hospitality Workforce Training Center was not far enough along. After recent meetings with VDHCD staff, they now recommend that the County move forward with a Planning Grant, as substantial progress has been made on the Granite Falls project.

Mrs. Carney said the planning grant can be used to assist with the costs of the development of a usage agreement between the higher education institutions, the development of a demand survey to quantify student enrollment, the development of the program curriculum, and development of other quantifiable data to support the needs assessment. Supervisor McKay made a motion to authorize the application of a \$25,000 VDHCD Planning Grant for the preparation of a future CDBG Construction Grant, and to authorize the Chairman of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors or the County Administrator to sign a letter making the grant request; the motion carried:



### DRAFT AMENDMENT TO THE COUNTY CODE, TO BE INCLUDED IN THE SECTION WHICH CONTROLS LIVESTOCK:

## DIVISION 4(A). FOWL RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-72. Prohibited

- a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a fowl shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodian's immediate control. Any person who continues to permit fowl owned or controlled by him to run at large following notification of such violation by any animal control officer or other law enforcement officer shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.
- b) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, §§3.1-796.128, 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as fully set forth in this section.

(Procedure for seizure and impoundment of abandoned agricultural animals is laid out in the *Code* of *Virginia*, §3.2-6569.)

Recovery Zone Bonds IDA Request

**Summary:** On Monday, August 2, 2010, the IDA held a Public Hearing and then voted unanimously to recommend the issuance of a maximum of \$16,750,000 in Recovery Zone Bonds to Granite Falls Hospitality, LLC to assist with the financing to construct and equip a hotel to be located in the County of Prince Edward, Virginia. There was no public in attendance at the Public Hearing and therefore no public comments.

The American Recovery and Re-investment Act (ARRA) of 2010 authorized state and local governments to issue these bonds, to promote job creation and economic recovery in areas affected by employment declines. Each state was allocated a specific dollar amount of Bonds it could allow to be issued. Prince Edward applied to the Governor's office for an allocation of said Bonds for the Granite Falls Inn and Conference Center Project on June 18, 2010. The Governor approved the request on July 8, 2010.

The issuance of the \$16,750,000 is **not a debt of the county** and will be repaid from revenues generated from the operation of the hotel. The debt will be secured with a first deed of trust on the hotel property. The County and the IDA simply function as a financing conduit for the Recovery Zone Tax Exempt Bonds. This practice has been done a number of times in the past for projects like the Southside Community Hospital for a new addition, Trinity Mission of Farmville for a nursing home, and Hampden-Sydney College for their new library.

The County's Bond Attorney has reviewed and approved all attached documents and verifies the Bonds will not be debt of the County.



WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Authority"), is empowered by the Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act, Chapter 49, Title 15.2, Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended ("Act"), to issue its revenue bonds for the purpose of inducing the location of industrial and commercial facilities in Virginia and to promote the commerce, safety, health, welfare, convenience or prosperity of citizens of Virginia;

WHEREAS, the Authority has received a request from Granite Falls Hospitality, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (the "Borrower"), requesting that the Authority issue its recovery zone facility revenue bonds to assist in financing the construction and equipping of a hotel ("Project") to be located in the County of Prince Edward, Virginia (the "County");

WHEREAS, such assistance will induce the Borrower to locate the Project in Virginia and benefit the inhabitants of the County and the Commonwealth of Virginia, either through the increase of their commerce or through the promotion of their safety, health, welfare, convenience or prosperity;

WHEREAS, preliminary plans for the Project have been described to the Authority and a public hearing has been held as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, ("Code") and Section 15.2-4906 of the Act;

WHEREAS, the Borrower has represented that the estimated cost of the construction and equipping of the Project and all expenses of issue will require, in addition to other available funds, an issue of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$16,750,000 (the "Bonds");

WHEREAS, (a) no member of the Board of Directors of the Authority is an officer or employee of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, (b) each member has, before entering upon his duties during his or her present term of office, taken and subscribed to the oath prescribed by Section 49-1 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended and (c) at the time of their appointments and at all times thereafter, including the date hereof, all of the members of the Board of Directors of the Authority have satisfied the residency requirements of the Act; and

WHEREAS, no member of the Board of Directors of the Authority has any personal interest or business interest in the Borrower, the Bonds, or any of the transactions contemplated therein or has otherwise engaged in conduct prohibited under the Conflict of Interests Act, Chapter 31, Title 2.2 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Conflict of Interests Act") in connection with this resolution or any other official action of the Authority in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates that the Board of Supervisors of the County will designate the County as a recovery zone for the purpose of issuing recovery zone bonds pursuant to Sections 1400U-1 thorough 1400U-3 of the Code and will reallocate to the Authority any allocation of recovery zone facility bonds allocated to the County.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. It is hereby found and determined that the construction and equipping of the Project will be in the public interest and will promote the commerce, safety, health, welfare, convenience or prosperity of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the County and their citizens.

2. To induce the Borrower to locate the Project in the Commonwealth of Virginia, and particularly in the County, the Authority hereby agrees to assist the Borrower in financing the construction and equipping of the Project by undertaking the issuance of the Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$16,750,000 upon terms and conditions mutually agreeable to the Authority and the Borrower. The Bonds will be issued pursuant to documents satisfactory to the Authority. The Bonds may be issued in one or more series at one time or from time to time.

3. It having been represented to the Authority that it is necessary to proceed immediately with the construction and equipping of the Project, and the planning therefor, the Authority agrees that the Borrower may proceed with plans for the Project, enter into contracts for construction, materials and equipment for the Project, and take such other steps as it may deem appropriate in connection with the Project, provided, however, that nothing in this resolution shall be deemed to authorize the Borrower to obligate the Authority without its consent in each instance to the payment of any moneys or the performance of any acts in connection with the Project. The Authority agrees that the Borrower may be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Bonds for all expenditures and costs so incurred by it, provided such expenditures and costs are properly reimbursable under the Act and applicable federal laws.

4. The Authority approves McGuireWoods LLP, Richmond, Virginia, as Bond Counsel in connection with the issuance of the bonds.

5. All costs and expenses in connection with the financing and the construction and equipping of the Project, including the fees and expenses of Bond Counsel and Authority Counsel, shall be paid by the Borrower or, to the extent permitted by applicable law, from the proceeds of the Bonds. If for any reason the Bonds are not issued, it is understood that all such expenses shall be paid by the Borrower and that the Authority shall have no responsibility therefor.

6. In adopting this resolution the Authority intends to take "official action" toward the issuance of the Bonds and to evidence its "official intent" to reimburse from the proceeds of the Bonds any expenditures paid by the Borrower to finance the construction and equipping of the Project and the planning therefor before the issuance of the Bonds, all within the meaning of regulations issued by the Internal Revenue Service pursuant to Sections 103 and 141 through 150 and related sections of the Code.

7. The Authority recommends that the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia approve the issuance of the Bonds.

8. The Authority designates the Bonds as Recovery Zone Facility Bonds for purposes of Section 1400U-3 of the Code.

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9. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

### RESOLUTION DESIGNATING THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA AS A RECOVERY ZONE FOR PURPOSES OF RECOVERY ZONE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT BONDS AND RECOVERY ZONE FACILITY BONDS AND REALLOCATING VOLUME CAP ALLOCATION FOR <u>RECOVERY ZONE FACILITY BONDS</u>

WHEREAS, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-5), in part, added Sections 1400U-1 through 1400U-3 to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), that authorize state and local governments to issue two new categories of bonds (together, "Recovery Zone Bonds") entitled (i) "recovery zone economic development bonds" and (ii) "recovery zone facility bonds," the purposes of which are to lower costs of state and local government borrowing and thereby to promote job creation and economic recovery in areas particularly affected by employment declines;

WHEREAS, the Code imposes bond volume limitations for recovery zone economic development bonds and recovery zone facility bonds and the County of Prince Edward, Virginia (the "County") has been allocated an allocation of \$16,750,000 in recovery zone facility bonds (the "RZF Bond Allocation");

WHEREAS, recovery zone economic development bonds may be used to finance certain "qualified economic development purposes" and recovery zone facility bonds may be used to finance certain "recovery zone property," both generally for use within or attributable to areas designated as "recovery zones;"

WHEREAS, the Code defines the term "recovery zone" as, among other things, "any area designated by the issuer as having significant poverty, unemployment, rate of home foreclosures or general distress;"

WHEREAS, the entire geographic area of the County is experiencing general distress resulting from, in part, an overall unemployment rate, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, of 10.6% as of March 2010 (an increase of 1.5% over the unemployment rate in March 2009) and a low per capita income;

WHEREAS, the County has determined that as a result of such general distress, the entire geographic area of the County qualifies to be designated as a recovery zone for purposes of issuing Recovery Zone Bonds;

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors desires to facilitate the issuance of Recovery Zone Bonds by the County or the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Authority") or any other entity permitted to undertake the issuance of bonds for projects located in or attributable to the County;

WHEREAS, the Authority has considered the request of Granite Falls Hospitality, LLC (the "Borrower") requesting the issuance of the Authority's recovery zone facility revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$16,750,000 ("Bonds") to assist in financing the Borrower's construction and equipping of a hotel consisting of approximately 110,000 square feet ("Project") to be located near the intersection of U.S. Rt. 15 and Dominion Drive approximately

 $\frac{1}{2}$  miles south of the intersection of U.S. Rt. 15 and Route 460, in the County and has held a public hearing on August 2, 2010.

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Code provides that the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the issuer of private activity bonds and over the area in which any facility financed with the proceeds of private activity bonds is located must approve the issuance of the bonds;

WHEREAS, the Authority issues its bonds on behalf of the County; the Project is to be located in the County and the Board of Supervisors of the County (the "Board") constitutes the highest elected governmental unit of the County;

WHEREAS, the Authority has recommended that the Board approve the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the Authority's resolution approving the issuance of the Bonds, subject to the terms to be agreed upon, a certificate of the public hearing and a Fiscal Impact Statement have been filed with the Board.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA:

1. <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. Each of the recitals set forth above is incorporated and restated as if set forth herein.

2. <u>Designation of Recovery Zone</u>. The entire geographic area of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia is hereby designated a "recovery zone" for purposes of issuing Recovery Zone Bonds under the provisions of Code Sections 1400U-1 through 1400U-3.

3. <u>Reallocation of RZED Bond Allocation</u>. In accordance with U.S. Department of Treasury Notice 2010-50 the County hereby allocates its RZF Bond Allocation to the Authority for the purpose of assisting in financing the Project.

4. <u>Approval by Board</u>. The Board approves the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority for the benefit of the Borrower, as required by Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended ("Virginia Code") to permit the Authority to assist in the financing of the Project. The approval of the issuance of the Bonds does not constitute an endorsement to a prospective purchaser of the Bonds of the creditworthiness of the Project or the Borrower.

5. <u>Designation of Bonds</u>. The Board designates the Bonds as recovery zone facility bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Code. The Project is located in the County, will provide additional employment opportunities and economic benefit for the County and its residents and is attributable to both the County and the Authority.

6. <u>Nature of Obligations</u>. Nothing in this Resolution or the Bonds shall constitute a debt of the County. Nothing in this Resolution or the Bonds shall constitute a pledge of the full faith and credit of the County.

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7. <u>Further Actions</u>. The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and the County Administrator, and such officers or agents of the County as any of them may designate, or any of them, are authorized to execute and deliver on behalf of the County such instruments, documents or certificates, and to do and perform such things and acts, as they shall deem necessary or appropriate to carry out the transactions authorized by this Resolution; and all of the foregoing, previously done or performed by such officers or agents of the County, are in all respects approved, ratified and confirmed.

8. <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

**Summary:** In 2000, Prince Edward County was awarded a joint Enterprise Zone with Charlotte and Lunenburg Counties, which is administered by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD). The Enterprise Zone offers certain state incentives to businesses and industries for real property improvements and job creation. The Enterprise Zone designation allows for a maximum of 3,840 acres within the Enterprise Zone Boundary. Since the Zone was awarded, the Zone boundaries have been expanded in 2001 and 2005 to encompass properties within economic growth patterns of the County. Currently, the Enterprise Zone encompasses 1,605 acres, leaving 1,755 acres for future expansion.

VDHCD recommends that each zone be reviewed every five years or so to make boundary and incentive adjustments, if warranted, to reflect economic growth patterns of the area. The Enterprise Zone Committee appointed by the Board of Supervisors in the fall of 2009, along with an Enterprise Zone Committee appointed by the Town of Farmville, would like to recommend some deletions and additions of properties to the zone (see address list attached), which is made up primarily of areas located within the Rice area around the intersection of US 460 and Route 307. An expansion of 428+/- acres is recommended, leaving 1,327 acres for expansion should future growth areas emerge.

The addition or deletion of a property to the Enterprise Zone has no impact on a property's taxes, but may make a property more desirable for a potential business or industry for development. No changes to local development incentives are recommended at this time (see attached brochure). If approved by the VDHCD, the Zone expansion area will be retroactive to January 1, 2010, so improvements or development which incurred in 2010 in these proposed new areas will be eligible for incentives.

In order to complete the amendment application by year-end, , I would request the Board consider authorizing a Public Hearing on the Enterprise Zone amendments for the September 14, 2010 meeting. As part of the Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Amendment, a Resolution of Support is also required from our Zone partners, Charlotte and Lunenburg Counties. I anticipate that the application for the amendment would be filed with VDHCD in November 2010. Additionally, a notification letter of the proposed Enterprise Zone amendment will also be mailed to each property owner that may be affected so they will all receive ample notice.

# ENTERPRISE ZONE

### Program Description Prince Edward County's Enterprise Zone Program is a Commonwealth of Virginia, economic development program managed by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). The State's Enterprise Zone Program is designated to offer state and local incentive

managed by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). The State's Enterprise Zone Program is designated to offer state and local incentives for businesses to locate or expand within the designated zone areas. Prince Edward County has one enterprise zone designation that includes portions of the Town of Farmville and consists of 2,085 acres as shown on the enclosed map.

### ∕⇒State Incentives

Real Property Investment Grants Real Property Investment Grants are available for

Keal Froperty Investment Crants are avalable for investment made to industrial, commercial, or mixed-use property in an enterprise zone. A mixed-use property is a building incorporating residential uses in which a minimum of 30 percent of the useable floor space will be devoted to commercial, office or industrial use.

L Real Property Investment Grants require investors Fubmitting applications for rehabilitation or expansion projects to meet a \$100,000 investment threshold while a \$500,000 investment threshold will be applied to new construction projects. Grants are available to qualified Zone investors in amounts up to 20% of the total amount of investments made exceeding the applicable thresholds. Grant caps for projects in which total investments are less than \$5million is equal to \$100,000. A \$200,000 grant cap will be applied to projects in which total investments are less than \$5million. Real Property Investment Grants are applicable per building or facility within a five-year period.

## Wage-Based Job Creation Grants

Wage-based creation grants are offered for new permanent fulltime positions created by business start-ups and expansions by existing firms. Wage-based job grants are available for all qualified business firms that are not local service, food/beverage or retail establishments. Wage-based job creation grants are available in amounts up to \$500 per grant eligible position filled by an employee earning 175 percent of the federal minimum wage and up to \$800 per grant eligible position filled by an employee earning 200 percent of the federal minimum wage. To qualify, these positions must also be offered health benefits. Business firms are eligible to receive job grants for five consecutive calendar years from the first year of grant by ..., ...

To qualify for wage-based job creation grants, business firms must increase their enterprise zone permanent full-time positions by four permanent full-time threshold jobs over a base calendar year.

### **General Provisions**

- Job grant applications must be submitted to DHCD by close of business on April 1 for the preceding calendar year. DHCD will notify them of the fiscal grant by June 30.
  - Should requests for tax credits exceed the state's annual available amount, each qualified business will receive a prorated portion.







This table illustrates the projected demands that were used in the development of the computer hydraulic water model. This water model was used to determine the design size of pipelines in the proposed distribution system. When projecting flows for pipeline design, it is important to be conservative by <u>overestimating</u> the demands so that the pipeline has adequate capacity for growth over the very long useful life of the pipe.

When projecting demands for the proposed treatment plant, we do not overestimate to the same degree because the useful life of a treatment plant is much shorter than a pipeline.

When projecting demands for the purpose of predicting revenue, it is important to be conservative by <u>underestimating</u> the demands so that the waterworks can be assured adequate operating revenue.





### **Executive Summary**

Prince Edward County, Virginia has recently established a Water Authority with intentions to supply clean drinking water for the region by constructing a water treatment facility to treat the water in the Sandy River Reservoir and constructing the infrastructure for the distribution system. The purpose of this report is to evaluate options for source water, treatment, and distribution.

This report will consider options to provide service to areas within Prince Edward County including Hampden-Sydney College and Rt. 15, The Manor golf course, and emergency connections to the Town of Farmville. An option to run waterline to Nottoway County and the Towns of Crewe and Burkeville is also being considered.

Prince Edward County currently only has as small water distribution system that is an extension from the Town of Farmville. The Appomattox River supplies all of the water for the Town of Farmville water treatment plant. In August of 2002, the drought of record, the river level was so low that water restrictions were put into place. During this time, a minimum instantaneous discharge was recorded at 0.07 cubic feet per second<sup>1</sup> and a drought emergency was announced for the Town of Farmville and its water distribution area. The Town does not currently have any raw water storage and is reliant upon the river.

Currently, the Town of Farmville has a run of the river permit, which means that there is no minimum flow requirement. Although the Town is permitted to withdraw and treat up to 3 mgd, there have been numerous occasions over the last 10 years where this quantity of water has not been available. As growth in Virginia continues to increase, the water resources in the state become more stressed. If downstream demands continue to increase in localities such as Chesterfield County and the tri-cities area, there is the potential that the Department of Environmental Quality will issue a more stringent withdrawal permit from the Appomattox River in the future that will require minimum downstream flows.

Several options for a water source were evaluated in this report which include another withdrawal from the Appomattox River, an new sidestream reservoir, groundwater, and the Sandy River Reservoir. After several discussions with DEQ, we have concluded that other options are unlikely to be permitable and the local geology is not conducive to support groundwater systems on a large scale. The County has a withdrawal permit for 6.3 million gallons per day (mgd) for the Sandy River Reservoir, and we conclude that is the best option for a regional water source.

An evaluation of the water quality in the Sandy River Reservoir was completed by Gary C. Schafran, Ph.D. with Old Dominion University (ODU). The report provides evidence that the water in the Sandy River Reservoir meets most of the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations without treatment. It is typical of most lakes and reservoirs in Virginia and can be characterized as eutrophic by traditional measures such as ammonia, total phosphorus, and chlorophyll-a.

The Sandy River Reservoir has a defined thermocline that begins developing in the spring and by summer reaches a depth of about 10 ft. Low dissolved oxygen levels are observed below the thermocline and the water quality is generally much poorer. Multiple withdrawal levels on an intake structure will allow the water quality to be optimized while allowing water to be withdrawn in the event of a drought.

The Sandy River Reservoir generally has low turbidity (less than 10 NTU) and low alkalinity (less than about 40 mg/L). There were no observances of pesticides or any other organic compounds in concentrations of regulatory concern. There were no observances of giardia or cryptosporidium. There were a few occasions where fecal coliform concentrations exceeded 10 CFU/100 ml, which appear to be influenced by surface runoff. The major constituents of concern for the Sandy River Reservoir are relatively high levels of total organic carbon (TOC), iron, and manganese.

It has been suggested that the high levels of TOC could be mitigated by draining the lake and clearing out existing tree stumps and other bottom organic matter. This activity was discouraged by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF), as it would significantly damage an excellent fishery. We reviewed historical data and conducted treatability studies, and

have concluded that the proposed dredging/clearing operation is not likely to result in a significant improvement in the water quality and is not worth the cost and environment disruption that it would create.

A sanitary survey of the Sandy River Reservoir was conducted. The highest risk land use activities that were identified were three livestock farm operations. These risks can be mitigated through the use of best management practices. The proposed resource protection overlay district will also be a significant step towards maintaining water quality in the reservoir if implemented. There is a closed sanitary landfill adjacent to the reservoir. Several monitoring wells were constructed on the site. The initial round of groundwater sampling yielded no constituents with concentrations of regulatory concern.

Three main options were evaluated for the water distribution system.

- 1. Extension west into Prince Edward County towards Hampden-Sydney College
- 2. Extension east into Nottoway County to Burkeville and Crewe
- 3. Combination of the east-west options

Within each option, several alignment alternatives were evaluated. A computer water model was used to evaluate each of these options based on initial (2013) demands, 10-year demands (2023), and 20-year demands (2033). The demands are summarized on the following table:

In order to meet the 20-year maximum daily demands and provide fire flow of 1,500 gpm, a combination of 16-inch and 12-inch water mains have been proposed. The individual alignments were evaluated based on several factors, which include easements, environmental impacts, constructability, and project cost.

A summary of construction costs for all the Segments that are discussed in this report is presented in Appendix I and also includes assumptions and all of the breakdown of all routing options presented. There are a total of nine (9) routing option combinations, three (3) for the Western System, three (3) for the Eastern System, and three (3) for the Combined Systems.

### West Only Route Options (service to HSC)

West Option 1 includes Segments A1, A3, B3, C2, D3, E, and F and is the least expensive routing option, totaling \$4,956,000. This option generally follows the shortest alignments, which is the main reason it is the least expensive. However, this routing option will not provide as much direct service to Route 460 near the water plant or as much service to Routes 630 and 628.

West Option 2 includes Segments A1, A2, B2/B4, C2, D3, E and F and is more expensive than Option 1, totaling \$5,344,566. It does include service out to Route 460, which will be an advantage if Rice is to be served in the immediate future. This option also reduces service to Routes 630 and Route 628.

West Option 3 includes Segments A1, A2, B1/B3, C2, D2, E, and F and is the most expensive option, totaling \$5,928,580. It does maximize service to all roads including Route 460, Route 630 and Route 628. We have used the higher costs for some of the segments in order to be conservative on the maximum price that the Western route could be.

# Since it does not appear that there will be any significant development in these areas in the near future, it is recommended that West Option 1 be selected.

# East Only Route Options (Service to Crewe)

East Option 1 includes Segments A1, H4, and I3 and is the least expensive option. It is the shortest option and this is a big reason it is the least expensive, totaling \$4,521,354. This option does not serve any of the Route 460 corridor including Rice.

East Option 2 includes Segments A1, A2, G2, H3, and I3 and is more expensive than Option 1, totaling \$5,375,513. This option does provide service to Rice along Route 460 and then follows the High Bridge Trail so service east of Rice along Route 460 will not be provided.

East Option 3 includes Segments A1, A2, G1, H1, and I1 and is the most expensive routing option, totaling \$6,381,081. This option does provide service along Route 460 all the way to Burkeville and Crewe. We have used the higher costs for some of the segments in order to be conservative on the maximum price that the Eastern route could be.

Since it does not appear that there will be any significant development along Route 460 east including Rice in the immediate future, it is recommended that East Option 1 be selected if the primary objective will be to serve Crewe initially.

# Combined System Routing Options (East and West)

Combined Option 1 includes Segments A1, A3, B3, C2, D3, E, F, H4 and I3 and is the least expensive routing option, totaling \$9,116,631. This option generally follows the shortest alignments, which is the main reason it is the least expensive. However, this routing option will not provide any service along Route 460 to the east of the water plant or as much service to Routes 630 and 628.

Combined Option 2 includes Segments A1, A2, B2/B4, C2, D3, E, F, G2, H3 and I3 and is more expensive than Option 1, totaling \$9,952,101. It does include service along Route 460 from Route 630 to Rice, but does not provide service east of Rice, as if follows the High Bridge trail toward Crewe. This option also reduces service to Routes 630 and Route 628.

Combined Option 3 includes Segments A1, A2, B1/B3, C2, D2, E, F, G1, H1, and H and is the most expensive option, totaling \$11,642,662. It does maximize service to all roads including Route 460, Route 630 and Route 628. We have used the higher costs for some of the segments in order to be conservative on the maximum price that this option could be.

Since it does not appear that there will be any significant development along Route 460 in the immediate future, it is recommended that Combined Option 1 be selected if the primary objective will be to serve Crewe and the Route 15 area initially.

# Water Treatment Plant

The obvious choice for the water treatment plant site is a 77.2 acre parcel of land slightly downstream of the dam that is already owned by Prince Edward County. The parcel has access to public roads and is out of the flood zone and dam spill zone. Electric and data utilities will have to be extended to the site. A geotechnical investigation was performed and found that there is little rock, groundwater, and the soils are generally suitable for standard foundations.

Several options were evaluated for treatment, primarily focused on removal of TOC and iron and manganese. The options included a combination of membrane filters, conventional filters, powdered and granular activated carbon, magnetic ion exchange resin, and various forms of disinfection. The option selected is Option 4, which is summarized as follows:

# Intake & Screens:

Three screens be installed at different elevations and supported by a pile system. Intake piping is also supported in the water and is included from the screens back to the raw water pump station. Three levels will allow the County to withdraw at optimal water quality for that season and be able to access water at low levels in the event of a drought. Each intake level will have wedge wire screens sized for 8.0 mgd, which is equal to the safe yield of the reservoir. The structure will be expensive to construct so design provisions are being made so that the life of the structure will provide for the long term needs of Prince Edward County.

The pump station houses two pumps with space for two additional future pumps. Base elbows, discharge main, slide rails, and power conduit will be provided for the two additional future pumps.

The airburst system for the screens is included and will be housed at the pump control building, which will be located at the top of the hill off the existing dam access road. The control building will be a precast concrete building. The raw water magmeter will be located in a vault near this building and a pH analyzer will be located here as well. The building will also be sized to allow for future house blowers for lake aeration and mixing. A fiber optic line will be installed parallel to the raw water main to provide data access to the plant SCADA system. A finished water line will be run in the same trench as the raw water main to provide for an eyewash in the control building and washdown.

# Raw Water Main:

The raw water main has been sized to provide a minimum of 2 ft/second velocity. If a 1.0 MGD option is chosen, the size will be 12-inch. A 16-inch main will provide between 2-3 MGD. The estimates provided include either the 12-inch or 16-inch pipe depending upon the County's customer base.

A direct chemical feed of potassium permanganate will be injected at the control building based on the average manganese concentration in order to take advantage of the contact time in the pipeline.

# Raw Water Contactor

We have included a concrete Raw Water Contactor tank complete with a chemical feed location and a mixer. The basin will have pH analyzers to optimize manganese oxidation. Water will be collected through a center pipe with a sloped floor. The tank will be located on a high point on the site to allow for gravity flow to the clarifiers.

# Superpulsator Clarifier

Our estimate includes a SuperPulsator clarifier with polymer feed. The process equipment will be installed in a cast-in-place tank sized to accommodate the proper treatment capacities.

# Mixed Media Filtration

A conventional granular activated carbon (GAC) mixed media filter system will be installed in cast-in-place filter basins. The filters will run at a high rate process of 4 gpm/square ft of filter area. Per VDH requirements, there is one redundant filter beyond the normal operational capacity. Therefore if a 1.0 mgd capacity is determined, we would construct 2 filter beds and for 2.0 mgd capacity we would have 3 filters. Ultimately, 5 filters could be provided to achieve a 4.0 mgd of capacity. The concrete basins have been included in this estimate for this anticipated future growth.

# <u>Clearwell</u>

The clearwell will be an exterior 350,000 gallon tank with interior Red Valve mixing system. A glass-lined bolted steel tank is the basis for this estimate. It will be necessary to provide filtrate pumps to fill the clearwell. Space will be allowed on the site for a future tank.

# Finished Water Pump Station

This option includes a finished water pump station, complete, utilizing a package vertical turbine pump system. pH will be adjusted to between 7.0-7.5 prior to pumping through the addition of an alkaline chemical. Effluent will be metered through a magmeter. Effluent turbidity and pH will be monitored using instrumentation..

The following is a summary of estimated project costs for the three main options presented in the PER. We have provided a comparison of the Presentation Level Estimate that was provided to the County in March 2010. The current Preliminary Estimate is lower than the Presentation Estimates because of the additional study and information that has allowed the design team to make more firm costs. These project costs will continue to be refined throughout the preliminary design phase in development of the final guaranteed maximum price that will be presented in the Comprehensive Agreement.




# Estimated Annual System O&M Costs





As you recall the CRC Transportation Committee has been working for some time on the Rural Long Range Transportation Plan (RLRP). As a part of this process the Committee identified Transportation Roadway Deficiencies in the region and submitted those areas to the State's Consultant for recommendations. The transportation system for each locality is being evaluated and a range of transportation improvements including roadway, rail, transit, air, bicycle and pedestrian will be recommended that best satisfies existing and future needs. The Committee has received the roadway recommendations that also include recommendations for other roadway segments and/or intersections that were compiled from VDOT databases pertaining to safety issues, congestion, crash data, level of service, etc. Recommendations for other modes of transportation will be provided in the final draft.

- Maps of the Detailed Study Locations (DSL)
- Spreadsheet (The Spreadsheet gives the map code # for the maps and details the explanation of the location information, roadway deficiency and recommendations)

# Overview of Developing Recommendations for RLRP

Attached is the draft recommendations table. As you are aware, the table includes recommendations from a number of sources and reflects analysis as follows:

- 1. Needs-based recommendations that were developed from the following sources:
  - a. Safety locations based on review of the statewide crash database. Locations with nine or more crashes over the three-year analysis period were identified as potential safety locations. If locations were also identified from other sources (including local priority, high risk rural roads analysis, STARS locations, etc.), then specific recommendations are proposed. If not, the recommendation is generally as follows:

Initial screening indicates that this location is a potential safety location. While not identified as a priority location, the long-term recommendation is to continue to monitor for safety and to implement improvements as needed.

- b. Bridge deficiencies based on review of the statewide structures database. Locations with low sufficiency ratings were identified and tabulated. Unless otherwise identified from other sources as well, recommendations for each structure are not identified separately.
- c. Segments identified as operating at level of service (LOS) D or worse based on the output from the Statewide Planning System (SPS) database. Improvements to address these deficiencies may include the following: spot improvements, widen existing lanes, widen roadway by constructing additional lanes (i.e., widen from two to four lanes), or other improvements of an operational nature (signal system coordination, etc).
- d. Segments identified as being geometrically deficient based on output from the SPS database (SPS identifies roadway geometry deficiencies based on a combination of existing lane widths and existing/projected traffic volumes). Improvements to address these deficiencies generally include either spot improvements or total reconstruction to address geometric deficiencies.
- e. Field reviews and analysis of detailed study locations (DSLs). The DSLs include both roadway segments and intersections and were identified by each PDC. The analysis of the locations included field reviews and, where needed to support analysis, traffic counts. Analysis is performed for both existing traffic volumes and for year 2035 forecasted traffic, which is obtained from the SPS database. Recommendations for these locations are generally tailored with some degree of specificity to the individual locations.
- 2. Compilation of recommendations from other sources, including:
  - a. High Risk Rural Roads studies
  - b. Small Urban Area plans
  - c. Locality Comprehensive Plans, Corridor Studies
  - d. Other studies
- 3. Recommendations developed by VDOT for key roadways of regional and/or statewide significance. These roadways are part of the Statewide Mobility


System (SMS). Recommendations for the SMS roadways have been separately provided to each PDC by VDOT for review and concurrence.


We are asking for review of all RLRP recommendations by localities and the PDC as a whole (through the transportation technical committee). VDOT and the consultant team are ready to assist in the reviews, and we would like to receive final feedback that reflects concurrence by the transportation technical committee on the entire package. This ensures that the final draft recommendations that are taken to a public meeting reflect planning and concurrence at the PDC level.

To discuss any comments on the recommendations for SMS roadways, a teleconference or meeting shoud be scheduled to review any potential changes with the locality, the PDC, VDOT TMPD staff, and the consultant team. This will ensure that the rationale for changes are communicated, understood, and documented and that changes, if made, can be reflected not only in the RLRP but also in the SMS plan, which is a key component of the State Highway Transportation Plan.

In summary:

- 1. The PDC should review the draft recommendations table with localities.
- 2. The PDC should ensure that there is a review of suggested changes (including any prioritization by the PDC, if desired) by the transportation technical committee as a whole. A resolution from the committee or meeting minutes reflecting agreement at the staff level with the proposed changes to the draft recommendations table should be forwarded to the District Planner at least two weeks in advance of public involvement.
- 3. Prior to finalizing any suggested changes to SMS recommendations, the PDC should contact the District Planner and request a teleconference to be set up to review the proposed changes with the PDC, TMPD, and District staff.

**Summary:** As authorized by the Board of Supervisors an RFP for business telephone system and voice processing system upgrades was issued on June 16, 2010. The closing date for applications was July 16, 2010. The County received only one response – COMMWORLD located in Forest, Virginia. A limited number of responses was expected because the County was not replacing the existing phone sets already in use. The existing phones are Toshiba and the RFP was limited to manufacturers and distributors of Toshiba equipment. There are at least three such businesses in the region. It was expected the cost of the upgrade would be approximately \$65,000. The response from COMMWORLD quoted a price of \$62,934.44. This price includes all equipment and labor with a 7 year warranty on parts and 3 years labor warranty.

COMMWORLD has been in business since 1984 and has been an authorized dealer of Toshiba equipment for over 13 years. Toshiba Corporation provided a letter verifying that COMMWORLD is an authorized Toshiba dealer in good standing with trained personnel.

As you may recall the estimated savings to the County will fall in the range of \$54,345 - \$62,516 per year.

# Summary:

To continue exploring all financing options, it is requested the Board of Supervisors authorize the County Administrator to submit an application for the Virginia Resource Authority Fall Bond Pool in the amount of \$14,000,000. The funds would be used to help finance the Conference Center and public infrastructure components of the Granite Falls project. The Conference Center portion would be \$9,000,000 and the public infrastructure would be \$5,000,000 and includes the relocation of State Route 628, parking, water and sewer lines and storm water management, etc.

This request is merely to submit an application whose deadline is August 16, 2010. Before any obligation is incurred the Board of Supervisors would have to vote to authorize the issuance of any debt. Funds to repay any debt would be derived from the incremental taxes and assessments as authorized by the Board in the economic development grant agreement approved by the board on December 8, 2009.

This action merely allows the county and developer to continue to explore all options in order to obtain the most cost effective financing.

None of the VRA funds would be used for the hotel portion of the project.

VRA provides financing to local governments for essential projects. All VRA projects areas are eligible for financing in the Virginia Pooled Financing Program (VPFP). Since inception in 2003, 88 different cities, towns, counties, and service authorities utilized this program to finance nearly \$1.5 billion.

# 2.2 <u>EMPLOYMENT</u>

- F. Recruitment and Selection
  - 1. The County Administrator has the primary responsibility for recruitment. All selection methods shall be approved in advance by the County Administrator.
  - 2. In determining qualified applicants, the County may use, but shall not be limited to, any one or a combination of the following selection methods in the pre- and postemployment processes: evaluation of training and experience; written and skills tests; performance tests; psychological tests; driving record, reference and background checks and, post-offer medical examinations. As a condition of employment, all employees commencing employment after \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_ shall provide the county with the necessary information for a background check. Additionally, if a position requires the operation of a county vehicle as a part of the job duties, the applicant will provide a current (generated not more than 10 days prior to the application deadline) copy of his/her complete driving transcript through DMV.
  - 3. An applicant who refuses to participate in any phase of the selection process shall be considered withdrawn from the recruitment and shall not be eligible for further consideration.
  - 4. After department representatives have completed final interviews and given full consideration to the group of qualified candidates, the department director shall submit a written recommendation for a selection to the County Administrator.
  - 5. In all cases, the offer of employment and discussion of beginning salary, benefits and starting date shall be approved by the County Administrator.
  - 6. Upon completion of the hiring process, all applications, resumes and any related test materials shall be returned to and maintained by the County Administrator's office.

#### Governor launches August listening tour; county officials urged to participate

Gov. Bob McDonnell announced that he will hold eight town halls around the state beginning on Aug. 4. The meetings will be in Roanoke, Norfolk, Chester, Fredericksburg, Fairfax, Harrisonburg, Danville and Bristol.

The main purpose of the town halls is to discuss the privatization of the ABC system, but input from the public is also solicited for governor's two commissions: <u>Economic</u> <u>Development and Jobs Creation</u> and <u>Government Reform and Restructuring</u>. Gov. McDonnell indicated that at each stop he would be available to meet with local officials to discuss the ABC plan and other concerns.

In addition to the governor, members of his cabinet and the Jobs and Reform Commissions are to be present at each meeting.

The governor's staff has unveiled the preferred plan to sell the state's alcohol assets – the one-time sale of liquor licenses to increase the number of retail outlets from the current 332 ABC stores to approximately 800+ locations. That plan anticipates that stores currently sell wine and beer will also seek liquor licenses.

VACo staff has been advised that in the plan under consideration, it is the governor's intent

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to regard the retail sale of alcohol in the same manner as wine and beer licenses are treated currently in the statues and regulation. Thus, the authority local governments have under the current system of ABC laws would be unchanged. Further, it is also his intent that local land use authority be preserved with respect to the location of liquor stores.

Any ABC privatization proposal will be reviewed by the Reform Commission's Government Simplification and Operations Committee before consideration by the full commission. If the plan is sanctioned by the commission, it is anticipated that the governor will call a special session in the late fall. Implementation of any ABC privatization legislation will take approximately one year.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

**June Financial Statements:** Ms. Hickman stated the Financial Statement for the June 29<sup>th</sup> meeting included in the packet covered the period of June 1-21, 2010. However, due to the Special Called Meeting packet being sent out before accounts payable were paid on June 24, 2010, Ms. Hickman provided an update to the information provided. As of June 30, 2010 total income was \$23,329, total expenses were \$23,332 with a cash-on-hand balance of \$460,725. Ms. Hickman stated accounts receivables for the year-end of 2009 were on target with only two small contract amounts that would be carried over to 2010-2011 budget year.

Dr.Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded to approve the Financial Statements as presented. Motion carried.

#### Report of Officers & Committees

#### Chairman's Report:

**Personnel:** The Chairman stated it was requested that this discussion be delayed unless anyone else had a personnel item to discuss. With no one commenting, the item was tabled.

**FY 10-11 CRC Budget:** The Chairman stated since the Council has limited the economic development activities, it has been discussed on what we want to continue to do as far as economic development. The Chairman asked for discussion on the subject.

Dr. Bates stated his question, as it relates to the budget, is what role do the funds that were transferred to the organization from the Virginia's Heartland Authority serve in the future? The Chairman stated when the two former organizations merged (Virginia's Heartland Partnership & Piedmont Planning District Commission) a rather large cash infusion of funds was given to the new organization (CRC) with the idea that it would be used for economic development.

The Chairman stated the new organization (CRC) was to be two fold, economic development and planning. The Chairman stated since Mr. Danny Fore (former CRC President & CEO) has left, the CRC has had to phase back due to budget issues and therefore the economic development team is no longer with the CRC. The Chairman stated the only discussion is whether the CRC wants to continue to use that funding in the budget to run and maintain the organization or does the CRC want to take some of the funding and earmark it for economic development.

Ms. Atkins questioned hadn't the CRC spent funds on economic development, doing the website, advertising, etc., how much of the funding was left?

The Chairman stated the CRC received funding from a Special Appropriation from the State to cover Mr. Danny Fore's salary and also when the two organizations merged the localities continued to pay the same amount dues for two organizations as they paid for one organization. Therefore, there has been more money for economic development as well as for the planning district.

Dr. Bates stated the CRC received \$250,000 for two years then an additional appropriation of \$200,000 from the Special Appropriation. Dr. Bates stated all of the work the Marketing Consulting Firm did was paid for through the Special Appropriation.

Ms. Atkins questioned if all of the funds were comingled how could it be determined what funding was left?

Dr. Bates stated the Special Appropriation funding was earmarked for economic development. Dr. Bates stated his concern was the funds that came from the Heartland Authority were originally Tobacco funds that were earmarked for economic development. Dr. Bates stated when the Virginia's Heartland Partnership merged with the PPDC to become the CRC, the Authority rolled those funds into the CRC for marketing purposes. Dr. Bates stated if the money was originally earmarked for economic development, and the CRC is no longer going to do economic development, should the funding be returned to the Authority so that it can be used by them for economic development.

Ms. Atkins asked how much money Dr. Bates would propose to give to the Authority.

Dr. Bates stated we currently have approximately \$340,000 to \$360,000 but he would not propose giving the total amount to the Authority.

The Chairman stated whether it is this year or four years down the road the CRC has got to come up with a business plan that will allow the organization to be run without running a deficit budget.

Mr. Fore stated he did not believe just because this organization has reached a slump that it would not continue to be able to pay its bills in the future. Mr. Fore stated the organization has been too successful for too many years to believe it would not be able to continue.

The Chairman stated he served on the Heartland Board and he felt a moral obligation that the funding that came from the Heartland be used for economic development as they had requested. However, he stated he believed in voting and if the majority of the Council wanted to continue using the funds for the CRC then that is what would occur. The Chairman further stated he felt the CRC has a good staff and good leadership and will succeed, but the Council Board of Directors has an obligation to come up with a business plan that will make this happen. The Chairman stated the CRC cannot continue to live

off of the savings account. The Chairman stated he personally felt the funds given to the organization by the Heartland should be used for economic development alone. Therefore, funding should be given to the Authority to be used for economic development. However, he is not suggesting leaving the CRC without enough funding to function into the future for several years.

The Chairman asked Ms. Hickman what the deficit was for the FY 10-11 Budget. Ms. Hickman indicated it was approximately \$60,000, which was the lowest it had been for the past three years. The Chairman stated he had faith in the staff that they will be able to turn things around even sooner.

The Chairman stated he has been hearing different County Administrators around the region stating the funding should be used to hire an Economic Development Administration (EDA) staff so that localities can be eligible to receive EDA funding or use the funds to hire a staff to do economic development. He stated that if this is what the majority of the Council wants to do, he would go along with it. The Chairman stated he was sharing his opinion on the matter and he only had one vote.

Ms. Hickman requested to interject some information regarding the discussion. Ms. Hickman requested if she was out of order for members to state so, however the current discussion had come up at one of the Budget Committee Meetings and she was told by a council member to be prepared for this discussion because it would come up during a Full Council meeting. Ms. Hickman stated after the subject of funds being transferred to the Authority came up during the March 31, 2010 Budget Committee meeting, staff went through financials for the past five years and put together expenses that were incurred for marketing as well as revenue that was received. Ms. Hickman stated this included expenses that were incurred for marketing prior to the CRC receiving the Special Appropriation. Ms. Hickman stated during this time she was serving in the capacity of Interim Director of the CRC. The remaining time covered in the expenses is the three years that Mr. Fore served as President/CEO of the CRC. Ms. Hickman stated that the Council had approved all expenses that are noted. Ms. Hickman stated she would be glad to provide a copy of the information she was sharing that included a running tab of revenue received from Virginia's Heartland Partnership, the Special Appropriation, and funding for the Lobbyist. Ms. Hickman stated it was her understanding that the Lobbyist activities were part of the marketing initiative.

Ms. Hickman stated the CRC received \$443,989.00 from the Virginia's Heartland Partnership for the merger of the two organizations (PPDC & Va's Heartland Partnership). Ms. Hickman stated the CRC began incurring expenses as early as August 2005 to maintain the offices of the former Va's Heartland Partnership that was vacant at the time. This included expenses for the rent, telephone, web upkeep, etc., that ran through June 2006 and totaled \$13,449.21. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC incurred expenses relating to hiring the CRC President that included attorney fees, reimbursement for travel, meals, hotel, etc. that totaled \$21,244.67. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC incurred marketing expenses prior to receiving the Special Appropriation funding that included reimbursement for travel related to marketing initiatives as well as expenses for marketing projects that were approved by the Council that covered the period of January 2006 through June 2006 and totaled \$19,252.29. Ms. Hickman stated Mr. Fore was hired in February 2006 and during that period until June 2006 his salary, as well as benefits, was not covered by the Special Appropriation because it had not been received at that point. This total was \$31,388.16.

Dr. Bates stated Mr. Fore was the President/CEO of the whole organization and therefore expenses related to hiring him and also his salary would be shared by the marketing as well as the planning

#### programs.

Ms. Hickman stated the staff went through financials to determine expenses related to marketing based on the staffs understanding. However, it would be up to the CRC to discuss how these expenses would be divided between planning and marketing.

Ms. Hickman stated between the period of July 2006 through June 2009 the CRC received funding from the Special Appropriation totaling \$447,000. Ms. Hickman stated the Special Appropriation funding could only be used to reimburse net pay, not gross pay. Total gross pay for Mr. Fore and Ms. MacKenzie during this time period was \$619,790.89. Ms. Hickman stated Mr. Fore also received additional compensation per his contract as well as a severance package that was not covered by the Special Appropriation. In addition, Ms. MacKenzie continued to work for the CRC from July 2009 through November 2009, with the Special Appropriation funding ending in June 2009.

Ms. Hickman stated further that the CRC received \$102,000 from local governments towards expenses for the Lobbyist. However, expenses incurred for the Lobbyist from August of 2007 thru August 2009 totaled \$171,664.65.

Ms. Hickman stated the total expenses identified by staff attributed to Marketing were \$1,034,892.88 with total funds received for marketing being \$992,989.04. Ms. Hickman stated based on these financial figures, there is a negative difference of -\$41,903.85 of revenues over expenses for marketing related items.

The Chairman requested what the balance was of the PPDC that was carried into the CRC and also what the membership dues were prior to the merger and after the merger. Ms. Foster stated the PPDC balance brought to the CRC was \$298,248 and the membership dues total for the PPDC (base rate + a per capita rate) was \$91,533. Ms. Hickman stated during 05-06 FY the CRC received membership dues for both the PPDC and Heartland totaling \$172,911. In FY 06-07 the CRC total dues was \$141,300 which has decreased since that time due to members withdrawing. The Chairman asked if there was additional discussion on the matter.

Dr. Bates stated without having viewed the financial information provided, he did not think some of the figures allocated to marketing were a fair assessment of how monies were distributed. Dr. Bates stated expenses allocated for Mr. Danny Fore's salary should have been evenly allocated and not all been allocated to marketing due to Mr. Fore being the President of the entire organization.

Mr. Fore stated that may be and therefore it warrants that the CRC take a closer look at the financials.

Dr. Bates stated he agreed with the Chairman in that the funding that came to the CRC from the Heartland came from the Tobacco Commission and should be used for economic development. Dr. Bates stated during the Budget Committee meetings when this matter was discussed none of the members had a problem with moving as much as \$200,000 to the Authority. Dr. Bates stated however, he did not attend the last budget committee meeting and he also was not in attendance at the June 3, 2010 Council Meeting when the budget was approved. Dr. Bates stated he was surprised when he learned that the Budget Committee did not include a recommendation in the budget to move the funds to the Authority.

Ms. Atkins stated once the funds from both the PPDC and the Heartland were received into the CRC

they were commingled and certainly funds were expended on marketing expenses including trade trips taken by Mr. Fore that were expensive as well as the marketing program. Ms. Atkins stated she did not think once the monies were commingled you would be able to tell where the money went or how after this fact you could say you want the money back. Dr. Bates stated the CRC did cost accounting and therefore it can be traced. Dr. Bates stated the discrepancy would be in how much of Mr. Fore's salary would be for marketing and planning as well as the recruiting cost.

The Chairman stated it was his opinion there obviously was a difference of opinion and this was too important of an issue to have a split vote. The Chairman requested to move onto the next item. Mr. Osl stated he did not want to leave the issue on the table and leave the funds with the CRC while it continues to loose money. Mr. Osl stated he felt there was an income side to the issue that showed the increase in membership dues caused the reserve balance to increase, and also you cannot have a reserve balance increase while losing money.

Ms. Hickman stated when the CRC was created two organizations with different missions were merged. However, the revenue for the CRC was reduced based on what both previous organizations received separately. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC did receive an increase in funding the first year (receipt of both organizations membership revenue) but the second year there was a decrease in local funding based on the nine members at that time and the new flat rate for membership.

There was discussion on how the lobbying funds were spent to benefit members which were no longer members. There was also discussion on how if the lost members to the organization were to come back to the CRC, the CRC would not have a deficit budget situation.

Mr. Osl stated he felt the CRC needed finer tuning in order to have a balanced budget and be able to transfer funds to the Authority that could be sought through researching further financial information.

Mr. Osl stated he felt Dr. Bates had a valid point that all of the expenses that were articulated by Ms. Hickman were attributed to Marketing and this included significant dollars that could be evaluated in a different way. Mr. Fore stated he felt this should be looked at further. Dr. Bates stated there is a difference of opinion on the matter and perhaps a committee should be established to review the information. Dr. Bates stated he has seen a pretty big shift in opinion on the matter in the past weeks.

Ms. Atkins stated she could not represent Longwood without addressing the statement that Longwood took the money for the nursing program and ran. Ms. Atkins stated Longwood's Nursing Program was one of the CRC's priorities, however Longwood lobbied hard for the program as well and met with legislators that the CRC lobbyist did not. Ms. Atkins stated Longwood paid its membership dues and really got no other benefit from the CRC except for the lobbying efforts.

The Chairman stated he had stated that Farmville and Longwood benefited more than any of the other members. There was discussion on the matter.

Mr. Fore moved and Mr. Osl seconded that a Committee be appointed by the Chairman to review the financial information Ms. Hickman provided and sort through to determine what has been spent on marketing from the beginning of the CRC till now and find out how much is left, if any, and also determine how the fund balance increased during that time. Motion carried.

The Chairman indicated he would appoint the Committee at a later time.

**Nominating Committee Report:** The Chairman stated the Nominating Committee did not have a report at this time. The Chairman stated he had spoken with Mr. Hoover from Lunenburg to request him to serve as an officer and he had indicated he was too busy with Lunenburg matters at this time to serve as an officer. The Chairman stated the Committee would continue to work on the matter. However, the current officers would continue to serve until such time as new officers could be determined.

#### **Old Business**

#### President & Staff Reports:

<u>-Update on Membership Request for Funds</u>: Ms. Hickman stated beginning July 1, 2010 the CRC will have five member localities including: Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Lunenburg and Prince Edward. Ms. Hickman stated all have indicated that they have the CRC Membership Fees included in their budgets for this fiscal year.

The Chairman stated for the record that money that is budgeted does not mean that the money will be spent in all situations.

<u>-Information on PDC's Dues Structure:</u> Ms. Foster stated Mr. Osl requested at the June 3<sup>rd</sup> CRC meeting information on how other PDC's member dues were structured. Ms. Foster stated enclosed in the CRC packet is information from a survey that was conducted by the VAPDC in April that provides this information. Ms. Foster stated some of the PDC's have a per capita rate and some have a base rate plus per capita. Ms. Foster stated while it is not included in the information provided, she also requested information on which population figures were used for the per capita rate. Ms. Foster stated three of the PDC's utilized the decennial Census, five utilized the annual estimates provided by Weldon Cooper and one PDC developed their own estimates annually. The Chairman asked if the PDC's across the State were about the same in population. Ms. Foster indicated they were not. The Chairman noted that it seemed the CRC's dues were in line with other PDC's reported.

Council Member Comments: None.

#### <u>New Business</u>

#### President & Staff Reports

<u>-VRS Transitional Benefits Program Resolution & VRS Long-Term Care Program for Employees:</u> Ms. Hickman stated both of these items were included in the packet for CRC information and consideration from VRS. Ms. Hickman stated the VRS Transitional Benefits Program allows schools divisions and VRS --participating political subdivisions, which the CRC qualifies as, to provide a transitional severance benefit or an enhanced retirement benefit to employees who are involuntarily separated from employment. Ms. Hickman stated the cost of the Transitional Severance Benefit would be factored into the future employer contribution rate. This is being offered by VRS.

The other offered benefit from VRS is the Elect Voluntary Long-Term Care Program that is open to

employees. However, there would be no liability to the CRC. This benefit would cover long-term care services, such as nursing home care, home health care, etc. There is an open enrollment period through July 16<sup>th</sup> for employees if the CRC chooses to offer the benefit. If the CRC chooses to offer employees the choice of this benefit, the employee could either be billed directly or through a payroll deduction. There would be no cost to the CRC for this benefit. Participating employees would pay the entire cost. The CRC, however, does have to elect to provide this benefit for employees in order for them to be eligible to participate.

Ms. Hickman stated the deadline for responding for the Transitional Benefits Program is June 30<sup>th</sup> and July 16<sup>th</sup> for the Transitional Benefits Program.

Mr. Osl moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve providing employees the opportunity to participate in the VRS Long-Term Care Program, but not participate in the VRS Transitional Benefits Program. Motion carried.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

**Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRPS):** Ms. Foster stated there were no local CIRPS noted in the packet that was mailed out. However, the CRC has received two local CIRPS after the mailing of the packet that need action. Prince Edward County is applying to USDA for the Granite Falls Hotel/Conference and Hospitality Training Center and the Town of Kenbridge is applying to USDA for the Town of Kenbridge Sanitary Collection System Rehabilitation and Replacement Project. Ms. Foster stated staff recommended a Level One, no concern comment.

Dr. Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded to provide a Level One Comment on the two listed CIRPS. Motion carried.

**Council Member Comments:** Mr. Osl stated the discussions on the financials of the CRC can be a touchy and difficult discussion and he appreciated Ms. Hickman providing the information so that there can be more knowledge and intelligence on how to move forward. Mr. Osl stated he also appreciated Mr. Fore's comments to research the matter further to get a resolution.

Other Business: None.

Adjournment: The meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m.


