September 14, 2010

At a special called meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House,

thereof, on Tuesday the 14th day of September, 2010; at 3:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Fore called the special meeting to order.

In Re: Water Project Update

Chairman Fore said the County is at the point from the engineer's perspective that the County needs to decide the options on the route or routes for the water pipeline. He said at the end of this meeting, the Board may wish to look at two or three options.

Mr. Fred Pribble, Draper Aden, introduced Jeff Capano, Draper Aden; Mike Larson, Draper Aden; and John McIntyre, Crowder Construction.

Mr. Pribble said we are comfortable with most of the issues of the lines to be installed from the water plant west to Route 15. He said the Board needs to consider the options of the water lines to be installed going east to Burkeville and Crewe; the line could follow the power line, the High Bridge Trail, Route 460, or a combination of all three. He then discussed each option in detail.

Mr. Pribble said installing the water lines at the edge of Route 460 would be the most expensive because the rights of way and easements would have to be obtained from both VDOT and the residents. He added tree buffers along the property lines may have to be removed, and there may also be environmental issues because of the need to cross creeks and wetlands. He then said the second option would be to follow the High Bridge Trail; if the water lines are installed along the High Bridge Trail, Norfolk Southern wishes to partner with DCR to get the Trail all the way to Burkeville. The railroad doesn't have a problem placing the pipelines into this right of way but they do have an issue with placing the Trail in their right of way because Norfolk Southern may wish to use the area for storage, which could be an issue. This option could provide service to Rice and along Route 460, and also the proposed DCR campground area. He said a Memo of Understanding with DCR is being worked on; Mr. Bartlett said DCR wishes to have water service to the Trail.

Mr. Pribble said the third option would be to install the lines along the Virginia Power easement; he said adding a line along Route 605 to get service closer to Route 460 in the Rice area would add a cost of approximately \$700,000 to that option. He said the power line option would provide the shortest distance, but would not bring a lot of service to Route 460 and would offer fewer options for future connections. Easements and access to maintain those lines would be an issue, and environmental impacts would also be a concern. Option Four would be to combine the options along the Virginia Power easement and the High Bridge Trail; there would be fewer easements necessary, installation would be quick and would be easy to maintain but there is not immediate service to Route 460 areas.

Chairman Fore asked about a short line for emergency use to the Town of Farmville. Mr. Bartlett said the Town has a line that ends in the vicinity of the interchange of Third Street and Route 460 which is very close to the proposed route. Mr. Pribble stated he thought the Town's line was an 8-inch line. Mr. Pribble said the western water line would run along Route 460 to State Route 630, then to Route 628, then follow Route 628 to the vicinity of the re-routed Route 628, then join the line that will serve Granite Falls. Draper Aden will investigate if cost savings could occur if the line went cross-country from Route 630 to Route 628.

Mr. Pribble then reviewed a summary of costs; he said there is about a million dollars difference between the options. The more that is known and evaluated, the less risk and the costs are lower. The more

we can concentrate on one option, the more risk we can eliminate and the better the price. Supervisor Wilck asked if all these costs are Prince Edward County's that Crewe and Burkeville would not pay for the pipeline. Mr. Bartlett stated the portion of the line crossing over the Nottoway line would be totally a cost to Crewe and Burkeville. Mr. Pribble said costs will be distributed proportionally by capacity and usage; they will be paying for the capital cost out of their actual usage fees, which will include the capital costs and operation and maintenance costs.

Supervisor Gantt stated if the water line was extended to the fire house at Rice, it would solve a lot of problems. There would be benefits to the fire departments and homeowners insurance would be less costly to citizens if water was available. Supervisor Wilck asked if Mr. Pribble had stated earlier if the cost to Rice would cost about \$600,000. Mr. Pribble stated that it would cost a little less than \$700,000 to get it from the power line to Rice. Supervisor Wilck asked if the line would be on both sides of the road in Rice; Mr. Pribble said no, only one side.

Supervisor Wilck asked what are the prospects for customers, and which option offers the best opportunity for customers. Mr. Pribble said Option Four, the combination of the Virginia Power easement and along High Bridge Trail, would provide for the least cost and the most potential customers, including the proposed campground, the town of Rice and along the proposed Enterprise Zone. Supervisor Wilck stated these are just potential customers. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Wilck asked before we run the line in Rice would somebody go and knock on doors to see how many people are interested before we spend the money. Mr. Bartlett said there is a form, offered by DHCD used to gather such information, and we will gather the information regarding interest throughout the area, not just Rice; once the lines are installed, there are DHCD grants for those citizens that are below the poverty level, which can help extend the lines through various CDBG programs. Supervisor Wilck said he wants to make sure there are enough interested citizens to make it feasible.

Mr. Pribble said December is the key date for getting the final cost estimate to the County. He said there will be meetings with Crewe, Burkeville, and Hampden Sydney College, to enable the engineers to finalize the financial analysis to present to the Board next month. He said there will be meetings with DCR, VDOT and VDH. Once all these meetings have been held we will be ready to finalize the financial

analysis; the goal is to complete that in the next month. He said Mr. McIntyre will contact local contractors to see how they will be able to assist Crowder Construction.

Supervisor Wilck then asked about the cost of a raw water line to Farmville. Mr. Bartlett said it would range between \$14 million to \$20 million. Discussion followed on the financial differences between building a new water plant and distribution system versus building an intake, running a raw water line to the Town's current plant and the County buying water from the Town to re-sell. He said the contract with the Town allows for only 250,000 gallons. Supervisor Wilck said that could be changed; Mr. Bartlett said the Town's lines would need to be resized and a bigger water tank would need to be constructed. Supervisor Wilck asked wouldn't that be a lot cheaper than building a new plant. Mr. Bartlett said you would have to compare the cost; if you run a \$14 million raw water line and then have to re-size the Town's lines and build a new tank it would be very expensive. Supervisor Wilck said he would like it looked at to compare the cost. Mr. Pribble stated the numbers are pretty close between those two options. Further discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt asked if any entity could come in and take the water from the County. Mr. Pribble said there is nothing to stop the Board of Supervisors from negotiating a contract for the sale or from giving away the water. Supervisor Wilck asked if the water could be leased. Mr. Pribble said he would be very concerned about leasing it; once they have it, they would be reluctant to give it up. He said that in 1967, the County and the Corps of Engineers formed a partnership; the bill was passed by including the reason "for water supply." He said one of the things that has changed significantly is the regulatory environment; the focus had been on each entity taking care of its own needs and now the focus is on regional solutions.

Mr. Bartlett said the Code of Virginia includes sections concerning two entities that both have condemnation powers in the state, and the process if one attempts to condemn another. Often it's utilities trying to condemn properties, or neighboring county disputes. That is as the Code of Virginia exists today; the General Assembly can always make changes to the Code of Virginia, giving condemnation power or taking it away. If water becomes a scarce resource, the General Assembly could take action to distribute water from counties that have it to ones that don't. Further discussion followed.

Supervisor McKay said the Board should put the emphasis on Option 4 to get the estimate on the

cost. Supervisor Simpson agreed, but asked to include an estimate for a line to be run to the fire

department in Rice from the railroad tracks.

Supervisor Campbell asked about the water pressure in the water line. Mr. Pribble said a small

pump will be running at all times to maintain pressure. If a drop in pressure is registered, it will

automatically kick on a larger pump and there is a generator in case power is lost. He said the system is

designed to provide approximately 1,500 gallons per minute, which is good for school and business needs,

for residential areas and also fire protection needs. Mr. Pribble said additional storage tanks will be

necessary as the system grows; initially additional storage will be located at the water plant.

Mr. Bartlett then said December 15th is the deadline and it is time to narrow down the options.

Discussion followed on the benefits and drawbacks to the various options.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to authorize Draper Aden and Crowder Construction to work

on the cost estimate for Option 4 with the addition of the lines being installed along Route 605 to Rice, with

the option of a spur to the fire department, and a cost estimate for Option 4 with the addition of the

connection of lines installed along Route 605 to Rice, along the Rails to Trails with spurs to the fire

department, and then along Route 460 to Burkeville. The motion carried:

Chairman Fore called the September meeting to order. Supervisor McKay asked Reverend Sam Weddington, of Douglas Presbyterian Church, offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the

opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public

information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

Chairman Fore introduced the new director of the Piedmont Health District, Dr. Alex Samuels, and gave a brief biography.

Dr. Alex Samuels, Director of the Piedmont Health District, thanked the Board for its continued support and expressed his eagerness to work with the Board and the community.

Linda Southall, Hampden District, expressed her concerns regarding a lack of response from the Sheriff's Department to calls made from her residence. She explained that she resides near the county line, and when she called to report vandalism, the officer instructed her to come to the Sheriff's Department as they were too busy, and cited several incidents of concern. She added that neighbors in her area have had the same difficulty in obtaining assistance from the Sheriff's Department, and that of the 21 recent breakins in the County during the past two months, 12 have been in her area. She asked the Board to investigate this matter.

Reverend Sam Weddington, Hampden District, spoke in support of Ms. Southall's complaint, and said there is a lot of crime in that area. He said the residents need and want some sense of responsibility and authority in that area.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Campbell invited the Board and citizens to the Prospect Volunteer Fire Department 50th Anniversary Sale to be held on October 2, 2010, and to the 50th Anniversary Parade, to be held on October 17, 2010.

Supervisor Gantt explained the process of the 911 Dispatch, saying that when a call goes to 911, the dispatchers must first determine which enforcement agency is required and then the call is forwarded to the officers in that jurisdiction. He said the need for a centralized 911 dispatch system is necessary.

Supervisor Wilck agreed with Supervisor Gantt; he said there are delays that are not necessary, and there would be cost savings involved also.

PPTRA RESOLUTION FOR 2010 County of Prince Edward, Virginia

In accordance with the requirements set forth in VA CODE ANN. §58.1-3524 C.2 and §58.1-3912 E, as amended by Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly (2004 Special Session 1) and as set forth in Item 503.E (Personal Property Tax Relief Program) of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly, any qualifying vehicle sitused within the County of Prince Edward, Virginia commencing January 1, 2010, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:

- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,000 or less will be eligible for 44% tax relief; and
- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,001 or more shall receive only 44% tax relief on the first \$20,000 in assessed value; and
- All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying" (such as business use vehicles, motor homes, etc.) will not be eligible for any form of tax relief under this program; and
- In accordance with *Item 503.D.1 of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly*, the entitlement to personal property tax relief for qualifying vehicles for tax year 2005 and all prior tax years shall expire on September 1, 2006. Supplemental assessments for tax years 2005 and prior years that are made on or after September 1, 2006 shall be deemed "non-qualifying" for purposes of state tax relief and the local share due from the taxpayer shall represent 100% of the tax assessable.

In Re: Highway Matters

Kevin Wright, Residency Maintenance Manager, introduced Jorg Huckabee-Mayfield, VDOT Liaison. He said he will continue with the Alternate Route 628 project, and can still be contacted for maintenance needs.

Ms. Huckabee-Mayfield said she has been with VDOT for 24 years, and looks forward to working with the community.

Mr. Wright then gave an update on various projects:

- o Route 751 (Hidden Lake Road) one-third of the project is complete, expect to be finished by the end of September
- o Mowing is currently being done on secondary roads
- Patching work continues
- o Route 626 in Prospect is being patched
- o Resurfacing to be done in the next two to three weeks
- o Bridges on Routes 622 is scheduled to begin tomorrow (September 15) and work on Route 623 is scheduled to begin on September 21. The roads will be closed for repairs.

Supervisor Simpson said he has received citizen complaints about the intersection of Routes 460 and 307, and asked that the road possibly be widened so the drivers would have to stop to make the turn onto Route 460.

After some discussion, Mr. Wright said the County may need to look at the enforcement of the law in that area, and if that doesn't work, he said there are several options and will have the traffic engineers look at the intersection.

Supervisor Campbell said that "Children Playing" signs are needed on Routes 655 and 685, and asked that the Board to approve and present a Resolution to VDOT. He then thanked VDOT for the work completed on Route 626 which greatly improved the roads.

Supervisor McKay expressed his thanks for the "School Bus Stop Ahead" sign to be posted on Route 133.

In Re: Public Hearing – Request of Southside Electric Cooperative to Construct a Substation

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Request of Southside Electric Cooperative to construct a substation on 16.69 acres presently owned by James Capps and located on the north side of Loman Road about one mile east of Farmville Road. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the August 27, 2010 and September 3, 2010 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mike Bender, SEC Director of Engineering Services, gave a presentation on the proposed Briery Substation, and reported citizen concerns about noise from the substation. He said the site is very secluded and surrounded by natural buffer.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Jones said the Planning Commission held a public hearing on this request at the Commission's August 17, 2010 meeting and received only one citizen comment which was supportive of the request. Following the hearing the Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval to the Board.

Supervisor Wilck said the site is secluded; Supervisor McKay said it is sometimes three or four days before service is restored in that area and he is pleased this has been proposed.

Supervisor Jones then made a motion to approve the request in accordance with the site plan presented at the Planning Commission meeting; the motion carried:

Mr. Bender said that the project is expected to be completed in November 2011.

In Re: Public Hearing - Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Amendment

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on proposed amendments (additions/deletions) to the Enterprise Zone Boundary, with a proposed expansion of approximately 540+/- acres primarily in the community of Rice, Virginia. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the August 27, 2010 edition of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mrs. Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development, said that notices of the proposed Enterprise Zone expansion were sent to the 59 landowners that would be affected by the proposed boundary adjustment (57 properties to be added and two properties in the Town of Farmville to be deleted). In addition, a Public Hearing notice was published in The Farmville Herald on August 27, 2010 to give citizens an opportunity to comment on proposed amendments (additions/deletions) to the Enterprise Zone Boundary. She said the Enterprise Zone Committee for the Town of Farmville has asked to take some

properties from the Zone and add others in. Mrs. Carney said 2.958 acres are to be deleted, and 144 acres would be added, including Poplar Hill, Prince Edward IDA, Farmville Hospitality and other areas in the Rice district.

Mrs. Carney said the addition or deletion of a property to the Enterprise Zone has no impact on a property's assessed value, real estate taxes or current zoning designation; however, it may make a property more desirable for a potential business or industry for development. No changes to local development incentives are recommended at this time. If approved by the VDHCD, the Zone expansion area will be retroactive to January 1, 2010 so no improvements or development that has occurred in the year 2010 in these new areas will be omitted.

As part of the Enterprise Zone boundary Adjustment Amendment, Prince Edward County is required to request from Charlotte and Lunenburg County authorization, via a Resolution of Support, since the original Zone award was a shared designation. Mrs. Carney requested that the Board of Supervisors approve a Resolution of Support for the Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Amendment application and suggested zone areas, and requested authorization to request a Resolution of Support from Charlotte and Lunenburg counties.

Cindy Morris, Planner, Town of Farmville, said the Town wishes to create an economic development incentive for folks to build, renovate, and to add on. She said the proposed areas that the Town wishes to include in the amendment have had approximately \$11 million worth in investments just in 2009. She respectfully requested the approval of the map amendment as submitted to the Board of Supervisors, to include the ICE facility and the Woodland Property.

Mrs. Carney then reviewed the possible changes to specific business sites. She said there are no residential properties in the proposed Zone. She said the 367.97 total acres would be added, and 3 acres would be deleted.

Supervisor Gantt asked when the County could adjust the Enterprise Zone again. Mrs. Carney said it can be done annually.

Supervisor Gantt then asked when additions could be made in Meherrin. Mrs. Carney said properties have to be contiguous, and may take a year.

After further discussion, Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Jim Pohl, Lockett District, expressed his concern regarding the proposed Enterprise Zone and asked for more information regarding the depth of the agreement with the trucking entity that wishes to open a site in Rice. He said normally Enterprise Zones follow water and sewer. Mr. Pohl asked that the small community be left as it is.

Brian Lokker, Lockett District, thanked Supervisors Wilck and Jones for speaking with the citizens and thanked Mr. Bartlett for his response. He then voiced concerns about higher taxes and utility rates such as water and sewer, and reduced residential property values. He said the infrastructure is not there and the Enterprise Zone would lower the quality of life. He said the State Park has been developed and could be ruined by industry. Mr. Lokker asked that the citizens be given opportunity for input during the process, and asked the Board not take action on this resolution today.

Bonnie Fitzpatrick, Lockett District, presented a petition with 91 signatures opposing the proposed Enterprise Zone amendment. She expressed her concern about decreasing property values and increased noise, pollution and traffic.

Doug Farley, Lockett District, thanked Supervisor Jones for discussing the Enterprise Zone with citizens. He expressed his concerns that the safety will be compromised and said the article in THE FARMVILLE HERALD stated the Zone is where the trucking terminal is currently zoned for that use. He said citizens have the right to choose where to live, and they chose Rice. He asked that the Board make no decision at this time.

Shay Farley, Lockett District, expressed his concern about the dangerous stretch of road along Route 460 at Route 307, stating the Enterprise Zone would add to the problem. He asked for more time to digest the proposal.

Chris Mountcastle, Lockett District, said he and a property owner directly to the north of the proposed Enterprise Zone received no personal contact from anyone, and said this project is unnecessary.

Patrice Payne, Lockett District, said she is the fourth generation in Rice, her family establishing itself there in the 1700s. She said she opposes the development of Rice, a historic part of the county, but if it is developed, asked that it be developed to preserve its historical significance.

Wade Clements, Lockett District, expressed his agreement with the previous speakers.

Daniel Bradshaw, Lockett District, said his family has also been in Rice since the 1700s. He

asked Mrs. Carney of the probability of the sections originally selected but deleted during this amendment

of their being added at a later date. Mrs. Carney said the boundaries may be changed each year. She said

tourism will increase the demand for goods and services.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Gantt asked if the Town's changes be passed separately; Chairman Fore said they

could be.

Supervisor Jones asked about repercussions of postponing the decision one month. Mr. Bartlett

said until the changes to the Enterprise Zone for Prince Edward County are approved by the Board, they

cannot be sent to Charlotte and Lunenburg counties, which share in the regional Enterprise Zone. He said

one month's delay could result in difficulty meeting the deadline of getting the amendments to DHCD by

the end of the year.

After further discussion, Supervisor Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Wilck, to

approve the adjustments to the Town of Farmville and the properties surrounding the Town of Farmville,

and to exempt the inclusions in Rice; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said a letter of request has been received from Roma Morris, Director of the Department of Social Services for the Board to provide a designated space in the first floor conference room that can be used to accommodate both parent-child visitations and Family Partnership Meetings. The letter states "the agency will soon be required by state policy to provide Family Partnership Meetings," implying the decision to require the meetings has not yet been made or the requirements of how to conduct the meetings have not been determined. Once requirements are understood there may be other space available in the Courthouse that could be used to meet any new state mandated requirements.

Mr. Bartlett said the County has two conference rooms in the Courthouse, one located on the third floor adjacent to the Board of Supervisors Room (Conference Room 3) and one located on the first floor, adjacent to the Department of Social Services (Conference Room 2). He said there is a third conference room on the Ground floor but it is part of the space rented by the Department of Health, and it is not under the County's control.

Mr. Bartlett stated that during the last twelve months, Conference Room 3 had 135 reservations and currently has 21 pending reservations. Conference Room 2 had 36 reservations and currently has one pending reservation. He said that due to office flooding, the Department of Social Services had two employees located in Conference Room 2 for about five of the last twelve months, which precluded any outside use of the conference room by others.

Mr. Bartlett recommended no action to be taken until the state policy regarding the Family Partnership Meetings is presented.

Mr. Pickett said the county has received a special use request from David Simpson to operate a retail bakery out of a portion of the building he owns at 46 Simpson Road. The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on this request on September 21, 2010.

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

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TAXATION § 70-2

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 70-1. Due date of returns; penalty.

- (a) In accordance with Code of Virginia, § 58.1-3916, which authorizes the governing body of any county to provide by ordinance the time for filing annual returns of taxable tangible personal property, machinery and tools, and merchants' capital, the board of supervisors directs that annual returns of tangible personal property, machinery and tools, and merchants' capital shall be due on May 1 of each year.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully fail or refuse to file such returns at the time required herein or for making false statements in such returns with the intent to defraud.
- (c) Any person who shall violate subsection (b) of this ordinance and the amount of the tax lawfully assessed in connection with the return is \$1,000.00 or less shall be guilty of a class 3 misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$500.00. Any person who shall violate subsection (b) of this section and the amount of the tax lawfully assessed in connection with the return is more than \$1,000.00 shall be guilty of a class 1 misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$2,500.00 and up to 12 months imprisonment, either or both.

Sec. 70-2. Personal property exempt from taxation.

The following classes of personal property are exempt from taxation by the county:

- (1) Bicycles.
- (2) Household and kitchen furniture, including gold and silver plates, plated ware, watches and clocks, sewing machines, refrigerators, automatic refrigerating machinery of any type, vacuum cleaners and all other household machinery, books, firearms and weapons of all kinds.
- (3) Pianos, organs and all other musical instruments; phonographs, record players and records to be used therewith; and radio and television instruments and equipment.
- (4) Oil paintings, pictures, statuary, curios, articles of virtu and works of art.
- (5) Diamonds, cameos or other precious stones and all precious metals used as ornaments or jewelry.
- (6) Sporting and photographic equipment.
- (7) Clothing and objects of apparel.
- (8) Antique motor vehicles as defined in Code of Virginia, § 46.2-100, which may not be used for general transportation purposes.
- (9) All other tangible personal property used by an individual or a family or household incident to maintaining an abode.

Chairman Porterfield asked for any corrections or additions to the August minutes. Hearing no objections, he declared the minutes approved.

PUBLIC HEARING

Chairman Porterfield opened the public hearing, the purpose of which is described below:

A Special Use Request by David K. Simpson to operate a retail bakery in a portion of the existing "Simpson Crop Insurance" building, located at 46 Simpson Road, Prospect District.

Chairman Porterfield requested an explanation of the request. Jonathan Pickett explained that the building is located at the intersection of Hwy 460 and Simpson Road, a couple of miles west of Dowdy's

Corner. He reviewed the history of the building. In 2002 Mr. Simpson obtained a permit to operate an insurance business in the building. The total building is 3,200 SF, about 1/3 is the insurance business; he plans to rent the remainder to a Mennonite Family for the operation of a retail bakery, goods will be baked and retail sales conducted at the location. The parking lot is paved and provides enough parking to satisfy the Zoning requirements for both businesses. It is not anticipated that VDOT would require additional entrances because there are existing two commercial entrances to the property, one from Highway 460 and one from Simpson Road.

Chairman Porterfield opened the hearing to public comment. There being no public comment offered, he moved to consideration of a recommendation for the Board of Supervisors. **Commissioner Jones** made a motion that the Board of Supervisors consider granting a Special Use Permit to Mr. Simpson for the operation of a bakery in the building. Unanimous agreement from the Commissioners.

RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of a Special Use Permit submitted by David Simpson to operate a retail bakery in a portion of the existing "Simpson Crop Insurance" building, located at 46 Simpson Road, Prospect District. The business will include baking and retail sales.

Chairman Porterfield directed attention to the sign request submitted by Tri-Boro Shelving.

SIGN REVIEW - TRI-BORO SHELVING

Mr. Pickett identified the location of Tri-Boro Shelving at 300 Dominion Drive in the Prince Edward Business Park. Tri-Boro Shelving has the reputation of being a manufacturer of shelving, but they also sell directly to the public. They would like to get the word out that the sell directly to the public. He introduced Frederick Payne, an attorney representing Tri-Boro. Mr. Pickett reviewed the color diagrams of the signs, which had previously been provided to the Planning Commissioners.

Chairman Porterfield raised questions concerning whether the same free-standing sign design would be used at two locations, clarified that the wall sign would replace the existing sign, and whether there was a showroom. Mr. Payne explained that the sign shown in Exhibit 5 would replace the existing wall sign and an additional "Buy Direct" sign installed, then the free standing sign would be used at the entrances to Dominion Drive from Commerce Road and to the business from Dominion Drive. Commissioner Gilfillan pointed out that the signs were comparable to the Lowe's Sign and the Paris Ceramic Signs. Chairman Porterfield noted that the signs met the requirements of the sign ordinance for the business park, and Mr. Payne added that the Social Security Building sign was also comparable to the proposed Tri-Boro signs.

(Mr. and Mrs. DeMaio entered the room.) Mr. Payne explained that the freestanding signs were wooden on wooden posts, and the wall signs were aluminum. Chairman Porterfield inquired about maintenance of the signs. Mr. Demaio stated that, "If they (the signs) get faded, I will fix them up."

Dr. Porterfield requested questions or comments from the Commissioners. Hearing none, he suggested that the Commission vote on the issue. He offered a motion to approve the sign request as described in the materials previously sent to the commissioners and provided at the meeting. He called for the vote, All in favor: Unanimous favor from the Commissioners.

RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

The Planning Commission recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of a Sign Request submitted by Tri-Boro Shelving, located on Dominion Drive in the Prince Edward Business Park. The request includes replacement of existing wall mounted signs at the building, and the addition of wooden, free standing signs at the entrance to Dominion Drive from Commerce Drive and the entrance to the Tri-Boro business from Dominion Drive. The signs advertise the availability of public retail of shelving. The Planning Commission has determined that the signs requested meet the Business Park covenants.

Dr. Porterfield moved the meeting to the Information Items on the Agenda.

Mr. Pickett announced that the School Superintendent, Dr. Smith, is scheduled to attend the October 19th Planning Commission Meeting, and has invited the School Board Chairman and financial people from the schools to join him. Chairman Porterfield offered to prepare an outline of the headings for the Capital Plan where it pertains to the schools.

Mr. Pickett provided updates for projects, per Mr. Coleman's request at the August meeting.

<u>Worsham School Property:</u> Ross Fickensher reported that two wells have been drilled, and the existing well will also be used. All three wells have sufficient yield according to the Health Department. He plans to begin building renovations within two weeks. Chairman Porterfield inquired about whether an agreement had been reached with the Fire Department concerning fire fighting water. Mr. Pickett stated that no agreement has been reached, and Chairman Porterfield reiterated that everyone is delighted about the improvements planned for the site, but that the hitch was over water (fire fighting) and to satisfy the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors that the site is required to have an adequate storage tank for fire suppression.

<u>Luck Stone Quarry:</u> In a report from Ben Thompson, Mr. Pickett reported that Luck Stone is working with VDOT to open the primary commercial entrance on Highway 460. Hydrology studies are underway and it is anticipated that approval from DMME will be next year. 2013 is the projected date for quarrying stone. Luck Stone feels optimistic about the project and that things are progressing.

Heritage LLC: Several years ago, a 60-unit assisted living complex was approved for Phyllis Archer on Watson Drive (off Green Bay Road). Phyllis Archer has received a Planning Grant from VHDA to work on site development issues. The grants are usually one year in length. Chairman Porterfield inquired about whether there was a time limit on a conditional use or Special Use permit. Mr. Pickett stated there was not a time limit on this Special Use Permit. Dr. Porterfield wanted to verify that the Planning Commission would not be embarrassed if questions were raised, and mentioned his continued support for the project. There was some reflection of the project details in the discussion.

Commissioner Gilfillan redirected their attention back to the question of time-limits on Special Use Permits. She specifically inquired about the property across from Jenkins Blue & Gray in Rice, which has been abandoned, and inquired about the status of the Special Use Permit for that site. Mr. Pickett explained that the SUP is still in effect for a tenant that wanted to sell manufactured homes, up to 15 used cars, and advertise freight containers as mini storage. The former tenant, Mr. Clary, has departed the site without fulfilling all of the conditions which were set, such as a tree border. Any conditions would still be required of any future tenant using that same SUP.

<u>Crestview:</u> The Garland property, Fariss property (approved for a Holiday Inn Express), and the property approved for 73 townhouses are for sale. The conditions set on the Fariss property when it was conditionally re-zoned for a hotel will remain in effect for that property if ownership changes. Commissioner Gilfillan expressed concern about traffic generation. Vice-Chairman Mason asked for clarification about the time limits on condition zoning and special use permits and cited the 'potential Tharpe property' as an example. Chairman Porterfield wondered if it was a non-conforming use of a Conditional Use Permit, which differs from a conditional re-zoning such as the hotel. Mr. Pickett agreed to investigate further.

<u>Granite Falls</u>: The funding is in place for the hotel. There is a Tobacco Commission proposal seeking funding for the Conference Center and the Hospitality Training Center, both of which would lend to the hotel's success. The Board of Supervisors has to decide whether the County would cover the revenue sharing portion of the road construction if the hotel did not cover the local portion. Commissioner Jones offered further insight. Chairman Porterfield inquired about timelines. The funding questions should be answered within 90 days and corresponding construction is slated to be completed within 18 months, with the road to follow the timeline within a month or two.

<u>The Manor:</u> Ownership is changing from the Herberton Group to a developer from New York. Hampden-Sydney is involved with the cottages, 3 of 5 are completed. There are foreclosures scheduled on the cottages.

<u>Lyles RV Park:</u> The project is still progressing. He has completed the site work, built a berm and planted trees so that Mr. Lee's house across the street is protected from headlights in the park. Mr. Lyles is working on specifics with the Department of Health and plans to open once those are resolved.

<u>Cannery:</u> An Amish grower has been using the cannery for prospective commercial production of a specialty eggplant crop. The modernization of the cannery is showing great progress.

Mr.Pickett shared that Alecia has been working on the Capital Improvement Plan and the Sub-division ordinance. He brought their attention to the 'state road' requirement for private roads and discussed some localities allow a phased paving schedule based on build-out of the homes. Mr. Pickett suggested that the Planning Commission think about the private roads.

At the conclusion of Mr. Pickett's report, Chairman Porterfield called for any additional items. Hearing none, he declared the meeting adjourned.

It might be helpful to have a plan of the Park for the commission to look at. The only plan we have is a recorded plat, which I do not consider terribly helpful, since it shows lots, roads, etc., that have not yet been developed, and I thought perhaps you would have a display of the County's tax map for the area which would be easier for the commission to see.

Please let me know if you have any questions or suggestions or if anything further remains to be done.

Dear Mr. Pickett:

This will follow up our conversation of Wednesday regarding the proposal to modify the signage at the Tri-Boro Shelving plant in the Prince Edward County Business Park (formerly Industrial Park). The undersigned represents Tri-Boro, and I respectfully request that you treat this as an application for approval of certain signs described hereinafter pursuant to Section A.2. of the revised protective covenants for the Park as recorded in Prince Edward County Deed Book 370, page 634.

Tri-Boro proposes to locate 4 new signs on its property known as Lot 6 and a portion of Lot 7 of the Park. The property is located on the westerly side of Dominion Drive at the intersection of Commerce Road. The signs in question are more particularly described as follows:

- (1) A single-faced free-standing sign, 4' X 8' in area, consisting of a wooden (Duraply) backboard mounted on treated wooden posts set in concrete. The design of the sign (including colors, fonts, etc.) is shown on Exhibit 1. This sign is to be located along the property's frontage on Commerce Road, approximately even with the center of the façade of the plant building. The approximate proposed location of this sign is shown in the foreground of the photograph labeled Exhibit 2. It is anticipated that the sign now located on the building façade will be removed.
- A single-faced free-standing sign identical to the sign described in paragraph (1), above. It is proposed that the existing pylon sign located at the main entrance to the plant on Dominion Drive be removed and that it be replaced by the proposed sign. The existing pylon sign is shown on the photograph labeled Exhibit 3.

- (3) A single-faced aluminum sheet, 6' X 12', to be mounted on the side of the plant building facing Dominion Drive. The design of the sign is shown on Exhibit 4. The approximate location of the sign is shown on the photograph labeled Exhibit 5.
- (4) A single-faced aluminum sheet, 6' X 12', to be mounted beside the sign described in paragraph (3), above. The design of the sign is shown on Exhibit 6.

The background of this request is as follows:

- (1) Tri-Boro has been an occupant of Lot 6 of the Park since 1997. Since the original plant was built, the company has acquired additional land (a portion of Lot 7) and has expanded the plant to its current size of approximately 165,000 square feet. At its peak, Tri-Boro employed a workforce of 51.
- (2) As the name indicates, Tri-Boro is in the business of manufacturing steel shelving and related products, which are marketed throughout North America. In recent years, dramatic increases in the prices of materials (notably steel) and competition from government-subsidized manufacturers primarily in the Far East have cut into Tri-Boro's market share. These competing products are generally of inferior quality to Tri-Boro's, but they enjoy broad marketing advantages by selling through mass-market retailers specifically including local outlets of Lowe's and WalMart.
- (3) The reorientation of the Park from purely industrial to partly commercial uses has encouraged this competition. Lowe's now occupies one of the largest lots in the Park, with prime frontage along Farmville Road (Route 15).
- (4) As a result of these competitive disadvantages, together with the global economic recession, Tri-Boro's business has dropped significantly, and it has been forced to reduce its fulltime workforce to 30.
- (5) In an attempt to regain market share, Tri-Boro wishes to increase its marketing efforts to promote direct retail sales. To this end, Tri-Boro believes that the proposed signs will help make the public aware of the availability of its products.

With all of this in mind, Tri-Boro respectfully submits that its proposal is entirely consistent with the covenants which control the Park, specifically Sections A.1. and A.2. The proposed signs:

- (a) Are similar in color, materials, font size and type and general appearance to the existing signs on the property and within the Park;
- (b) Identify only the name, business and products produced and sold on the property; and
- (c) Employ no objectionable lighting.

For purposes of comparison, photographs of other signs within the Park are included as Exhibits 7, 8, 9 and 10.

Please forward this application to the planning commission for its review on September 21. If you require any additional information or have any questions for which we can prepare a response prior to the meeting, please let me know. I anticipate that Mr. DeMaio and I will both attend the commission's meeting to answer any questions and address any other issues which the commission may consider relevant.








EXHIBIT 10: Paris Ceramics façade showing wall sign

Issue: Expansion of Cannery for Low-Acid Food Preservation

Summary: The second phase of the Southern Piedmont Local Food Supply and Commercial Cannery project includes the upgrade of the cannery to process Low-Acid foods. Using freezing techniques to preserve low-acid foods has been determined to be the most economical method of processing these foods for commercial distribution, based upon the inspections and regulatory registration processes conducted during the initial preparations of the cannery for the commercial processing of acidified foods.

A partnership with the Agricultural Research Station at Virginia State University (ARS/VSU) has identified Edamame has a primary low-acid food crop which could be well served by food preservation freezing equipment in the Prince Edward Cannery. This equipment would also be very valuable toward creating new agricultural entrepreneurial activity within the region as it would make the post-season distribution of low-acid foods an option for growers. Restaurants, institutions and distributors can purchase low acid foods that are processed using freezing as the preservation method.

The Tobacco Commission Agribusiness grant is a possible source of funding toward the purchase of equipment for freezing, packaging and storing foods, construction of an addition to the Cannery for housing the low-acid food processing equipment, commercial labeling equipment, expansion of Edamame grower participation to 4 acres in Prince Edward County in 2011, installation of accessibility ramps for loading and ADA compliance, and restroom renovation for ADA compliance. ARS/VSU is interested in working cooperatively with Prince Edward County through a grant award to utilize the freezing equipment and provide technical guidance to the Edamame growers. The deadline for the grant application is November 1.

The grant requires an unspecified match; the County's match would be funds that have already been budgeted to operate the cannery, the position of the Commercial Cannery Assistant, and the value of the building and property- as an in-kind match.

This second phase continues progress toward the County's goal of bringing local producers together with local institutions, by making frozen low-acid products an available product for commercial sale.

Issue: REQUEST FROM MOTON MUSEUM

Summary: The County has received a request from the Moton Museum to serve as the Project Sponsor for a VDOT Enhancement Grant in the amount of \$176,000. These funds would be used to complete an existing VDOT Grant – the parking lot and bus pull-off previously approved by the enhancement grant program, but lacking sufficient funding for completion.

The museum requests: (1) the County serve as the Project Sponsor for the grant and provide a resolution of support from the Board of Supervisors;

- (2) the County serve as the Fiduciary Agent for the Grant, and
- (3) the Board request the CRC to assist the Museum with grant preparation.

The Museum plans to request the required match (\$44,000) from the Tobacco Commission's Reserve Fund program and not the annual allocation allotted to Prince Edward County. The Museum will pay any cost charged by the CRC for their assistance.

The attached draft resolution is verbatim to what is required by VDOT. The CRC contacted VDOT to determine if all the recitals in the resolution are required and was told that a grant application is not eligible for funding without the required resolution.

Recommendation: Board members are asked to carefully review the required resolution to be aware of the County's long-term responsibility to VDOT upon approving the request from the Moton Museum. Should the Board wish to approve the request, it may want to consider approving the resolution contingent upon: (1) if the grant is awarded, the Tobacco Commission or other non-county funds must be certified by VDOT as the required grant match prior to the County executing a grant agreement with VDOT; and (2) the Museum must execute an agreement with the CRC agreeing to pay all costs for grant preparation and management. Staff has no recommendation for how to mitigate VDOT's requirement (noted in the fifth paragraph of the resolution) that the County of Prince Edward will be responsible for maintenance, upkeep and operating costs of any facility constructed with Enhancement Program funds.



Be It Further Resolved, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward hereby agrees to enter into an agreement with the Virginia Department of Transportation to provide oversight that ensures the project is developed in accordance with all state and federal requirements for design, right of way acquisition, and construction of a federally funded transportation project; and

Be It Further Resolved, that the County of Prince Edward will be responsible for maintenance, upkeep and operating costs of any facility constructed with Enhancement Program funds.

Be It Further Resolved, that if the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward subsequently elects to cancel this project the County of Prince Edward hereby agrees to reimburse the Virginia Department of Transportation for the total amount of costs expended by the Department through the date the Department is notified of such cancellation. The County of Prince Edward also agrees to repay any funds previously reimbursed that are later deemed ineligible by the Federal Highway Administration.

The Robert Russa Moton Museum, earlier this year, amended its bylaws to recognize local groups with a strong connection to the Moton story via membership on the museum's board of directors.

Prince Edward County was selected as one of those organizations. We are hopeful that your organization will agree to accept this form of representation by appointing a member to our board.

The Moton Museum's bylaws were amended to read as follows:

Article IV - DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

Section 1. Board of Directors - The Board of Directors shall be comprised of no more than twenty-five (25) voting members and no less than seventeen (17). Between seven (7) and fifteen (15) members shall serve as non-categorical members.

Ten (10) members shall serve as categorical members representing the following institutions/ community groups/governmental agencies (listed alphabetically): Farmville Area Chamber of Commerce, Fuqua School, Hampden-Sydney College, Longwood University, Martha E. Forrester Council, Prince Edward County, Prince Edward County Branch NAACP, Prince Edward County Public Schools, Town of Farmville, and Virginia's Retreat.

The Director of the Museum and the President of the R. R. Moton Museum Foundation shall serve as exofficio members. Ex-officio members are non-voting.

Section 2. Officers - The officers of the corporation shall be president, immediate past president, vicepresident, secretary, assistant secretary, and treasurer. Officers must be current categorical or noncategorical voting members of the Board, No member shall hold more than one office at the same time. The officers will assume their positions on January 1 each year.

At the time we made this bylaws change, we surveyed our existing board members and selected Mr. Howard Simpson to serve on behalf of your organization. Mr. Simpson's term on the board expires at the end of this calendar year, December 31, 2010, and her term may be continued on the board at your discretion or you may choose to name a new representative to the board. You may also choose to not appoint a representative on behalf of your organization.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF REDUCED MANDATES FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION IN VIRGINIA

- WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, through the Board of Supervisors and its School Board, to construct a balanced budget within the confines of available federal, state and local funds; and
- WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia provides direction to and imposes requirements on the public schools within the state; and
- WHEREAS, the FY 2011 Prince Edward County School budget required cuts of \$1.9 million from the previous year's budget of \$28.6 million to achieve a balanced budget; and
- WHEREAS, according to James Regimbal, Jr., reporting to the Virginia Association of Counties on June 17, 2010, "adopted FY 2011 K-12 state distribution from all funding sources is \$512 million lower than this year's adopted FY 2010 distribution;" and
- WHEREAS, Prince Edward County has no reason to believe that state funding for K-12 education in FY 2012 will increase and may, in fact, decline; and
- WHEREAS, despite making substantial cuts in services and positions, the Prince Edward County School Board is faced with the difficult choice of reducing educational programs or facing non-compliance with state regulations in this current difficult economy; and
- WHEREAS, there is substantial need to ease burdens placed on all localities by Commonwealthimposed unfunded mandates which force difficult choices between untenable tax increases or cuts in educational services for our children;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors requests that the Virginia Department of Education substantially reduce the current number of unfunded mandates; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Virginia Department of Education should delay implementation of all new unfunded mandates until the economy has substantially recovered; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Virginia Department of Education should place a moratorium on penalties for noncompliance until the substantial recovery of the economy; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Virginia Department of Education should reduce the need for locally-generated paperwork and statistics which do not provide actual benefit to students; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that careful consideration should be given to the impact of mandates on small school systems, such as Prince Edward County, which has a school population of approximately 2,410, a population that has slowly declined over the last 10 years; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Virginia Department of Education should align SOL testing schedules with federally-mandated testing in order to minimize the time students spend testing rather than learning; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in agreement with the 2010 Legislative Policies of the Virginia Association of School Superintendents, "the state should assume a role of support and direction rather than one of punitive enforcement in accountability and accreditation"; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution shall be presented to Governor Robert McDonnell; State Senator Frank M. Ruff, Jr.; Delegate Watkins M. Abbitt, Jr.; Delegate James E. Edmunds, II; the Virginia Board of Education; and the Virginia Department of Education.

Dear Local Government Official,

Following last year's historic H1N1 influenza season the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) is working hard to prepare for this year's season by building on lessons learned from H1N1 and ensuring that our communities are well informed about what to expect in the coming months. I believe these efforts to be of great importance as many Virginians may have concerns regarding the status of this season in comparison to the last.

Currently there is strong evidence that H1N1 illness patterns are transitioning towards patterns of seasonal influenza. Many people now have some immunity to H1N1; however, cases of illness and outbreaks associated with this strain are still expected to occur in 2010-2011. We expect that recognized risk groups, such as children, pregnant women, and those with underlying medical conditions, including obesity, will likely continue to be disproportionately affected with more severe disease.

For the first time, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices is recommending flu vaccination for <u>all</u> <u>persons ages 6 months and older</u>. This year's seasonal flu vaccine will include the H1N1 (2009) strain as well as two other strains.

Please keep in mind that unlike last year, there has been no large-scale federal or state purchase of flu vaccine for this season. Thus, VDH will not have access to vaccine beyond what it routinely provides through local health departments and through planning and preparedness exercises. The vast majority of seasonal flu vaccine will be available through private sector pharmacies and physician offices.

In conclusion, please join me and local health departments in mitigating the impact of flu on all Virginians by encouraging vaccination among your constituents, employees, family and friends. In anticipation of the decennial redistricting process that will take place in 2011, Senator Janet D. Howell today announced that the redistricting subcommittee of the Senate of Virginia Committee on Privileges and Elections has scheduled a series of four public hearings throughout the Commonwealth. The four different public hearings will take place in October, November, and December of this year. Details on the membership of the subcommittee and the dates, times and locations of the hearings are set out on page 2 of this release.

Senator Howelf, chairman of the Committee and its redistricting subcommittee, stated that the hearings are designed to promote and facilitate the participation of the public in the important redistricting process. The Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections has jurisdiction over measures relating to redistricting. The Committee will provide several opportunities to ensure that the public is fully involved at every stage of the redistricting process.

During the previous decennial redistricting process, public hearings were held jointly with the Committee's House counterpart, the House of Delegates Committee on Privileges and Elections and its redistricting subcommittee. However, the leadership of the House has decided to discontinue this practice, choosing instead to schedule its own series of hearings without Senate participation, effectively depriving the public of the opportunity of addressing members from both houses of the General Assembly at the same time. Senator Howell expressed her regret that the House is following a course that is disrespectful of the public's time and wasteful of public funds.

Senator Howell emphasized that through its scheduled hearings, the Committee is fulfilling its responsibility to ensure public involvement by offering a forum for citizens from every part of the Commonwealth to provide their input directly to members of the Committee and actively participate in the redistricting process from the beginning. Senator Howell stressed the importance of active participation from the public at the earliest stage of the redistricting process, calling attention to the fact that the General Assembly and most counties have a very narrow window of time in which to complete redistricting and enact redistricting plans before the November 2011 elections. The scheduled hearings will afford members of the subcommittee and the public a meaningful opportunity to exchange information and views in advance of the anticipated special session to redistrict in 2011.

Senator Howell noted that estimates of the current populations of the present House, Senate, and congressional districts are now available through the Division of Legislative Services on the Internet in the August 2010 issue of Drawing the Line 2011, its redistricting newsletter. The site for Drawing the Line 2011 is http://dlsgis.state.va.us/. Senator Howell, however, underscored the limited utility of these estimates, noting that they are too speculative for drawing detailed district plans. It is important, though, in light of the narrow window for completing redistricting for 2011, that the public have all possible information made available to them in order to fully participate in the redistricting process from the outset.

The subcommittee seeks public comment on all aspects of the redistricting process, including the criteria to be considered when preparing redistricting plans and potential district changes to legislative and congressional districts.

Additional public hearings will be scheduled subject to the receipt of the final census data.

<u>Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRPS):</u> Ms. Foster stated there were no local CIRPS for action this month.



Capping taxes: A bad idea in bad times

When Gov. Bob McDonnell last week highlighted proposals developed by his job creation commission, he carefully skirted recommendations to abolish or cap local government taxes.

Legislators may show less self-control, however. The House Finance Committee last year endorsed a bill to cap the business, professional and occupational license tax. The chairman, Del. Harry "Bob" Purkey of Virginia Beach, also favors a phaseout of the machinery and tools tax.

Similar ideas bubbled up from skull sessions of the job commission. A subcommittee of small business owners proposed a two-year study to assess the impact of revising BPOL to tax profits, not total revenue.

The group also suggested that the state take over collecting the tax and dole out sums to each city and county, as if the car tax relief program deserved replication. Another panel of manufacturers called for an end to the machinery tax.

Purkey and his Finance colleagues will no doubt find fodder for their own bills in the commission's ideas, but they should also take time to read another report, by the Virginia Municipal League and the Virginia Association of Counties.

State aid to localities has fallen by \$1 billion since 2008. State spending per pupil dropped from \$5,300 to \$4,500 over the past two years. Additional reductions were made to mental health programs, social services, sheriffs, police, jails and courts.

Ending the BPOL and machinery taxes would gouge another \$900 million a year from city and county budgets at a time when they are already being ordered to shoulder more responsibilities that have been shed by the state.

Local governments have had state responsibilities dumped on them before. But in previous economic downturns, state revenues declined when real estate collections were stable.

That's not true for the Great Recession. Growth in real estate revenues has been declining since 2007.

Faced with declining local revenues and state aid reductions, localities reacted by cutting back services and their workforce. A survey of Virginia's 134 localities found that 79 of the 109 respondents reported that they delayed or canceled capital projects. Fifty-three increased fees, 52 cut education, 47 raised taxes, 45 laid off workers, 43 drew down reserves and 42 cut public safety programs.

According to an analysis of state unemployment data, 15,600 local government jobs disappeared between June 2009 and June 2010.

· It's understandable that struggling businesses don't want to pay taxes in the middle of a recession. But whether they are making a profit, breaking even or losing money, they still expect police cars and fire engines to come to their rescue when they are burglarized or smell smoke.

If legislators insist on meddling with city and county budgets even as they cut support for those localities, then they should be prepared to take over the services they are undermining. Let's see how quickly they respond to the next fire alarm in their community.
