At a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held jointly with the School Board of Prince Edward County, in the Prince Edward County Schools Career and Technical Center, Eagle Drive, Farmville, Virginia, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of November, 2010; at 6:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Dove called the School Board to order. Mr. Tillerson offered the invocation.

Chairman Fore called the Board of Supervisors to order at 6:05 p.m. stating the purpose is to meet jointly with the Prince Edward County School Board.

Following dinner, the School Board recognized the students involved with the dinner.

In Re: Traffic Safety Improvements

Dr. Smith asked for Board support to build Alternate Route 628 to improve the Routes 628/15/460 intersection. He also asked the Board to request VDOT update the 1999 study and include the traffic impact on the Route 460 ramp. Mr. Bartlett gave an update on Granite Falls and the Alternate Route 628 project. He said the final design for the Alternate 628 project is \$65,000; this is eligible for the Revenue Sharing Grant. This would allow for advertisement for construction bids in February 2011; the bid package will be an additional \$15,000.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to authorize the County Administrator to complete the engineering with Hurt & Proffitt on Alternate Route 628 and appropriate the funds to complete the engineering, up to \$65,000.

Supervisor Jones asked if the plans are good indefinitely; Mr. Bartlett said the Board could consider a special service district to fund Alternate 628 construction. The assessment applies only to the area that would see an immediate benefit.

Supervisor Campbell asked if Mr. [Robert] Fowler is paying \$50,000; Mr. Bartlett said the County paid that but if he goes forward with the project, he will pay the portion of the Revenue Sharing that would normally be paid by the County.

Chairman Fore returned to Supervisor Simpson's motion, to authorize the County Administrator to complete the engineering with Hurt & Proffitt on Alternate Route 628 and appropriate the funds to complete the engineering, up to \$65,000; the motion carried:

In Re: Declining State Revenue - Loss of Stimulus Funds

Ms. Wahrman said there is a \$242,000 anticipated shortfall due to the reduced ADM. Enrollment on March 31 determines the final FY11 budget figures; for FY 12, there is an anticipated revenue shortfall of \$407,136.00. Federal ARRA funds were not used for positions, but for programs and training, technology and ten special education tutors as temporary positions. Ms. Wahrman said in FY12, the state and ARRA revenue reduction is \$1,044,164.

Mr. Bartlett asked if the reductions will affect employees; Ms. Wahrman said the federal cuts will not, but it is not yet clear if the state funding cuts will affect the employees.

In Re: Education Jobs Fund - Short-Term Hiring

Dr. Smith reported several positions will be filled using Jobs Funds money to secure targeted specialized positions in areas of known weakness within the schools. These are short term, grant-funded positions that are not intended to be continuing after the Jobs Fund money timeframe runs out. Ms. Wahrman said the schools received a \$698,370 total award. Discussion followed regarding positions to be hired and/or supplemented. These are restricted funds for salaries and benefits only and cannot be used for any position within the school.

In Re: Capital Improvement Projects

Dr. Smith presented a review of the priorities and past expenditures.

In Re: Carryover - FY 2009 Unspent Funds/Escrow

Ms. Wahrman reported carryover funds for FY 2009 of \$377,413 (verified), and for FY 2010 of \$61,034 (unverified). Chairman Fore stated everyone else that had money left over turned it over to the County. Mr. Dove said the School Board requests the Board of Supervisors consideration to re-appropriate the carry-over to the schools.

Supervisor Jones asked how it would be spent and asked for a submission to the Board of Supervisors. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt requested a copy of recommendations from Cambridge, specifically which were

implemented, and why were the others not implemented. Dr. Smith said he will share the findings when

complete.

In Re: School Turnaround Update

Ms. Wahrman said the funding for the high school falls under the School Improvement Grant,

which is a three year funded program (FY 2011-FY 2013); the amount changes each year. These are

restricted funds and must be used to pay Cambridge, personnel benefits, purchased services, travel to

conferences and meetings to learn to do to work with Cambridge and their materials. The personnel and

benefits are not for teachers' salaries; they are for what is used in conjunction with Cambridge.

Dr. Smith said three years of grant funding have prevented the burden falling on the local

taxpayers for the turnaround efforts. Through the partnership of Cambridge and the use of the additional

funds, significant strides in the quality of the educational services provided can be made in the high school

which will also spill over into the middle and elementary schools. He then discussed the current "S.O.A.R.

to Success" program at the high school. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said the Cambridge program has brought about more parental and community support

assistance. Without that, it's going to fail." Discussion followed.

Chairman Fore called the special meeting to order, stating that the purpose of the meeting is for an update to the Sandy River Reservoir Water Treatment and Distribution project.

In Re: Sandy River Reservoir Water Treatment and Distribution Project Update

Mr. Jeff Kapanos, Draper Aden Associates, said the project is a month away from the next level estimate. He then presented an overview of the project.

Mr. Kapanos reviewed the site plan and projected eastern and western pipeline routes.

Mr. Mike Larson said the Virginia Department of Health made comments regarding the project; he said VDH requested a pilot study to be done beginning this fall. He said a small scale simulation will be done from a trailer unit with tanks, pumps, chemical feeds and lab equipment. Technicians will run a "plant" to demonstrate the treatability of water. He said the pilot study is being performed under the existing Interim Agreement budget, and additional pilot testing may be performed in the Comprehensive Plan.

Mr. Larson then reviewed the aeration process; he said VDH is concerned about aerating the reservoir but the issues could be avoided through proactive management of the Sandy River Reservoir, and that installation at a later date will not interfere with the operations of the plant. He said he wishes to provide operational flexibility with either green-sand coating on the filter or as a biological type of filter. He said discussion followed on the advantages of Granulated Activated Carbon (GAC) versus powdered activated carbon. He said the granulated activated carbon will be used in the pilot study. He said the VDH found the PER to be well done and appropriate for the purposes set forth.

Mr. Bartlett reported that representatives from Crewe, Burkeville, Hampden Sydney and Farmville were presented with the operational costs of the proposed water treatment plant; they are reviewing the information. He said he is to meet with representatives from Crewe on Tuesday, November 22. He said Hampden Sydney is in preliminary discussions, and are working on a proposal to donate their existing water system to Prince Edward County; in exchange for not charging them any connection charges. The County would then assume all maintenance and operating costs of the system. He said the Board will have to inquire if Farmville wishes to have an emergency connection; the Board needs to decide if it wishes to formally make such a request to the Town. He said options will include whether the County covers the cost entirely as the Town is a part of the County, or if the Town wishes to become a member of the Authority, if so, they should have some of the cost allocated to them.

Mr. Murray Taylor, Crowder Construction, reviewed the overall project cost. He said the estimates for the work on the intake were reviewed and found there was a drop of \$3 million from the March 2010 estimates to the July 2010 estimates.

Cheryl Stevens, Draper Aden Associates, reviewed the process of financial analysis, the allocated capacity, the 2013 demands and future demands, and financing options.

Mr. Bartlett said a method of allocation is to divide the costs; for example, the intake will provide eight million gallons. If Crewe wants one million gallons capacity, they would pay one-eighth of the cost of the intake. He said on the water plant, since it's a two million gallon capacity, if they want one million gallons, they would pay one-half of the cost. On the water lines, if the amount of the capacity of the line is five million gallons and Crewe would use one million gallons, they would pay one-fifth of the costs. He

said the assumption is the County would retain all the rights to the remainder of the capacity. On the other side of the Nottoway County line, Crewe and Burkeville are responsible for all costs.

Supervisor Wilck questioned Prince Edward County paying 7/8th of the cost of the intake. Mr. Bartlett said Prince Edward County would be paying more for the intake because the County would have the other seven million gallon capacity. On the operational costs, Crewe would be the largest user of the water, so they would be the largest payer of operational costs, which is different from capacity costs. Ms. Stevens said the figures given were an example and the actual numbers will change in approximately 30 days. The point of the plant is to have water capacity that will be available to meet the future growth needs of the county. The point of the analysis is to show the first draft of it, and the Board then makes the final decisions.

Mr. Larson stated the intake structure is the most oversized part of the project. It's much more difficult to go back and "up-size" the intake at a later date. The plant is a much smaller capacity; the intake is an eight million gallon per day structure, while the plant is only a two million gallon per day structure. The plant costs a lot more money than the intake structure.

Supervisor Wilck said if Crewe obtains the use of 75-80% of the water, certainly they should pay that much of the cost.

Ms. Stevens said Prince Edward County will pick up more of the cost of the intake but will be the one to benefit the most in the long term of this project.

Supervisor Gantt said an eight million gallon per day intake is to everyone's benefit.

Ms. Stevens then discussed the distribution lines to the east – along the High Bridge portion of Prince Edward County, including Crewe and Burkeville. She said the western portion includes Prince Edward County or Prince Edward County and Farmville. She then reviewed possible funding options. The projected water demands are used to determine size of the lines and size of the plant, and are different from the projections used to determine how much revenue the project might generate for the Heartland Authority. Current usage was studied and conservative usage models were projected to show detailed calculations of revenues that would be paid into the Authority to show the revenue stream.

Mr. Bartlett asked the Board to review the amounts of water use. Discussion followed on the assumptions of usage on a daily basis, such as variants of usage on regular days versus high usage days, such as for conventions or a fire.

Mr. Kapanos said the next steps include a fine-tuning estimate in mid-December. He said the pilot study will begin, Crowder has pricing packages and qualification packages out to local subcontractors and subcontractors that do utility work. The 30-35% design drawings on the treatment plant are being done. The following step includes partner negotiations and the final Comprehensive Agreement, and finally to construction.

Supervisor Wilck said it was mentioned that aeration costs and capital operational costs could be substantial; he asked at what point the Board will know what those are going to be and what is considered "substantial." Mr. Larson said the aeration cost could be in the \$500,000 – \$700,000 range, and the operational costs will be mostly power consumption. He said some blowers will need to be run for several months.

Supervisor Wilck then said that Wiley & Wilson comments stated "We found the PER to be well done and appropriate for the purposes set forth." He said Wiley & Wilson had said they indicated to Mr. Bartlett that there wasn't enough business to make this [project] justifiable.

Mr. Bartlett said Wiley & Wilson didn't use the word "justifiable."

Supervisor Gantt said the report states, "High annual unit cost of water production due to low water demands." He said the "need for project" section states there is little imminent need, but projections go out 20 years.

Supervisor Wilck said a speaker in the budget committee at the VACo meeting said that because of tight times and short money, the first thing that is recommended is to eliminate and stop all capital costs, and asked when the County would see a profit. Ms. Stevens said a profit will probably not be seen in the first five to ten years.

Mr. Bartlett said in December, there will be a guaranteed maximum price, according to the interim agreement. Under the PPEA process, if there are savings in construction costs, then there is a sharing of the savings. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt asked how the figure would be obtained for the cost of the water. Ms. Stevens said that the cost to run the plant is under \$600,000 per year, which includes no debt service.

Mr. Bartlett said the water system is an expensive proposition; regionalization grants will bring lower costs. He said regionalism is being pushed to make it financially advantageous to work as a region.

Ms. Stevens said that \$2.70 per 1,000 gallons to sell water to a partner is a reasonable amount. She said Crewe and Burkeville indicated that they would pay their portion of the debt service if they decide to partner with Prince Edward.

Ms. Stevens said VDH, VRA, Rural Development and the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission want regional projects; they drive the grant money.

Mr. Bartlett said the costs will be refined after the pilot study. Mr. Larson said the pilot study will also help to determine electric power costs.

Ms. Stevens explained the presentations to Crewe and Burkeville and the impact to those municipalities on their operational costs. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Wilck asked that as demand for water service increases, there will also be a demand for a waste water treatment plant, and if the cost for a water treatment plant will be more than the distribution plant. Mr. Bartlett said that is another issue and would be sometime in the future, and the cost would be more.

Supervisor Campbell asked if other localities were interested. Mr. Bartlett said he spoke with representatives from Keysville, and letters were sent to all surrounding incorporated towns and counties. He said Amelia and Cumberland Counties expressed some interest; Buckingham County would have greater difficulty because of the distance. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said the County Administrator of Charlotte County expressed interest; the Board has to determine how many partners they may want; he reminded the Board that the more partners or customers Prince Edward County has, the lower the water capacity for Prince Edward County. He also reminded the Board that other counties or municipalities would need to join the Authority at the beginning or they may not be able to join as it takes a unanimous vote of all members to allow a new member.

Supervisor Wilck said because of the best financial way to do it, the County has invested approximately \$5 million. He asked in order to get bonds we actually need to add \$5 million to each.

Supervisor Gantt asked about the line of credit. Mr. Bartlett said once the County has the final numbers, Davenport, the financial advisors for the County, will explain how best to make the existing loan permanent, long term. Discussion followed.

In Re: Granite Falls – Extension of Land Purchase Agreement / Grant Agreement

Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development, said that at the November 1, 2010 Industrial Development Authority (IDA) meeting, the Authority voted to extend the Granite Falls Purchase Agreement for one year, which will make the new closing date January 16, 2012. The IDA members also voted to extend the Granite Falls Grant Agreement by one year as well, with all other terms and conditions remaining the same. This means that the closing date is extended to January 16, 2012, the hotel project must be substantially complete by December 16, 2012 and that the Tax Increment Financing (TIF) will run through December 31, 2036. The IDA did not feel that there would be any hardship to the IDA or to the County by approving this extension since there is no other party interested in developing the subject 94 acre property at this time.

Mr. Bob Fowler, Prince Edward Development, LLC, gave an update on the Granite Falls project. He reviewed the specifications of the proposed hotel and conference center, and said that it will be managed by Crestline Hotels and Resorts, who currently operate 66 "Renaissance" hotels in Virginia. Mr. Fowler said there are two pages of accomplishments to date, but one remaining issue is to obtain the environmental permits, and they are in position to do so. He added an article written on November 2 states the third quarter rose to the highest growth rate ever recorded in U.S. hotel occupancy.

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ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 70-1. Due date of returns; penalty.

- (a) In accordance with Code of Virginia, § 58.1-3916, which authorizes the governing body of any county to provide by ordinance the time for filing annual returns of taxable tangible personal property, machinery and tools, and merchant's capital, the board of supervisors directs that annual returns of tangible personal property, machinery and tools, and merchants' capital shall be due on March 1 of each year.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully fail or refuse to file such returns at the time required herein or for making false statements in such returns with the intent to defraud.
- (c) Any person who shall violate subsection (b) of this ordinance and the amount of the tax lawfully assessed in connection with the return is \$1,000.00 or less shall be guilty of a class 3 misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$500.00. Any person who shall violate subsection (b) of this section and the amount of the tax lawfully assessed in connection with the return is more than \$1,000.00 shall be guilty of a class 1 misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$2,500.00 and up to 12 months imprisonment, either or both. (Ord. of 11-12-86, § VIII(23-43), (23-44); Ord. of 9-14-04)

In Re: Prospect Historical Society VDOT Enhancement Grant Application

Mrs. Carney said the Prospect Historical Society has requested assistance from the County in the Society's VDOT Enhancement Grant application, due December 1, 2010. As a result of the current construction estimates, the Society anticipates an application in the amount of \$215,000, which should be sufficient to complete the project.

Mr. Fred Floyd asked the Board to approve the resolution and requested Mrs. Carney be permitted to assist the Historical Society with the application.

Supervisor Wiley made a motion to approve the resolution and to allow the County Administrator to sign any and all documents associated with the application.

Supervisor Gantt questioned the County's responsibility for the building; Chairman Fore said an agreement with the DCR has been presented.

Mrs. Carney stated the letter from the Prospect Historical Society has two requests:

• The VDOT grant application requires a Resolution of Support by the governing municipality,

which requires the County to accept responsibility for maintenance and operating cost of any

structure erected with VDOT grant funds. Historically it has been the position of the Prince

Edward County Board of Supervisors to not accept such responsibility for this project. To resolve

this issue the Historical Society has partnered with the Virginia Department of Conservation and

Recreation (DCR) to use the facility as a trail head for High Bridge Trail State Park. In return,

DCR is willing to assume responsibility for the maintenance and operating cost of the structure

under a lease agreement which is being developed at this time. Under a separate agreement, the

building becomes the property of the Commonwealth if the building is abandoned, which would

occur if the Prospect Historical Society ceased to exist.

Since the grant process and management for the Prospect Depot Restoration Project has gotten

very complicated, the Prospect Historical Society is requesting approval by the Board of

Supervisors for the continued assistance for the Prospect Depot Project by Sharon Carney.

The Prospect Historical Society has already received \$313,000 in Enhancement Grant funds and

has completed 30% plans for the project. The preliminary plans have already passed the Virginia

Department of Historical Resources (DHR), Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), and

VDOT review. It is anticipated for 90% plans to be ready by the end of December 2010.

At the request of Chairman Fore, Supervisor Wiley amended her motion to approve a resolution

and to allow the County Administrator to sign any and all documents associated with the application, but

not to approve the signing of the contract until the lease agreement is signed between the Prospect

TRANSPORTATION ENHANCEMENT GRANT PROGRAM PROJECT ENDORSEMENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, in accordance with Commonwealth Transportation Board construction allocation procedures, it is necessary that a request by resolution be received from the sponsoring local jurisdiction or state/federal agency in order that the Virginia Department of Transportation establish an enhancement project in the County of Prince Edward, Virginia;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Prince Edward requests the Commonwealth Transportation Board to establish a project for the improvement of the Prospect Depot Transportation Museum; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward hereby agrees to provide a minimum of 20 percent of the total cost for planning and design, right of way, and construction of this project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward hereby agrees to enter into an agreement with the Virginia Department of Transportation to provide oversight that ensures the project is developed in accordance with all state and federal requirements for design, right of way acquisition, and construction of a federally funded transportation project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County of Prince Edward will be responsible for maintenance, upkeep and operating costs of any facility constructed with Enhancement Program funds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that should the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward subsequently elect to cancel this project the County of Prince Edward hereby agrees to reimburse the Virginia Department of Transportation for the total amount of costs expended by the Department through the date the Department is notified of such cancellation. The County of Prince Edward also agrees to repay any funds previously reimbursed that are later deemed ineligible by the Federal Highway Administration.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett reported an estimate was received for the repair of the Atrium roof; HydroStop submitted an estimate of \$2,800. They would not remove all the shingles but would go up four feet, and

would repair the 'dip' where the gutters are higher than the roof line. He said the money would come from the General Property Fund and would not require further appropriations.

Mr. Bartlett said he is still in negotiations in seeking a contractor to assist in finding improvements to the County's health insurance, to find a better plan at a lesser cost.

Mr. Bartlett then said that approximately six to eight months ago, Buggs Island Wireless Broadband project was tested; he said the beta site did not meet technical requirements. He said Buggs Island will be returning to Rural USDA Utilities for approval and a press release will be forthcoming.

In Re: SCOPE Building Improvements

Mr. Bartlett said improvements are underway at the SCOPE Building. The work crews at the Piedmont Regional Jail are in the process (or have completed) the painting of the exterior trim, some yard work, the painting of the walls and kitchen cabinets on the interior, the buffing and waxing of the floor and some work on the windows. The current users of the building have been asked to please remove their belongings from the main room, kitchen and the storage closets. Anything remaining will be sorted and disposed of, as needed, following Board action.

Mr. Bartlett stated that in order to complete the immediate renovations and upgrades, the Board is asked to consider an appropriation of \$5,000 to enable County staff to purchase folding tables and folding chairs, window coverings, tile for both bathrooms, and new Formica for the kitchen counters (to be installed by county staff) that will enable us to function as a senior center and also a public-use rental facility.

In Re: Peddler License Fee Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett said the Peddler License Fee Committee comprising of Supervisor McKay (Chair),

Supervisor Campbell, and Supervisor Simpson met October 8, 2010 and November 2, 2010 with the

County Attorney, County Administrator, Treasurer and Commissioner of the Revenue.

Supervisor McKay said the committee discussed the options for how to structure an ordinance to

encourage activity and generate revenue, or for policing purposes to control activity which would require a

restrictive ordinance. The Committee reviewed ordinances from other counties and discussed, in depth,

whether the problem warrants an ordinance and the creation of an administrative and enforcement process.

Supervisor McKay stated one of the biggest complaints is that itinerant merchants are seemingly

not paying state sales tax. He said he contacted the Virginia Department of Taxation regarding the

enforcement process for the payment of sales tax and reported this to the committee.

Supervisor McKay said the Committee recommends no action is needed at this time by the Board

of Supervisors; however, the Committee strongly encourages citizens who learn of merchants not requiring

the payment of sales tax be reported to the County or the Virginia Department of Taxation.

Supervisor McKay made a motion that the Board of Supervisors take no action at this time; the

Chairman Fore said given the action of the Board, the committee is dismissed.

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In Re: Poplar Hill CDA

Mr. Bartlett said that upon the repurchase of property by Hampden-Sydney, taxes were paid .which will generate some legal issues.

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, said the Poplar Hill CDA was the subject of a judgment that was rendered in favor of Cline Design Associates, who has filed a garnishment action in the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County with the County being the garnishee, requesting that any funds that are due and owing from the County to the Poplar Hill CDA be paid to Cline Design Associates. He said the bond holder, Merchant & Traders Trust Company, which is the trustee on the bonds, filed a motion to intervene claiming that the special levy proceeds have been pledged them pursuant to an agreement and that therefore, they are not subject to being garnished by Cline Design Associates.

He said the court had a hearing and granted Merchant & Traders Trust Company's motion to intervene in the garnishment; in the interim, because of the foreclosure by Hampden-Sydney on the note and their bidding the property in, they have remitted the real estate taxes on the property that they purchased as well as the special assessment. The special assessment funds amount to \$39,171.00 which is currently in the hands of the County Treasurer. The return date for the garnishment is November 19 [2010].

Mr. Ennis said he prepared a pleading on behalf of the County to file with the Court to pay the \$39,171.00 to the Clerk of the Circuit Court who will hold it pending a ruling from the court on whether or not Merchants & Traders Trust Company has a prior lien on the proceeds of the special assessment or whether it is subject to the garnishment by Cline Design Associates. He requested authorization from the Board for the Treasurer to pay the money to the Clerk of Circuit Court and to file the pleading with the court which should effectively dismiss the County from this garnishment.

Chairman Fore asked if there was any way that the CDA could retain any of the money. Mr. Ennis said he is not privy to the agreement that the CDA made with respect to the bonds with Merchants & Traders Trust Company; he does not know if all of the proceeds are payable to the trustee to be disbursed to the bondholders or whether there is any provision for a retention of any of those funds or not. The County's obligation is simply to pay whatever money comes in that would be remitted to the CDA, to pay

to creditor if the court determines that the creditor is entitled to the money, or to Merchants & Traders Trust Company should the court determine that the agreement is controlling and that those assets have already been pledged as security for the bond financing and therefore not available to be garnished. He said he is unsure who is in possession of the agreements; he did not want to get the County too deeply embroiled in the garnishment proceeding because the County has no right to retain any of the money. The agreement with the CDA is that they request the special assessment, the County levies the special assessment, collects it and remits it in its entirety to the CDA.

Chairman Fore asked if it would or should be in the agreement that established the CDA; Mr. Ennis said probably not. Chairman Fore then asked if it would be in the agreement between the CDA and the bondholders and where that document would be; Mr. Ennis said it would have to be, and would assume Merchants & Traders Trust Company would have that document. He said this judgment is not going to go away and they can file a summons in garnishment repeatedly if the court determines that the Merchants & Traders Trust Company does not have a prior lien on the proceeds from the special assessment. If the court does rule that, then that ruling would stand for future garnishments with respect to this particular creditor. It also doesn't mean that there might not be other creditors who have gone to judgment who may seek to reach the same proceeds, because there is no other income to the CDA other than the proceeds from the special assessment that is due from the county if and when they request that the special assessment be made.

Chairman Fore said the CDA is active, and asked if the CDA could retain a portion of those funds.

Mr. Ennis said he does not believe the court will not have the ability to reform the contract between the trustee and the CDA; they will rule on the validity of the prior lien but they will not have the ability to reform the agreement, and this will only resolve this action with this creditor.

Supervisor Gantt asked the total of the judgment. Mr. Ennis said it is a private financing agreement that involves M&T Bank. They are not the creditor at this point; they are the trustee for the bondholders and there may not have been any default at this point by the trustee or the CDA as far as remitting those proceeds to the trustee to distribute to the bondholders as income on the bonds. It may be imminent and will be so if the court rules the money is subject to the garnishment rather than subject to the prior pledge of those proceeds as security for the bond financing. Mr. Ennis said it started out at

approximately \$400,000 but now may be slightly over \$900,000 due to the judgment rate of interest and

attorney's fees. He added there have been other garnishments by Cline Design Associates where the

County has answered that there are no funds on hand because no one had paid the special assessment,

which may not have even been requested for 2010. There was a failure to receive the necessary affidavits

because it requires the consent of all the property holders.

Supervisor Gantt asked if this will have an effect on the purchase of the property. Mr. Ennis said

it only concerns the golf course itself, not the surrounding real estate. He said it ultimately affects the

County because water and sewer lines run under the golf course and there are no entities that are active who

can grant the necessary easements or dedicated those lines to the County, which does affect the ability to

develop the surrounding real estate. He said it is necessary that the Treasurer remits a check for \$39,171.00

to the Clerk of the Circuit Court, which will hold the monies until the court makes a ruling which would

release the County from the garnishment.

Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to authorize the County Attorney to transfer \$39,171.00 from the

Treasurer to the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

Further discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt asked about the easements on the water lines. Mr. Bartlett said not yet; he said

the trustee stated on November 18th there will be an advertisement, and the trustee (the bondholders) will

acquire the property, which is the golf course, much like Hampden-Sydney did. He said the bondholders

will then have clear title to the golf course, and they will make the decision of what to do. Mr. Ennis added

they need to dedicate the lines underneath the property they own to the County.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to authorize the County Attorney to transfer \$39,171.00 from the

Treasurer to the Clerk of the Circuit Court; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said this was never County money. This was the special tax assessment that even if there were no liens whatsoever, it would always go to the CDA or to the developer, and that all of these funds were paid by the property owners. Mr. Ennis added the County is just the conduit, or collection entity and it was always intended to be remitted to the CDA.

In Re: Tobacco Commission Grant Awards

Mrs. Carney said Prince Edward County has just been informed by the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission that the Commission approved two grant requests at their October 28, 2010 meeting for the Granite Falls Workforce Training Center. A Special Projects Grant in the amount of \$1.5 million is to go towards the construction of the Center and \$145,848 from the Southside Economic Development grant Fund program is to be used for architectural and engineering fees associated with the construction of the Workforce Training Center.

She said to accept the grant funds, the necessary documents must be signed and returned to the Commission no later than December 8, 2010, and requested the Board to authorize the Chairman and/or the County Administrator to execute the required documents to enable the County to accept the grant funds. She said execution of the grant agreements does not negate the possibility of declining the funds at a later date prior to the expenditure of any funds if the Board should chose to do so. She added that if for any reason, if the Granite Falls site is not completed, the money can be used for a Workforce Training Center at another location.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to authorize the Chairman and/or the County Administrator to execute the necessary Grant Agreements for two Tobacco Commission Grants: one for \$1.5 million for construction of the Granite Falls Workforce Training Center and one for \$145,848 for architectural and engineering fees associated with the construction of the Granite Falls Workforce Training Center; the motion carried:

In Re: Regional Tourism Grant Award

Mr. Bartlett reported "The Best Part of the Civil War ... The End," a regional tourism marketing partnership comprising the Counties of Prince Edward, Amelia and Appomattox, the Town of Appomattox and the Department of Conservation and Recreation (State Parks) was awarded a \$15,000 Marketing Leverage Grant by the Virginia Tourism Corporation to be used to market and promote the communities which were involved in the closing days of the American Civil War. The \$15,000 is leveraged by \$30,000 of local funds (provided by the five partners). For Prince Edward County, we receive the benefit of \$45,000 of marketing and tourism promotion for a local investment of \$10,000. No additional county funds are needed, as this program was budgeted in the FY11 tourism budget. Prince Edward County will administer this grant.

Thomas Pairet, Farmville Town Council, entered the meeting at this time.

Mr. Gerald Spates, Farmville Town Manager, stated \$4.2 million was borrowed for the library; of that, \$274,249.09 remains. Mr. Spates said that at the dedication ceremony, it was discussed that the hours possibly be extended by three hours on Monday through Thursdays, and add Sunday hours. He said

\$30,000 would be needed in additional funding to cover the costs of the extended hours and staff for one year. Mr. Spates proposed splitting the cost from the remaining money, two-thirds from Prince Edward County and one-third from the Town of Farmville. He said the Town is waiting for the final bill and will then reimburse the County.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Wilck, to share the cost of \$30,000 from the remaining funds, two-thirds from Prince Edward County and one-third from the Town of Farmville, for the extension of hours for the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library for one year.

Dr. Gordon said the money needs to be put in during the nurturing phase; this is a fine-tuning of the original project.

After some discussion, Chairman Fore asked that Ms. Peggy Epperson, Director of the library, keep separate usage records for the additional hours. Mr. Whitus said there have been rave reviews about the library and the main concern has been the hours of operation.

Chairman Fore restated Supervisor Simpson's motion to share the cost of \$30,000 from the remaining funds, two-thirds from Prince Edward County and one-third from the Town of Farmville, for the extension of hours for the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said that at the previous Board of Supervisors meeting, VDOT Transportation Enhancement Grant for the Prospect Historical Society and the train station. A request from the [Robert Russa] Moton Museum had been presented during the previous Board meeting which had been tabled because of resolution requiring the County to assume the operation and maintenance costs of the museum, in case they could no longer operate for whatever reason. He said he received a telephone call from a representative of the Moton Museum and told them the Board had never received a request on how to handle the issue, and therefore there was no action taken. He said he and Mrs. Sarah Puckett contacted a

representative from VDOT in Richmond and asked if the new grant was mainly for a parking lot and bus pull-out, and that if the Board approved that, does it limit the responsibility only to the parking lot or to operating the whole museum. He said an answer is forthcoming, and recommends approval to submit the application but not to provide the resolution. Mr. Bartlett said the application would then go into 'incomplete' status after December 14; he also spoke to the museum director regarding DCR taking over for the Historical Society as a sponsor and actually owning a portion of the train station. The director of the Moton Museum will attempt to find a sponsor other than the County.

Mr. Bartlett said the authorization to submit the grant would not obligate the County in any way, but would authorize the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) to work as the grant administrator; the deadline for the grant is December 1.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Simpson, to authorize the County Administrator to submit the application and that the CRC be requested to administer the grant; the motion carried:

Supervisor Wilck said VDOT is asking for suggestions and requests of roadways; he asked if the funding may be used towards projects that are already underway, such as the work from the Bridge or on Route 628. Mrs. Puckett said the Revenue Sharing funding can be used to advance projects in the Six Year Plan; it requires the County to match state funding.

Mr. Bartlett said a second issue is that there is funding that was determined to be available by the audit. There is a process that the engineers that are working with Route 628 are going through; they are going to a function where some of that can be explained. There is going to be a few \$100 million that will be "freed up." The Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) will determine and present the process on how to apply; most of the funding goes to projects that are already completely designed or underway, such

as the Route 15 project from Route 628 to Route 133, Kingsville. He said it may also be applied to other projects.

Mrs. Puckett said the Six Year Plan is state and federal money; the County can apply for Revenue Sharing funding to advance a Six-Year Plan project and put local money in to advance the projects faster.

Supervisor Gantt said the Carbone building has been sold and cleaned up, and is available for economic development use. Mr. Bartlett said the building has been cleaned and painted, roll-up doors have been installed. He said the building also has landing docks and is on a 40-acre lot, 30 of which are forested. Discussion followed.

Mr. Gerald Spates gave an update on the INS Facility; he said there are currently 278 detainess and 140 employees, and expansion is expected in the near future, with an expectation of up to 224 employees. He said prospective employees must undergo a governmental background check. He said a medical program has been secured through the federal government.

Chairman Fore asked about the general attitude of the detainees. Mr. Spates said it is very good and some wish to stay; some claim political asylum, which must be proven that their life is in danger if they are returned to their home country. Mr. Spates said a group of investors own the building; the Town gave them the 50 acres of land which was purchased from Johnny Bollinger for \$50,000. He said the Town of Farmville has a contract with the Federal government and have subcontracted with the private developer. The Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission helped with two grants; one for the site work and one for sewer. The total was \$600,000 for both grants. The Town of Farmville has no obligation. There is \$12 million invested in the building; they have a \$2 million payroll.

Mr. Bartlett asked if the ICE Facility pays business tax to the Town; Mr. Spates said it does.

Supervisor Gantt asked if there are any businesses coming; Mr. Spates said a restaurant is planning to open and a 72-room Holiday Inn Suites is expected. Discussion followed on the commercial possibilities along Alternate Route 628 and several marketing projects held jointly with the Town and County. Mr. Bartlett said this area attracts from seven counties and has Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney College. Further discussion followed on the economic growth of the Town and County. Supervisor Simpson said the Town of Farmville and Prince Edward County have been working together as long as he has been on the Board, citing examples of the YMCA, Lowes, Social Security building, the

housing development and the water and sewer for the housing development. Mr. Spates said the library is a prime example, and all should be proud of what has been accomplished.

Supervisor Wiley asked about the parking situation. Mr. Spates said the parking lot behind the courthouse is working for the most part; he reported there are some issues on Main Street. He said a bus runs from Lancer Park to the University campus.

Discussion followed on the Farmer's Market. He said \$102,000 from the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission. Mr. Spates said they are waiting on final approval on the plans from VDOT on the downtown area and then will be going to bid.

Chairman Fore thanked all for attending and anticipated another meeting be held in about six months.

RE: FY2012 Revenue Sharing Program - Call for Letters of Intent

The Revenue Sharing Program has a track record of successfully leveraging local and state funding to complete a myriad of important transportation projects across the Commonwealth. In recent years this program has been funded with up to \$50 million in state funds to be matched with local funds. This year (FY2011) the program was capped at \$15 million in state funding, resulting in many of you not fully receiving the funding you requested.

Based on feedback from you and members of the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB), Secretary Connaughton asked that I solicit your interest in participating in the program for the next fiscal year (FY2012). By requesting your interest now, I can present to the CTB the amount of state funds required to fully maximize local participation in advance of the finalization of the FY2012 budget.

In order to do this, we are asking you to provide us with a letter of intent, identifying the amount of funding you will be requesting for FY 2012 (not to exceed \$1 million in state funding). Please provide this letter of intent to your local VDOT representative no later than December 17, 2010. This will not formally commit your Board or Council. It will simply provide the CTB with an estimate of the anticipated interest in the program.

As in previous years, a formal application, along with a supporting resolution from your locality, would subsequently be submitted by Friday, April 15, 2011 for each project you wish to be considered for FY 2012 funding. The application along with the Revenue Sharing Program Policy of the Commonwealth Transportation Board can be found on our website, located at: http://www.virginiadot.org/business/local-assistance.asp.

As we discussed with you and the County Board of Supervisors on November 13, 2010, we have reviewed the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) comments regarding the Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) that was submitted for this project. The majority of their comments are being addressed; however, one of their recommendations was to perform a field run pilot treatability study. We decided to move forward with the pilot study at no additional cost to the County.

With approval of the VDH, the pilot study has been initiated and the field work is expected to be completed December 7, 2010. 

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding, dated	, between
Prince Edward County, Virginia ("County") and the Virginia Department of Cons	ervation and
Recreation ("DCR"), hereby states as follows:	

DCR has developed a former railroad corridor into the High Bridge Trail State Park ("Trail"). A 10-foot wide trail has been installed in the former railroad bed.

The County has a vested interest in using up to 7 miles of the Trail for the construction of a water transmission main which will convey water from a new water treatment plant located near the Sandy River Reservoir to an existing water system serving the Town of Crewe ("Project"). The Project will benefit DCR by providing accessibility to water at several locations along the Project.

As the success of the Project would be beneficial to each party and to the Commonwealth of Virginia as a whole, the parties agree to and acknowledge the following:

- 1) **Construction Issues**. Crowder Construction Company ("Contractor") will be responsible for the installation of the water transmission main. The following conditions will apply:
 - a. Portions of the Trail will be closed to the public during construction activities. The Contractor will provide construction signage and DCR will post trail closure information on their website.
 - b. Construction of the Project will adhere to a schedule agreed upon by DCR, the County, and the Contractor. Inclement weather may affect the duration of the construction.
 - c. Contractor shall install the water main along one side of the Trail wherever possible.
 - d. Where disturbed, Contractor will restore the surface of the Trail as closely as possible to original conditions. This will include grading and compacting the entire trail surface to create a consistent surface throughout the construction area. In the likely event that material will be added to the trail surface the material added must meet DCR specifications.
- 2) Maintenance Issues. The County will be responsible for the maintenance of the water main. Maintenance includes occasional flushing of water main at hydrants, necessary repairs to the water main, and occasional exercising of valves. Construction equipment and vehicles may be required on the Trail to perform maintenance and repairs. The County will coordinate all activities with DCR to ensure the safety of the public.
- 3) Accessibility. The County will be provided access to the Trail in order to perform maintenance or any necessary repairs of the water main. The County will coordinate with DCR those times that access is necessary.


- 4) **Easement Development**. It is the mutual understanding of the parties that utility easements will be required for the water transmission main.
 - a. All easements over state-owned property must meet all applicable legal requirements and be approved by the Governor.
 - b. The parties shall cooperate in the County's development of a utility easement along the Project.
 - c. In order to expedite state approval of the County's requests, the DCR Director may authorize the local State Park Manager for the High Bridge Trail State Park to grant park-related work permits to the County for any construction activities within the Project.
- 5) **Point of Contact**. The parties shall each maintain one point of contact in regards to the Project. Each party's point of contact shall be responsible for communicating with the other parties and facilitating the Project in any way possible.
 - a. The County's point of contact shall be the office of the County Administrator (current contact is Sarah Puckett), 111 South Street, Third Floor, Farmville, Virginia 23901.
 - b. DCR's initial point of contact shall be the office of Assistant Director, Division of State Parks (currently held by G. Warren Wahl), 203 Governor Street, Suite 306, Richmond, Virginia 23219.
- 6) **Good Faith**. The parties intend this Memorandum of Understanding to be a foundation for a good faith and reasonable relationship with one another during all phases of construction and maintenance of the Project.
- 7) This document represents a statement of the intent of the parties. It is not a legally binding contract and does not create any enforceable rights in either of the parties or any third party.
- 8) Nothing herein shall negate requirements in state law.

A Review of the State-Local Fiscal Relationship in Virginia:

Not So Good Now and It Could Get Worse

by Neal Menkes

Introduction

This article reviews the fiscal relationship between the Commonwealth of Virginia and her localities, examining the relationship's need, its legal basis, and the tensions that sometimes drive both sides to distraction. At the end, I'll suggest some ways to clarify and strengthen the relationship.

But, first let me offer you a joke. You may or may not be amused. The point, however, is to illustrate the attitudes held by some General Assembly members whenever local government officials chide them about state appropriations for financial assistance.

Chernov, the shnorrer (a Yiddish word for a free-loader), had a wealthy patron who gave him a handsome stipend—never less than 500 rubles. One year, the rich man gave him only 250 rubles. Chernov demanded to know why. The wealthy man apologized, saying that his expenses had to be cut because his son had married an actress and stuck him with all of the bills. "Well, of all the chutzpah!" roared Chernov. "If your son wants to support an actress that's his business. But how dare he do it with my money!" 1

If you substitute "local governments" for Chernov the shnorrer, "General Assembly" for the wealthy man, and the Personal Property Tax Relief Act (the so-called "Car Tax Relief Act") for the son and his actress wife, you have a capsulated version of the 2010 budget debates in which the General Assembly and the governor fully restored state appropriations for the car tax relief program while

cutting state aid programs in public education, public safety, and others services.

The State-Local Relationship is Not Close

Unlike computer dating, compatibility is not at the heart of the state-local relationship. The partnership is built on a simple truth. Each side needs the other, regardless of any likes and dislikes. The state relies on local governments to deliver core programs such as education, public safety, and social services. Using local governments for service delivery saves the state from having to hire more employees and provides a bonus of additional local revenues to help shoulder the load. As Virginia's Secretary of Finance, Richard D. Brown, told a Governor's Reform Commission subcommittee, the state is "in effect a financier of services" and "not really a service provider."2 Although the thrust of Brown's statement is correct, it should be noted that the state is the direct provider for a number of services including highways (except municipal maintenance), the state police, higher education (including community colleges), and penitentiaries.

How Do Local Governments Benefit from Their Partnership with the State?

So what do local governments get from this relationship? The answer is plenty. The state provides localities with legal authority along with financial and technical assistance to provide public services. Localities also gain a buffer between them and the federal government — an entity that can understand and translate federal bureaucratic dictates into Virginia-style governance and that can funnel federal dollars from Washington to local governments.

Yes, the fiscal relationship between the state and localities is a partnership, but it is not an equal partnership. Some entity has to be in charge, and from a legal perspective the Constitution of Virginia designates the state, through the General Assembly, as that entity. In matters of establishing or even disestablishing localities, setting public education standards and allocating their costs, or determining property assessment procedures, the commonwealth rules.

- The General Assembly can by general law provide for the organization, government, powers, change of boundaries, consolidation and dissolution of counties, cities, towns, and regional governments. The General Assembly may also provide by special act for the organization, government and powers of any county, city, town, or regional government, including such powers of legislation, taxation and assessment as the General Assembly may determine... (Article VII, Section 2)
- Standards of quality for the school divisions are determined and prescribed by the Board of Education, subject to revision only by the General Assembly. The legislature determines the manner in which funds are to be provided for the cost of maintaining an educational program meeting the prescribed standards of quality, and provides for the apportionment of the cost of such program between the commonwealth and the local units of government comprising such school divisions. Each unit of local government provides its portion of such cost by local taxes or from other available funds. (Article VIII, Section 2)
- The General Assembly can establish the procedure and schedule for assessing local taxes on real estate, coal and other mineral lands, and tangible personal property. (Article X, Section 4)

Dillon's Rule

In addition, there is a lot of confusion about the application of what is known as Dillon's Rule. The rule stems from an 1868 Iowa court case that was

decided by federal judge John Forrest Dillon.3 The rule construes grants of power to localities very narrowly. The bottom line is that if there is a question about a local government's power or authority, then the local government does not receive the benefit of the doubt. Under Dillon's rule, one must assume that the local government does not have the power in question. In legal language, the first part of the rule reads like this: local governments have only three types of powers, those granted in express words, those necessarily or fairly implied in or incident to the powers expressly granted, and those essential to the declared objects and purposes of the governing body, not simply convenient, but indispensable. In Virginia, Dillon's Rule is woven throughout the commonwealth's governing and financial relationship with localities through statute and judicial decision.

It is the second part of Dillon's Rule, however, that puts local government powers in a vise. This part states that if there is any reasonable doubt whether a power has been conferred on a local government, then the power has not been conferred.4 So, what does this all mean in terms of financial resources? As editorialized in the Virginian-Pilot, "(c)ities and counties long ago got stuck with the most loathsome taxes because they're not the ones who carved up the revenue pie. State leaders took the taxes that give the least offense. Income taxes are deducted from paychecks. Sales taxes are virtually invisible to most consumers. Localities, by default, were left stranded on the "Island of Misfit Taxes."5 And, in case you are wondering about the importance of these taxes, the commonwealth collected \$9.1 billion and \$3.8 billion in individual income and sales taxes, respectively, in FY 2010.6

What are these local tax monsters that amounted to over \$14.4 billion in FY 2009? First and foremost they include property taxes (see Table 1). According to the Auditor of Public Accounts, more than three-fourths of all local tax revenues came from property taxes, a category that includes real estate taxes as well as taxes on personal property, machinery and tools, merchants' capital, and public service corporation property.⁷

Other local taxes include the 1 percent local option sales and use tax, the business, professional and occupational license tax (popularly known as the BPOL tax), the restaurant food tax, taxes on communications, the consumer utilities tax, hotel and motel room taxes, and the motor vehicle license tax. Thus, with fiscal resources significantly dependent upon property rather than income or economic transactions and without the authority to expand or create new resources, local governments are definitely the junior partner in this fiscal relationship.

Table 2 shows where local governments spent their dollars in FY 2009 and the sources of funds—local, state and federal. In all cases local government was the dominant funding source.

It is interesting to note that the state provided 44.9 percent of the \$13.8 billion spent on public education, with the federal government kicking in another 6.7 percent. Local governments provided the remaining 48.4 percent-a share that has remained fairly consistent in recent years. Yet it is the state and federal governments that drive the preponderance of education costs through their policy- and rule-making roles. As Mel Brooks said in his film comedy, History of the World: Part I, "It's good to be the king."

As further shown in Table 2, local government provided the lion's share of funds for expenditures on such important activities

as public safety, public works, general government administration, community development, and parks, recreation, and cultural activities. In fact, the Auditor of Public Accounts reported that in FY 2009 the commonwealth provided less than one-third of the revenue for all of local government spending notwithstanding state mandates.

Fiscal Tension: The State Perspective

Thirty-four year ago in FY 1976 the total amount of aid to Virginia local governments was over \$1 billion from all fund sources (state general, state non-general, and federal) according to an article in the archives of this newsletter. The authors wrote "(t)he most notable recent characteristic of Virginia government finance has been its growth; and during the ten-year period 1966-1976, the



fastest growing category was state aid to local governments." In addition, they found that "(s)tate aid is a major source of funds for local governments in Virginia, composing about one-third of their general revenue."9

How things do change and how they remain the same! Today state financial assistance still comprises roughly one-third of local budgets while almost half of the state general fund budget is appropriated as state financial assistance to localities (see **Figure 1**).

Since that article more than three decades ago, state general fund dollars alone surpass the \$1 billion from all funds the authors reported as total local aid. Today, just five state aid programs,

comprising over 95 percent of the general fund dollars appropriated for state financial assistance, exceed \$6.7 billion in FY2011 and in FY2012 (see Table 3).

Politics and Economic Growth Push State Spending and Aid to Localities

What propelled the over 600 percent surge in state aid compared to the general fund growth of 455 percent since 1981 as shown in Figure 2? The answer is more than "inflation" because the \$1 billion in aid to local governments in 1976 dollars would equal some \$3 billion today. 10 The answer is arguably a combination of the state's general economic and population growth, and the interplay of policy and politics. Beginning with Governor Charles Robb, state spending on public education surpassed \$1.1 billion in nominal dollars for the first time, 11 and Virginia teachers' salaries were raised to the highest in the Southeast boosting the state's national rank from 34th to 26th in the nation. 12 Eight years earlier state education spending barely topped \$404.5 million.¹³ Also, voter interest in public education sparked legislative studies and initiatives and more rigorous state standards. All of these actions resulted in substantial state and local investments in education.

However, the increase in state aid also popped up in some unexpected places. For example, Governor Jim Gilmore's pledge to put an ax to the car tax led to a tax relief program, which grew from an initial annual appropriation of \$210.7 million to a cap of \$950 million. In addition to the substantial general fund appropriations, the car tax relief program irrevocably changed the state-local fiscal relationship. The state, as "senior partner," transformed this local revenue source into a political "litmus test" requiring governors and legislators to clevate the car tax relief program as the top



state spending priority. Local elected officials can increase car tax rates but better be able to persuade the electorate that other choices would be far more painful.

Indeed, Figure 3 tells us that the growth in state aid is not necessarily tied to increases in the state general fund. In some years, state aid climbed while general fund revenues lagged behind. And, in other years, growth in general fund revenue outstripped state financial assistance.

Thus, a state official might assert that there really is no problem in the fiscal relationship. Governors and General Assemblies alike have proposed and appropriated billions of state dollars for education, law enforcement, other core services, and tax relief in good and bad economic times. How can any reasonable person believe that the state isn't living up to its funding commitments?

It is a persuasive argument, but a closer examination of the numbers behind Figure 3, indicates that the spikes in state aid can be traced, in large part, to car tax relief and, even more importantly, to efforts to re-set or re-benchmark public education spending. Re-benchmarking is the process to estimate the total prevailing cost of operating Virginia's public schools, using updated student costs and other technical data. The criticisms of re-benchmarking are twofold: 1) state officials say the cost is too expensive, and 2) locals complain that using two-year old data distorts the true costs.

In the last three biennia (2004-06, 2006-08, and 2008-10), re-benchmarking totaled \$1.2 billion, \$1.5 billion, and \$1.1 billion, respectively.

For the 2010-12 biennium, the re-benchmarking appropriation was in free fall, dropping to \$138 million as a result of the state's revenue challenges, policy changes in education finance, and shifting state budget priorities.

Fiscal Tension: The Local Perspective

Sometimes local officials feel that the General Assembly and the governor do not listen to their concerns. The state officials hear the locals talk about:


- unfunded or partially funded state mandates in education, local employee benefits, and social services;
- creaky tax mechanisms that fixate on 18th century notions of economics;¹⁴ and
- unmet education, transportation and social services needs that hurt economic development efforts.

But do local officials have a case? Take another look at Table 3, which says "Yes they do." Did you notice that the general fund appropriation for public education in FY 2011 is \$31 million less than in FY 2010, \$869 million less than in FY 2009, and a whopping \$1,029 million less than in FY 2008?

Figure 4 also shows a slump in state support for public education, particularly in general fund dollars. Indeed, without lottery dollars and stimulus money from Washington to prop up the FY 2011 estimated distributions, state support for K-12 would be almost a re-play of FY 2005.


Localities are already spending \$3.1 billion or almost 92 percent more each year than is required to match state dollars. ¹⁵ This is not aspirational spending. Local governments make this commitment in order to meet state-promulgated Standards of Accreditation and Standards of Learning. No community wants to boast having an unaccredited school system. And, no one has figured out how to make the slogan "Come invest in our community—both our schools and

students are failing" into an effective economic development strategy.


Figure 5: State General Fund Aid to Local Governments, FY 2005 to FY 2010

Although the Car Tax Relief Program has held steady at \$950 million, state support in the other local aid categories has stagnated or dropped since FY 2008 as shown in Figure 5.¹⁶

The question confronting cities, towns and counties is how much longer can local taxes make up for state budget cuts. The answer does not provide comfort. This past summer, the Virginia Municipal League (VML) and the Virginia


Association of Counties (VACo) took the fiscal pulse of Virginia's cities and counties through their third annual survey of chief executive officers. The findings were grim. Figure 6 shows that the basic staple of local finance, the real estate tax, is staggering from the recession and the painfully slow recovery. Since FY 2007, double-digit revenue growth faded to single-digit and now is plumbing negative growth. According to the VML-VACo survey, real estate assessments dropped an average of -5 percent across the state from 2009 to 2010. It is likely that residential assessments will continue to decrease.

Because real estate collections make up so much of local taxes and because of the lingering effect of the recession, local revenue growth actually contracted in FY 2010. This revenue contraction shown in **Figure 7** is expected to continue in FY 2011, although at a lesser rate.

There is a wave of pessimism washing over local governments. Sixty-one percent replied that they are less able to meet their financial needs in FY 2011 as compared to the previous year. And, almost 60 percent believe that this trend will continue through next year's budget cycle.

Figure 6: Annual Percentage Change in Locally Assessed Real Property Tax Revenue, FY 1990 to FY 2011



With real estate assessments and real property tax revenues in a nosedive since the housing bubble burst, local governments are looking to the state for help. However, there is little confidence the commonwealth will come through. To the question: "What are your locality's biggest revenue concerns?" most responses focused on the future of state financial assistance, the general overall decline of state aid, and specific program

cuts in education, the Comprehensive Services Act (CSA) that provides services for high-risk youth and their families, and the Compensation Board that provides partial state funding for constitutional officers such as commissioners of revenue and circuit court clerks. In the survey, state aid concerns even trumped worries over the decline in real property values and taxes by more than 3 to 1.

The survey findings illustrate the general uneasiness that the "junior fiscal partner" believes will happen in next year's session—a session after which all 140 legislative seats are up for grabs. Last session the House of Delegates passed legislation to freeze BPOL rates (HB 57) and to change the burden of proof from the taxpayer to the assessor for appeals (HB 570). Legislation (HB 613) was also introduced to exempt from local taxation new investments in machinery and tools. In peering into a dimly lit crystal ball, the staff director for the Senate Finance Committee told members of VML's Legislative Committee in August that tax issues including the corporate income tax, BPOL, and machinery and tools taxes could dominate the session. The upcoming political assault on traditional local taxes and shrinking state aid make me wonder if the frayed state-local fiscal relationship can hold. Something has to give.

Suggestions for a Solution

The General Assembly is locked in a bitter partisan struggle—a struggle that could continue even beyond legislative re-districting and the November 2011 election. While some legislators clamor for more money and resources for core programs, others shout for tax cuts and service reductions. Developing and enacting a state budget becomes increasingly difficult in an environment marked by widely different political agendas. Local governments end up waiting along the sideline for the fallout.

Can anything be done? Absolutely. First, the governor and legislature, as "senior partners" must agree not to:

- · further restrict local revenue authority;
- impose new spending requirements or expand existing ones on services delivered by local governments;
- shift state funding responsibilities onto local governments; and
- place additional administrative burdens on local governments for state or joint programs.
 Second, the governor and the General

Assembly, in concert with local governments, should establish a task force to develop legislative proposals for compelling state agencies to justify standards and regulations, including those in public education, in terms of costs and benefits. Shouldn't we be measuring performance rather than compliance to determine the success or failure of public services? The task force could also examine what services should state and local governments provide, how such services are sorted between the two levels of government, whether the policies and practices used to determine primary responsibility are appropriate, and which public

services should be considered joint responsibilities. Yes, there have been studies and task forces galore, dating back to the Revenue Resources and Economic Study Commission in the 1970s through the Commission to Study Virginia's State and Local Tax Structure for the 21st Century and the Joint Subcommittee to Study and Revise Virginia's State Tax Code. But, we have not been in an economic and revenue squeeze like this since the Great Depression. Political leaders may now understand the need for action.

Third, as part of its own budget development and budget deliberation processes, the state needs to develop fiscal priorities that take into account both spending and revenue actions. Should education funding be afforded less priority than certain tax preferences? Perhaps in some situations education programs should be cut, but that decision should be publicly debated and made, and the fiscal priorities should be transparent to the public in both the proposed budget bill and the Appropriation Act. That is not the case today.

I am not including action to modernize local taxing authority. Nor am I advocating for the state to assume all public education funding. A strong case can be made for both, but as Otto Von Bismarck once said, "Politics is the art of the possible." And that's no joke. It is time for our state and local leaders to make something good out of this art.

Summary and Conclusions

Virginia state and local governments need each other, regardless of any likes and dislikes. The state relies on local governments to deliver core programs such as education, public safety, and social services. Localities in turn receive legal authority, and financial and technical assistance, and gain a helpful buffer between them and the federal government. The Constitution of Virginia designates the General Assembly as in charge of the governance relationship. Virginia follows a legal precedent called Dillon's Rule that limits powers of local governments only to those expressly granted by the state. The state's financial resources rely on income and sales taxes, while localities must rely on more unpopular and complex taxes such as on real estate, utilities and business licenses.

Local governments provide close to half the funds spent on public education, but the state and federal governments drive the preponderance of education costs through their policy- and rule-making roles. The state in recent years provided less than one-third of the revenue for all of local government spending, while issuing mandates and authorizing new requirements.

Virginia state and local governments need each other, regardless of any likes and dislikes.

To help restore a healthy relation-ship with localities, the governor and legislature, as "senior partners" must agree not to restrict further local revenue authority or impose new spending requirements or administrative burdens on localities.

Five state aid programs comprise more than 95 percent of the general fund dollars appropriated for financial assistance to localities: aid to K-12 education, aid to police departments, aid to funding for local constitutional officers, aid to programs for at-risk youths and families, and car tax relief. The car tax relief program established by Governor Jim Gilmore costs \$950 million annually. In addition to requiring the substantial general fund appropriations, the car tax relief program irrevocably changed the state-local fiscal relationship. The state basically took political control over this local revenue source. Local elected officials can increase car tax rates but better be able to persuade the electorate that other choices would be far more painful.

This year the General Assembly and the governor maintained appropriations for the car tax relief program while cutting state aid programs in public education, public safety, and others services. Localities are spending more each year than is required to match state dollars in order to meet state Standards of Accreditation and Standards of Learning. But while the car tax relief program has held steady, state support in the other local aid categories has declined.

There is a wave of pessimism washing over local governments. Many officials say they are less able to meet their financial needs in FY 2011 as compared to the previous year. With real estate assessments and real property tax revenues in a nosedive since the housing bubble burst, local governments are looking to the state for help, But there is little confidence the commonwealth will come through. The General Assembly is locked in a bitter partisan struggle-a struggle that could continue even beyond legislative re-districting. While some General Assembly members clamor for more money for core programs, others call for tax cuts and service reductions. Developing and enacting a state budget becomes increasingly difficult in an environment marked by widely different political agendas. Local governments end up waiting along the sideline for the fallout.

To help restore a healthy relationship with localities, the governor and legislature, as "senior partners" must agree not to restrict further local revenue authority or impose new spending requirements or administrative burdens on localities. The state and local governments together should establish a task force to develop legislative proposals for compelling state agencies to justify standards and regulations, including those in public education, in terms of costs and benefits. Program performance should take precedence over program compliance. The task force could also examine what services should state

and local governments provide, how such services are sorted between the two levels of government, whether the policies and practices used to determine primary responsibility are appropriate, and which public services should be considered joint responsibilities.

Finally, the state needs to develop fiscal priorities that take into account both spending and revenue actions. For example, should education funding be afforded less priority than certain tax preferences? Such decisions should be publicly debated, and made available to the public in the proposed budget bill and, ultimately, in the appropriation act.
