COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

I. ATTENDANCE AND ADJOURNMENT

All members shall make a reasonable effort to attend meetings of the Board. If unable to attend, a member shall notify the Chairman or County Administrator.

A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and must be present to proceed to business. A smaller number of members may adjourn or send for absentees. Special meetings of the Board may be called in accordance with Section 15.1-538 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour set by the Board for regular or special meetings. He shall immediately call the Board to order and determine if a quorum is present; if so, he shall have the minutes of the preceding meeting submitted. Any errors or omissions shall, upon motion and carried, then be corrected. The minutes, being found correct, shall be signed by the Chairman and Clerk and shall be the authentic record of the proceedings of the Board of Supervisors.

II. CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

At the first meeting in January of each year, the Board of Supervisors shall elect one of its members as Chairman and one other of its members as Vice-Chairman. The term of office for the Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be for two years, but they may be re-elected.

The Chairman shall preside at all meetings at which he is present. The Vice-Chairman shall preside at all meetings at which the Chairman is absent and may discharge any other duty of the Chairman during his absence or disability.

The day, time, and place of regular board meetings shall be determined at the January meeting.

III. CLERK

The County Administrator shall serve as Clerk to the Board.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board shall be duly drawn by the Clerk and shall be submitted for approval at the next regular monthly meeting following their draft.

The Clerk shall appoint a deputy as recording secretary if required or needed by the Board.

IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

After the call to order the Board shall proceed to the agenda. The normal order of the agenda shall be as below, except at the January organizational meeting and as subject to rearrangement by the Chairman, absent objection by the Board. At the organizational meeting in January, the first order of business shall be the election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman and approval of the Board's operating procedures.

- K. Monthly Reports from Local Departments
- L. Adjournment

V. PREPARATION OF AGENDA

The County Administrator shall see that the preparation and printing of Board papers, ordinances, resolutions, petitions, and other applicable documents, be completed within such time that members of the Board may receive the documents at least 72 hours before the meeting of the Board.

The County Administrator shall close the upcoming Agenda on the Wednesday prior to the meeting of the Board. Any item submitted after this deadline will not be considered for action unless recommended by the County Administrator.

VI. CONSENT AGENDA

The Chairman and County Administrator shall style routine, non-controversial matters requiring Board action on a Consent Agenda. Items may be removed from the Consent Agenda and place on the Regular Agenda on recorded vote by a majority of the Board members present. Only one motion is necessary to adopt all recommendations and action items on the Consent Agenda.

There shall be no debate or discussion by any member of the Board or the public regarding any item on the Consent Agenda, beyond asking questions for simple clarification.

VII. CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum. When two or more members speak at the same time, the Chairman shall name the person who shall speak first.

A motion or proposition shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Chairman or any member. Any motion or proposition may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or other action of the Board upon it, except a motion to reconsider, which

shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Board. Otherwise, meetings shall be conducted in accordance to <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u>, <u>Newly Revised</u> (Procedures for Small Boards).

VIII. TAKING THE VOTE

When a motion in order is made, the Chairman shall state the exact motion and indicate that it is open to debate. After the motion has been debated, the Chairman shall put the question in the following forms: "As many as agree that, etc. (as the question may be) let it be known by raising your right hand", and "Those opposed by the same sign."

According to the Constitution of Virginia, a majority of all elected members shall be necessary to adopt any ordinance or resolution appropriating money exceeding the sum of \$500.00, imposing taxes, or authorizing the borrowing of money. Otherwise, a resolution, ordinance, or other proposition shall be adopted by vote of the majority of Board members present and voting. A tie vote shall mean the defeat of the motion voted on.

A member may abstain and be entered in the minutes as present and abstaining.

The Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, Title 2.1, Chapter 40.2, Section 639.30 et seq shall control with respect to a member's participation and voting. (Conflict of Interest-Section 2.1-639.30 et al, Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.)

IX. RECONSIDERATION

After a question has been decided, it may be reconsidered on the motion of any member who voted with the prevailing side, provided the motion is made on the same day as the decision carried. All motions to reconsider shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting.

X. WITHDRAWAL OF EXHIBITS

Original papers, filed as exhibits with any ordinance or resolution, may be withdrawn by the patron or upon his order. In such case, he shall leave attested copies, and shall pay the Clerk for the cost of copying.

XI. MANUAL AND RULES

The rules of parliamentary practice in <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, except when they are inconsistent with the rules established by the Board.

The Rules of the Board shall be reviewed and adopted in January of each year. These Rules may subsequently be suspended or amended by a two-third vote of the entire Board. Upon a motion to suspend or amend, the mover shall be allowed two minutes to state the reasons for his motion, and one member opposed to the motions shall be allowed an equal time to object.

XII. APPOINTMENTS

All appointments of Board representatives to commissions, authorities, committees, etc. shall be made once the individual leaves the position or on expiration of his term, and not later

than two meetings after the individual has left. The Board shall attempt to honor appointments from representative districts and shall not discriminate based on sex, age, handicap, race, or origin.

At the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees. The committees shall meet at the regular times and in conformity with the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. In selecting members of committees, the Chairman of the Board shall make nominations after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. The Board may amend the Chairman's nominations and shall confirm the assignments. Standing committees shall consider such matters as referred by the Board, and shall report at regular meetings of the Board.

If the Board votes not to have standing committees, it may act as a committee of the whole on matters normally referred to standing committees. However; the Chairman after consulting with the County Administrator, may appoint special (ad hoc) committees to carry out specific tasks. This shall be done after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. A special committee shall automatically cease to exist once it has completed its specific task.

XIII. PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Chairman may, at his discretion, set an appropriate and consistent time limit on all speakers at a public hearing. All speakers shall come forward and identify themselves by name and address before stating their position. If a public hearing becomes disruptive, the Chairman may adjourn or continue, in accordance with the *Code of Virginia*.

XIV. CLOSED SESSIONS

All discussions held in Closed Session as outlined in the Freedom of Information Act shall represent privileged information held by those involved. Release of such information by a Board member outside the session shall be considered a breach of these by-laws, and the member shall be subject to censure. Specific purpose of closed session shall be stated in accordance with Section 2.2-3711 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Upon return to regular session after a closed session, the County Attorney and/or Chairman shall state the nature of the closed session in as specific terms as appropriate.

In open session, a roll call vote shall be recorded in the minutes, certifying that only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements and only such business matters as were identified in the motion were discussed or considered. Any member of the public body who believes there was a departure from the requirements shall so state prior to the vote. The statement shall be recorded in the minutes.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED

PROCEDURE IN SMALL BOARDS

In a board meeting where there are not more than about a dozen members present, some of the formality that is necessary in a large assembly would hinder business. The rules governing such meetings are different from the rules that hold in other assemblies, in the following respects:

--Members are not required to obtain the floor before making motions or speaking, which they can do while seated.

- --Motions need not be seconded.
- --There is no limit to the number of times a member can speak to a question, and motions to close or limit debate generally should not be entertained.
 - --Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending.
- --Sometimes, when a proposal is perfectly clear to all present, a vote can be taken without a motion having been introduced. Unless agreed to by general consent, however, all proposed actions of a board must be approved by vote under the same rules as in other assemblies, except that a vote can be taken initially by a show of hands, which is often a better method in such meetings.
 - -- The chairman need not rise while putting questions to vote.
- --The chairman can speak in discussion without rising or leaving the chair; and, subject to rule or custom within the particular board (which should be uniformly followed regardless of how many members are present), he usually can make motions and usually votes on all questions.

EFFECT OF PERIODIC PARTIAL CHANGE IN BOARD MEMBERSHIP

In cases where a board is constituted so that a specific portion of it is chosen periodically (as, for example, where one third of the board is elected annually for three-year terms), it becomes, in effect, a new board each time such a group assumes board membership. Consequently, all unfinished business existing when the outgoing portion of the board vacates membership falls to the ground; and if the board is one that elects its own officers or appoints standing committees, it chooses new officers and committees as soon as the new board members have taken up their duties, just as if the entire board membership had changed. The individual replacement of persons who may occasionally vacate board membership at other times, however, does not have these effects.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PUBLIC HEARINGS RULES OF PROCEDURE

- 1. Public Hearings the order of presentation shall be as follows, unless varied by the Chairman.
 - a. Staff report.
 - b. Applicant's presentation.
 - c. Comments, statements or presentations from members of the public.

The order of speakers will be:

- 1) Those in support of the matter,
- 2) Those with questions or concerns,
- 3) Those opposed,
- 4) Rebuttals (limited by the Chair as to number and time-see below),
- 5) Questions by the Board members of speakers.

d. Additional rules:

- The Chair can permit speaking out of the order in #c above as deemed necessary to enable the public to fully participate.
- Speakers must stand at the podium and address the Board.
- All comments shall be directed to the members of the Board of Supervisors.
 Debate is prohibited. This includes debate among speakers or speakers/Board members/staff.
- Presentation by the applicant and other speakers shall be limited to a time set by the Chairman.
- Additional time, for any portion, may be granted at the discretion of the Chairman.
- The Chair will set the number of minutes permitted for rebuttal and has the discretion to change the number.
- The Chair has the authority to limit or decrease time for any portion of the public hearing due to the number of potential speakers, or repetition, or any other concern.
- Remarks shall be confined to the matter under discussion and shall be relevant.
- 2. Speakers arriving after the commencement of the hearing and/or who are not on the signup sheet will be recognized at the discretion of the Chairman.
- 3. Repetitive testimony is discouraged.
- 4. The Chairman shall have the authority to end a presentation that violates these rules or for other cause.

- 5. Following discussion of all matters considered in the public hearing, the Board members will consider one of three actions regarding each matter:
 - Approval (with conditions, as applicable);
 - Denial; or
 - Table for further review.
- 6. Once the public comment period has been closed, no further public input will be permitted unless clarification is requested by a Board member. The response shall address only those questions raised by the member.

Protocol for Public Participation

The Board of Supervisors sets aside twenty (20) minutes near the beginning of each regular board meeting for citizen comment.

This regular agenda item is termed "Public Participation." During this period, the Board receives comment from any citizen of Prince Edward County on any matter not scheduled for a public hearing.

This is an opportunity for citizens to speak and the Board to listen carefully to citizen expressions of concern and opinion.

Citizens may ask questions of the Board or individual Board members; however, Public Participation is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.

Citizens are expected to conduct research on topics prior to Board meetings and this forum provides citizens with an opportunity to inform elected officials of their findings and positions on matters of public interest and concern.

Citizens wishing to speak during Public Participation are asked to please sign the Public Participation register prior to the beginning of the meeting.

Citizens are respectfully requested to state their full name and address for the record.

The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.

Citizens shall speak for a maximum of five (5) minutes, unless more time is granted by the Chair.

In the event that more than four (4) speakers wish to be heard during citizen's time, the Chairman shall allocate the twenty (20) minutes among speakers in an equitable manner. An extension to the twenty (20) minute limit can be granted by the Chair.

Comments from citizens who are not residents of Prince Edward County will be entertained once all County residents are heard.

Signs, placards, posters or like material are not permitted in the Board Chamber, adjoining areas or County offices.

The Board asks that citizens remain seated during the meeting unless called upon to stand for recognition as a speaker, official duties, physical necessity, or to enter or leave the meeting.

The use of profane, vulgar, obscene or threatening speech is not permitted and can result in removal from the meeting.

Citizens are requested to turn off or deactivate the sound from all cell phones, pagers, or other electronic communication devices.

- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

PUBLIC HEARING - Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment

Summary:

In December 2010, an Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Amendment was submitted to the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD). During their review of the application, an error in the Public Hearing Notice procedure conducted in July of 2010 was discovered. The Public Hearing notice was only run once in the Farmville Herald, the local newspaper of record, and should have been run twice. As a result, VDHCD has requested the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors hold a new, second Public Hearing on the Enterprise Zone Boundary Amendment. As part of that action, VDHCD is also requesting a new "Resolution of Support" for the Prince Edward County Enterprise Zone Boundary Amendment, reaffirming the desire of the Board for the amendment (see attached). The Public Hearing Notices for the new hearing were published in *The Farmville Herald* on Wednesday, December 29, 2010 and Wednesday January 5 2011, meeting the Public Hearing Requirements of the VDHCD.

Approval of the "Resolution of Support" by the Board of Supervisors will enable the County's request for the Enterprise Zone Boundary Amendment to be retroactive to January 1, 2010. By complying with VDHCD's request, no potential grant applicants within the new zone areas submitting an application for 2010 will be precluded from participating for the 2010 grant year.

At its September 14, 2010 meeting, the Board approved the addition of \pm 303.361 acres in and around the Town of Farmville, running contiguous with the County's current sub-zone (Town of Farmville \pm 144.859 acres and in Prince Edward County \pm 158.502). This addition will bring the County's total Enterprise Zone to \pm 2,388.361 acres, leaving the County 1,452.639 acres of the original maximum allocation of 3,840 acres for future development.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding, dated,	between Prince
Edward County, Virginia ("County") and the Virginia Department of Conservation and	Recreation
("DCR"), hereby states as follows:	

DCR has developed a former railroad corridor into the High Bridge Trail State Park ("Trail"). A 10-foot wide trail has been installed in the former railroad bed.

The County has a vested interest in using up to 7 miles of the Trail for the construction of a water transmission main which will convey water from a new water treatment plant located near the Sandy River Reservoir to an existing water system serving the Town of Crewe ("Project"). The Project will benefit DCR by providing accessibility to water at several locations along the Project.

As the success of the Project would be beneficial to each party and to the Commonwealth of Virginia as a whole, the parties agree to and acknowledge the following:

- 1) **Construction Issues**. Crowder Construction Company ("Contractor") will be responsible for the installation of the water transmission main. The following conditions will apply:
 - a. Portions of the Trail will be closed to the public during construction activities. The Contractor will provide construction signage and DCR will post trail closure information on their website.
 - b. Construction of the Project will adhere to a schedule agreed upon by DCR, the County, and the Contractor. Inclement weather may affect the duration of the construction.
 - c. Contractor shall install the water main along one side of the Trail wherever possible.
 - d. Where disturbed, Contractor will restore the surface of the Trail as closely as possible to original conditions. This will include grading and compacting the entire trail surface to create a consistent surface throughout the construction area. In the likely event that material will be added to the trail surface the material added must meet DCR specifications.
- 2) Maintenance Issues. The County will be responsible for the maintenance of the water main. Maintenance includes occasional flushing of water main at hydrants, necessary repairs to the water main, and occasional exercising of valves. Construction equipment and vehicles may be required on the Trail to perform maintenance and repairs. The County will coordinate all activities with DCR to ensure the safety of the public.
- 3) Accessibility. The County will be provided access to the Trail in order to perform maintenance or any necessary repairs of the water main. The County will coordinate with DCR those times that access is necessary.
- 4) **Easement Development**. It is the mutual understanding of the parties that utility easements will be required for the water transmission main.
 - a. All easements over state-owned property must meet all applicable legal requirements and be approved by the Governor.
 - b. The parties shall cooperate in the County's development of a utility easement along the Project.
 - c. In order to expedite state approval of the County's requests, the DCR Director may authorize the local State Park Manager for the High Bridge Trail State Park to grant park-related work permits to the County for any construction activities within the Project.

5) Point of Contact. The parties shall each maintain one point of contact in regards to the Project. Each party's point of contact shall be responsible for communicating with the other parties and facilitating the Project in any way possible.

The County's point of contact shall be the office of the County Administrator (current contact is Sarah Puckett), 111 South Street, Third Floor, Farmville, Virginia

23901.

b. DCR's initial point of contact shall be the office of Assistant Director, Division of State Parks (currently held by G. Warren Wahl), 203 Governor Street, Suite 306,

Richmond, Virginia 23219.

6) Good Faith. The parties intend this Memorandum of Understanding to be a foundation for a good faith and reasonable relationship with one another during all phases of construction and

maintenance of the Project.

This document represents a statement of the intent of the parties. It is not a legally binding

contract and does not create any enforceable rights in either of the parties or any third party.

8) Nothing herein shall negate requirements in state law.

Mr. Bartlett then said the County was awarded the Recovery Zone Facility Bond Allocation for

Granite Falls earlier in 2010; the county had to return the allocation as the bonds had to close by December

31. Mr. Bartlett said it is understood that Congress is working on a re-allocation for the program for 2011.

- 1. A "bonus" shall be defined as a lump-sum payment to an officer or employee that is not part of the base salary.
- 2. The Board of Supervisors shall pay a bonus of \$500.00 for all full-time employees.
- 3. The Board of Supervisors shall pay a bonus of \$250.00 for all part-time employees.
- 4. This ordinance shall become effective on and after 12:01 a.m. on January 11, 2011.
- 5. This ordinance shall terminate on February 1, 2011.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person must be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

RE: Citizens' Appeals of Local Tax Assessments

Dear W., Wade

As we begin to work through the hundreds of bills filed for the 2011 General Assembly, we remind you of a priority issue that was identified by the VACo Board of Directors. That issue is protecting the current burden of proof process in real estate and property assessment appeals. We believe that Delegate Iaquinto (Virginia Beach) will reintroduce legislation, similar to 2010's HB570, to put the burden of proof in assessment appeals on the locality. Under current law, assessments of real and personal property by the local government are presumed to be correct. Currently, when a taxpayer challenges or appeals his assessment, the burden of proof is upon the taxpayer to prove the assessment is erroneous. The proposed legislation will shift the burden of proof to the locality to prove the assessment is correct. We predict that if the bill passes, many localities may be hit with an onslaught of appeals. We anticipate that many property owners will determine it's in their best interests to appeal, since they no longer would have the burden of proving their case. The additional appeals may require your assessor and/or commissioner of the revenue to add staff to deal with the appeals. In addition, you may be forced to hire additional attorneys to handle the cases that go to court. Rural and smaller localities will not be immune from impact. Localities that contract for assessment services or conduct multi-year assessments may be forced to conduct annual assessments based on appeal results and court rulings.

VACo and VML have pooled resources to fight this proposed legislation that will significantly alter the assessment and appeals process. We have contracted with some of the best tax, real estate and property assessment consultants to assist us in fighting this legislation during the 2011 session. Needless to say, this effort will benefit all of the counties in the Commonwealth and can be very expensive. A number of counties have already recognized the importance of defeating this legislation and offered VACo assistance with funding for this matter. Therefore, we ask your county to consider a special assessment of at least \$1000 to help us protect the current standard of proof in real estate and property assessment.


The residents of Amelia and Prince Edward Counties are fortunate to have such well-trained and courteous volunteer fire personnel to protect our communities.



Thank you for reviewing VACo's 2011 Legislative Priorities that represent the association's top policy interests.

VACo members develop and adopt their annual legislative program from which the priorities are derived. The program then guides the membership and staff during the legislative session. The 2011 Legislative Program is available at www.vaco.org.

Fiscal concerns continue to be prominent because budget issues still dominate the time and attention of the Commonwealth's localities. VACo's membership has called for many revenue and tax reforms, including repealing the state's reduction in Aid to Localities, opposing the elimination or reduction of local tax revenues, and supporting the restructuring of state income and sales and use taxes to stabilize and increase revenues to meet current and foreseeable core service demands.

In addition to pressing fiscal and funding issues, VACo's priorities include concerns about the expansion of broadband services, supporting sufficient state funding for public education programs, transportation, unfunded mandates, sovereign immunity and environmental issues.

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VACo's legislative team is honored to serve Virginia's counties and to work with the governor and members of the General Assembly.

VACo's Priorities

State and Local Fiscal Sustainability

During a period when the Commonwealth and its local governments are experiencing the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression, VACo reaffirms its commitment to protecting state and local fiscal stability. Fiscal stability enables the Commonwealth to provide core public services critical to the long-term economic vitality of Virginia. Difficult financial times require government, at all levels, to evaluate its service delivery and determine the continued importance and viability of the programs created to meet critical service needs. The counties in Virginia stand ready to partner with the state to make the tough decisions required.

State Funding

•VACo is concerned with protecting the reliability and sustainability of the Commonwealth's general fund which finances most core government functions mandated by the state but provided by local governments, including public primary and secondary education (K-12).

State Tax Reform

•VACo supports significant tax reform that includes a restructuring of state income and sales and use taxes with the intent to stabilize and increase revenues to meet current and foreseeable core service demands. Tax reform also will reduce pressure on local government leaders who continually must consider raising real estate tax rates to fund K-12 public education, public safety, CSA, mental health and mental retardation, and other critical services.

Local Government Revenues

•VACo supports equal taxing authority for cities and counties. VACo also asks the Commonwealth to grant counties and cities the option, by action of the local governing body without a referendum, to increase the local sales and use tax by 0.5 percent to help offset state budget reductions affecting localities.

Local Discretion for Budget Reductions

VACo supports sufficient local discretion to manage state-mandated reductions.

Local Government Fiscal Policy

- •VACo supports proposals ensuring the appropriate collection of applied and assessed taxes including Transient Occupancy Taxes from online transactions.
- •VACo opposes constitutional amendments mandating real property tax relief.
- •VACo opposes proposals reducing state and local grantor and recordation tax revenue.
- •VACo opposes state-mandated policies affecting the Local Government Investment Pool.

Broadband

•VACo urges the Commonwealth to assist counties in their efforts to deploy universal affordable broadband services, particularly in underserved and rural areas, by adopting targeted statewide budgetary and statutory policies.

Education

- •VACo supports full state funding for public education programs, including the Standards of Quality, teacher salaries and retirement costs, the Standards of Accreditation, the Standards of Learning, incentive/categorical aid, and capital/maintenance support.
- •VACo opposes changes in methodologies and the division of financial responsibility intended to shift education costs from the state to localities.
- •VACo supports local flexibility to make appropriate reductions across state educational categories when general funding that supports the Standards of Learning and Standards of Accreditation is reduced.

Health and Human Resources

•VACo supports state policies and funding to ensure the Commonwealth's at-risk families have access to high quality and appropriate services.

Growth Management

- •VACo opposes any legislation to weaken the authority of localities to plan and regulate land use.
- •VACo supports legislation to grant localities additional tools necessary to adequately meet citizens' increasing public infrastructure needs that are driven by new development.

Sovereign Immunity

•VACo opposes any substantive change in local governments' present defense of sovereign immunity for tort liability. VACo opposes bringing counties under the Virginia Tort Claims Act.

Stormwater

•VACo opposes any stormwater requirements on local governments related to new development, redevelopment and existing development that are not cost-effective, affordable and manageable at the local level.

Transportation

- •VACo urges the Commonwealth to enact a transportation funding package to include dedicated, new, significant and recurring annual revenues to address the Commonwealth's documented transportation infrastructure needs.
- •VACo supports restoration of the Transportation Revenue Sharing program to the structure that existed prior to the 2006 session with robust funding.

Unfunded Mandates

•VACo opposes unfunded mandates by the Commonwealth.

Water Quality

- •VACo supports additional state funding and technical assistance to help localities improve water quality in a manner consistent with tributary strategies, implementation of Total Maximum Daily Loading goals, and water quality standards established by the State Water Control Board.
- •VACo opposes the imposition of a state fee, tax or surcharge on water, sewer, solid waste or any other service provided by a local government or authority.

- 1. Spring regional meetings: In even number years VACo members are invited to attend regional meetings to identify and discuss key statewide legislative and policy issues.
- 2. Three Resolutions Committee meetings: The committee oversees the development of the annual Legislative Program. The meetings occur in the spring after the regional meetings, early fall, and during the annual conference in November. The committee receives regular legislative updates, via conference call, during the annual legislative session.
- **3.** VACo's eight steering committees meet at least twice: Late summer and November during the annual conference. The steering committees develop their policy sections of the annual Legislative Program.
- **4.** The membership is asked to adopt the new legislative program during the annual business meeting. The meeting occurs on the last day of the annual conference in November.

Additional information

VACo's President appoints steering committee chairs and vice chairs. VACo members volunteer to serve on steering committees. In early October, prior to the annual conference, the membership receives a Preliminary Legislative Program, which is revised during the annual conference.

Letter from the Chairman



As I end my second term as chairman, I am pleased to report that the council has been involved with many exciting projects and activities. We have worked on projects covering the four elements of the NRCS Strategic Plan: Community

Development, Land Conservation, Land Management and Water Quality and Quantity. We are finishing up the second year of our 5 year Area Plan and we are on target with the completion of its goals.

We have educated our children in agricultural safety and the importance of recycling and protecting our water, the land and the animals that live there. These children are our future; they will be the next generation of leaders and caretakers of the earth. It is our responsibility to provide them with the knowledge and skills necessary to make sound decisions in the future.

There are, however, many challenges that still lie ahead. Annual Plan of Work

The Old Dominion Resource Conservation and Development Council, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) not for profit organization. The Council is comprised of 10 county sponsors, five soil and water conservation district sponsors, and two planning district sponsors. In addition to these sponsors, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service provides funding which includes staff, office space and a vehicle. The Council identifies resource needs and develops projects for economic development, land conservation, land management, and water quality and quantity. Many of the projects provide multi-county benefits, while others pertain specifically to one county.

The Fiscal Year 2010 Annual Plan of Operations was derived from the second year of our 2009-2014 Area Plan. The following projects and activities worked on in Fiscal Year 2010 are accomplishments toward the Area Plan and have been recorded in POINTS, the Natural Resources Conservation Service data base.



Alternative Energy Projects: Finding New Ways to Power the Future

Longwood University Alternative Energy Feasibility Study

Old Dominion RC&D obtained a \$4,000 grant from the Virginia Association of RC&D Councils to fund an alternative energy feasibility study at Longwood University. The study looked at the type and cost of improvements needed to retrofit Longwood's physical plant to generate electricity and cool the buildings using chillers. This incorporates technology that uses heat exchange from steam to produce cool air. Longwood currently uses wood sawdust in place of heating oil in their physical plant to heat the campus buildings and produce hot water.

The study also looked at the efficiency and cost/benefit ratio of switching over to an alternative energy source. The study results showed three scenarios with varying economic benefits that the university can work with as they upgrade their physical plant facility.

Community Biomass Project Presentation

Representatives from Public Policy Virginia gave a presentation to the council on the Community Biomass Business Plan for consideration as a potential RC&D project. The goal of the project, which is being funded by Tobacco Commission money, is to develop a plan and constructional design to retrofit the physical plant at an industrial or institutional facility to utilize an alternative energy source to for heating and generation of electricity. The plan will consider the economic feasibility of biomass fuels such as small diameter wood and switchgrass. The role of RC&D will be to organize and co-host informational workshops for community leaders, public officials and managers from private industry to explain the results to other facilities interested in converting to the use of biomass as a fuel source.

Promoting Clean Water in the Council's Region

TMDL Implementation Plan - Ash Camp Creek and Twitty's Creek

Old Dominion RC&D Council responded to a request from the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation to help with the development of a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Implementation Plan for sections of Ash Camp Creek and Twitty's Creek, sub-watersheds of the Roanoke River in Charlotte County. These plans are developed to improve the water quality in streams and rivers impaired by pollution, which in this case was due to excessive sedimentation. The process of developing the TMDL implementation plan includes identifying potential sources of pollution, determining the types of conservation practices required for reduction of sediment entering the water, and collecting input from local residents, agricultural producers, government agencies and concerned citizens. The council's role was to facilitate the entire process which included public meetings, government agency/steering committee meetings, and residential and agricultural committee meetings. As a result, a plan has been developed identifying areas where conservation practices need to be installed and the cost of these practices. With this plan, state and federal money will be targeted to improve these watersheds resulting in an influx of dollars into the local economy. The council partnered with the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, Virginia Department of Environmental Quality, Southside Soil and Water Conservation District, Charlotte County Cooperative Extension, and the Virginia Department of Forestry on this project.

Environmental and Safety Education Programs for Area Youth

Eco Kids' College Expanded

Old Dominion RC&D partnered with the Charlotte County Extension Office, the Southside Soil & Water Conservation District, and Charlotte County to offer a unique summer program called Eco Kids' Kollege. This one-week, half-day program offered children ages 9-12 from Charlotte, Lunenburg, and Prince Edward Counties the opportunity to explore many topics pertaining to this year's theme, "Backyard Habitats." Among the interesting learning sessions were: a presentation from the Virginia Wildlife Center featuring live animals to explain animal habitat needs and the causes and effects of habitat loss; a bird watching session by a Longwood College professor where the students learned to use binoculars and a field guide to find and identify different species of local birds; and a demonstration from the VA

in identifying animal tracks, and learning about the laws which protect the animals and their habitats. Other presenters from partner agencies including VA Department of Environmental Quality, NRCS, and VA Cooperative Extension performed demonstrations, gave presentations, assisted with hands-on activities, and participated in fun and educational games pertaining to aquatic life, wildlife, nature/habitats, birds/bats, and building habitats. Some of the fun and educational activities included making animal track molds, fish prints, constructing a butterfly house, making a coffee can birdhouse, and collecting materials from animal habitats to construct a model habitat. Additionally, the students learned about the importance of recycling and how to improve and protect the environment through Reducing, Reusing, and Recycling of everyday materials.

In this predominately agricultural region, children as well as adults are exposed to many potential hazards on the farm. The Council hosted the Halifax Agriculture Safety Day at Edmunds Memorial Park near South Boston. Eighty-nine middle school students attended demonstrations explaining tractor and PTO safety, chainsaw and lawn equipment safety, firearms safety, livestock handling, food safety, boating/water safety, first aid and many other safety topics. The program also included learning sessions with the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Mobile Workshop from the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research in Danville. The council partnered with Halifax Cooperative Extension, Farm Bureau Women's Committee, Halifax Soil and Water Conservation

District and the Halifax Middle School Agriculture Department on the event.

Local sponsorship was provided by Travelers Protective Association, Farm Bureau, Southern States Cooperative/South Boston Petroleum, Spaulding Equipment Company and Tractor Supply Company. The event is one of over 200 similar events sponsored by Progressive Agriculture throughout the country and Canada this year. The sponsorship that the council received from Progressive Agriculture included instructor training, event insurance, T- shirts and other supplies. Four council members and eleven volunteers from partner organizations helped out to make the event a success.

The Council also submitted a grant to Virginia Environmental Endowment for development of a self-guided, half mile nature trail on the Ellis Acres grounds,

with the trail head located at the parking lot for the community center and picnic grounds. Funding was requested for the development,



purchase and installation of large educational signage at several locations along the trail for visitors to read about subjects such as stream ecology, the importance of water quality, and wildlife habitat and food sources.

Plant identification signs will also be installed on many of the trees, native shrubs and herbaceous plants. Once the trail is developed, people attending other activities at the park will be able to stroll along the trail at their leisure, taking time to stop and learn about important aspects of our environment and the native plants.

Update on Census Redistricting

James Whitehorne, Assistant Chief of the U.S. Census Bureau's Redistricting Data Office (pictured to the right), told the Commonwealth Regional Council's (CRC) Chief Administrative Officers Advisory Committee on October 26 that the State of Virginia and local governments should start receiving Census data for redistricting soon.

Data that was set to start coming out before December 31, 2010 includes apportionment data, indicating the number of Congressional seats each state will have, and TIGERLine shape files for mapping. Distribution of the TIGERLine data was scheduled to begin after Thanksgiving, and be distributed on a state-by-state basis, according to Whitehorne.



The four states with off-year elections, which include Virginia, will get top priority due to holding legislative elections in 2011. Other data products, including redistricting data and related support products, will come out in the first guarter of 2011.

In addition to states, localities will use Census data to redraw their local election districts (including School Board and Board of Supervisors). While CRC member localities will make the final decision in re-drawing their political boundaries, CRC staff is available to assist with the mapping portion of this task. Any locality wishing to request assistance with mapping of political boundaries is encouraged to contact the CRC Office at (434) 392-6104.

Update on Smart Beginnings Heartland Program

Will Rogers, Executive Director of Crossroads Community Services Board (pictured to the left), told the Commonwealth Regional Council's (CRC) Chief Administrative Officers Advisory Committee on November 23 that the Smart Beginnings Heartland Coalition would likely need an additional planning grant to pull needed components together for the next step in the Smart Beginnings Heartland Program.

The program was started in mid-2009, and is a collaborative effort between Crossroads, Longwood University, local Departments of Social Services, and other public and private sector agencies/stakeholders. It would serve all seven counties in Planning District 14. The objective is to plan and develop programs that would prepare children (newborn to age 5) for school.

Smart Beginnings Heartland was awarded an initial planning grant from the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation (VECF), which was matched by local funding to accomplish three main activities: develop the coalition, develop and publish a needs assessment, and develop a strategic plan. Upon completion of those activities, the program – with assistance from the CRC – submitted an application for a Getting Ready I grant to VECF. This was one of four applications submitted to VECF statewide, none of which were funded.

Among the services to be provided by the Smart Beginnings Heartland Program are assisting Day Care centers in getting accredited (Rogers said a significant number of centers in the region are not; the program would pick a few from each county and work with them), working with local school systems to help prepare children, and developing resource centers for stay-at-home children.

According to data gathered during the needs assessment, there are 45 center-based early childhood care and education programs in the region. In addition to some of the centers not being accredited, none of these are rated by the Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) National Learning Network, which was formed by a coalition of states and organizations to use rating and improvement strategies to improve the quality of early care and education systems and childhood development. Other findings of the needs assessment include:

- About 40% of children are in child day care, and a similar percentage are in the homes of family or friends.
- Parents surveyed said quality of care is most important, but many have children in less satisfactory conditions (most likely due to cost issues).
- Literacy is an issue. The percentage of children reading in the third grade was low for the 2008-2009 school year.
- Children are not coming to school "age ready" appropriate.
- Approximately 50% of children are born to teenagers. There is a need to train teen parents.
- There are resources and programs available in the region, but the community may not know about them.

As the data indicates, there is a need for such services in this region.

More than 50 Virginia localities "green" certified since start of Green Government Challenge

Since its inception in 2008, more than 50 Virginia localities have become "green" certified under the Virginia Municipal League (VML) Green Government Challenge.

The initiative is a friendly challenge to VML member localities to become more "green" by implementing policies that reduce carbon emissions by local governments and the community at large. For 2009, VML partnered with the Virginia Association of Counties on this program. According to Joseph Lerch, Director of Environmental Policy with the VML (pictured to the right), 26 Virginia localities became "green" certified during the program's first year. Last year, another 36 became certified. Lerch made a presentation on the program to the Commonwealth Regional Council's Chief Administrative Officers Advisory Committee on September 28.



To participate in the Challenge, localities have to be a member of VML and register for the program (which can be done online at www.GoGreenVa.org). Participating localities can earn points by undertaking "green" initiatives such as adopting policies that encourage energy efficiency or environmental preservation, or by retrofitting government buildings to make them more energy efficient. By the deadline each year – usually in September – participating localities are required to submit their challenge forms to the GoGreenVa web site.

Prizes are given to the governments with the top scores, and localities that become "green" certified are recognized for their achievement. According to Lerch, as of September 2010, the Town of Drakes Branch was the only locality in the region participating in the Challenge.

In addition to the Green Government Challenge, VML now offers the Green Independent Schools Challenge. This is a friendly challenge to schools belonging to the Virginia Association of Independent Schools (VAIS) to become more energy efficient and reduce their carbon footprint on the environment. The process is similar to the Green Government Challenge.

CRC Grant Writing Update

Victoria awarded preliminary CDBG planning grant for housing rehab

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) would like to congratulate the Town of Victoria on its successful request for initial planning grant assistance from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD). CRC staff, acting upon a request from the Town, prepared a request for planning grant funds to undertake a housing rehab study which would identify future needs in three areas of the Town and how best to address them. Those areas are: Third and Fourth Streets (north of Main Street); areas west of Court Street (north of Park Avenue); and Lunenburg and Virginia Avenues.

VDHCD awarded the County initial funding of \$3,000 to carry out some preliminary activities. The CRC assisted the County in facilitating those activities and submitting the required deliverables to VDHCD. The agency is reviewing the materials to determine if the project is eligible for additional funding. If it is, the County would be invited to apply for additional planning grant money for further planning activities.

It is the hope of the Town that this project will eventually lead to a future application for construction funding from VDHCD for housing improvements in these areas.

CRC working on new DCR Trail Grant application for Victoria

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) has been retained by the Town of Victoria to prepare and submit a new Recreational Trail Grant application to the Virginia Department of Conversation and Recreation (DCR). The Town is seeking grant funding from DCR to construct a trail running from Twin Cemetery Road, just east of the Town Limits, to a point near the Lunenburg County Airport. The trail would connect to a recently completed trail, running from Twin Cemetery Road to the Victoria Railroad Park. That trail was constructed using DCR grant funding, which the CRC assisted the Town in obtaining last year.

This is a two-phase application. The first phase is due in January 2011, and will consist of a general project description and supporting documentation. DCR will review all applications received by the deadline, and advance selected projects to the next stage. The second phase consists of a more detailed project description and required environmental reviews, plus supporting documentation, and will be due later in 2011.

VDOT Enhancement Grant applications submitted on behalf of localities

The latest round of Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) Enhancement Grant applications was due on December 1, 2010. For this round, VDOT only accepted applications for existing projects. Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) staff prepared Enhancement Grant applications for the following sponsors/localities:

- <u>Town of Victoria</u>: Complete second phase construction of its Downtown Streetscape Improvements Project.
- <u>Town of Dillwyn</u>: Undertake fourth phase construction of its Downtown Streetscape Improvements Project.
- Buckingham County: Undertake second phase construction of the Buckingham Court House Village Streetscape Improvements Project.
- <u>Prince Edward County</u> (on behalf of Moton Museum): Bus pull-off and related parking for Moton Museum.

The program provides federal funds for projects and activities that expand travel choices and enhance the transportation experience by improving the cultural, historic, aesthetic and environmental aspects of our transportation infrastructure. To be eligible, projects must fall under one of 12 eligible activities and relate to surface transportation. Eligible projects include creation of bicycle and pedestrian facilities, streetscape improvements, refurbishment of historic transportation facilities, and other enhancements.

Application period for FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to begin soon

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is expected to announce, sometime after the first of the year, that applications for the 2011 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) program are being accepted. Since 2001, AFG has helped firefighters and other first responders obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training, and other resources needed to protect the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards.

The application period usually runs from early March through early April, and dates and program guidance – as well as a schedule of workshops – is expected to be available soon.

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) will provide updates as they become available. In the meantime, any fire department or rescue squad interested in the program can check back on the program's web site – http://www.firegrantsupport.com – for more information. The CRC is available to assist – on a first-come, first-serve basis – in writing a grant application and administering the grant (if awarded). Anyone interested in receiving assistance should contact the CRC office at (434) 392-6104. There is a fee for grant writing services.

On a related note, DHS announced in early January that it is now accepting applications for Fire Prevention and Safety Grants. Applications are due by 5:00 p.m. on February 4, and the application for this program can be accessed online at http://www.firegrantsupport.com/content/html/fps/default.aspx.

March 30 deadline for CBDG competitive grant applications

The Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development, in its Program Design for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, has set a deadline of March 30, 2011 for submission of CDBG proposals. A number of localities in Planning District 14 have used CDBG funding over the years for projects to improve their communities.

The CDBG program provides funding to localities for projects that address critical community needs such as housing, infrastructure, and economic development. In order to be eligible, a project must meet one of three national criteria: benefit for low- to moderate-income individuals; prevention of slums or economic blight; or a community need having a particular urgency. Given the process involved in applying for a CDBG competitive grant, any locality considering applying should be well into the planning process (if not finished with planning activities) for their project.

VDH to announce availability of construction funding soon – No WSAG funding this year

The Virginia Department of Health-Office of Drinking Water (VDH-ODW) is expected to release program guidance for the upcoming round of grant/loan funding in January. A number of localities in Planning District 14 have used VDH-ODW funds in recent years for planning and/or construction activities to repair and improve their public water systems.

In December, VDH-ODW posted some changes for the upcoming funding cycle on its web site. One of the more important changes has to do with available funding. In the past, there have been two different pots of funding – the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Program, which provides funding (usually loans) for larger construction projects such as water distribution system repair and replacement; and the Water Supply Assistance Grant Fund (WSAG), which provides grants for smaller construction projects such as construction/upgrade of wells and storage tanks and planning grants to develop preliminary plans and engineering documents for future construction funding applications. For the upcoming funding cycle, according to information on the VDH-ODW web site, the agency does NOT plan to award funding under the WSAG program due to the limited availability of state matching funds (resulting from the State's current financial situation).

Other changes include: An increase in the amount of funding awarded to Virginia by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for large construction projects; the EPA now requires a goal of 20% of that funding go towards green projects; and Davis Bacon Act wages are now required by the EPA on all projects closed after November 1, 2009.

CRC Project Update

Update of Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan ongoing; workshop set for January 10

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) continues to work on an update of the Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan for Planning District 14. A workshop is scheduled for January 10, 2011 at 10:00 a.m. in the downstairs meeting space at the CRC office. The workshop will be open to the public. Two workshops have been held during the last four months to work on the Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (HIRA) portion of the Plan and begin updating mitigation strategies. At the workshop on January 10, the HIRA will be finalized and work on updating mitigation strategies will continue. The Regional Plan update is expected to be completed during the first half of 2011.

Drakes Branch moving ahead with wastewater system project

Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) staff are currently assisting the Town of Drakes Branch with its recently funded sewer system improvements project. The project is being funded through the Southern Rivers Watershed Enhancement Program, which is administered through the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development. Improvements made to the system will improve water quality and eliminate raw sewage from pumping into the Wastewater Treatment Plant. In November 2010, the Town received bids for the sewer line/manhole rehabilitation work. Existing lines will be slip-lined instead of excavated and replaced. This will address the inflow and infiltration problems while allowing the Town to see a significant cost savings. The Notice of Award and Notice to Proceed was issued in December 2010, and construction is expected to be completed by April 2011.

Prince Edward undertaking EECBG project for STEPS

CRC Staff are currently assisting Prince Edward County with its recently funded Energy Efficiency Community Block Grant (EECBG) project for STEPS, Inc. These grants were made by the Virginia Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy, and supported by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. EECBG funds were awarded to install a new HVAC System to cover the entire STEPS manufacturing facility in Farmville. The current heating and cooling system is very inefficient, and extremely expensive to operate. Currently, the County is utilizing "Performance Contracting" as it looks for a firm to install the new system. It is expected that demolition of the existing system will occur in early 2011, with installation of the new recommended system by mid-2011.

Amelia County proceeding with telecommunications plan

CRC staff are currently assisting Amelia County with the second phase of its telecommunications planning project. The County was awarded an initial planning grant in 2009 from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDCHD) to undertake a series of initial planning activities. Upon completion of those activities, VDHCD awarded the County additional planning grant money to help fund the development of a county-wide telecommunications plan. This plan would identify future needs in the County (including broadband) and how best to address them. The County has hired Blacksburg, VA-based Design Nine to develop the plan, which is expected to be completed during the first half of 2011. It is the expectation of the County that this plan will be used to apply for funding from various agencies, including VDHCD, to undertake future construction projects.

Dillwyn completes current phase of Enhancement Project

The Town of Dillwyn has completed the most recent phase of its Downtown Streetscape Improvements Project. The CRC assisted the Town in implementation of the project, which was funded by a VDOT Enhancement Grant (awarded to the Town in 2006) plus local funding. Activities for the most recent phase include new sidewalks on U.S. 15 from the Main/Oak Street Intersection to Conner Street, handicap ramps, stamped concrete, period lighting, and trees. These activities complement previous phases of the project, which consisted of a clock and pedestrian plaza plus crosswalks on U.S. 15 in front of Town Hall and the plaza. The Town, with CRC assistance, recently applied for VDOT Enhancement Grant funding to undertake the next phase of the project – which would consist of streetscape improvements on U.S. 15 from Conner Street to Rosney Road.

Regional RC&D Coordinator leaves for position in upstate New York

Dave Roberts, Coordinator for Old Dominion Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council since 2003, left in December 2010 to take a position as a Grazing Land Specialist in upstate New York. In an e-mail to RC&D Council members on November 10, 2010, Dave said this type of position is one that he has been interested in throughout his career. He will continue to be employed by the USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service, for whom he was employed as RC&D Coordinator.

During his time as RC&D Coordinator, the RC&D Council implemented or worked with other agencies in the region on a number of projects. They are too numerous to mention here, but include the Civil Rights in Education Heritage Trail, ALIVE by the James (River), Heartland Horse Heroes, farm safety programs, recycling education programs, environmental field schools, conservation workshops, and a TMDL implementation plan for sub-watersheds of the Appomattox River.

Old Dominion RC&D serves 10 counties in Central and Southside Virginia, including all seven counties in Planning District 14. The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) is involved with Old Dominion RC&D in an advisory role. The CRC Board and staff would like to take this opportunity to thank Dave for his service to the RC&D Council and his contributions to the region, and wish him well in his future endeavors.

Two UVA training programs merge

The Center for Transportation Studies at the University of Virginia announced on December 5 that two of its programs, the Virginia Local Technical Assistance Program (Virginia LTAP) and the Transportation Professional Development Program (TPDP) have been merged into a new entity, the University of Virginia Transportation Training Academy.

The Academy's mission, according to the announcement, is "to impart the required knowledge and skills to Virginia's transportation workforce to perform their jobs more productively, safely, and effectively so as to: (1) enhance traveler mobility and safety, and (2) improve the design, construction, and maintenance of transportation facilities in the Commonwealth." The announcement said that merging the two programs would allow the Academy to support the workforce training and professional development needs of state and local transportation agencies and private sector companies by offering more workshops across a broad range of topics more affordably. Those topics include:

- Transportation Facility Design & Operation
- Infrastructure Management
- Traffic Engineering
- Highway Safety
- Information Technology
- Planning
- Work Zone Safety
- Project Management
- Communications
- Materials
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Programs
- Legal Issues
- Workplace Safety

RABIES CONFIRMED IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY Rabid Skunk in Darlington Heights Area

January 6, 2011 – A skunk has tested positive for rabies in the Darlington Heights area of Prince Edward County. Prince Edward County Animal Control and the Prince Edward County Health Department confirmed the case of rabies on Wednesday, January 5, 2011.

Rabies is a fatal, but preventable, disease that is carried by mammals and has been in the wild animal population of the County for many years. There are three important rabies prevention guidelines recommended by County Animal Control:

- 1. Vaccinate your pets.
- 2. Immediately, report all exposures to wild animals (bites and scratches) to your doctor and the local health department.
- 3. Enjoy wildlife from a distance don't feed or encourage wild animals such as raccoons, skunks, or foxes to visit your premises.

"Regrettably, the facts of this particular case are a sobering reminder of how important it is to have your animals vaccinated," said Ray Foster, Chief Animal Control Officer for Prince Edward County.

"I urge every citizen of Prince Edward County to please have your companion animals vaccinated. It is the law, but it will also save their life, if they come into contact with a rabid animal."

2010 Tourism Department Report to the Board of Supervisors

Visitor Center Staffing:

- The County has one Full Time staff member for the Tourism Department Magi VanEps
 - Two Part Time positions paid by Prince Edward County worked 1,200 hours at a cost to Prince Edward County of \$8,700 (\$7.25/hour).
 - Workforce Investment Board Older Worker Program (Caring Arms Will Support): As a training site, three Title V participants worked at the Visitor Center in a training capacity in 2010. These participants worked a total of 1,718 hours and were paid (at \$7.25/hour) \$12,455.50 by the Workforce Investment Board.
 - During their annual luncheon in October 2010, Caring Arms Will Support named Magi VanEps their 2010 Training Site Supervisor of the Year.
 - Volunteer Recruitment program started March 2010. Three volunteers worked 328.5 hours off-setting (at \$7.25/hour) an additional \$2,381.63.

Virginia's Retreat Marketing Consortium:

- Chair of the Marketing Committee for Virginia's Retreat
 - Co-wrote and implemented the RFP for a new website
 - Working with web designer site to "go live" Feb 2011
 - o Co-wrote two grants from VTC totaling \$50,000 to leverage funds for marketing efforts
- Member of Civil Rights in Education Heritage Trail Committee
 - Expansion of trail from 41 sites to 65 sites expect to have opening in April 2011

The Best Part of the Civil War ... The End! Marketing Campaign:

- Co-wrote VTC grant from VTC for \$9,521.75 in late 2009 to create this joint marketing campaign with the Town and County of Appomattox leveraging \$19,043.50 in appropriated funding.
- Co-wrote VTC grant from VTC for \$15,000 in 2010 to expand the campaign through 2011 after Amelia County joined the campaign. DCR had already requested to join this campaign because of the success shown in 2009. This grant money will leverage \$30,000 in appropriated funding for the 2011 calendar year.
- The 2010 campaign mailed out more than 10,910 brochures due to The Best Part of the Civil War. The Town of Appomattox used their Bulk Mailing rate to further save money.
 - o Emailed 574 requests for information about our area
 - O Shipped out 39 inquiries for information about our area (requests taken by phone)

Sesquicentennial Legacy Project

- Successful first Legacy Project at Community Library project discovered home with 250+ years of historical documents
 - o 11 participants brought in 160 items to be scanned
 - o Second scheduled event set for April 2011

April 2010: The Visitor Center started seeing in excess of 200 visitors a month in April. Trend continued through August. This year the Visitor Center saw a record 1,830 visitors; just 280 short of doubling 2009 visitor numbers.

- Magi is currently working with the Town of Farmville on acquiring Virginia Logo signage (the
 very large signs on interstates and major highways) that could state Heartland Regional Visitor
 Center, Next Exit. We hope to know Spring 2011 whether the VDOT Enhancement Grant will
 include this signage.
- VDOT traffic count at US 15S intersection with the US460 bypass is approximately 9,000 vehicles per day. We realize that much of this traffic is local; however, that leaves a significant number of visitors who could be attracted into town with more signage. 88% of these vehicles are motorcycles and passenger vehicles.
- The Town of Appomattox, according to the 2009 VDOT report, shows approximately 17,000 vehicles per day on their stretch of US460. The Town's Train Station Visitor Center saw over 18,000 visitors in 2009. The National Park Service Visitor Center in Appomattox County saw in excess of 63,000 visitors in 2010: 62,000 were counted in 2009.

Updated and printed 80,000+ Just A Drive Away brochures jointly with the Town of Farmville.

- Produced a two-year supply of brochures to promote our area.
- Due to State Certified Visitor Center status, these brochures are found in all 10 State-owned Welcome Centers at no charge (would cost \$1,088 per year), and required to be available in all 58 other State Certified Visitor Centers - without State Certification, no Visitor Center is required to carry this brochure.

In the Spring of 2011, Virginia Tourism Corporation is planning several Virginia is For Lovers ads to be broadcast on TV nationally for the first time.

Conclusion:

As 2011 is the official kick-off year for the Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War, we are expecting to see these numbers continue to increase over the next 5 calendar years. Prince Edward County has a wonderful opportunity to daily promote our region to families, genealogy researchers, outdoor enthusiasts, as well as those seeking to follow the Civil Rights in Education Heritage Trail and Lee's Retreat.
