**Jack Houghton**, District, asked for clarification regarding the amount reported for the Enterprise Funds (Water/Sewer Utilities) in the FY10 Audit and the attached Fund Balance Report. Mr. Bartlett stated the funds reported were advanced from the General Fund breakdown, which is a requirement of the Auditor of Public Accounts with the state. Mr. Bartlett reported approximately \$30,000 is actual revenue from the customer base, and advised the public of a presentation by Crowder Construction and Draper Aden to be held on Thursday, February 10, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. in the Board of Supervisors Room, at which they will outline the projections of the project. He said additional meetings are planned in the near future to address more in-depth financial aspects of the project.

Mrs. Jorg Huckabee-Mayfield, Transportation and Land Use Director, was unable to attend the

- Over the next month, VDOT will focus on brush cutting, shoulder maintenance, customer service requests, filling of pot holes, snow removal as necessary
- Bids were received on January 26, 2011, for the Charlotte and Prince Edward County Plant Mix contract; low bidder was Colony Construction
- Request for VDOT to update the 1999 traffic study for Route 628 in the area of the Prince Edward County Public Schools to include the traffic impact on the intersection with U.S. 15 (north and south) and the U.S. 460 exit ramp still under review
- Request that the posted speed be reduced to 35 mph on Route 616, from its intersection with Route 460 to the Nottoway County line based on the review, this section of roadway does not qualify for the requested 35 mph reduced speed limit, but does qualify for a 45 mph reduced speed limit
- Request for an accident review at the intersection of Routes 628 and 630 to determine if there is a way to better align the intersection VDOT's traffic engineering section has recommended that the STOP and STOP AHEAD signs located along Route 628 be replaced with a new 48" STOP sign and STOP AHEAD signs. # RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, held in the Board Room of the Prince Edward County Courthouse, 111 South Street, Farmville, Virginia, on Tuesday, February 8, 2011, at which a quorum was present and voting, the following resolution was adopted in public session.

WHEREAS, Prince Edward County, Virginia, is required to consider reapportionment every ten years; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Census Bureau is expected to soon release the 2010 Census that will indicate that there have been sufficient population changes within Prince Edward County, Virginia, to warrant a reapportionment of the Board of Supervisors of the County; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors has the power to apportion the election districts of the governing body in accordance with federal and state laws;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia supports and adopts the following:

#### GOAL

The goal for the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors is to reapportion the governing body of the County during calendar year 2011. As part of that process, the Board will consider the existing election districts for the members of the Board and proposed revisions to those districts. That process will be completed and approved in accordance with federal and state law.

#### CRITERIA

- 1. The governing body of the County must be composed of a fixed number of members who are elected from single-member districts.
- 2. The Board will adopt election districts composed of contiguous and compact territory, and which shall be so constituted as to give, as nearly as is practicable, representation in proportion to the population of the district.
- 3. The Board will adopt election districts with clearly observable boundaries, as Virginia law defines that term.
- 4. The Board will comply with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended.

#### POLICIES

- 1. The Board will consider plans that maintain eight election districts as well as any other plans that propose a lawful number of election districts.
- 2. The Board will not consider election district proposals which would result in a maximum population deviation between election districts that is ten percent or greater.
- 3. The Board will consider existing geographical and political boundaries, which shall include, but not be limited to, the utilization of incorporated town boundaries.
- 4. The Board will consider established communities of interest that shall include, but not be limited to, geographic areas with similar characteristics such as ethnic, social, and cultural interests. Present and planned use of land and public facilities are relevant to defining communities of interest.
- 5. The Board will consider existing districts and incumbent representation on local public bodies that may be affected by reapportionment.

- 6. The Board encourages plans that are based on existing voting precinct boundaries, and where changes are necessary, precincts shall be divided along Census block boundaries.
- 7. The Board encourages interested persons to submit reapportionment plans to the County. Proponents of any plan shall submit appropriate maps of proposed election districts and statistical summaries and analyses. The statistical analyses shall show the population deviation between election districts and any retrogressive effect on racial or language minority groups.
- 8. The Board encourages interested persons to submit proposals for amending or revising any reapportionment plan that has been submitted to the County. Proponents of any such amendment or revision shall submit appropriate maps showing the proposed changes and statistical summaries and analyses. The statistical analyses shall show the population deviation between election districts and any retrogressive effect on racial or language minority groups.
- 9. Nothwithstanding Policies 7 and 8 above, the Board encourages public comments or recommendations from interested persons on any plan or change to any plan that has been submitted.
- 10. All of the foregoing criteria shall be considered in the reapportionment process, but population equality among districts and compliance with federal and state constitutional requirements and the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, shall be given priority in the event of conflict among the criteria.

Chairman Fore reviewed the redistricting schedule; the Board concurred.

#### In Re: CRC – Grant Writing for CDBG Application for Granite Falls

Mrs. Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development, said that since July 2010, the Prince Edward Economic Development Office has been working with the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD) towards the submittal of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) due March 30, 2011 in the amount of \$700,000. These funds will be used for construction and equipment for the proposed new Workforce Training Center. Due to heavy work load demands, the Economic Development Office is requesting the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors authorize the County Administrator to contract with the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) to assist with the writing of the CDBG application at a cost of \$4,000. Mr. Fowler, the developer of the Granite Falls Hotel & Conference Center, has agreed to pay this cost.

Mrs. Carney added that as part of the grant requirements, a Public Hearing must be held to gather input from citizens of the community regarding the Workforce Training Center. As this is a "re-submittal" of an application from March 2010, Prince Edward County is only required to hold one Public meeting, but it is encouraged to be as near as possible to the grant due date. Vice-Chairman Simpson called the reconvened meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

Vice-Chairman Simpson welcomed representatives from Nottoway County, the Town of Crewe, the Town of Burkeville, and the Town of Farmville. He then announced Chairman Fore was unable to attend due to a death in the family but provided a statement; Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, read the statement, which stated the presentation is the first in a series of meetings and is an informational briefing, and the public will have opportunities later to ask questions.

#### In Re: Presentation by Crowder Construction Company and Draper Aden Associates

Mr. Fred Pribble, Draper Aden Associates, presented information on the Sandy River Reservoir and provided a brief history of the project. Mr. Pribble discussed the droughts in 2002 and 2008, and presented a chart showing projected average daily demands, stating the demand increase is based on data from the Water Supply Plan and the 2000 and 2010 Census data showing Prince Edward County's population is increasing. He further discussed the impact of the population expansion and projected average daily demands and discussed other potential water demands that could occur but were not factored into the projections. Mr. Pribble reviewed the various options evaluated: (1) raw water to the town, (2) emergency water to the town, and (3) a County facility located at the reservoir. He explained the County chose to move forward with researching the third option that Prince Edward County proceed with a PPEA proposal, that the Board of Supervisors advertised for competing proposals and eventually approved an Interim Agreement with Crowder Construction Company.

Mr. Murray Taylor, Crowder Construction, reviewed the scope of the project; Mr. Chris Robards, Crowder Construction, provided information regarding the raw water intake structure, pumps, the control building infrastructure, the distribution system and potential service areas. Mr. Robards then presented information regarding cost reductions, the treatment study conducted in November [2010], and the opportunities for the local workforce, subcontractors, material suppliers and equipment rentals. He then stated the initial cost estimate for the project in 2008 was \$33.7 million; due to the studies and competitive pricing, the projected cost is now \$24.879 million with indirect costs estimated to be \$841,900. Mr. Robards stated suppliers and subcontractors are willing to hold their cost submittals until May 1, 2011, thus Crowder Construction can only hold their price until May 1, 2011. Mr. Robards gave an estimated timeline for the remainder of the project and stated meetings will be held with the Board of Supervisors, potential partners and funding agencies; workshops will be held to determine the final scope.

Mr. Carlos Norris, Senior Vice-President of Crowder Construction, stated the timing is in the County's favor due to the state of the economy and the low interest rates; he added this project is an investment that will provide a reliable water supply solution and will prepare the County for the next drought.

Supervisor Wilck expressed his concern regarding the number of pilot studies that must be done prior to receiving approval from the Department of Health. He said VDH has stated they are going to require additional pilot studies. Mr. Pribble stated the PER has been resubmitted and plans to schedule a meeting with VDH within two weeks and will discuss the issue. The Pilot Study conducted in the fall provided data for two of the three concerns expressed by VDH, namely the impact of cold water on treatment and to capture the fall turnover. Mr. Pribble stated the reason VDH wants another pilot study in the summer is to determine if algae would cause any treatment issues. Draper Aden's position is two-fold: First, if no algae bloom occurs this summer, would you have to wait another year to conduct another study. Also, there are many different types of algae and each can present different treatment challenges. Even if an algae bloom occurs this summer, there is no guarantee that a different type of algae could pose a problem in the future. Second, VDH requires new treatment plants to have provisions to deal with algae issues regardless of what any one-time study shows. Thus, it is Draper Aden's position that any additional studies only increases the County's costs and delays the project to determine a solution to a possible problem addressed in the water treatment design.

Supervisor Wilck then questioned the reports and documents not completed but submitted for payment; Mr. Pribble said all information has been submitted to the County Administrator, the financial documents have not been completed as the Board will meet with funding agencies and potential partners over the next few weeks. Supervisor Wilck implied he would like to release the engineering documents that have been paid for and ask for bids to see if the County could get a lower bid. Mr. Robards stated the designs are only 30% complete and are not at the stage to send out for competitive bids but because of the work Crowder Construction and Draper Aden have done and their intimate knowledge of the project, they are confident in their ability to submit a bid. Normally before a locality advertises for bids on such a project, the locality develops 100% design documents and receives VDH approval of those designs before bidding the project. To reach such a level of design would take a significant amount of time. Mr. Norris stated the County has every right to seek other bids.

Supervisor Gantt entered the meeting at this time.

Mr. Norris said Crowder Construction will fulfill the contract; the County will be in possession of all documents.

Supervisor Wilck questioned the two PERs not being complete; Mr. Pribble said the second PER is not part of the Interim Agreement, but is a design document. He said the PER for the water distribution and the PER for the treatment plant were combined into one report and submitted to the Department of Health in August [2010]. Further discussion followed. Mr. Norris stated they are willing to review all

payment requests with the County and if there was an overbilling, the County would be credited and a refund provided if necessary.

Supervisor Campbell asked for clarification of the financial analysis for which the County was billed. Mr. Pribble said the model is complete but has not yet been run with the numbers from tonight's meeting. A meeting will be held with Davenport to provide them the information, who will then review the financial analysis and report to the Board.

Supervisor Wilck asked if the final price includes the \$2 million for the Interim Agreement, the \$2.5 million to the Town of Farmville, and the \$400,000 for the start-up of the [Virginia's Heartland Water & Sewer] Authority; Mr. Robards said he is not privy to that information.

Mr. Bartlett said a schedule for work sessions will be set up to include potential partners and funding agencies.

# MAINTENANCE (For the next 30 days):

 Winter weather operations were undertaken periodically over the past month.

Over the next month, VDOT will focus on the following:

- Brush cutting will continue throughout the month.
- Maintenance of non-hard surfaced roadways will continue, as needed
- Maintenance of stone shoulders will be performed, as well as spot ditching and litter pickup

# PROJECT STATUS

VDOT met with County staff to explore funding options for the High Bridge Trail new access road and improvements to Route 601.

VDOT is currently updating the balances on the Secondary Six Year Plan and will forward a Draft proposal for this year's Plan to the Board in the near future.

TRAFFIC ENGINEERING ISSUES

The following requests have been made by the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. A request for VDOT to update the 1999 traffic safety study for Route 628 in the area of the Prince Edward County Public Schools and include the traffic impact on the intersection with U.S. 15 (north and south) and the U.S. 460 exit ramp. This request is still under review.
- 2. Supervisor Campbell has asked that VDOT consider placing either a larger yield sign or two yield signs at the end of the westbound exit ramp at Dowdy's corner on Rt. 15. He has received complaints that traffic is not yielding. The request has been forwarded to our Traffic Engineering Section for review.

3. A speed study has been requested for Schultz Mill Road (Route 632) between Rt. 628 (Mountain Creek Road) and Rt. 629 (Gallion Road). This request is under review.

#### **OTHER INQUIRIES/ISSUES**

Bridge Repairs on Route 623:

Norfolk-Southern Railway has performed repairs to this structure; however they did not fully address all of the concerns outlined in the critical recommendation. The railway has been contacted by our office concerning the additional repairs required. The structure was rated/ analyzed and the 3 Ton posting must remain in effect at this time.

Route 701:

VDOT has received a request to investigate a citizen complaint regarding Route 701 and the access to the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries property at Briery Lake. This investigation is underway.

#### CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
  - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
  - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
  - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
  - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
  - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
  - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
  - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
  - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
    - 1. Person <u>must</u> be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
    - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
    - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
    - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
    - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
    - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
    - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
    - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
    - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
    - 10. Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

**Summary:** Discussion of the rezoning request by Richard Raymond, Jr. and Robert Raymond, Sr. began at the Planning Commission in December and has continued with amendments until the final recommendation was made at the Commission's February 15, 2011 meeting. Because there have been several changes, we felt it prudent to brief the Board prior to authorizing a Public Hearing.

As the Board will recall from previous meeting discussions, Richard Raymond, Jr. and Robert Raymond, Sr. submitted a request to rezone from A-2, Agricultural Residential, to C-1, General Commercial, a 1.5 acre parcel located at 4644 Farmville Road (Tax Map # 50-A-71). The original request was to permit a truck rental and used automobile sales business to locate on the property. The amended application eliminates the used automobile sales business, but adds a general office component, which is a permitted use in General Commercial. Additionally, the original site plan was amended to eliminate access from the site onto Stokes Road, leaving the sole access to the site from U.S. 15.

At its February 15, 2011 meeting, the Prince Edward County Planning Commission voted to recommend to the Board: approval of a conditional rezoning request by Robert Raymond, Sr. and Richard Raymond, Jr. of property located at 4644 Farmville Road and identified as Tax Map Parcel 50-A-71 from Agricultural Residential to General Commercial, with the conditions that exterior lighting be limited to downward lighting attached to the building, that a continuous buffer be planted and perpetually maintained along Stokes Road in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance Design Standards, and that the maximum construction height not exceed forty feet (40').

The Board may wish to consider the following additional conditions that were discussed at earlier Planning Commission meetings, but not included in the recommendation:

- 1. The approval is conditional upon there being no more than 10 rental vehicles (trucks) of operable condition on the site at any time.
- 2. No inoperable vehicles may be parked/garaged on the site at any time.
- 3. The rezoning approval is conditional upon approval of a VDOT highway entrance permit onto Route 15.







The February 15, 2011 meeting was called to order by Chairman Porterfield.

Minutes:

Chairman Porterfield asked for any corrections or additions to the January 18, 2011 minutes. Hearing none, he declared them approved for filing as distributed.

Rezoning Request & Site Plan:

Chairman Porterfield directed attention to the review of the site plan submitted by the Raymonds for the rezoning request for the parcel located at 4644 Farmville Road which the Planning Commission has discussed during the past two meetings. He confirmed that all commissioners had received a copy of the site plan.

Chairman Porterfield called on Ms. Daves-Johnson to discuss how the request had changed since the first

submission in December. Ms. Daves-Johnson explained that the site plan presented for review has been changed since the first presentation by the Raymonds. The current site plan does not contain an ingress / egress point from Stokes Road. Also, in response to neighborhood concerns, the request for the use has changed from the Auto Sales, Used car sales use to a General Offices use. The applicant wishes to maintain the Auto Rental use for a moving truck rental business at the site.

Chairman Porterfield reminded that there have already been two public hearings for the proposal, but explained that public comments could be entertained tonight also. He then asked for comments from the Commissioners.

Commissioner Gilfillan directed her question to the Raymonds and asked whether the meeting with the neighborhood had occurred. Mr. Richard Raymond explained that Robert Raymond had met with neighbors at the beginning of the project planning, and that since then the only opposition to the project had been directed toward the used car sales which they have subsequently removed from the project plans.

Chairman Porterfield called on Ms. Daves-Johnson for any public comments received. Ms. Daves-Johnson provided the following comments:

Parcel 50-A-65: Mr. Leslie Stokes, associated with 83 Stokes Rd, remains opposed to the project, even with the General Offices change, because the truck rental portion is retained. He is concerned about the property becoming an eyesore and devaluing his property. Route 15 is a main corridor and it should be an attractive entrance into Farmville and for the homeowners there. "I'm not against change, I know things have to change, but I have personally turned down a cell-tower offer because of my respect for the neighborhood." Call received February 15, 2011 at 9:30a.m.

Parcel 50-2-1: Ms. Evette Farley, landowner at 183 Stokes Rd, called to express her opposition to the project and explained that she does not desire commercial development in her neighborhood. Call received February 15, 2011 at 3:58 p.m.

50-A-78, 50-A-76: Ms. India Redd, landowner on Spraggs-Redd Drive and property along Stokes Road, objects to the rezoning stating that Stokes Road is too narrow for trucks and commercial traffic, there are dangerous intersections already where Stokes Rd and Route 15 intersect and that she is concerned about additional traffic generated by commercial uses.

Letter dated February 9, 2011: Christopher and Brenda Bolding, 289 Stokes Road, expressed opposition to the rezoning request. (Copy of letter filed with minutes.)

Letter not dated: James and Shirley Bolding, 337 Stokes Road, expressed opposition to the rezoning request. (Copy of letter filed with minutes.)

E-mail rec'd February 15, 2011: Hampden-Sydney College via Shirley Robertson, Business Operations Manager, expressing concern about traffic safety and the effect of the site entrance on the college's long term plan to provide a new scenic entrance to the campus. (Copy of e-mail filed with minutes.)

Commissioner Jones offered a reply to the concern expressed by HSC. He agreed with the safety concerns, but rejected the concern about limiting future commercial entrances due to an entrance planned for the college. He was concerned that many of the emails and phone calls might not have realized that the used auto sales request had been rescinded and that the entrance to Stokes Road had been removed from the site plan.

Chairman Porterfield asked the Raymonds to address whether the existing driveway would be used as a commercial entrance. There will not be a commercial turn-lane at the existing entrance, but it would be widened for use. There is a larger entrance planned for the site.

Chairman Porterfield asked about whether the site plan boundary reflected the right-of-way of Stokes Road and Route 15. Mr. Richard Raymond explained that the site plan was harmonious with the right-of-way, but that the line weight didn't indicate it clearly on the photocopied site plans. Commissioner Gilfillan expressed concern that there be room for the right-of-way, landscape buffer, and set-backs. Mr. Raymond agreed to remove two parking spaces if necessary to meet set-back and right-of-way requirements, including the eight feet (8') wide landscape buffer.

Mr. Raymond explained that the lighting would only be mounted to the corners of the building and pointed downward, and that there would not be any poles or lights in the parking lot areas. Commissioner Mason suggested that a motion detector be used to limit the light emitted throughout the night, and because it could result in energy savings. The Raymonds agreed this was a good idea.

Chairman Porterfield stated that removing the commercial entrance from Stokes Road assured that there would be no traffic impact to Stokes Road from the development of this site, and that the type of businesses proposed would not generate traffic loads which would be problematic for Route 15.

Chairman Porterfield asked whether any members of the audience wished to speak to the Commission. He. summarized that a continuous line of fairly rapidly growing vegetation for a landscaped buffer was added, that there would no longer be a used car lot, and there was no entrance from the site to Stokes Road.

Commissioner Townsend called for a rendition of the proposed building for the site and pointed to the allowance of a 60' building height in the Zoning Ordinance for General Commercial parcels. He suggested that a height limitation of 40' be a condition for the rezoning request.

There was much discussion associated with the plan review.

Commissioner Leatherwood asked whether the truck rental would be a commercial rental company. Mr. Arthur Rowley approached the podium and introduced himself as the current owner of the Penske Truck Rental business presently located on 1001 E. Third Street in Farmville. He invited the Commissioners to visit with the residential neighbors behind his business, and explained that since July he has only had four trucks at a time on his lot. The hours of operation are Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Saturdays 8 a.m. - 12 noon.

Chairman Porterfield asked the dimensions of the parking lot and inquired about the surface treatment plans. Mr. Raymond replied that the surface will be gravel and eventually asphalt. Chairman Porterfield confirmed that if the parking lot is less than 5,000 sf then gravel is acceptable.

Chairman Porterfield called for any additional questions. Hearing none, he made a motion that the Planning Commission recommend favorably to the Board of Supervisors the conditional rezoning of the parcel at 4644 Farmville Road to General Commercial for the purpose of office space and truck rental and that the conditions include downward lighting attached to the building, a continuous buffer planting in compliance with zoning requirements along Stokes Rd, and a maximum construction height not to exceed 40'.

Commissioner Mason inquired about the motion sensing light operation. Chairman Porterfield stated it was a good idea, but did not wish to include it as a condition.

Commissioner Gilfillan expressed interest in hearing from any neighbors along Stokes Rd that were present in the audience in response to the conversation by the Planning Commission.

Ms. Martha Cleveland approached the podium and explained that her family (owners of (50-A-70)) has opposed these plans, especially for the used car lot which has since been removed, although she is still concerned about the "U-Haul trucks". She appreciates that the gentlemen are trying to start a business, and noted that even though there were objections from her and her family, the revisions to the site plan were an improvement. She provided written comments. (A copy is filed with the minutes.)

Gilfillan asked that perpetual maintenance of the landscape buffer be part of the conditions. She requested that the adjacent property owners be sent a letter about the new plan and the opportunity to attend the Public Hearing before the Board of Supervisors.

Mr Richard Raymond interjected that Mr. Robert Raymond had spoken with the neighbors. Ms. Cleveland responded that there was a conversation about changing the lot to an office building but that the used car lot had not been mentioned.

Chairman Porterfield called for a vote on the motion to recommend conditional rezoning of the property with the conditions that exterior lighting be limited to downward lighting attached to the building, that a continuous buffer be planted and perpetually maintained along Stokes Road which complies with the Zoning Ordinance Design Standards, and that the maximum construction height not exceed 40'. The vote was met with unanimous favor.

Commissioner Watson added that the extra traffic on Stokes Road and the used car sales issues which were the most contested by the public were resolved by the new site plan.

**RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:** The Planning Commission recommends approval of a conditional rezoning request by Robert Raymond, Sr. and Richard Raymond, Jr. of property located at 4644 Farmville Road and identified as Tax Map Parcel 50-A-71 from Agricultural Residential to General Commercial with the conditions that exterior lighting be limited to downward lighting attached to the building, that a continuous buffer be planted and perpetually maintained along Stokes Road in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance Design Standards, and that the maximum construction height not exceed 40'.

#### Resolution:

The Planning Commission reviewed a Resolution of Respect for Thomas Pairet and a Resolution of Respect for Lee Hicks, Jr. for their service to the Planning Commission. Chairman Porterfield read both resolutions aloud, he called for a vote for each resolution. Each resolution received unanimous favor of the Planning Commissioners.

#### Agri-tourism Request:

Ms. Daves-Johnson asked if the Planning Commission wished to amend the Agricultural Conservation District (A-1) description in the Zoning Ordinance to include Agri-tourism as a Special Use. She described a phone call inquiry from a lady who is interested in operating a corn-maze in the Prospect area in the Fall. Ms. Daves-Johnson explained a corn-maze as a use within a category described as agri-tourism which is not included in the general agriculture definition because it entails commercial business and an entertainment component. Ms. Daves-Johnson referenced the Comprehensive Plan goal of promoting agricultural business in the County and suggested that agri-tourism be added as a use in the A-1 District, Zoning Ordinance. Commissioner Gilfillan requested clarification of a "corn-maze." Chairman Porterfield stated that Community Recreation is a permitted use in the Agricultural Conservation district and considered this as certainly community recreation, adding that the fact that there will be a charge for it does not change the essential nature of the recreation aspect. There were no objections from the commissioners.

#### Information Items:

Capital Improvement Plan:	Ms. Daves-Johnson reported that the Emergency Response Providers wish to make a presentation at the March 15 <sup>th</sup> Planning Commission meeting. The Planning Commissioners asked that the Firefighters Association make one presentation representing all of the volunteer fire departments.
James River Association:	The JRA is scheduling evaluations of the County's codes and ordinances to see how well they address nutrient reduction goals for water quality.
Sub-division Ordinance:	Ms. Daves-Johnson suggested that time be scheduled on the March meeting agenda for a work session to review the draft sub-division ordinance. There was discussion and it was agreed upon, if the agenda will allow.

Ms. Daves-Johnson shared an update on Jonathan Pickett which was a report of continued improvement. He is presently trying to establish a consolidation therapy schedule which might prevent him from returning to the office as soon as everyone would like. Commissioner Mason commended Ms. Daves-Johnson for keeping the Planning Commission organized during Mr. Pickett's absence.

Urban Development Area:

Chairman Porterfield shared a concern that Prince Edward County would be required to develop an UDA within 18 months due to the census results. This involves planning and zoning for a population growth in the next decade equal to the past decade.

The Planning Commission requests the County Attorney to determine whether there could be an exemption or waiver of Prince Edward's requirement to prepare a UDA if the percentage of population growth in Prince Edward attributed to college students reduced the county population growth below the UDA threshold.

Commissioner Townsend directed everyone's attention to the PlanVirginia website for a detailed presentation about the UDA and TDR programs.

Chairman Porterfield asked for any additional items for business. Hearing none, he thanked everyone for coming and declared the meeting adjourned at 8:40 pm.

This amount does not include the cost for Social Services which will be about \$7,680. We are still working on various options concerning Health Insurance and will have more information and options for the Board to discuss in the near future. While the deadline for both a request for renewal and/or a request for termination is April 1, 2011, I have spoken to the Local choice Program Manager for the Commonwealth, and I have been informed any request for termination can be rescinded as late as May 31, 2011. - b. Attached is a draft of a resolution authorizing the County Administrator to submit a funding application to the Virginia Department of Health (VDH). I am proposing we request up to \$8 million dollars in grants or low cost loans. The deadline for submitting applications this year is April 1, 2011. Dear Mr. Bartlett:

Thank you very much for your contribution in response to VACo's appeal for a "special assessment" to buttress the harmful effects of legislation aimed at real estate assessment appeals. The proposed legislation (HB 1588 and SB 1350) would have significantly altered the appeals process by changing the burden of proof from the taxpayer to the assessing locality in all matters before the Board of Equalization and Circuit Court.

# **Three Chopt District leads Henrico growth**

#### By Luz Lazo

The bulk of Henrico County's population growth in the past decade occurred as expected in the county's northwest corridor, according to a county analysis of data from the 2010 census.

As Henrico officially begins its redistricting process, the Board of Supervisors learned that the number of people living in the Three Chopt District — one of five districts — jumped about 32 percent from 54,459 people to 72,035 people.

Three Chopt, which covers Innsbrook, Short Pump and both sides of Broad Street, saw notable growth in its Asian population, which went from 6 percent in 2000 to 15 percent of the district's population in 2010.

"I'm not surprised about this growth because the same thing happened 10 years ago," Three Chopt District Supervisor David A. Kaechele said. "We will have to look at a lot of options because we have to reduce the people" in the district.

During a work session Tuesday, Planning Director R. Joseph Emerson told the supervisors that the ideal population per district would be 61,387 people. He said it would take other districts picking up population from Three Chopt, the only district that is substantially above that ideal population.

Henrico had 306,935 residents in 2010, an increase of 17 percent since 2000, with blacks and Hispanics helping to fuel much of the growth. The black population now makes up 30 percent of the county's population, up from about 25 percent a decade ago. The Hispanic population rose to 15,000, an increase of 152 percent since 2000 to make up 4.9 percent of the county population.

The Asian community rose to 20,000 people, or 6.5 percent of the population, compared with 3.6 percent a decade ago.

"Henrico is a growing, vibrant and diverse community," Emerson told the supervisors as he presented the data.

Varina, the largest district areawise, saw the second-largest growth — 20 percent — growing from 49,300 people in 2000 to 59,349 people in 2010.

Varina saw a decrease in its white population, while its black population jumped from 19,061 to 30,789, and went from being 38.7 percent of the district population to becoming a majority with nearly 52 percent.

Meanwhile, Brookland District has the largest presence of Hispanics, with about one-third of the county's Hispanic population.

The redistricting process will include several public hearings and comment sessions between now and May 24, when supervisors are expected to vote on the new district lines, said County Attorney Joseph P. Rapisarda Jr.

Rapisarda said that in the process, the county will need to reduce the number of people in Three Chopt District. The goal is to bring each district as close as possible to the ideal district population, or within 10 percent of it, he said.

The supervisors have not discussed raising the number of districts from five to seven, Rapisarda said, but he said the option is not off the table. Kaechele said he expects the option to come up during the process.

#### Water-reservoir contract

The supervisors on Tuesday approved a multimillion-dollar contract for engineering services for the county's \$280 million water-reservoir project.

The board awarded the \$43.45 million contract to Arcadis U.S., with services through its water division, Malcolm Pirnie.

Henrico will build, own and operate the 1,100-acre Cobbs Creek Regional Water Supply Reservoir in northwest Cumberland County near the James River.

The 50-year regional water project, approved in August by the Henrico supervisors after a decade of negotiations and debate, is expected to be completed in 10 years and the reservoir to be operational in 2021.
