At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House,

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official

record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for

follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate

response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board

agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the

opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public

information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any

factual error that might occur.

1 **10** **Sam Campbell,** Prospect District, expressed his concern about the suggested increase in Board compensation; he stated the pay rate was known when the members ran for office. He also expressed his disapproval of the Revenue Sharing project for the new Route 786.

Henry Shelton, Prospect District, stated he is in support of Sam Campbell, and as an alternative, suggested being paid only a flat rate per meeting. Mr. Shelton then expressed his concern regarding the increased cost of the Route 628 project and the County's proposed purchase of more land. He then said he was embarrassed regarding the actions of a Board member at the January meeting regarding speed limits.

Supervisor Simpson stated the gentleman returned and apologized to the Board regarding that matter.

David Hart, Rice, asked the Board to consider reopening the convenience site in Rice every day. He stated that since the site was closed one day a week, there is an ongoing problem with trash being thrown along the road and in the bushes.

Joe Huddleston stated he received a letter from VDOT regarding work to be done on Route 643; he questioned their right to enter the property to do survey work. Chairman Fore said nothing is scheduled on that road except normal maintenance, and requested the staff look into the matter and get back to Mr. Huddleston.

Robert Fowler, Prince Edward Development, LLC, stated during the Granite Falls CDA meeting in November [2011], the Board received a preliminary presentation on a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) for the conference center component of the hotel/conference center. The Board and the Granite Falls CDA gave preliminary approval for a bond issue of up to \$17 million. The team requested additional time to do legal research to finalize the details and then return to the Board with the final plan. He said they are now at the stage to present the final plan. On the hotel component, the equity is raised; final negotiations are ongoing with three separate banks and expect at least one written preliminary commitment by the end of next week. The legal analysis is 95% complete. Mr. Fowler respectfully requested a meeting date be set for the Board and the Granite Falls CDA to meet with Maguire Woods, Davenport, the underwriter, and Prince Edward Development, LLC.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Jones responded to Mr. Hart's concern, stating that he is trying to get people out to that

site for clean-up. He suggested discussion about reopening the Rice convenience site during the budget

process.

Supervisor Wilck stated that on November 13 [2011], Mr. Fowler had said financing would be in

place by this time but it is not yet complete, and expressed his opposition to the project.

Supervisor Campbell stated Mr. Hart's concern at Rice is also an issue at the Prospect convenience

site; both sites need to be open on a daily basis.

Sheriff Wesley Reed stated that after the previous Board meeting, the position of Chief Deputy

was awarded to David Eppes; Sheriff Reed said the Comp Board has agreed to increase the wages of the

Chief Deputy by 15% to \$48,044 and requested the Board agree to a \$3,000 increase to give the Chief

Deputy a salary of \$51,044.

law in the Friday, February 3, 2012 and Friday, February 10, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE

HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, stated that at the December 2011 meeting, the Board

took action to position the County and the Granite Falls Hotel and Conference Center project to take

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advantage of the Virginia Tourism Development Financing Program. The final components of the program that require action are the adoption of an ordinance that specifies that the County shall match the 1% of state tax by an equal dollar amount of local tax revenue generated by transactions taking place on the premises and the execution of a Performance Agreement. The County Attorney's office drafted the ordinance and has revised the existing economic development grant agreement between the County and the IDA and Prince Edward Development, LLC to meet the state's requirements for a performance agreement. It has been reviewed and approved by the Attorney assisting VTC with this program.

Chairman Fore opened the Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING FUNDING FOR A TOURISM PROJECT

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward wishes to participate in the Virginia Tourism Development Financing Program; and

WHEREAS, Section 58.1-3851.1(C) of the *Code of Virginia* requires that a locality, by ordinance, direct that at least one percent of the local sales and use tax revenues, or an equivalent amount of other local tax revenues, generated by transactions taking place on the premises of the authorized tourism project shall be applied to the payment of principal and interest on qualified gap financing, and

WHEREAS, the Prince Edward County Tourism Development Plan identifies a deficiency that will be met by the Granite Falls Hotel and Conference Center project; and

WHEREAS, the Granite Falls Hotel and Conference Center project has been authorized by an appropriate ordinance; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, following a duly advertised Public Hearing, does hereby authorize the following distribution of local tax revenue generated by the Granite Falls Hotel and Conference Center, subject to annual appropriation and subject to the provisions of the

Economic Development Grant and Performance Agreement to the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia:

The County shall make payments equal to the entitled sales tax revenues for a period of twenty (20) years from any of the following sources to the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia pursuant to the authority of Section 58.1-3851.1(C) of the *Code of Virginia* to be applied to payments of principal and interest on qualified gap financing:

- a) 80% of the transient occupancy taxes collected in any calendar year from the Project in excess of the amount of such taxes collected in calendar year 2009; and/or
- b) 95% of food and beverage sales tax or assessment collected, if any, in any calendar year from the Project.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT AND PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT

This ECONOMIC GRANT AND PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT dated this _____ day of February, 2012 (THIS "Agreement"), by and among PRINCE EDWARD DEVELOPMENT, LLC or an affiliate formed by it (the "Developer"), the COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA (the "County") and the INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA, (the "Authority").

RECITALS:

The purpose of this Agreement is to describe certain obligations of the Developer and incentives to be provided by the County and the Authority to the Developer in connection with the development of hospitality and conference/training facilities in the County, to be known as Granite Falls Hotel & Conference Center (the "Project") and to utilize Section 58.1-3851.1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended to facilitate the use of certain tax revenues for the Project.

The County is authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement and to make the grant payments described herein to the Authority pursuant to Sections 15.2-935(B) and 58.1-3851.1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code").

The Authority is authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement to fulfill its obligations hereunder pursuant to Sections 15.2-4905(12) and 15.2-4905(13) of the Virginia Code.

The County and the Authority anticipate numerous benefits to the County and its residents as a result of the development of the Project, including increased tax base for the County, additional employment and training opportunities, promotion of tourism, and enhanced economic strength of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and inconsideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I DEVELOPER'S COMMITMENTS

In consideration of the assistance being provided to the County and the Authority under the terms of this Agreement, the Developer agrees as follows, contingent on upon the Developer purchasing certain land in Prince Edward County, Virginia consisting of approximately 92 acres described in Exhibit A, attached hereto, (the "Land"). Should the Developer fail to purchase the Land within one year after the date of this Agreement or should the Developer notify the County and the Authority in writing of its intention to not acquire the Land, the obligations of the County and the Authority under this Agreement shall immediately cease and terminate.

1.01 <u>Development of Project</u>

The Developer agrees to acquire the Land, construct or cause to be constructed, develop or cause to be developed and operate or cause to be operated the Granite Falls Hotel & Conference Center consisting of approximately 176 guestrooms, an approximately 3400 square foot spa, an approximately 55,000 square foot conference and training center and all required public infrastructure in support thereof.

Any material changes to the Project components described above shall be made only with the prior written consent of the County. The facilities described in the paragraph above shall be substantially completed within 3 years from the date of this Agreement.

1.02 Financing of Project

The Developer shall provide financing for all components of the Project except for the conference/training center and certain infrastructure whose financing will be provided for by the Granite Falls Community Development Authority. The County shall not be responsible for issuing any bonds, notes, or other financing for the Project. All financings for the Project shall state clearly that such financing is not an obligation of the County and the County has no obligation for the payment of such financing. Any financings to be repaid from proceeds of the Grant (as defined below in Section 2.01) shall be referred to in this Agreement as the "TIF Financings". In the event the County enacts a food & beverage sales tax in the future, the outstanding debt issued by the Granite Falls Community Development Authority and secure by a food & beverage assessment shall be included in the definition of "TIF Financings". Notwithstanding the foregoing, the County will work with the Developer to facilitate the use of certain tax revenues and the Developer's access fee to finance no more than 20% of the Project (the "Gap financing Component").

1.03 Application of Grant Proceeds

The Developer shall use proceeds of the Grant, together with the Entitled Sales Taxes and Access Fees, to repay the TIF Financings and apply the proceeds of any TIF Financing to pay a portion of the costs of constructing, equipping, renovating or re-equipping the Project described in Section 1.01 above and shall not use any portion of the Grant or TIF Financings to pay any other costs.

1.04 Access Fee

Pursuant to Section 58.1-3851.1(D) of the Virginia Code, the Developer shall pay an access fee for a period of twenty (20) years equivalent to one percent of the sales tax revenues generated by transactions taking place on the premises of the authorized tourism project referenced herein (the "Access Fee"). The Access Fees shall be collected by the County and remitted to the Authority on a quarterly basis. The Access Fees shall be used solely to make payments of principal and interest on the qualified Gap Financing component of the TIF Financings.

1.05 Reporting

The Developer will provide to the County and the Authority such information as the County or the Authority may reasonably request with respect to the financing, acquisition and construction of the Project, including copies of documentation relating to the TIF Financings and debt service schedules for the various components of the TIF Financings. The Developer will provide the County with no less than annual reports setting forth the amount and purpose of expenditures of Grant proceeds and/or TIF Financing proceeds.

ARTICLE II COUNTY'S AND AUTHORITY'S COMMITMENTS

In consideration of the benefits to the County as a result of the Developer's performance under this Agreement, the County and the Authority agree as follows:

2.01 Grant

The County agrees to make payments to the Authority (the "Grant") of certain incremental tax revenue (the "Incremental Tax Revenues") as described below on the terms subject to the limitations set forth in this Agreement:

- (a) 80% of the incremental increase in real estate and personal property tax revenues collected with respect to the Project in any calendar year in excess of the amount of such taxes collected in the calendar year 2011; and
- (b) 80% of the transient occupancy taxes collected in any calendar year from the Project in excess of the amount of such taxes collected in calendar year 2011; and
- (c) 95% of food and beverage County sales tax or CDA assessments collected, if any, in any calendar year from the Project.

2.02 <u>Subject to Appropriation</u>

Payments by the County of the Grant to the Authority shall be subject to annual appropriations by the Board of Supervisors and shall not constitute a debt or general obligation of the County. The County Administrator, or other officer responsible for preparing the County's budget, will include each year in the County's budget an appropriation of the Grant to the Authority; however, payment of the Grant shall be subject to appropriation each year by the Board of Supervisors.

2.03 <u>Limitation on Amount</u>

The amount of Grant paid to the Authority each year shall not exceed the Incremental Tax Revenues. Payments of the Grant shall not exceed the amount of Incremental Tax Revenues actually collected by the County.

2.04 Expiration of Grant

Payment of the Grant shall terminate on the earlier to occur of (i) payment in full of the TIF Financings or (ii) December 31, 2038.

2.05 GAP Financing

A portion of the TIF Financing (the "Gap Financing Component") will be repaid from revenues derived pursuant to the Virginia Tourism Development Financing Program (the "TDFP"). Under the TDFP, the Commonwealth will remit an amount equal to one percent of that state sales tax revenues generated by transactions taking place on the premises of the Project (the "Entitled Sales Taxes"). The County shall collect an amount equivalent to the Entitled Sales Taxes from other local tax revenues generated by transactions taking place on the premises of the Project. The County shall also collect the Access Fee referenced in Section 1.04 herein. The County shall remit the amounts collected to the Authority on a quarterly basis. The Access Fees, along with Entitled Sales Taxes distributed pursuant to Section 58.1-3851.1(B)(1) of the Virginia Code, shall be used solely to make payments of principal and interest on the qualified Gap Financing Component and shall continue to be collected and paid until such Gap Financing Component is paid in full. The County shall notify the State Controller and the Department of Taxation when Entitled Sales Taxes are no longer subject to being remitted.

2.06 Authority's Obligations

The Authority will apply amounts received pursuant to this Agreement to the payment of the TIF Financings. The Authority agrees to assign its rights to payment of the Grant to the lender or trustee for the TIF Financings. The Authority's obligations hereunder shall be limited to amounts paid to it by the County under this Agreement.

ARTICLE III INDEMNIFICATION; PAYMENT OF EXPENSES

The Developer shall indemnify, protect and save the County, the Authority, and each of their respective officers, directors and employees harmless from all liability, obligations, losses, claims, damages, actions, suits, proceedings, costs, and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, arising or resulting directly from the issuance of TIF Financing. The Developer agrees to pay the costs, fees and expenses of the County and the Authority, including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred by the County or the Authority in connection with this Agreement and the administration of the Grant. The indemnification arising under this Article III shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE IV TERMINATION OF THE COUNTY'S AND THE AUTHORITY'S OBLIGATIONS

Should any of the following circumstances occur or exist (each an "Event of Default"), the obligation of the County and the Authority to provide the Grant, as described herein, to the Developer shall cease and terminate:

- (a) The Developer fails to substantially complete construction of the Project components described in Section 1.01 within three years after the date of this Agreement;
- (b) The Developer assigns its rights without the consent of the County; or

(c) The Developer ceases to operate or cause the Project to be operated as described herein for a period of 12 months.

The provisions of this Article IV are subject to the following limitation: if by reason of *force majeure* the Developer is unable in whole or in part to carry out this Agreement, the Developer shall not be deemed in default during the continuance of such inability. The term "force majeure" as used herein shall mean, without limitation, the following: acts of God; strikes, lockouts or other industrial disturbances; acts of public enemies; orders or restraints of any kind of the government of the United States of America or of the Commonwealth or any of their departments, agencies or official, or any civil or military authority; insurrections; riots; landslides; earthquakes; fires; storms; droughts; floods; explosions; breakage or accidents to machinery, transmission lines, pipes or canals; or any other cause or event not reasonably within the control of the Developer.

ARTICLE V TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall terminate upon the earlier of (i) payment in full of the TIF Financing or (ii) December 31, 2038.

ARTICLE VI ASSIGNMENTS

No party shall sell or assign any interest in or obligation under this Agreement without the prior written consent of all of the parties.

ARTICLE VII LIMITED OBLIGATIONS OF THE COUNTY AND THE AUTHORITY

NO PROVISION OF THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE CONSTRUED OR INTERPRETED AS CREATING A PLEDGE OF THE FAITH AND CREDIT OF THE COUNTY OR THE AUTHORITY WITHIN THE MEANING OF ANY CONSTITUTIONAL DEBT LIMITATION. NO PROVISION OF THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE CONSTRUED OR INTERPRETED AS A DONATION OR A LENDING OF THE CREDIT OF THE COUNTY OR THE AUTHORITY WITHIN THE MEANING OF THE VIRGINIA CONSTITUTION. THIS AGREEMENT SHALL NOT DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY OR CONTINGENTLY OBLIGATE THE COUNTY OR THE AUTHORITY TO MAKE ANY PAYMENTS BEYOND THOSE APPROPRIATED IN THE SOLE DISCRETION OF THE COUNTY FOR ANY FISCAL YEAR IN WHICH THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE IN EFFECT. THE AUTHORITY SHALL BE UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO MAKE ANY PAYMENTS HEREUNDER EXCEPT FROM MONIES PROVIDED TO IT BY THE COUNTY PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT. THE AUTHORITY SHALL BE UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO MAKE ANY INVESTIGATION OR DETERMINATION AS TO ANY MATTERS THAT WOULD CONSTITUTE AN EVENT OF DEFAULT HEREUNDER AND THE AUTHORITY SHALL BE ENTITLED TO RELY ON INSTRUCTIONS PROVIDED BY THE COUNTY AS TO SUCH MATTERS.

ARTICLE VIII MISCELLANEOUS

8.01 Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Any litigation with respect thereto shall be filed solely in the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County, Virginia. The Developer hereby waives the right, if any, to remove any case to federal court.

8.02 Notices

(a) All notices required or permitted to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be effective only if the same shall be in writing and sent by first class mail with postage prepaid, return receipt requested, or by a nationally recognized next day courier service, addressed as follows:

Notice shall be deemed given when deposited with the United States Postal Service by first class mail, postage prepaid, or when received, if by next day courier delivery service.

(b) Any addressee may designate additional or different addresses for communications by notice given under this Section to each other.

8.03 Severability

If any term, covenant, or condition of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall to any extent be determined to be invalid or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term, covenant or condition to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby and in lieu of such term, covenant or condition that is found to be invalid or unenforceable, a provision may be added as a part of this Agreement that is mutually agreeable to County and the Developer and is as similar to the invalid or unenforceable term, covenant or condition as may be possible and be valid and enforceable.

8.04 Waiver

Any party to this Agreement may waive any right or remedy hereunder, if permitted by law, provided that no such waiver shall be deemed to exist unless such waiver is in writing. No such waiver shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of other rights and remedies provided pursuant to this Agreement. The failure to enforce any particular provision of this Agreement on any particular occasion shall not be deemed a waiver by either part of any of its rights hereunder, nor shall it be deemed to be a waiver of that party's rights for any subsequent or continuing breach of such provision.

8.05 <u>Liability of Officers and Agents</u>

No office, agent or employee of the County or the Authority shall be subject to any personal liability or accountability by reason of the execution of this Agreement or any other documents related to the transactions contemplated hereby. Such officers, agents, or employees shall be deemed to execute such documents in their official capacities only, and not in their individual capacities. This Section shall not relieve any such officer, agent, or employee from the performance of any official duty required by law.

8.06 Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, including separate counterparts, and each shall constitute the same instrument.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed by their duly elected officers, all as of the date above written.

<u>In Re: Public Hearing – Amendments to the FY 12 County Budget</u>

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Ordinance Authorizing Funding for a Tourism Project. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, February 3, 2012 and Friday, February 10, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated Section 15.2-2507 of the *Code of Virginia* requires a public hearing when the Board of Supervisors makes amendments to the County budget when such amendment exceeds one percent of the total expenditures shown in the adopted budget. The Board of Supervisors has held public hearings for the VDOT Revenue Sharing Project, the VRA financing package to fund the project and the condemnation of the right of way of the various land required to complete the project. This public hearing is regarding adjustments to the budget for the purchase of the additional land costing \$384,150.

Mr. Bartlett stated he met with representatives from VDOT regarding amendments to the Revenue Sharing Agreement. The sources of funds and uses of the funds for the project were discussed; VDOT is providing the original \$1 million that was requested for the project which, at that time, was the limit. The state has since changed the limit, which is now up to \$10 million for Revenue Sharing projects. They have agreed to move \$575,000 that was on a Revenue Sharing Project that is not going to be completed; they also stated that they had approximately \$195,000 from two older Revenue Sharing Projects that were not

expended, and they were willing to move those funds to the current project. That changed the amount of the Revenue Sharing Funds from \$1,575,000 to \$1,759,980.

Mr. Bartlett added there is a change in the draw from the Fund Balance that went from over \$600,000 to \$432,000, due to the additional Revenue Sharing funds available. This budget amendment proposes that the Board amend the budget and appropriate the funds associated with the VRA bond that was issued in November [2011] for the road project, which is slightly less than \$1.5 million. Those funds are in the SNAP account waiting to be expended. Together, that provides almost \$1.9 million, which will be used to pay some of the bond issuing costs, then transfer approximately \$1.4 million to the Revenue Sharing Project, and provides \$384,150 that would represent the funding to purchase the additional land from the Glad Hill, LLC; this is not part of the road project but is part of an agreement that has been proposed by Glad Hill, LLC.

Mr. Bartlett said VDOT stated that they would provide the County with \$500,000 in order for the intersection of Route 15, Dominion Drive and the new Route 786 to be completed in total, to include the work that VDOT would need to do in a year and a half when they begin their Route 15 project. That would provide \$3.1 million for construction of the road and intersection. The only excess dollars outside of the road project is the purchase of the 13+ acres for \$384,150, which would all come from the Fund Balance.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Wilck questioned the increase of \$384,150 and \$572,541 over the original \$1.4 million cost for the project. Mr. Bartlett said that the \$572,541 is included in the VDOT project; that is an increase of approximately \$180,000 from the original proposal. Mr. Bartlett said the intersection was bid as a separate component and is approximately \$350,000 more than VDOT can provide, but because the County is getting the extra funds from VDOT on the other Revenue Sharing Projects, that difference dropped to \$160,000. The \$572,541 is for the right of way that needs to be obtained from Glad Hill, LLC and Davis property. The extra property is \$384,150 which is a different and lower cost than the other property.

Supervisor Wilck asked for clarification that the "out of pocket" for the County would be \$2.4 million; Mr. Bartlett said the "out of pocket" for the County is about \$1.9 million. Funding needed to construct the road project is the transfer from the General Fund to the Revenue Sharing Fund, which is \$1.5

million plus the draw from the fund balance of \$432,894. The rest is covered by VDOT funds. The \$384,150 has nothing to do with Revenue Sharing, and comes from the General Fund.

Supervisor Campbell questioned the developer having committed to paying for part of the road; Mr. Bartlett stated the Economic Development and Performance Agreement sets forth that the developer agreed to pay up to 55% of the cost of the road which is through some of the TIF financing, and it will be part of the discussion to be held in approximately three weeks.

After some discussion regarding the land, Supervisor Gantt stated the land will be considered an asset of the County.

WHEREAS, that plan must be reviewed and updated every five years for the County to remain in compliance with Section 322 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, and to remain eligible for certain types of federal assistance in the event of a disaster affecting the County; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) has undertaken an update of the regional hazard mitigation plan, which includes Prince Edward County, with input from the appropriate local and state officials; and

WHEREAS, the Virginia Department of Emergency Management and the Federal Emergency Management Agency have reviewed the updated hazard mitigation plan for legislative compliance and have approved the plan pending the completion of local adoption procedures.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors for Prince Edward County hereby adopts the updated CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan, as applicable to the County, and agrees to take such official actions as reasonably necessary, and as available resources allow, to carry out the proposed actions in the plan.

In Re: Planning Department Report

Smith, dba Sandy River Outdoor Adventure, LLC, for a Special Use Permit in accordance with the Agricultural Conservation (A-1) Zoning requirements to operate a Commercial Outdoor Sports and Recreation Use on a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel 53-A-27C and located at 185 Monroe Church Road in Rice. The Planning Commission recommended approval of this Special Use Permit Application.
- The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 17, 2012 to receive citizen input prior to considering a request by Richard Raymond, Jr. and Robert Raymond, Sr. to amend a site plan to allow an accessory building on a 1.5 acre parcel located at 4644 Farmville Road, and further described as Tax Map Parcel 50-A-71, which is Zoned General Commercial (C-1) and is the location of Truck Rental and General Offices uses. The Planning Commission requested a final site plan from the applicant for a second review at the February 21 Planning Commission meeting and suggested the Board consider this Site Plan Amendment at the Board's March meeting.

In Re: Highway Matters

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - 7. Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - 10. Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

Issue: Public Hearing – Site Plan Amendment

Summary: The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 17, 2012 to receive citizen input prior to considering a request by Richard Raymond, Jr. and Robert Raymond, Sr. to amend a site plan to allow an accessory building on a 1.5 acre parcel located at 4644 Farmville Road, and further described as tax map parcel 50-A-71, which is Zoned General Commercial (C-1) and is the location of Auto Rental (Moving Truck) and General Offices uses. Following that meeting, the Planning Commission requested the applicant to provide a completed Final Site Plan at the February meeting. The Planning Commission completed a second review at the February 21, 2012 Planning Commission meeting and made a unanimous recommendation that the Board favorably consider this Site Plan Amendment.

The Site Plan Amendment was initiated by the placement of an accessory structure on the site, which was not shown on the approved site plan submitted concurrent with the Rezoning application for the site. This site was provided a Conditional Rezoning on April 11, 2011 which uses the site plan as a legally binding document. Per the County Zoning Ordinance, Section 4-104, Final Site Plans are required to show the exact location of buildings or structures existing on or proposed for the site, including their setbacks from property lines, and the distance between buildings or structures; the number of stories, floor area, and building height of each building proposed; the location of existing and proposed freestanding signs on the parcel; the location and type of proposed exterior site lighting, including height of poles and type of fixtures; and many other specifics. Section 4-300.11 of the County Zoning Ordinance sets the construction standards for the parking lot, and does not permit gravel for lots greater than 5,000 SF. The Final Site Plan is a legally binding part of the Conditional Rezoning. The applicant has been provided with the above mentioned sections of the County Zoning Ordinance.



Summary: Justine Young, a Community Health Educator with the Massey Cancer Center for the Piedmont Health District will be present to provide the Board a brief overview of the work she has completed on the Piedmont Health District.

The Piedmont Health District was chosen to participate in a Massey Cancer Project funded by a Tobacco Indemnification Grant. The district was chosen due to high incidence and mortality rates for cancer. The project goals were to perform a comprehensive community health assessment and to mobilize resources into this underserved area. Over the past sixteen months focus groups have been held throughout the seven counties, all physicians canvassed via a questionnaire, local health care facilities interviewed and the availability of health resources documented. Information from the U.S. Census Bureau, the Virginia Cancer Registry, and the Komen Foundation among others has been used to develop a comprehensive look at the state of health in this district. The presentation includes income and poverty levels, education levels, cancer rates, etc in comparison to the rates for the state of Virginia.

Issue: Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment

Summary:

In 2010, Prince Edward County was granted a boundary zone adjustment by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD) for their Enterprise Zone (#48), which added 302.587 +/- acres. Since that time, the Office of Economic Development has received several requests from businesses who wish to be included in the Zone area. Since the County still has 1,442 acres remaining of their original 3,840 acre designation, I respectfully request the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors authorize the preparation of a Boundary Zone Amendment application for 2012.

In preparation for this boundary zone amendment request, the owners of property located on Route 460 in the Rice area have been interviewed to verify their willingness to have their property included in the zone making them eligible for the Zone grant opportunities. We have heard from some Board members that they are interested in possibly adding additional property.

County Staff has questions regarding the coordination of the Enterprise Zone with the County's Comp Plan and the use of the remaining acreage to its maximum potential. The Board may wish to develop criteria for the expansion of the zone which the staff can use in developing a recommendation for the boundary adjustment.

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec.10-1. Adoption of state comprehensive animal laws.

The provisions of Code of Virginia of 1950, § 3.1–796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., are adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-2. Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless otherwise defined within this chapter. Words and phrases not defined herein, which are defined in section 3.1–796.66 3.2-6500 of the Code of Virginia shall have the meanings ascribed to them by that section:

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER means a person appointed as the animal control officer or a deputy animal control officer pursuant to Virginia law (§ 3.2-6555) to enforce the Virginia Comprehensive Animal Laws, this Chapter, and all laws for the protection of domestic animals.

COMPANION ANIMAL means any domestic dog, domestic cat, non-human primate, guinea pig, hamster, rabbit not raised for human food or fiber, or other animal not prohibited, kept for pleasure rather than utility.

LIVESTOCK includes all domestic or domesticated: bovine animals; equine animals; ovine animals; porcine animals; cervidae animals; capradae animals; animals of the genus Lama; ratites; fish or shellfish in aquaculture facilities as defined by state law (§ 3.2-2600); enclosed domesticated rabbits or hares raised for human food or fiber; or any other individual animal specifically raised for food or fiber, except companion animals.

WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMAL means any raccoon, skunk, wolf, squirrel, fox, leopard, panther, tiger, lion, lynx or any other warm-blooded animal, poisonous snake or tarantula which can normally be found in the wild state or any other member of crocodilian, including but not limited to alligators, crocodiles, caimans and gavials. Ferrets, nonpoisonous snakes, rabbits and laboratory rats which have been bred in captivity and which never have known the wild shall be excluded from this definition.

DIVISION 1. CONTAINMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Sec. 10-10. Purposes; legislative authority.

- (a) The purpose of this division is to provide for the containment of livestock in the county and to prescribe the penalties for its violation.
 - (b) This division is adopted under the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 55-310, et. seq.

Sec. 10-11. Lawful fence.

- (a) The boundary line of each lot or tract of land or any stream in the county shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock domesticated by man.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner or manager of any livestock domesticated by man to permit any such livestock, as to which the boundaries of lots or tracts of land have been constituted a legal fence, to run at large beyond the limits of his own lands within the county; and such animal shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running off the property, whether owned or rented, of its owner or manager, and not under their owner's or manager's immediate control.
- (c) Any such owner or manager, after having been notified by an officer of the law that such animal is running at large, permits such animal to continue to run at large, shall be deemed to have violated this section and shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

DIVISION 2. MISCELLANEOUS ANIMAL REGULATIONS

Sec. 10-20. Disposal of companion animals.

- (a) The owner of any companion animal which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal.
- (b) If after notice any owner fails to comply with this section, the animal control officer or other officer cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal; and may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of this service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-21. Killing of covotes permitted; bounty established; procedures for claims.

- (a) The killing coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The board of supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.

- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per fiscal year, except by additional appropriation by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under this division, which act shall constituted a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

ARTICLE II. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS

Sec. 10-30. Position created.

The animal control officer shall discharge the duties provided for in Code of Virginia § 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500, et seq., and such other duties as are provided in this chapter. The animal control officer shall be paid from the dog operating fund such compensation as the board of supervisors by resolution may determine, such compensation to be paid monthly.

Sec. 10-31. Dog operating fund.

The dog operating fund shall consist of the funds received from dog license taxes and fines imposed for the violation of the provisions of this chapter.

Fees for services provided by the animal control officer or for reclaiming animals, not otherwise specified within this Chapter shall be set by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE III. DOGS

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 10-40. Disposal of dead dogs.

The owner of any dog which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury and dispose of the dog. If after notice any owner fails to do so, the animal control officer or other officer shall bury or cremate the dog; and he may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of his service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-41. Unlawful acts.

The following shall be deemed unlawful acts the violation of which shall be a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section:

- (1) Diseased dogs. For the owner of any dog with a contagious or infectious disease to permit such dog to stray from his premises if such disease is known to the owner. § 3.2-6587(A)(6)
- (2) Female dog in season. For the owner of any female dog to permit such dog to stray from his premises while such dog is known to such owner to be in season.

- (3) Removing collar and tag. For any person except the owner or custodian to remove a legally acquired license tag from a dog without the permission of the owner or custodian. § 3.2-6587(A)(8)
- (4) Concealing a dog. For any person to conceal or harbor any dog for which the license tax has not been paid or to conceal a- any dog which has been found to be vicious or dangerous to prevent the same from being destroyed. § 3.2-6587(A)(7)

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Sec. 10-50. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog four months or older unless such dog is licensed as required by the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.85 3.2-6524, and this division.

Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and, upon their first offense of this section and shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-51. How to obtain license.

Dogs shall be licensed as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1–796.86 3.2-6527, by reference, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-52. Amount of license tax.

(a) Pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.87 3.2-6528, any person licensing a dog in the county shall pay an annual license tax on the ownership of the dog according to the following schedule:

Male dog	\$10.00	(\$1 to \$10)
Unsexed (castrated) male dog	\$ 5.00	(\$1 to \$10) *can't exceed male
Female dog	\$10.00	(\$1 to \$10)
Unsexed (spayed) female dog	\$ 5.00	(\$1 to \$10) *can't exceed female

(b) No license tax shall be levied on a guide dog for a blind person, service dog or dogs under four months of age.

Sec. 10-53. Kennel license tax.

The tax for a licensed kennel shall be according to the following schedule:



Sec. 10-54. When license tax payable.

The license tax imposed by this division shall be payable to the treasurer of the county, as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.88 3.2-6530, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-55. Effect of dog not wearing collar as evidence.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall prima facie be deemed to be unlicensed and a stray; and in any proceedings under this division, the burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog. § 3.2-6533

Sec. 10-56. What dog license shall consist of.

The county dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the jurisdiction issuing the license, the sex of the dog and the calendar year for which issued, and shall bear a serial number.

Sec. 10-57. Duplicate license tags.

Duplicate license tags shall be obtained by the owner of a dog as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.91 3.2-6532, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-58. Displaying receipts; dogs to wear tags.

Dog license receipts shall be displayed and dog license tags shall be worn as required by Code of Virginia, $\S 3.1-796.92 3.2-6531$.

Sec. 10-59. Payment of license tax subsequent to summons.

Payment of the license tax subsequent to a summons to appear before the general district court or other court for failure to do so within the time required shall not operate to relieve such owner of the penalties provided.

DIVISION 3. RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 10-60. Vaccination required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog or domesticated cat, age four months or older unless such dog or cat has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises. No license tags shall be issued for any dog unless there is presented to the treasurer at the time application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6521.

Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6522(4).

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person who is the owner or custodian of the dog found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section, if said owner or custodian has previously been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is or has been running at large.
- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
 - (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
 - (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
 - (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
 - (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
 - (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog (d) found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197 Code of Virginia § 3.2-6540. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

Sec. 10-72. Fowl running at large.

"It shall be unlawful to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at-large in the county at any time."

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96 3.2-6546.

Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500 et seq.

Sec. 10-82. Fees for confinement.

The legal owner of any dog seized and confined by the animal control officer shall pay to the animal control officer a charge for the confinement of the dog, the amount of such charge to be in accordance with the fees established by the board of supervisors. All fees received by the animal control officer shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

Sec. 10-83. Unlicensed dogs.

(a) It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, or any other officer, to capture and impound any companion animal found running at large on which the license tax has not been paid. A reasonable

effort will be made to find the owner. After five days, if the owner is not found, the animal shall be declared abandoned. If the owner is known, the animal will be held an additional five days. The provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1–796.96 3.2-6546 shall apply where applicable to the disposition of the dog. Any person, animal control officer or other officer euthanizing a dog under this chapter shall cremate, bury or sanitarily dispose of the dog. Prior to the disposition by euthanasia or otherwise, all of the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1–796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., shall have been complied with.

(b) If the animal control officer or other officer exercises his option to deliver such dog to any person in his jurisdiction who will pay the required license tax and cost on such dog, the person accepting delivery of such dog shall, within five days after such delivery, furnish to the animal control officer evidence of the inoculation and licensing of such dog as required by this article; and the failure to provide such evidence shall be a violation of this article and shall constitute a separate offense.

DIVISION 6. DAMAGE BY DOGS

Sec. 10-90. Disposition of funds.

The treasurer shall keep all money collected by him for dog licenses in a separate account as part of the general fund; and such funds shall be used for the purposes designated by Code of Virginia, § 3.1–796.101 3.2-6534, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-91. Compensation for livestock and poultry killed or injured by dogs.

- (a) Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6553, Any—any person who has any livestock or poultry killed or injured by any dog not his own in the county shall be entitled to receive as compensation the fair market value of such livestock or poultry not to exceed \$400.00 per animal or \$10.00 per fowl, provided that:
 - (1) Within 72 hours of discovery of the death or injury, the claimant gives notice of the incident to the animal control officer.
 - (2) Within 60 days of the discovery of the death or injury, the claimant shall furnish such evidence of the quantity and value of the dead or injured livestock or poultry and the reasons the claimant believes that death or injury was caused by a dog to the board of supervisors.
 - (3) The claimant first has exhausted his legal remedies against the owner, if known, of the dog doing the damage for which compensation under this section is sought. Exhaustion shall mean a judgment against the owner of the dog upon which execution has returned unsatisfied.
- (b) Upon a determination by the board that a claim meets the criteria set forth in this section for compensation, the board shall approve the same and forward the approval to the treasurer. Upon payment under this section, the board shall be surrogated to the extent of compensation paid to the right of action to the owner of the livestock or poultry against the owner of the dog and may enforce such compensation in an appropriate action at law.

Sec. 10-92 Seizure of dogs suspected of killing or injuring livestock or poultry.

Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6552, If—if any person, including the animal control officer, has reason to believe that any dog is killing livestock or poultry, he shall apply to a magistrate of the county, who shall

issue a warrant requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before the judge of the general district court at the time and place named therein, at which time evidence shall be heard. If it shall be determined by the court that such dog is a livestock or poultry killer, the dog shall be ordered (i) euthanized immediately by the animal control officer or other officer designated by the judge of the general district court or (ii) removed to another state which does not border on the commonwealth. Any dog ordered removed which is later found in the commonwealth shall be ordered by a court to be euthanized immediately.

DIVISION 6. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Sec. 10-100. Control of dangerous or vicious dogs; penalties.

(a) As used in this section:

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person or companion animal that is a dog or cat, or killed a companion animal that is a dog or cat. However, when a dog attacks or bites a companion animal that is a dog or cat, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i) if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the dog or cat as a result of the attack or bite, (ii) if both animals are owned by the same person, (iii) if such attack occurs on the property of the attacking or biting dog's owner or custodian, or (iv) for other good cause as determined by the court. No dog shall be found to be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking, or inflicting injury on a dog or cat while engaged with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog handling event. No dog that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person shall be found to be a dangerous dog if the court determines, based on the totality of the evidence before it, that the dog is not dangerous or a threat to the community.

"Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior that resulted in a previous finding by a court or, on or before July 1, 2006, by an animal control officer as authorized by local ordinance, that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner has been given notice of that finding.

(b) Any law-enforcement officer or animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the matters at issue. If a law-enforcement officer successfully makes an application for the issuance of a summons, he shall contact the local animal control officer and inform him of the location of the dog and the relevant facts pertaining to his belief that the dog is dangerous or vicious. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of this section. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance with the provisions of § 3.1-796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The procedure for appeal and trial shall be the same as provided by law for misdemeanors. Trial by jury shall be as provided in Article 4 (§ 19.2-260 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 19.2 of the Code of

Virginia, 1950, as amended. The Commonwealth shall be required to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.

- (c) No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely because it is a particular breed, nor is the ownership of a particular breed of canine or canine crossbreed prohibited. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog that was engaged in the performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. No animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. § 3.2-6540(C)
- (d) If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section. § 3.2-6540(D)
- (e) The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within 10 days of such finding, obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer or treasurer for a fee of \$50, in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer or treasurer shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag that identifies the animal as a dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subsection shall be renewed annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained. The animal control officer shall provide a copy of the dangerous dog registration certificate and verification of compliance to the State Veterinarian. § 3.2-6540(E)
- (f) All dangerous dog registration certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current rabies vaccination, if applicable, (ii) that the animal has been neutered or spayed, and (iii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value of at least \$100,000, which covers animal bites. The owner may obtain and maintain a bond in surety, in lieu of liability insurance, to the value of at least \$100,000. § 3.2-6540(F)
- (g) While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its owner's property, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it from biting a person or another animal.
- (h) The owner of any dog found to be dangerous shall register the animal with the Commonwealth of Virginia Dangerous Dog Registry, as established under § 3.1-796.93:3 3.2-6542 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, within 45 days of such a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction.

The owner shall also cause the local animal control officer to be promptly notified of (i) the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all owners; (ii) all of the means necessary to locate the owner and the dog at any time; (iii) any complaints or incidents of attack by the dog upon any person or cat or dog; (iv) any claims made or lawsuits brought as a result of any attack; (v) tattoo or chip identification information or both; (vi) proof of insurance or surety bond; and (vii) the death of the dog.

- (i) After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, upon learning of same, cause the local animal control authority to be notified if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; or (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; or (iii) is sold, given away, or dies. Any owner of a dangerous dog who relocates to a new address shall, within 10 days of relocating, provide written notice to the appropriate local animal control authority for the old address from which the animal has moved and the new address to which the animal has been moved.
- (j) Any owner or custodian of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal is guilty of a:
 - 1. Class 2 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person;
 - 2. Class 1 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, bites a human being or attacks a human being causing bodily injury; or
 - 3. Class 6 felony if any owner or custodian whose willful act or omission in the care, control, or containment of a canine, canine crossbreed, or other animal is so gross, wanton, and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life, and is the proximate cause of such dog or other animal attacking and causing serious bodily injury to any person.
- The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.
- (k) The owner of any animal that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to comply with the requirements of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
- (1) All fees collected pursuant to this section, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by this section, shall be paid into a special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any training course required under § 3.1-796.104:1 3.2-6556 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS (REPEALED August 14, 2007)

ARTICLE V. HYBRID CANINE.

Section 10-120 Definitions.

As used in this article:

1. "Hybrid canine" means any animal which at any time has been or is permitted, licensed registered, or otherwise described or represented as a hybrid canine, wolf or coyote by its owner to

- a licensed veterinarian, law enforcement officer, animal control officer, humane investigator, official of the Department of Health, or representative of the State Veterinarian.
- 2. "Adequate confinement" means that, while on the property of its owner and not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian, a hybrid canine shall be confined in a humane manner in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to (i) prevent the animal's escape; or if the hybrid canine is determined to be a dangerous dog pursuant to § 3.1-796.93:13.2-6540, the structure shall prevent direct contact with any person or animal not authorized by the owner to be in direct contact with the hybrid canine, and (ii) provide a minimum of 100 square feet of floor space for each adult animal. Tethering of a hybrid canine not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian shall not be considered adequate confinement.
- 3. "Responsible ownership" means the ownership and humane care of a hybrid canine in such a manner as to comply with all laws and ordinances regarding hybrid canines and prevent endangerment by the animal to public health and safety.
- 4. "Owner" means any person who (a) has a right or property in an animal, (b) keeps or harbors an animal, (c) has an animal in his care, or (d) acts as a custodian of an animal.

Section 10-121. Hybrid canine ordinance; penalty.

- 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian to allow any hybrid canine to run at large in the country during the period of January 1 through December 31 inclusive of any year. For the purpose of this section, a hybrid canine shall be deemed to be running at large while outside of any pen or enclosure as provided in subsection 2 of this section, however, any owner or custodian of a hybrid canine may be allowed to remove a hybrid canine from any pen or enclosure for purposes of transportation to another pen or enclosure or for the purpose of obtaining medical attention. In no event shall any hybrid canine be allowed to be set free on any property within the county whether or not the hybrid canine is under its owner's or custodian's immediate control.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to own or possess a hybrid canine unless such hybrid canine is kept and maintained in a pen or enclosure as follows:
 - (a) The pen or enclosure shall contain at least 200 square feet of space per adult hybrid canine.
 - (b) Any fencing used in the construction of the pen or enclosure shall be at least eight (8) feet in height with an additional overhang of fencing or barbed wire angling a minimum of three (3) feet into the pen or enclosure. Such wire enclosure shall be of such strength as to prevent the escape of any hybrid canine enclosed therein.
 - (c) To prevent digging out along the fence, concrete footers at least one (1) foot wide and six (6) inches deep shall be installed along the perimeter of the pen or enclosure or a wire footing of 12-gauge wire buried six (6) inches in the ground with at least three feet of wire on the inside of the pen or enclosure, bending the remaining one (1) foot of wire up in a 90° angle and connect every six (6) inches to the bottom outside of the pen or enclosure.
 - (d) The pen or enclosure shall provide shelter which affords complete protection from all elements of nature.
 - (e) A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class 3 misdemeanor for the first violation and a Class 1 misdemeanor for any second or subsequent offense. Upon a conviction of a second violation of this ordinance, the owner shall surrender the hybrid canine to the

animal control officer for euthanasia in accordance with \S 3.1-796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, effective as of January 1, _____, between the Sheriff and the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia.

ARTICLE I - SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

This agreement extends the coverage of the County's personnel policies and procedures to all employees and deputies of the Sheriff. This Agreement recognizes that employees and deputies of the Sheriff and other County employees all serve the residents of Prince Edward County.

Therefore, this Agreement seeks to establish a uniform personnel system so that the Sheriff's employees and deputies will have the same rights and benefits and will be subject to the same policies, procedures and regulations as other County employees, except as provided herein. The inclusion of such employees in the County Pay and Classification Plan shall not change the status of such employees as appointees of a constitutional officer who serve at the will and pleasure of the Sheriff and concurrent with the term of office of the Sheriff; nor shall it deprive the Sheriff of control over the actions of his appointees, but shall serve as the basis for supplementation of salaries as permitted by law.

Employees and deputies will be subject to the County's personnel policies and procedures, except the grievance procedure. All employees and deputies of the Sheriff, whether funded by the Compensation Board or by the County, shall be placed on the County's pay plan, shall be eligible for the same benefits, and shall receive salary adjustments consistent with those received by other County Employees. This is an endeavor to maintain parity among County and Compensation Board funded positions as it pertains to general employee compensation.

The Sheriff understands that future increases offered by the State through the Compensation Board will not be passed automatically to the staff due to the fact that they would be covered under the county system. Regardless of what the county pay and classification plan states it is understood that the salaries for the Sheriff's staff will be no less than the salaries approved by the Compensation Board, as is required by state law. In the event that the salary established by the Compensation Board for a given position is higher than that determined by the County's pay plan, the salary set by the Compensation Board shall be applicable to the position.

Nothing in the Agreement shall be interpreted to infringe upon the authority of the Sheriff to retain control over the operations of his office, including, without limitation, the authority to:

- Direct the work of employees and deputies;
- · Hire, promote, transfer or appoint employees and deputies; and
- Discipline, suspend, demote, dismiss or terminate the appointment of any employee or deputy.

Such authority shall be exercised by the Sheriff; however, the procedures shall be in accordance with the County's personnel policies and procedures. In addition, the Sheriff's authority

pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-1603 to terminate the appointment of a deputy is not intended to be infringed by this Agreement.

The Sheriff does not agree to include employees and deputies under the County Grievance Policy or Procedure, as the employees and deputies serve as an extension of the Sheriff and derive all powers from the status of the Sheriff as an elected Constitutional Officer.

The Sheriff does agree to abide by all applicable State and Federal laws regarding FLSA, FMLA, EEO/AA and other such applicable statutes as applied to appointees of elected officials.

ARTICLE II - TIME OF PERFORMANCE

This Agreement shall commence as of January 1, _____ and is effective until either the Sheriff's term in office expires on December 31, _____, or the below named Constitutional Officer leaves office, whichever event occurs first.

ARTICLE III - LAWS, PERMITS AND RESTRICTIONS

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects, whether as to validity, construction, capacity or performance by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

ARTICLE IV- POLICIES

The Sheriff agrees to comply with the policies included in the County's Personnel Policy Manual, adopted by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005, and which may be amended from time to time.

The Sheriff and County agree that employees and deputies in the office of the Sheriff shall be incorporated in the County Uniform Pay Plan, as approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005, as amended.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENT TO POLICIES

The County agrees to provide the Sheriff with written notice of any change to all policies and procedures, and any new policies within thirty (30) days after adoption by the Board. The Sheriff agrees to respond in writing to the County within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notice as to his agreement or disagreement with such amended/new policy. No amendments or new policies may be incorporated within this agreement without the written consent of the Sheriff and the County.

This Agreement constitutes the sole Agreement existing between the parties with respect to this subject matter and there are not other written or oral understandings or agreements with respect thereto. No variation or modification of this Agreement and no waiver of its provisions shall be valid unless agreed to in writing and signed by the County, and the Constitutional Officer.

ARTICLE VI - TERMINATION

- (1) This Agreement may be canceled by either party by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other, or
- (2) This Agreement shall be suspended in the event Board of Supervisors fails to appropriate or allocate funds for the purpose of continuation of this Agreement, or

(3) In the event of breach by either party to this Agreement, the other party may give written notice to the party deemed to be in breach specifying the manner in which the Agreement has been breached. If such notice of breach is given, the party sending the notice may suspend performance of any or all of its corresponding obligations under this Agreement, and if the party receiving the notice has not substantially corrected the breach within thirty (30) days of receipt of the written notice, the party sending the notice shall have the right to terminate this Agreement.

ARTICLE VII - PERSONNEL RECORDS AND REPORTS

The County Administrator or designee shall maintain the official time records of all employees and deputies of the Sheriff. The Sheriff agrees to keep and maintain current records of all of his employees regarding accumulated sick leave, annual leave, etc. and to report each pay period any usage. The Sheriff agrees to provide the County Administrator or designee all relevant information needed to administer the Personnel Plan, upon request. Records and forms will be maintained and submitted in accordance with established procedures. Additionally, the Sheriff agrees to provide to the County Administrator an annual accounting as of December 31, of all accrued leave balances.

ARTICLE II. FIREWORKS

Sec. 50-31. Use limited.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the county to keep, sell, offer for sale, expose for sale, or buy any fireworks, or to use, ignite or explode any firecracker, torpedo, skyrocket, Roman candle, or other substance or thing of whatever form or construction containing explosives or flammable compounds, intended or commonly known as fireworks, in any public highway or street, public place or within 200 yards of the dwelling or building of another. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-6))

Sec. 50-32. Permits.

Upon application in writing to the board of supervisors, fair associations, amusement parks, or any organization or group of individuals may be granted a permit for the display of fireworks under such terms and conditions as the board of supervisors may prescribe. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-7))

Sec. 50-33. Penalties for violation of article.

Any person violating any provision of this article shall be fined not exceeding \$1,000.00, confined in the county jail not exceeding 12 months, or both. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-8))

Treasurer's Report

January Financial Statements: The Chairman stated the January Financial Statement was enclosed in the Council packet for review. Ms. Stish moved to accept the Financial Statement as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: The Chairman welcomed two new representatives to the Council, Mr. Parker Wheeler, representing Cumberland County Board of Supervisors and Ms. Cassandra Stish representing Buckingham County Board of Supervisors.

Appointment of CRC Treasurer: Mr. Walker moved and Ms. Stish seconded to appoint Mr. Parker Wheeler as the new Treasurer to the CRC. Motion carried.

Old Business

President & Staff Reports:

Status Report - CRC Charter Amendments-Attorney General Opinion: Ms. Hickman reported that she had contacted Mr. Josh Lief with the Virginia Attorney General's Office to seek an opinion on whether the CRC can amend it's Charter to allow for "other entities" to be members of the CRC. Ms. Hickman stated Mr. Lief's informal opinion is that a non-governmental entity may not be a party to the charter agreement under the plain terms of the Code of Virginia. Mr. Lief did state however, that the code does prohibit a non-governmental entity from being included in meetings and being part of committees and planning groups. Ms. Hickman stated as follow-up to Mr. Lief's response she inquired as to what the CRC's options would be to continue to pursue the Charter Amendment. Mr. Lief indicated that the CRC could seek an Official Opinion of the Attorney General. However, the Attorney General shall give his advice and render official advisory opinions in writing only when requested in writing to do so by one of the following: the Governor, a member of the General Assembly; a judge of a court of record or a judge of a court not of record; the State Corporation Commission; an attorney for the Commonwealth; a county, city or town attorney in those localities in which such office has been created; a clerk of a court of record; a city or county sheriff; a city or county treasurer or similar officer; a commissioner of the revenue or similar officer; a chairman or secretary of an electoral board; or the head of a state department, division, bureau, institution or board. Ms. Hickman stated another option noted by Mr. Lief would be for the CRC to contact a member of the General Assembly and request that a change be made to the Code of Virginia. Ms. Hickman noted that several members of

the CRC were instrumental in getting a Patron to sponsor the legislation to allow higher education institutions to be members of Planning District 4 and 14 in 2005.

There was discussion on the matter. Mr. Walker moved for the Chairman and President to pursue seeking an official opinion from the Attorney General by such means possible as described by the Attorney General's office for the CRC to amend its charter to allow for non-governmental entities to be members of the organization. Motion carried.

Adoption of CRC Transportation Committee Recommendations – CRC Regional Transportation Priorities: Ms. Foster reported that she had received Local Prioritization of Transportation Recommendations from all seven of the PD #14 counties. Ms. Foster stated the CRC's Transportation Committee met on January 25th and was tasked with creating Regional Priorities based on the information received from localities. Ms. Foster stated prior to the Committee meeting VDOT staff had inputted all of the local projects provided into a spreadsheet program that included weighted factors that then produced a ranking of projects. Mr. Youngblood went over the use of the Spreadsheet Program to rank the projects. Weighted criteria included such things as: Average Daily Traffic Flow, Accident Rates/Fatalities, Level of Service, Heavy Truck Traffic, Environmental Issues, Existing Right-of-Way, Pavement Condition, etc. A copy of the Committee's Recommendation was provided for Council review. Ms. Foster stated that the Committee chose to separate the Primary from the Secondary projects to provide Regional Priority Ranking Recommendations. Ms. Foster did note that the Route 307 project listed is only the portion of Route 307 in Nottoway County. While Route 307 traverses three counties, only the County of Nottoway listed it as a priority. Ms. Foster stated the Committee did discuss including all of Route 307 but decided to utilize the information received.

Ms. Foster stated the CRC Chairman had also requested prior to the Council meeting that she research the CRC's RLRP Recommendations to indicate how many projects included coverage by two or more localities. The Chairman stated he had requested this information after noting that Route 307 was an example of a regional project that could be backed by the CRC and he had wondered how many other projects similar to this one existed in the region. Ms. Foster stated the only criteria used to produce the listing of projects of Regional Significance were projects from the RLRP that traversed two or more counties. A listing of these projects was also provided. Ms. Foster noted the projects listed were not prioritized only listed by locality. Mr. Youngblood stated he liked the approach this listing provided that utilized the RLRP to note projects of Regional Significance and stated he did not believe this listing needed to be prioritized. There was discussion on all of the submitted priority rankings.

Ms. Foster stated staff from all of the PDCs around the state will be meeting with VDOT in Richmond on February 8th and have been asked to provide the local and regional priority listings prior to this meeting. A copy of the letter for the February 8th meeting was provided to members in attendance. Ms. Foster noted in the letter VDOT had outlined some of their priorities for funding in the upcoming fiscal year.

Ms. Stish moved that all four priorities: 1) Local Priorities, 2) Regional Ranking of Primary Transportation Projects, 3) Regional Ranking of Secondary Transportation Projects and 4) Projects of Regional Significance be submitted to VDOT for their use in the Six Year Improvement Plan process. Motion carried.

CRC Regional VAST Training Workshop Held – Chesapeake Bay Multi-PDC Planning Grant: Ms. Hickman stated, as previously noted, Virginia is in the process of developing a Phase II Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP) to help guide the cleanup efforts for the Chesapeake Bay. The CRC and

other Planning District Commissions with localities in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed were awarded a Multi-PDC Planning Grant to help facilitate and coordinate the planning process. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC in conjunction with the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, arranged for a Virginia Assessment Scenario Tool (VAST) Training workshop. The workshop was held on January 19, 2012, at the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library in Farmville, VA. The training was conducted by Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) representatives. The VAST was developed to help localities, PDCs and others take existing land use and Best Management Practices (BMP) data and develop local nutrient reduction scenarios needed to meet pollution-reduction targets established under the Chesapeake Bay Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) and state Watershed Implementation Plans (WIPs). Staff from the affected counties were invited as well as staff from the area Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Ms. Hickman stated a complete overview status report was given to the Chief Administrative Officers (CAO) at their January 24, 2012, meeting. Ms. Hickman also stated a complete overview of the project is available on the CRC's website. Ms. Hickman stated the Chief Administrative Officers were notified during the meeting that localities needed to respond to the November 9, 2011, letter sent by DCR. The letter requested a response be submitted by February 1, 2011, even if the response indicated that the locality elected not to provide additional information. Ms. Hickman stated all affected counties (Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland and Prince Edward) did respond by the February 1st deadline.

Ms. Hickman stated the CRC will be submitting a close-out report to DCR in coming weeks.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

Status of CRC FY 12-13 Budget Request: Ms. Hickman stated she has received and responded to budget requests from Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland and Prince Edward. Ms. Hickman stated it is her understanding that Charlotte and Lunenburg will be sending out their budget request in February. Ms. Hickman requested guidance on sending out budget requests to non-member eligible localities/higher education institutions, including Nottoway, Farmville, Blackstone, Hampden-Sydney College and Longwood University. Mr. Bennett moved that budget request be sent to eligible non-member localities/higher education institutions, including Nottoway, Farmville, Blackstone, Hampden-Sydney College and Longwood University. Motion carried.

CRC FY 10-11 Annual Report Presentation Schedule: Ms. Hickman stated enclosed in the Council packet is the FY 10-11 Annual Report schedule of Presentations to the boards of supervisors. Ms. Hickman stated staff will be appearing before all seven counties in PD14 during the month of February and March. Ms. Hickman stated the staff will also be attending town councils in March and April.

Status of 2012 Virginia CDBG Program Regional Priorities: Ms. Terry stated each year DHCD requests that the Planning Districts prepare Regional Priorities in support of the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). The CRC has contacted all eighteen localities in PD14 to request they submit their local priorities for consideration. Ms. Terry stated the deadline for receiving local responses is February 24, 2012. Ms. Terry stated the CRC will need to adopt the Regional Priorities at their March 1st meeting in order to submit them to DHCD on time.

Prince Edward County Technical Assistance Request – County Comprehensive Plan Update: Ms. Hickman stated the CRC has received a request from Prince Edward County for technical assistance in the County's Comprehensive Plan Update. The CRC had provided to Prince Edward County options for consideration of services. The County chose Option #2 for the contract amount of \$22,000.

Mr. Wingold moved that the CRC assist Prince Edward County is updating their Comprehensive Plan for the contract amount of \$22,000 and authorized the Acting President/CEO to execute a contract between the CRC and Prince Edward County for said amount. Motion carried.

Status of CRC Projects: Ms. Hickman stated enclosed in the Council packet was a Status Report on CRC Projects as of February 2012. Ms. Hickman stated this was provided for information.

2012 VA General Assembly Legislative Update: Ms. Hickman stated provided in the Council packet was a 2012 Virginia General Assembly Legislative Update that was provided by the Virginia Association of Counties (VACO). Ms. Hickman stated this was provided for information.

Ms. Hickman also passed out a copy of House Bill 823 whose Patron is R.G. Marshall. This Bill has language that relates specifically to the Regional Cooperation Act and the purpose of planning district commissions. The language would limit functional areas warranting regional cooperation by striking language related to economic and physical infrastructure development, criminal justice, emergency management, human services and recreation and would also strike language stating PDCs "shall not be limited to" but "shall consist of" only solid waste, water supply and other environmental management and transportation. Ms. Hickman states this bill would limit the role of Planning Districts in regional issues. Ms. Hickman stated this bill has been assigned to the Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns which will be meeting today (February 2, 2012). Ms. Hickman stated the VAPDC is closely monitoring this bill and will keep the PDCs abreast of the outcome.

Ms. Hickman stated Ms. Foster and herself will be attending the VML/VACO/VAPDC Legislative Day on February 9th. Ms. Hickman stated they will be visiting the legislators that cover PD14 to present them a copy of the Annual Report and also would be able to pass on any concerns the Council had on regional issues.

Mr. Walker stated he did not feel it would be necessary to discuss this issue this year as it appears it has died in the House. However, Mr. Walker stated the issue of Sunday Hunting is something that he felt most in Charlotte County were opposed to and probably other areas of the region also. Therefore, the Council could go on record to voice its opinion in the future if the subject were to come up again. Also, if the issue seemed to have support then the Council could put forward that a local option should be sought instead.

Governor's Announcement – Results of Task Force on Local Mandate Review: Ms. Hickman stated the Governor has announced the results of the Task Force on Local Mandate Review and a copy was provided to council members for their review.

VAPDC Winter Conference February 9-10, 2012: Ms. Hickman stated the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions will be holding their winter conference February 9-10, 2012, in Richmond, Virginia. The Conference is also being held in conjunction with VML/VACO/VAPDC Legislative Day which is on February 9th. Ms. Hickman stated Ms. Foster and herself will be attending

both events. Ms. Hickman stated for anyone interested attending a copy of the registration form was provided to members.

Ms. Stish stated she will also be attending the VML/VACO/VAPDC Legislative Day.

Council Member Comments: None.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process: Ms. Foster stated the CRC received three CIRPs for review:

- DRPT/Crossroad Community Services Board Purchase 9 passenger van, van with a lift, 5 passenger mini van with ramp and a 15 passenger bus with lift
- Rural Development/Blackstone Conf. and Retreat Center Purchase and install a bio-mass heating system
- DEQ/Virginia Electric and Power Co.-Prevention of Significant Deterioration Permit for a new combined-cycle combustion turbine electric generating facility in Brunswick County.

Council provided no comment on listed CIRPs.

Other Business: Ms. Hickman stated the CRC received a request from Lunenburg County for grant writing services for a Community Improvement Grant for the STEPS Renovation and Expansion project. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC has already been assisting Lunenburg County on the Planning Grant activities leading up to this project. Mr. Wingold moved that the CRC authorize the Acting President/CEO to execute an agreement between Lunenburg County and the CRC for the CRC to provide grant writing services. Motion carried.

Ms. Hickman stated the CRC received a request from the Town of Farmville for grant writing services to prepare a 2012 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application for developments at the Moton Museum. Ms. Hickman stated due to CDBG requirements the applicant must be a local unit of government, therefore, the Town of Farmville is requesting services as the applicant on behalf of the Moton Museum. The Moton Museum would directly contract with the CRC for services. Ms. Stish moved that the CRC enter into contract services to provide grant writing services to the Town of Farmville (applicant), Moton Museum project. Motion carried.

Ms. Hickman passed out a flyer received by the CRC notifying the public, representatives of Senator Mark Warner's office will in Victoria at the public library on Friday, February 10, 2012, 11:00 – 12:30 p.m. to meet with individual Virginians who have specific issues dealing with federal agencies.

Thank you for your generous contribution to the Friends of the Appomattox River in support of the inland waterways training by the United States Navy Explosive Ordinance Disposal Team. The Virginia Department of Transportation and its consultant, C&M Associates, Inc., will be conducting origin-destination studies for several major roadways in the southeastern part of Virginia in the Richmond/Tri-Cities and Hampton Roads metropolitan areas to support improvements to the US Route 460 corridor during the period of February 21, 2012 through March 1, 2012. Data collection will require the use of equipment such as vehicles, generators, Bluetooth detectors, traffic counting devices, and cameras with associated temporary wiring that may be attached to fencing, guardrail, and bridge structures. These efforts should not disrupt traffic flow and work will be on VDOT right of way. Individuals working on this study will be carrying a copy of this letter as identification when in the field.

These studies are required by both the federal and state government to evaluate potential proposed improvements to the US Route 460 corridor. The gathering of baseline data within the corridor is one of the early steps in project planning. These studies will ultimately allow the Department to evaluate specific proposals on the future of US Route 460. This study is independent from any other corridor improvement proposals being advanced through the state's Office of Transportation Public-Private Partnerships (OTP3). The individuals collecting the data are not in a position to answer questions involving future plans or highway policies.
