At the special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Prince Edward County Vo-Tech Center, 1419 Zion Hill Road, Farmville, Virginia, on Tuesday the 6st day of March, 2012; at 5:30 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Fore called the special meeting to order as a joint meeting with the Prince Edward County School Board.

Chairman Dove called the School Board meeting to order.

Ms. Nancy Grasso, President at Strategic Employee Benefit Services, reviewed the benefits and drawbacks of combining the insurance of the County offices and the County schools. She explained Self-Funded Plans for health insurance. Discussion followed on the process taken to switch to a Self Funded Plan.

Supervisor McKay entered the meeting during the presentation.

The Board concurred to have an evaluation done on the insurance claims to determine if the Self Funded Plan would be beneficial for the County.

Dr. Smith and Mrs. Wahrman discussed updates to the Legislative process and a comparison between the Governor's budget, the House budget and the Senate figure, even though the Senate has not passed a budget. He also reviewed the reductions that may have to be made in the school budget if additional funding does not become available. Mrs. Wahrman stated the Governor's budget presents a state revenue reduction of \$709,000; in addition,

\$904,000 will be lost from federal funding, which gives a total reduction of \$1.6 million. She said with the reduced revenues and increased expenditures, the school is facing a \$2.8 million loss.

Supervisor Wilck questioned the amount having been \$2.3 million; Mrs. Wahrman said it had been a \$3.1 million loss because of the health insurance increase. Further discussion followed.

Ms. Wahrman reviewed the financial and program reductions. Dr. Smith said the program reductions are based on an analysis of the effectiveness of that program and a lack of student achievement gains over time. Discussion of the ROTC program and budget cuts that were made over the past two years followed.

Discussion followed on VRS.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

Chairman Fore instructed the Committees to consider all applicants received seriously. The applicants will be named to the Board by the Committees during the April meeting.

In Re: Public Hearing – Site Plan Amendment

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Site Plan Amendment. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Wednesday, March 7, 2012 edition of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, stated the Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 17, 2012 prior to considering a request by Richard Raymond, Jr. and Robert Raymond, Sr. to amend a site plan to allow an accessory building on a 1.5 acre parcel located at 4644 Farmville Road, and further described as Tax Map Parcel #50-A-71, which is zoned General Commercial (C-1) and is the location of Auto Rental (Moving Truck) and General Offices uses. Following that meeting, the Planning Commission requested the applicant to provide a completed Final Site Plan at the February meeting. The Planning Commission completed a second review at the February 21, 2012 Planning Commission meeting and made a unanimous recommendation that the Board favorably consider this Site Plan Amendment.

Mr. Richard Raymond, Jr. stated that during the Planning Commission meeting, specifics regarding the amended site plan were questioned; the amended site plan includes a shed, a dumpster site and flagpole. He stated he was also questioned about the tree buffer; the tree buffer and seeding will be done as weather permits. The gravel and paving will also be done in the near future.

Mr. Raymond, Jr. then requested if the County receives a complaint, they would like to be made aware of it to correct the problem.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Jones apologized for not being able to attend the last Planning Commission meeting; he said this project had opposition and the variance was difficult to obtain. He said the amended site plan contains all that is requested. Discussion followed.

In Re: Update from Commonwealth Regional Council

Mary Hickman, Interim President of the Commonwealth Regional Council thanked the Board for its continued support and presented the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) 2011 annual report. She said their function is to address projects with regional impact; the redistricting project was one of their successful initiatives in 2011.

Supervisor Simpson expressed his appreciation for the work done on the redistricting.

In Re: Comprehensive Community Health Assessment-Piedmont Health District

Justine Young, a Community Health Educator with the Massey Cancer Center for the Piedmont Health District presented an overview of the work accomplished by the Piedmont Health District. The Piedmont Health District was chosen to participate in a Massey Cancer Project funded by a Tobacco Indemnification Grant.

The district was chosen due to high incidence and mortality rates for cancer. The project goals were to perform a comprehensive community health assessment and to mobilize resources into this underserved area. Over the past sixteen months, focus groups have been held throughout the seven counties, all physicians canvassed via a questionnaire, local health care facilities interviewed and the availability of health resources documented. Information from the U.S. Census Bureau, the Virginia Cancer Registry, and the Komen Foundation among others has been used to develop a comprehensive look at the state of health in this district. The presentation included information on income and poverty levels, education levels, cancer rates, etc., in comparison to the rates for the state of Virginia. This region is medically underserved, with one hospital serving approximately 104,000 people. Ms. Young stated the findings from this project may bring further resources and healthcare into this region.

In Re: The Southside Messenger

Averett Jones, Editor of the Southside Messenger, expressed his concerns regarding a statement by Chairman Fore that he will only answer questions from the Farmville Herald, the County's newspaper of record. Mr. Jones stated the Southside Messenger meets the requirements set forth for that qualification, and that according to the *Code of Virginia* and the Virginia Press Association, Prince Edward County does not have a newspaper of record. Mr. Jones stated the policy of the Southside Messenger is to report the truth; if something is reported incorrectly, he asked that the mistake be documented and the newspaper will print a retraction. Mr. Jones then said the Board does not have authority to withhold information from the public, except for a few legal and personnel issues; he stated he wished to resolve this issue to spare Prince Edward County unnecessary hardship and expense.

In Re: Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment

Sharon Lee Carney, Economic Development Director, stated that in 2010, that Prince Edward County was granted a boundary zone adjustment by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD) for their Enterprise Zone (#48), which added 301.587 +/- acres. Since that time,

the Office of Economic Development has received several requests from businesses who wish to be

included in the Zone area. Since the County still has 1,442 acres remaining of their original 3,840 acre

designation, Mrs. Carney requested the Board of Supervisors authorize the preparation of a Boundary Zone

Amendment application for 2012.

Mrs. Carney said that in preparation for the boundary zone amendment request, property owners

located on Route 460 in the Rice area have been interviewed to verify their willingness to have their

property included in the Enterprise Zone, making them eligible for the Enterprise Zone grant opportunities.

She requested permission to prepare an Enterprise Zone amendment.

Chairman Fore appointed Supervisor Jones, Supervisor Simpson and himself, along with Mr.

Bartlett and Mrs. Carney, to draft an Enterprise Zone amendment.

Mrs. Carney stated there can be no more acreage added to the total amount; the region has 3,840

acres total, and the zone will expire in 2020, and would have to compete with other areas for renewal. She

said the Town of Farmville has no additions or deletions; Luck Stone is interested in being included in the

Enterprise Zone.

In Re: Update of County Animal Control Ordinance

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, stated Deputy County Attorney Morgan Greer has updated the

County Animal Control Ordinance in response to a re-codification of the Code of Virginia.

Additionally, Section 10-54. Kennel License Tax: The County currently sells kennel tags to a

citizen who owns 5-20 dogs. This must be changed to 10-20 dogs as allowed in the Code of Virginia.

Finally, the County Administrator recommends deleting Section 10-31. Dog Operating Fund. The

County does not use a Dog Operating Fund in its budget process.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion to authorize a public hearing on the County Animal Control

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec.10-1. Adoption of state comprehensive animal laws.

The provisions of Code of Virginia of 1950, § 3.1 796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., are adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth in this section.

Sec.10-2. Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless otherwise defined within this chapter. Words and phrases not defined herein, which are defined in section 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500 of the Code of Virginia shall have the meanings ascribed to them by that section:

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER means a person appointed as the animal control officer or a deputy animal control officer pursuant to Virginia law (§ 3.2-6555) to enforce the Virginia Comprehensive Animal Laws, this Chapter, and all laws for the protection of domestic animals.

COMPANION ANIMAL means any domestic dog, domestic cat, non-human primate, guinea pig, hamster, rabbit not raised for human food or fiber, or other animal not prohibited, kept for pleasure rather than utility.

LIVESTOCK includes all domestic or domesticated: bovine animals; equine animals; ovine animals; porcine animals; cervidae animals; capradae animals; animals of the genus Lama; ratites; fish or shellfish in aquaculture facilities as defined by state law (§ 3.2-2600); enclosed domesticated rabbits or hares raised for human food or fiber; or any other individual animal specifically raised for food or fiber, except companion animals.

WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMAL means any raccoon, skunk, wolf, squirrel, fox, leopard, panther, tiger, lion, lynx or any other warm-blooded animal, poisonous snake or tarantula which can normally be found in the wild state or any other member of crocodilian, including but not limited to alligators, crocodiles, caimans and gavials. Ferrets, nonpoisonous snakes, rabbits and laboratory rats which have been bred in captivity and which never have known the wild shall be excluded from this definition.

DIVISION 1. CONTAINMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Sec. 10-10. Purposes; legislative authority.

- (a) The purpose of this division is to provide for the containment of livestock in the county and to prescribe the penalties for its violation.
 - (b) This division is adopted under the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 55-310, et. seq.

Sec. 10-11. Lawful fence.

- (a) The boundary line of each lot or tract of land or any stream in the county shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock domesticated by man.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner or manager of any livestock domesticated by man to permit any such livestock, as to which the boundaries of lots or tracts of land have been constituted a legal fence, to run at large beyond the limits of his own lands within the county; and such animal shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running off the property, whether owned or rented, of its owner or manager, and not under their owner's or manager's immediate control.
- (c) Any such owner or manager, after having been notified by an officer of the law that such animal is running at large, permits such animal to continue to run at large, shall be deemed to have violated this section and shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

DIVISION 2. MISCELLANEOUS ANIMAL REGULATIONS

Sec. 10-20. Disposal of companion animals.

- (a) The owner of any companion animal which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal.
- (b) If after notice any owner fails to comply with this section, the animal control officer or other officer cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal; and may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of this service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-21. Killing of coyotes permitted; bounty established; procedures for claims.

- (a) The killing coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The board of supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.
- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per fiscal year, except by additional appropriation by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under this division, which act shall constituted a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

ARTICLE II. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS

Sec. 10-30. Position created.

The animal control officer shall discharge the duties provided for in Code of Virginia § 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500, et seq., and such other duties as are provided in this chapter. The animal control officer shall be paid from the dog operating fund such compensation as the board of supervisors by resolution may determine, such compensation to be paid monthly.

Sec. 10-31. Dog operating fund.

The dog operating fund shall consist of the funds received from dog license taxes and fines imposed for the violation of the provisions of this chapter.

Fees for services provided by the animal control officer or for reclaiming animals, not otherwise specified within this Chapter shall be set by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE III. DOGS

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 10-40. Disposal of dead dogs.

The owner of any dog which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury and dispose of the dog. If after notice any owner fails to do so, the animal control officer or other officer shall bury or cremate the dog; and he may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of his service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-41. Unlawful acts.

The following shall be deemed unlawful acts the violation of which shall be a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section:

- (1) Diseased dogs. For the owner of any dog with a contagious or infectious disease to permit such dog to stray from his premises if such disease is known to the owner. § 3.2-6587(A)(6)
- (2) Female dog in season. For the owner of any female dog to permit such dog to stray from his premises while such dog is known to such owner to be in season.
- (3) Removing collar and tag. For any person except the owner or custodian to remove a legally acquired license tag from a dog without the permission of the owner or custodian. § 3.2-6587(A)(8)
- (4) Concealing a dog. For any person to conceal or harbor any dog for which the license tax has not been paid or to conceal a any dog which has been found to be vicious or dangerous to prevent the same from being destroyed. § 3.2-6587(A)(7)

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Sec. 10-50. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog four months or older unless such dog is licensed as required by the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.85 3.2-6524, and this division.

Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and, upon their first offense of this section and shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2 03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2 03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-51. How to obtain license.

Dogs shall be licensed as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.86 3.2-6527, by reference, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-52. Amount of license tax.

(a) Pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.87 3.2-6528, any person licensing a dog in the county shall pay an annual license tax on the ownership of the dog according to the following schedule:

Male dog. . . $10.00 ($1 to $10)

Unsexed (castrated) male dog . . . $5.00 ($1 to $10) *can't exceed male

Female dog . . . $10.00 ($1 to $10)
```

Unsexed (spayed) female dog . . . \$ 5.00 (\$1 to \$10) *can't exceed female

(b) No license tax shall be levied on a guide dog for a blind person, service dog or dogs under four months of age.

Sec. 10-53. Kennel license tax.

The tax for a licensed kennel shall be according to the following schedule:

5 1020 dogs	\$35.00
Over20 dogs	\$50.00

Sec. 10-54. When license tax payable.

The license tax imposed by this division shall be payable to the treasurer of the county, as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.88 3.2-6530, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-55. Effect of dog not wearing collar as evidence.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall prima facie be deemed to be unlicensed and a stray; and in any proceedings under this division, the burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog. § 3.2-6533

Sec. 10-56. What dog license shall consist of.

The county dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the jurisdiction issuing the license, the sex of the dog and the calendar year for which issued, and shall bear a serial number.

Sec. 10-57. Duplicate license tags.

Duplicate license tags shall be obtained by the owner of a dog as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.91 3.2-6532, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-58. Displaying receipts; dogs to wear tags.

Dog license receipts shall be displayed and dog license tags shall be worn as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.92 3.2-6531.

Sec. 10-59. Payment of license tax subsequent to summons.

Payment of the license tax subsequent to a summons to appear before the general district court or other court for failure to do so within the time required shall not operate to relieve such owner of the penalties provided.

DIVISION 3. RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 10-60. Vaccination required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog or domesticated cat, age four months or older unless such dog or cat has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises. No license tags shall be issued for any dog unless there is presented to the treasurer at the time application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6521.

Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6522(4).

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any

person who is the owner or custodian of the dog found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section, if said owner or custodian has previously been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is or has been running at large.

- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
 - (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
 - (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
 - (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
 - (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
 - (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1 796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2 03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2 03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.
- Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that (d) any dog found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197 Code of Virginia § 3.2-6540. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

Sec. 10-72. Fowl running at large.

"It shall be unlawful to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at-large in the county at any time."

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.96 3.2-6546.

Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.66 3.2-6500 et seq.

Sec. 10-82. Fees for confinement.

The legal owner of any dog seized and confined by the animal control officer shall pay to the animal control officer a charge for the confinement of the dog, the amount of such charge to be in accordance with the fees established by the board of supervisors. All fees received by the animal control officer shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

Sec. 10-83. Unlicensed dogs.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, or any other officer, to capture and impound any companion animal found running at large on which the license tax has not been paid. A reasonable effort will be made to find the owner. After five days, if the owner is not found, the animal shall be declared abandoned. If the owner is known, the animal will be held an additional five days. The provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.96 3.2-6546 shall apply where applicable to the disposition of the dog. Any person, animal control officer or other officer euthanizing a dog under this chapter shall cremate, bury or sanitarily dispose of the dog. Prior to the disposition by euthanasia or otherwise, all of the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1 796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., shall have been complied with.
- (b) If the animal control officer or other officer exercises his option to deliver such dog to any person in his jurisdiction who will pay the required license tax and cost on such dog, the person accepting delivery of such dog shall, within five days after such delivery, furnish to the animal control officer evidence of the inoculation and licensing of such dog as required by this article; and the failure to provide such evidence shall be a violation of this article and shall constitute a separate offense.

DIVISION 6. DAMAGE BY DOGS

Sec. 10-90. Disposition of funds.

The treasurer shall keep all money collected by him for dog licenses in a separate account as part of the general fund; and such funds shall be used for the purposes designated by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.101 3.2-6534, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-91. Compensation for livestock and poultry killed or injured by dogs.

- (a) Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6553, Any—any person who has any livestock or poultry killed or injured by any dog not his own in the county shall be entitled to receive as compensation the fair market value of such livestock or poultry not to exceed \$400.00 per animal or \$10.00 per fowl, provided that:
 - (1) Within 72 hours of discovery of the death or injury, the claimant gives notice of the incident to the animal control officer.
 - (2) Within 60 days of the discovery of the death or injury, the claimant shall furnish such evidence of the quantity and value of the dead or injured livestock or poultry and the reasons the claimant believes that death or injury was caused by a dog to the board of supervisors.
 - (3) The claimant first has exhausted his legal remedies against the owner, if known, of the dog doing the damage for which compensation under this section is sought. Exhaustion shall mean a judgment against the owner of the dog upon which execution has returned unsatisfied.
- (b) Upon a determination by the board that a claim meets the criteria set forth in this section for compensation, the board shall approve the same and forward the approval to the treasurer. Upon payment under this section, the board shall be surrogated to the extent of compensation paid to the right of action to the owner of the livestock or poultry against the owner of the dog and may enforce such compensation in an appropriate action at law.

Sec. 10-92 Seizure of dogs suspected of killing or injuring livestock or poultry.

Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6552, If— if any person, including the animal control officer, has reason to believe that any dog is killing livestock or poultry, he shall apply to a magistrate of the county, who shall issue a warrant requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before the judge of the general district court at the time and place named therein, at which time evidence shall be heard. If it shall be determined by the court that such dog is a livestock or poultry killer, the dog shall be ordered (i) euthanized immediately by the animal control officer or other officer designated by the judge of the general district court or (ii) removed to another state which does not border on the commonwealth. Any dog ordered removed which is later found in the commonwealth shall be ordered by a court to be euthanized immediately.

DIVISION 6. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Sec. 10-100. Control of dangerous or vicious dogs; penalties.

(a) As used in this section:

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person or companion animal that is a dog or cat, or killed a companion animal that is a dog or cat. However, when a dog attacks or bites a companion animal that is a dog or cat, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i) if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the dog or cat as a result of the attack or bite, (ii) if both animals are owned by the same person, (iii) if such attack occurs on the

property of the attacking or biting dog's owner or custodian, or (iv) for other good cause as determined by the court. No dog shall be found to be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking, or inflicting injury on a dog or cat while engaged with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog handling event. No dog that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person shall be found to be a dangerous dog if the court determines, based on the totality of the evidence before it, that the dog is not dangerous or a threat to the community.

"Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior that resulted in a previous finding by a court or, on or before July 1, 2006, by an animal control officer as authorized by local ordinance, that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner has been given notice of that finding.

- (b) Any law-enforcement officer or animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the matters at issue. If a law-enforcement officer successfully makes an application for the issuance of a summons, he shall contact the local animal control officer and inform him of the location of the dog and the relevant facts pertaining to his belief that the dog is dangerous or vicious. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of this section. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance with the provisions of § 3.1-796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The procedure for appeal and trial shall be the same as provided by law for misdemeanors. Trial by jury shall be as provided in Article 4 (§ 19.2-260 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 19.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The Commonwealth shall be required to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.
- (c) No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely because it is a particular breed, nor is the ownership of a particular breed of canine or canine crossbreed prohibited. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog that was engaged in the performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. No animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. § 3.2-6540(C)
- (d) If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section. § 3.2-6540(D)

- (e) The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within 10 days of such finding, obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer or treasurer for a fee of \$50, in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer or treasurer shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag that identifies the animal as a dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subsection shall be renewed annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained. The animal control officer shall provide a copy of the dangerous dog registration certificate and verification of compliance to the State Veterinarian. § 3.2-6540(E)
- (f) All dangerous dog registration certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current rabies vaccination, if applicable, (ii) that the animal has been neutered or spayed, and (iii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value of at least \$100,000, which covers animal bites. The owner may obtain and maintain a bond in surety, in lieu of liability insurance, to the value of at least \$100,000. 3.2-6540(F)
- (g) While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its owner's property, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it from biting a person or another animal.
- (h) The owner of any dog found to be dangerous shall register the animal with the Commonwealth of Virginia Dangerous Dog Registry, as established under § 3.1-796.93:3 3.2-6542 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, within 45 days of such a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction.
 - The owner shall also cause the local animal control officer to be promptly notified of (i) the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all owners; (ii) all of the means necessary to locate the owner and the dog at any time; (iii) any complaints or incidents of attack by the dog upon any person or cat or dog; (iv) any claims made or lawsuits brought as a result of any attack; (v) tattoo or chip identification information or both; (vi) proof of insurance or surety bond; and (vii) the death of the dog.
- (i) After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, upon learning of same, cause the local animal control authority to be notified if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; or (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; or (iii) is sold, given away, or dies. Any owner of a dangerous dog who relocates to a new address shall, within 10 days of relocating, provide written notice to the appropriate local animal control authority for the old address from which the animal has moved and the new address to which the animal has been moved.

- (j) Any owner or custodian of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal is guilty of a:
 - Class 2 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person;
 - 2. Class 1 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, bites a human being or attacks a human being causing bodily injury; or
 - 3. Class 6 felony if any owner or custodian whose willful act or omission in the care, control, or containment of a canine, canine crossbreed, or other animal is so gross, wanton, and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life, and is the proximate cause of such dog or other animal attacking and causing serious bodily injury to any person.
- The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.
- (k) The owner of any animal that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to comply with the requirements of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
- (l) All fees collected pursuant to this section, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by this section, shall be paid into a special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any training course required under § 3.1 796.104:1 3.2-6556 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS (REPEALED August 14, 2007)

ARTICLE V. HYBRID CANINE.

Section 10-120 Definitions.

As used in this article:

- 1. "Hybrid canine" means any animal which at any time has been or is permitted, licensed registered, or otherwise described or represented as a hybrid canine, wolf or coyote by its owner to a licensed veterinarian, law enforcement officer, animal control officer, humane investigator, official of the Department of Health, or representative of the State Veterinarian.
- 2. "Adequate confinement" means that, while on the property of its owner and not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian, a hybrid canine shall be confined in a humane manner in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to (i) prevent the animal's escape; or if the hybrid canine is determined to be a dangerous dog pursuant to § 3.1.796.93:13.2-6540, the structure shall prevent direct contact with any person or animal not authorized by the owner to be in direct contact with the hybrid canine, and (ii) provide a minimum of 100 square feet of floor

- space for each adult animal. Tethering of a hybrid canine not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian shall not be considered adequate confinement.
- 3. "Responsible ownership" means the ownership and humane care of a hybrid canine in such a manner as to comply with all laws and ordinances regarding hybrid canines and prevent endangerment by the animal to public health and safety.
- 4. "Owner" means any person who (a) has a right or property in an animal, (b) keeps or harbors an animal, (c) has an animal in his care, or (d) acts as a custodian of an animal.

Section 10-121. Hybrid canine ordinance; penalty.

- 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian to allow any hybrid canine to run at large in the country during the period of January 1 through December 31 inclusive of any year. For the purpose of this section, a hybrid canine shall be deemed to be running at large while outside of any pen or enclosure as provided in subsection 2 of this section, however, any owner or custodian of a hybrid canine may be allowed to remove a hybrid canine from any pen or enclosure for purposes of transportation to another pen or enclosure or for the purpose of obtaining medical attention. In no event shall any hybrid canine be allowed to be set free on any property within the county whether or not the hybrid canine is under its owner's or custodian's immediate control.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to own or possess a hybrid canine unless such hybrid canine is kept and maintained in a pen or enclosure as follows:
 - (a) The pen or enclosure shall contain at least 200 square feet of space per adult hybrid canine.
 - (b) Any fencing used in the construction of the pen or enclosure shall be at least eight (8) feet in height with an additional overhang of fencing or barbed wire angling a minimum of three (3) feet into the pen or enclosure. Such wire enclosure shall be of such strength as to prevent the escape of any hybrid canine enclosed therein.
 - (c) To prevent digging out along the fence, concrete footers at least one (1) foot wide and six (6) inches deep shall be installed along the perimeter of the pen or enclosure or a wire footing of 12-gauge wire buried six (6) inches in the ground with at least three feet of wire on the inside of the pen or enclosure, bending the remaining one (1) foot of wire up in a 90° angle and connect every six (6) inches to the bottom outside of the pen or enclosure.
 - (d) The pen or enclosure shall provide shelter which affords complete protection from all elements of nature.
 - (e) A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class 3 misdemeanor for the first violation and a Class 1 misdemeanor for any second or subsequent offense. Upon a conviction of a second violation of this ordinance, the owner shall surrender the hybrid canine to the animal control officer for euthanasia in accordance with § 3.1 796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, effective as of January 1, _____, between the Sheriff and the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia.

ARTICLE I - SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

This agreement extends the coverage of the County's personnel policies and procedures to all employees and deputies of the Sheriff. This Agreement recognizes that employees and deputies of the Sheriff and other County employees all serve the residents of Prince Edward County.

Therefore, this Agreement seeks to establish a uniform personnel system so that the Sheriff's employees and deputies will have the same rights and benefits and will be subject to the same policies, procedures and regulations as other County employees, except as provided herein. The inclusion of such employees in the County Pay and Classification Plan shall not change the status of such employees as appointees of a constitutional officer who serve at the will and pleasure of the Sheriff and concurrent with the term of office of the Sheriff; nor shall it deprive the Sheriff of control over the actions of his appointees, but shall serve as the basis for supplementation of salaries as permitted by law.

Employees and deputies will be subject to the County's personnel policies and procedures, except the grievance procedure. All employees and deputies of the Sheriff, whether funded by the Compensation Board or by the County, shall be placed on the County's pay plan, shall

be eligible for the same benefits, and shall receive salary adjustments consistent with those received by other County Employees. This is an endeavor to maintain parity among County and Compensation Board funded positions as it pertains to general employee compensation.

The Sheriff understands that future increases offered by the State through the Compensation Board will not be passed automatically to the staff due to the fact that they would be covered under the county system. Regardless of what the county pay and classification plan states it is understood that the salaries for the Sheriff's staff will be no less than the salaries approved by the Compensation Board, as is required by state law. In the event that the salary established by the Compensation Board for a given position is higher than that determined by the County's pay plan, the salary set by the Compensation Board shall be applicable to the position.

Nothing in the Agreement shall be interpreted to infringe upon the authority of the Sheriff to retain control over the operations of his office, including, without limitation, the authority to:

- Direct the work of employees and deputies;
- Hire, promote, transfer or appoint employees and deputies; and
- Discipline, suspend, demote, dismiss or terminate the appointment of any employee or deputy.

Such authority shall be exercised by the Sheriff; however, the procedures shall be in accordance with the County's personnel policies and procedures. In addition, the Sheriff's authority pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-1603 to terminate the appointment of a deputy is not intended to be infringed by this Agreement.

The Sheriff does not agree to include employees and deputies under the County Grievance Policy or Procedure, as the employees and deputies serve as an extension of the Sheriff and derive all powers from the status of the Sheriff as an elected Constitutional Officer.

The Sheriff does agree to abide by all applicable State and Federal laws regarding FLSA, FMLA, EEO/AA and other such applicable statutes as applied to appointees of elected officials.

ARTICLE II - TIME OF PERFORMANCE

This Agreement shall commence as of January 1, _____ and is effective until either the Sheriff's term in office expires on December 31, _____ , or the below named Constitutional Officer leaves office, whichever event occurs first.

ARTICLE III – LAWS, PERMITS AND RESTRICTIONS

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects, whether as to validity, construction, capacity or performance by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

ARTICLE IV - POLICIES

The Sheriff agrees to comply with the policies included in the County's Personnel Policy Manual, adopted by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005, and which may be amended from time to time.

The Sheriff and County agree that employees and deputies in the office of the Sheriff shall be incorporated into the County Uniform Pay Plan, as approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005, as amended.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENT TO POLICIES

The County agrees to provide the Sheriff with written notice of any change to all policies and procedures, and any new policies within thirty (30) days after adoption by the Board. The Sheriff agrees to respond in writing to the County within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notice as to his agreement or disagreement with such amended/new policy. No amendments or new policies may be incorporated within this agreement without the written consent of the Sheriff and the County.

ARTICLE VI – TERMINATION

This Agreement may be canceled by either party by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other, or

This Agreement shall be suspended in the event the Board of Supervisors fails to appropriate or allocate funds for the purpose of continuation of this Agreement, or

In the event of breach by either party to this Agreement, the other party may give written notice to the party deemed to be in breach specifying the manner in which the Agreement has been breached. If such notice of breach is given, the party sending this notice may suspend performance of any or all of its corresponding obligations under this Agreement, and if the party receiving the notice has not substantially corrected the breach within thirty (30) days of receipt of the written notice, the party sending the notice shall have the right to terminate this Agreement.

ARTICLE VII - PERSONNEL RECORDS AND REPORTS

The County Administrator or designee shall maintain the official time records of all employees and deputies of the Sheriff. The Sheriff agrees to keep and maintain current records of all of his employees regarding accumulated sick leave, annual leave, etc. and to report each pay period any usage. The Sheriff agrees to provide the County Administrator or designee all relevant information needed to administer the Personnel Plan, upon request. Records and forms will be maintained and submitted in accordance with established procedures. Additionally, the Sheriff agrees to provide to the County Administrator an annual accounting as of December 31, of all accrued leave balances.

fireworks displays.

Mr. Ennis advised the County to repeal Section 50, Article II, Fireworks of the County Code,

which would require a public hearing. The repeal of the County's Fireworks Ordinance does not prohibit

the use of "permissible fireworks" as defined in Section 27-97 of the Code of Virginia as any sparklers,

fountains, Pharaoh's serpents, caps for pistols, or pinwheels commonly known as whirligigs or spinning

jennies. It also does not prohibit large fireworks displays, which will be regulated by the State Fire

Marshal's Office.

Sec. 50-31. Use limited.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the county to keep, sell, offer for sale, expose for sale, or buy any fireworks, or to use, ignite or explode any firecracker, torpedo, skyrocket, Roman candle, or other substance or thing of whatever form or construction containing explosives or flammable compounds, intended or commonly known as fireworks, in any public highway or street, public place or within 200 years of the dwelling or building of another. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-6))

Upon application in writing to the board of supervisors, fair associations, amusement parks, or any organization or group of individuals may be granted a permit for the display of fireworks under such terms and conditions as the board of supervisors may prescribe. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II)10-7))

Sec. 50-33. Penalties for violation of article.

Any person violating any provision of this article shall be fined not exceeding \$1,000.00, confined in the county jail not exceeding 12 months, or both. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-8))

I think today is a celebration, because Joe Elton, Director of Virginia State Park, and Eric Hougland, Manager of High Bridge Trail State Park, are going to update us on the development of the Park and share with us how close we are to the opening of High Bridge.

It was in February of 2003 that we first learned that Norfolk Southern might abandon the Burkeville to Pamplin rail line through Farmville. Since that time, our community and our friends at Virginia State Parks have worked hard to make rails-to-trails a reality.

I believe that High Bridge will become a crown jewel in our community's tourism development program. And I am confident that High Bridge Trail State Park will generate untold economic opportunity for Prince Edward County and the Town of Farmville.

Please help me welcome Joe Elton and Eric Hougland.

Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

After lunch, Chairman Fore turned the program over to Eric Houghland.

Supervisor Campbell left at this time.

Mr. Hougland expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to present the information regarding High Bridge. He said High Bridge will be open in a few weeks; however a specific date has not yet been set. A Grand Opening celebration is targeted for mid-May.

Mr. Hougland stated the entire park is 31 miles long, from Pamplin to Burkeville. He said the Park will continue to grow, and will provide an asset to all communities. He expressed appreciation for the efforts and support of the Town of Farmville and Prince Edward County has shown over the course of the project.

Supervisor Wilck stated spikes from the original tracks are available for sale at the Visitor's Center.

Councilwoman Thompson asked if the Night Walks on the trail would be held this year; Mr. Hougland stated there will be Night Walks this summer.

Supervisor McKay asked if there are plans to connect Twin Lakes State Park with High Bridge Trail State Park; Mr. Hougland said it is identified in the master plan as a pursuit at some point.

Councilman Gordon asked if there is cell phone service along the trail; Mr. Hougland said there is service along the entire trail, with one exception. The "dead zone" is where Route 610 crosses the trail on the east side of the county.

Mr. Joe Elton shared a brief history of the state park system. He said the Virginia State Park System is one of the best managed in the country. He said the history associated with this area will draw people not only from all over the country, but from all over the world. Mr. Elton commended the Town and County's staff for their assistance in the efforts made by the Park. Mr. Elton then thanked Del. Watkins Abbitt for his efforts in promoting and nurturing the project.

Mr. Elton stated within a year, approximately 100,000 people will have been on High Bridge; within three years, 250,000; within five years, 500,000 people; and within ten years, a million people a year. He added that estimate is conservative.

RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT REGARDING THE GRANITE FALLS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

RECITALS:

- 1. By Ordinance creating the Granite Falls Community Development Authority, dated November 17, 2009, the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Board") created the Granite Falls Community Development Authority (the "CDA").
- 2. The application for creation of the CDA was forwarded by petition received from the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "IDA") and from Prince Edward Development, LLC (together with Granite Falls Hospitality, LLC, the "Developer").
- 3. The Developer, CDA and IDA and certain other parties jointly intend to develop a Hotel/Conference Center and related amenities (the "Project") on approximately 92 acres of land (the "Property") currently owned by the IDA.
- 4. The preliminary financing package for the Project includes the issuing of approximately \$17,000,000 of CDA bonds by the CDA pursuant to Section 15.2-5158 of the Code of Virginia (the "CDA Bonds").
- 5. The proceeds of the CDA Bonds will be utilized to finance the construction of certain public infrastructure related to the Project, including, without limitation, (i) approximately 35,000 square feet of the proposed conference center component of the Project and (ii) the related project and site infrastructure costs.
- 6. Pursuant to the CDA Bonds, a Debt Service Reserve Fund (the "DSR Fund") is intended to be established in the approximate amount of the lesser of 1) 10% of the par amount of the bonds issued, 2) maximum annual debt service, or 3)125% of average annual debt service. The current estimated amount of the DSR Fund to be established is \$1,700,000. If insufficient revenues are available to service the debt on the CDA Bonds, this DSR Fund may be drawn down on an annual basis so as to service debt payments due on the CDA Bonds.
- 7. To enhance the marketability of the CDA Bonds the Developer has requested and the Board has determined it is in the best interest of the County to provide its indication of support for the County to replenish all or any deficient portion of the DSR Fund in the event Project funds and other reserve streams pledged or to be pledged to support the repayment of the CDA Bonds (including, without limitation, payment by the owner of any required special tax assessments) are insufficient to pay annual payments of principal and interest on the CDA Bonds. Any such commitment to replenish all or a portion of the DSR Fund shall be made "subject to appropriation" in accordance with Virginia law.
- 8. Such resolution of support is subject to finalization of the proposed transaction in form and substance acceptable to the Board and to the CDA.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia as follows:

- A. Subject to the finalization of the complete financing package sufficient to finance all elements of the Hotel/Conference Center in a form and substance, acceptable to the Board and CDA, the Board acknowledges its intention, in principle, to enter into a contractual agreement, SUBJECT TO ANNUAL APPROPRIATION, as provided by applicable state law, to replenish the DSR Fund as established for the CDA Bonds, on an annual basis, to the extent such fund becomes depleted.
- B. This is only a preliminary expression of support. Upon finalization of the CDA Bond financing and related Project financing, this Board, by separate meeting, shall approve and authorize the specific

manner by which it will agree, subject to appropriation, to replenish the DSR Fund and approving all of the agreements putting such mechanism into place, all of which must be acceptable to the Board and CDA in all regards.

- C. No final commitment shall exist with respect to the Board unless and until final Bond and Project documents have been presented to the CDA and the Board and a separate Board meeting is held approving the final form of such documents.
- D. The commitments expressed herein are premised upon representations from the Developer that the anticipated principal amount of CDA Bonds to be issued shall be in the amount of approximately \$17,000,000 and the DSR Fund shall be approximately 10% of this amount.

In Re: Presentation of the County Administrator's Fiscal Year 2013 Recommended Budget

Mr. Bartlett read his FY13 County Budget Letter to the Board of Supervisors into record:

INTRODUCTION

I am pleased to present to the Board of Supervisors my recommended budget for Prince Edward County for Fiscal Year 2013 (FY13). I am presenting a balanced budget with no tax increases. I look forward to the Board's feedback and response to the many difficult decisions that will be required during this year's budgetary process. As has been the case for the last four years, the General Assembly continues a pattern of reducing funding provided to local governments. Previously the General Assembly concentrated on reducing non-educational funding while using funds provided by President Obama's Administration to shift a significant portion of the state's responsibility for education to the federal government. Now that the federal funds have expired the state has refused to fully replace them and has decided to push increased costs associated with teacher retirement down to the local level. In addition, many specific state education programs have been reduced or eliminated. The result has been the largest reduction in educational funding from the Commonwealth for at least the last 20 years.

This is placing great pressure on local governments to increase local funding for education. While many localities are contemplating increasing taxes (Appomattox, Halifax, Pittsylvania, Powhatan, Franklin, Lynchburg, Montgomery, etc.) due to rising costs and declining state support I am not recommending such action. Indications are the national and local economies are recovering. This can be seen locally in the increase in real estate, personal property and sales tax revenues collected. With the current climate in Richmond, I do not foresee any will on the part of the General Assembly to provide additional revenues to local governments, even when the economy turns around. This does not bode well for local governments and will continue to place great pressure on us in the future. If this trend continues, the question will be when (not if) will Prince Edward County be forced to raise taxes.

FORECAST OF FY12 BUDGET RESULTS

Before discussing the new budget which starts on July 1, 2012, I think it is appropriate to review the current budget and the forecast of the state of the County's finance's at the start of the new fiscal year. Enclosure (1) is a chart of projected fund balances for each of our budgetary funds at the end of the current fiscal year. When totaling all the funds together I predict the fund balance will increase by \$917,461 to a total of \$12,294,340 and cash in the amount of \$10,561,019. Of the amount in cash \$328,169 is contained in the School Cafeteria Fund and can only be used for costs associated with the operations of the cafeteria. An additional \$1,101,551 is found in the landfill construction fund which has historically been used to pay cash for the opening and closing of landfill cells. There is no mandatory requirement to pay such costs in cash, thus those funds are available for use at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors.

The General Fund is our primary source of revenue and supports the majority of all County operations. I project the General Fund will end FY12 with a decrease in the fund balance of \$81,664 and end with a cash reserve of \$7,205,548. While a slight decrease, the result is much better than anticipated when the fiscal year began. The initial budget adopted this time last year called for a draw from fund balance of \$637,344. During the course of the fiscal year the Board made appropriations of \$150,000 to the schools for HVAC equipment, the purchase of the Glad Hill property for almost \$390,000, the creation of the revolving capital fund for the Volunteer Fire Departments/Rescue Squad from which \$220,000 will be spent in FY12, and the purchase of two cars for the sheriff for \$50,000. When totaled appropriations exceeded the initial revenue projections by more than \$1.4 million. The ability to absorb almost this entire amount will be the result of revenues exceeding forecasts by almost \$800,000 and expenses being less than the budgeted amounts by almost \$550,000.

Collections of General Property taxes (\$500,000) and local sales tax (\$119,000) were the major drivers of the greater than expected revenues. The savings in expenses can primarily be found in debt service (\$186k), CSA (\$130K), refuse (\$64K) and general property (\$60K) budget being under expended.

Almost every department in the County has under-expended its budget. I want to commend all County employees and Constitutional Officers and their employees for the hard work necessary to achieve such a positive outcome. This fund balance increase of \$917,461 will play an important role in the FY13 budget as explained below.

Another major revenue source iw the Landfill Construction Fund. Revenues from customers of the landfill located outside Prince Edward County are placed in this fund and are accumulated and then used to pay for the closure and construction of new landfill cells. It was anticipated we would need to close a cell in the spring of 2012 but that will not happen.

The fund and cash balances in the Water Fund will increase by \$767,085 during FY12. This occurs due to the VRA borrowing completed in November 2011. All expenses associated with the water project were completed earlier and the VRA borrowing replenished the Water Fund which will end the year with a fund balance of almost \$1.4 million and cash of \$933,625. The Sewer Fund's fund and cash balances declined by \$36,547 for the year and have a negative cash balance of almost \$69,000. Cash could be transferred from the Water Fund to balance the Sewer Fund but there is no overriding reason to do that at this time.

FY13 BUDGET

For FY13, the Board of Supervisors made it clear they did not want to see any tax increases, and at the same time the Board wishes to maintain the current level of services to our citizens. This proposed budget meets those goals. I am proposing a budget that is relatively flat with only a few exceptions. After deducting the transfers between funds, the proposed budget for all funds is \$42,062,414. The budget is balanced but requires the use of some of the fund balances. I recommend using \$416,003 from the fund balance of the General Fund and, after deducting the noncash depreciation expense, \$244,039 from the Water Fund and \$93,106 from the Sewer fund for a total of \$753,148. This can be funded from the \$917,461 increase in the Fund Balance for FY12 mentioned above.

Enclosure (2) is a chart that shows the revenues, expenses and projected fund balances of the various funds at the end of FY13. Enclosure (3) provides a comparison of the departmental costs over the last four years.

FACTORS SHAPING THE FY13 PROPOSED BUDGET

The FY13 proposed budget incorporates the Board's direction to present a budget that level funds the schools, holds charitable donations steady, provide the first COLA in five years, no increase in tax rates, and at the same time maintain core service levels.

The FY13 proposed budget process comes amid a slowly improving economy. One statistic which conveys the economic health of a locality is the unemployment rate. Unemployment in Prince Edward County fell to 8.5% in January 2012, compared with 9.4% last January. This compares favorably to the unemployment rate for the nation which is 8.8% for the same period.

This improving economy, even if it is a slow recovery, bodes well for the future. We are seeing an increase in the number of business prospects displaying an interest in Prince Edward County. The future looks more promising now than it has for three years. Luck Stone is still proceeding on the opening of the quarry, we have two local businesses that are set to expand, and new real estate projects are about to begin construction. Finally, I am hopeful the Granite Falls project will develop. While I am bullish on the future prospects of Prince Edward County, I did not factor any revenue growth from any of these projects into my revenue calculations.

Personal Property is always the most challenging revenue to estimate due to the transient nature of the cars and the annual changes in values of vehicles. I project we will collect \$3,081,892 during FY12 from this revenue source. I have projected collections of \$3,050,000 for FY13 but indications are this amount could be greater. NADA values for used cars are holding steady and the Commissioner of Revenue mailed out 722 more tax applications this year than last. This is a strong indication assessments will increase, generating more revenues than contained in the proposed budget. Revenues from General Property taxes are projected to increase \$453,8-6 when compared to the same amount in last year's initial budget. I do not foresee any other revenue source changing to such a degree.

For FY13 health insurance rates increased 5.7%, which will cost the County approximately \$34,000. Additionally, VRS rates are increasing from 15.11% to 17.25% adding an additional \$65,000 to our retirement cost. But I must make one point to our citizens regarding the County's retirement program. The County and in fact all local governments are not underfunding their retirement funds. Each locality's retirement rate is set using actuarial data specific to that locality. Unlike the state, no local government delays funding its obligations. Additionally, the landfill operations contract will expire on June 30, 2012. I anticipate the new contract will increase and I have included that increase in the budget.

There are a number of outside factors that may still impact the FY13 budget. Final decisions and implementing instructions regarding the Commonwealth's budget have not been received. Thus, there is still uncertainty regarding the final disposition of State and Federal funding at the local level, but we must proceed with the information we have at hand.

FY13 BUDGET DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIES

It has been at least four years since any department or outside entity has received any significant funding increases. In fact most have seen funding decreases. There are many demands on the Board to increase funding to various constituencies but to do so would have required a tax increase. While the Board of Supervisors recognizes the economy is improving slowly, they also recognize there are still many citizens who are struggling. The Board instructed me to develop a budget that would hold tax rates steady, provide a 3.6% COLA to County employees which is equal to the COLA provided to social security recipients in January, maintain core service levels and fund the public schools and charitable organizations at the same levels as in FY12. This budget recommendation achieves those instructions.

The 3.6% COLA will cost \$168,178 which does not include the employees of Social Services. This will be the first COLA since July 2008. Once again capital purchases are being kept to a minimum. I recommend \$30,000 be used to replace aging computers and printers, \$60,000 to purchase two vehicles for the Sheriff and \$60,000 to purchase vehicles for county administration.

The proposed budget includes the transfer of \$8,106,652 to the schools. This is the same amount as in the FY12 budget but represents an increase in available funds of \$415,730 for the School Board to use

to replace loss state funding or cover increased costs. The available funds increase due to the reduction in school debt service of \$189,210 and continuing to appropriate the funding of \$226,520 that was provided by the Board of Supervisors for a one-time bonus for school employees.

Due to the growth in responsibility I am recommending the elevation of the Building & Grounds section to a Departmental level – Public Works. Due to the incumbents background he has been able to complete in-house many tasks that were normally contracted out in the past saving the County tens of thousands of dollars. Additionally, I anticipate this department assuming vehicle maintenance responsibility this next fiscal year saving additional taxpayer dollars. In response to this additional responsibility I am recommending the reclassification of the Building & Grounds Supervisor to the Public Works Director increasing this position to a grade 21 and step 5 with a salary of \$56,165. This will bring that position in line with the existing department directors.

While not increasing any costs I recommend the hours at the Cannery be changed slightly to allow some evening and weekend hours. This will allow citizens who work to use the Cannery. The only change the current users will experience is that the Cannery will be closed on Wednesday. The new additional hours will be Monday from 4pm-7pm and the second Saturday of each month from 7am-2pm.

Tax Rates

I recommend all tax rates be maintained at their current rates.

FUTURE REVENUE ENHANCEMENTS

The landfill operations contract will expire on June 30, 2012. As stated above I anticipate the new contract will increase and the proposed budget contains that increase. Once a new contract is awarded I recommend the current landfill tipping fees be increased by the same percentage as the contract increases. This increased revenue has not been budgeted and will help offset the draw on the fund balance.

I recommend the Board of Supervisors authorize the Staff to research the development of a service charge in lieu of real property taxation as allowed in Section 58.1 Chapter 34 of the Code of Virginia. Such a service charge can be placed on all real estate which is exempted from property taxation. Certain criteria must be met to allow the service charge to be placed on property owned by the Commonwealth. Such criteria do not apply to the placement of such a service charge on exempted property not owned by the Commonwealth. Currently nine counties and 11 cities impose this service charge. The County has \$335,322,400 in real estate assessments that are currently tax exempt; this is approximately 22% of all real estate assessments in Prince Edward. This revenue stream has the potential to be a significant source of funding but due to state regulations cannot be imposed prior to next year.

Conclusion

I look forward to our future work sessions and realize the Board may recommend changes to the proposed budget. That is understandable and expected. Thank you for this opportunity to present a balanced budget for the citizens of Prince Edward County.

Mr. Bartlett then reviewed the PowerPoint presentation.

Supervisor Simpson inquired about the sales tax revenue projections. Mr. Bartlett stated they are above what was collected during the same period in the previous year.

Discussion followed regarding the Sheriff's department writing tickets based on state code or county code, and regarding the costs incurred regarding the Piedmont Regional Jail.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April
 meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person must be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person must be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - 7. Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members:
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

PROJECT: Special Use Permit - Mark S. Smith dba Sandy River Outdoor Adventure, LLC

Commercial Outdoor Sports & Recreation

Summary of Request:

Sandy River Outdoor Adventure, LLC has submitted a Special Use Permit Application to operate a Commercial Outdoor Sports and Recreation facility use in the A-1 Zoning District. This proposed facility would be accessed from 151 Monroe Church Road in Rice, near the public boat ramp access of Sandy River Reservoir. The outdoor recreation facility would also be bounded by Green Bay Road, and is further identified as Tax Map Parcel (TMP) #53-A-27C. The lots which comprise this TMP are 1.73 acres and 1.60 acres for a total area of 3.33 acres.

The facility proposed is described as "eco-friendly tourism" and is constructed as a series of obstacle course challenges - many supported from framework attached to the trees and elevated platforms. Other words commonly used to describe this type of adventure course include: ropes course, zip-line, bridges, and climbing wall. Users of the facility will be outfitted with harness, helmet and gloves apparatus and provided proper safety training concurrent with this type of recreational facility.

Zoning and Existing Land-Use:

The site consists of two contiguous parcels totaling 3.33 acres and is zoned A-1. The existing site is set in a residential area adjacent to "Sandy River Retreat", a vacation rental business operated by Mark & Candace Smith. Part of the vacation experience includes access to the Smith's small family farm which includes sheep, donkeys, chickens, and rabbits.

The proposed site plan is situated within a wooded area along a spring-fed water feature below the vacation cabins. The site plan calls for clearing understory cover and developing a circuit of walking trails with mulched surface to provide a perimeter limit to the placement of the challenge course activities.

An entrance to the site will follow an existing entrance from Monroe Church Road which serves the vacation cabins. VDOT has inspected the site and provided specifications for the upgrade suited to a commercial entrance at this location. The Smiths wish to place a sign for the business along Monroe Church Road, but not along Green Bay Road.

Adherence to Comprehensive Plan:

This land use request seeks to preserve Open Space by providing family oriented recreation and entertainment in a low-impact, natural setting.

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal I: Economic Development: Objective #5:</u> Promote tourism through the development of additional recreational opportunities. Increase the number o tourists visiting Pr. Ed. County each year through promotion and marketing of the recreational resources. (p 76)

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal II: Land Use: Objective #4:</u> Promote a diversified commercial base which I does not create significant impacts on residential area, prime agricultural lands, or public facilities. (p.79)

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal VII: Agriculture, Forestry, and Open Space:</u> Conserve and protect the County's Open Spaces.

Adjoining Properties and Land-Uses:

The properties surrounding the parcel are also zoned A-1. The proposed site development is separated from the nearest residences by Green Bay Road on the west, an adjoining wooded parcel with no improvements on the south, and an adjoining parcel which has several pastures for horses between this site and the occupied dwelling to the north.

The development of this site will be well buffered from adjoining properties by the wooded land cover condition, the super-elevation of Green Bay Road along this property, and by similar land uses which adjoin the site. There are no exterior lights planned for the site and there is no night time operation planned for the facility. The traffic to the site should be consistent with the traffic accessing the public boat launch and recreational area at Sandy River Reservoir, which is also served via Monroe Church Road.

Great care has been provided in the site plan process to determine the health and integrity of the trees used in the course development. Preservation of natural wooded setting is paramount to the success of the this endeavor. This preservation of the natural setting also preserves the same visual screening that the adjoining property owners are accustomed to having between themselves and the proposed site.

The Smiths have visited with the adjoining landowners. Letters of Notification were sent by USPS certified mail to the landowners identified by the Planning Department. They have also taken great care

Trip Generation

The trip generation of this use is expected to be consistent with the trips generated by the public fishing facility and the vacation rental cabins on-site. Based upon the proposed hours of operation provided by the applicant and the capacity for the number of users per session, and the number of sessions per day being limited to three, there is minimal traffic generation expected from full build-out of this facility. The applicant provides a maximum capacity of 72 users per day (24 maximum per shift of 3 hour sessions) and a schedule which primarily opens the course on a Friday - Sunday schedule, which reduces the traffic expectation to a reasonable load for the state secondary roads serving the site. Therefore, the applicants were not required to perform a Transportation Study as part of their application.

Utilities

There is no public water or sewer available at this site. The applicant has contacted the VA Dept of Health and has been given permission to operate this facility using Portable Lavatory and Portable Toilet conveniences. These are shown on the site plan located near the parking area. The operation of the proposed use does not require electricity. The natural utilities of gravity and manpower will be in use at this site.

Emergency Services Zone 813

This site will be served by the Rice Volunteer Fire Department, the Farmville/ Prince Edward Rescue Squad, and the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Department.

Public Comments:

The Smiths have spoken with their neighbors.

Received call and visit from an adjoining landowner (Samuel Martin). While he had many questions concerning the facility, once his concerns were addressed, he expressed no opposition. His concerns included future expansion plans, hours of operation, lighting, septic system installation, the generally wet condition of the site (spring fed stream headwaters), and keeping signs on SR 640 and not on SR 696.

An anonymous caller inquired about whether there would be "trap shooting" at the facility. Once the question was answered (no) and the facility function clarified, the caller expressed no opposition.

A nearby resident called in response to the SUP Sign posted at the site (Saundra Long). She expressed concerns whether alcohol would be served at the facility. Once the question was answered (no) and the facility function clarified, the caller expressed no opposition.

The office has received no complaints or objections to the proposed development.

Conclusion

The applicants have conducted their due diligence in the planning and application for this project. They have contacted VDOT concerning the entrance, VDH concerning the public sanitation facilities, have consulted with a certified professional in the field of adventure course design and safety, have selected professional gear and hardware to provide the safest apparatus, and designed this course so that the challenges will encourage family centered entertainment. The applicants have also invited the neighbors to see the site and discuss their plans, and even invited Planning Commissioners and County Supervisors to visit the site.

The Commercial Outdoor Sports and Recreation Use has specific Use & Design Standards in the A-1 Zone. These design standards address signage at the site and details specific to the site plan. The applicant anticipates a total build-out of forty (40) obstacles at the course. Phase I will only include a maximum of twenty (20) obstacles.

The hours of operation proposed vary based on the season of the year and day of the week, but total 140 days per year. The applicant would also like to offer special hours for groups outside of the general hours. The hours proposed are as follows:

It is the conclusion of the County Planner that this Commercial Outdoor Sports & Recreation Facility would complement the goals of the Comprehensive Plan by attracting eco-tourism, preserving open space, and providing a diversity of commercial businesses. It provides family centered recreation in a low-impact method which will likely build self-confidence and appreciation for natural resources.

The business will be required to be inspected by a certified inspector trained on zip lines and rope courses.

PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing for this SUP on January 17, 2012. Following their consideration of the application and the Public Hearing, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the application including the details provided with the site plan and the following recommended conditions:

- S No Alcohol
- \$ No Trap Shooting or gun activities
- Sign per specification in Zoning Use & Design Standards and placement compliant with VDOT regulations.
- Future Expansion beyond the scope of the proposed site plan would require new review by the Planning Commission (this would include addition of lighting).
- No noise generating mechanical equipment to be used at the facility (e.g power winches)
- \$ Hours of Operation will be adhered to per the proposed hours.

Narrative Statement:

Virginia Electric and Power Company is proposing to construct a new distribution substation on a 2.974 acre parcel, subdivided from a 18.69 acre parcel, owned by Charles M. and Jessica A. Fore, upon successful Special Use permitting through Prince Edward County. The parcels are located in Hampden Magisterial District. The substation site will occupy .91840 acres of the 2.974 acre parcel. The new substation will be called Prince Edward Substation and will be initially constructed with 1 transformer, 2 to 3 circuits and associated electrical equipment. Ultimate buildout of this facility will be 2 transformers and 6 circuits.

Today, Dominion has 1 circuit, # 310 which supplies power to our service territory in Prince Edward County and is served out of our Farmville Substation on transformer #3. This transformer is projected to approach its maximum rating during peak summer load in 2013. Since there are no external tie circuits, a contingency loss of Farmville transformer #3 will result in 100% of the load being out until a mobile transformer can be energized. A new substation source will create a substation contingency; create circuit tie capability to Hampden-Sydney College and to the Farmville substation radial 34.5kV system. Most of the load growth on circuit 310 fed from transformer #3 is near the intersection of US 15 and 460 and near Hampden-Sydney College. Consideration was given to adding capacity at the Farmville sub. However, the college is over 10 line miles away from Farmville sub and has reliability issues as a result. We have been pursuing improvements for the college and determined a new substation source and feed near this location will greatly improve the reliability issues.

Pamplin Sub, another existing substation in Prince Edward County is too far away from the load center to efficiently and reliably serve this load. Dominion has three transmission lines located in the County. Two 115 kV lines; one on the western edge of the County and is the transmission feed to Pamplin Sub and the other 115 kV line on the eastern edge feeding Farmville Sub. Our third line is a 230 kV line which extends from north to south through the middle of the County, which is the transmission line chosen to be the source for the new Prince Edward Substation.

The subject property is located in the A1 agricultural districts between Leigh Mountain Road and Worsham Road. The substation parcel will be situated on the northern end of the property adjacent to Worsham Road. The Fore's +/- 18 ac property is currently occupied with one residence. The Fore's home is approximately +/- 170' south west of the proposed most southern substation fence. A direct line of sight from the home to the substation will be shielded by

approx a 70' width of mature trees. The second closest home is approx +/- 420' south east of the proposed most southern substation fence. The property belongs to Cheryl E. Lard and the line of sight from the home will be obstructed by an extensive amount of mature trees.

An electrical substation on this parcel will have minimal effects to adjoining properties. The substation will be visible from Rt. 637 (Worsham Road) and Rt. 628 (Leigh Mountain Road) by vehicles passing by the location. The tallest structure within the facility will be the backbone. The backbone structure will be approximately 75' in height, connects the wires from the transmission lines overhead and will basically be the same heights as the transmission line structures which cross through this property today. Substation equipment will vary in height but will average around 20' in height. The substation will not create any loud noise, odor, dust, nor will fumes be generated by the operation of this facility. The transformer equipment inside the facility produces a slight humming sound when in operation. There will be no impact to the surrounding area due to increase in traffic or public utilities. This facility will be unmanned, will not require water or sewer connections and should be visited on a monthly basis by Dominion personnel for inspections and maintenance.

Compatibility:


Prince Edward Zoning Ordinance dated October 2007 allows the inclusion of major utility services within this district by special use permits and the proposed project's location, character and extent is in conformance with the county's adopted comprehensive plan policies regarding compatible land uses and the advancement of economic development.


The Prince Edward site was selected due to reliability benefits and proximity to the projected load center. The substation facility minimizes visual impacts to residents by being located in a rural area and within an established electric transmission corridor with transmission facilities in existence since 1973. Forested vegetation is removed within this corridor to adhere to federal safety clearances; however, the substation should be shielded from view from adjacent residences by forested areas on both sides of this corridor. Planting of additional low growing landscaping within the transmission corridor facing both Rt. 637 and Rt. 628 will further allow this use to be in harmony with existing uses and those uses allowed by right in the A1 zoning district.

Access to the substation is planned from Worsham Road. VDOT site distance standards will be adhered to as well as other county zoning conditions. All electrical facilities are regulated by state and federal laws and our facilities meet or exceed the National Electric Safety Codes. The electrical equipment will be surrounded by a 7' fabric fence with 1' of barbed wire around the top. All gates are equipped with locks. For safety of our employees and good safety practices in general, security lights will be constructed with dusk to dawn, fully shielded lighting fixtures directed inward and downward into the interior of the site away from adjacent streets and properties. A photocell light fixture will be placed near the control house door. The substation equipment is electronically monitored by controls located inside the control house building.

The Prince Edward 2005 Comprehensive Plan estimated a 37.9% increase in population for the County between the years 2000 and 2030 and is planning accordingly to meet these needs with adequate public facilities. Chapter VI — Special Policy Areas, Corridor Development references the areas of Rt. 15, Rt 460 and Rt. 360 as being largely undeveloped and indicated the enhancement of these "gateways to the County" will be critical to the success of the County's economic development and marketing activities. The proposed substation will be sized to handle increased capacity when needed while supporting the colleges, public school system and the technical center located near Rt. 628 and Rt. 460 by-pass. The substation location will be ideally located near smaller unincorporated rural villages of Rice and Worsham and will have the capacity to support future development of commercial and low-density residential land uses envisioned for the villages as mentioned in the land use section of Chapter VII. Overall, the addition of this substation will help support the County's goals and objectives of promoting growth and attracting new industries within the County by ensuring reliable electric utilities are available for new industries considering locating in Prince Edward County.

All existing and future uses located in the area will benefit from increasing capacity and reliability in the area. Hampton-Sydney College and local residents should see a reduction in outages with regard to their electrical service as well as increased capacity available for future load growth.





Board of Supervisors Meeting April 10, 2012

Prince Edward County Department of Planning & Community Development Staff Report

PROJECT: Special Use Permit - Virginia Electric and Power Company - Prince Edward

Substation - Utility Service, Major Use

Summary of Request:

Virginia Electric and Power Company (VEPCO) is proposing to construct a new distribution substation along Worsham Road, between the intersections of Leigh Mountain Road and Westover Ridge Drive, in the Leigh District. The electrical load growth is projected to outgrow the one circuit that Dominion Virginia Power (DVP) presently has in Farmville by Summer 2013. Since most of the load growth is near the intersection of US 15 and Hwy 460 and near Hampden-Sydney College, adding capacity at the existing Farmville substation which is ten miles away from the growth area would present a reliability issue. DVP has determined that a new substation source and feed near the proposed location would inprove the reliability issues and address the growth needs of Hampden-Sydney and the Rt 15 / Hwy 460 area.

Adherence to Comprehensive Plan

While not mentioned specifically in the Comprehensive Plan, electric service reliability and the ability to meet the future growth demands are very important to county citizens. Hampden-Sydney College, which would be served by this substation, has described the serious mechanical, physical, and student safety impact which a loss of electricity creates for the college.

Presently DVP has one circuit which supplies power to their service territory in Prince Edward County. This circuit is served by one transformer in Farmville Substation. A contingency loss of this transformer would result in 100% of the load being out until a mobile transformer could be energized. A new substation source will create a substation contingency.

Outages are not only an inconvenience, but can be a health and safety issue for residents with medical conditions. In addition, lengthy outages can be a health and safety concern for many citizens, especially in the winter.

Zoning and Existing Land Use

The proposed substation would be located on a 2.974 acre parcel, subdivided from an 18.69 acre parcel owned by Charles M. & Jessica A. Fore, and further identified as Tax Map Parcel 066-A-9A. The substation, occupying 0.9184 acres of the parcel, would be located on the northern end of the property near Worsham Road.

The property is presently zoned A1 and the proposed location of the substation is presently wooded. A "Utility Services, Major" use is permitted in the A1 District with a Special Use Permit. A DVP overhead transmission line crosses Worsham Road and runs through the property here and the substation would be located adjacent to this line.

Adjoining Properties and Uses

All surrounding propoerties are zoned A1 and are, for the most part, forested or open fields. There are two residences: the Fore's home is located approximately 170' south west of the most southern substation fence location; the second home is Ms. Cheryl E. Lard and is approximately 420'

southeast of the proposed most southern substation fence. Both properties would be shielded from the substation by no less than a 70' width of existing mature forest.

Substation equipment would be visible from travelers on Worsham Road and Leigh Mountain Road as part of the structure would be a "backbone" approximately 75' in height which carries the lines from the existing overhead transmission lines down to the substation equipment. The substation equipment will be approximately 20' in height. There is not anticipated loud noise, odor, dust, or fumes expected from the operation of this facility. The transformer equipment inside the facility is stated to produce a slight humming sound when in operation.

Transportation Access / Traffic Generation

The site will be accessed from Worsham Road. Upon completion of construction, traffic will be insignificant - the facility will be unmanned and should be visited once a month by DVP personnel for inspections and maintenance.

Emergency Services

The proposed substation is 4.7 miles from the Hampden-Sydney Fire Dept. It should have little impact on emergency services.

Public Comment

Prior to the PC Public Hearing of November 10, 2011, there were two inquiries concerning the project. One was a landowner who misunderstood the adjoining landowner letter to mean that DVP wanted to build a substation on her property. The other was a citizen calling to confirm her receipt of the adjoining landowner notice and plans to attend the Public Hearing, although she expressed no opposition to the project.

There were additional concerns raised at the November Public Hearing. Mr. Jim Ennis expressed concern about a loss of property value for a potential building location on his property if the substation was constructed at this site near his home and the viewshed impact of the backbone tower which will support lines from the overhead transmission lines to the substation. Ms. Louise Vanderpool, who resides at 3018 Worsham Road, self-described as a light sleeper opposed the substation because of the noise potential.

At the January 2012 meeting, Mr. Tom Gregory, Director of Facilities at HSC, spoke in favor of the project which would provide more reliable power for the college. He described the extensive impact that any power outage has on the campus, from a mechanical, physical and a student safety standpoint. Mr. Dan Doody, VEPCO Project Manager, explained the results of their further inquiry into adjoining properties. One property owner would not agree to sell a portion of the parcel, another property would require a variance for setbacks and presented steep terrain challenges, another property had swampy area which would prevent the facility placement.

<u>Issues</u>

1. Noise: There is a perception that substations can produce significant noise. This is not reported to be the case. As can be seen in the information provided by VEPCO, the transformer only produces a low hum during operation. Planning Department staff visited four substations in the area during late evening hours and detected low

- level continuous noise similar to noise levels generated by residential HVAC systems.
- 2. Aesthetics: There will be the large "backbone" structure to connect the overhead transmission lines to this substation which will be visible. However, there has been the towers and supporting structure associated with OH Transmission lines visible through the fields in this area for many years, and there have been no complaints. The addition of the substation will improve reliability and service from the existing infrastructure and should blend into the existing utility framework. The substation will meet setback requirements and will be buffered by mature forest.

Staff Recommendations

Staff recommends approval of the request as submitted on the site plan. This location is adjacent to the existing transmission line infrastructure and should have little impact on neighboring properties. The project is very important to DVP's effort to provide reliable electrical service to the areas of greatest growing demand. Representatives of DVP have been very active in contacting neighbors and offering to explain the site plans to them as a means of ensuring that anyone in the area would clearly understand the level of noise and visual impact the project would have. VEPCO has explored many other locations and has determined this location to be best suited for this infrastructure.

Planning Commission Recommendation:

After thorough review and discussion of this application, the Planning Commission voted to recommend favorable consideration of this SUP application by the Board of Supervisors per the site plan and application materials presented by VEPCO / DVP at the November 15, 2011 Public Hearing.



PROJECT: Special Use Permit - Amanda Wells, dba Four Paw Bed & Biscuit

Commercial Kennel

Summary of Request:

Amanda Wells has submitted a Special Use Permit (SUP) Application to operate a Commercial Kennel facility use in the A-2 (Agricultural Residential) Zoning District. This proposed facility would be accessed from 2018 Persimmon Tree Fork Road, and is further identified as Tax Map Parcel (TMP) #25-A-22A, measuring 2.75 acres.

The facility would be a newly constructed building approximately 24 feet x 40 feet x 14'h with fenced areas for "running" areas. Ms. Wells has been operating a successful Pet Sitting business previously and this kennel is an expansion of that business. The applicant wishes to be allowed to kennel a maximum of thirty (30) dogs at the site, which allows for future expansion. Phase I is designed for approximately fifteen (15) kennels, and Phase II is proposed for future expansion up to thirty (30). Dogs will be allowed outside in a secure, fenced area during the daytime and will be kept in interior quarters through the night, reducing any noise disturbance to neighbors.

Zoning and Existing Land-Use:

The site consists of one parcel totaling 2.75 acres and is zoned A-2. The existing site is set in a rural residential area near the end of Persimmon Tree Fork Road. It is nestled into larger working agricultural lands owned by the applicant and members of her family.

The proposed site plan is situated alongside an existing residential dwelling surrounded by grazing lands. The entrance to the site will follow an existing entrance from Persimmon Tree Fork Road. The applicant wishes to place a sign for the business along Persimmon Tree Fork Road and shows such sign placement on the proposed site plan.

Adherence to Comprehensive Plan:

The application proposes an economic development opportunity for this business-woman and promotes the placement of a commercial kennel in an agricultural setting. Allowing the commercial kennel use in this location minimizes conflicts between existing and proposed land uses which is a Land Use Goal of the Comprehensive Plan.

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal I: Economic Development: Objective #2:</u> Promote the retention and growth of existing County businesses, and the location of new businesses in the County.. (p 74) *Ms. Wells proposes to grow her existing pet care business.*

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal II: Land Use: Objective #4:</u> Promote a diversified commercial base which I does not create significant impacts on residential area, prime agricultural lands, or public facilities. (p.79) *This location is well suited to this proposed use*.

Adjoining Properties and Land-Uses:

The properties surrounding the parcel are also zoned A-2. The proposed site development is separated from the nearest residence, which is the applicant's, by Persimmon Tree Fork Road. The development of this site would be well buffered from adjoining residences by ample open space pasture and forest lands. Many of the nearby residences have dogs as pets and are accustomed to Ms. Well's existing pet sitting business.

Exterior lights planned for the site are within acceptable lighting expectations, similar to farm and residential lighting fixtures.

The applicant has spoken with her neighbors and has reported their support for the business endeavor. Letters of Notification were sent by USPS certified mail to the adjoining landowners identified by the applicant and the Planning Department. There have been no complaints or calls of concern. All certified mail receipts have been returned.

Trip Generation

The trip generation of this use is expected to be minimal and consistent with the trips generated by the existing Amanda's Pet Sitting business operating from 2063 Persimmon Tree Fork Road. Therefore, the applicants were not required to perform a Transportation Study as part of their application.

The existing driveway will be extended to reach the new kennel building. Only minimal parking needs are expected and the Acting Zoning Administrator suggests the equivalent of four parking spaces each 9' x 20' (total 720 SF) be designed into the site, per Schedule B of the Zoning Ordinance. Gravel access and parking is permitted.

Utilities

There is no public water or sewer available at this site. The applicant has contacted the VA Dept of Health and has been given permission to operate this facility using waste handling techniques consistent with agricultural practices. There is existing well water supply and electrical supply at the site.

Emergency Services Zone 805

This site will be served by the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department, the Farmville/ Prince Edward Rescue Squad, and the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Department. The nearest veterinarian's office is Ridge Animal Hospital approximately 3 miles from the site.

Public Comments:

The office has received no calls concerning the proposed development.

Hours of Operation:

Monday through Saturday 7:30 am - 6:00 pm, and pick-up or drop-off by appointment when necessary.

Conclusion

It is the conclusion of the County Planner that this Commercial Kennel Use would be consistent with the A2 District and is a compliment to the goals of the Comprehensive Plan by providing a diversity of commercial businesses which do not create significant impacts on residential areas.

Recommendation of the Planning Commission:

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing for this SUP on February 21, 2012. Following their consideration of the application and the Public Hearing, the Planning Commission recommended the Board of Supervisors favorably consider the SUP application allowing a Commercial Kennel facility with up to thirty (30) kennels, operating in adherence to the proposed Hours of Operation, and the site constructed per the site plan and to include the equivalent of four parking spaces each 9' x 20' (total 720 SF), per Schedule B of the Zoning Ordinance. Gravel access and parking is permitted.

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 10-1. Adoption of state comprehensive animal laws.

The provisions of Code of Virginia of 1950, § 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., are adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-2. Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless otherwise defined within this chapter. Words and phrases not defined herein, which are defined in section 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500 of the Code of Virginia shall have the meanings ascribed to them by that section:

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER means a person appointed as the animal control officer or a deputy animal control officer pursuant to Virginia law (§ 3.2-6555) to enforce the Virginia Comprehensive Animal Laws, this Chapter, and all laws for the protection of domestic animals.

COMPANION ANIMAL means any domestic dog, domestic cat, non-human primate, guinea pig, hamster, rabbit not raised for human food or fiber, or other animal not prohibited, kept for pleasure rather than utility.

LIVESTOCK includes all domestic or domesticated: bovine animals; equine animals; ovine animals; porcine animals; cervidae animals; capradae animals; animals of the genus Lama; ratites; fish or shellfish in aquaculture facilities as defined by state law (§ 3.2-2600); enclosed domesticated rabbits or hares raised for human food or fiber; or any other individual animal specifically raised for food or fiber, except companion animals.

WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMAL means any raccoon, skunk, wolf, squirrel, fox, leopard, panther, tiger, lion, lynx or any other warm-blooded animal, poisonous snake or tarantula which can normally be found in the wild state or any other member of crocodilian, including but not limited to alligators, crocodiles, caimans and gavials. Ferrets, nonpoisonous snakes, rabbits and laboratory rats which have been bred in captivity and which never have known the wild shall be excluded from this definition.

DIVISION 1. CONTAINMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Sec. 10-10. Purposes; legislative authority.

- (a) The purpose of this division is to provide for the containment of livestock in the county and to prescribe the penalties for its violation.
 - (b) This division is adopted under the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 55-310, et. seq.

Sec. 10-11. Lawful fence.

- (a) The boundary line of each lot or tract of land or any stream in the county shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock domesticated by man.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner or manager of any livestock domesticated by man to permit any such livestock, as to which the boundaries of lots or tracts of land have been constituted a legal fence, to run at large beyond the limits of his own lands within the county; and such animal shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running off the property, whether owned or rented, of its owner or manager, and not under their owner's or manager's immediate control.
- (c) Any such owner or manager, after having been notified by an officer of the law that such animal is running at large, permits such animal to continue to run at large, shall be deemed to have violated this section and shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

DIVISION 2. MISCELLANEOUS ANIMAL REGULATIONS

Sec. 10-20. Disposal of companion animals.

- (a) The owner of any companion animal which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal.
- (b) If after notice any owner fails to comply with this section, the animal control officer or other officer cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal; and may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of this service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-21. Killing of coyotes permitted; bounty established; procedures for claims.

- (a) The killing coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The board of supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.

- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per fiscal year, except by additional appropriation by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under this division, which act shall constituted a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

ARTICLE II. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS

Sec. 10-30. Position created.

The animal control officer shall discharge the duties provided for in Code of Virginia § 3.1–796.66 3.2-6500, et seq., and such other duties as are provided in this chapter. The animal control officer shall be paid from the dog operating fund such compensation as the board of supervisors by resolution may determine, such compensation to be paid monthly.

Sec. 10-31. Dog operating fund.

The dog operating fund shall consist of the funds received from dog license taxes and fines imposed for the violation of the provisions of this chapter.

Fees for services provided by the animal control officer or for reclaiming animals, not otherwise specified within this Chapter shall be set by resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE III. DOGS

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 10-40. Disposal of dead dogs.

The owner of any dog which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury and dispose of the dog. If after notice any owner fails to do so, the animal control officer or other officer shall bury or cremate the dog; and he may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of his service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-41. Unlawful acts.

The following shall be deemed unlawful acts the violation of which shall be a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section:

- (1) Diseased dogs. For the owner of any dog with a contagious or infectious disease to permit such dog to stray from his premises if such disease is known to the owner. § 3.2-6587(A)(6)
- (2) Female dog in season. For the owner of any female dog to permit such dog to stray from his premises while such dog is known to such owner to be in season.

- (3) Removing collar and tag. For any person except the owner or custodian to remove a legally acquired license tag from a dog without the permission of the owner or custodian. § 3.2-6587(A)(8)
- (4) Concealing a dog. For any person to conceal or harbor any dog for which the license tax has not been paid or to conceal a- any dog which has been found to be vicious or dangerous to prevent the same from being destroyed. § 3.2-6587(A)(7)

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Sec. 10-50. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog four months or older unless such dog is licensed as required by the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.85 3.2-6524, and this division.

Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and, upon their first offense of this section and shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-51. How to obtain license.

Dogs shall be licensed as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.86 3.2-6527, by reference, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-52. Amount of license tax.

(a) Pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, § 3,1-796.87 3.2-6528, any person licensing a dog in the county shall pay an annual license tax on the ownership of the dog according to the following schedule:

Male dog	\$10.00	(\$1 to \$10)
Unsexed (castrated) male dog	\$ 5.00	(\$1 to \$10) *can't exceed male
Female dog	\$10.00	(\$1 to \$10)
Unsexed (spayed) female dog	\$ 5.00	(\$1 to \$10) *can't exceed female

(b) No license tax shall be levied on a guide dog for a blind person, service dog or dogs under four months of age.

Sec. 10-53. Kennel license tax.

The tax for a licensed kennel shall be according to the following schedule:

5 1020 dogs	\$35.00
Over20 dogs	\$50.00

Sec. 10-54. When license tax payable.

The license tax imposed by this division shall be payable to the treasurer of the county, as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.88 3.2-6530, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-55. Effect of dog not wearing collar as evidence.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall prima facie be deemed to be unlicensed and a stray; and in any proceedings under this division, the burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog. § 3.2-6533

Sec. 10-56. What dog license shall consist of.

The county dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the jurisdiction issuing the license, the sex of the dog and the calendar year for which issued, and shall bear a serial number.

Sec. 10-57. Duplicate license tags.

Duplicate license tags shall be obtained by the owner of a dog as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.91 3.2-6532, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-58. Displaying receipts; dogs to wear tags.

Dog license receipts shall be displayed and dog license tags shall be worn as required by Code of Virginia, $\frac{3.1-796.92}{3.2-6531}$.

Sec. 10-59. Payment of license tax subsequent to summons.

Payment of the license tax subsequent to a summons to appear before the general district court or other court for failure to do so within the time required shall not operate to relieve such owner of the penalties provided.

DIVISION 3. RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 10-60. Vaccination required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog or domesticated cat, age four months or older unless such dog or cat has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises. No license tags shall be issued for any dog unless there is presented to the treasurer at the time application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6587, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6521.

Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6522(4).

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person who is the owner or custodian of the dog found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section, if said owner or custodian has previously been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is or has been running at large.
- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
 - (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
 - (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
 - (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
 - (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
 - (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128 3.2-6527, 18.2-03.1 18.2-403.1, 18.2-03.2 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog (d) found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197 Code of Virginia § 3.2-6540. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

Sec. 10-72. Fowl running at large.

"It shall be unlawful to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at-large in the county at any time."

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96 3.2-6546.

Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1–796.66 3.2-6500 et seq.

Sec. 10-82. Fees for confinement.

The legal owner of any dog seized and confined by the animal control officer shall pay to the animal control officer a charge for the confinement of the dog, the amount of such charge to be in accordance with the fees established by the board of supervisors. All fees received by the animal control officer shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

Sec. 10-83. Unlicensed dogs.

(a) It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, or any other officer, to capture and impound any companion animal found running at large on which the license tax has not been paid. A reasonable

effort will be made to find the owner. After five days, if the owner is not found, the animal shall be declared abandoned. If the owner is known, the animal will be held an additional five days. The provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96 3.2-6546 shall apply where applicable to the disposition of the dog. Any person, animal control officer or other officer euthanizing a dog under this chapter shall cremate, bury or sanitarily dispose of the dog. Prior to the disposition by euthanasia or otherwise, all of the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.66 3.2-6500 et seq., shall have been complied with.

(b) If the animal control officer or other officer exercises his option to deliver such dog to any person in his jurisdiction who will pay the required license tax and cost on such dog, the person accepting delivery of such dog shall, within five days after such delivery, furnish to the animal control officer evidence of the inoculation and licensing of such dog as required by this article; and the failure to provide such evidence shall be a violation of this article and shall constitute a separate offense.

DIVISION 6. DAMAGE BY DOGS

Sec. 10-90. Disposition of funds.

The treasurer shall keep all money collected by him for dog licenses in a separate account as part of the general fund; and such funds shall be used for the purposes designated by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.101 3.2-6534, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-91. Compensation for livestock and poultry killed or injured by dogs.

- (a) Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6553, Any—any person who has any livestock or poultry killed or injured by any dog not his own in the county shall be entitled to receive as compensation the fair market value of such livestock or poultry not to exceed \$400.00 per animal or \$10.00 per fowl, provided that:
 - (1) Within 72 hours of discovery of the death or injury, the claimant gives notice of the incident to the animal control officer.
 - (2) Within 60 days of the discovery of the death or injury, the claimant shall furnish such evidence of the quantity and value of the dead or injured livestock or poultry and the reasons the claimant believes that death or injury was caused by a dog to the board of supervisors.
 - (3) The claimant first has exhausted his legal remedies against the owner, if known, of the dog doing the damage for which compensation under this section is sought. Exhaustion shall mean a judgment against the owner of the dog upon which execution has returned unsatisfied.
- (b) Upon a determination by the board that a claim meets the criteria set forth in this section for compensation, the board shall approve the same and forward the approval to the treasurer. Upon payment under this section, the board shall be surrogated to the extent of compensation paid to the right of action to the owner of the livestock or poultry against the owner of the dog and may enforce such compensation in an appropriate action at law.

Sec. 10-92 Seizure of dogs suspected of killing or injuring livestock or poultry.

Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6552, If—if any person, including the animal control officer, has reason to believe that any dog is killing livestock or poultry, he shall apply to a magistrate of the county, who shall

issue a warrant requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before the judge of the general district court at the time and place named therein, at which time evidence shall be heard. If it shall be determined by the court that such dog is a livestock or poultry killer, the dog shall be ordered (i) euthanized immediately by the animal control officer or other officer designated by the judge of the general district court or (ii) removed to another state which does not border on the commonwealth. Any dog ordered removed which is later found in the commonwealth shall be ordered by a court to be euthanized immediately.

DIVISION 6. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Sec. 10-100. Control of dangerous or vicious dogs; penalties.

(a) As used in this section:

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person or companion animal that is a dog or cat, or killed a companion animal that is a dog or cat. However, when a dog attacks or bites a companion animal that is a dog or cat, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i) if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the dog or cat as a result of the attack or bite, (ii) if both animals are owned by the same person, (iii) if such attack occurs on the property of the attacking or biting dog's owner or custodian, or (iv) for other good cause as determined by the court. No dog shall be found to be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking, or inflicting injury on a dog or cat while engaged with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog handling event. No dog that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person shall be found to be a dangerous dog if the court determines, based on the totality of the evidence before it, that the dog is not dangerous or a threat to the community.

"Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior that resulted in a previous finding by a court or, on or before July 1, 2006, by an animal control officer as authorized by local ordinance, that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner has been given notice of that finding.

(b) Any law-enforcement officer or animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the matters at issue. If a law-enforcement officer successfully makes an application for the issuance of a summons, he shall contact the local animal control officer and inform him of the location of the dog and the relevant facts pertaining to his belief that the dog is dangerous or vicious. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of this section. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance with the provisions of § 3.1.796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The procedure for appeal and trial shall be the same as provided by law for misdemeanors. Trial by jury shall be as provided in Article 4 (§ 19.2-260 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 19.2 of the Code of

Virginia, 1950, as amended. The Commonwealth shall be required to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.

- (c) No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely because it is a particular breed, nor is the ownership of a particular breed of canine or canine crossbreed prohibited. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog that was engaged in the performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. No animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. § 3.2-6540(C)
- (d) If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section. § 3.2-6540(D)
- (e) The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within 10 days of such finding, obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer or treasurer for a fee of \$50, in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer or treasurer shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag that identifies the animal as a dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subsection shall be renewed annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained. The animal control officer shall provide a copy of the dangerous dog registration certificate and verification of compliance to the State Veterinarian. § 3.2-6540(E)
- (f) All dangerous dog registration certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current rabies vaccination, if applicable, (ii) that the animal has been neutered or spayed, and (iii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value of at least \$100,000, which covers animal bites. The owner may obtain and maintain a bond in surety, in lieu of liability insurance, to the value of at least \$100,000. § 3.2-6540(F)
- (g) While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its owner's property, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it from biting a person or another animal.
- (h) The owner of any dog found to be dangerous shall register the animal with the Commonwealth of Virginia Dangerous Dog Registry, as established under § 3.1-796.93:3 3.2-6542 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, within 45 days of such a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction.

The owner shall also cause the local animal control officer to be promptly notified of (i) the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all owners; (ii) all of the means necessary to locate the owner and the dog at any time; (iii) any complaints or incidents of attack by the dog upon any person or cat or dog; (iv) any claims made or lawsuits brought as a result of any attack; (v) tattoo or chip identification information or both; (vi) proof of insurance or surety bond; and (vii) the death of the dog.

- (i) After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, upon learning of same, cause the local animal control authority to be notified if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; or (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; or (iii) is sold, given away, or dies. Any owner of a dangerous dog who relocates to a new address shall, within 10 days of relocating, provide written notice to the appropriate local animal control authority for the old address from which the animal has moved and the new address to which the animal has been moved.
- (j) Any owner or custodian of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal is guilty of a:
 - 1. Class 2 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person;
 - 2. Class 1 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, bites a human being or attacks a human being causing bodily injury; or
 - 3. Class 6 felony if any owner or custodian whose willful act or omission in the care, control, or containment of a canine, canine crossbreed, or other animal is so gross, wanton, and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life, and is the proximate cause of such dog or other animal attacking and causing serious bodily injury to any person.

The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.

- (k) The owner of any animal that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to comply with the requirements of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
- (I) All fees collected pursuant to this section, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by this section, shall be paid into a special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any training course required under § 3.1-796.104:1 3.2-6556 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS (REPEALED August 14, 2007)

ARTICLE V. HYBRID CANINE.

Section 10-120 Definitions.

As used in this article:

1. "Hybrid canine" means any animal which at any time has been or is permitted, licensed registered, or otherwise described or represented as a hybrid canine, wolf or coyote by its owner to

- a licensed veterinarian, law enforcement officer, animal control officer, humane investigator, official of the Department of Health, or representative of the State Veterinarian.
- 2. "Adequate confinement" means that, while on the property of its owner and not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian, a hybrid canine shall be confined in a humane manner in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to (i) prevent the animal's escape; or if the hybrid canine is determined to be a dangerous dog pursuant to § 3.1-796.93:13.2-6540, the structure shall prevent direct contact with any person or animal not authorized by the owner to be in direct contact with the hybrid canine, and (ii) provide a minimum of 100 square feet of floor space for each adult animal. Tethering of a hybrid canine not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian shall not be considered adequate confinement.
- 3. "Responsible ownership" means the ownership and humane care of a hybrid canine in such a manner as to comply with all laws and ordinances regarding hybrid canines and prevent endangerment by the animal to public health and safety.
- 4. "Owner" means any person who (a) has a right or property in an animal, (b) keeps or harbors an animal, (c) has an animal in his care, or (d) acts as a custodian of an animal.

Section 10-121. Hybrid canine ordinance; penalty.

- 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian to allow any hybrid canine to run at large in the country during the period of January 1 through December 31 inclusive of any year. For the purpose of this section, a hybrid canine shall be deemed to be running at large while outside of any pen or enclosure as provided in subsection 2 of this section, however, any owner or custodian of a hybrid canine may be allowed to remove a hybrid canine from any pen or enclosure for purposes of transportation to another pen or enclosure or for the purpose of obtaining medical attention. In no event shall any hybrid canine be allowed to be set free on any property within the county whether or not the hybrid canine is under its owner's or custodian's immediate control.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to own or possess a hybrid canine unless such hybrid canine is kept and maintained in a pen or enclosure as follows:
 - (a) The pen or enclosure shall contain at least 200 square feet of space per adult hybrid canine.
 - (b) Any fencing used in the construction of the pen or enclosure shall be at least eight (8) feet in height with an additional overhang of fencing or barbed wire angling a minimum of three (3) feet into the pen or enclosure. Such wire enclosure shall be of such strength as to prevent the escape of any hybrid canine enclosed therein.
 - (c) To prevent digging out along the fence, concrete footers at least one (1) foot wide and six (6) inches deep shall be installed along the perimeter of the pen or enclosure or a wire footing of 12-gauge wire buried six (6) inches in the ground with at least three feet of wire on the inside of the pen or enclosure, bending the remaining one (1) foot of wire up in a 90° angle and connect every six (6) inches to the bottom outside of the pen or enclosure.
 - (d) The pen or enclosure shall provide shelter which affords complete protection from all elements of nature.
 - (e) A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class 3 misdemeanor for the first violation and a Class 1 misdemeanor for any second or subsequent offense. Upon a conviction of a second violation of this ordinance, the owner shall surrender the hybrid canine to the

animal control officer for euthanasia in accordance with § 3.1-796.119 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Issue: PUBLIC HEARING – Repeal of Section 50, Article II, Fireworks

Summary: At the March meeting, County Attorney Jim Ennis discussed with the Board the changes to the state's fireworks regulations, specifically that the state now requires at least one person at each fireworks display be certified by the State Fire Marshal's Office as a Pyrotechnician. As the County of Prince Edward does not have a Fire Marshal to inspect and permit fireworks shows, it is preferable to allow applicants to go through the State Fire Marshal's office for fireworks displays.

The County Attorney indicated that it is advisable for the County to repeal Section 50, Article II, Fireworks of the *County Code*. The repeal of the County's Fireworks Ordinance does not prohibit the use of "permissible fireworks," as defined in Section 27-97 of the *Code of Virginia* as any sparklers, fountains, Pharaoh's serpents, caps for pistols, or pinwheels commonly known as whirligigs or spinning jennies. It also does not prohibit large fireworks displays, which will be regulated by the State Fire Marshal's Office.

ARTICLE II. FIREWORKS

Sec. 50-31. Use limited.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the county to keep, sell, offer for sale, expose for sale, or buy any fireworks, or to use, ignite or explode any firecracker, torpedo, skyrocket, Roman candle, or other substance or thing of whatever form or construction containing explosives or flammable compounds, intended or commonly known as fireworks, in any public highway or street, public place or within 200 years of the dwelling or building of another. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-6))

Sec. 50-32. Permits.

Upon application in writing to the board of supervisors, fair associations, amusement parks, or any organization or group of individuals may be granted a permit for the display of fireworks under such terms and conditions as the board of supervisors may prescribe. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II)10-7))

Sec. 50-33. Penalties for violation of article.

Any person violating any provision of this article shall be fined not exceeding \$1,000.00, confined in the county jail not exceeding 12 months, or both. (Ord. of 12-1-47, § II(10-8))

IDA Financing of Equipment for Paris Ceramics. America, LLC

Summary:

At the March 20, 2012 meeting of the Industrial Development Authority, the Authority Members approved a request by Richard Abbott, President of Paris Ceramics. America, LLC for financing assistance in the amount of \$170,000 to purchase a new water jet saw. A financing proposal has now been agreed upon between the Authority and Mr. Abbott. The Authority respectfully requests the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors advance the \$170,000 to the Authority to enable the authority to make the loan.

The IDA prefers to make this loan in order to maintain full control of the building and all contents associated with this business. Currently the IDA is selling the building on a lease/purchase agreement and is holding the mortgage, thereby controlling the land/building. Additionally, the IDA holds a blanket lien on all FF&E which helps secure the building loan. The funding for this new equipment will be covered by the blanket lien. To ensure the County's first position is maintained we would not want another lender to establish any claim on the company's assets.

The loan for \$170,000 is fully amortizing over 7 years, with principal and interest payments due monthly, at 5.0% simple interest, and using the water jet saw as collateral. The addition of the new water jet saw to the existing stone fabrication equipment at Paris Ceramics will allow them to do enhanced architectural designs in stone and will require the addition of an additional employee position to plant operation.



Re: Notice of Claim Under Va. Code Ann. § 15.2-209

Dear Mr. Bartlett:

By this letter I am advising that I have been retained by Ms. Lillian Snelling, both individually and in her capacity as Personal Representative of the Estate of John B. Snelling, for all matters related to the employment, injury, medical treatment, and death of John Snelling in the Town of Farmville at the facility operated by Immigration Centers of America. As you may know, Mr. Snelling died on January 19, 2011. after an incident at the Immigration Centers of America. I will be investigating any and all injuries, damages, and claims which may exist against various individuals and entities, including the Town of Farmville.

Upon information and belief, Prince Edward County emergency services responded to the incident, provided treatment to Mr. Snelling, transported him to the hospital, and provided information to hospital staff regarding Mr. Snelling. Potential claims against the County may include negligence, wrongful death, discrimination, fraud, conspiracy, and conflicts of interest.

Since our investigation into this matter is still underway, the precise theories that would be asserted against the Town are subject to change. Therefore, I hereby request that immediate steps be taken by you and all other entities and individuals to preserve all documents and data from all sources that relate to or have any possible connection with John Snelling, Immigration Centers of America, and these potential claims.

"Documents and data" as used here means not only hard copy documents, but audio recordings, videotape, email, instant messages, word processing documents, spreadsheets, databases, calendars, telephone logs, contact manager information, Internet usage files, and all other electronic information maintained, created, received, and/or maintained by you on computer or data systems. "Sources" include all hard copy files, computer hard drives, removable media (e.g., CDs and DVDs), laptop computers, PDAs, Blackberry devices, and any

other locations where hard copy and electronic data is stored. Keep in mind that any of the above-mentioned sources of relevant information may include personal computers your employees use or have access to at home, or other locations. It also includes inaccessible storage media, such as back-up tapes, which may contain relevant electronic information that does not exist in any other form.

Electronically stored data will also be an important and irreplaceable source of discovery and/or evidence in these matters. You must take every reasonable step to preserve all such information in its possession, custody or control until further notice. *Failure to do so could result in serious adverse consequences*.

In order to comply with these legal obligations, the County must take immediate steps to preserve all existing documents and data related to and arising out of John Snelling's employment, injury, medical treatment, and death, and all such existing documents related to Immigration Centers of America, and suspend deletion, overwriting, or any other possible destruction of relevant documents and data.

Thank you for your anticipated cooperation in this regard.

Mr. Fortune stated he is still awaiting approval from the Town's of Charlotte Court House, Keysville, Blackstone, Burkeville and Crewe, all of which have the Plan on their March Agenda for adoption. The rest of the Towns in the District have already approved the Plan.

Mr. Fortune stated in working on the Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan he had worked with Mr. Steve Ferguson, County Planner for Nottoway County. Mr. Ferguson passed away on February 29, 2012, after suffering a massive stroke the previous Sunday. Mr. Fortune stated he had the funeral arrangements for anyone wishing to attend the funeral.

Status- Virginia General Assembly-HB823 Defeated: Ms. Hickman stated House Bill 823 that would have limited Planning District's purposes under the Regional Cooperation Act was passed by indefinitely by the House Subcommittee, effectively killing the bill.

Redistricting Update – Town of Farmville & Blackstone: Ms. Foster stated all of the Counties completed their Redistricting process last Fall. However, the two Towns that the CRC is assisting, Farmville and Blackstone were not under the same time constraints.

The Town of Farmville requested a Census Count Question Resolution to the U.S. Census Bureau in June of 2012 challenging the census counts within certain blocks in the Town of Farmville that placed students of Longwood University in the wrong census blocks. The inaccurate data would have made it very difficult to conduct Redistricting of the Town's Wards with the current data. The Town finally received a notice from the Census agreeing that mistakes had been made and provided new updated information in February 2012. The Town received an opinion from the Virginia Attorney General's office prior to receiving the new data that they could hold Town elections in May based on the current Ward system (before Redistricting) due to the Census Count Question to the U.S. Census Bureau. The Town's Redistricting Committee met on February 28, 2012 and formulated a Plan to be reviewed by the Town Council at their next meeting if accepted it will be reviewed by the Public for possible adoption in the coming weeks.

The Town of Blackstone does not have an election this year and plans to complete the process sometime this year. Blackstone has created several Plans; however, they have not officially adopted one to date.

March Presentations of CRC FY10-11 Annual Report: Ms. Hickman stated the staff attended Boards of Supervisor meetings in Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland and Nottoway during the month of February to present the CRC's FY10-11 Annual Report. Ms. Hickman stated staff will be attending Lunenburg and Prince Edward County Boards of Supervisors meetings in March and will also be attending Town Council meetings in Drakes Branch, Phenix, Farmville, Charlotte Court House and Kenbridge. Ms. Hickman provided a schedule of meetings in April and May to close out the Annual Report Presentations.

Status – CRC FY 12-13 Budget Request: Ms. Hickman stated FY 12-13 Budget Requests have been sent to all current CRC member entities as well as Nottoway County. Budget Requests will be sent to Farmville and Blackstone following Annual Report Presentations to their Councils. Requests will also be sent to Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney in the coming weeks.

2013 Virginia Outdoors Plan Public Kick-Off Meeting: Ms. Terry stated the CRC will be hosting

the Public Input Meeting for the Virginia Outdoors Plan for the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation for the Planning District 14 area. Two meetings will be held on March 13, 2012, one at 3:00 p.m. and the other at 7:00 p.m. in the Mill Room which is located in the basement of the building housing the CRC offices. Ms. Terry stated she is working with Ms. Magi Van Eps, Tourism & Visitor Center Coordinator for Prince Edward County, to invite additional groups from the area that are involved in tourism and outdoor activities other than those targeted by DCR. The Chairman suggested that the Prince Edward County Historical Society be notified as well as all of the counties.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

Adoption of CRC FY 12-13 Rural Transportation Planning Scope of Work & Resolution: Ms. Foster stated included in the Council Members packet was a copy of the Draft FY 2013 Rural Transportation Planning Work Program and Resolution. Ms. Foster stated the CRC will receive \$58,000 from VDOT with the CRC providing \$14,500 in matching funds for a total program cost of \$72,500.

Ms. Stish moved that the CRC FY 12-13 Rural Transportation Planning Scope of Work & Resolution be adopted as presented. Motion carried.

Victoria Request for Grant Writing Assistance for 2012 VCDBG Application: Mr. Fortune stated the Town of Victoria has requested that the CRC assist them in applying for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for a Housing Rehabilitation Project. The project consists of a sixblock area within the town with 15-20 houses being rehabilitated. The application is due March 28, 2012.

Mr. Wingold moved that the CRC approve the request from Victoria for assistance in applying for a CDBG for a Housing Rehabilitation Project and also to authorize the Acting President-CEO to execute the Grant Writing agreement between the CRC and the Town of Victoria. Motion carried.

Adoption of 2012 Virginia CDBG Program Regional Priorities: Ms. Terry stated the CRC has received comments from nine localities to formulate the Region's Priorities for the 2012 Virginia CDBG Program.

Mr. Wheeler moved that the 2012 CRC Regional Priorities for the CDBG Program be adopted as presented and also to authorize the Acting President-CEO to sign the Resolution that will be sent to DHCD. Motion carried.

VEDP-Virginia Heartland Regional Profile: Ms. Hickman stated a copy of the VEDP-Virginia Heartland Regional Profile was provided as a separate attachment in the Council members' packet. Ms. Hickman stated a copy of this profile is provided on the VEDP's homepage on their website.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process: Ms. Foster stated the CRC received three CIRPs for review:

STEPS, Inc./DRPT, Purchase 1 fourteen-passenger bus with wheelchair lift

- SVCC/DEQ, Environmental Impact Review-Learning Resource Center at SVCC
- DEQ, Buckingham Landfill-Remedial Action/Unilateral Administrative Order

Council provided no comment on listed CIRPs.

Council Member Comments: There was discussion on services provided to members versus non-members.

Other Business: None

Adjournment: The Chairman reminded members the next meeting will be held on April 5, 2012, with the Budget Committee (the entire Council) meeting at 11:00 a.m. prior to the Noon Council meeting.

The purpose of this letter is to express the Commonwealth of Virginia's appreciation for your contribution in the development of the Final Chesapeake Bay total maximum daily load (TMDL) Phase II Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP). This plan is aimed at identifying pollutant reduction strategies that can be employed from now through 2025 that will improve the quality of the Chesapeake Bay. The state's philosophy for this endeavor is to develop a WIP that contains reasonable, cost effective local strategies that best suit the water quality and other objectives of local decision makers.

I am happy to share with you that 95% of approached localities provided us with some or all of the requested information by the state's deadline of early February. As a result of this high response rate, there are close to 500 aggregated strategies that we have categorized according to pollutant source sector. In addition to the quantity of the strategies, the strategies were also meaningful and well thought out, representing practices and actions that are feasible. The Commonwealth's final WIP will be submitted at the end of March and will be available on the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) website at http://www.dcr.virginia.gov/vabaytmdl/index.shtml

The Commonwealth is extremely encouraged by the quantity of local strategies submitted in support of the Chesapeake Bay TMDL. We also recognize that this is the beginning of a multi-year process to advance local strategies. The DCR Local Engagement Teams will continue assisting localities in refining the identified strategies and to seek funding and other resources to help advance the strategies.

Again, thank you for your significant contribution to the protection of the Chesapeake Bay.
