Supervisor McKay entered the meeting at 3:20 p.m.

Chairman Fore called a 25 minute recess at 4:36 p.m.

Chairman Fore called the meeting back to order at 5:00 p.m. for the purpose of hearing the Presentation of the Prince Edward County Public Schools FY12-13 Proposed Budget.

Dr. K. David Smith, Superintendent of the Prince Edward County Schools, stated there are many variables from the state that will change the school's budget. He stated the School Board focused on priority items and attempted to protect operation functions, core programs and maintain class size.

Ms. Cindy Wahrman, Division Director of Finance, reviewed the Prince Edward County Public Schools FY2012-2013 proposed budget. She concluded by stating the School Board is requesting an increase in Local Support of \$785,334, with a total budget of \$26,132,027.

Discussion followed regarding the changes dependent upon the state budget and the General Assembly.

Supervisor Gantt suggested restructuring existing debt to include costs of upcoming repairs. Dr. Smith stated he will research that option.

Discussion followed regarding the mandate set forth on the payment of the VRS by employees.

Dr. Smith stated the challenges to the FY12-13 budget are the significant budget reductions. He said the reductions in previous years means loss of electives, programs, language instruction in the high school, art and music courses, and is a dangerous downward spiral. He then discussed grant funding.

To determine the amount of tax owed, divide the property's assessed value by 100 then multiply by the appropriate tax rate. Prince Edward County determines the assessed valuation for Machinery & Tools, Merchant's Capital, and all Business Tangible Personal Property tax classifications by taking a percentage of the original cost of the property as shown in the chart below. Real estate is assessed at fair market value. Tangible Personal Property owned by individuals such as vehicles, trailers, motorcycles, etc. are assessed using the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA) Guide Loan Value.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order, stating this is a reconvened meeting from April 3,

2012 for the purpose of a Highway Work Session.

In Re: Highway Work Session - County Six Year Plan

Mr. Kevin Wright, VDOT, reported on the amounts available to Prince Edward County for the

2013-2018 Program of \$316,635. This has gone down and is expected to continue to decline. He then

reviewed county-wide services and stated there is \$70,000 of previous funding that may be permitted to be

transferred to a project. Additionally, there is \$30,000 under the Rural Addition that may be able to be

transferred to a project.

Supervisor Campbell entered the meeting at this time.

Mr. Wright stated the \$30,000 may be able to be put to a Rural Rustic project. Discussion

followed on the various projects: Back-Hampden-Sydney Road is slated to begin construction in the spring

of 2015; Mr. Randy Hamilton stated the public hearing for that project is projected for September 2012.

Mr. Wright said the Lockett Road (Route 619) project is expected to begin December 2015, and the Aspen Hill (Route 601) project should begin next spring; temporary right-of-way easements have been staked, and the "willingness" will be posted in mid-May [2012].

Supervisor Cooper-Jones entered the meeting at this time.

Mr. Wright stated there are currently no open projects; the next is expected in six to eight years.

Discussion followed on the qualifications for Rural Rustic projects and the following potential sites: Route 740, Copper Hill Road, which is approximately one mile in length; Route 628, Spring Creek Road, which is more than a mile in length; and Route 751.

Mr. Wright stated the funds for the Rural Rustic projects only amount to about \$6,000.

Supervisor Campbell asked about paving the other end of Route 751; there is a section of about two-tenths of a mile that could use paving. He said from the Rails to Trails and pave back toward what was already done.

Supervisor McKay stated a citizen inquired about Watson Road which was on the Six Year Plan to be paved; he asked about the status of that project.

Supervisor Simpson suggested Green Town Road in Worsham.

Mr. Wright asked the Board to submit potential candidates; he stated the roads will be checked and options will be presented on the candidates which fit into the project work under "Rural Rustic." He added there is funding for five potential projects.

Mr. Hamilton stated the Lockett Road Bridge Replacement project is from a different source of funding, which is controlled by the Bridge section. He reviewed the following projects:

Route 619 Bridge – to begin in December 2015

Route 623 Bridge – the ad will be posted in 2014

Route 622 Bridge – the ad will be posted in May 2016

Route 633 Bridge – the ad will be posted in December 2013

Further discussion on the projects followed.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to authorize advertisement of a public hearing on the Prince

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Wright reviewed the current VDOT projects and maintenance activities. He stated the public

hearing on the Six Year Improvement Plan will be held on April 24, 2012 at 6:00 p.m., at North Side High

School in Roanoke, Virginia, and invited the Board members to attend.

Supervisor Campbell reported the guard rail on Route 460 near Route 626 and 655 has been

knocked down again. He said it is knocked down every week, and asked if it could be extended. Mr.

Wright said it cannot be extended; fill work may be done and the guard rail may be set back a bit with

rumble strips added to alert drivers that drift off the roadway.

Mr. Wright stated a previous request for a reduced speed limit on Route 608 does not qualify. He

said if the road has less than 400 vehicles per day or fewer than three crashes per year, it won't even qualify

for a speed study. He added gravel roads are not [speed] posted; Mr. Hamilton stated Nelson County has a

law that all unpaved roads are 35 MPH. Mr. Wright then reviewed the policy for Children At Play signs;

he stated a reduced speed is expected in a subdivision or in a rural densely populated area. He said the

more signs that are posted, the less effective they are.

Supervisor Gantt stated Dead End Road needs gravel; a road off Peach Orchard Road is in bad

shape. He added the two bridges on Routes 622 and 623 have good reflectors but there are pieces that are

missing or loose. Mr. Wright stated he will check on the next inspection dates, and replacements are under

design and are expected to be done in 2014 and 2016.

Mr. Wright said the "Through-Truck Restriction" in Rice is ready to post for public comment;

however, VDOT will not post it until there is a through-truck problem. He stated there is local truck traffic

on the roads in question.

Chairman Fore called the meeting back to order at 5:00 p.m.

In Re: YMCA Summer Program

Ms. Jane Schirmer, CEO/Executive Director of the Southside Virginia Family YMCA, discussed

the plans and the process of the Summer Program to be held at the Southside Virginia Family YMCA and

stated the YMCA cannot do the program without assistance from Prince Edward County.

Mr. Bartlett stated there is currently \$23,000 in the budget to fund the program for this fiscal year;

it has not been included in the recommended budget.

Discussion followed on the consolidation of services and programs for the area youth, and how the

youth are selected for the program, and the teacher to student ratio. Ms. Schirmer stated there will be

several positions advertised for employment and they anticipate 150 children, on a first-come first-served

basis. Mr. Bartlett added the Town of Farmville also has a summer program.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to appropriate \$23,000 to the Southside Virginia Family YMCA

In Re: Budget Work Session

Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator, stated a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) is proposed for the County employees, at a rate of 3.6% which is the same provided to the Social Security and military retirees. Mr. Bartlett said the retirement component is unknown. He stated the Governor amended the mandate to have the employees pay their VRS contribution to allow it to be phased in over five years. Mr. Bartlett said that to keep the employees at their current rate of pay with the mandate in place, the increase in cost to the County to cover the mandated VRS would be \$23,455. He stated that in order to provide the amount to keep their take-home pay equal, it would take an additional 0.7% which would cost the County \$31,000. The State did not even out the pay for the state employees when they enforced the mandate.

Discussion followed.

In Re: IDA Financing of Equipment for Paris Ceramics America, LLC

Mrs. Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development, stated that at the March 20, 2012 meeting of the Industrial Development Authority, the Authority members approved a request by Richard Abbott, President of Paris Ceramics America, LLC for financing assistance in the amount of \$170,000 to purchase a new water jet saw. A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA APPROVING THE SECOND ADDENDUM TO MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY AND THE TOWN OF FARMVILLE, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward, Virginia (the "County") and the Town of Farmville, Virginia (the "Town") have entered into a Memorandum of Agreement dated

20 **43** December 9, 2008 (the "Original Library Agreement"), regarding the responsibilities of the Town and the County with respect to the public library (the "Library");

WHEREAS, in 2009 the Town issued its \$4,200,000 General Obligation Public Improvement Bonds, Series 2009 (the "Series 2009 Bonds") for the purpose of financing the construction and equipping of the Library;

WHEREAS, in connection with the issuance of the Series 2009 Bonds, the Town and the County entered into an Addendum to Memorandum of Agreement dated January 13, 2009, modifying the Original Library Agreement (collectively the "Library Agreement") to reflect the County's obligation to pay the Town two-thirds of the scheduled debt service payments on the Series 2009 Bonds;

WHEREAS, the Town desires to issue its General Obligation Public Improvement and Refunding Bond, Series 2012 (the "Series 2012 Bond") for purposes, in part, to refund all or a portion of the outstanding principal amount of the Series 2009 Bonds in order to achieve debt service savings; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the issuance of the Series 2012 Bond and the refunding of all or a portion of the Series 2009 Bonds, the Town and the County will execute and deliver a Second Addendum to Memorandum of Agreement (the "Second Addendum") to modify the Library Agreement to reflect the County's obligation with respect to the Series 2012 Bond.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA:

- **1.** <u>Issuance of the Series 2012 Bond</u>. The issuance of the Series 2012 Bond for the purpose, in part, to refund all or a portion of the outstanding principal amount of the Series 2009 Bonds is hereby approved.
- **2.** Approval and Execution of Second Addendum. The Chairman and the County Administrator, either of whom may act, are authorized and directed to execute and deliver on behalf of the County the Second Addendum substantially in the form presented at this meeting, with such additions, deletions or modifications as either of them, in their sole discretion, may approve. The execution and delivery of such Second Addendum shall be conclusive evidence of such approval.
- **3. Other Actions.** The Chairman and the County Administrator are each authorized and directed to take such further actions as they deem necessary or desirable that are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this Resolution.
 - **4.** <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

SECOND ADDENDUM TO MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

This Second Addendum to Memorandum of Agreement is made this ____ day of ______, 2012 by and between the COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA (the "County") and the TOWN OF FARMVILLE, VIRGINIA (the "Town").

Whereas, the County and the Town entered into a Memorandum of Agreement, dated December 9, 2008 (the "Library Agreement") setting forth their respective duties pertaining to the construction and maintenance of a public library (the "Library");

Whereas, the County and the Town agreed in the Library Agreement that the County would pay two-thirds of the costs related to constructing, furnishing and equipping the Library and the Town agreed to provide financing for the Library in an amount not to exceed \$4,200,000;

Whereas, on January 29, 2009, the Town issued its \$4,200,000 General Obligation Public Improvement Bond, Series 2009 (the "Series 2009 Bond") to finance the costs related to constructing, furnishing and equipping the Library;

Whereas, the County and the Town entered into an Addendum to Memorandum of Agreement dated January 13, 2009 (the "First Addendum"), pursuant to which the County approved the issuance by the Town of its Series 2009 Bond and agreed to pay the Town two-thirds of the scheduled debt service payments on such Series 2009 Bond;

Whereas, the Town desires to refund the Series 2009 Bond to achieve debt service savings; and

Whereas, the Town proposes to issue its general obligation bond (the "Series 2012 Bond") to be purchased by the Virginia Resources Authority, the proceeds of which will be used in part to refund the Series 2009 Bond.

Now Therefore, in consideration of the promises and mutual covenants contained herein, the Library Agreement and the First Addendum, the County and the Town hereby agree as follows:

Approval of Financing. Pursuant to the Library Agreement, the County approves the refinancing of the Series 2009 Bond by the Town and the issuance and sale the Series 2012 Bond, a portion of the proceeds of which will be used to refund the Series 2009 Bond.

County Payments. the County agrees that it will pay its two-thirds share of the cost of the Library in the amounts and on the dates set forth in the attached Schedule of County Payments, subject to annual appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on Sandy River Outdoor Adventures, LLC. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, March 23, 2012 and Friday, March 30, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 17, 2012 regarding a Special Use Permit Application submitted by Sandy River Outdoor Adventure, LLC, to operate a Commercial Outdoor Sports and Recreation facility use in the A-1 Zoning District. This proposed facility would be accessed from 151 Monroe Church Road in Rice, near the public boat ramp access of Sandy River Reservoir. The outdoor recreation facility would also be bounded by Green Bay Road, and is further identified as Tax Map Parcel #53-A-27C. The lots which comprise this parcel are 1.73 acres and 1.60 acres for a total are of 3.33 acres. The Planning Commission recommended that the Board favorably consider this Special Use Permit with the following conditions:

No alcohol

• No trap shooting or gun activities

• Sign per specification in Zoning Use & Design Standards and placement compliant with VDOT regulations

• Future expansion beyond the scope of the proposed site plan would require new review by the Planning Commission (this would include the addition of lighting)

• No noise generating mechanical equipment to be used at the facility (e.g. power winches)

• Hours of operation will be adhered to per the proposed hours

Excerpt From the Prince Edward County Department of Planning & Community Development Staff Report:

Conclusion:

The applicants have conducted their due diligence in the planning and application for this project. They have contacted VDOT concerning the entrance, VDH concerning the public sanitation facilities, have consulted with a certified professional in the field of adventure course design and safety, have selected professional gear and hardware to provide the safest apparatus, and designed this course so that the challenges will encourage family centered entertainment. The applicants have also invited the neighbors to see the site and discuss their plans, and even invited Planning Commissioners and County Supervisors to visit the site.

The Commercial Outdoor Sports and Recreation Use has specific Use & Design Standards in the A-1 Zone. These design standards address signage at the site and details specific to the site plan. The applicant anticipates a total build-out of forty (40) obstacles at the course. Phase I will only include a maximum of twenty (20) obstacles.

The hours of operation proposed vary based on the season of the year and day of the week, but total 140 days per year. The applicant would also like to offer special hours for groups outside of the general hours. The hours proposed are as follows:

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Spring (April 13-June 15)
Open 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., Fri, Sat, Sun and Holidays (total 28 days)

Summer (June 16-Sept 16)
Open 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. Daily (total 56 days)

Fall (Sept 21-Nov 11)
Open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Fri, Sat, Sun and Holidays (total 28 days)
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Special hours by appointment for groups (e.g. birthday parties, church events, college clubs)

It is the conclusion of the County Planner that this Commercial Outdoor Sports & Recreation Facility would complement the goals of the Comprehensive Plan by attracting eco-tourism, preserving open space, and providing a diversity of commercial businesses. It provides family centered recreation in a low-impact method which will likely build self-confidence and appreciation for natural resources.

The business will be required to be inspected by a certified inspector trained on zip lines and rope courses.

PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

In Re: Public Hearing – Dominion Virginia Power Substation – Utility Service, Major

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Dominion Virginia Power Substation – Utility Service, Major. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, March 23, 2012 and Friday, March 30, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated the purpose of this hearing is to receive citizen input prior to the Board of Supervisors considering a Special Use Permit Application submitted by Virginia Electric and Power Company to construct a new electricity distribution substation, which is considered a Utility Service, Major use. The location of the substation is along Worsham Road, between the intersections of Leigh Mountain Road and Westover Ridge Drive, in the Leigh District on a portion of a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel #066-A-9A, and located nearest 3098 Worsham Road.

The Planning Commission held a public Hearing on November 15, 2011 to receive citizen input prior to considering a Special Use Permit Application submitted by Virginia Electric Power Company to construct and operate an electricity distribution substation. At the initial review of the application, several Commissioners had questions concerning the possibility of other nearby locations for the utility infrastructure and conducted a site visit to the proposed location on December 13, 2011. There was majority agreement that the proposed site was well selected and the application was revisited at the January 17, 2012 Planning Commission meeting. After thorough review and discussion of this application, the Planning Commission voted to recommend favorable consideration of this Special Use Permit application per the site plan and VEPCO/DVP at the November 15, 2011 Public Hearing.

Chairman Fore opened the Public Hearing.

Charles Fore stated that due to unforeseen obstacles, he opposes the building of the substation, citing that it is too close to his house.

Supervisor Gantt asked if Mr. Fore has suggested any other locations; Mr. Fore said he has but is

unsure of the power company's findings.

Diana Faison, Site & Permit Specialist, Virginia Electric and Power Company, stated the

substation is necessary to provide additional growth and reliability to meet the power load. She said the

Power Company has been working since November 2008 on this particular site and they have a signed

contract with Mr. and Mrs. Fore.

Ms. Faison presented information regarding the process taken since 2008 and the search for the

site which would best meet all necessary criteria. She explained that several potential sites were eliminated

because they were not for sale or were out of the service area. She then reviewed the proposed site plans,

adding the existing circuit serving Hampden-Sydney is expected to be at maximum load by 2015.

Supervisor Campbell asked if the [Southside Electric] Cooperative substation would be connected;

Mr. Daniel Doody, Project Manager, stated that they will not be connected.

Supervisor Wilck asked about plans if this Special Use Permit is not approved, and would

beginning the process at another site allow for completion by the 2015 deadline.

Discussion followed.

Mrs. Puckett stated that when the situation was brought to the attention of the staff, the IDA

Attorney was contacted as there could be a conflict of interest for the County Attorney; Mr. Tinnell

advised the Board to act on the request for the Special Use Permit and remove itself from the land

transaction. The real estate contractual issue is strictly between the buyer and the seller.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the Public Hearing.

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec.10-1. Adoption of state comprehensive animal laws.

The provisions of Code of Virginia of 1950, § 3.2-6500 et seq., are adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-2. Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless otherwise defined within this chapter. Words and phrases not defined herein, which are defined in section 3.2-6500 of the Code of Virginia shall have the meanings ascribed to them by that section:

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER means a person appointed as the animal control officer or a deputy animal control officer pursuant to Virginia law (§ 3.2-6555) to enforce the Virginia Comprehensive Animal Laws, this Chapter, and all laws for the protection of domestic animals.

COMPANION ANIMAL means any domestic dog, domestic cat, non-human primate, guinea pig, hamster, rabbit not raised for human food or fiber, or other animal not prohibited, kept for pleasure rather than utility.

LIVESTOCK includes all domestic or domesticated: bovine animals; equine animals; ovine animals; porcine animals; cervidae animals; capradae animals; animals of the genus Lama; ratites; fish or shellfish in aquaculture facilities as defined by state law (§ 3.2-2600); enclosed domesticated rabbits or hares raised for

human food or fiber; or any other individual animal specifically raised for food or fiber, except companion animals.

WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMAL means any raccoon, skunk, wolf, squirrel, fox, leopard, panther, tiger, lion, lynx or any other warm-blooded animal, poisonous snake or tarantula which can normally be found in the wild state or any other member of crocodilian, including but not limited to alligators, crocodiles, caimans and gavials. Ferrets, nonpoisonous snakes, rabbits and laboratory rats which have been bred in captivity and which never have known the wild shall be excluded from this definition.

DIVISION 1. CONTAINMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Sec. 10-10. Purposes; legislative authority.

- (a) The purpose of this division is to provide for the containment of livestock in the county and to prescribe the penalties for its violation.
 - (b) This division is adopted under the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 55-310, et. seq.

Sec. 10-11. Lawful fence.

- (a) The boundary line of each lot or tract of land or any stream in the county shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock domesticated by man.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner or manager of any livestock domesticated by man to permit any such livestock, as to which the boundaries of lots or tracts of land have been constituted a legal fence, to run at large beyond the limits of his own lands within the county; and such animal shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running off the property, whether owned or rented, of its owner or manager, and not under their owner's or manager's immediate control.
- (c) Any such owner or manager, after having been notified by an officer of the law that such animal is running at large, permits such animal to continue to run at large, shall be deemed to have violated this section and shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

DIVISION 2. MISCELLANEOUS ANIMAL REGULATIONS

Sec. 10-20. Disposal of companion animals.

- (a) The owner of any companion animal which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal.
- (b) If after notice any owner fails to comply with this section, the animal control officer or other officer cremate or bury or sanitarily dispose of the companion animal; and may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of this service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-21. Killing of coyotes permitted; bounty established; procedures for claims.

- (a) The killing coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The board of supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.
- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per fiscal year, except by additional appropriation by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under this division, which act shall constituted a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

ARTICLE II. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS

Sec. 10-30. Position created.

The animal control officer shall discharge the duties provided for in Code of Virginia § 3.2-6500, et seq., and such other duties as are provided in this chapter. The animal control officer shall be paid from the dog operating fund such compensation as the board of supervisors by resolution may determine, such compensation to be paid monthly.

ARTICLE III. DOGS

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 10-40. Disposal of dead dogs.

The owner of any dog which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury and dispose of the dog. If after notice any owner fails to do so, the animal control officer or other officer shall bury or cremate the dog; and he may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of his service as provided in § 3.2-6554 of the Code of Virginia.

Sec. 10-41. Unlawful acts.

The following shall be deemed unlawful acts the violation of which shall be a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section:

(1) Diseased dogs. For the owner of any dog with a contagious or infectious disease to permit such dog to stray from his premises if such disease is known to the owner. § 3.2-6587(A)(6)

- (2) Female dog in season. For the owner of any female dog to permit such dog to stray from his premises while such dog is known to such owner to be in season.
- (3) Removing collar and tag. For any person except the owner or custodian to remove a legally acquired license tag from a dog without the permission of the owner or custodian. § 3.2-6587(A)(8)
- (4) Concealing a dog. For any person to conceal or harbor any dog for which the license tax has not been paid or to conceal any dog which has been found to be vicious or dangerous to prevent the same from being destroyed. § 3.2-6587(A)(7)

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Sec. 10-50. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog four months or older unless such dog is licensed as required by the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6524, and this division.

Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and, upon their first offense of this section and shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-51. How to obtain license.

Dogs shall be licensed as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6527, by reference, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-52. Amount of license tax.

(a) Pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6528, any person licensing a dog in the county shall pay an annual license tax on the ownership of the dog according to the following schedule:

(b) No license tax shall be levied on a guide dog for a blind person, service dog or dogs under four months of age.

Sec. 10-53. Kennel license tax.

The tax for a licensed kennel shall be according to the following schedule:

1020 dogs	\$35.00
Over20 dogs	\$50.00

Sec. 10-54. When license tax payable.

The license tax imposed by this division shall be payable to the treasurer of the county, as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6530, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-55. Effect of dog not wearing collar as evidence.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall prima facie be deemed to be unlicensed and a stray; and in any proceedings under this division, the burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog. § 3.2-6533

Sec. 10-56. What dog license shall consist of.

The county dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the jurisdiction issuing the license, the sex of the dog and the calendar year for which issued, and shall bear a serial number.

Sec. 10-57. Duplicate license tags.

Duplicate license tags shall be obtained by the owner of a dog as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6532, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-58. Displaying receipts; dogs to wear tags.

Dog license receipts shall be displayed and dog license tags shall be worn as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6531.

Sec. 10-59. Payment of license tax subsequent to summons.

Payment of the license tax subsequent to a summons to appear before the general district court or other court for failure to do so within the time required shall not operate to relieve such owner of the penalties provided.

DIVISION 3. RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 10-60. Vaccination required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog or domesticated cat, age four months or older unless such dog or cat has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or

licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises. No license tags shall be issued for any dog unless there is presented to the treasurer at the time application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6587, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6521.

Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6522(4).

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person who is the owner or custodian of the dog found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section, if said owner or custodian has previously been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is or has been running at large.
- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:

- (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
- (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
- (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
- (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
- (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6527, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.2-6527, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.
- (d) Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of Code of Virginia § 3.2-6540. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

Sec. 10-72. Fowl running at large.

"It shall be unlawful to permit any fowl, including all domestic fowl and any game birds raised in captivity, to run at-large in the county at any time."

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6546.

Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6500 et seq.

Sec. 10-82. Fees for confinement.

The legal owner of any dog seized and confined by the animal control officer shall pay to the animal control officer a charge for the confinement of the dog, the amount of such charge to be in accordance with the fees established by the board of supervisors. All fees received by the animal control officer shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

Sec. 10-83. Unlicensed dogs.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, or any other officer, to capture and impound any companion animal found running at large on which the license tax has not been paid. A reasonable effort will be made to find the owner. After five days, if the owner is not found, the animal shall be declared abandoned. If the owner is known, the animal will be held an additional five days. The provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6546 shall apply where applicable to the disposition of the dog. Any person, animal control officer or other officer euthanizing a dog under this chapter shall cremate, bury or sanitarily dispose of the dog. Prior to the disposition by euthanasia or otherwise, all of the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6500 et seq., shall have been complied with.
- (b) If the animal control officer or other officer exercises his option to deliver such dog to any person in his jurisdiction who will pay the required license tax and cost on such dog, the person accepting delivery of such dog shall, within five days after such delivery, furnish to the animal control officer evidence of the inoculation and licensing of such dog as required by this article; and the failure to provide such evidence shall be a violation of this article and shall constitute a separate offense.

DIVISION 6. DAMAGE BY DOGS

Sec. 10-90. Disposition of funds.

The treasurer shall keep all money collected by him for dog licenses in a separate account as part of the general fund; and such funds shall be used for the purposes designated by Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6534, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-91. Compensation for livestock and poultry killed or injured by dogs.

- (a) Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6553, any person who has any livestock or poultry killed or injured by any dog not his own in the county shall be entitled to receive as compensation the fair market value of such livestock or poultry not to exceed \$400.00 per animal or \$10.00 per fowl, provided that:
 - (1) Within 72 hours of discovery of the death or injury, the claimant gives notice of the incident to the animal control officer.

- (2) Within 60 days of the discovery of the death or injury, the claimant shall furnish such evidence of the quantity and value of the dead or injured livestock or poultry and the reasons the claimant believes that death or injury was caused by a dog to the board of supervisors.
- (3) The claimant first has exhausted his legal remedies against the owner, if known, of the dog doing the damage for which compensation under this section is sought. Exhaustion shall mean a judgment against the owner of the dog upon which execution has returned unsatisfied.
- (b) Upon a determination by the board that a claim meets the criteria set forth in this section for compensation, the board shall approve the same and forward the approval to the treasurer. Upon payment under this section, the board shall be surrogated to the extent of compensation paid to the right of action to the owner of the livestock or poultry against the owner of the dog and may enforce such compensation in an appropriate action at law.

Sec. 10-92 Seizure of dogs suspected of killing or injuring livestock or poultry.

Pursuant to the Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6552, if any person, including the animal control officer, has reason to believe that any dog is killing livestock or poultry, he shall apply to a magistrate of the county, who shall issue a warrant requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before the judge of the general district court at the time and place named therein, at which time evidence shall be heard. If it shall be determined by the court that such dog is a livestock or poultry killer, the dog shall be ordered (i) euthanized immediately by the animal control officer or other officer designated by the judge of the general district court or (ii) removed to another state which does not border on the commonwealth. Any dog ordered removed which is later found in the commonwealth shall be ordered by a court to be euthanized immediately.

DIVISION 6. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Sec. 10-100. Control of dangerous or vicious dogs; penalties.

(a) As used in this section:

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person or companion animal that is a dog or cat, or killed a companion animal that is a dog or cat. However, when a dog attacks or bites a companion animal that is a dog or cat, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i) if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the dog or cat as a result of the attack or bite, (ii) if both animals are owned by the same person, (iii) if such attack occurs on the property of the attacking or biting dog's owner or custodian, or (iv) for other good cause as determined by the court. No dog shall be found to be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking, or inflicting injury on a dog or cat while engaged with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog handling event. No dog that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person shall be found to be a dangerous dog if the court determines, based on the totality of the evidence before it, that the dog is not dangerous or a threat to the community.

- "Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior that resulted in a previous finding by a court or, on or before July 1, 2006, by an animal control officer as authorized by local ordinance, that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner has been given notice of that finding.
- (b) Any law-enforcement officer or animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the matters at issue. If a law-enforcement officer successfully makes an application for the issuance of a summons, he shall contact the local animal control officer and inform him of the location of the dog and the relevant facts pertaining to his belief that the dog is dangerous or vicious. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of this section. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance with the provisions of § 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The procedure for appeal and trial shall be the same as provided by law for misdemeanors. Trial by jury shall be as provided in Article 4 (§ 19.2-260 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 19.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The Commonwealth shall be required to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.
- (c) No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely because it is a particular breed, nor is the ownership of a particular breed of canine or canine crossbreed prohibited. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog that was engaged in the performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. No animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog. § 3.2-6540(C)
- (d) If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section. § 3.2-6540(D)
- (e) The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within 10 days of such finding, obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer or treasurer for a fee of \$50, in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer or treasurer shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag that identifies the animal as a dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subsection shall be renewed annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained. The animal control officer shall provide a copy of the

dangerous dog registration certificate and verification of compliance to the State Veterinarian. § 3.2-6540(E)

- (f) All dangerous dog registration certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current rabies vaccination, if applicable, (ii) that the animal has been neutered or spayed, and (iii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value of at least \$100,000, which covers animal bites. The owner may obtain and maintain a bond in surety, in lieu of liability insurance, to the value of at least \$100,000. § 3.2-6540(F)
- (g) While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its owner's property, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it from biting a person or another animal.
- (h) The owner of any dog found to be dangerous shall register the animal with the Commonwealth of Virginia Dangerous Dog Registry, as established under § 3.2-6542 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, within 45 days of such a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction.
 - The owner shall also cause the local animal control officer to be promptly notified of (i) the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all owners; (ii) all of the means necessary to locate the owner and the dog at any time; (iii) any complaints or incidents of attack by the dog upon any person or cat or dog; (iv) any claims made or lawsuits brought as a result of any attack; (v) tattoo or chip identification information or both; (vi) proof of insurance or surety bond; and (vii) the death of the dog.
- (i) After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, upon learning of same, cause the local animal control authority to be notified if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; or (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; or (iii) is sold, given away, or dies. Any owner of a dangerous dog who relocates to a new address shall, within 10 days of relocating, provide written notice to the appropriate local animal control authority for the old address from which the animal has moved and the new address to which the animal has been moved.
- (j) Any owner or custodian of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal is guilty of a:
 - Class 2 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person;

- 2. Class 1 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, bites a human being or attacks a human being causing bodily injury; or
- 3. Class 6 felony if any owner or custodian whose willful act or omission in the care, control, or containment of a canine, canine crossbreed, or other animal is so gross, wanton, and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life, and is the proximate cause of such dog or other animal attacking and causing serious bodily injury to any person.

The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.

- (k) The owner of any animal that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to comply with the requirements of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
- (l) All fees collected pursuant to this section, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by this section, shall be paid into a special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any training course required under § 3.2-6556 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS (REPEALED August 14, 2007)

ARTICLE V. HYBRID CANINE.

Section 10-120 Definitions.

As used in this article:

- 1. "Hybrid canine" means any animal which at any time has been or is permitted, licensed registered, or otherwise described or represented as a hybrid canine, wolf or coyote by its owner to a licensed veterinarian, law enforcement officer, animal control officer, humane investigator, official of the Department of Health, or representative of the State Veterinarian.
- 2. "Adequate confinement" means that, while on the property of its owner and not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian, a hybrid canine shall be confined in a humane manner in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to (i) prevent the animal's escape; or if the hybrid canine is determined to be a dangerous dog pursuant to § 3.2-6540, the structure shall prevent direct contact with any person or animal not authorized by the owner to be in direct contact with the hybrid canine, and (ii) provide a minimum of 100 square feet of floor space for each adult animal. Tethering of a hybrid canine not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian shall not be considered adequate confinement.
- 3. "Responsible ownership" means the ownership and humane care of a hybrid canine in such a manner as to comply with all laws and ordinances regarding hybrid canines and prevent endangerment by the animal to public health and safety.

4. "Owner" means any person who (a) has a right or property in an animal, (b) keeps or harbors an animal, (c) has an animal in his care, or (d) acts as a custodian of an animal.

Section 10-121. Hybrid canine ordinance; penalty.

- 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian to allow any hybrid canine to run at large in the country during the period of January 1 through December 31 inclusive of any year. For the purpose of this section, a hybrid canine shall be deemed to be running at large while outside of any pen or enclosure as provided in subsection 2 of this section, however, any owner or custodian of a hybrid canine may be allowed to remove a hybrid canine from any pen or enclosure for purposes of transportation to another pen or enclosure or for the purpose of obtaining medical attention. In no event shall any hybrid canine be allowed to be set free on any property within the county whether or not the hybrid canine is under its owner's or custodian's immediate control.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to own or possess a hybrid canine unless such hybrid canine is kept and maintained in a pen or enclosure as follows:
 - (a) The pen or enclosure shall contain at least 200 square feet of space per adult hybrid canine.
 - (b) Any fencing used in the construction of the pen or enclosure shall be at least eight (8) feet in height with an additional overhang of fencing or barbed wire angling a minimum of three (3) feet into the pen or enclosure. Such wire enclosure shall be of such strength as to prevent the escape of any hybrid canine enclosed therein.
 - (c) To prevent digging out along the fence, concrete footers at least one (1) foot wide and six (6) inches deep shall be installed along the perimeter of the pen or enclosure or a wire footing of 12-gauge wire buried six (6) inches in the ground with at least three feet of wire on the inside of the pen or enclosure, bending the remaining one (1) foot of wire up in a 90° angle and connect every six (6) inches to the bottom outside of the pen or enclosure.
 - (d) The pen or enclosure shall provide shelter which affords complete protection from all elements of nature.
 - (e) A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class 3 misdemeanor for the first violation and a Class 1 misdemeanor for any second or subsequent offense. Upon a conviction of a second violation of this ordinance, the owner shall surrender the hybrid canine to the animal control officer for euthanasia in accordance with § 3.2-6562 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

<u>In Re: Public Hearing – Repeal of Section 50, Article II, Fireworks</u>

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the repeal of County Code Section 50, Article II, Fireworks. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, March 30, 2012 and Friday, April 6, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mrs. Puckett stated that at the March Board meeting, discussion was held with the Board regarding the changes to the state's fireworks regulations, specifically that the state now requires at least one person at each fireworks display be certified by the State Fire Marshal's Office as a Pyrotechnician. As the County of Prince Edward does not have a Fire Marshal to inspect and permit fireworks shows, it is preferable to allow applicants to go through the State Fire Marshal's office for fireworks displays.

Mrs. Puckett said that the County Attorney recommended the County repeal Section 50, Article II, Fireworks of the *County Code*. The repeal of the County's Fireworks Ordinance does not prohibit the use of "permissible fireworks," as defined in Section 27-97 of the *Code of Virginia* as any sparklers, fountains, Pharaoh's serpents, caps for pistols, or pinwheels commonly known as whirligigs or spinning jennies. It also does not prohibit large fireworks displays, which will be regulated by the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Mr. Ennis stated the County will not intervene in enforcing the regulations set forth in the *Code of Virginia*; this does not impede the display of fireworks. The County is merely taking itself from the process.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Gantt suggested the County contract with the Town of Farmville for the services of their Fire Marshal. Mr. Ennis stated the repeal does not prohibit firework displays; it simply takes the County out of the permitting process when the County can't be certain the state regulations have been complied with or not. There is a state mechanism to make sure that there is a Pyrotechnician in charge of the fireworks display. Further discussion followed.

Chairman Fore called the Special Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m., stating the purpose of the meeting was to

hold a public hearing on the Fiscal Year 2013 County Budget and the Prince Edward County School Budget for

2012-2013.

Reverend Christopher Cunningham, Johns Memorial Episcopal Church, led the invocation.

In Re: Public Hearing – FY 13 County Budget

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Fiscal Year

2013 County Budget. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, April 6, 2012 and the

Friday, April 13, 2012 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince

Edward.

Chairman Fore stated:

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This is the date and time that has been advertised for the public hearing on the overall Prince Edward County Budget, to include the Prince Edward County Public Schools, for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2012 and ending June 30, 2013.

The Board of Supervisors has taken this opportunity to conduct a combined public hearing on the overall county budget, county tax rates, and the school budget. The Board believes this consolidated public hearing is good for the citizens, so that you, the citizens, can correlate the funding for the schools with the overall county budget and the setting of the tax rates.

The proposed budget, as advertised, includes the following highlights:

- The Board is proposing no increase in county tax rates.
- The County anticipates an increase over last year in local tax revenues of approximately \$454,000, which is mainly due to an increase in the value and number of motor vehicles in the County.
- A 3.6% cost of living increase is proposed for County employees, the same as provided to Social Security recipients in January. This is the first salary increase that county employees have received since 2007.
- Level or decreased funding is proposed in the operational budgets of most County departments,
 Constitutional Offices, and County Emergency Services Agencies.
- The proposed budget includes \$8,106,652 of local funds for the Prince Edward County Public Schools. While this is the same dollar amount as the current budget, it represents an increase of \$416,000 in available operating funds, due to a decrease in debt service and the Board of Supervisors agreeing to allow the Schools to keep the funding that was provided for a one-time employee bonus. In order to balance the FY 13 County budget, this \$416,000 increase in operating funds for the schools will have to come from the General Fund Balance in order to balance the budget.

Therefore, the budget, as advertised, is balanced. If the citizens of Prince Edward County ask the Board to increase expenditures in this proposed budget it will require additional resources, which will mean a tax increase or cuts to other existing programs and services.

Before I open the floor for citizen comments, let me say that this year's budget process has been extremely complicated due to the failure of the Virginia General Assembly to adopt a state budget in a timely fashion. I know many of you are here to talk about funding for the Prince Edward County Public Schools.

As I said earlier, the County of Prince Edward has not and is not cutting funding for our schools. In fact, the County is providing an additional \$416,000 to the schools. Any shortfall that the schools are anticipating is due to the state's, not the county's failure to adequately fund public education.

I urge each of you to contact Senator Garret and Delegate Edmunds to express your concern and, frankly, your outrage.

I will now open the floor for public comment. I will start with the names that are on the sign-in sheet. To give everyone an opportunity to speak, I ask that you limit your comments to three minutes.

If someone speaking before you has voiced your opinion, you may simply state that you agree with the previous speaker. Please come forward and state your name and the district in which you reside.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Barbara Arieti, Hampden District, expressed her support for a tax increase to support the School Budget in order to make up the funding cuts from the state.

Teri Kidd, Farmville District, and **Diane Gilliam**, Buffalo District, expressed their concern regarding the state cuts in funding and requested the Board of Supervisors take every available means to make up the difference.

Patty Pugh, Farmville District, spoke on the benefits of the Farmville-Prince Edward Library and requested additional support from the Board of Supervisors.

Martha Dorrill expressed her support of higher taxes in order to fund the Prince Edward County Schools.

Mary Reed, Lockett District, voiced her displeasure at the cuts in the School Budget and stated she is willing to pay more taxes to support the schools.

Heather Edwards, Farmville District, expressed her support for a tax increase in support of the schools to keep programs from being cut from the curriculum.

Christopher T. Cunningham, Farmville District, urged the Supervisors to look at increasing taxes to cover the \$1.8 million in eliminated Tier I cuts the Board is proposing.

Lowell T. Frye, Farmville District, requested the Board of Supervisors increase the funding to the schools and the library; he stated once the General Assembly does re-fund the schools, taxes could be rolled back.

Carolyn DeWolfe, Hampden District, stated the schools need to be funded adequately and asked the Board to do what needs to be done, even if that means increasing taxes.

Liz Magill, Farmville District, stated she supports a tax increase and the students deserve whatever it takes to keep the schools running and keep the programs going.

Samuel Trent expressed his concern for funding the road at the school complex but cutting funding to the schools.

Beulah Womack expressed her support for the Board to do whatever it takes to fund the schools.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Chairman Fore then stated:

It is important for all of the citizens of Prince Edward County to realize that this Board annually faces the difficult task of approving a budget that will meet the needs of our County and also maintain our financial stability.

We spend countless hours scrutinizing every line item in this budget and I can assure you that the Board and staff can and will account for every dollar collected and spent.

On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank all of you for coming out tonight to show your interest in the County's budget process. I assure you that your comments will be given serious consideration.

The Board will not take action on the budget tonight. The Board still has work to do on the County Budget and will consider the adoption of the School Budget and the overall County Budget at its meeting on Thursday, April 26th, which begins at 3:00 in the afternoon.

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In Re: FY 12-13 County Budget Review

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, reviewed the proposed budget adjustments and stated the proposed current draw from the General Fund Balance would be \$416,003. The recommended adjustments total \$78,997.

Mr. Bartlett stated the VRS and the associated 5.7% Pay Adjustment is the largest adjustment in this year's budget, and appears that it will be mandated by the state. He said to make it a level-issue for the employees, it would be necessary to provide a 5.7% increase to their salaries. VRS is taken pre-tax, therefore the employees would not have to pay federal and state taxes on that, but Social Security tax is taken. He briefly reviewed the other recommended adjustments: Farmville Area Bus, Special Olympics, Piedmont Soil and Water District, and Madeline's House.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones entered the meeting at this time.

Mr. Bartlett reviewed information from Lee Cox of the Piedmont Health District, stating the need for an increase in funding or the Health Department would need to reduce services or staffing.

Mr. Bartlett then briefly reviewed requests for funding from SVCC, R. R. Moton, the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library, HOPE, and Crossroads, which were not included in the proposed adjustments. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Simpson stated he wished to include \$5,597 to the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library for computers and staffing. Supervisor Wilck agreed; the Board concurred.

Chairman Fore inquired as to the impact on Cross Roads if additional funding is not granted; Mr. Bartlett stated it would affect the level of services provided and would mean fewer counselors for juveniles. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt expressed his concerns about the proposed budget, the VRS pay adjustment and the employee health insurance. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to revisit the health insurance issue.

Supervisor Wilck asked for clarification on the motion and asked Supervisor Gantt to present the information regarding the proposed insurance differences in a dollar amount. Discussion followed regarding the insurance policies and the possibility of self-insurance.

Supervisor Jones stated there are differences between the County and the Schools' benefits for their employees; in the past, the School Board elected to give raises to the School employees when the Board of Supervisors did not give raises to the County employees. He added there is a possibility of a service charge to be placed on state-owned property.

After further discussion, Chairman Fore restated Supervisor Gantt's motion to revisit the employee insurance plan; the motion failed:

Mr. Bartlett requested input regarding budget line items. He reviewed Revenues and stated there are no major changes expected.

Supervisor Wilck questioned the rate of collections; Mr. Bartlett stated it is at about the same rate as in previous years. Discussion followed on collection of taxes from those that are in arrears, and the possibility of publishing the names of delinquent taxpayers in the newspaper.

Supervisor Jones asked about the upcoming need for a renewed landfill contract. Mr. Bartlett said the County will go out for bids for a new landfill contract; if necessary, tipping fees will be adjusted. Discussion followed on the anticipated costs of the landfill, such as diesel.

Supervisor Gantt then asked about the amount that the school is short. Dr. K. David Smith, Superintendent, said it is approximately \$785,000. Dr. Smith stated the state has adjusted their funding to \$130,000 assuming that the Governor approves what is recommended, which leaves a shortfall of \$655,000. Discussion followed on the cuts that may have to be made.

Mr. Bartlett stated the Governor has not made adjustments to the state budget and has until next week to make adjustments. He said the state budget won't be final for another two to three weeks; the major points in the General Assembly are education and transportation.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones expressed her support for the schools and stated that if a tax increase is necessary,

she will support the increase. She added that the Board should revisit the budget and look at the tax rates.

Supervisor Gantt suggested the Board revisit the budget to "cut the fat" from the budget. He said he could

not support a tax increase due to the current economy.

Mr. Bartlett explained that doing so would require a new public hearing and stated the time required

between each. He said the Board could advertise the new tax rate almost immediately; the budget could be passed in

May or as late as June.

Supervisor McKay expressed his concern for the citizens that state a tax increase would put them in

jeopardy of losing their homes; he stated he is not in favor of an increase this year.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to revisit the budget to seek reductions and reconstruct the budget as need

be. After some discussion, Supervisor Gantt withdrew his motion.

Chairman Fore clarified that there is no direction to the County Administrator other than to increase the

budget by six items and decrease by one item as previously stated. The Board concurred.

Chairman Fore called the special meeting to order, stating the purpose of the meeting was for a work session on the Prince Edward County School Budget and the County Budget.

In Re: Approval of FY13 School Budget

Chairman Fore stated:

With the Board's consent, I would like to open our meeting today with a few thoughts that I think summarize this Board's effort to draft a County Budget that best serves the needs of all of our citizens. Since January, this Board has met nine times, several of which were with the School Board, to discuss the FY 13 County Budget.

The budget schedule set by the Board calls for the approval of the County budget this afternoon. While the Governor and General Assembly have yet to completely finalize the budget for the Commonwealth, it appears we have enough information to enable Prince Edward County to maintain our schedule and approve a budget. Moving ahead now, keeps us on the historic timeline of approving a school budget by May 1, which better enables the School Board to make its decisions for the coming school year.

If we find that the final state budget contains significant changes to the funding being provided to the County, or if expenses have increased because of additional unfunded mandates, the Board has time to make amendments prior to the appropriation of the funds in June.

As has been the case over the last several years, the General Assembly is continuing to decrease the funds it provides to local governments and to shift expenses from the Commonwealth to local governments. This year that was especially true in the area of education.

Each member of the Board of Supervisors has heard from many of his or her constituents. Annually, as the Board works on the County budget, we must take into account the many differing, and often conflicting needs of our citizens. With the economy still weak, many of our residents simply cannot afford to pay any more in local taxes.

From the statements made by Board members at Tuesday's Budget work session, I think it is fair to say that not a single member of this Board supports an increase in local tax rates.

Much of the public discussion, both at Board meetings and in letters to the newspaper, has focused on the funding for the Schools. I want the public to clearly understand that the funding reductions the schools are facing are ALL a result of decreases in funds provided by the state and increases in expenses mandated by the state.

The funding the Board of Supervisors is voting to provide is exactly the same for the new Fiscal Year 2013 budget as it is in Fiscal Year 2012.

I say this because I want to be crystal clear that education is the number one priority in the County budget; no other department receives even a fraction of the amount of funding we provide to the schools.

However, the Board must provide funding to serve the needs of all of our citizens, and that includes law enforcement, public safety, social services, waste management, courts and education. And the majority of our citizens can only afford to pay so much.

Based on information from the County's annual audit, since 2008 the local dollars for education have increased by approximately \$450 per pupil; while the amount provided by the state has fallen by about \$540 per pupil. In total, that represents a reduction of approximately \$1.2 million in state funding.

This data is compiled from the County's audit and will not correlate precisely to information contained on the Department of Education web site. But the pattern of funding from local and state government is valid. Increase in local funds – decrease in state funds.

Some residents have stated the Board needs to think outside the box and develop new sources of revenues. We don't disagree.

Our problem is that over the years, the General Assembly has created stronger and stronger boxes to restrict the flexibility of local governments to raise local revenues. The first impediment for local governments is that Virginia is a "Dillon Rule" state; in fact we are the only "Dillon Rule" state in the nation.

The "Dillon Rule" basically says that local governments can only exercise those powers that are expressly provided to them in the state code.

Because of the Dillon Rule, counties are not allowed to implement the various revenue and taxation ideas that our citizens have asked the Board to consider, to include:

- (1) Creating higher real estate tax rates for people who can afford it creating different real estate tax rates based on property values is expressly forbidden by the Constitution of Virginia;
- (2) Increasing the local sales tax that can only be done by the General Assembly;
- (3) A Luxury Tax that is not allowed, because the General Assembly has not given localities that authority.

Finally, there appears to be a strong misperception concerning supposed funding provided by the County for the Granite Falls Hotel and the Revenue Sharing Project for the new Route 786. The Hotel is a private endeavor that is being funded 100% by the developer. There is not one single dollar in this County budget that will be spent on the Hotel.

The Road Project is being funded by a combination of funds from VDOT and borrowed funds, which the Hotel Developer has agreed, in writing, to pay on behalf of the County. If, in the worst case scenario, the Hotel is not built the annual debt service for the road is approximately \$97,000 per year. Additionally, there are other options available to the County to recover its investment, even if the Hotel is not built. And, while the \$97,000 is a sizeable amount of money, it is way short of the amount the School Board has stated it needs.

The bottom line is neither the Hotel nor the Road make an impact on the County budget or the funds available for County schools. I will add, that when the Hotel is built and the road is complete, the County will receive hundreds of thousands of dollars in new tax revenues that the Board can use to fund needed projects and operations in the County.

Since the announcement of the road project and the apparent successful funding of the Hotel, the County has been contacted by developers who are expressing interest in locating other projects in our area. Such projects would create even more jobs and revenues for the County.

It is clearly in the best interest of our citizens and our schools, if the Board continues to expand our County tax base from which to fund education and other county responsibilities. If the tax base is not expanded, the Board will be forced to reduce everybody's funding, and/or raise taxes.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion that the FY 13 Prince Edward County School Budget be approved as follows:

<u>School Fund</u> – the total for the School Fund is \$25,666,080, of which \$8,106,652 is local revenue as a transfer from the County General Fund

<u>School Cafeteria Fund</u> – the total for the School Cafeteria Fund is \$1,087,070, of which \$0.00 is local revenue as a transfer from the County General Fund

This provides for an overall FY 13 Prince Edward County School Budget in the amount of \$26,753,150.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person must be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder:
 - 3. Person must be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - 7. Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - 10. Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OFFICE 2012 UPDATE

The goal of the Prince Edward County Office of Economic Development is to recruit new or assist existing businesses and industries to create new sustainable jobs with benefits and/or invest in real property improvements. This will enhance the quality of life for all the citizens of Prince Edward County and the surrounding community. Currently, the Economic Development Office is a staff of one but often times utilizes Longwood University interns to assist with clerical duties. Under the auspice of the County Administrator, there are a number of responsibilities assigned to the Economic Development Director. Below is a list of general duties and accomplishments by the Economic Development Office as of April 2012. Over the years, our economic development efforts have been very successful and have added greatly to the prosperity of the County.

Business recruitment and assistance to existing businesses and industries:

Business recruitment and assistance to existing businesses and industries is the primary responsibility of the Economic Development Office. The Economic Development Director is responsible for the development, fabrication and distribution of economic development marketing materials for the county (excluding tourism efforts). The Economic Development Director is also the primary point of contact for Prince Edward County regarding business sites, coordination with the Virginia Economic Development Office (VEDP) and other various State and Federal Agencies, realtors, and business site locators.

The Prince Edward Economic Development Office is currently working with <u>12</u> <u>business and industry recruitment projects</u>. They include 3 forthcoming projects totaling \$77million and 153 jobs:

•	Granite Falls Hotel & Conference Center	112 jobs	\$55,000,000
•	Luck Stone	16 jobs	\$20,000,000
•	Tharpe Trucking	25 jobs	\$ 2,000,000

There have been 6 active projects and 3 inquiry commercial/retail projects since January 2012. An active project is one in which executives from a company have visited the area. An inquiry project is one in which a firm has shown interest in the area but has not sent executives to visit. This increased interest in Prince Edward County is attributed to more favorable economic conditions and the announcement of the Route 786 construction and Granite Falls Hotel and Conference Center.

Grant writer, grant administrator and project coordinator:

Grant writing, grant administration and grant project coordination are important responsibilities of the Economic Development Office. Though very time consuming, access to grant funds for business recruitment and economic development efforts often times, makes the critical difference in the successful recruitment or expansion of an industry.

Currently there are 4 open grant projects totaling \$3,996.848:

•	Workforce Training Center: Tobacco Commission Grant (2)	\$ 1,645,848
•	Prince Edward Cannery: Tobacco Commission Grant	\$ 350,000
•	Depot Revitalization: VDOT Enhancement Grant (4)	\$ 501,000

Since 2004 (7) grant projects were closed out, totaling \$1,466,118, which attributed to the overall success of the following projects:

•	Heartland Regional Visitor Center (2)-VDOT Enhancement	\$ 375,000

Enterprise Zone Administrator:

Another duty of the Economic Development Office Director is to function as Prince Edward County's Enterprise Zone Administrator. From January 1 until April 1 each year, Enterprise Zone Grant applications to the Commonwealth of Virginia are open for submittal. The Zone Administrator is responsible for the preparation of all marketing materials, notification annually of the Zone benefits to over 600 property owners within the Prince Edward County Zone, review of all local zone applications and coordination of application submittals, responsible for the preparation of the County's annual report to the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development and prepares Enterprise Zone Amendments whenever needed. From 2004 through 2010, there have been 42 Enterprise Zone grant applications submitted by businesses from Prince Edward County's Zone totaling over \$3,032,000 in grant awards.

Industrial Development Authority Secretary:

The Director of Economic Development also functions as the Secretary to Prince Edward's (7) member Industrial Development Authority (IDA) and as such is responsible for all clerical responsibilities, managing all the IDA funds, and oversees all outstanding IDA loans and financing instruments. The importance of an active pro-business IDA is critically important in the recruitment of businesses and industries bringing investment and jobs to Prince Edward County. Since 2005, there have been 6 loan instruments executed by the IDA, totaling over \$14,284,000. Currently there are 6 loans remaining with balances of over \$9,671,394:

Issue:

Planning & Community Development Report

Summary:

I. A Public Hearing has been advertised for the May 15, 2012 meeting of the Prince Edward Planning Commission related to the following Special Use Permit Application received by the Department of Planning & Community Development on April 24:

Request by Greater Purpose, LLC for a Special Use Permit for an Office Use in accordance with A-1 Zoning requirements to erect a building for General Office purposes (Helton House) measuring two (2) stories in height on a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel 41-19-5, located near 24478 Prince Edward Highway in Rice.

A complete copy of the Special Use Permit application is available for public review in the Department of Planning & Community Development.

II. The Planning Commission is concerned about the timeline experienced by applicants for permits such as a Rezoning or a Special Use Request, who require a Public Hearing before the Planning Commission and a Public Hearing before the Board of Supervisors. In some cases, applicants have to wait seven weeks between the two Public Hearings. In an effort to expedite the timeline, while also being mindful of the requisite public advertisement and public input requirements, the Planning Commission respectfully recommends that the Board of Supervisors consider a process which would allow the Board of Supervisors' Public Hearing to be legally advertised and scheduled for the first regularly scheduled Board of Supervisors meeting following the Planning Commission Public Hearing and preparation of a recommendation by the Planning Commission.

An example follows of how this process would look:

- 1. A proposed new business owner files a Rezoning application with the County.
- 2. The Planning Commission reviews the application and authorizes advertising a Public Hearing on the rezoning.
- 3. At this point, the public hearing is advertised and adjoining landowners to the project are notified by certified mail. The Board of Supervisors will also be notified that a Planning Commission Public Hearing has been scheduled and summary information would be provided to the Board at its meeting one week preceding the Planning Commission Public Hearing. The complete application packet would be available for review in the Planning Department office.
- 4. This notification to the Board would normally occur one week prior to the Planning Commission Public Hearing. Unless the Board notes an objection, a Board of Supervisors Public Hearing will automatically be advertised following the Planning

Committee Report: Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Committee

Summary:

Over the past several weeks, the Enterprise Zone Boundary Adjustment Committee has been reviewing properties to recommend for addition to or deletion from the County's exiting Enterprise Zone. The Committee has prepared a presentation for the Board and requests that the Board authorize a Public Hearing on the Enterprise Zone Boundary Amendment for its June 12, 2012 meeting.

Attachment (1) is a spreadsheet listing the various properties considered for inclusion in the Enterprise Zone in the Farmville/Route 15 Corridor, the Rice Area, and the Green Bay/Meherrin/360 Corridor. This spreadsheet displays the tax map number, number of acres, property address, owners name and comments.

Attachment (2) contains the tax maps for the various areas, color coded to visually display the existing zone (in green), the parcels where the owners have requested their land be added and are being recommended for addition (in yellow) and the land recommended to be removed from the zone (in pink). A total of 418.835 acres is recommended for addition to the zone, and 274.93 acres is recommended to be removed from the zone, for a net increase in acreage of 143.905, which will leave 1,298 acres available for future expansion of the zone.

If authorized, the appropriate Public Hearing Notices will be advertised in *The Farmville Herald* and a notification letter will be sent to every property owner whose property is being considered for inclusion or deletion within the County's Enterprise Zone.





Treasurer's Report

February Financial Statements: The Chairman stated the March Financial Statement was enclosed in the Council packet for review. Ms. Stish moved to accept the Financial Statement as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Report on Chief Administrative Officers Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated a copy of the Chief Administrative Officers meeting agenda was provided in the Council packet for information. Ms. Hickman stated the guest speakers for the March meeting were Ms. Amanda Healy with AmeriCorps and Ms. Patrice Dempsey with AmeriCorps VISTA.

Old Business

President & Staff Reports:

Status Report – CRC Charter Amendments-Attorney General Opinion: The Chairman stated, Ms. Hickman had drafted a letter on his behalf for Mr. James Ennis, Prince Edward County Commonwealth's Attorney to request an Attorney General's Opinion for the CRC's Proposed Charter Amendment. The Chairman stated Mr. Ennis has sent the letter to the Attorney General but has not received any news as of this date. The Chairman stated he would keep the Council informed as information becomes available.

April/May Presentations of CRC FY10-11 Annual Report: Ms. Hickman stated the staff will attend Town Council meetings in Keysville, Victoria and Blackstone in April of 2012. The last presentation by staff will occur at the Dillwyn Town Council meeting in May of 2012.

Status –CRC FY 12-13 Budget Request: Ms. Hickman stated FY 12-13 Budget Requests have been sent to all current CRC member entities as well as Nottoway County, the Town of Farmville, Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney. A Budget Requests will be sent to the Town of Blackstone following the Annual Report Presentation to their Council in April. Ms. Hickman stated she did receive a letter from the President of Longwood University, Pattrick Finnegan. President Finnegan stated while Longwood University will not be able to renew its CRC membership it would like to continue to find opportunities for the University and the CRC to work together for the community.

Report on 2013 Virginia Outdoors Plan Public Kick-Off Meeting: Ms. Terry stated the CRC hosted the Public Input Meeting for the Virginia Outdoors Plan for the Virginia Department of

Conservation and Recreation for the Planning District 14 area. Two meetings were held on March 13, 2012, one at 3:00 p.m. and the other at 7:00 p.m. in the Mill Room which is located in the basement of the building housing the CRC offices. Ms. Terry stated while there were not a lot of attendees, those in attendance offered good responses. Later this summer, DCR will completing a draft of the Virginia Outdoor Plan that takes into consideration comments received. The public will have another opportunity to comment on the Plan at that time.

Update on CRC Rural Transportation Planning Program: Ms. Foster reported the CRC's Transportation Committee met on March 23, 2012. Ms. Foster stated the Committee reviewed the Updated GIS CRC Future Land Use Map. Ms. Foster stated this was completed after compiling data from the localities Comprehensive Plans. Ms. Foster stated the original Future Land Use Map of the region was completed in 2007 at the beginning of the Rural Long Range Transportation Plan process. Ms. Foster stated this process was somewhat difficult in that localities have different definitions of land uses and all of this had to be taken into consideration in putting together the regional map. Ms. Foster stated the Committee was also updated on the CRC's Public Transit Connectivity Study. Ms. Foster stated staff met with Public Transit Providers on April 3, 2012 to review routes and discuss connectivity of routes throughout the region. Ms. Foster stated during the Rural Long Range Plan process, it was noted that while the region had several Public Transit Providers some of the routes did not connect to provide service throughout the region. The staff will be updating the regional map of public service routes. Ms. Foster also noted that the Virginia Department of Rail does not have a GIS Map database of all of the Public Transit Routes in the State and therefore this information will be shared with state agencies as well as the localities.

Ms. Stish stated that Buckingham County was interested in pursuing an expansion of routes with JAUNT to extend their service in Buckingham to Farmville. Ms. Foster stated that in reviewing the data collected, Buckingham should also consider that while JAUNT does not offer a service to Farmville, it does offer service to Dillwyn where PAT offers service that picks up and continues to Farmville. Therefore, a rider could start out on JAUNT then transfer to PAT to go all the way to Farmville. Ms. Foster stated this is one good example of how useful this information will be to localities because most of the time citizens/officials are looking at maps provided by the Public Transit that only shows their route information and does not show how their routes interact with other Public Transit providers.

2012 CDBG Application Submissions: Mr. Gilliam stated the CRC assisted the Town of Farmville (sponsor for the Moton Museum CDBG) and the Moton Museum in requesting Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the amount of \$700,000 from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) for a Community Improvement Project. The project will involve transforming five classrooms into galleries for exhibits to form the Permanent Exhibit.

Mr. Fortune stated the CRC assisted the Town of Victoria in applying for CDBG funds for a Housing Rehabilitation project. The project includes Virginia and Lunenburg Avenues and proposes to rehabilitate 17 houses, run new water mains for two new fire hydrants as well as storm water drain improvements. The Town is requesting approximately \$500,000 in grant funds.

Both of these grants were submitted on March 28, 2012.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

Center for Rural Virginia Presentation (Jeff Edwards): Mr. Edward canceled the Presentation at the last minute due to an unforeseen pressing matter. Mr. Edwards will reschedule his presentation.

Victoria Request for Grant Writing Assistance for Recreational Trail Grant Application: Mr. Fortune stated the Town of Victoria has requested grant writing assistance from the CRC to apply for a Recreational Trail Grant from the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation. The Town has received funding previously for the Trail that runs through the Victoria Railroad Park. However, the Town did apply for funding from DCR last year and was unsuccessful. This funding request would be utilized to expand the Trail towards the Lunenburg County Airport. Currently Roanoke River Rails to Trails, Inc. is acquiring property near the Airport in hopes to link the two trails together and also to convert a private home into a Visitor Center.

Mr. Wingold moved and Ms. Stish seconded the motion to approve the Victoria request for grant writing assistance. Motion carried.

CRC/DMME EECBG Post Award Management/Administration Performance Contract Agreement: Ms. Hickman stated Prince Edward County previously received Energy Efficiency Community Block Grant Funds through the Virginia Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy (DMME) to undertake energy efficiency improvements at the STEPS, Centre in Farmville, Virginia. The CRC assisted the County in grant writing and grant administration. The CRC also was contracted by DMME to assist them in the overall administration of the DMME project, as well as contracting with Prince Edward to assist the County in the grant management of the grant.

Ms. Hickman stated the project was completed ahead of schedule. During this time the STEPS, Centre facility began experiencing leaks in the roof. Therefore, the CRC on behalf of the County/STEPS contacted DMME and requested if any funds were still available would they entertain the idea of the project receiving additional funds to address the leaking roof. The County/STEPS received notification that they will receive an additional \$350,000 in EECBG funds to undertake the Energy Efficiency Roofing Retrofit project on the STEPS building. Ms. Hickman stated the notification of this award as well as a request from Prince Edward County to amend its contract with the CRC is enclosed in the Council packet. The CRC will also provide additional grant management to DMME for the amended project. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC will receive an additional \$6,000 from Prince Edward for grant management services and \$14,000 from DMME for additional grant administrative services. Ms. Hickman stated the project is scheduled to be completed by June 30, 2012.

Ms. Stish moved that the Acting President/CEO be authorized to execute amended agreements with Prince Edward County and DMME to continue to provide grant administration/management services for the EECBG project at the STEPS Centre. Motion carried.

<u>Other Business:</u> Ms. Hickman passed out a copy of available 2012 gubernatorial board/commission appointment openings that will become open in June of 2012. Mr. Walker stated there is an application process on the Governor's website for those interested in being appointed by the Governor to a board or commission. Ms. Hickman stated Mr. Edwards, the guest speaker who was not able to attend the meeting, had provided this copy to encourage more rural representation on boards/commissions.

The Chairman reported the Budget Committee met prior to the CRC Council meeting. The Chairman stated the Acting President/CEO presented a draft budget for FY 2012-2013 with a comparison of figures from FY 2011-2012. The Chairman stated the Budget Committee will be meeting again next month 11:00 a.m. prior the May 3, 2012 CRC meeting to continue to review the draft budget.

Ms. Stish requested if the Council packets could be provided in a digital format and emailed to council members to save on postage and printing. Ms. Foster stated while it could be possible, many of the attachments would have to be scanned in because they are received as a paper copy. Ms. Stish stated it was just a suggestion if it was not too much trouble.

The following are brief updates on local Virginia Cooperative Extension programs for the first quarter of 2012:

Staffing Update:

Virginia Cooperative Extension administration approved a full-time Unit Administrative Assistant position
for the Prince Edward unit. This is a fully state-funded position. The opening was advertised on the VT
website and on the state employment website. Twenty-eight applications were received. Interviews were
held on March 27 and the position was offered to Shelda Daniels, who has worked in the Unit Support
Staff wage position since April 2011.

Polycom System:

Virginia Tech approved the placement of a Polycom system in the conference room at the Prince Edward
County Ag and Natural Resources building. This \$17,000 teleconferencing system will allow for speakers
to present interactive educational programs to groups in real time from any location. Plans are being
made for the system's installation.

4-H Program Update Jennifer Bowen, Extension Agent, 4-H:

- All fourth graders at PECES participated in the 4-H presentations program in order to meet Oral Language SOLs 4.1 and 4.2.
- All sixth and seventh grade students at PECMS participated in the 4-H science fair. A total of 345
 projects were judged over a 4 day period by a team of 13 judges. Each participant received a ribbon with
 "best-overall" projects invited to participate in Central District Contests.

- I chaired Central District Contests. This event included winners from local presentations, public speaking, science fair and photography contests. There were 134 entries from 13 counties. Sixteen youth from Prince Edward participated.
- Three after-school programs were completed Fun with Foods, Cooking with Cloverbuds, and CSI: Farmville. The Junior Master Gardener after-school program is ongoing.
- CSI: Farmville was also offered to Prince Edward County Middle School students as an after-school program through the 21st Century grant.
- Three Prince Edward 4-H members registered to show in the Piedmont Area Junior Livestock Show: Andrew Clark, Oralia DeLaCruz, and Wade Jenkins. They will all compete in the beef show.
- I presented the second set of a three set series of money management lessons to youth enrolled in Fuqua School's Math-in-Action program. They have asked for an expanded program for 7th and 8th graders next year.
- I completed a facilitation skills training offered by Martha Walker, Community Viability Specialist.
- An orientation meeting was held for teens from Prince Edward and Buckingham interested in attending Junior 4-H Camp as Teen Leaders and Counselors in Training. Over 50 teens were in attendance.
- Registration for Junior 4-H Camp opened in early March. Prince Edward was allotted approximately 35 additional beds for 2012. Currently all the spaces for boys are filled and there are few remaining spaces for girls. There are currently 87 campers registered. There are 35 teen leaders registered.
- Registration opened for Cloverbud Camp. This is an overnight weekend camping program for youth ages
 5 8 from the Holiday Lake service area. There are currently 12 youth and 3 adults from Prince Edward registered for this program.
- I presented a canning workshop to 9 participants during the Women's Retreat at Holiday Lake 4-H
 Center.
- I am serving on the planning committee for Farm Safety Day and for the PECPS Wellness Night programs scheduled for the fall.
- The Riding Star 4-H Horse and Pony Club received approval to host the Central District Qualifying Horse Show at GLC farm on May 19. This will draw participants from around the District who need to qualify in order to participate in the State 4-H Horse Show.
- The Prince Edward 4-H Shooting Education Club continues monthly practices at Holiday Lake 4-H Educational Center.
- I received a state programming award for "Best New Initiative" for Camp Loud and Clear, the overnight camping program for deaf and hard-of-hearing children held at Holiday Lake. Registration is now open for this camp as well.

FCS\ANR Program Update Eric Bowen, Extension Agent, FCS/ANR:

January 19th: Buy Fresh Buy Local Meeting

The meeting was held at the Southside Virginia Community College Workforce Development Center in Keysville. The meeting was held to determine producer and consumer interest in a Buy Fresh Buy Local Chapter. One hundred and twenty people attended representing Buckingham, Cumberland, Amelia, Nottoway, Lunenburg, Charlotte, Appomattox, Prince Edward, Brunswick, Mecklenburg, Halifax and Campbell Counties. Attendees learned what a Buy Fresh Buy Local chapter is and how it can help with marketing and gaining new markets. Overall, attendees were very supportive of the concept and 26% (32 individuals) signed up to be part of working groups to help develop the chapter. The Heartland Buy Fresh, Buy Local chapter is being sponsored and organized through the Old Dominion Resource Conservation & Development Council. The application and fee of

\$2,500 has been submitted to Food Routes for approval to begin chapter organization and graphics development for the local chapter.

January 31st: Wholesale Produce Auction Meeting

I assisted Bob Jones, Charlotte County Extension Agent, in organizing a meeting to determine producer interest in establishing a wholesale produce auction for Southside Virginia. Producer interest was favorable and the wholesale produce auction committee in Charlotte County is pursuing development. Bob Jones and I are also organizing vegetable production meetings for producers to build relationships with producers and to address expressed educational needs for successful produce production and marketing.

February 2nd – 23rd: Vegetable Gardening Series

Cumberland and Prince Edward Extension offices partnered together to offer a four week class series. Thirty-five participants learned the gardening basics including soil fertility, organic gardening, companion planting, garden design, plant selection, food preservation, insect and disease control\identification.

Local Food Initiative:

I have met with Alecia Daves-Johnson and Hal Smith to develop a local food assessment and plan of action for the area including Prince Edward, Buckingham, Cumberland, Amelia, Nottoway, Lunenburg, Charlotte, and Appomattox. The group met on December 15th, February 7th and March 6th to develop an outline for the local food initiative. Currently, I am working on the assessment portion of the document and Alecia is working on the goals outline portion.

I participated in the March 7th applesauce pilot batch test at the cannery for recipe development and approval submission.

Area Extension Agents, Alecia Daves Johnson, Hal Smith, Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services representatives, and others met with Smithson Mills, the firm conducting the Prince Edward County Food Enterpise Center feasibility study, on February 29th to allow for understanding of the study and to assist Smithson Mills by organizing a producer focus group meeting for April 6th between Smithson Mills and up to a maximum of fifteen producers.

Buy Fresh, Buy Local Initiative:

The Buy Fresh, Buy Local chapter application has been sent to Food Routes for review and chapter approval. Food Routes has approved our application for creating a Buy Fresh, Buy Local chapter serving Prince Edward, Buckingham, Cumberland, Amelia, Nottoway, Lunenburg, Charlotte, Appomattox, Brunswick, Mecklenburg, and Halifax counties. Old Dominion RC&D paid the \$1,500 application fee; VDACS supported the initiative with \$500 of support. Additional funding to support the BFBL chapter is being sought from local agriculture sponsors. I have meetings scheduled with the Nottoway and Cumberland Farm Bureau's to answer board member's questions relating to the BFBL initiative.

Heart of Virginia Master Gardener's:

A new class began January 4th with sixteen new trainees. This class will graduate May 17th and begin their service projects. Upcoming projects include the plant sale fundraiser, "Ask a Master Gardener" information booth at the Farmville Farmer's Market, garden insects class, and others.

Central Virginia Commodity Storage Grant:

There have been four new applicants. Two of these applicants have been approved and completed construction of hay storage sheds. Two applicants are pending approval for hay storage sheds.

Central Virginia Livestock Improvement Program:

This is the new grant from the Tobacco Commission targeting livestock producers in fourteen counties. The program will concentrate on livestock management, pasture utilization\management and hay feeding efficiency. Producer sign-up for the program will begin May 7th at 8 a.m.

Office and field visits:

I have been assisting residents with questions concerning lawn care, soil testing, fertilization, pasture weeds, pasture management, pond weeds, plant diseases, and insect identification. I have assisted several individuals interested in utilizing the cannery for commercial canning of their products.

Professional Development Activities:

I attended the 2012 Local Foods Conference in Richmond on February 27th.

I participated in a pilot training with agents in Georgia, South Carolina and Virginia for "Enhancing the safety of locally grown produce on the farm training." This is a pilot program for new curriculum that was developed as part of a USDA funded program. This program will be offered locally as part of the training and as a pilot test course.

I participated in a pilot training with agents in Georgia, South Carolina and Virginia for "Enhancing the safety of locally grown produce at the Farmer's Market training." This is a pilot program for new curriculum that was developed as part of a USDA funded program. This program will be offered locally as part of the training and as a pilot test course.

I was invited to be part of a Local Foods panel at the Virginia Cooperative Extension In-Service at Virginia Tech. The agents serving on the panel shared their programming experiences regarding Local Foods programming. This is the first step in assessing agents needs for creating a method of sharing Local Foods programming information across VCE.

I received a District programming award for Interdisciplinary Programming Award for a food safety program for hunters, From Field to Fixins, held in Amelia in 2011. The program addressed food safety relating to field dressing wildlife and safe handling of meat and preservation options.

I will be serving on the state food safety program team to help develop and guide Extension efforts in development and delivery of food safety programs and materials.
