- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official

record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for

follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate

response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board

agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the

opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public

information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any

factual error that might occur.

1 **10** Jane Schirmer, Executive Director, Southside Family YMCA, reported on the YMCA Summer Program. She thanked the Board for its partnership and said there were 116 children participated in the program this summer; compared to 33 last summer. She stated the YMCA could not have done the program without the support from the County, the schools, Longwood and the library.

Mary Beth Echeverria, Lockett District, expressed her concern regarding the noise ordinance and her right to quiet enjoyment of her property which is being infringed upon due to a neighbor's dog barking excessively. She asked for the assistance of the Board.

Roy Echeverria, Lockett District, also expressed his concern on the same topic.

Michele Schumacher, Lockett District, voiced her concern regarding the Granite Falls [Hotel and Conference Center] project and that the Board has taken a "moral obligation to replenish the Bond Reserve Fund." She questioned the time limit placed on the land reverting to the County if the deal does not go through and the dissolution of the Granite Falls CDA if the real estate has not be acquired by the purchaser or its designee within two years after the adoption of the ordinance. She also questioned the price received for the property, adding that the Board has the fiduciary duty to obtain the best price for the land. She stated the property should be marketed to more viable developers for development.

In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated she is impressed with the operation of the YMCA Summer Program. She also thanked Ms. Schumacher for her comments.

Supervisor Jones stated a citizen suggested a bus stop be set up on the new road to pick up the students to take them into the school campus for drop-off at the school, to alleviate more of the traffic from parents driving into the campus.

In Re: Prince Edward County Extension Leadership Council

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, stated Jennifer Bowen, Prince Edward

County Extension Office, requested the Board of Supervisors appoint a member of the Board to the Prince

Edward County Extension Leadership Council (ELC). The Council meets quarterly.

Supervisor Jones agreed to serve as the Board representative on the Prince Edward County

In Re: Transportation Enhancement Grant: Prospect Depot

Mrs. Sharon Lee Carney, Director, Economic Development, stated that in January 2011, the Board

of Supervisors appropriated \$22,000 in addition to a previous \$45,000 appropriation to fulfill the

architectural contract with CJMW for the development of building construction plans for the Prospect

Depot. Finally in June 2012, the draft plans were sent to various agencies for review. This review phase

involves expenses related to printing of plans, agency review fees and plan changes by the architect which

have not been expensed before. It has been verified with VDOT that all of these expenses are eligible for

reimbursement to the County. Mrs. Carney requested the Board of Supervisors appropriate \$40,000 to

cover the costs mentioned.

Mrs. Carney then stated VDOT recently accepted the value of the Depot building site at \$44,958

towards the 20% match requirement to the Enhancement Grant funds. This releases approximately

\$224,000 of Enhancement Grant Funds for the Depot Project. To date, \$64,891 in grant funds have been

spent. The Prospect Historical Society and DCR have provided \$60,998 toward their match requirement.

Total Enhancement Grant Funds awarded to the project are \$501,000 and the total match requirement is

18 **27** \$125,250. Actual construction of the facility is not expected to begin until the entire required matching funds are approved by VDOT.

Chairman Fore stated Prince Edward County is currently functioning as fiscal agent for the funds and will request periodic reimbursement from VDOT, will review all expenditures, and oversee construction. Mrs. Carney added that to date, the County has been fully reimbursed by VDOT for all completed work.

In Re: Cannery – Request for Proposals

Mr. Bartlett stated that at its June 12, 2012 meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved the advertisement of a RFP for bids for contracting the commercial operations of the Cannery. The goal was to bring a greater entrepreneurial focus to the development of the commercial component of the Cannery and allow the Cannery to reach its full potential as a food business generator.

One proposal was received, which was from Virginia Food Works, Inc. The proposal fulfills the County's stated desire of promoting agri-business in Prince Edward County. Virginia Food Works proposes to:

- Provide local producers with access to value-added foods market
- Assist in the development of food businesses
- Assist growers to maximize the potential of their land

- Create an entrepreneurial hub which will stimulate further development of businesses in our region: processors, growers, distributors, consumers (including restaurants)
- Provide a means to supply local foods to institutions and food bank operations
- Assist local growers and food business entrepreneurs comply with regulatory processes that are cumbersome and can be perceived as an obstacle
- Provide a Co-packing service to area growers

Strengths of Virginia Food Works:

- Partnerships with VDACS, VA Farm Bureau, VA Food System Council, VSU College of Agriculture and VT Department of Food Science & Technology, VA Cooperative Extension.
- Has included Cannery in a Feasibility Study sponsored by Virginia Department of Agriculture.
- Familiar with Prince Edward Cannery; has researched equipment needs, and processed over 6,500 jars at the facility
- Organized as a 501(c)3 non-profit entity with a mission to assist agricultural producers to
 maximize the potential of their land by fostering agribusiness development and offering easier
 entry in the food business market by assuming responsibility for many regulatory standards that
 are often prohibitive to industrial producers; to help social service organizations maintain adequate
 supplies of healthy food; and provide residents, schools, restaurants and institutions with access to
 safely-processed, state-inspected local foods.

Mr. Bartlett said that Virginia Food Works proposes to provide all management of commercial cannery operations and assist in the development of local food based businesses at a cost of \$35,000 for a one year contract to commence on a date to be determined by negotiation with the vendor with the option to renew for two one year periods.

This cost can be accommodated in the existing budget. Approximately \$13,100 in personnel cost currently budgeted for the Cannery will be saved by shifting management of the commercial cannery operation from in-house to a contracted service. Additionally, \$19,600 can be moved from the General Properties budget due to the resignation of a part-time employee whose duties will be absorbed by existing staff. These savings total \$32,700; the final \$2,300 can be funded from savings associated with the Director of Planning.

Ms. Allie Hill, Virginia Food Works, gave a brief presentation and stated 90% of all food in Virginia is imported or grown elsewhere, even though a tremendous amount is grown here, Virginia doesn't have a single freezing or canning facility for commercial production of Virginia produce.

Supervisor Simpson asked if this would affect existing staff; Mr. Bartlett said it will not.

Supervisor Jones asked for clarification that home canners will not be affected. Discussion followed on the existing and proposed schedule.

Supervisor Jones made a motion to award a contract for management of commercial operations of the Prince Edward Cannery to Virginia Food Works, and to authorize the Chairman and/or the County Administrator to develop and execute all necessary contract documents on behalf of the County.

Supervisor Gantt questioned the status of the insurance and Workers Compensation carried by the non-profit organization. Discussion followed on the inclusion of minimum limits, Products and Completed Operations Waiver and Workers Compensation added into the contract. Ms. Hill stated the insurance policies are based on the grocery stores and the schools; there is a \$2 million policy in place.

Chairman Fore restated Supervisor Jones' motion to award a contract for management of commercial operations of the Prince Edward Cannery to Virginia Food Works, and to authorize the Chairman and/or the County Administrator to develop and execute all necessary contract documents on behalf of the County; the motion carried:

In Re: Emergency Management Report

Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, stated that following the July Board meeting and the interest expressed by members of the Board of Supervisors for the County to pursue grant funding for emergency generators, County staff learned of a grant opportunity which would help fund a generator for the County's primary emergency operations center (EOC). The Supplemental Emergency Management Performance Grant (SLEMPG) will provide up to \$50,000 in grant funding and has a 50/50 matching formula. Given that the grant deadline was July 20, 2012, the County Administrator authorized staff to pursue the funding, with the proviso that the Board of Supervisors would have to approve the matching funds, if the grant was awarded. The proposed grant request is for funding for a 150kW portable generator. The total cost of the generator project is \$105,450. The grant will fund up to \$50,000 and the county match

would be \$55,450. While more expensive than a fixed generator, the benefit of the proposed portable generator is that it can be moved to the location where it is most needed, in the event of an emergency.

Mrs. Puckett then stated that County staff is proposing the creation of a Prince Edward County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC). In 1986, in the wake of the Bhopal, India disaster, Congress passed a law called the *Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act*, requiring every locality in the nation to form and maintain an LEPC. This group supports emergency planning for chemical hazards and provides the public with information about possible chemical hazards. It also serves in an advisory capacity for County emergency management planning. Historically, the County has participated in the Town's LEPC; however, the membership of the Town's LEPC does not cover all of the County's constituencies (e.g. the rural volunteer fire departments and EMS companies). Mrs. Puckett stated the Town has determined it will retain its current LEPC and is not interested in forming a joint LEPC. Therefore, the County will wish to form a County LEPC; the Board may wish to advertise for atlarge citizen representation.

Discussion followed regarding the proposed LEPC and its oversight and advisory capacity.

In Re: Special Use Permit - Simpson

Mr. Bartlett stated the Prince Edward County Planning Commission will hold a Public Hearing on

Tuesday, August 21, 2012 to gather citizen input prior to considering an application by David Simpson for

a Special Use Permit for Commercial Kennel Use in accordance with the A-1 Agricultural Conservation

Zoning District requirements. The purpose of the request is to construct a commercial kennel on a parcel

identified as Tax Map Parcel 10-A-6 and located at 1371 Simpson Road in Prospect.

The Commercial Kennel Use would be co-located with a barn (36' x 84') constructed for horse

stables. Horse stables are permitted by-right in the Agricultural Conservation (A-1) District; however,

In Re: Subdivision Administrator

Mr. Bartlett stated Section 2-1 of the County's Subdivision Ordinance delegates the enforcement

In Re: Local Aid to State Government

Mr. Bartlett stated the General Assembly has again reduced state aid to local governments and

mandated the local governments to decide how best to absorb this reduction. In Fiscal Year 2013, the total

state reduction is \$50 million with Prince Edward County's portion calculated to be \$155,139. The Board

appropriated \$178,000 in the FY13 budget for this expense.

24 **33** Each locality must select a reduction strategy and notify the Department of Planning and Budget (DPB) of that strategy. Localities may (1) Designate the reductions be withheld from payments for various programs provided by DPB; (2) Make reimbursement payment directly to the Commonwealth or (3) Combination of reductions and reimbursement.

Since 2009, Prince Edward County has elected to reimburse the state for its share of the reduction. The original budget language in 2009 which initiated this process clearly stated that once a locality elected a reduction of funding in any affected program, that reduction would be considered permanent. To ensure there is no perception by the Commonwealth that Prince Edward County authorizes any funding reductions, Mr. Bartlett recommended the Board once again make direct reimbursement to the Commonwealth and not designate any reductions.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

<u>Timber Thinning at Landfill</u> – Mr. Bartlett advised the Board that a representative of the Virginia Department of Forestry contacted the County stating it may be time for the County to consider thinning the stand of pines on the property adjoining the landfill. The County owns approximately 580 acres at the landfill, a portion of which is used for landfill operations. A meeting will be scheduled with the Department of Forestry; recommendations will be brought to the Board.

<u>Duck Hunting Permits at Sandy River Reservoir</u> – Mr. Bartlett stated that about ten years ago, the Board of Supervisors began allowing duck hunting at the Sandy River Reservoir. At that time, the Board

enacted a county duck hunting permit as a control measure to limit the number of permits that were issued annually; the permit is issued free of charge.

County staff contacted the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF) to determine if they have any objections to the elimination of the duck hunting permit. County staff received no feedback from the Wildlife Division or the Law Enforcement Division; DGIF has no objections to the elimination of the permit. Briery Creek Lake Wildlife Management Area, which is owned by DGIF, allows duck hunting and does not require a permit.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to approve the elimination of the county permit for duck hunting at the Sandy River Reservoir as hunters are still required to purchase a state hunting license, state migratory waterfowl conservation stamp and federal duck stamp; the motion carried:

In Re: Personnel Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett reported that the Personnel Committee, comprised of Supervisor Simpson (Chair), Supervisor Campbell and Supervisor Wilck, met on July 19, 2012; also present was the Commonwealth's Attorney and himself.

The Committee reviewed a request by the Commonwealth Attorney to be permitted to hire a new attorney for the open position as a Grade 21 Step 1 (\$52,583 with a total cost including benefits of \$70,517). The FY13 budget contains \$50,413 for the incumbent with a total cost of \$67,887. The request represents an increase in total cost to the County of \$2,630 which will be offset by vacancy savings. The Committee voted 3-0 to approve the request.

Mr. Bartlett then stated the Committee reviewed a request to temporarily increase the salary of the Planner from \$48,189 to \$53,037. The total increase to the County including benefits would be \$6,193 for a full year. The incumbent has assumed many of the duties of the Director of Planning & Community Development during his absence. The increase will be rescinded once the Director returns to employment.

Mr. Bartlett stated he also requested approval of a one-time payment of \$4,271 which is 20% of the difference in the salary of the two positions for the time already served fulfilling the additional duties. The additional costs will be more than offset by the placement of the Director of Planning & Community Development in a Leave Without Pay status which will reduce County expenses by approximately \$7,500 per month. The Committee voted 3-0 to approve the request.

In Re: Drought Watch Update

Mr. Bartlett stated that earlier in the day, staff received word from the State that the Drought Watch has been elevated to a Drought Warning for the Appomattox River Basin in south-central Virginia. He stated no additional action must be taken; all water conservation measures are voluntary unless localities issue mandatory restrictions if appropriate.

Mr. Bartlett reported that the flow of the Appomattox River at Farmville was at 19 cubic feet per second; the monitoring well in Buckingham has fallen almost half a foot since July 31st; the Sandy River Reservoir fell more than eight inches; and precipitation for the area was more than 10 inches below normal for the year. He added the County staff will continue to monitor the drought indicators.

PPTRA RESOLUTION FOR 2012

County of Prince Edward, Virginia

In accordance with the requirements set forth in <u>VA. CODE ANN.</u> §58.1-3524 C.2. and §58.1-3912 E., as amended by Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly (2004 Special Session I) and as set forth in *Item 503.E.* (Personal Property Tax Relief Program) of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly, any qualifying vehicle sitused within the County of Prince Edward, Virginia commencing January 1, 2012, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:

- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,000 or less will be eligible for 40% tax relief; and
- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,001 or more shall receive only
 40% tax relief on the first \$20,000 in assessed value; and
- All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying" (such as business use vehicles, motor homes, etc.) will not be eligible for any form of tax relief under this program; and
- In accordance with *Item 503.D.1. of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly*, the entitlement to personal property tax relief for qualifying vehicles for tax year 2005 and all prior tax years shall expire on September 1, 2006. Supplemental assessments for tax years 2005 and prior years that are made on or after September 1, 2006 shall be deemed "non-qualifying" for purposes of state tax relief and the local share due from the taxpayer shall represent 100% of the tax assessable.

Treasurer Resignation

Summary:

The Treasurer for Prince Edward County has submitted the attached retirement letter with an effective date of retirement of December 31, 2012. The following information is meant to inform the Board of the process to be followed to fill a vacancy in a Constitutional Office and is in no way meant to suggest or imply any course of action.

Per Section 24.2-228.1 of the *Code of Virginia*, upon notification of an officer's resignation as of a stated date, the governing body of the County may immediately petition the circuit court to issue a writ of election and the court may immediately issue the writ to call the election.

Per Section 24.2-682 of the *Code of Virginia*, at least 81 days must pass between the issuance of the writ of election and the date of the special election. All special elections must be held on a Tuesday. Assuming a writ of election is issued no later than September 19, 2012 a special election could be held on December 11, 2012, which is the second Tuesday in December.

Having the election prior to December 31, 2012 would allow the winner of the election to fill the office on January 1, 2013. If the election is not held until after December 31, 2012 the Court will have to appoint an interim Treasurer in accordance with Section 24.2-227 of the *Code of Virginia*. Such an appointment is determined by a majority of the judges in the Circuit, if a majority of the judges cannot reach agreement, the senior judge shall make the appointment.

Per the Registrar, election equipment must remain sealed for at least 10 days after the state board of elections certifies the Election to be held on November 6, 2012. This will occur on November 26th, meaning the equipment would not be available until December 6, 2012. The 10 day period is the time frame that allows for a recount or a contested election to be declared. If a recount/contested election is declared the equipment will most likely not be available for an Election on December 11th. In that event, if the Board still desires an election on December 11th, the County could hold the election using paper ballots. The registrar will be in attendance at the board meeting to answer any questions the Board may have.

The Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on Tuesday, August 21, 2012, at 7:30 p.m. to gather citizen input concerning an application by David Simpson for a Special Use Permit for Commercial Kennel Use in accordance with the A-1 Agricultural Conservation Zoning District requirements. The purpose of the request is to construct a commercial kennel on a parcel identified as Tax Map Parcel 10-A-6 and located at 1371 Simpson Rd. in Prospect.

The Commercial Kennel Use would be co-located with a barn (36' x 84') constructed primarily for horse stables. Horse Stables are permitted by-right in the Agricultural Conservation (A-1) District; however, commercial kennels require a Special Use Permit.

PROJECT: Special Use Permit - David Simpson, Applicant

USE Request: Commercial Kennel

Summary of Request:

David Simpson has submitted a Special Use Permit (SUP) Application to operate a Commercial Kennel facility use in the A-1(Agricultural Conservation) Zoning District. This proposed facility would be accessed from 1371 Simpson Road in Prospect which is the last residential access on State Road 645. It is Tax Map Parcel 10-A-6 measuring 116 acres.

The facility would be a newly constructed building approximately 36 feet x 84 feet with sixteen indoor, climate controlled kennel stalls measuring 4' x 4'. The remainder of the barn building will be used for horse stalls, which are permitted by right. Dogs will be allowed outside in a secure, fenced area during the daytime and will be kept in interior quarters through the night, reducing any noise disturbance to neighbors.

Zoning and Existing Land-Use:

The site consists of one parcel totaling 116 acres and is zoned A-1. The existing site is set in a rural residential area at the end of Simpson Road. It is nestled into larger working agricultural lands owned by the applicant and members of his family.

The proposed site plan is situated near an existing residential dwelling surrounded by grazing lands. The entrance to the site will follow an existing residential driveway from Simpson Road. The applicant does not wish to place any signs for the business.

Adherence to Comprehensive Plan:

The application proposes an economic development opportunity and promotes the placement of a commercial kennel in an agricultural setting. Allowing the commercial kennel use in this location minimizes conflicts between existing and proposed land uses which is a Land Use Goal of the Comprehensive Plan.

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal I: Economic Development: Objective #2:</u> Promote the retention and growth of existing County businesses, and the location of new businesses in the County.. (p 74) *Mr. Simpson proposes this new business*.

<u>Chapter VIII: Goal II: Land Use: Objective #4:</u> Promote a diversified commercial base which I does not create significant impacts on residential area, prime agricultural lands, or public facilities. (p.79) *This location is well suited to this proposed use*.

Adjoining Properties and Land-Uses:

The properties surrounding the parcel are also zoned A-1. The proposed site development is separated from the nearest residence by 1/4 mile. The development of this site would be well buffered from adjoining residences by ample open space pasture and forest lands.

Exterior lights planned for the site are within acceptable lighting expectations, similar to farm and residential lighting fixtures.

Letters of Notification were sent by USPS certified mail to the adjoining landowners identified by the applicant and the Planning Department. There have been no complaints or calls of concern. All certified mail receipts have been returned.

Trip Generation

The trip generation of this use is expected to be minimal and consistent with the trips generated by the existing residential and agricultural uses along Simpson Rd. Therefore, the applicants were not required to perform a Transportation Study as part of their application.

Utilities

There is no public water or sewer available at this site. There is existing well water supply and electrical supply at the site.

Emergency Services Zone 806

This site will be served by the Prospect Volunteer Fire Department, the Farmville/ Prince Edward Rescue Squad, and the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Department. The nearest veterinarian's office is most likely Ridge Animal Hospital approximately 10 miles from the site.

Public Comments:

The office has received no calls concerning the proposed development.

Conclusion

It is the conclusion of the County Planner that this Commercial Kennel Use would be consistent with the A1 District and is a compliment to the goals of the Comprehensive Plan by providing a diversity of commercial businesses which do not create significant impacts on residential areas. Gravel access and parking is permitted.

Recommendation of the Planning Commission:

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing for this SUP on August 21, 2012. Following their consideration of the application and the Public Hearing, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended the Board of Supervisors favorably consider the SUP application allowing a Commercial Kennel facility with sixteen kennel stalls. The applicant declined to include a sign.

Issue: Tobacco Commission Grant - Historic Prospect Depot Project

Summary: Opportunities for the 2013 Tobacco Commission Economic Development Grants are now open. Currently there is \$99,018.57 available for the Prince Edward County Community (\$21,232.57 is the balance of the 2012 Tobacco Commission allocation plus \$77,786 for the 2013 allocation). Receipt of these Economic Development Grant Funds for the Prospect Depot Project would complete the funding necessary to move forward with all the plan development, building construction and a well and septic system. Therefore, I am respectfully requesting the Board of Supervisors to authorize a Tobacco Commission Economic Development Grant application in the amount of \$99,018.57 to be used towards the Prospect Depot restoration. No matching funds to complete this project will be required from Prince Edward County.

Already the Depot Project has been awarded \$501,000 in VDOT Enhance Grants, and the Prospect Historical Society and the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) have put up \$60,998 in match funds for the project. Match funds in the amount of \$125,250 are required to release the entire \$501,000 for the construction of the Depot facility. In 2010, the estimated total project cost was \$668,000, subtracting the \$501,000 grant the \$60,998 in existing match funds and the \$99,018.57 in Tobacco Commission Grant funds would leave a balance of \$6,983.43. It is anticipated contributions from various local businesses and citizens will reduce the actual bid price by more than \$7,000 eliminating the balance mentioned above.

The revitalization of the Prospect Community with the advent of the new High Bridge Trail State Park, is centered around the new Depot Trail Head. The adaptive reuse of this historic site was identified by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (DHR), as a contributing structure of the village, making it the nucleus to the continued prosperity and revitalization of Prospect Village. The Depot will consist of a ranger office, fully functioning restroom facilities, a kitchen area, a community room and a parking area that will accommodate large vehicles such as horse trailers and recreation vehicles. Once complete, the Depot will be a premier rest-stop along the trail where visitors will congregate, relax and potentially enjoy cottage type businesses like sandwich shops, antique stores, gift shops, etc.

Issue:

Tri-Boro Rack and Storage Products Development Incentives

Summary: Over the past 18 months, the Economic Development Office has been working with Fred DeMaio, President of Tri-Boro Shelving to help with the development of a new plant called Tri-Boro Rack and Storage Products. Tri-Boro Rack will manufacture a similar product to what is currently being made at Tri-Boro Shelving but at a much more industrial level. During this time there have been a number of potential development incentives offered to Mr. DeMaio but until now he has not felt comfortable in making a commitment meeting all the requirements for development incentives. Now that the plant is nearer to beginning operations, Mr. DeMaio has a much better evaluation for the potential of how the plant will operate in this current tedious economic climate and thus is willing to make a commitment for Local and State Incentives.

The Tri-Boro Rack facility will be 62,500 square feet, constructed at an approximate cost of \$1.5 million (land, improvements, architectural/engineering and site work). In addition there is approximately \$3 million in equipment being installed at the plant to fabricate the heavy gage metal shelving and storage products. Within 3 years it is estimated that there will be 25 new jobs with a minimum average wage of \$11.76 per hour, plus health and retirement 401-K benefits.

Attached is a Local Incentive Proposal that has been tentatively offered to Mr. DeMaio, subject to the Board of Supervisors and IDA approval. Most of the local incentives being offered are reimbursements that are revenue neutral and performance based. The award of any Tobacco Revitalization Opportunity Funds (TROF) and Governor's Opportunity Funds (GOF) will hold Prince Edward County liable in the event of a failure by Tri-Boro Rack to meet certain performance agreement provisions. To protect the County from any potential "claw-back" implications, Mr. DeMaio has agreed to provide a Letter of Credit or a Performance Bond suitable to the County, with Prince Edward County as the beneficiary in an amount equal to the amount of the grant awards. The Letter of Credit or Performance Bond will not be released until the County is released from any obligation for the TROF and/or GOF funds.

The acceptance of this proposal will continue the Board of Supervisors trend for creating a strong probusiness environment for Prince Edward County by not just attracting new business but helping existing industries to grow and prosper in these tough economic times.

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.1-13 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA 1950, AS AMENDED

Sec. 82-31.

- (a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
 - (1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
 - (2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy River Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640, at the end of Route 792, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
 - (3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
 - (4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward, with the exception of duck hunting, which requires no county permit.
 - (5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
 - (6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind or description.
 - (7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
 - (8) Operation in or on the reservoir of a windsurfer, sailboard or any wind-propelled vessel, other than a sailboat, length of which shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet.
 - (9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
 - (10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the Countyowned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - (11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - (12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
 - (13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
 - (14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.

- (15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicle, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.
- (16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads. Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measures and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.
- (17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- (18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners with express written permission from Prince Edward County may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- (19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the County-owned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
- (20) The siting of "sewerage systems" and "treatment works", as defined by the State Board of Health Sewage Handling and Disposal Regulations, within five hundred (500) feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- (21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-owned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- (b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of the authorization, and shall maintain the area in that condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- (c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall, on conviction of a first offense of a violation of this section, be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Planning & Community Development Report - Cannery

Summary:

There is need to upgrade the electrical power service at the Prince Edward Cannery. The current single phase, 200 Amp service has reached capacity and must be upgraded prior to any further equipment installations. Additionally, much of the equipment that would be utilized for commercial food processing will require 3-phase electrical service. According to Southside Electric Cooperative (SEC), this upgrade will eventually provide a value to the County in terms of electrical utility costs. However, there are upfront costs associated with this request and a utility easement is needed to place a utility pole on the grounds of the cannery.

The following is a cost breakdown to bring the service to the Cannery:

SEC to install the 3-phase power to meter
SEC Program Discount for Customer
TICR Cannery Grant dedicated funds
Cost to County

\$15,000 *
- 3,600
- 2,500
- \$8,900

*This cost can change depending on where the meter is placed and which party trenches the wire. There are additional costs related to the interior modifications, such as a CT Cabinet and modified electrical outlets; although a firm estimate was not available when preparing this report — it is estimated to be between \$500 and \$1,000. Our County employs certified personnel that can perform these components of the project.

Once the three-phase power is installed, the cost per kW hour will be lower, however the billing system will change. There will be a baseline minimum monthly amount billed for electrical usage. This minimum amount is based on the average use of months June, July and August. An evaluation of the past three years indicates that there could be a slight increase in the net annual electrical expense. It is anticipated that as commercial processing increases, the amount of electricity used will increase, but at a lower rate per kWH using the 3-phase option.

<u>Cannery - Seconds Saturday:</u> On Saturday, August 11, twenty people participated in the Community Cannery Education program – processing Zesty Salsa from locally grown ingredients. 140 pints of salsa were processed in glass jars for personal consumption. A special thanks is extended to Jennifer Samuels who volunteered her time to assist Alecia Daves-Johnson with instructing the class. On Saturday, Sept 8, class participants will process locally-grown green beans into pint cans for personal consumption. Jennifer Samuels is again volunteering her time to assist Lena Huddleston with instructing the class.


Aerial of Cannery showing Electric Service

County Administrator's Report - Storm Water Management Grant

Summary:

The 2012 General Assembly passed legislation mandating that all Virginia localities create local stormwater management programs. Such programs must include adoption of water quality standards for development and redevelopment that are equal to or more stringent than the state standards.

To assist in the development of such programs the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) is making non-matching grants available to local governments to be used to develop local programs. Grant awards will range from \$10,000 – \$100,000, with larger grants available to regional requests. DCR held a webinar on August 17, 2012 concerning this program. County staff attended the webinar and learned required elements of the grant, eligible and noneligible activities and the grant award timelines which are displayed below:

- September 10, 2012 deadline for submitting applicants and proposals
- October 5, 2012 target date for stormwater award decisions & public notice
- November 5, 2012 public comment period closes
- December 1, 2012 target date to begin executed Stormwater project agreements
- June 30, 2014 target completion date for all project awards

County staff contacted all neighboring counties except for Appomattox to ascertain their plans on this issue. No other County had decided on a plan of action. To investigate if our region would be interested in submitting a regional grant request to DCR, the Counties met on August 28, 2012 at the CRC and invited Draper Aden to provide information about this program and grant process.

At the conclusion of the meeting all the Counties agreed to work with Draper Aden to develop a regional grant proposal and that Prince Edward County would serve as the fiscal agent for the grant. Draper Aden is preparing the grant application at no charge since each County is a client of Draper Aden. Final decisions on the implementation of the stormwater management program will be made by each County during the local program development phase of the grant.

County Administrator's Report - Hazard Mitigation Grant

Summary:

As a result of the Presidential Disaster Declaration associated with the severe wind and storm even that occurred between June 29 and July 1, 2012, the Commonwealth of Virginia and its localities are eligible to apply for funding through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). Included in the list of eligible activities is funding for "quick connects" (generator hook-ups) to facilitate the use of a generator in the event of a power outage.

Currently, the Prince Edward County Middle School is the county's primary shelter facility. There is no generator or quick connect available at the Middle School. Therefore, staff is recommending that the County apply for funding through the HMGP for the needed quick connect and the professional electrician services needed for installation. There is limited funding available, and a conversation with our Hazard Mitigation Coordinator at the Virginia Department of Emergency Management indicates that a funding request for a generator is not viable.

The anticipated cost is \$30,000. The grant requires no local match.

County Administrator's Report - Drought Watch Update

Summary:

On August 1, 2012 the Board of Supervisors declared a Drought Watch.

Per the Drought Response and Contingency Plan triggers for the declaration of a "Drought Watch" would be when at least two of the indicators meet the follow conditions:

- Precipitation levels are at or below normal precipitation;
- Stream flows fall between the 10th and 25th percentile;
- Ground water levels fall between the 10th and 25th percentile; and
- Sandy River Reservoir level is between 75% and 85% of total usable volume.

Precipitation through August is now 6.27 inches below normal for the year; it had been over 10 inches below normal through July. From September 1 – 4th 1.58 inches of rain was recorded which is almost one-half the total normal precipitation for September. With the forecast for more rain it appears rainfall will be greater than normal for September which will reduce the deficit even more. On September 5, 2012 streamflow in the Appomattox was at 106cfs, which exceeds the 25th percentile of 55cfs. Ground water levels as measured at the state monitoring well in Buckingham County is at 28.71 which is below the 25th percentile of 23.71. The Sandy River Reservoir is approximately 11.5 inches below normal which means the reservoir is holding approximately 93.4% of its total usable volume.

Attachments:

Recommendation: Two of the triggers still meet the measurements to enact a drought watch; however, it appears that the rainfall totals are on the rise and the flow Appomattox River is well over the 25th percentile. The Board may wish to evaluate if it wishes to lift the drought watch.

Summary:

The Noise Ordinance Committee met August 21, 2012. The Committee comprises Supervisor Jim Wilck – Chair, Supervisor Pete Campbell and Supervisor Bobby Jones. Also present were: County Attorney Jim Ennis, County Administrator Wade Bartlett, Sheriff Wesley Reed, Chief Animal Control Officer Ray Foster, and Assistant County Administrator Sarah Elam Puckett. Members of the public present were: Mike & Chris Smith, homeowners in the Hunter's Ridge subdivision, and Lynn East, mother of a homeowner in the Hunter's Ridge subdivision.

The Noise Ordinance Committee was charged with reviewing a request from Roy and Mary Beth Echevarria regarding excessive dog barking in their neighborhood, the Hunter's Ridge subdivision. At the August 14, 2012 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, the Echevarrias asked the Board to consider amending the County Noise Ordinance to add barking dogs as a noise that could be deemed loud and disturbing. Other municipalities were also contacted regarding their ordinances.

The Smiths and Mrs. East discussed with the committee the circumstances involving the dogs belonging to the immediate next-door neighbors of the Echevarrias. Additionally, it was noted that there are other dogs in the neighborhood, in close proximity to the Echevarrias. The committee reviewed all of the facts that had been presented regarding the situation in this neighborhood. The enforceability of an amended noise ordinance was also discussed with the County Attorney, Sheriff and Chief Animal Control Officer.

Based on all available information, the Committee's unanimous recommendation to the Board of Supervisors is that, at present, no amendment to the County Noise Ordinance regarding barking dogs or other animals is needed.

Summary: The Route 628 Committee met August 24, 2012 at the Prince Edward County School Board Office. The Committee comprises Supervisor Simpson – Chair, Supervisor Gantt, School Board Chairman Russell Dove, School Superintendent David Smith, Kevin Wright, Residency Administrator, VDOT-Dillwyn, and Gerry Harter, Lynchburg District Traffic Engineer. Assistant County Administrator Sarah Elam Puckett was present at the meeting representing Wade Bartlett, who had a meeting conflict with the Rt. 786 Progress Meeting. (He arrived later in the meeting.) Also present were: Richard Goode, Director of Support Services, and Lylton Crenshaw, Supervisor of Bus Transportation for the Prince Edward County Public Schools and Scot Shippee, Assistant Residency Administrator, VDOT-Dillwyn. Members of the public present were: Dan Andrews and Jack Houghton.

The Route 628 Committee was charged with making a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors regarding the future traffic pattern for Route 628. The Board of Supervisors would then make a recommendation to VDOT, who would have the final authority to determine the traffic pattern of the road. Because members of the public were present, Committee Chair Simpson called for public participation. Mr. Dan Andrews stated that dual turn lanes off of Rt. 15 and an extra lane at the west end of Zion Hill Road could help alleviate the traffic congestion. Mr. Jack Houghton stated that the congestion problem was only twice per day (early morning and early afternoon), not all day and only on Zion Hill Road. He stated that the Committee should explore why the County is building Rt. 786.

The Committee discussed the multiple causes of the traffic congestion on Rt. 628 and Rt. 15 and the safety concerns with students crossing Rt. 628 numerous times during the day. The Committee also discussed the multiple possible fixes for the congestion and the possible traffic patterns involving Rt. 786. The Committee agreed that the best immediate answer was to wait and see how traffic responds after the opening of the new road later this fall. In the meantime, VDOT encouraged the County to consider an educational campaign when the new road opens that encourages parents to use Rt. 786 when dropping their children in the morning. Additionally, VDOT will quantitatively measure the change in the traffic with the opening of Rt. 786.

The Committee will meet again on January 25, 2013 at 10:30 a.m.

- 1. **Taxing Authority** The Board of Supervisors of the Prince Edward County urges the Virginia General Assembly to grant counties the same taxing authority as cities.
- 2. **Appointments** The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County urges the Virginia General Assembly to give governing bodies that make appointments to local, authorities, boards and commission, the authority to remove appointees.
- 3. **Compensation Board Funding** The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly require the Compensation Board to seek local governing body approval prior to authorizing personnel changes that affect localities financially.
- 4. **Line of Duty Act** The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County strongly urges the Virginia General Assembly to take back the costs of the Line of Duty Act. Localities had no input into the design of the benefits program, but are now burdened by the costs of the program, because expenditures exceed what the state wishes to pay.
- 5. **Unfunded Mandates** The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly require that all legislative mandates wish a cost associated with them must also have a sunset clause. In the event state funding is eliminated, the mandate would sunset and no longer be binding on localities.
- 6. **Funding for Law Enforcement** The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly fully fund the State Compensation Board to a level as set out in Section 15.2-1609.1, Code of Virginia (1 deputy per 1500 population).
- 7. *Continuing Contract Status* The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County encourages the Virginia General Assembly to study the need for further modifications of continuing contracts for K-12 employees.
- 8. The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors also supports the Legislative Priorities of the Virginia Association of Counties.



Dear Local Government Official:

As next year's General Assembly session rapidly approaches, the <u>Governor's Task Force for Local Government Mandate Review</u> would like to give you an update on actions taken during the 2012 legislative session, provide a view as to where the Task Force is heading in the coming months, and to again provide you an opportunity to give us your thoughts.

Interim Report – Legislative and Administrative Relief. As a result of your input, the Task Force issued an Interim Report to Governor McDonnell on January 16, 2012, recommending more than 60 local mandates be eliminated. Of those recommended, 20 were placed into an Omnibus bill sponsored by Senator Newman and Delegate Byron, which ultimately eliminated 15 local mandates. Five additional mandates recommended by the Task Force were eliminated by other legislation. In addition, Governor McDonnell is currently reviewing a list of mandates from the Interim Report for potential elimination under the Administrative Process Act. While the results of the last legislative session were historic in terms of mandate repeal, much work is left to be done.

Task Force Direction. An overall goal of the Task Force is to raise the awareness of the implications of mandates placed on all local governments by the General Assembly. Even though new mandates were passed this past session, there were a record number of bills referred for fiscal impact analysis and other review because of their impact on local governments. It is this fundamental relationship between how services are provided and how they are funded that must be addressed for true mandate relief. This fact demonstrates an increased awareness in Richmond of the impact their decisions have on local government. While we will continue to raise issues with specific mandates that are suggested to us by local government officials, the Task Force will begin to take a broader look at the overall relationship between Richmond and local governments.

Your Input Is Important. The Task Force accomplished real and historically significant changes last year because of your input and recommendations. As we move into the coming months, we want your feedback again. Your day-to-day experiences with mandates are the most important piece of information we can gather. The information you submitted last year went a long way towards placing a real face to the issues created by local mandates.

Please take a moment to complete our online survey (<u>click here to take the survey</u>) to provide your thoughts and input on local mandates or you may write the Task Force at <u>MandateRelief@dhcd.virginia.gov</u>.

Comments received before COB on September 12, 2012 will be included for Task Force review at their meeting on September 17th. Comments received after that date will be assembled for Task Force review at their October and/or November meeting. It would be helpful to have all comments by October 15th.

You are also welcome to attend our September 17th meeting. It will take place beginning at 10:00 a.m. at the Virginia Aquarium and Marine Science Center, 717 General Booth Boulevard in Virginia Beach.

We look forward to continuing our work on behalf of the more than 300 local governments in Virginia. We look forward to receiving your feedback, and please do not hesitate to contact us should you have any questions. We also want to thank Governor McDonnell for his support and leadership in this area and the opportunity to make further progress.

Emergency Disaster Designation and Declaration Process

Overview

Agriculture-related disasters and disaster designations are quite common. One-half to two-thirds of the counties in the United States have been designated as disaster areas in each of the past several years, even in years of record crop production.

The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to designate counties as disaster areas to make emergency loans (EM) to producers suffering losses in those counties and in counties that are contiguous to a designated county. In addition to EM eligibility, other emergency assistance programs, such as FSA disaster assistance programs, have historically used disaster designations as an eligibility requirement trigger.

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) streamlined the USDA Disaster Designation process to make assistance more readily available and with less burdensome paperwork.

Types of Disaster Designations

FSA administers four types

of disaster designations:

- USDA Secretarial disaster designation (This designation is most widely used).
- Presidential major disaster and Presidential emergency declarations,
- FSA Administrator's Physical Loss Notification and,
- Quarantine designation by the Secretary under the Plant Protection Act or animal quarantine laws as defined in § 2509 of the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 (mentioned in 7 CFR part 761, which includes a definition of "quarantine" in accordance with 7 U.S.C. 1961).

What Does a Disaster Designation Specify?

A disaster designation specifies:

- The disaster that resulted in the designation;
- The incidence period (dates) of that disaster;
- The specific counties included in the designation.

Procedures for Severe Drought

The streamlined process provides for nearly an automatic designation for any county in which drought conditions, as reported in the U.S. Drought Monitor (http://droughtmonitor.unl. edu/) when any portion of a county meets the D2 (Severe Drought) drought intensity value for eight consecutive weeks. A county that has a portion of its area in a drought intensity value of D3 (Extreme Drought) or higher at any time during the growing season also would be designated as a disaster area.

Benefits of the Streamlined Disaster Designation Process

The new process helps reduce paperwork and documentation requirements at the local FSA level, making the process more efficient and timely. Individual producer losses would still need to be documented for Emergency Loan (EM) Program eligibility.

Highlights of the New Rule Governing Secretarial Disaster Designations

- The new rule governing disaster designations:
 - Streamlines the USDA Secretarial designation process by eliminating steps from the current process;
 - Preserves the ability of a state governor or Indian Tribal Council to request a Secretarial Disaster Designation;
 - Removes the requirement that a request for a disaster designation be initiated only by a state governor or Indian Tribal Council;
 - Further streamlines the disaster designation process for severe drought occurrences by utilizing the U.S. Drought Monitor as a tool to automatically trigger disaster areas with no further documentation;
 - Does not impose any new requirements on producers or the public.
- For all other natural disaster occurrences and

those drought conditions that are not considered severe, the county must either show a 30 percent production loss of at least one crop or a determination must be made by surveying producers that other lending institutions will not be able to provide emergency financing.

Location of Regulation Governing Disaster Designation Process

The rule is contained in the Federal Register dated July 13, 2012, at http://www.gpo.gov/fdsys/pkg/FR-2012-07-13/html/2012-17137.htm.

Why is the Farm Service Agency (FSA) amending the disaster designation process?

In November 2011, FSA published a proposed rule that would simplify procedures for designating USDA Secretarial disaster counties. The proposed rule did not amend or change the process to make any other disaster determinations nor did it amend the Presidential declarations made outside USDA. FSA sought comments on the rule and is now publishing the final rule to implement changes that will result in faster designations of disaster counties and assure more timely assistance to farmers and ranchers devastated by natural disasters.

When will FSA's proposed changes take effect?

July 12, 2012.

What are the changes in the rule?

FSA is not modifying the criteria that determine disaster designation eligibility, only improving the process.

The new Secretarial Disaster Designation process:

- Nearly automatically qualifies a disaster county once it is categorized by the U.S.
 Drought Monitor as a severe drought for eight weeks; or extreme drought or higher at any time during the growing season of the affected crops that would be considered a disaster area.
- Streamlines the USDA Secretarial designation process The new process reduces the average time it takes to designate a county by 40 percent from the previous process.
- Removes the requirement that a request for a disaster designation be initiated by a state governor or Indian tribal council. A state governor or Indian tribal council can still request a Secretarial Disaster Designation; however it is not a requirement.

What are the streamlined processes for severe drought?

The new process provides for nearly an automatic designation for any county in which drought conditions, as reported in the U.S. Drought Monitor (http://www.drought.unl.edu/dm/monitor.html), meet the drought intensity value of at least D2 (Drought-Severe) for eight consecutive weeks. Under the rule, once a county meets the D2 threshold for eight consecutive weeks, the Secretary will automatically designate the county a disaster area; no Loss Assessment Report (LAR) will be required. Any county that has a portion of its area in a drought intensity value of D3 (Drought – Extreme) or higher at any time during the growing season of the affected crops would be considered a disaster area.

How does streamlining the process for severe drought help farmers and producers?

The new process will help ensure all eligible disaster counties receive a designation.

Is there anything the public needs to do as a result of the rule?

The new process does not impose any new requirements on farmer or ranchers. It merely simplifies the process USDA uses to establish Secretarial disaster designations.

Report to September Board of Supervisors:

- Visitation number were up 83% this August over last year, but still not as high as we had hoped. The very hot temperatures, coupled with the usual Back To School events, slowed things a little bit. However, we continue to maintain between 20% and 25% year to date increase this year over all of last year. The average visitors per month, calculating the whole calendar year to date, is still over 300 per month.
