- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House,

thereof, on Tuesday, the 9<sup>th</sup> day of October, 2012; at 7:00 p.m., there were present:

Also present: Wade Bartlett, County Administrator; Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator; Sharon Carney, Economic Development Director; and Alecia Daves-Johnson, Planner.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor McKay offered the invocation.

#### In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore read the Public Participation Policy, adopted at the September 2009 meeting:

Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked. Follow-up may consist of an immediate response, or planned action by the County Administrator or Board, or by placement on a future Board agenda. Tonight's agenda cannot be changed because the public needs advance knowledge of and the opportunity to review related materials regarding items addressed by the Board. To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

Jennifer Bowen, 4-H Extension Agent, Virginia Cooperative Extension, introduced Caitlin Miller, the new Family and Consumer Sciences Agent. Ms. Miller thanked the Board for their continued support; she looks forward to creating programs that connect potential buyers with local producers and teaching the benefits of using local foods.

Allison Crews stated that October 24, 2012 is Food Day and requested the Board approve the proclamation of Food Day and to celebrate eating healthy in Prince Edward County.

Lydia Burijon, Longwood University, introduced her professor, Dr. Clark, and stated that the Social Problems & Social Policy Development classes are in attendance to observe firsthand the procedures taken to develop and enact social policies.

Chairman Fore welcomed the class to the Board meeting.

#### In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Campbell stated there will be a meeting at the Prospect Post Office on November 13 (2012) regarding the future of the post office. He added that there are approximately 400 post offices in which closure of the post offices is being considered. Supervisor Jones added a meeting will be held in Rice for citizen input; Jenkins Blue & Gray has signed a contract with the post office to hold post office hours in their place of business.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones thanked Dr. Clark for bringing her class to the Board meeting.

Supervisor Wilck stated that he will not be able to attend the grand opening of Tri-Boro Rack & Storage. He also said discussion was held at the recent Town Council meeting regarding the collection of taxes twice yearly. Discussion followed regarding the County considering the same.

Supervisor Jones stated the Buggs Island Broadband Initiative was granted \$22 million from the Federal government to bring internet to rural areas in Southside Virginia, and that the deadline was September. He requested that someone research the status of the project. After some discussion, Chairman Fore requested a letter be drafted to the funding agencies for the status of the project.

Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, September 21, 2012 and Friday, September 28, 2012 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

River Reservoir without the need for a county-issued permit.

#### ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.1-13 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA 1950, AS AMENDED

#### Sec. 82-31.

- (a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
  - (1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
  - (2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy River Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640, at the end of Route 792, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
  - (3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
  - (4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward, <u>with the exception of duck hunting, which requires no county permit.</u>
  - (5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.

- (6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind or description.
- (7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
- (8) Operation in or on the reservoir of a windsurfer, sailboard or any wind-propelled vessel, other than a sailboat, length of which shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet.
- (9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
- (10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
- (11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
- (12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
- (13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
- (14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.
- (15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicle, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.
- (16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads.

Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measures and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.

- (17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- (18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners with express written permission from Prince Edward County may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- (19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the Countyowned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.

- (20) The siting of "sewerage systems" and "treatment works", as defined by the State Board of Health Sewage Handling and Disposal Regulations, within five hundred (500) feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- (21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-owned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- (b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of the authorization, and shall maintain the area in that condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- (c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall, on conviction of a first offense of a violation of this section, be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. (Ord. of 7-9-96; Ord. of 11-12-98; Ord. of 9-14-99; Ord. of 10-10-00; Ord. 6-10-08; Ord. 11-12-08; <u>Ord. 10-9-12.</u>)

The Southside Virginia Chapter of Holistic Moms Network has asked the County Board of Supervisors to sign a proclamation recognizing October 24<sup>th</sup> as Food Day in Prince Edward County and to encourage citizens of Prince Edward County to participate in events in the area.

#### FOOD DAY PROCLAMATION October 24, 2012 Prince Edward County, Virginia

**WHEREAS**, the health and well-being of our citizens is a primary concern for Prince Edward County; and

WHEREAS, promoting safer, healthier diets is a critical factor in improving our citizens' overall health; and

WHEREAS, supporting sustainable family farms and local agriculture benefits the local economy; and

**WHEREAS**, optimizing environmental conditions for food and farm workers is beneficial for both the producer and consumer, so that the food we produce and consume is safe and fair for all; and

WHEREAS, expanding access to food and reducing hunger is of critical importance to aid those who live in food deserts; and

WHEREAS, citizens purchasing locally grown foods and farm products directly benefit our local economy; and

**WHEREAS**, the expansion of local processing facilities and food distribution infrastructure is critical to sustainable food systems for all;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia does hereby proclaim Wednesday, October 24, 2012 as **FOOD DAY** in Prince Edward County, and urges our citizens to participate in the benefits of local food.

Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated that the Agribusiness Grant Application is available from the Tobacco Commission. Prince Edward County staff has been working with several partners toward the expansion and development of the cannery as a Food Enterprise Center. The Board of Supervisors recently indicated their support of the expanded use of the cannery in a way which will incubate food business development in our region by contracting with Virginia Food Works to operate and manage the commercial aspects of the cannery and provide technical education to prospective food businesses. Through the past three years, several partnering organizations have expressed interest in the cannery project and have begun processing food products there, leading to the conclusion that an expansion is needed at the cannery building to house all of the needed equipment for expansion of commercial food business development facility.

This grant project would provide specific facility upgrades to the existing cannery space and a building expansion for aquaculture and agriculture opportunities. The upgrades to the existing processing space include air tight doors and windows with a 'make-up air' ventilation system, exhaust hoods above the steam kettles, and an improved ceiling. The addition would offer a functional loading dock, refrigeration and freezing equipment space, and the development of a commercial kitchen which would allow for value-added processing of a multitude of products, not the least of which is aquaculture processing and packaging for retail markets. This expanded space would also invite Edamame processing equipment. Further inclusions in the grant proposal are the relocation of the septic drainfield to allow for the expansion, improvements to the side for the loading dock access, and a sign to identify the facility.

Match funds to the grant are available from Virginia Tech's Food Science program, the Virginia Aqua-Farmers Network, Virginia State University Department of Agriculture, Virginia Food Works, and in-kind match from Prince Edward County. The final application is still in progress; it is not anticipated that there will be any cash match required from local, public funds. The final grant request is yet to be determined, but is approximately \$825,000.

The County would serve as the applicant to the grant, per the suggestion of the Tobacco Commission during pre-application meetings, but would need to sub-contract a portion of the grant to the Virginia Tech Food Science Department. Mr. David Kuhn, a research professor in that department, would have the responsibility of researching, selecting, and overseeing installation of equipment related to the aquaculture product processing and set-up of the commercial kitchen facility components. In return for this sub-contract of the project, Mr. Kuhn and staff estimate being able to supply \$125,000 as in-kind match funds to the project. The Virginia Aqua-farmers Network has working capital match funds available by leveraging Value Added Producer Grant funds received from USDA to this project development. The improvements to the existing facility are based upon the recommendations of the feasibility study and the value of that study is anticipated as match funds.

Prior to the expenditures of any funds, including grant funds, a forecast of annual operating costs will be developed. The Board of Supervisors will be informed of those operating costs and a budget plan will be developed forecasting any cost to the County. The Board of Supervisors will have the opportunity at that time to make a final decision before the County would proceed with the project.

Discussion followed regarding a study being conducted by W. A. Stratton on the cost of a new building versus the cost to retrofit the existing Cannery.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion to authorize the submission of an Agri-Business Grant Application to the Tobacco Commission.

Supervisor Jones stated the Cannery must continue to offer its availability to home users. Discussion followed regarding relocation of the equipment.

Supervisor Wilck amended his motion to authorize the submission of an Agri-Business Grant Application to the Tobacco Commission, and to approve the Project Endorsement Resolution; the motion carried:

# VIRGINIA TOBACCO INDEMNIFICATION AND COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION COMMISSION PROJECT ENDORSEMENT RESOLUTION

**WHEREAS**, the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission was created to help foster economic development in the tobacco dependent communities of Southside and Southeast Virginia; and

**WHEREAS**, the County of Prince Edward Board of Supervisors would like to submit a grant application for \$825,000 to the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission utilizing the Agribusiness Grant Funds which are available through grant application; and

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia does hereby support a grant application to the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission for building improvements to the Prince Edward Cannery to enable the facility to expand its use as a Regional Food Enterprise Center for Processing, Value-Adding and Marketing of Virginia Farm Products. It is anticipated that once complete, the Food Enterprise Center will encourage the development of new agricultural based businesses and the expansion of businesses that will have increased access to the market for their products, bringing economic development to an area that is struggling to take advantage of the available crop land and agricultural resources; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia does hereby authorize the Board of Supervisors Chairman and/or County Administrator to sign all necessary grant documents to execute the application, grant reports and grant contract.

#### In Re: County Administrator's Report

<u>RFP for Reassessment Services</u> - Mr. Bartlett reported that in accordance with Section 58.1-3252 of the *Code of Virginia*, it has been the practice of Prince Edward County to conduct its reassessment every six years. The reassessment must be completed by December 31<sup>st</sup> of the year prior to the year in which the new assessed values will be used to generate the land book. The reassessment is approximately an 18 month process. In 2007 the County issued an RFP for services regarding the reassessment for the 2009 General Reassessment. Following the County's normal cycle requires selection of an assessment firm in the spring of 2013 in order for the reassessment to be completed by December 31, 2014. There was discussion during the last reassessment cycle regarding the instructions that will be provided to the reassessment firm (i.e. – home sites on vacant parcels). If the Board desires to provide direction to the reassessment firm before it begins the process the Board may wish to appoint a committee to make recommendations to the full board.

Following some discussion, Chairman Fore appointed Supervisor Gantt, Supervisor Simpson, the Commissioner of Revenue Beverly M. Booth, and Marshall Thaxton to serve on the Reassessment Committee.

<u>Drought Watch Update</u> – Mr. Bartlett stated that while DCR still has the Drought Watch in effect for the Appomattox Basin, two of the four requirements for a Drought Watch are no longer being met in Prince Edward County. The annual precipitation is almost caught up to the average amount and the flow in the Appomattox River is now running over the 25<sup>th</sup> percentile. The groundwater level is still below normal and the water level in the Sandy River Reservoir is still below normal.

<u>Route 786 Update</u> – Mr. Bartlett advised the Board the Route 628 tie-in of existing 628 and 786 is progressing; work is being done on the Route 15 portion and it is estimated the work will be done before Thanksgiving. He stated there are major issues regarding the funding of the slope along the Davis property. The initial estimate for the slope was \$6,500-\$7,000 and after having met with the contractor to discuss the angle and the length that is necessary to meet VDOT regulations, the estimated cost is \$22,500. The cost can be absorbed from the proceeds from the sale of the land. Discussion followed.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to authorize a change-order for \$22,500, to be paid from funds from the sale of the land, for Haymes Brothers, Inc. to restore the land in front of the Davis property; the motion carried:

<u>Field of Dreams</u> – Mr. Bartlett stated he and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board met with Farmville Town Council concerning improvements to the Field of Dreams. The Town has invited the County to participate in this project. County representatives have stated the improvements are needed and it is a worthwhile project, but similar needs at the County schools may be considered a higher priority by the full Board. All costs discussed were estimates as the exact scope of the work to be done has not been decided; an estimate was presented of \$1.5 million for the County's portion. The Town is proceeding to develop a master plan for the Field of Dreams. After completion of the master plan, the Town will be in a better position to discuss the project with the County; they anticipate the plan to be complete in December.

<u>Piedmont Regional Jail</u> – Mr. Bartlett stated he received notice from Regional Jail Superintendent Ernest Toney that state funding will be reduced. Mr. Bartlett advised the Board that the reduced revenue stream will require localities to start paying for the jail, at a cost of approximately \$287,000. These reductions are due in part to being cut 100 federal inmates, medical staffing and prisoner release. U.S. Marshals inspected the jail and found that the main issues were the training of staff; to keep costs low, CNAs are in place while LPNs are necessary according to federal guidelines. Another issue was the number of staff on hand at any one time. The Jail Board has worked to correct those issues and there will be a re-inspection in November. Mr. Bartlett stated Prince Edward County houses 40% of the inmates.

#### In Re: Voting Credentials for the Annual Business Meeting

Chairman Fore asked for nominations for voting delegate and alternate for the VACo Annual Business Meeting.

#### In Re: Personnel Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Personnel Committee met on October 3, 2012; the Committee is comprised of Supervisor Simpson, Chair; Supervisor Campbell; and Supervisor Wilck. Mr. Bartlett said he also was in attendance.

The Committee reviewed a proposal to increase the pay steps of the three employees who are responsible for the cleaning of the AG building by two steps. The duties of these three employees were increased when the part-time employee who cleaned one-half of the building retired. That position will not be filled and the responsibility of the position was divided between the three full-time employees. Not filling the part-time position equates to an annual savings to the County of \$19,639.

With the increase in duties it is proposed to increase the three workers salary by two steps. This equates to approximately a 4.5% increase for each employee. The total cost increase for all three including benefits of the proposal is \$4,460. After this proposed increase the County would realize a net savings of \$15,179 annually. The Committee voted 3-0 to approve the request.

Supervisor McKay, Chairman of the Legislative Committee, provided a draft of the Legislative Priorities; discussion followed. Chairman Fore reminded the Board of the Legislative Luncheon to be held in Settle Hall, Hampden-Sydney College, on Thursday, October 23, 2012.

# County of Prince Edward, Virginia 2013 Legislative Priorities

- 1. *Taxing Authority* The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County urges the Virginia General Assembly to grant counties the same taxing authority as cities.
- 2. *Appointments* The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County urges the Virginia General Assembly to give governing bodies that make appointments to local, authorities, boards and commissions, the authority to remove appointees.
- 3. *Compensation Board Funding* The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly require the Compensation Board to seek local governing body approval prior to authorizing personnel changes that affect localities financially.
- 4. *Line of Duty Act* The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County strongly urges the Virginia General Assembly to take back the costs of the Line of Duty Act. Localities had no input

into the design of the benefits program, but are now burdened by the costs of the program, because expenditures exceed what the state wishes to pay.

- 5. Unfunded Mandates The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly require that all legislative mandates with a cost associated with them must also have a sunset clause. In the event state funding is eliminated, the mandate would sunset and no longer be binding on localities.
- 6. Funding for Law Enforcement The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County requests that the Virginia General Assembly fully fund the State Compensation Board to a level as set out in Section 15.2-1609.1, Code of Virginia (1 deputy per 1500 population).
- 7. Continuing Contract Status The Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County encourages the Virginia General Assembly to study the need for further modifications of continuing contracts for K-12 employees.
- 8. The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors also supports the Legislative Priorities of the Virginia Association of Counties.

# In Re: 2013 Legislative Priorities

Following lunch, Chairman Fore called the Board of Supervisors to order as a recessed meeting

for the Board of Supervisors and Mayor Newman called the Council to order. Chairman Fore stated the

meeting was for presentation of the 2013 Legislative Priorities.

Chairman Fore introduced Marge Connelly, President of Longwood University.

Ms. Connelly stated the needs for Longwood University include a student-oriented research

facility and a new and/or improved admissions office.

Chairman Fore introduced Glenn Culley, Vice President for Business Affairs and Finance, and Dr.

Dale Jones, Vice-President for Strategy, Administration and Board Affairs with Hampden-Sydney College.

Dr. Jones stated Hampden-Sydney is concerned about the Federal Pell Grant Program. Since 1984, there has been an 83% increase in students receiving Pell Grants, which is a 210% increase in the total Pell Grant dollars awarded to Hampden-Sydney students. He added that 209 students (19% of students) would not be able to attend Hampden-Sydney without the grant to support their education. He requested support in the appropriation of additional funding for Pell Grants.

Dr. Jones also requested support for the Virginia Tuition Assistance Grants; 739 grants have been awarded for this academic year for a total of \$2,039,000. He strongly urged Governor McDonnell and the General Assembly to restore the undergraduate award amount to \$3,200 per individual.

Chairman Fore introduced Dr. David Smith, the Division Superintendent of the Prince Edward County Public Schools.

Dr. Smith reviewed the priorities of the School Board. He said the single most important factor in achieving high levels in student achievement is consistently high levels of instruction from the teaching staff. To that end, the School Board is interested in seeing the probationary contract term for new teachers extended from three years to five years. The School Board also recommends the extension of the probationary period from one year to two years for teachers who transfer from another school division. He said the School Board believes that the academic year should be the decision of the School Board and not the tourism industry and asks for the repeal of Section 22.1-79.1 of the *Code of Virginia* that mandates schools to open after Labor Day. The School Board also asks for legislative assistance in fully funding the Virginia Retirement System. Finally, the School Board asks for legislative assistance in lessening the ever-growing financial strain due to funding reductions.

Chairman Fore introduced Bill Bass, Chief Operating Officer of Centra Southside Community Hospital.

Mr. Bill Bass stated one of the main issues at the state level is indigent care; currently, Centra gives 5.5% (\$8.6 million) to indigent care. The other issue of concern is Medicaid and if the state is going to participate in the expanding health care programs that will come in 2014, by making it easier for people to get the assistance necessary.

Chairman Fore introduced Mr. Will Rogers, Executive Director of Crossroads Community Services Board.

Mr. Rogers requested legislative assistance obtaining more Medicaid waiver slots for persons with intellectual disabilities, along with an increase in the Medicaid rates. He added increased funding is necessary, whether it be through Medicaid expansion or other avenues, to provide outpatient services.

Chairman Fore introduced Gerald Spates, Farmville Town Manager.

Mr. Spates introduced the members of Town Council in attendance; Mr. Spates requested a change in the Virginia County Code to allow use of an impoundment in a county as a water supply without obtaining permission of the host county or DEQ.

Chairman Fore then introduced the Board of Supervisors members and county staff in attendance; he asked Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator to present the 2013 Legislative Priorities for the County.

Mr. Bartlett said the Board of Supervisors urges the Virginia General Assembly to grant counties the same taxing authorities as cities. He stated the Board of Supervisors urges the General Assembly to give governing bodies that make appointments to local authorities, boards and commissions the authority to remove such appointees. The Board of Supervisors also requests the Virginia General Assembly require the Compensation Board to seek local governing body approval prior to authorizing personnel changes that affect localities financially. The Board of Supervisors also strongly urges the Virginia General Assembly to take back the costs of the Line of Duty Act. The Board of Supervisors requests the Virginia General Assembly require all legislative mandates with a cost associated with them must also have a sunset clause; in the event state funding is eliminated, the mandate would sunset and no longer be binding on localities. The Board of Supervisors requests that the Virginia General Assembly fully fund the State Compensation Board to a level as set out in Section 15.2-1609.1, Code of Virginia (one deputy per 1,500 population). The Board encourages the General Assembly to study the need for further modifications of continuing contracts for K-12 employees. Finally, the Board of Supervisors supports the Legislative Priorities of the Virginia Association of Counties.

Chairman Fore introduced Susan Lascolette, Representative for Senator Garrett.

Ms. Lascolette stated many items brought up are issues of concern to Senator Garrett. He will support the VTAG program. He is concerned that DEQ and DCR may merge into one unit. He is also concerned about the Medicaid issue and the Affordable Care Act; November 1 is the deadline for the state to let the federal government know what it will do. Ms. Lascolette appreciates the unfunded mandates sunset clause as proposed by the Board of Supervisors.

Delegate James Edmunds stated he will work to restore the TAG grants and that Medicare is important and he will advocate to restore funding. He stated he will work to make the changes the schools requested and will try to change the Composite Index but that will be difficult. Delegate Edmunds added that he supports changing the "Kings Dominion Law" – the repeal of Section 22.1-79.1 of the *Code of Virginia* that mandates schools to open after Labor Day. He added he supports all of the issues raised by the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Fore asked for any questions or comments and thanked all for attending.

Summary:

During the September 11, 2012 meeting the Board approved the sale of a total of .792 acres of land to VDOT for a total of \$152,400. The land was contained in 3 parcels fronting highway 15 and was needed by VDOT for the 15 expansion project they will commence in 2013. Two of the parcels in which the value of the land sold was \$100,260 are owned by the County, while one parcel is owned by the IDA and that land sold for \$52,140. During the October 9, 2012 meeting the Board authorized expending \$22,500 to restore land in front of the Davis property to as close to the original condition as possible. The actions below amends the budget placing \$100,260 in the General Fund with \$22,500 used to pay for the land restoration and \$77,760 being returned to the General Fund Fund balance and \$52,140 from the sale of land contained in the parcel owned by IDA being placed in the Economic Development Fund to be used as authorized by the Board for future projects.

Mrs. Hampton has indicated that she is not interested in continuing to serve as the County's representative on the RC&D. Mrs. Puckett serves at the pleasure of the Board.

The Old Dominion RC&D comprises the Counties of Amelia, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Halifax, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward; three Soil & Water Conservation Districts – Lake Country, Piedmont and Southside; and two Planning District Commissions – Southside and CRC.

The mission of the RC&D is to initiate and coordinate resource development and conservation programs that enhance the social, economic and environmental quality of the region. The two primary projects of the RC&D are the regional Buy Fresh/Buy Local program and a bio-mass fuel program.

Historically, a member of the County staff has filled the alternate position, as the alternate only attends the meetings in the absence of the representative.

**Summary:** The County was awarded an LEMPG grant from the Virginia Department of Emergency Management in the amount of \$9,436. This grant requires a local match of \$9,436. The grant provides for \$750 to purchase equipment and \$8,686 for salary expenses. The county historically used these funds to fund part of Mr. Pickett's salary for the work he performed regarding his emergency management duties. Both the grant funds and the match were charged to Mr. Pickett's salary. A non-supplanting certification form is part of the grant application. This forbids localities from using grant funds to supplant/replace local funds. The receipt of the grant does not increase the County's local costs.

I am also recommending that the Board appoint Mrs. Puckett as Acting Emergency Services Coordinator and Acting Hazardous Materials Coordinator. The salary adjustment and "acting" titles will be temporary until Mr. Pickett returns to duty.

Grant awards will not be made to localities that do not have a current EOP as of September 1, 2012.
- 2. **College and University Coordination:** Each locality that has within its borders a public college or university, including community colleges, is required to coordinate planning with the institution, which includes collaboration with the designated emergency management point of contact. Each locality that has within its borders a private college or university is encouraged to coordinate planning with the institution.

Local Exercise Program: Localities are to submit to their Regional Coordinator a multi-year exercise program in accordance with the principles outlined in the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP), Volume I: HSEEP Overview and Exercise Program Management. More details regarding this program can be found on the HSEEP website, located at:

https://hseep.dhs.gov/pages/1001\_HSEEP7.aspx.

- Exercises are to use components of the local EOP as the basis for development, and exercises planned in a three year period are to be progressively more complex and challenging.
- Funded localities are to prepare a post-exercise After Action Review (AAR) that documents performance in terms of areas of

strength and areas requiring improvement. In addition, an Improvement Plan matrix must be completed and used to update plans and procedures.

# **Crisis Management System**

1. **Trained Personnel:** Locality shall maintain a cadre of personnel who are trained in, and have account access to, the state's online crisis management system (currently WebEOC).

# **Capability Reporting**

 Submit Updated Local Capability Assessment for Readiness (LCAR). §44-146.19 (F) of the Code of Virginia requires all political subdivisions to provide an annually updated emergency management assessment to the State Coordinator of Emergency Management on or before July 1 of each year. Locality will submit an updated LCAR no later than June 30, 2013.

Summary: The County issued an RFP for annual engineering services and received responses from 8 firms:

- 1. A. Morton Thomas and Associates, Inc. (AMT)
- 2. Draper Aden Associates
- 3. Hurt & Profitt Incorporated
- 4. Maxey & Associates
- 5. Resources International, LTD.
- 6. Timmons Group
- 7. WW Associates
- 8. Wiley/Wilson

Based on the following criteria, I reviewed all 8 proposals:

(a) Project Team qualifications and experience, (b) Offeror's project management approach, (c) Representative projects, (d) Knowledge of Prince Edward County, and (e) References.

The County last awarded annual contracts to Draper Aden, Resource and Wiley/Wilson.

**Recommendations:** I recommend the Board authorize entering into annual contracts with Draper Aden, Hurt & Profitt, Resource, Maxey & Associates, and WW Associates.

Resource has served as the County's landfill engineers since 1983 and has done an excellent job of providing services. They have an excellent relationship with DEQ. Resource has provided all professional services associated with the landfill including construction design and oversight, groundwater and gas monitoring. They also have licensed surveyors on staff and considerable experience in design and engineering of water/wastewater facilities, site plans and stormwater issues. Draper Aden has served as the County's engineers for many years. Draper engineered the Industrial Park and have all the plans and a full understanding of the site, they have performed most of the work associated with the Sandy River Reservoir, the joint Town/County water supply plan, dam emergency action plan, the regional stormwater grant, site work for the Courthouse and the AG building, engineered the extension of the water system to serve the Industrial park and performed the engineering work associated with the PEA project. Hurt & Profitt has provided certain services to the County over the last 5 years with good results. This includes development of site plans for four industrial pads in the County's Industrial Park and the engineering for the Route 786 project. Additionally, they have extensive experience in Animal Shelter design, water/sewer facilities, master planning, stormwater management and other civil engineering services. Maxey & Associates are a local firm that has 33 years experience in the region. There references were outstanding and they are partnering with Rummel, Klepper, and Kahl (RK&K) an engineering firm with over 226 engineers. This partnership provides a depth of experience not normally associated with a small firm. Richmond has RK&K under an annual services contract and RK&K has performed over 40 individual projects for the City. RK&K also is under an annual service contract for Charlottesville. WW Associates has extensive experience with site development, roadways, GIS, water/sewer improvements, dam safety issues. They serve as the town engineer for Amherst and have annual services contract with several other local governments in Virginia.

#### Summary:

- c. Route 786 Update The VDOT inspection of Route 786 schedule for Friday, November 9, 2012 was rescheduled for Friday, November 16, 2012. The County Administrator is meeting with representatives from VDOT on Friday and will provide an update in the table pack.
- d. **Court House Roof** Repeated attempts to stop all leaks in the roof of the Court House have not been successful. Various leaks have been located and repaired only to see new leaks develop quickly. We have been successful in reducing the volume of the leak in the Atrium but have not been able to completely stop the leak, because we have not been able to pinpoint its exact location. We have recently had two contractors inspect the roof to determine if a fix could be made. Both contractors stated the problem is the existing shingles are cracking and any fix would only be temporary. Both recommended replacement of the shingles, these contractors do not do reroofing. The estimated cost to reroof the courthouse is \$30,000 \$50,000. Currently, we have stopped all known leaks with the exception of the one in the Atrium. Our two choices are replacing the roof now or waiting until the next budget year.
- e. Jail Update The Jail is still losing money and at the current rate localities will have to start subsidizing the Jail operation by December. This week the Jail Board met with Robert Huff, the jail's auditor. He was instructed to conduct a complete review of various options regarding revenues and expenses and report back to the Jail Board by the end of November. I fully anticipate the County will begin to subsidize jail operations in December and the Board will have to amend the County budget to account for this unbudgeted expense.



Committee Reports: Reassessment

**Summary:** The Reassessment Committee met October 23, 2012. The Committee comprises Supervisor Gantt – Chair, Supervisor Simpson and Marshall Thackston, citizen appointee and Beverly Booth, Commissioner of Revenue. Also present was County Administrator Wade Bartlett.

- 1. The Committee reviewed the letter sent to the Board of Supervisors from the Board of Equalization dated April 19, 2009, see attachment. The main point of discussion centered on the practice of placing a "home site" on unimproved parcels. The committee was informed approximately 1,085 parcels not located in Town limits or a subdivision had a home site placed on the parcel. The total taxable value of these sites was \$61,204. After review of the letter and discussion the committee voted unanimously to recommend eliminating the practice of placing a "home site" on unimproved tax parcels that are not in a subdivision or located in the Town limits.
- 2. The Commissioner of Revenue updated the Committee on the current sales ratio which for 2012 is 100% and for 2011 it was 95.4%. The sales ratio is calculated by the state and compares the tax assessment to the actual sales price of property. A ratio of 100% means the sales price matches the tax assessment while a ratio of less than 100% means the tax assessment is less than the sales price.
- 3. Committee members requested an RFP be issued for reassessment services. The committee was informed the Board of Supervisors had already approved the issuance of an RFP for these services.
- 4. The remainder of the conversation centered on specific valuation policies and the need of the County and the Board of Equalization to understand the policies used by the assessment firm. The Committee recommends that once the reassessment firm has been chosen the Board of Supervisors authorize the Committee to meet with the firm to discuss specific valuation policies and make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

Dear Officers of the County:

The board wishes to express its gratitude in being given the opportunity to serve our community. The experience was both enjoyable and educational. However, in reviewing the assessments completed this year, we feel the need to address several issues that will hopefully aid in the completion of the next assessment.

- The usage of the term "home sites" has been a major debate within our group. Not only were the home site rates inconsistent but, the criteria for adding this designation to parcels is not the same countywide. We propose that the County eliminate the use of this special assessment whether there is an actual home or the parcel is unimproved. For unimproved land, every acre would be assessed at a value reflective of the entire parcel.
- There were also quite a few general errors in square footage, topography, dwelling count, etc.; leaving us to question whether or not the assessor(s) had in fact traversed the property.
- We also feel that the values placed on well/septic and water/sewer are inaccurate and should reflect actual price points.
- Our session yesterday brought to light a severe inconsistency in commercial land value. In one particular instance, three parcels, within the same tract of land, were visited on three separate occasions by three different assessors, all of whom factored different prices per acre. One of those parcels was actually taxed per square foot despite it being a nine acre parcel.
- Accepting bids from other competent assessment firms should absolutely be considered for next term.
- Commissioning reassessment at least every three years as opposed to six.
- A group of individuals familiar with the County's real estate, perhaps our own Board of Equalization, should be made available to consult with the assessment firm to ensure accuracy.

In closing, we reiterate our appreciation and hope that you take our concerns and suggestions into consideration.

# RE: Third Quarterly Report - VCE Prince Edward County Office

The following are brief updates on Virginia Cooperative Extension programs for the third quarter of 2012:

# **Staffing Update:**

- Interviews were held August 30 for the Family and Consumer Sciences Agent position. Four candidates were interviewed and Caitlin Miller, a recent VT graduate and Blacksburg native, was offered the position. She began work on September 25. The focus of this position will be on local foods systems.
- Eric Bowen transferred to the Specialized Food Safety and Security Agent position in September. He is housed in the Nottoway office and serves multiple counties (including Prince Edward) in the Central District.
- Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR) calls and requests are being handled by neighboring agents: crop and soil questions will go to David Smith in Cumberland, animal science questions will go to Jennifer Ligon in Buckingham, and horticulture calls will be divided between David Smith and Stuart Sutphin in Danville. We do not have a timeline on when the ANR position will be filled.

# 4-H Program Updates – Jennifer Bowen, Extension Agent, 4-H Youth Development:

- The second annual Camp Loud and Clear for deaf and hard of hearing children was held in July at Holiday Lake 4-H Center. Camp was full with 20 campers and a short waiting list. A teen leadership component was added this year. This is the only camp of its kind offered in Virginia.
- Prince Edward 4-H partnered with Fuqua School to offer two camps (a forensic science camp and a cooking camp) as a part of their Beyond the Bell summer program.

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- Jesse Schrader, a senior at Longwood, completed the VCE summer intern program in the Prince Edward office. For this program, VT pays half and the locality pays half. The county's portion came from salary savings from the 3<sup>rd</sup> agent's position.
- VCE is partnering with PECHS for the independent study program. Madeline Buczek, a senior, will be working in the office 4 days a week. She is leading our after school Club BTP program.
- Registration for all of our after school programs is going very well. Several programs filled very quickly, including two cooking classes that filled in less than a week. A third class was added to accommodate youth on the waiting list. Jesse Schrader is offering a new science program beginning in November. We are offering a new Junior Master Gardener program called Literature in the Garden. It is led by members of the Heart of Virginia Master Gardeners. We are planning to add some additional workshops as volunteers are available (youth canning, gingerbread, and hopefully sewing).
- 4-H teens raised over \$400 with a car wash fundraiser at Tractor Supply. This will help offset the cost of taking additional (over and above required ratio) teens to camp. Nationally, Tractor Supply Company supports 4-H through its paper clover campaign. Locally, that money is used to support youth livestock programs and teen programming.
- Nine members of the Riding Star 4-H Horse and Pony Club competed at the state 4-H horse show in Lexington. Caroline Cumbea won champion in her division, a huge accomplishment at this level of competition. Cathy Duker is the long-time volunteer leader for this club.
- The Prince Edward 4-H Shooting Education Club continues monthly practices at Holiday Lake 4-H Center. This club is small and is actively recruiting new members ages 9 – 19. Two volunteers are registered to participate in shotgun instructors' certification at Holiday Lake 4-H Center in October. We will also submit an NRA Foundation grant application to support the shotgun program offered at Junior 4-H Camp.
- In school 4-H programs began in September. I will again be visiting all 4<sup>th</sup> grades classes at PECES for in-school clubs and science enrichment programming; all 6th and 7<sup>th</sup> graders at PECMS will be participating in the 4-H science fair program; we have expanded the financial management program for Fuqua's 7<sup>th</sup> graders to 12 sessions each semester.

# FCS/ANR Program Updates – Eric Bowen, Exension Agent, FCS/ANR

- Held six cooking matters classes for families in collaboration with Habitat for Humanity. Habitat identified three families, three adults and eight youth that participated in the classes. Habitat identified thirty people who expressed interest in the classes but did not attend. The three families learned the importance of proper nutrition, cost savings of cooking at home, meal planning, shopping, eating more fruit and vegetables and eating as a family. This class was part of a collaboration to implement a community garden in the Virginia street area.
- I was invited by Crossroads to provide nutrition education at Camp Unity. Three classes were taught to seventy-five special needs individuals. The groups learned the importance of proper nutrition and classes specifically targeted healthy snacks.
- The two demonstration kitchens were completed in early September. The kitchens have been used in two 4-H camps and one is scheduled for a cooking demonstration for youth at the Farmville Farmers' market on October 20<sup>th</sup>. These two trailers represent an investment of over

\$12,000 by Virginia Cooperative Extension to teach food safety, food preservation and cooking with local foods in Central District.

- Prince Edward has ten livestock producers that have signed up for the livestock improvement grant. Producers are working towards improved livestock working facilities, improved pasture management and improved hay feeding efficiencies.
- Sign-ups have been sent to local producers so they may be listed in the first printing of the Buy Fresh, Buy Local flyer scheduled for this Fall.
