- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

#### In Re: FY14 County Budget

Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator, stated that at its April 30, 2013 meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved the County Ordinance setting the 2013 tax rates and the FY14 County Budget. These set forth the appropriations for the County of Prince Edward for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2014 and the funds to be specifically appropriated by the Board of Supervisors by department or fund.

Mr. Bartlett said that last year, the Board of Supervisors voted to allow the School Fund to maintain a fund balance if expenditures in the FY13 budget are less than revenues actually received. To allow a fund balance to accumulate in the School Fund will require the transfer of all funds from the General Fund as budgeted regardless of actual expenditures. In that way, any savings would then accrue to the School Fund. To allow proper cash flow management, a transfer schedule must be developed. If the Board of Supervisors allows the creation of a fund balance in the School Fund, Mr. Bartlett recommended that only the amounts required to balance expenditures in the School Fund be transferred from the General Fund for the first six months of the Fiscal Year (July-December). Then the remaining balance can be transferred in equal amounts monthly from January through June or as agreed upon by the Superintendent and the County Administrator.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to approve the annual budget resolution and the appropriations by department or fund, as submitted totaling \$53,656,838; the motion carried:

# ANNUAL RESOLUTION OF THE APPROPRIATION OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2014

A resolution to appropriate designated funds and accounts from specified estimated revenues for FY 2014 for the operating budget and the Capital Improvements Program for the County of Prince Edward and to authorize and empower County officers to expend funds and manage cash assets; and to establish policies under which funds will be expended and managed.

The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors does hereby resolve on this 11<sup>th</sup> day of June 2013 that, for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2013, and ending on June 30, 2014, the following sections are hereby adopted:

- Section 1. The cost centers shown on the attached letter labeled FY2013-2014 Appropriations are hereby appropriated from the designated estimated revenues as approved by the Board of Supervisors on April 30, 2013 for FY 2013-2014.
- Section 2. Appropriations, in addition to those contained in this general Appropriations Resolution, may be made by the Board of Supervisors only if deemed appropriate and there is available in the fund unencumbered or unappropriated sums sufficient to meet such appropriations.
- Section 3. All appropriations herein authorized shall be on the basis of cost centers for all departments and agencies and by <u>Lump Sum</u> for the Schools.
- Section 4. The Social Services Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. By this resolution the Social Services Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance of portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within its respective funds in any amount.
- Section 5. The School Board is separately granted authority for implementation of the appropriated funds for their respective operations. Appropriations for the School Board are by <u>Lump Sum</u>. By this resolution the School Board is authorized to approve the transfer of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within or between a category.
- Section 6. The County Administrator is expressly authorized to approve transfers of any unencumbered balance or portion thereof from one classification of expenditure to another within the same Fund with the exception of Constitutional Officers for the efficient operation of government. Transfers into or out of a department of a Constitutional Officer requires prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 7. All outstanding encumbrances, both operating and capital, at June 30, 2013 shall be reappropriated to the FY2014 fiscal year to the same cost center and account for which they are encumbered in the previous year.

- Section 8. At the close of the fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriations lapse for budget items other than those involving ongoing operational projects, or programs supported by grants or County funds, which must be preapproved by the County Administrator or his designee and submitted to the Board of Supervisors for final approval. Such funds must be applied to the purpose for which they were originally approved.
- Section 9. Appropriations previously designated for capital projects will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until the completion of the project if funding is available from all planned sources, or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate ordinance, resolution or other action changes or eliminates the appropriation. Upon completion of a capital project, the County Administrator is hereby authorized to close out the project and return to the funding source any remaining balances. This section applies to all existing appropriations for capital projects at June 30, 2013 and appropriations as they are made in the FY 2014 Budget. The County Administrator is hereby authorized to approve construction change orders to contracts up to an increase of \$10,000.00 as long as funds are available from the funding sources and approve all change orders for reduction of contracts.
- Section 10. The approval of the Board of Supervisors of any grant of funds to the County shall constitute the appropriation of both the revenue to be received from the grant and the County's expenditure required by the terms of the grant, if any. The appropriation of grant funds will not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall remain appropriated until completion of the project or until the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate action, changes or eliminates the appropriation. The County Administrator may increase or reduce any grant appropriation to the level approved by the granting agency during the fiscal year. The County Administrator may approve necessary accounting transfers between departments and funds to enable the grant to be accounted for in the correct manner. Upon completion of a grant project, the County Administrator is authorized to close out the grant and return to the funding source any remaining balance. This section applies to appropriations for grants outstanding at June 30, 2013 and appropriations in the FY 2014 Budget.
- Section 11. The County Administrator may reduce revenue and expenditure appropriations related to programs funded all or in part by the Commonwealth of Virginia and/or the Federal Government to the level approved by the responsible state or federal agency.
- Section 12. The County Administrator is authorized to make transfers to the various funds for which there are transfers budgeted. The County Administrator shall transfer funds as deemed necessary up to amounts budgeted or in accordance with any existing bond resolutions that specify the matter in which transfers are made.
- The Treasurer may advance monies to and from the various funds of the County to allow maximum cash flow efficiency. The advances must not violate County bond covenants or other legal restrictions that would prohibit an advance. The Treasurer is authorized and directed to credit all interest received from the investment of all County funds to the General fund, with the exception of the School Fund (which will be allowed to maintain a fund balance). School Construction Fund, Economic Development Fund, Recreation Fund, Forfeited Assets Fund, Landfill Fund, D.A.R.E. Fund, VDOT Revenue Sharing Fund (non-local money only) and the Piedmont Court Services Fund, wherein all interest earned will be credited to the respective funds.
- Section 14. All procurement activities with funds appropriated herein shall be made in accordance with the County purchasing policy and applicable state statutes.

- Section 15. It is the intent of this resolution that funds be expended for the purpose indicated in the budget; therefore, budgeted funds may not be transferred from operating expenditures to capital projects or from capital projects to operating expenses without the prior approval from the Board of Supervisors. Also, funds may not be transferred from one capital project to another without the prior approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 16. The County Administrator is authorized, pursuant to State statute, to issue orders and checks for payments where funds have been budgeted, appropriated, and where sufficient funds are available. A listing of vendor payments shall be presented to the Board of Supervisors for information not less frequently than monthly.
- Section 17. Subject to the qualifications in this resolution contained, all appropriations are declared to be maximum, conditional and proportionate appropriations the purpose being to make the appropriations payable in full in the amount named herein if necessary and then only in the event the aggregate revenues collected and available during the fiscal year for which the appropriations are made are sufficient to pay all the appropriations in full. Otherwise, the said appropriations shall be deemed to be payable in such proportions as the total sum of all realized revenue of the respective funds is to the total amount of revenue estimated to be available in the said fiscal year by the Board of Supervisors.
- Section 18. All revenues received by an agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board not included in its estimate of revenue for the financing of the fund budget as submitted to the Board of Supervisors may not be expended by said agency under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors or by the School Board or by the Social Services Board without the consent of the Board of Supervisors being first obtained, and those sums appropriated to the budget. Any grant approved by the Board for application shall not be expended until the grant is approved by the funding agency for drawdown. Nor may any of these agencies or boards make expenditures which will exceed a specific item of an appropriation.
- Section 19. Allowances out of any of the appropriations made in this ordinance by any or all County departments, commissions, bureaus, or agencies under the financial control of the Board of Supervisors to any of their officers and employees for expense on account of the use of such officers and employees of their personal automobiles in the discharge of their official duties shall be paid at the same rate as that established by the internal revenue service and shall be subject to change by the County Administrator from time to time to maintain like rates.
- Section 20. All previous appropriation ordinances or resolutions to the extent that they are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance shall be and the same are hereby repealed.
- Section 21. This ordinance shall become effective on July 1, 2013.

#### RURAL RUSTIC ROAD RESOLUTION ROUTE 725 (WATSON BOULEVARD)

**WHEREAS**, Section 33.1-70.1 of the Code of Virginia, permits the hard surfacing of certain unpaved roads deemed to qualify for designation as a Rural Rustic Road; and

**WHEREAS**, any such road must be located in a low-density development area and have no more than 1,500 vehicles per day; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia desires to consider whether Route 725, Watson Boulevard, from Route 15 to Dead End, should be designated a Rural Rustic Road; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board is unaware of pending development that will significantly affect the existing traffic on this road; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board believes that this road should be so designated due to its qualifying characteristics; and

**WHEREAS,** this road is in the Board's six-year plan for improvements to the secondary system of state highways.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, the Board hereby designates this road a Rural Rustic Road, and requests that the Residency Administrator for the Virginia Department of Transportation concur in this designation.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, the Board requests that this road be hard surfaced and, to the fullest extent prudent, be improved within the existing right-of-way and ditch-lines to preserve as much as possible the adjacent trees, vegetation, side slopes, and rural rustic character along the road in their current state.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Virginia Department of Transportation Residency Administrator.

Supervisor Jones asked about the work to be done on Route 633; Mr. Wright stated there will be a complete bridge replacement.

Supervisor Gantt stated there is a stand of trees along Route 630 that are in bad shape due to pine bark beetles; Mr. Wright said that has been passed on to the proper department. He said that there are a lot of trees in bad shape; anyone that sees a tree that could fall across the road can report it directly to VDOT at 1-800-367-ROAD (7623), which is the Customer Service Hotline and they will report it directly to the Roadside Department.

Supervisor Simpson questioned the project on the Twin Bridges in Green Bay. Mr. Wright stated both bridges are to be replaced in 2014.

Supervisor Campbell stated there are poor drainage issues on Dry Bridge Road; he thanked the VDOT crew for the pot-hole repairs.

#### In Re: Request for Use of County Land

Mr. Bartlett stated a request was received from Branscome, Inc. in Richmond, the contractor who will be working on the widening of Route 15, to use county land for staging and placement of an office trailer on the parcel containing the water tower. He said he contacted Mr. Gerry Spates who stated he has no issue with this but asks that they coordinate with the Town of Farmville on the location.

**Joseph Nutter,** Hampden District, presented a petition to pave Lakeside Road. The road is approximately 1.5 miles long; 19 of the residents along the road signed the petition. One refused to sign and the remaining five could not be reached.

A citizen questioned the meaning of Rural Rustic; Mr. Wright stated Rural Rustic is a classification of an existing road that will have as little improvement as possible, which is basically surface treatment the existing road, with minimal land disturbance or widening. The road must have only local traffic, there must be no anticipated growth in the area and must meet the low-volume traffic requirement. It will have no curves or hills. He added that this is for existing state roads and only tar and gravel will be used.

**WHEREAS**, Kevin Wright, Residency Administrator, Virginia Department of Transportation, appeared before the Board and recommended approval of the Six-Year Plan for Secondary Roads (2014 through 2019) and the Construction Priority List (2014) for Prince Edward County;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that since said Plan appears to be in the best interests of the Secondary Road System in Prince Edward County and of the citizens residing on the Secondary System, said Secondary Six-Year Plan (2014 through 2019) and Construction Priority List (2014) are hereby approved as presented at the public hearing.

#### In Re: Public Hearing – Tharpe Rezoning Request

Chairman Fore announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on a request of J.R. Tharpe Trucking Company to rezone from A-1, Agricultural Conservation, to C-1, General

Commercial, a 10.99 acre parcel located at 401 Pisgah Church Road, and further described as Tax Map parcel #41-A-59 A. The purpose of the request is to permit a Truck Yard (by Special Use Permit) and Construction Sales & Services uses to locate on the property. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, May 29, 2013 and Friday, June 5, 2013 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated the Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing at the May 21, 2013 Planning Commission meeting to consider a request from J.R. Tharpe Trucking Company to operate a Truck Yard Use and Construction Sales & Services Use. The Truck Yard Use necessitates the consideration of a Request for Rezoning the proposed site from A-1 to C-1.

Mr. Bartlett stated that at the May 21<sup>st</sup> meeting, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended that the Board of Supervisors favorably consider the request by J. R. Tharpe Trucking Company. The Planning Commission further defined the purpose of the request for rezoning as to permit a Truck Yard (by Special Use Permit) and Construction Sales & Services uses to locate on the property. On the basis of the Public Hearing held by the Planning Commission on May 21, 2013, the Planning Commission recommended the Board of Supervisors, if the Board chooses to conditionally rezone the property, then approve the Special Use Permit for the Truck Yard which is the use for which the rezoning is envisioned.

Mr. Bartlett added that the approval of the Conditional Rezoning Request would negate the need for a Special Use Permit for the truck yard use.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Andy Ellington, Jimmy Garnett, Reverend Earl Wallace, Pastor Whit Mayton, and Butch Jones/Johns expressed their support for the approval of the rezoning request and stated Mr. Tharpe is a good neighbor and is willing to work to alleviate any problems that may arise. They stated Mr. Tharpe also runs a professional, safe truck company and keeps the operation clean with state of the art equipment.

**Mr.** Tim Tharpe, Vice President and Manager of the Burkeville branch of Tharpe Trucking, stated that in 2011, Tharpe Trucking had been approved to operate the truck yard on 15 acres in Rice. The Evergreen Seed property had not been available for purchase at that time and it is a much better location; he stated there are no issues with the entrance but will make any alterations necessary. He stated the traffic

threshold is well below the VDOT limit. Mr. Tharpe assured the Board that unless there was a delivery to be made in the town of Rice, the trucks would not enter the town.

Chairman Fore read a letter from Eugene and Stephanie Hall regarding their concerns regarding safety, lighting and noise from the proposed Tharpe Trucking business.

Tom Scorotto, US Cellular representative, stated some emergency services use other US Cellular towers; a structural analysis must be completed. #### In Re: Cannery

Mr. Bartlett stated an advertisement was placed in *The Farmville Herald* to notify the public of the Prince Edward Cannery and Commercial Kitchen hours for the 2013 season. The cannery opened Monday, June 3 to "Home Users." There has been a continuous stream of commercial users with increased interest since the distribution of an informational flyer about the Cannery & Commercial Kitchen.

Mr. Bartlett stated there have been 20 inquiries; six potential clients and two new clients booked just this week. A participating Virginia producer who prepares 2,000 cases of 12 units each, per week, that is now outsourcing outside of Virginia has contacted the County; it would stretch our capacity to do that

volume. This producer would like our co-packer to source all their ingredients, which would be a large potential for our area farmers to grow. It is uncertain as to whether our facility can handle that type of demand. This would, however, support our existing grant application to the Tobacco Commission which was tabled. This would produce approximately 24,000 quarts per week. Mr. Bartlett stated the reason this project was started was to provide a market to the local growers and the land that has been out of production for various reasons.

### In Re: County Administrator's Report

Route 786 – Mr. Bartlett stated that after an inspection by VDOT officials on May 21, 2013 the County was informed on May 29, 2013 that all aspects of construction was deemed acceptable and the project was ready for acceptance into the State system. As discussed during the April 9, 2013 Board of Supervisors meeting a decision must be made regarding ownership of all the stormwater ponds. VDOT recommends the County maintain ownership of the storm water ponds if there is the possibility the ponds could be moved in the future. Once ownership of the ponds is transferred to VDOT it can take as much as a year to have the ownership reversed – if VDOT even agrees to such a request. The County's engineers state there is little expense in the upkeep of the ponds once they are stabilized and there is minimum risk of a failure of the ponds. Currently the County owns the storm water pond located on Dominion Drive. To date, experience has shown that there is little cost to the County in maintaining the ponds. The advantage to owning the ponds would be it would allow greater flexibility for the County when dealing with any future developer and moving such ponds to the rear of any development would increase the developable property adjacent to the road. The risk of ownership is the annual maintenance (mowing) and the need to make any repairs.

After some discussion, Supervisor Simpson made a motion to maintain Board control of the two stormwater ponds on the south side of Route 15 and request VDOT to take control of the three ponds on the north side of Route 15. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Wilck stated that with consideration of the cost of maintenance on the ponds, he suggested VDOT take control of all five ponds. Discussion followed.

Supervisor McKay called for the motion.

In Re: Supervision Fees charged by Piedmont Court Services

Mr. Bartlett stated that over the past six years, the amount of the DCJS grant to operate this

program has remained the same. During that same time, costs, especially insurance and retirement have

increased significantly and other operating expenses have increased at a slower rate. Even with these cost

increases the revenues generated from the grant and the supervision fees have provided enough funds to

operate the program with no contribution from Prince Edward County or any of the Counties in which the

program operates. For FY14, that will no longer be true. The FY14 budget could only be balanced with a

budgeted withdrawal of \$18,431 from the fund balance. It is projected this shortfall will continue to grow

in the future due to increases in normal operating costs and increases in personnel costs. Due to the

shortfall the Director of Piedmont Court Services is requesting an increase in the amount of the Supervision

Fees charged to offenders from \$100 to \$125 (the maximum allowed by the state is \$150) and from \$30 to

\$37.50 for cases involving indigents (receiving SNAP/Welfare or on disability). This represents an

increase of 25% and will raise approximately \$18,000 annually.

In Re: Personnel Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Personnel Committee met on May 21, 2013; the committee is comprised of Supervisor Simpson – Chair, Supervisor Campbell and Supervisor Wilck. Also present was Sheriff Wesley Reed, Commonwealth Attorney Jim Ennis, Chief Deputy David Eppes, Sgt. Richard Raybold and County Administrator Wade Bartlett.

Mr. Bartlett stated the Committee reviewed a request by the Sheriff requesting "At Will – Traffic Enforcement Overtime Program," which would allow Sheriff Deputies to work traffic enforcement "at will" for overtime. The program will be an enforcement need-based program. The two current grant programs that fund overtime – Alcohol and DMV Speed Enforcement – are restricted as to the time the deputies can work. High traffic volume times such as morning commuting times and weekend morning hours are not covered. Mr. Bartlett added that often when staff is working under the grant funding, they become involved in situations that are not traffic-related such as handling calls for service, and traffic enforcement does not occur. The "At Will" program will provide additional staff on duty during the busiest periods of enforcement, thus allowing faster response to calls for service.

Mr. Bartlett stated increased enforcement will increase safety in the County, provide badly needed additional manpower while the additional cost will be covered by the additional enforcement; Amelia, Charlotte and Cumberland are successfully using this program.

The Sheriff is requesting that the entire state traffic code be incorporated into the County code, that the Board allow the Sheriff to institute the "at-will" enforcement program, and that part-time

employees be paid an overtime rate equal to the lowest amount paid to full-time deputies (\$28.38/hour) if they participate in the program.

Sgt. Raybold stated calls for service take precedence over traffic stops; he stated revenues from fines cover the costs.

Supervisor Simpson questioned the number of hours the officers will be permitted to work. Sgt. Raybold said during the trial period approximately 20-25 hours will be allotted to each member taking part in the program. He said this is restricted to road officers; not all road officers are interested in participating.

Sheriff Reed stated some of the investigators are certified to also work traffic division. He stated it would benefit the County because while crime rates are up, traffic stops would also get drugs off the street and would allow apprehension of felons; this program would also permit more County coverage. He stated routine patrol generated over \$80,000.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to approve a six-month trial of the "At Will" Traffic Enforcement Overtime Program to begin immediately, to permit participating road officers to work a maximum of 25 hours per month, per road deputy, with the stipulation that if it is not beneficial to the County it will be discontinued after that time; the motion carried:

### In Re: Amendment to Section 74-3 of the County Code

County Attorney James R. Ennis stated an amendment to Section 74-3, which is the local ordinance that incorporates the provisions of Title 46.2 Code of Virginia, which is the traffic provisions as well as 18.2-266 of the Code of Virginia, which is the Driving Under the Influence statute. He said the previous Section 74-3 excluded not only offenses which constituted a felony but they also excluded Class I and Class II misdemeanors that are contained in the traffic code. This amendment would still exclude offenses that are felonies, but would now include offenses which are Class I and Class II misdemeanors. The inclusion of these offenses will entitle defendants charged with Class I and II misdemeanors to court-

appointed lawyers, and it will be the County's responsibility to compensate those court-appointed lawyers. The cost is \$122 per offense; if found guilty, the cost is covered by the offender. If there is no request for jail time and only a fine is sentenced, it removes the need for a court appointed attorney.

# Proposed Amended Section 74-3 of the Code of Prince Edward County

### Section 74-3. Adoption of State Law

- (a) That pursuant to the authority of *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended, Section 46.2-1313, all of the provisions and the requirements of the laws of the state contained in Title 46.2 of the *Code of Virginia* as in force and effect on July 1, 2013, except those provisions and requirements the violation of which constitutes a felony, and except those provisions and requirements which, by their very nature, can have no application to or within the county, are hereby adopted and incorporated in this article by reference and made applicable within the county. References to highways of the state contained in the provisions and requirements adopted in this section shall be deemed to refer to the streets, highways and other public ways within the county. Such provisions and requirements are hereby adopted, mutatis mutandis, and made a part of this article as fully as though set forth at length herein, and it shall be unlawful for any person within the county to violate or fail, neglect or refuse to comply with any provision of Title 46.2 or of Article 2 (Section 18.20266 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 of the *Code of Virginia*. Amendments to such state law hereafter adopted shall be incorporated herein on their respective dates unless specifically rejected by the governing body of the county.
- (b) All definitions or words and phrases contained in the state law adopted to this section shall apply to such words and phrases when used in this article unless clearly indicated to the contrary.
- (c) The penalties imposed for the violation of any provision or requirement adopted by this article are:
  - (1) As provided by general law for similar reference under Title 46.2 or under Article 2 (Section 18.2-266 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 of the *Code of Virginia*; or Title 19.2 Criminal Procedure
    - Chap. 20 Taxation and Allowance of Costs, Sections 19.2-328-19.2-338

In Re: Back-Up Generator and Transfer Switch Grants

Mr. Bartlett stated that late last fall, the County was awarded a \$50,000 Supplemental Local

Emergency Management Grant (SLEMPG) through the Virginia Department of Emergency Management

(VDEM). The grant was a 50/50 matching grant (\$50,000 state funds and \$50,000 local funds) for the

purpose of providing back-up power for the facility that will be used as the County's emergency operation

center - the County Ag Building. This spring the County issued two Invitations for Bid: one for the

purchase of the generator and one for the purchase and installation of the transfer switch.

Mr. Bartlett reported that one bid was received for a 100kW, trailer-mounted generator from

Carter Machinery Company for \$66,782. For the Invitation for Bid for the Transfer Switch and

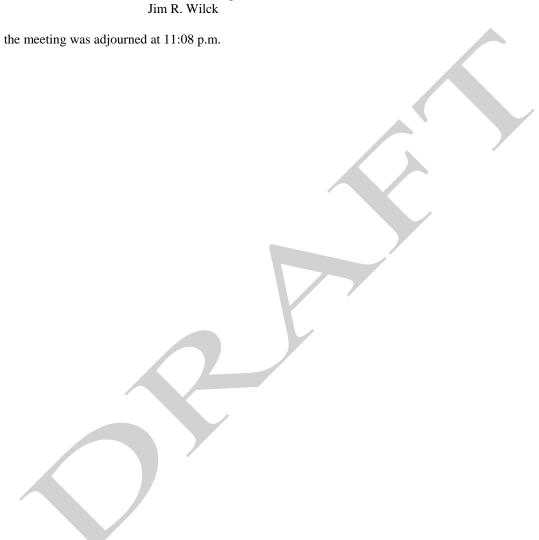

### Proposed Amended Section 74-3 of the Code of Prince Edward County

### Sec. 74-3. Adoption of State Law

- (a) That pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, Section 46.2-1313, all of the provisions and the requirements of the laws of the state contained in Title 46.2 of the Code of Virginia as in force and effect on July 1, 2013, except those provisions and requirements the violation of which constitutes a felony, and except those provisions and requirements which, by their very nature, can have no application to or within the county, are hereby adopted and incorporated in this article by reference and made applicable within the county. References to highways of the state contained in the provisions and requirements adopted in this section shall be deemed to refer to the streets, highways and other public ways within the county. Such provisions and requirements are hereby adopted, mutatis mutandis, and made a part of this article as fully as though set forth at length herein, and it shall be unlawful for any person within the county to violate or fail, neglect or refuse to comply with any provision of Title 46.2 or of Article 2 (Section 18.2-266 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 of the Code of Virginia. Amendments to such state law hereafter adopted shall be incorporated herein on their respective dates unless specifically rejected by the governing body of the county.
- (b) All definitions or words and phrases contained in the state law adopted to this section shall apply to such words and phrases when used in this article unless clearly indicated to the contrary.
- (c) The penalties imposed for the violation of any provision or requirement adopted by this article are:
- (1) As provided by general law for similar reference under Title 46.2 or under Article 2 (Section 18.2-266 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 of the Code of Virginia; or Title 19.2 Criminal Procedure

Thank you for your prompt response to the March 4th letter requesting assistance on Piedmont Senior Resources Board appointments. This letter and the attachments should answer your questions.

The staggering of the Board was to address the monitoring report and move existing Board members off over the next three years. Newly appointed Board members have a term of three years and may serve no more than two consecutive three-year terms. Per Commissioner Rothrock it is acceptable to have two appointees from each county. The plan is to put the additional Board members on from each county and let the existing roll off as their terms expire. Three of them go off in November of this year, including Mr. Townsend from Prince Edward County. Therefore, please consider an additional candidate for his replacement in November.

Enclosed you will find a copy of Mr. Dunn's letter outlining the services provided to Prince Edward County residents dated Jan 15<sup>th</sup>, 2013 and the additional information on citizens served dated Feb 5, 2013. I have also included year to date information on the Home Delivered Meals, Disease Prevention/Health Promotion, Congregate Nutrition, and Transportation Programs from 10-1-2012 through 2-28-2013. Legal Aid is subcontracted to provide legal support to our seniors on an as needed basis. They appear to be averaging six new clients a month from all the counties combined. Two month's statements are included to give you an idea of the services. The by-laws are included for your review. There are no amendments to the by-laws re-written after the last monitoring report.

Please notify me if you need further information. I hope to improve the visibility and activity of this agency. However sequestration may prevent expansion of services at this time.

### Summary:

Helton House, Inc. plans to expand their Rice, VA facility over the next 36 months. The expansion will enable Helton House to enhance their assisted living and day programs, while also improving the training facilities for the area's mentally challenged individuals. This expansion shall replace services lost upon the closing of the Central Virginia Training Center to disabled persons.

The expansion will consist of 5 elements:

- Expansion of Helton House's psycho-social day program within a 5,000 sf. addition to the existing facility in Rice. The Board of Supervisors at their July 10, 2012 meeting approved the construction of a new building up to 5,000sf.
- The area previously occupied by the day program will be renovated to accommodate offices for mental health supporters.
- Two homes purchased in 2013 will be appropriately renovated to accommodate challenged individuals.
- A residential four-bedroom home in the Pamplin/Prospect area of Prince Edward County for use as a group home.
- Two new homes are scheduled to be built as the needs of individuals increase.

### **General Planned Expansion**

### Background:

Helton House, Inc. began as a small business venture between Michael and Edward Helton in hopes of using their combined 23 years of human service knowledge to support persons with disabilities in living in a community setting. The company began with one small unlicensed assisted living facility (ALF) with one resident with hopes of maybe getting one or two more clients to serve. As demand for their services increased over the years, they have expanded to three assisted living homes and four Intellectual Deficit (ID) Waiver group homes. These homes function to support individuals 24 hours per day with basic living skills in the areas of general hygiene (including bathing and toileting), food preparations, increasing their understanding of health and safety, and supervision when there are severe behavioral concerns.

In addition to expanding in providing residential services, Helton House expanded to provide day programs. Currently, Helton House is licensed for one ID Waiver day support, and one community outreach oriented mental health support services program. Both the ID Waiver day support, and the mental health support services program meets the needs of clients who live in Helton House residential homes and those living in the community.

As the Commonwealth of Virginia has implemented a plan for closing large training centers, demand has increased for ID Waiver group homes. These closing are a result of the Department of Justice (DOJ) settlement agreement with the Commonwealth of Virginia. An excerpt from the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services website explains this in detail:

"In August 2008, DOJ initiated an investigation of Central Virginia Training Center (CVTC) pursuant to the Civil Rights of Institutionalized Persons Act (CRIPA). In April 2010, DOJ notified the Commonwealth that it was expanding its investigation to focus on Virginia's compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the U.S. Supreme Court Olmstead ruling. The Olmstead decision requires that individuals be served in the most integrated settings appropriate to meet their needs consistent with their choice. In February 2011, DOJ submitted a findings letter to Virginia, concluding that the Commonwealth fails to provide services to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities in the most integrated setting appropriate to their needs."

As a result of these closings, Helton House is working to place many of the upcoming discharges in our facilities by working with each training center's discharge coordinator and the local Community Services Boards. Currently, Helton House partners with several Community Service Boards (also known as a CSB) and Departments of Social Services (DSS) for case management of the clients they currently serve and as a basis for referrals for new clients. Several of these partners have requested that Helton House accept

their clients, but limited bed space has prevented this. As a response, Helton House plans to expand services to meet the growing demand.

To prepare for the expansion in residential services, the current day support building will be renovated to accommodate the new clients for day time activities. In addition to renovating to increase the amount of usable space, our renovations will accommodate the needs of individuals with high medical needs.

Assisted living facilities are licensed by the Department of Social Services with the residential director being licensed by Board of Long Term Care Administrators. The ID Waiver day support, mental health support services, and the ID Waiver residential homes are regulated by the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.

Each home is staffed by one house manager, and a variety of full time and part time Direct Support Professionals. The minimum requirement by regulations is a high school diploma and a criminal record free of barrier crimes. For the ALF homes a CNA certificate is desired. Entry level direct support professionals are hired at \$9.07/hour. Entry level mental health professionals with the minimal degree and experience begin at \$11.08/hour, but those with degrees earn about \$14.23/hour.

For professionals working in the mental health areas of the planned expansion, there are requirements for years of experience for some positions a bachelor's degree in a human services field is required.

### Expansion:

- 1.) One residential, four bed, ID Waiver home is planned for Prince Edward county in the Pamplin/Prospect area. This home will provide 6 new jobs. A minimum capital investment of one vehicle to transport residents of the home is estimated at \$30,000. Total estimated cost of purchasing a home is \$325,000. We will require a home with 4 bedrooms and two baths (minimum).
- 2.) Plans to apply for a license to operate a Psycho-social day program in Prince Edward County to accommodate supporting 15-30 individuals and adding approximately 7 jobs. Building a new psycho-social program at 5000 to 8000 square feet that will also add additional office space and potential for additional programs and additional hiring (\$775,000.00). Excavating costs and parking lot installation are estimated at \$147,000. Renovations may be needed to the desired site. Demand for the service is high in the surrounding counties. We currently have referrals for 13 individuals for this program pending its licensing. This program requires three vans for transport into the community for those who use the program. The estimated cost for three vans is \$90,000.00. With the demand for these programs increasing, we anticipate this could add an additional 10 jobs from year 2-5 after completion.
- 3.) The current day support program building will be renovated to make office space for the mental health supports program that is currently in a temporary location. The renovation will double the amount of usable space in the current location. The renovations will also accommodate

- addition of potentially 16 more clients and 4 to 5 more direct support professionals. This renovation project has been priced at \$285,000 for phase 1 (by end of 2013) and \$50,000 for phase 2 for outdoor space for client use (by end of 2014). With the addition of the new clients, two additional vans will be needed for an estimated cost at \$60,000.
- 4.) Two of our current ALF homes with 8 residents total will be moved to a new home purchased in 2013. Those two homes will be converted to two ID waiver homes with 8 residents. This will require the addition of 12 more staff for those homes. Renovations and upgrades to the three homes (including the home purchased in 2013) are estimated at \$75,000.
- 5.) The purchase of two new construction homes on land currently owned by Helton House (ID Waiver home 3) is \$650,000. These homes will be built with the needs of individuals with increased medical needs and will include special lifts for bathing and toileting. These homes will be four bedrooms and two specially constructed baths. Living spaces will be larger than average to accommodate the use of motorized chairs, or standard wheelchairs. Equipment purchase of 2 wheelchair lift vans \$70,000.00.

The use of the vehicles is for the resident's use only. Staff members drive the resident's to the locations in the community where they may shop, attend physician appointments, attend psychiatric appointments, and for recreational purposes (going to the park, visiting relatives, etc.). These vehicles will be used for aiding in residents accessing community resources such as the department of social services, the social security administration, the library, and their community services board.

Agriculture & Forestry Industries Development Planning Grant (AFID)

### Summary:

On May 8, 2013, Governor McDonnell announced that our grant application titled, "Southside Food Enterprise Center for Production, Marketing, and Education of Value-Added Food Processing Serving Virginia Farm-Based Producers," was awarded a \$20,000 **Planning Grant** through the **Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund.** 

I. In June, VDACS provided a draft Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) and asked the grant recipients to sign this agreement to begin the use of the grant funds. The MOA outlines the period of performance, reimbursement process, project budget, and a scope of work or "work plan". The key document in the MOA is the "approved work plan" submitted as Appendix A to the MOA. VDACS allows an opportunity to revise the work plan which was included in the grant application prior to submitting it with the MOA (VDACS must agree to any suggested changes). It is suggested to change to work plan to focus project design on the potential users of the facility, instead of seeking first to find a location and then attract users to that location.

On May 24, County Administrator Bartlett sent a request to all adjoining counties to inquire about their interest in this endeavor. Our neighboring counties were afforded two options to become involved; (1) Identify any buildings or building lots suitable for consideration and the county's willingness to share in the in-kind or cash match. (2) If not interested in contributing to the match requirement, then provide a letter of support. (The grant requires a 50 / 50 match to the \$20,000 award. You will recall the discussion at the February 12<sup>th</sup> Board meeting, that the grant project would identify other localities that would commit to being regional partners and investigate potential locations for the food processing facility in these other localities, however Prince Edward County was the only county that had committed match funding to the grant.)

There has been mixed responses to this inquiry, more counties have offered a letter of support for the facility being constructed in Prince Edward County, and Lunenburg County

has offered in-kind match (staff hours) with a possible \$2,000 cash match. Therefore, it is suggested that the work-plan be revised to develop the facility plan based on the potential users *then* conduct a search for the appropriate facility based on the construction design specifications. Lastly, offer the adjoining counties another opportunity to support the project when sources of capital support are being identified based on a completed development and operations plan. [The original work plan approached the project by finding a location first, then fitting the users to that location.] This change in the work-plan would also expedite the completion of the Planning Grant deliverables, which might help meet the next approaching Tobacco Commission grant application deadline in October.

The Board is asked to authorize the County Administrator and Planning Department staff to modify the Work Plan and submit it to VDACS for approval. Upon approval of the workplan, the Board is asked to authorize the County Administrator to execute the Memorandum of Agreement with VDACS.

II. Upon executing the MOA, the first project activity is to advertise for a consultant to coordinate the deliverables of the grant. The Board is asked to authorize the County. Administrator to advertise for a consultant; the Agriculture Enterprise Development Work Group appointed by the Board at the February 12 meeting will assist with interviews and selection of a consultant that can perform the Planning Grant deliverables at a cost not to exceed the project budget. The Board is asked to authorize the County Administrator to execute a working contract with selected consultant.

### Governor McDonnell Announces Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund **Planning Grant Recipients**

- \$249,000 Awarded to Eleven Projects Covering Thirty-one Localities to Strengthen Local, Regional Agribusiness Planning and Development -

Initiative Part of Governor McDonnell's Jobs-Creation and Economic Development Agenda During 2012 General **Assembly Session** 

RICHMOND - Governor Bob McDonnell announced today the recipients of fiscal year 2013 planning grants from the Governor's Agriculture & Forestry Industries Development Fund (AFID). Eleven projects covering more than thirty localities have been awarded a total of \$249,000 to support the growth of agricultural and forestry projects in the Commonwealth. The AFID planning grants program was developed to encourage local governments and regional organizations to analyze and plan strategically about how they can support and integrate agriculture and forestry-based industries into their communities overall economic development efforts.

A listing and brief summary of the qualifying projects and their locations is included below.

Speaking about the AFID planning grants awards, Governor McDonnell said, "We've had great success incorporating two of the Commonwealth's largest industries, agriculture and forestry, and their significant overall impact on our economy into our economic development agenda. That strategic decision has been justified many times over. Exports have reached new record highs during the last three years and we've successfully utilized AFID economic development grants to attract new agribusinesses to Virginia and to help existing operations expand. Creating a program that incentivizes communities to plan for how they can best grow and support agricultural and forestry industries in their business community is a natural continuation of a strategy that is proven to benefit Virginians and create jobs."

Governor McDonnell continued, "Creating opportunities and the right environment for businesses to succeed is the approach we've taken over the course of my administration to keep the economic recovery going in Virginia. During my time as governor, unemployment has dropped from 7.2% to 5.3% because of our commitment to conservative principles and smart, targeted investments that lead to job creation. The AFID is just one more example of our efforts at work. Our General Assembly partners in this initiative, leaders such as Delegates Steve Landes, Kirk Cox, and Ed Scott and Senators Bill Stanley, John Watkins and Emmett Hanger, deserve many thanks for their work to make funds available for important local economic development efforts such as the AFID planning grant program."

The communities and regions receiving AFID planning grants will match each dollar awarded with a dollar of local funds, including certain types of allowed in-kind contributions. The program also requires the active participation of a board, committee, or working group representing the relevant agriculture and forestry interests in the locality.

"Flexibility was given to applicants to pursue the type of project that made the most sense for their region or locality, whether it was something as broad as creating a strategic plan for agriculture and forestry development, or as specific as construction of a commercial kitchen facility," said Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry Todd Haymore. "It was extremely important that projects demonstrate involvement from the local agriculture and forestry community, giving an indication that it was the producers themselves who helped identify and support economic development opportunities that were of true benefit to their industries. I am hopeful that the successful implementation of these planning grants will lead to future awards of some of our larger AFID facility grants to these same localities that will have benefitted from their dedication to planning for agriculture

AFID planning grant program guidelines were announced on November 27, 2012, with applications for FY 2013 due March 1, 2013. Applicants demonstrating a clear need, a solution to be undertaken, and strong support from local government and the agriculture and forestry community received the highest marks during the review process. The next round of AFID Planning Grants will be fall 2013. Localities interested in applying may visit http://vdacs.virginia.gov/agribusiness/planning.shtml for parts information.

Agriculture and forestry are Virginia's largest industries, with a combined economic impact of \$79 billion annually: \$55 billion from agriculture and \$24 billion from forestry. The industries also provide approximately 500,000 jobs in the Commonwealth according to the Weldon Cooper for Public Service at the University of Virginia.

### Planning Grant Recipients and Projects

Project Title: New Markets for Agriculture Producers in Southwest Virginia through Online Marketing and a Local Food Campaign Applicant: Town of Abingdon

Award: \$20,000

Summary: Abingdon Convention and Visitors Bureau and Appalachian Sustainable Development will work together to develop new, year-round markets for locally produced agricultural products by creating and marketing an online order system to facilitate the sales of local foods to restaurants and other institutions. The effort will also further develop Rooted in Appalachia website and mobile app to promote local foods and restaurants serving them.

Project Title: Fields of Gold - The Next Season of Agritourism in the Shenandoah Valley Applicant: Central Shenandoah PDC (CSPDC) Award: \$35,000

Summary: Fields of Gold is a regional agritourism marketing initiative led by the CSPDC in the Shenandoah Valley. They recently completed a year-long planning process, funded by the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), and have received significant support and buy-in from their member localities, as well as awards for the effort. This grant is to develop and market a robust website that will include an interactive map of agritourism sites, an events calendar and farm-to-restaurant guide. The marketing and build-out of the website were identified as key deliverables in their strategic marketing plan.

### **Project Title: Fauquier County Impact of Agriculture Study** Applicant: Fauquier County Award: \$6,000

Summary: Funds will be used to conduct a study of the needs of the farming community in Fauquier and to off-set the costs of having UVA's Weldon Cooper Center conduct an "Impact of Agriculture" study to document the overall economic contribution of agriculture to Fauquier. As part of the study, a working group of county farmers, representing all segments of the local farming community, will work with the County's Agricultural Advisory Committee and the Fauquier County Farm Bureau to conduct, review and analyze results of a farmer survey. Studies will help the County determine what changes to the zoning ordinance might be necessary to assist the agricultural community.

### Project Title: Planning for Agritourism and Agribusiness Benefits in Giles, Montgomery and Pulaski Counties Applicant: Giles County - lead applicant, Montgomery and Pulaski Counties Award: \$35,000

Summary: Project will develop a strategic plan for agricultural economic development in the tri-county region. It will include interviews/surveys of agritourism operations and agribusinesses, an inventory of these businesses, policy recommendations, and an economic impact study.

### Project Title: Meat Processing Facility for Southside Virginia

Applicant: Halifax County Award: \$12,500

Summary: Grant funds will help pay for a professional, third-party feasibility study of a USDA inspected meat processing facility in Halifax county to serve Southside Virginia.

### Project Title: The Highland Center Local Food Incubator Applicant: Highland County

Award: \$20,000

Summary: Grant funds will help pay for the renovation and upgrading of a commercial kitchen at the Highland Center in Monterrey. Specifically, they will be used to create a temperature-controlled meat processing area in the kitchen that will allow for the production of value-added meat products under USDA inspection. This project is the culmination of years of effort to grow Highland County's economy by building on its agricultural assets, primarily livestock. It will complement the County's recently completed USDA inspected slaughter facility, by giving producers the opportunity to add further value to

### Project Title: James City County Rural Economic Development Strategic Plan Applicant: James City County Award: \$20,000

their meat.

Summary: The county boasts many agricultural and forestry assets, and has undertaken a number of individual efforts to promote them, but never has the County taken a comprehensive look at how to protect, support and leverage these assets. The need is particularly important for the County, with development pressures coming from its east (Williamsburg/Hampton Roads) and west (exurban Richmond). This effort is just the type of project the AFID Planning Grants program was designed to engender. It is being led by their Rural Economic Development Committee, which includes key local government personnel, local business leaders and agricultural producers). This project could be used as a model for other jurisdictions under development pressure.

### Project Title: Feasibility Study for Barging Logs across the Chesapeake Bay Applicant: Northern Neck Planning District Award: \$35,000

Summary: Funds are part of a proposed \$100,000 feasibility study to determine the economic efficiency of utilizing barge I transport to bring logs timbered on the Eastern Shore for milling in Kinsale. Study will be conducted in two phases with Phase I determining the basic economic feasibility of the project, especially as compared to extending their current wood basket by truck. Phase II will develop a detailed proposal for moving forward with the project. The study seeks to address the timber availability problem faced by sawmills on the Northern Neck and lack of a robust transportation infrastructure to otherwise transport timber into the area



### Project Title: Southside Food Enterprise Center for Production, Marketing, and Education of Value-Added Food Processing Serving Virginia Farm-Based Producers Applicant: Prince Edward County

Award: \$20,000

Summary: Since 2009, Prince Edward County has been working to provide local food processing options for area producers, primarily though its existing community cannery facility. They have completed a feasibility study on developing a new shared-use kitchen and food-business incubator. AFID Planning Grant funds will be used to develop an operational plan for this facility. A separate application to the Tobacco Commission for funding for facility construction is pending.

### Project Title: Vision for Agriculture and Forestry in Region 2000, 2013-14 Strategic Plan Applicant: Virginia's Region 2000 Local Government Council; includes Amherst, Appomattox, Bedford and Campbell Counties and Lynchburg City

Summary: Funds will be used to bring in a consultant to work with the organization and local partners to develop a regional strategic plan for the agriculture and forestry components of the region's economy. The study will include an inventory of regional agriculture and silviculture assets, SWOT analysis and will seek to develop a plan endorsed by member jurisdictions.

### Project Title: Staunton Feasibility Study of a Commercial and Shared-Use Kitchen Applicant: City of Staunton

Award: \$10,500

Summary: Funds will be used to help analyze the feasibility of a certified, commercial, shared-use kitchen and to research and create a replicable business model. The development of a commercial kitchen was a recommendation from a recent Community Foods Planning Project. The Project's key partners, the City of Staunton and the Staunton Creative Community Fund, have successfully undertaken other local food development projects and are developing a suite of services to assist area food entrepreneurs from start-up through launch. This study will be useful to other communities considering a commercial kitchen as well.

### About the Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund

The creation of the AFID was part of Governor McDonnell's jobs-creation and economic development agenda during the 2012 session of the General Assembly. Funded at \$1 million in each year of the biennium, the AFID is broken into two categories with \$750,000 going to large grants to assist local efforts in expanding current or attracting new agriculture and forestry processing facilities using Virginia-grown products (http://www.vdacs.virginia.gov/agribusiness/afid.shtml) and \$250,000 dedicated to small grants to assist localities in improving local economic development efforts relating to agribusiness (http://www.vdacs.virginia.gov/agribusiness/planning.shtml).

### **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT**

Agreement # Project Title

This Agreement is hereby entered into this 1st day of July, 2013 by <u>Prince Edward County</u>, hereinafter referred to as Awardee, and the <u>Virginia Department of Agriculture & Consumer Services</u>, an agency of the Commonwealth of Virginia, hereinafter referred to as Agency.

**WITNESSETH** that Awardee and Agency, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and agreements contained herein, agree as follows:

### 1. Scope of Services:

Awardee shall be responsible for developing and delivering those actions and results included in the workplan proposed in its grant application (including any amendments/changes proposed by Agency), which is hereby made a part of this Agreement. The approved workplan is attached as Exhibit A.

### 2. Period of Performance:

The agreement shall run from July 1, 2013 through August 31, 2015, unless a written request to extend the Agreement is submitted by Awardee and approved by Agency. Agency shall not provide reimbursement for any expenses incurred after June 30, 2015, unless agreed to in writing by Awardee and Agency.

### 3. Reimbursement:

Agency will provide Awardee a total of up to \$20,000.00 in reimbursement expenses. Of this amount, 75 percent (\$15,000.00) will be reimbursed upon receipt of a valid invoice; the Awardee shall use the invoice template, which is attached as Exhibit B. Each invoice from Awardee must include a description as to how the expenditures submitted for reimbursement are related to the approved project workplan. The remaining 25 percent (\$5,000.00) will be reimbursed upon receipt and approval of the final report and invoice by Agency at the end of the project, unless an alternative reimbursement process is requested in writing by Awardee and agreed to by Agency. Payment by Agency will be made within 30 days of approval of the invoice. In addition, as required in the guidelines established for the Governor's Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund Planning Grants program, which are incorporated by reference into this Agreement, Awardee shall repay to Agency all previously reimbursed funds should Agency determine that Awardee failed to

substantially complete those actions and results included in the approved workplan attached as Exhibit A.

### 5. Travel:

All travel reimbursements requested by Awardee must adhere to Virginia Travel Regulations, which are attached as Exhibit C.

### 6. Audit Requirements:

Agency is required to conduct an audit of the expenditures of all grant funds no later than 60 days after completion of the grant period. Financial records, statistical records, supporting documents, and other records pertinent to this award shall be retained for a period of three years from submission of the final project report. Records that relate to audits, appeals, litigation, or settlement of claims arising out of the performance of the project shall be retained until such audits, appeals, litigation, or claims have been disposed of. Agency or any of its duly authorized representatives shall have access to any pertinent documents, books, papers, and records of the recipient organization to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts.

### 7. Site Visits:

Agency and/or its authorized representatives have the right, at all reasonable times, to make site visits to review project accomplishments and management control systems, and to provide such technical assistance as may be required.

### 8. Withholding Payment:

Agency reserves the right, upon written notice to Awardee, to withhold future payments after a specified date if Awardee fails to comply with any of the conditions of this Agreement. Agency also reserves the right, at Agency's discretion, to withhold payment until Awardee submits additional documentation evidencing how the expenditures submitted relate to the approved workplan.

### 9. Cancellation of Agreement:

Agency reserves the right, upon written notice to Awardee, to terminate the Agreement at any time if Agency determines that Awardee failed to comply with any of the conditions of this Agreement. Termination of the Agreement by Awardee may occur, but only upon submittal of a written request for termination by Awardee, and approval of such termination by Agency.

### 10. Reporting Requirements:

Awardee is required to submit an interim report by June 30, 2014. In addition, Awardee is required to submit a final report no later than August 31, 2015. The template for this final report is attached as Exhibit D.

### 11. Revision of Scope or Objectives:

Awardee must submit a written request for approval by Agency to modify the workplan attached as Exhibit A. Such written request shall include a justification for the workplan change, a description of the revisions proposed, and any budget revisions, if applicable.

The purpose of this memo is to invite you to participate in the development of a Food Enterprise Center which will be regionally beneficial to agricultural based businesses.

Prince Edward County has received a Planning Grant through the Governor's Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund (AFID). The Governor's AFID Planning Grants program was developed to encourage local governments and regional organizations to plan strategically about how they can support and integrate agricultural and forestry-based industries into the community's overall economic development efforts.

In 2011, Prince Edward County transitioned our cannery from a home user only facility to a joint use facility for both home users and commercial operations. The project immediately attracted use and interest from many potential food businesses and organizations. Realizing that the demand for commercial processing of Virginia agricultural products quickly outgrew the limitations of the existing cannery, Prince Edward County agreed to investigate the expansion of the facility's Food Enterprise Center into a new location. A feasibility study has been completed.

Prince Edward County was awarded the AFID Planning Grant to complete an operational plan/business plan for the proposed Food Enterprise Center facility. Prince Edward County's Board of Supervisors has indicated they will provide a building lot in the Prince Edward Business Park for the Food Enterprise Center. In this planning process, there has been much discussion of the importance of working regionally. Therefore, I am evaluating the potential commitment to this project that exists among our adjoining counties.



The Food Enterprise Center proposed in this region will be a model facility as it is likely to be the first food processing facility of this scale to offer commercial processing opportunities in Virginia. The volume of applications to the agriculture industries planning grant speaks to the demand for an agriculture processing facility, and locating it in a region with such a rich foundation in agriculture only makes sense. Currently, many Virginia producers travel to North Carolina to have their value-added food products manufactured. The creation of the Food Enterprise Center will bring existing jobs back to Virginia; benefiting all Virginia agriculture, but especially providing jobs and agribusiness opportunities for our Southside Virginia residents.

An Agriculture Enterprise Development Working Group has been established to create a center for production, marketing and education of Value-Added Food Processing which will serve Virginia farm-based producers. The work group is comprised of professionals representing private and public interests and each has expertise in relevant areas of the agriculture or food processing industry.

Each of your counties is invited to join this effort. The Planning Grant awards \$20,000 grant funds to the project and requires a 1:1 match from Prince Edward County and its partners. The match funds can be comprised of 50% in-kind (\$10,000 in-kind) and must include a 50% cash match (\$10,000 in cash match). Prince Edward County agreed to provide this match for a project to develop a Food Enterprise Center. The project funds will secure a consultant to prepare the organizational and operational plan documents necessary to construct, operate and maintain the Food Enterprise Center. The facility is proposed as a publicly owned, privately operated facility. Part of completing these operational plans is to determine the regional support and partnership commitments for the facility.

I would like to offer two ways which you can be involved:

Are there building lots or existing buildings in your County which would be suitable for consideration as a food processing facility (potential contaminants from prior uses are considered in this evaluation). If you have a prospective location for the facility and would like to be part of this planning process to have the locations evaluated, please advise me as to your County's willingness to share in the in-kind or cash match requirements of the grant.

OR, if your county is not interested in contributing to the match requirements at this time, but supports this project endeavor as a facility which will have significant, regionally beneficial results, then please provide a letter of support for the development of a Food Enterprise Center in Prince Edward County.

Your expression of intent in response to this invitation is respectfully requested by Friday, June 7 or as soon as practical if you do not have a Board meeting before that date. ### Summary:

- a. Piedmont Court Services (PCS) Lease The lease agreement between PCS and SRP Corporation expired on June 30, 2013. The lease contains an option to renew for 5 additional years. Both parties wish to renew the lease with minor changes. The lease is attached. The only change is a 4.9% increase in the lease payment, is the first increase in 10 years. Recommend the Board authorize the County Administrator to execute the proposed Lease Agreement.
- b. Legislative Committee Annually, the Chairman appoints a Legislative Committee that is tasked with updating the County's Legislative Priorities for Board approval. These priorities will be communicated to legislators, VACo, and the CRC for consideration in regional and statewide legislative priorities. The 2012 Legislative Committee was comprised of Supervisors McKay, Gantt, and Wilck. Additionally, the Board may wish to consider hosting a Legislative meeting as it did last fall. Recommend the Chairman appoint a Legislative Committee.
- c. Local Government Challenge Grant The Virginia Commission for the Arts notified Prince Edward County it was awarded a Local Government Challenge Grant in the amount of \$2,494 for FY14. Annually the County applies for and receives this grant which is provided to the Longwood Center for the Visual Arts. As required by the grant agreement the County must provide a matching amount. Both the grant and the County's match are contained in the approved budget, no action is required.
- d. Virginia Aqua-Farmers Network Contract Using grant funds Prince Edward has obtained a walk-in freezer to store food products at the Cannery. The freezer is being used by various commercial vendors with the Virginia Aqua-Farmers Network, LLC. being the primary user. The Network is concerned with loss of inventory if the cannery loses power and his product unthaws. The Network has attempted to obtain insurance for the loss but cannot because it does not own the freezer. The County researched the possibility of obtaining insurance with the Network reimbursing the County for the cost of the insurance. The County cannot obtain insurance because if the product is lost the County does not suffer any actual loss. To break from this cycle VACORP recommended the County sign a contract with the Network, in which the County would be responsible for reimbursing the Network for any loss due to spoilage. The County would recoup the cost of the insurance policy (approximately \$75 for \$50,000 of coverage) from users of the freezer. Recommend the Board authorize the County Administrator to execute a contact with the Network whereby the County assumes liability for the loss of any food inventory stored in the

County's walk-in Freezer and obtain a liability insurance plan from VACORP to cover such a loss.

- e. Virginia Local Disability Program A new local Disability Program offered through VRS is a mandatory part of the new hybrid retirement plan that will apply to most new employees hired on or after January 1, 2014. Local governments can opt out of the program but must provide a comparable employer-paid program. Local governments who wish not to have VRS provide administer this program have until September 1, 2013 to pass an opt-out resolution but can ask for an extension until November 1, 2013. A regional information session is being planned for the near future to provide attendees information about both the new Healthcare laws and an alternative Disability program developed by VACORP which local governments may choose instead of the VRS program. The time and date of this information session has not been established. Recommend the Board authorize the County Administrator to request an extension until November 1, 2013 to provide the opt-out resolution to VRS
- **LEMPG Grant** Prince Edward received an e-mail on July 1, 2013 advising the County of the upcoming FY 14 Local Emergency Management Program Grant (LEMPG). This is an annual grant which has been \$9,436 for at least the last 8 years. The grant requires a dollar for dollar match which can be in-kind. The majority of the grant funds have been used to supplement the salary of the Local Emergency Service Coordinator to compensate the office holder for the additional work requirements, the 24 hour on-call duty status, and the ongoing educational requirements. Mrs. Puckett assumed the duties as the Acting Emergency Services Coordinator in November 2012. As was outlined earlier, she has completed all of the FEMA and VDEM required training (with exception of IS 400, which has a six-month required wait), has developed a strong working relationship with our Emergency First Responder namely the Volunteer Fire Departments, local law enforcement, the Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad, Centra Southside Community Hospital, Hampden-Sydney College, VDEM, and our regional local government partners. Additionally, she has outlined an extensive list of priority items that need to be completed in FY14 like the EOP update, development of a COOP, activation of the LEPC, etc. The deadline for grant submissions is August 9, 2013. Recommend the Board appoint Ms. Puckett as County Emergency Services Coordinator, and authorize the County Administrator to submit all necessary documentation to VDEM to request the grant and use the funds to supplement the salary of this position for the required extra hours of work.

THIS AGREEMENT OF LEASE, made and entered into this 1st day of July, 2013 by and between SRP, LLC, party of the first part, hereinafter referred to as "Landlord", and PIEDMONT COURT SERVICES, parties of the second part, hereinafter referred to as "Tenants".

### WITNESSETH:

That for and in consideration of the provisions, stipulations and conditions hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto, as follows:

- 5. Landlord will be responsible for normal repairs to the heating, plumbing, electrical systems, and basic structure unless due to negligence or misuse on the part of the Tenants.
- 6. Tenants are to replace all broken glass and light bulbs. Tenants are responsible for changing air filters for the HVAC system on routine basis.
- 7. The property is not to be Sublette.
- 8. Tenants accept the premises as they are without any representation as to its suitability or desirability for the purposes contemplated and Tenants shall maintain the premises in good repair and good order, normal wear and tear expected. Tenants shall not make any change in the structure of the said building without first obtaining the

This letter is to notify you of the decision by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) to terminate H.O.P.E. Community Services, Inc. as a local subgrantee for Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP). WAP funds are used to improve the energy efficiency of low-income homes. H.O.P.E.'s service area included the counties of Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottaway and Prince Edward.

Weatherization services are funded from two funding sources: 1) WAP funds from the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), which is the primary funding source and regulatory authority; and 2) Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which is passed-through the Virginia Department of Social Services and to DHCD.

The final decision to terminate the program at H.O.P.E. was based on a number of financial weaknesses shown by the agency that DHCD believed could put the WAP and LIHEAP funds at significant risk. These issues led to monitoring findings that H.O.P.E has not resolved. We recognize that this termination leaves a gap in weatherization services in these areas.

The purpose of this communication is to share with you our plan for temporarily restoring those services until a permanent service provider is selected. The State has obtained from H.O.P.E. all applicant files which were in various approval stages. As required by DOE, a bidders list will be compiled and services will be contracted by the State to bidders based on criteria that ensures their ability to deliver quality services in a timely manner. All pending WAP applicants will be served in priority order as they normally would but the work will be performed by alternating agencies from the approved bidder's list.



DHCD had already announced plans for an open application process to occur this winter where all interested current WAP providers, as well as any new qualifying eligible non-profits organizations, can apply to serve as a WAP provider. This process currently is under development and should be finalized this fall. One of the key evaluative criteria that will be required as part of the application process, will be a letter of support from the local government in the proposed service area(s).

You may find that over the next few weeks and months a number of agencies may contact you for your support. I urge you to carefully consider your options before lending your written support to one agency over another. You may wish to consider factors such as administrative capacity, financial capacity and security, trained technical staff, appropriate licensing and start up time/resources.

We look forward to the continued provision of weatherization services in your county. It is undeniable the benefit that results from these energy conservation measures in saving low-income households money on their energy bills and creating a safer and healthier living environment.

First, I want to say thank you to Mr. Bartlett for his attentiveness to the issues with HOPE Community Services. He felt that perhaps it would help to update County Administrators on the status of HOPE Community Services, which receives Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds that flow into your county. The purpose of these funds is to help alleviate poverty and increase self-sufficiency for low-income families. Communities across the Commonwealth use CSBG funds to support programs connected with:

- Child care
- Community and economic development
- Education
- Employment
- Head Start
- Health and nutrition
- Housing and related services
- Special populations (including the elderly, ex-offenders and the homeless)
- Transportation

As the Director of the Office on Volunteerism and Community Service at Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS), I thought it would be helpful for you to know the recent actions we have taken with HOPE. On June 14<sup>th</sup> VDSS suspended all CSBG funds to HOPE Community Services. We recommended HOPE Board of Directors voluntarily rescind their designation as a community action agency. On June 21<sup>st</sup> a second letter was sent that announced that the Virginia Department of Social Services was formally beginning the process to recommend that the Governor rescind HOPE Community Services designation as a community action agency. This is a lengthy process that will delay citizens receiving needed services. Should the HOPE Board vote to voluntarily to rescind their designation, the formal process will stop and we will immediately begin addressing service delivery. Copies of both letters are attached to this email.

The HOPE Board of Directors has become divided. Like Mr. Bartlett, our office understands that on Thursday the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors voted to voluntarily rescind their designation; however, on Friday when the Executive Committee brought their recommendation before the full Board, the meeting became disruptive and disbanded prior to a vote. Today, the Board met and again the meeting got disruptive. More than ½ of the Board walked out of today's meeting which from multiple reports, resulted in a group without a quorum; therefore, no official action was taken on rescinding HOPE's designation as a community action agency.

We know there are multiple issues that HOPE's Board of Directors are trying to solve; however, VDSS remains focused on the CSBG funds and HOPE's designation as a community action agency. Below details the actions and concerns Mr. Bartlett raised:

- 1. All CSBG funds to HOPE Community Services will remain suspended---regardless of HOPE's leadership.
- 2. VDSS will not begin the process of identifying a new funding agency until either a) the Board of Directors of HOPE voluntarily votes to rescind its designation; or b) the formal process has been completed which is outlined in the attached Informational Memorandum in conjunction with all federal and state laws that rescinds the designation for cause. As far as I know, this has never been done in Virginia and as Mr. Bartlett explained could be a very long process.
- 3. Concerning the issue raised that HOPE will dissolve and reconstitute itself with the same leadership, if HOPE dissolves, VDSS will begin the process to recommend to the Governor another designated community action program. According to Administrative Code 22VAC40-901-60, "To be designated as a community action agency, a community organization's purpose shall include working for the reduction of poverty and the revitalization of low-income communities through the identification of local needs and the provision of a broad range of services to meet those needs. The organization must have the recommendation of the governing body of the localities to be served, must be financially viable, and must meet administrative standards, financial management standards, and other requirements established by federal and state laws and regulations..."

Bottom line, VDSS wants CSBG funds flowing into your county to help citizens. As stated above, the fastest way for that to happen is for HOPE's Board of Director's to voluntarily rescind their designation as a community action agency. I hope this update has been helpful and please feel free to contact me if I can be of any assistance. I appreciate the role you play in insuring citizens receive needed services that CSBG funds provide.

Mrs. Inge I am writing to inform you of the action/inaction of the Board of Directors of HOPE. Early last week the Executive Committee of the Hope Board meet and voted to approve the resolution to voluntarily rescind their designation as a Community Action Agency. The full Board met on Thursday June 27, 2013 to take action on the same resolution. At that meeting private citizens attended and at the urging of a small number of Hope Board members they became so disruptive the Board was unable to conduct any business and adjourned without taking any action. The Board met again this morning and the same events happened again which resulted in the HOPE Board once again not taking any action. At this point I am told several of the Board members left but those who stayed, which was not a quorum, actually voted to remove the Director and may have taken other action. If you receive notice that any action has been taken by the HOPE Board I would be highly skeptical. Several members of the HOPE Board are so frustrated it would not surprise me if many of them refuse to attend any more meetings.

The private citizens disrupting the meeting are doing so to prevent the rescinding of the designation of HOPE as a Community Action Agency. They are under the belief that HOPE can somehow resolve the issues they are facing and continue to receive funding from your organization and provide services to the region.

To add even more confusion there are some who are worried that HOPE will dissolve and merely reconstitute itself with the same leadership and continue to receive funding and just continue to operate with all the same issues. Is this a possibility?

As you can see there is much confusion on the part of both the HOPE Board and the public.

It is my understanding that your organization is going to recommend that HOPE's designation as a Community Action Agency be withdrawn and to cease all funding to HOPE. Additionally, I understand that if HOPE voluntarily rescinds its designation as a Community Action Agency your organization can move forward with finding an organization in the region to continue providing the services to the citizens of this region. But if HOPE does not voluntarily rescind its designation that the process the state will have to go through to pull the designation from HOPE could take as long as 2 years during which time no local agency could receive the designation meaning funding would not be available to assist citizens in our region.

I think it would be very helpful if you could provide an update detailing the action the state will take and answering the issues listed above.

The Virginia Department of Social Services remains gravely concerned with the governance and financial viability of Hope Community Services. As a Board of Directors, I know that you share our desire to ensure the citizens of Farmville, Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward receive the services that CSBG funds provide. Effectively immediately, no more CSBG invoices will be processed for Hope. Both the Hope Board of Directors and VDSS has a fiduciary responsibility to be good stewards of public funds; therefore, looking at multiple breaches of your contract, we are suspending all funds. Major issues which led to this decision include: an unacceptable A-133 audit, no proof of current liability insurance, allegations of fiscal mismanagement, Board minutes are not current, as required. Of most concern is our lack of confidence that services are being delivered to the residents of your community.

Last year, Dan Deane met with the Hope Board of Directors. Based on HOPE's financial stability, its ability to continue to adequately administer and deliver services, along with the ability to make certain that adequate financial controls and oversight are in place to ensure that the agency's finances are in order, he recommended that the agency voluntarily rescind their designation as a community action agency. The Virginia Department of Social Services still strongly recommends that the Board follow through on this action. This is a decision that must be made by the Hope Board of Directors. While we recognize this is a hard decision for the Board, it is a decision that will expeditiously get services back to the citizens of your community. The most critical part of this discussion needs to center around whether or not the citizens are getting the services they need.

While we remain confident that the Hope Board of Directors will make the right decision and voluntarily rescind their designation as a community action agency, please know that within the next week an official letter will come from the Virginia Department of Social Services that will formally start the process to rescind Hope's designation as a community action agency for cause. This will be a lengthy process delaying the provision of desperately need services to the citizens in your service area. Should the Board vote to voluntarily to rescind their designation, the formal process will stop and we can immediately begin addressing service delivery.

We recognize this is a difficult decision for Hope Board of Directors but we are sure you share our desire to look beyond the organization and see that the community needs you to step up and make the hard decision that will get services to the people in need. We eagerly await your decision.

We strongly recommended that the agency voluntarily rescind their designation as a community action agency. While VDSS still hopes this will be the case, in accordance with Section 678C of the Coats Human Services Reauthorization Act of 1998 (Public Law 105-285) and Section 2.2-5407D of the *Code of Virginia*, this letter will begin the process to recommend that the Governor rescind Hope Community Services designation as a community action agency.

Federal and State Law provide guidelines and requirements for administering the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG). These include criteria and processes used to terminate the designation and funding of existing community action agencies.

As stated previously, should the Board vote to voluntarily to rescind their designation, the formal process will stop and we can immediately begin addressing service delivery for the citizens of Farmville, Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward.
