- This is an opportunity for each individual member of the Board to express his/her own personal opinion in response to a citizen's concerns on matters of public interest.
- "Board of Supervisors Comments" is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.
- The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.
- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

Cindy Koether, Lockett District, stated that Section 22.1-93 of the Code of Virginia now includes a requirement by law which took effect July 1, 2015, that all School Boards post their budgets on their web site in line item form. She stated it is on their site but difficult to find and is not in line item form. She asked the Board of Supervisors to require the School Board to be in compliance with this new law.

Richard Altice, Hampden District, said citizens are concerned about the lack of high speed internet service in the county; he asked about the company that had begun a program regarding bringing internet to the rural areas and how much money has Prince Edward County invested.

Chairman Simpson stated the issue will be researched.

Carol Caruso, Keysville, requested assistance regarding issues in the Piedmont Court Services office. Supervisor Timmons said it sounded like a personnel issue and that may not be discussed in an open Board meeting. He requested Ms. Caruso speak with Mr. Bartlett about her issues. In Re: Highway Matters

HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Simpson opened the public hearing.

Mrs. Sharon Lee Carney, Economic Development Director, stated the Economic Development

office has been working to determine potential properties to be added or deleted to the County's existing

Enterprise Zone area. As a result of this survey, the owners of 21 properties, consisting of 231.01 acres +/-,

have given permission to be added to the Prince Edward County Enterprise Zone. There are no properties

recommended for deletion and there are no recommended changes to properties within the Farmville Town

limits.

With the approval of this proposed Boundary Amendment, Prince Edward County will have

approximately 1,231 acres remaining to designate for future development from the original designation of

3,840 acres. Prince Edward County's Enterprise Zone designation, awarded by the Virginia Department of

Housing & Community Development (DHCD) in 2000, will expire in 2020.

Supervisor Jones stated two great examples of the Enterprise Zone benefits are in Tharpe Trucking

and the Farmer's Daughter in the Rice area.

A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR THE AMENDMENT OF THE PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY ENTERPRISE ZONE

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward is a member of a joint regional Enterprise Zone #48 with the Counties of Charlotte, Lunenburg and Prince Edward; and

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward is seeking to expand its Enterprise Zone boundaries by 20 properties consisting of 230.01+/- acres (19 properties in the Prospect area and 1 property in the Rice area), whose owners have agreed to be added to the Prince Edward County's Enterprise Zone Program in Prince Edward County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia that this Resolution authorizes the County of Prince Edward to submit the above referenced application to the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development effective January 1, 2015; and

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward authorizes the County Administrator and/or Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to submit all necessary information to apply for an amendment to Prince Edward County's Enterprise Zone Boundary and to meet all other program administrative and reporting requirements.

2015 State of the County

WELCOME

Tonight the entire Board will assist in presenting the State of The County Address. Each Board member will present a section of the Address. It takes participation from the entire Board to shape the policies adopted by the Board. Thus, it is only fitting that each Board member participates in this presentation. On behalf of my fellow board members and the administrative staff of Prince Edward County, I hope you will find this report informative.

INTRODUCTION

Prince Edward County is 261 years old. Our early settlers were hard working people, planting seeds they hoped would yield crops to provide for their families. They faced adversity and conquered many obstacles. But by working together and being creative they built a prosperous community. The ingredients of sustaining a successful community are the same. We must embrace and welcome change, develop new approaches in order to remain relevant and prosperous as we move further into the 21st century. We must work together, not just within our own County but within our region and our Commonwealth to avail ourselves of the new opportunities and to collectively solve problems.

Across the Nation, the Commonwealth and even in our adjacent Counties, some communities are struggling while their leaders wait hopelessly on an ever shrinking supply of federal and state

dollars to meet transportation, education and infrastructure needs. In some communities that has meant reducing or eliminating important public services.

Here in Prince Edward County the Board of Supervisors has taken steps to make County government more efficient and effective, in order to serve residents at the lowest possible cost to you, the taxpayer. That has meant holding fast to a simple principle: address the needs of today, without leaving problems and bills for the future. We have been resolute about taking action that will benefit the long-term interests of Prince Edward County and our citizens.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Having a strong financial position, utilizing sound financial principals, which includes having adequate reserves and controlled debt and matching operational expenses to current revenue streams, is critical to good governance. A strong financial position is not a goal unto itself. The financial position of a County, in and of itself provides no services or benefits to our citizens. What it does allow is the ability to fund such services and benefits i.e. – public safety, education and quality of life factors.

The challenge for the Board of Supervisors is weighing the competing constituencies. Balancing the desire by some for increased services with equally important demand from others to maintain or even reduce our tax rates.

County revenues, especially for education and Social Services, are impacted by the economic health at the federal and state level; we must be cognizant of these impacts. Reduced Federal and State revenues over the last several years have produced our greatest challenges and the greatest impacts on our citizens. The loss of state funds is one of the primary reasons Prince Edward County is faced with an expense for housing local prisoners that exceeds \$1 million annually when it was zero only three years ago. The Schools have also seen significant losses in state and federal revenues which have negatively impacted our educational system.

To help respond to this lost revenue the Board of Supervisors formed a Finance Committee. Last fiscal year this committee reviewed in great detail the County's revenues and expenses. The results were that expenses were reduced by almost \$500,000 and revenues increased almost \$100,000. These adjustments were carried forward into the current Fiscal Year.

The County is in a solid financial position. The cash balance on June 30, 2015 was approximately \$10.4 million. But of that amount almost \$8 million is needed for either cash-flow purposes or is contained in various funds whose cash is restricted. Additionally, approximately \$1 million of the reserve is used to balance the FY16 budget. Subtracting these amounts from the cash balance leaves only \$1.4 million of unrestricted cash on June 30, 2016. Addressing the structural imbalance of the FY16 budget, must be a priority over the course of the next year.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The only ways to solve our budgetary imbalance are by increasing revenues, decreasing expenses or a combination of the two. Decreasing expenses on top of the decreases that have already occurred will impact the ability of County departments to serve our citizens and could possibly mean less funding for our schools.

For our citizens the most advantageous way to solve the budget imbalance is to increase revenues. Not by increasing taxes but by increasing the County's economic base. In other words by growing our way out of this problem. This process has already begun. We can all see the increased construction activity within the Town and County. These construction projects are pumping millions of dollars into the local economy.

We have several businesses that have already announced expansions but have either not completed construction or have just recently opened and have not been included on our tax rolls or expanded their workforce. Some of these are Centra, Tharpe Trucking, Luck Stone, Adams

Construction (Asphalt Plant), Lapp Metals, Wilck's Lake Sheds, Walk to Campus and Power Secure.

Last year the County, to include the Town of Farmville, saw 245 net new jobs created and 7 net new businesses. Four businesses received job creation grants and two received real property investment grants from the state. This expansion trend is continuing. In FY15 we submitted 19 business proposals from referrals obtained from the Virginia Economic Development Partnership, Virginia Growth Alliance and direct contact with Prince Edward County. Several of these prospects are still being worked. This was the greatest level of activity since at least 2007.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention the benefits provided to Prince Edward County and our citizens by being the home of Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney College and Centra Southside Hospital. Having these three entities as anchors to our economy provides great stability and growth potential to our County. All three have on-going construction projects that are pumping millions of dollars into our local economy, which will continue into the future.

MANOR

Another positive development recently completed was a County-led resolution of various legal entanglements surrounding The Manor development. As with most development projects when things don't go as planned, the various participants scramble to protect their own interests. This often results in judgements, liens and lawsuits which only serve to further stifle development. This has been the scenario of The Manor for the last six years. While The Manor is a private development, the Board of Supervisors realized only the County was in a position to bring all the parties together to reach a compromise to resolve the legal issues which would allow development to move forward. The Board directed the County Attorney to represent the County and mediate between all the parties to resolve the issues hampering development of the land. Mr. Ennis is to be commended for his work. With these issues resolved we can be hopeful this land will see the development initially envisioned which will add to the expansion of the tax base. Even before all of the agreements have been finalized people are talking about construction and a "For Sale Sign" has been erected on the property.

The other good news is that the issue of the Golf Course ownership has also been resolved, which will create more stability for The Manor development and bodes well for the future.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The safety of our citizens is a top priority for the Board of Supervisors. We expend almost \$3.5 million of County funds on the various departments tasked with ensuring the safety of our citizens. To obtain the greatest bang for the taxpayer's buck, the County has long cultivated partnerships with the volunteer fire departments and the volunteer rescue squads. There are approximately 200 volunteer firefighters and 80 EMS members serving Prince Edward County. These departments serve a vital function for our community and by the use of volunteers provide a higher level of service at less cost than if the County provided these services with paid staff. In recognition of that contribution the County provides over \$600,000 to the seven Volunteer Fire Departments and the four Rescue Squads to help ensure they have the training and equipment they need.

The Fire departments respond to approximately 900 – 1,000 calls each year. The rescue squads respond to almost 4,000 calls (with an average response time of eleven minutes.) Our fellow citizens dedicate a considerable amount of time, not only running calls but also training to ensure they are able to provide a high level of service. Each Fire Department conducts from 120 – 240 hours of in-house training each year. This is in addition to the 146 hours required to become a Class 1 firefighter. Many firefighters have taken other training such as hazardous materials operation, technical rescue and vehicle extrication. The training requirements for rescue squad volunteers are even greater. A basic EMT must have a minimum of 150 hours of training and a paramedic must have 1,000 hours.

The Sheriff's Department received their initial accreditation status in 2014. There are 34 staff members in the Sheriff's office which consists of 32 sworn full-time employees, 3 sworn part-time employees and 1 part-time personnel member provided by the Commonwealth of Virginia Workforce Project. The volume of work for the Sheriff is hard to believe. In 2014 they answered 8,152 calls for service, made 3,875 arrests, served 2,736 Uniform Summons, 2,735 Traffic Summons, 8,587 Civil papers and ran 446 transports.

The Sheriff believes in building bonds with the citizens and provides support and services through character building programs such as DARE, Class Action, and drug awareness events. Other community programs include Project Lifesaver, Highway Safety Events, Senior Safety, TRIAD and Neighborhood Watch Programs.

In FY14 the Board approved the Sheriff's request to fund an At-Will over-time program. This program has been an overwhelming success. It is a self-funding program that not only has increased traffic safety but also frees deputies from routine traffic duties to concentrate on crime prevention, solving crimes and increasing visibility and availability of officers throughout the County. It effectively increases the number of deputies on each shift. The result has been a 33% drop in break-ins from 2012 – 2014. In the first half of 2015 there has been an additional drop in break-ins of 28.5%.

Piedmont Regional Jail

Prior to FY13 the County did not have to pay for the housing of our prisoners in the regional jail. This was due to the fact the jail housed approximately 330 illegal immigrants. When those detainees were moved from the Jail that loss of revenue coupled with the state decreasing the inmate per diem from \$28 per day to \$12 per day, has caused the jail to go from a revenue generator to a major expense item. In FY16, it is estimated the County will expend almost \$1.3 million to house our prisoners. This amount would be substantially greater if not for the hard work of the Jail Superintendent. The Superintendent has been able to increase the number of inmates from outside the regional partners to generate revenue. We are currently housing about 130 Federal inmates, 85 from Culpepper and 50 from Powhatan. The Superintendent is constantly searching for additional inmates to house.

It is estimated revenues will increase by almost \$800,000 for FY16. While that is good news, it is almost exactly offset by increased costs. The cost increases are primarily the result of increased medical and pharmaceutical expenses. Even with the cost increases the Piedmont Regional Jail has the lowest cost per inmate day of any jail in the Commonwealth. The per inmate day average cost statewide is \$75, while the cost for Piedmont Regional Jail is \$44.

LANDFILL & WASTE COLLECTION

Prince Edward County owns its own Sanitary Landfill and contracts the operation to a local business. Sanitary Landfills are disposal sites for non-hazardous solid waste. Hazardous materials are not allowed in our landfill. We take seriously our duty to protect the environment surrounding the landfill. We meet all DEQ regulations and work closely with an environmental engineering firm to ensure the safe operation of our Landfill. In addition to the landfill the County operates 7 convenience/recycling sites where our citizens can take their trash and recyclables.

Due to ever stricter environmental regulations, the cost to construct and operate Landfills has increased dramatically over the last 20 years. The County spends about \$1.2 million each year operating the landfill and convenience sites. Traditionally the County has to construct a new landfill cell every 3 or 4 years. But because of lower waste volumes caused by the downturn in the economy coupled with better compaction rates and better oversight of daily ground cover by the operator it will be almost 8 years since the last time we built a new cell. The new cell will need to be built next summer at a cost of approximately \$1.4 million. These funds are available in a separate budget fund called the Landfill Construction Fund.

On June 30, 2015 that fund had about \$2.1 million in cash. Thus, there should be no impact on the tax payers for the construction cost of the new cell. Looking down the road at the next ten years the County will have to expend several million dollars to complete final closure on three landfill cells. It is estimated by 2023 we will have expended all of the reserves of the Landfill Construction Fund and will actually need an additional \$1.1 million which will increase to almost \$4 million by 2027. We are monitoring this situation and will develop a plan to handle this cost.

REASSESSMENT

Every six years the County conducts a reassessment of all real estate in the County. The County hires a professional assessment firm to conduct the reassessment. That process was started in 2013 and was completed in 2014. The only remaining item is for the Board of Equalization to complete their review of any requests they receive from citizens.

The results of the reassessment are that in total, Real Estate values in the County fell almost 8%. In General the value of residential properties declined the most followed by agricultural land. Commercial properties actually saw an increase of almost 7%. Because of this decrease an equalized tax rate would have been \$.51. The Board realized that many citizens are still being impacted by the recession that gripped the Country. As a result the Board only approved a tax rate of \$.49 for calendar year 2015. That rate is actually a tax decrease and will result in the County collecting \$300,000 less in real estate tax this Fiscal Year than last year. Almost 70% of residential properties will see a tax decrease while almost 60% of agricultural parcels will see a tax decrease.

PLANNING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

After several years of flux the Planning Office is beginning to stabilize. A new Director of Planning & Community Development began work this year. Mr. Rob Fowler has over 25 years of experience in planning. His last position was with the City of Lynchburg. He has started a review of the County zoning and subdivision ordinances to ensure they are in compliance with the recent changes adopted by the General Assembly.

Last year the County implemented state mandated stormwater regulations pertaining to plan review and inspections. Most of the Counties in the Commonwealth abdicated those responsibilities to DEQ but Prince Edward County has partnered with the Town of Farmville and is running our own program. We believe by running our own program we will be seen as more business friendly than those communities relying on DEQ. This will allow us to review and inspect construction plans instead of forcing developers to submit plans to DEQ and then having to wait for the state to complete their review.

VDOT

Over the last year VDOT has completed several road maintenance projects and bridge repairs. The bridges on Darlington Heights and Twin Bridges Road have been reconstructed while a new bridge was constructed on Mt. Pleasant Road. Current conditions record that 92% of the pavement on roads in the County are in fair or better condition pavement conditions are at 92%, VDOT's goal is 82%. Ninety-two and a half percent (92.5%) of the County's 134 Bridges are rated as either non-deficient or needing some repair but are not structurally deficient while 7.5% (10) are rated as structurally deficient but are safe for travel, VDOT's goal is 92%. VDOT rates the ride quality of the roads in Prince Edward County at 97% while the goal is 85%. Ride quality refers to the irregularities or roughness of the pavement.

The General Assembly passed two pieces of legislation that will dramatically change how transportation dollars are spent. House Bill Two (HB2) will change how funding controlled by the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) will be dispersed. Projects will be scored according to key factors, which are: congestion mitigation, economic development, accessibility, safety, environmental quality and land use. The second bill is HB1887. This bill applies the same factors mentioned above to District funding. This allows projects to compete against others only within the Lynchburg District.

Projects can be submitted if they are located along a Corridor of statewide significance (there are only a few), regional networks and urban development areas. Prince Edward is fortunate to have one of the few Corridors of statewide significance - Route 460; this will allow Prince Edward to compete for funding. The regional network definition is still being developed and there are no urban development areas in the County.

In the near future the following construction projects will be started: (1) Route 643, Back Hampden-Sydney road – it is currently under construction and is estimated to be completed in May 2016, (2) Route 725, Watson Blvd – is currently being planned with construction later this summer and (3) Route 632, Falkland Road – the bridge over Bush River will be replaced beginning in early 2016, the road will be closed approximately 3 months.

The County is continuing to work with VDOT to eliminate unpaved roads. On July 1, 2003 VDOT initiated the Rural Rustic Road Programs which reserved state funding to pave state roads that are unpaved. Prince Edward County has two roads that will be paved using this program. Route 725, Watson Blvd will be paved this summer and Route 628, Campbell Crossing will be paved next summer.

Several areas will be resurfaced. Various locations in Prospect, Tuggle, Farmville and Rice are scheduled for 2015. All ramps of the Farmville Bypass will be resurfaced in 2016 and 2.3 miles of Green Bay Road will also be resurfaced in 2016.

Finally, approximately 100 lane miles will be resurfaced in 2015 and 64 miles in 2016.

SCHOOLS

There is no question the Prince Edward County Public Schools have failed to reach the level of achievement we would like. Currently, all three of the schools are accredited with warning and the Middle School is designated a focus school.

The High School met all accreditation Benchmarks except for one – mathematics. Math scores missed the benchmark by one point.

The Middle School met two of the accreditation benchmarks – History and Science but did not for two others – English and Math. The English benchmark was missed by 7 points. The Math benchmark was missed by 6 points. Being designated a Focus School means one or more proficiency gap groups did not meet expectations in reading and math.

The Elementary School met two of the accreditation benchmarks – History and Science but did not for – English and Math. For English the Benchmark was missed by 9 points. For Math the Benchmark was missed by 4 points.

But the School system has made strides in improving academic performance. Attached is a summary of some of the actions taken by the School Board to improve performance. Its detail and length precludes reading it completely tonight but I urge our citizens to read this document, it will be posted on the County's web site. I will draw attention to some of the highlights.

To improve the learning climate and student discipline various programs have been implemented. The Leader in me program has been implemented in the Elementary and Middle Schools. This program is intended to develop a more positive learning environment. The Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program which addresses bullying and aggressive behaviors has been adopted and a School Resource Officer has been assigned to the Middle School.

Actions taken to improve academic performance include: realignment of Middle School math classes to focus more attention on basic math skills, reassignment of teachers to better match their skills to class needs, targeted professional development for teachers, strengthening the afterschool

remediation and tutoring programs, providing a more focused summer remediation program, reducing the amount of testing to allow more time for teaching students, hiring math and reading coaches to support teachers at the Middle School and the use of new benchmark tests that are better aligned with the SOLs.

At the Career and Technical School the number of students earning industry certifications increased from 110 to 180, a 39% increase. In 2013 the school division earned full accreditation by AdvancedED. This accreditation is only held by 40 of the 132 school divisions in Virginia.

The Prince Edward County Public Schools are actively partnering with Longwood University. The attachment lists 14 ongoing examples of partnership programs with Longwood University.

Since 2013 the High School graduation rate has improved from 76% to 87% and drop outs have decreased from 18.3% to 9.8%

Over the last 10 years student enrollment has declined by 565 students. The loss of students, reduced state support for education and reduced federal funding have caused a reduction of over \$4 million in the School budget. To compensate for this loss of revenue 78 positions have been eliminated in the last 6 years. The reduction in staff has caused a reduction in programs and services provided to students.

While state and federal funds have been reduced the amount of funds provided by the Board of Supervisors has actually increased the past 5 years by \$348,616. This amount combined with the decrease in debt service of \$335,329 over the same period means the School Board has an additional \$668,945 of local funds it can use for operations.

The public can be assured the Board of Supervisors is deeply concerned with the performance of the Schools. We stand ready to assist the School Board in raising the level of performance.

CONCLUSION

This has been a lengthy presentation. The responsibilities of County Government are numerous and often complex. The citizens of Prince Edward County deserve an accounting of the State of The County and this was an attempt to provide information to our citizens. We realize this report was not all encompassing it merely touched on the highlights. There is simply not enough time to discuss every aspect of County operations.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Sheriff's Office At-Will Overtime Program

Mr. Bartlett stated that at the January 13, 2015 meeting, the Board approved a 12-month extension of the "At-Will" traffic enforcement program with updates every six months. For the second half of FY15, this program has cost a total of \$20,571 to include FICA costs. This program was instituted at the start of FY14 thus the FY13 revenues serve as the base year for revenue collection. During FY13 collections

averaged \$8,265 per month or \$49,590 for six months. Collections for the second half of FY15 have been

\$86,647. This is an increase of \$37,057 when compared to the base year and exceeds expenses by \$16,486.

Mr. Bartlett stated on a financial basis the program funds itself. This program provides benefits

other than financial and traffic enforcement. It frees deputies from routine traffic duties to concentrate on

other law enforcement duties - crime prevention, solving crimes and increasing visibility and availability of

law enforcement personnel throughout the County. It is a no-cost program that effectively increases the

number of deputies on shift.

Supervisor Timmons asked for an assessment from the Sheriff's Office on the program.

Major David Wilmoth stated there is great benefit to the public regarding safety issues and is not a

financial burden to the County. He added the program brought in approximately \$200,000 in fines and has

also been a deterrent to break-ins in the County. Some discussion followed.

Supervisor Gray commended the Sheriff's Department for their quick action.

Strategic Planning Session

Mr. Bartlett stated that during conversations about the State of the County, many Board members discussed the need for updating the Board's strategic vision for the County. The Board may wish to consider scheduling a strategic planning session in late 2015; this could serve as guidance for the budget discussions next spring.

In Re: Finance Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Finance Committee met June 15, 2015 to discuss the request from the Town of Farmville for assistance in funding the annual Fourth of July Fireworks even known as "Fireworks After

Dark" held at the Farmville Airport. The Committee is comprised of Supervisor Cooper-Jones (Chair), Supervisor Jones, Supervisor Simpson and Supervisor Timmons.

The Town provided the Committee a summary of the cost of the event and an advertisement describing the various entertainment activities. The total cost for the event is \$19,450. No estimate of revenues from Donations was provided but at the June 9, 2015 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, it was stated that donations were raised from local people and businesses. There is a \$5 per vehicle charge at the gate; this fee is collected by the Boy Scouts who are allowed to keep 25% of the gate fee. The Town Manager estimated \$2,800 is collected.

The Committee noted that \$9,200 remained in the FY15 contingency line. The Committee unanimously approved a recommendation to the full Board that \$4,600 be provided to the Town from the Contingency line from the FY15 budget to help support the 2015 Fireworks After Dark event. Additionally, the Committee recommends the remainder of the FY15 Contingency fund (\$4,600) be reappropriated into FY16. If that is approved it will be accomplished when the remainder of the reappropriations are submitted to the Board of Supervisors.

In Re: Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan

Mr. Bartlett stated the Commonwealth Regional Council has received grant funding from FEMA through the Virginia Department of Emergency Management to assist counties in the region with the update of our Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The current plan was adopted by the Board in February 2012 and approved by FEMA in May 2012. The Stafford Act, which requires localities to have a Hazard Mitigation Plan, also mandates their update every five years.

The purpose of mitigation planning is to identify policies and actions that can be implemented over the long term to reduce risk and future losses. Mitigation Plans form the foundation for a community's long-term strategy to reduce disaster losses and break the cycle of disaster damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage.

As indicated in a memorandum from the CRC, the grant funding requires a local match, which can be in-kind (staff time). The exact match will not be known until it is determined who the regional partners will be. This is a multi-year effort, so the project will have no budget impact for FY16. If the County's in-kind match is inadequate to meet the threshold for its local match requirement, there is the possibility of a budget impact in FY17.

Summary: Kevin Wright, Residency Administrator, VDOT, will not be present at the August Board meeting. He plans to attend the September Board meeting. Staff will report any road issues to VDOT.

- a. HB2 Projects As the Board will recall, House Bill 2 (HB2) was signed into law in 2014 and directs the Commonwealth Transportation Board to develop and use a new scoring process to select the transportation projects that will receive VDOT funding. The scoring is based on the following factors: congestion mitigation, economic development, accessibility, safety, environmental quality, land-use and transportation coordination. Staff met with Kevin Wright, VDOT Residency Administrator, and reviewed potential projects that are eligible for funding through HB2. There are three projects in Prince Edward County that have the opportunity to score well, based on the HB2 criteria that also have the highest incident of accidents in the County. They are:
 - 1. <u>US 460/VA 307 Intersection</u>: The intersection would be reconfigured to improve the overall geometrics and safety and to provide additional spacing between Route 307, Route 600 and private driveways.
 - 2. <u>US 15/VA 692 Intersection (at Kingsville):</u> The improvements could include reconfiguring the intersection into a "T", removing the ramps, and implementing access management to improve safety for the private entrances.
 - 3. <u>US 15/VA 665 Intersection (at Worsham)</u>: The improvements could include improving advance warning signage and pavement markings, installation of turn lanes and possibly signalization.

The deadline for submitting applications for HB2 funding is September 30. VDOT "strongly" encourages public hearings be held on the projects prior to submission. Therefore, the Board will wish to consider authorizing a public hearing for its September 8, 2015 meeting.

b. FY 2017 VDOT Revenue Sharing Program – The County has been notified that applications for revenue sharing funds are due October 30, 2015. Localities may apply for up to \$10 million for eligible projects, which requires a dollar-for-dollar match.

Summary:

1. The Prince Edward County School Board submitted a request to the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors for a donation for a naming dedication ceremony. At the July 14, 2015 meeting of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors the request was referred to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee met on August 5, 2015 to review the request. The Committee's research found these funds would be used to purchase plaques, 13 inch lettering to name each location, frames for resolutions, invitations and light refreshments at the ceremony. The request can be found on Attachment (1). The Committee responsible for organizing this event estimates they will need approximately \$5,000; they have raised about \$3,500 to date. The Finance Committee also learned the Schools under expended the 2015 budget by almost \$83,000 which reduced the amount of local dollars by that amount.

Recommendation: The Finance Committee recommends the Board budget and appropriate \$1,500 to this event as shown below. The funds to be derived from the aforementioned savings.

2. During the August 5, 2015 meeting of the Finance Committee they reviewed a request from the County Administrator the budget for Piedmont Court Services (PCS) be amended by \$3,000 to allow the hiring of a consultant to perform an Operations, Policy & Procedures and Process review, Attachment (2). The consultant is the former Director of the Chesterfield County Community Services Department having retired in 2014. He is highly qualified and was recommended by DCJS to perform this review. The intent of the review is to determine (1) If local policies and procedures are consistent with DCJS guidance, (2) Determine if processes can be streamlined or automated, (3) Determine if local management processes and reports are redundant or can be streamlines or automated, and (4) Determine if client interface processes can be improved for both the client and the staff. The PCS fund has a cash balance of approximately \$300,000; this expense can be funded from that balance.

Recommendation: The Finance Committee recommends the Board authorize the County Administrator to enter into the contract found in Attachment 2 and amend the PCS budget and appropriate the same funds as shown below.

3. The Commissioner of Revenue informed the Board in January 2015 the General Assembly had made changes to the state code concerning Tax Relief for the Elderly/Disabled regarding real estate tax. The Board referred the matter to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee met on August 5, 2015 to discuss this issue. The Commissioner of Revenue was in attendance and explained the proposed change to the County's Ordinance merely brought the ordinance into compliance with the state code. The changes extend eligibility to owners of property who place their property in trusts but still live on the property and those who have "life rights." An additional change allows the Commissioner to no longer include the income of relatives living in the dwelling and providing caregiving services in the computation of the annual income calculations for determining eligibility. There is no recommendation to change the amount of the annual income threshold or Net Worth or the value of the house.

Recommendation: The Finance Committee recommends the Board authorize the advertisement of a public hearing for the proposed amendment at the September 8, 2015 meeting of the Board of Supervisors. Attachments (3) – (6)

This proposal is to provide a review of the Piedmont Court Services operations, policy & procedures and processes used for gathering data to operate the agency. Additionally the review will focus on how intakes are conducted, data collected, entered, and which automated versus manual reports are utilized. The review will result in a report to summarize the review findings and make recommendations to improve operations of Prince Edward County Piedmont Court Services.

Vendor / Contractor: Glen Peterson

Glen Peterson has worked in Virginia Community Corrections since 1981 serving as the Coordinator and later Director of the Chesterfield County Community Corrections Services Department. From 1981 until 1995 the agency was known as CDI and operated under the Community Diversion Incentive Act. From 1995 until present the Department operated under the Virginia Comprehensive Community Corrections Act. Glen Peterson retired from Chesterfield County in 2014. He is familiar with the Comprehensive Community Corrections Act, working with the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) and with local Community Corrections Agencies across Virginia. The Chesterfield Department included Local Probation, Pretrial Services, Center for Risk Reduction, Dual Treatment Track Program and a Domestic Sexual Violence Resource Center. He served on many committees and held several officer positions with the Virginia Community Criminal Justice Association. Glen Peterson received several awards from the Virginia Community Criminal Justice Association such as the Outstanding Director Award and the Award of Excellence. He was also recognized by the International Community Corrections Association and the National Pretrial Association. - 5) A summary report will be generated upon completion of the onsite interviews and off site information / data collection. The report will address findings and make recommendation for Agency improvement.

Exemption or Deferrals for the Elderly and Disabled from Real Property Tax

House Bill 1000 (Chapter 767) specifies that the local real property tax relief available for real property owned solely by taxpayers aged 65 or older or permanently disabled, or held jointly with other taxpayers, extends to real property that is i) held by the eligible person alone, with his spouse as tenant(s) for life or joint lives, or held in conjunction with one or more other people as tenants for life or joint lives; ii) held in a revocable inter vivos trust over which the eligible person, the eligible person and his spouse, or the eligible person with one or more other joint owners holds the power of revocation, or iii) held in an irrevocable trust under which an eligible person alone, with his spouse, or with other joint owners, possesses a life estate or an estate for joint lives or enjoys a continuing right of use or support.

This Act also provides that in computing the annual income to determine eligibility for real property tax relief, the income of owners' relatives that live in the dwelling and provide bona fide caregiving services is excluded. In addition, this Act clarifies that nonrelatives living in the dwelling, who provide bona fide caregiving services to the owner are not included in the income calculation, regardless of whether or not the nonrelative is compensated.

Under current law, localities are authorized to provide real property tax relief in the form of exemptions, deferrals, or a combination for real estate owned and occupied as the sole dwelling of anyone at least 65 years of age, or permanently and totally disabled. Localities may also provide real property tax relief programs for dwellings jointly held by two or more individuals, not all of whom are at least age 65 or permanently and totally disabled, if the dwelling is occupied as the sole dwelling by all such joint owners. In addition, localities may establish income or financial worth limitations for purposes of granting property tax relief to eligible homeowners.

CHAPTER 767

An Act to amend and reenact §§ 58.1-3210, 58.1-3211.1, and 58.1-3212 of the Code of Virginia, relating to real property tax exemption for the elderly and disabled.

[H 1000] Approved April 7, 2014

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 58.1-3210, 58.1-3211.1, and 58.1-3212 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:

 \S 58.1-3210. Exemption or deferral of taxes on property of certain elderly and handicapped persons.

A. The governing body of any county, city or town may, by ordinance, provide for the exemption from, deferral of, or a combination program of exemptions from and deferrals of taxation of real estate and manufactured homes as defined in § 36-85.3, or any portion thereof, and upon such conditions and in such amount as the ordinance may prescribe. Such real estate shall be owned by, and be occupied as the sole dwelling of anyone at least 65 years of age or if provided in the ordinance, anyone found to be permanently and totally disabled as defined in § 58.1-3217. Such ordinance may provide for the exemption from or deferral of that portion of the tax which represents the increase in tax liability since the year such taxpayer reached the age of 65 or became disabled, or the year such ordinance became effective, whichever is later. A dwelling jointly held by a husband and wife, with no other joint owners, may qualify if either spouse is 65 or over or is permanently and totally disabled, and the proration of the exemption or deferral under § 58.1-3211.1 shall not apply for such dwelling.

B. For purposes of this section, "eligible person" means a person who is at least age 65 or, if provided in the ordinance pursuant to subsection A, permanently and totally disabled. Under subsection A, real property owned and occupied as the sole dwelling of an eligible person includes real property (i) held by the eligible person alone or in conjunction with his spouse as tenant or tenants for life or joint lives, (ii) held in a revocable inter vivos trust over which the eligible person or the eligible person and his spouse hold the power of revocation, or (iii) held in an irrevocable trust under which an eligible person alone or in conjunction with his spouse possesses a life estate or an estate for joint lives or enjoys a continuing right of use or support. The term "eligible person" does not include any interest held under a leasehold or term of years.

C. For purposes of this article, any reference to real estate shall include manufactured homes.

 \S 58.1-3211.1. Prorated tax exemption or deferral of tax.

A. The governing body of the county, city, or town may, by ordinance, also provide for an exemption from or deferral of (or combination program thereof) real estate taxes for dwellings

jointly held by two or more individuals not all of whom are at least age 65 or (if provided in the ordinance) permanently and totally disabled, provided that the dwelling is occupied as the sole dwelling by all such joint owners.

The tax exemption or deferral for the dwelling that otherwise would have been provided under the local ordinance shall be prorated by multiplying the amount of the exemption or deferral by a fraction that has as a numerator the percentage of ownership interest in the dwelling held by all such joint owners who are at least age 65 or (if provided in the ordinance) permanently and totally disabled, and as a denominator, 100%. As a condition of eligibility for such tax exemption or deferral, the joint owners of the dwelling shall be required to furnish to the relevant local officer sufficient evidence of each joint owner's ownership interest in the dwelling.

B. For purposes of this subsection, "eligible person" means a person who is at least age 65 or, if provided in the ordinance pursuant to subsection A, permanently and totally disabled. For purposes of the tax exemption pursuant to subsection A, real property that is a dwelling jointly held by two or more individuals includes real property (i) held by an eligible person in conjunction with one or more other people as tenant or tenants for life or joint lives, (ii) held in a revocable inter vivos trust over which an eligible person with one or more other people hold the power of revocation, or (iii) held in an irrevocable trust under which an eligible person in conjunction with one or more other people possesses a life estate or an estate for joint lives or enjoys a continuing right of use or support. The term "eligible person" does not include any interest held under a leasehold or term of years.

c. The provisions of this section shall not apply to dwellings jointly held by a husband and wife, with no other joint owners.

C. D. Nothing in this section shall be interpreted or construed to provide for an exemption from or deferral of tax for any dwelling jointly held by nonindividuals.

§ 58.1-3212. Local restrictions and exemptions.

Pursuant to Article X, Section 6 (b) of the Constitution of Virginia, the General Assembly hereby authorizes the governing body of a county, city or town to establish by ordinance net financial worth or annual income limitations as a condition of eligibility for any exemption or deferral of tax allowed pursuant to this article. If the governing body establishes an annual income limitation, the computation of annual income shall be based on adding together the income received during the preceding calendar year, without regard to whether a tax return is actually filed, by (i) owners of the dwelling who use it as their principal residence, (ii) owners' relatives who live in the dwelling, except for those relatives living in the dwelling and providing bona fide caregiving services to the owner whether such relatives are compensated or not, and (iii) at the option of each locality, nonrelatives of the owner who live in the dwelling except for bona fide tenants or bona fide aregivers of the owner, whether compensated or not. If the governing body establishes a net hancial worth limitation, net financial worth shall be based on adding together the net financial worth, including the present value of equitable interests, as of December 31 of the immediately preceding calendar year, of the owners, and of the spouse of any owner, of the dwelling.

Nothing in this section shall be construed or interpreted as to preclude or prohibit the governing body of a county, city or town from excluding certain sources of income, or a portion of the same, for purposes of its annual income limitation or excluding certain assets, or a portion of the same, for purposes of its net financial worth limitation.

Any county, city, or town that pursuant to this article provides for the exemption from, deferral of, or a combination program of exemptions from and deferrals of real property taxes may exempt or defer the real property taxes of the qualifying dwelling and the land, not exceeding ten acres, upon which it is situated.

No local ordinance shall require that a citizen reside in the jurisdiction for a designated period of time as a condition for qualifying for any real estate tax exemption or deferral program established pursuant to § 58.1-3210.

Legislative Information System

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE EXEMPTION FROM REAL ESTATE TAXATION OF CERTAIN ELDERLY AND/OR PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY DISABLED PERSONS WHO OWN THEIR OWN HOMES IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA: That pursuant to Title 58.1, Chapter 32, Article 2, of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia, hereby adopts this ordinance which provides for the exemption from real estate taxation of certain elderly and/or permanently disabled persons who own their own homes in Prince Edward County, and further provides a schedule of exemption to persons qualifying and the procedure to be followed for claiming such exemptions.

A. Persons who qualify for this exemption are deemed to bear an extraordinary real estate tax burden in relation to their income and financial worth.

For the purposes of this Ordinance the term "permanently and totally disabled" shall mean the qualifying property owner is unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment or deformity which can be expected to result in death or can be expected to last for the duration of that person's life.

Persons ("Qualified owners") who are *at least* 65 years of age or who are determined to be permanently and totally disabled who own and occupy, as the sole dwelling of the person, a dwelling and the land not exceeding one acre, or a mobile home, as defined in Virginia Code Section 36-71.1, on land not exceeding one acre, and which they occupy as their sole dwelling subject to the limitations of this ordinance, shall be entitled to have their real estate or mobile home to be exempt from real estate tax liability. *Real property owned and occupied as the sole dwelling of a qualified owner includes real property (i) held by the qualified owner alone or in conjunction with his spouse as tenant or tenants for life or joint lives, (ii) held in a revocable inter vivos trust over which the qualified owner or the qualified owner and his spouse hold the power of revocation, or (iii) held in an irrevocable trust under which a qualified owner alone or in conjunction with his spouse possesses a life estate or an estate for joint lives or enjoys a continuing right of use or support. The term "qualified owner" does not include any interest held under a leasehold or term of years.*

If such person is under 65 years of age, such person shall provide certification by the Social Security Administration, the Department of Veterans Affairs, or the Railroad Retirement Board, or if such person is not eligible for certification by any of these agencies, a sworn affidavit by two medical doctors who are either licensed to practice medicine in the Commonwealth or are military officers on active duty who practice medicine with the United States Armed Forces, to the effect that the person is permanently and totally disabled. However, a certification pursuant to 42 U.S.C. 423 (d) by the Social Security Administration so long as the person remains eligible for such

social security benefits shall be deemed to satisfy such definition. The affidavit of at least one of the doctors shall be based upon a physical examination of the person by such doctor. The affidavit of one of the doctors may be based upon medical information contained in the records of the Civil Service Commission which is relevant to the standards for determining permanent and total disability.

A dwelling jointly held by a husband and wife may qualify if either spouse is over 65 years of age or is permanently and totally disabled.

- B. The exemption shall be administered by the Commissioner of the Revenue according to the general provisions contained in this Ordinance. The Commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to prescribe, adopt, and enforce rules and regulations, including requirement of answers under oath, as may be reasonably necessary to determine qualifications for exemption.
- C. Exemption shall be granted to *persons* subject to the following terms:
 - 1. The title to the property for which exemption is claimed is held, or partially held, on December 31, immediately preceding the taxable year by the person or persons claiming exemption.
 - 2. The head of the household occupying the dwelling and owning title or partial title thereto is 65 years or older on December 31 of the year immediately preceding the taxable year. Such dwelling must be occupied as the sole dwelling of the person or persons claiming exemption
 - 3. Subject to the provisions of Section F of this Ordinance, the gross combined income of the owner during the year immediately preceding the taxable year shall be determined by the Commissioner to be in an amount not to exceed \$22,000. Gross combined income shall include all income from all sources of the owner, spouse, and of the owner's relatives living in the dwelling for which the exemption is claimed. For purposes of this Ordinance, and subject to the provisions of Section F of this Ordinance, the first \$6,500 of annual income of each of the owner's relatives living in the owner's dwelling shall be excluded in computing gross combined income.
 - 4. The net combined financial worth of the owner as of December 31 of the year immediately preceding the taxable year shall be determined by the Commissioner to be an amount not to exceed \$150,000. Net combined financial worth shall include the value of all assets, including equitable interest, of the owner and spouse of any owner, excluding the fair market value of the dwelling and the land, not exceeding one acre, upon which the owner's dwelling is situated, not to exceed \$100,000, and for which exemption is claimed.
 - 5. The fact that persons who are not otherwise qualified for tax exemption are residing in hospitals, nursing homes, convalescent homes, or other facilities for physical or mental care for extended periods of time shall not be construed to mean that the real estate for which the tax exemption is sought does not continue to be the sole dwelling of such persons during extended periods of other residence, so long as the real estate is not used by or leased to others for consideration.
 - 6. The exemption shall be allowed for any year following the date that the qualified owner occupying the dwelling and owning title or partial title to the property reaches the age of 65 years, or for any year following the date the disability occurred.

- 7. Changes in respect to income, financial worth, ownership of property, or other factors occurring during the taxable year for which the affidavit is filed and having the effect of exceeding, or violating the limitations and conditions provided in this Ordinance for the exemption from taxation, shall nullify any exemption or deferral for the then current taxable year and the taxable year immediately following.
- 8. A certification is required by the Social Security Administration, the Veteran's Administration, or the Railroad Retirement Board, or if the person is not eligible for certification by any of those agencies, the sworn affidavit of two medical doctors licenses to practice in this Commonwealth to the effect that the person is permanently and totally disabled. If the doctor's affidavit is used, the affidavit of at least one of the doctors must be based upon a physical examination by the doctor. The affidavit of one of the doctors may be based upon medical information contained in the records of the Civil Service Commission which is relevant to the standards for determining permanent and total disability as defined in this Ordinance.
- 9. If there is a change of ownership of the property from a qualified owner to a spouse who is less than 65 years of age or who is not permanently and totally disabled, and when that change of ownership has resulted solely from the death of his or her qualified spouse, the change shall result in a prorated exemption for the then current taxable year. The prorated exemption shall be determined by multiplying the amount of the exemption by a faction which numerator is the number of complete months of the year that such property was eligible for the exemption, and whose denominator is the number 12.
- 10. The Commissioner of Revenue is designated to administer this exemption. Persons who claim the exemption shall annually report the following information on forms provided by the Commissioner of Revenue.
 - a. The name of the qualified owner.
 - b. The spouse of the qualified owner who resides at the dwelling for which the exemption is claimed.
 - c. The names of the related persons occupying the dwelling for which the exemption is claimed.
 - d. The names of those relatives living in the dwelling and providing bona fide caregiving services to the owner, whether such relatives are compensated or not, and who are thereby exempted from inclusion in the computation of the annual income for purposes of determining eligibility for an exemption of tax allowed by this Ordinance.
 - e. The total combined net worth, including equitable interests of the persons specified in sections (a), (b), and (c) of this paragraph of this Ordinance.
 - f. The combined income from all sources of the persons specified in sections (a), (b), and (c) of this paragraph of the Ordinance.
 - g. The applicant shall provide the required certification or affidavits to be used in the determination of the applicant's status as being permanently and totally disabled.
 - h. The applicant shall provide some reliable proof of age if the exemption claim is based upon the owner being not less than 65 years of age.
 - i. The applicant for the *exemption* shall be required to produce a copy of the most recent Federal Income tax return to establish the incomes. A detailed

financial statement may be required to establish financial worth.

D. Annually, after January 1 and by May 1 of the tax year, the person or persons claiming an exemption must file a real estate tax exemption affidavit with the Commissioner. Such affidavit shall set forth, in a manner prescribed by the Commissioner, the location, assessed value of the property, and the names of the related persons occupying the dwelling for which exemption is claimed, their gross combined income, and their net combined financial worth.

If, upon determination by the Commissioner of the Revenue, the Commissioner determines that the person or persons are qualified for exemption, he/she shall so certify the same and shall determine the percentage of exemption allowable and issue nonnegotiable exemption certificates in the amount of the exemption determined to be applicable to the claimant's real estate tax liability. Such exemption certificates shall apply only to the tax year for which issued. The person or persons to whom an exemption certificate has been issued shall, on or before the past due date established for the payment of such real estate tax, present such exemption certificate to the Treasurer's Office, together with payment of the difference between such exemption and the full amount of the tax payment then due on the property for which the exemption was issued. Any exemption certificate not presented in settlement of such taxes on or before the date specified for payment shall be null and void and unusable thereafter, and the Commissioner of the Revenue may not reissue a certificate for such tax year.

E. Where the person or persons claiming exemption conform to the standards and do not exceed the limitations contained in this section, the tax exemption shall be as shown on the following schedule:

<u>Total Income – All Sources</u>	Tax Exemption
\$0 - \$11,000.00	75%
\$11,000.00 - \$22,000.00	50%

F. In computing the annual income for purposes of determining eligibility for any exemption of tax allowed by this Ordinance, the income received during the preceding calendar year of those relatives living in the dwelling and providing bona fide caregiving services to the owner, whether such relatives are compensated or not, shall not be included.

Summary: On February 11, 2014 the Board of Supervisors approved providing the YMCA a \$50,000 loan each year for three years with payment each March. The repayment of the loan is to begin 5 years after the first payment, with a bi-annual review by the YMCA Committee. The Committee is to determine if the YMCA has made adequate progress in addressing its cash-flow challenges. For 2014, it was determined the YMCA had made progress for the first 6 months of 2014 in that they had a positive cash-flow for the period. The YMCA had reported they had not used any of the \$50,000 loan. Actions the YMCA had taken to save money were: (1) signed a shared services contract with Central YMCA which would save \$50,000 annually, (2) increased membership rates effective August 1, 2014, (3) required employees to pay 20% of their health insurance premiums and (4) reduced the number of full-time positions from 9 to 4.

Attached are: (1) the 2014 YMCA audit, (2) the Y's 2015 budget, (3) Statement of Activities Report for the first 6 months of 2015, and (4) Aged payables report dated June 30, 2015. The audit shows the YMCA had a positive cash-flow of \$30,565 for the year. This is an improvement over 2013 when the YMCA had a negative cash-flow of \$51,960. While an improvement, the amount is still less than the amount of annual depreciation. This is an indication the YMCA may have difficulty in affording to replace equipment when it reaches the end of its useful life or make capital repairs/improvements if required. Compared to 2013 revenues decreased by \$31,462 and expenses decreased \$64,778.

The YMCA Committee met August 5, 2015 for its bi-annual review. For the first six month of 2015 the YMCA's revenues have exceeded expenses by \$24,166. This is an improvement over the same period in 2014, when revenues exceeded expenses by only \$5.389. The aged payable have also declined.

The YMCA has not had to use any of the \$50,000 for day to day operations, but did use \$29,000 for the HVAC system associated with the pool. An additional \$24,000 of work will need to been done for the pool's HVAC system and another \$20,000 must be spent in the near future. Because of these expenses, the YMCA is requesting the payment of the second \$50,000 loan installment. The YMCA is working with their insurance company and will receive some reimbursement for these expenses, the final amount still to be determined.

Recommendation: The YMCA Committee is of the opinion that the YMCA has made additional progress in solving their cash flow challenges and recommends the Board provide the second \$50,000 installment of the loan to the Y. This would be from the FY2015 budget as that amount has not been expended.

NOTE A - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

Southside Virginia Family YMCA (the Organization) is a community center focusing on life long recreational opportunities for youth, teens, adults, and seniors. The Organization is committed to servicing the counties of Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Nottoway and Prince Edward with programs that promote health and wellness to its members and the community at large. The Organization is supported primarily through donor contributions, membership dues, and program fees. Approximately 13% of the Organization's support for the year ended December 31, 2014 came from donor contributions.

Promises to Give

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Organization that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

The Organization uses the allowance method to determine uncollectible unconditional promises receivable. The allowance is based on prior years' experience and management's analysis of specific promises made.

Contributed Services

During the year ended December 31, 2014, the value of contributed services meeting the requirements for recognition in the financial statements was not material and has not been recorded. In addition, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization, but these services do not meet the criteria for recognition as contributed services.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

NOTE A - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Property and Equipment

It is the Organization's policy to capitalize all property and equipment regardless of cost, Purchased property and equipment is capitalized at cost. Donations of property and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Organization reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets as that time. Property and equipment are depreciated using the straightline method over 39 years and MACRS 200% declining-balance method over 3, 5, and 7 years.

Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and classified by the Internal Revenue Service as other than a private foundation.

Investments

Investments are composed of money market funds and are classified as part of cash and cash equivalents on the statement of financial position.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Approval of Minutes of June 4, 2015 Meeting

Mr. Walker moved and Ms. Stish seconded that the minutes be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report

April Financial Statement: The Treasurer stated the June Financial Statement was in order.

Mr. Timmons moved and Mr. Walker seconded that the June Financial Statement be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: The Chairman requested a report on the status of Amelia's Dues payment. Ms. Hickman stated Amelia County currently has \$15,700 in their approved budget for FY15-16 instead of the \$17,000 requested. Ms. Hickman stated it is her understanding that the letter the CRC sent to Amelia County concerning their dues will be on their July 15th Board of Supervisors Agenda. It was stated it would be good to discuss the matter at the Chief Administrative Officers meeting as well.

Report of Charter/Bylaws Overall Review Committee: Ms. Stish reported that the Committee met prior to the Council meeting. The Committee is putting together recommended changes to the Charter and Bylaws in light of legislation that the CRC is supporting to allow PDC's to gain new members outside of the current membership types. The Committee will work on compiling the changes and providing an updated version of the Bylaws and Charter for the Council to review at the August CRC meeting. It was pointed out that if the Charter is amended, it will need to go back out to the Charter members for approval.

Report on Chief Administrative Officers (CAO) Meeting: Ms. Hickman noted that the CRC had requested that the CAO's continue to discuss the idea of Regional Reassessment. Ms. Hickman stated last September, Mr. Douglas P. Stanley, Warren County Administrator, gave a briefing on the regional concept that was looked at by several counties in the Northern Shenandoah Planning District. The option that the localities chose, in this case, was to conduct a regional RFP. As a result, two localities went with one firm and three localities went with another. While not all of the localities ultimately went together, the regional RFP process provided a cost savings as opposed to each locality having to issue one on their own. After the presentation, it was the consensus of the CAO to continue the discussion on the concept in the Spring of 2015 as each of the counties were currently in different stages of the reassessment cycles. Based on information provided by the CAO, upcoming reassessment schedules for counties are: Amelia 2017, Buckingham 2019, Charlotte 2019, Lunenburg 2018, and Prince Edward 2020.

At the June 23rd CAO meeting, discussion resumed on the concept of Regional Reassessment and it was the consensus of those present to poll members to seek interest in pursuing a regional purchasing approach through a Request for Proposals (RFP). It was noted with Amelia's Reassessment coming up in 2017 and the need to begin work on the process at least a year in advance, now would be a good time to seek this information.

Ms. Stish moved and Mr. Timmons seconded to have the Executive Director poll members to seek interest in pursuing a regional purchasing approach through a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a Regional Reassessment. Motion carried.

Scoping the Future – Discussion of Innovative/Regional Ideas: Ms. Hickman stated this attachment is provided each month to provide previous Innovative/Regional Ideas and to initiate new ideas for discussion. It was requested that this attachment also be provided to the Chief Administrative Officers Committee for review and discussion.

Old Business

Final FY16 VDOT Transportation Alternative Allocation Awards: Ms. Foster stated attached in the Council Members packet is the Final Allocation Awards for the FY16 VDOT Transportation Alternative Program. Ms. Foster stated the CRC assisted the Town of Dillwyn and Amelia County in applying for funds. The Town of Dillwyn received funding, unfortunately Amelia County did not.

Report on CRC Hosted VDOT Local Education Meeting on HB2 Changes: Ms. Foster stated VDOT requested that the CRC host a VDOT Local Education Meeting for the localities on how HB2 will change transportation project selections at the local level. The meeting was held on June 23rd in the Mill Room downstairs. The Commonwealth Transportation Board adopted the HB2 Implementation Policy Guide at their June meeting and therefore the Prioritization Process has now been finalized. There are two main pathways to funding within the HB2 process; the Construction District Grant Program (CDGP) and the High-Priority Projects Program (HPPP) which is statewide. The Construction District Grant Program is open only to localities and replaces the old "40-30-30" construction fund allocation model. Projects compete within each construction district for the CDGP funding and are prioritized with the CTB making the final decision. Projects applying for funds from the HPPP are prioritized with projects statewide, with the CTB making the final decision also.

Ms. Foster stated concerning eligible projects, she has previously reported numerous times there are three eligible project types; Corridors of Statewide Significance, Regional Networks and Urban Development Areas. The definition of Regional Networks is still uncertain and will be defined by the VTrans 2040 process which will be presented to the CTB at their August 19th meeting. However, VDOT will begin accepting applications August 1st. Currently there is some imbalance in the process. It is hoped that the definition of Regional Networks will include roads that are major collectors and above that could include secondary roads. However, currently the definition, when discussed, has been only roads in urban areas. Concerning UDA's, there has been a lot of discussion on having UDA-like areas being accepted and encouraging localities to include language in their Comprehensive Plans to link language with the Code of Virginia to make this an eligible category for funding. Ms. Foster stated she is currently working with Lunenburg County on addressing this issue in the Lunenburg Comprehensive Plan. Other localities are looking into this issue as well. Ms. Foster stated the one eligible project type that was added in June was for Safety Projects. This is a huge win for rural areas to allow for more projects in the rural areas of the State. Ms. Foster stated this is something that has been relayed to the CTB for the past year and showed that they were listening.

Ms. Foster stated the HB2 Project Application period will be August 1 – September 30, 2015. Ms. Foster stated VDOT will be working with localities and hopes that each eligible locality will submit their top three projects for the Construction District competition. VDOT will also be hosting an application workshop in the coming weeks. Ms. Foster stated she has had discussions on whether the CRC could

assist the localities with grant writing. Currently, VDOT would require the locality submitting a project would have to also be the one writing the grant. These discussions will continue.

Status Report – CRC Proposal – Amelia County Comprehensive Plan Update: Ms. Hickman stated the CRC submitted a proposal in response to the February Request for Proposals (RFP) advertised by Amelia County to complete an update to the Amelia County Comprehensive Plan. The CRC Proposal was hand delivered on April 24, 2015 which was the deadline date. The RFP allowed for flexibility in the submission of a work plan to undertake the project. Ms. Hickman stated she was notified on June 18, 2015 that Amelia County selected the The Cox Company, based out of Charlottesville, Virginia as their Consultant to complete the Amelia County Comprehensive Plan Update at a cost of \$60,000. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC's Proposal was for \$34,000 for an 18-month project period based on a total of 680 staff hours. The CRC's proposed scope of work would: bring the Comprehensive Plan into compliance with all state regulations and requirements; conduct three Community Meetings on County Issues and three Community Meetings on Future Land Use; and also Update the Implementation Section to Include a Schedule and Priority of Achievement. It was noted by Amelia County that the CRC tied with Cox Company on several ranking items. However, Cox Company had a impressive scope of work.

Ms. Hickman stated the CRC has not historically responded to Request for Proposals due to localities not being required to request RFP's for PDC contracts. Ms. Hickman stated she has requested from Amelia County a copy of the Cox Company's Proposal to be utilized as a learning tool for prospective future RFP proposals.

There was discussion on the matter.

Ms. Stish suggested in the future for RFP requests, the CRC could consider partnering with a Consulting firm to provide additional resources. Ms. Stish stated the Proposal submitted by the CRC, the Berkley Group and Chandler Planning to Buckingham County for the Buckingham County Comprehensive Plan, Zoning & Subdivision Ordinance Revisions was very good. Unfortunately, the costs were prohibitive. In that case, the County scaled the project down and chose to hire the CRC for the Comprehensive Plan Update.

Mr. Bennett stated anyone interested in the discussion at the Amelia Board of Supervisors meeting should read the article from the *Amelia Bulletin Monitor* covering the meeting. Members requested that the Executive Director send them copies of the news article.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

Town of Victoria Request – Technical Assistance with Procurement for the Town of Victoria DCR Recreational Trail Grant: Mr. Fortune stated this project is Phase II of the Town's Trail Project. Phase I was built in 2010 at that time the Trails Fund was a separate program but since then has been combined under MAP21 and now has additional requirements. Because of this, the Town is now requesting the CRC's assistance in bidding out the Recreational Trail Project. Mr. Fortune stated a copy of the Agreement between the CRC and the Town of Victoria was included in the Council

Members packet for execution.

Mr. Walker moved and Ms. Stish seconded to authorize Ms. Hickman to execute the Agreement between the Town of Victoria and the CRC for Technical Assistance with Procurement for the Town of Victoria's DCR Recreational Trail Grant. Motion carried.

FEMA Notification of Grant Award for the CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update: Mr. Fortune stated the CRC submitted a grant to FEMA in the Fall of 2014 to undertake an update of the CRC's Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan for Planning District 14. Mr. Fortune stated the CRC received official notification of the grant award in June 2015 for \$49,970 with a match to be provided of \$16,697 for a total project budget of \$66,667. Mr. Fortune did note the CRC requested \$50,000 but received \$30 less than requested.

Mr. Fortune stated the CRC will need to authorize the Executive Director to execute the Agreement and will also need to provide guidance to staff on the match requirement for non-members including the Town of Farmville, Nottoway and Cumberland Counties to participate in the project. Mr. Fortune noted the CRC adopted a Non-Member Participating Policy in CRC Sponsored Regional Project/Study in October 2014. A copy of the adopted policy was passed out at the meeting. Mr. Fortune noted that when he contacted non-members to participate in the application they were requested at that time only about interest in participating and hard costs were not committed to at that time. After the Non-Member Participation Policy was adopted, Mr. Fortune stated he contacted the non-members to make them aware of the new policy and the effect it would have on the Hazard Mitigation Plan Update match requirement if funded.

There was discussion on the Policy. Mr. Fortune was directed to contact the non-members to provide them with what their match requirement will be for the awarded Grant per the Non-Member Participation Policy.

Ms. Stish moved and Mr. Timmons seconded to authorize the Executive Director to execute the Agreement between FEMA and the CRC to accept the Grant Award for the update of the CRC's Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. Motion carried.

Ms. Hickman noted this Grant Award is not included in Revenues in the CRC's FY15-16 Approved Budget that was adopted May 7, 2015 and therefore is new revenue.

CRC Hosting VDOT Transportation Alternative Program Workshop: Ms. Foster stated the CRC will be hosting one of the four VDOT Transportation Alternative Program Workshops that are being held around the State of Virginia. The Workshop will be on July 22, 2015 at 10:00 a.m. in the Mill Conference Room downstairs. Applications are due November 1st. All localities were invited and are encouraged to attend to learn about the program.

Report on GIS Regional Services: Ms. Foster provided a media presentation to highlight GIS regional services provided in the region free of charge to member localities. Ms. Foster explained that from time to time the CRC receives requests to produce GIS Maps for localities on various topics. When the data is available and it can be completed within time constraints, the CRC provides these GIS services free of charge. Examples of maps produced included the Town of Phenix Zoning Map and the Town of Kenbridge Zoning Map. Both of these maps were only available in paper form and needed to be reproduced for display and to provide a digital copy for the localities. Ms. Foster went over the

different aspects of making a map and how the different layers of data assist in producing the map. Types of data utilized in these two maps included digitized tax map layers, Google Aerial Maps, and PDF's of the original map that were converted to a digitized map layers. Ms. Foster also stated in the upcoming year staff will be producing Land Use Maps of the Counties utilizing CRC's Rural Transportation Program funds. VDOT has requested the PDC's collect GIS Land Use Data from the localities to provide an inventory of the Land Use across the state.

Report on Agribusiness Grant Program Information Session & Project Development Workshop: Mr. Gilliam stated he attended the Agribusiness Grant Program Information Session and Project Development Workshop held in Chase City, Virginia on Tuesday, June 30, 2015. Mr. Gilliam stated there were several presenters on various programs. Ms. Sarah Capps with the Tobacco Commission gave examples of Agribusiness projects, the scoring criteria and stated \$2.1 million dollars is available for a grant which requires a dollar for dollar match. Application deadline has not been determined at this time. Mr. Stephen Verson, Virginia Department of Agriculture and Forestry Industries Development Fund (AFID) stated there is approximately \$2 million dollars available for grants. The Facility Grants maximum request is \$250,000 with a dollar for dollar match required which can include in-kind local match. Planning Grants can be requested for \$20,000 per locality or \$35,000 for multi-jurisdictional applications. Applications are taken on a open submission process. Mr. Tony Banks with the Virginia Farm Bureau Federation facilitated an open discussion with participants on prospective agribusiness projects. Strengths noted for an application included: a lot of land, size of property, and proximity to markets. Weaknesses for a project included: labor, limited capital and transportation. An example of a good project is one that establishes a brand and are regional in nature. Mr. Gilliam stated the workshop was well attended.

Governor's Transportation Conference Notification: Ms. Foster stated the date and location of the Governor's Transportation Conference has been announced. The Conference will be held at Virginia Beach, VA this year October 28-30, 2015. Ms. Foster noted there are a lot of local elected officials that attend this conference to learn more about transportation funding. This was provided for information.

VAPDC 2015 Summer Conference: Ms. Hickman stated the Virginia Association of Planning District Commission will be holding their Summer Conference at the Virginia Beach Resort Hotel and Conference Center at Virginia Beach, Virginia, August 5-7, 2015. Ms. Hickman stated at this point the agenda has not been completed. Ms. Hickman stated based on the cost of registration, hotel and travel the total cost for attending this conference for one staff would be \$900. Ms. Hickman stated based on the CRC's tight budget she would recommend that the CRC not be represented at the Summer VAPDC Conference this year due to cost. Ms. Hickman noted the CRC staff does attend the Winter VAPDC Conference in Richmond each year. This Conference is held at the same time as the VACO Legislative Day as well as the General Assembly being in session. It also is much more affordable.

Ms. Stish noted the CRC is still working with several legislators on legislation that it hopes to get backing from the VAPDC. Ms. Stish stated the Summer VAPDC Conference would seem to be the right venue to have the issue discussed and seek the VAPDC support. Ms. Stish stated it would be a good idea to get the item on their agenda for discussion. Mr. Walker suggested going and meeting with the Chairman of the VAPDC to discuss the matter and if it is put on the agenda then have staff attend the Conference to present the matter. Ms. Stish stated she has not met with the legislators this summer as of yet to discuss the matter, however, she felt that the CRC needed the buy in from the VAPDC before

moving forward.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

<u>Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRP)</u>: Ms. Foster stated there was one local CIRP;

 DEQ/Longwood University – Construct Longwood University Center, Environmental Impact Report

Ms. Stish moved and Mr. Timmons seconded to give the listed CIRP a level one, No Comment. Motion carried.

Other Business: Ms. Hickman passed out two items information purposes. The first was a copy of the Status Report on CRC Projects as of July 2015. Ms. Hickman noted the CRC had picked up several new projects that were not under contract at the time the FY15-16 Budget was approved and therefore represents new revenue. The second item was a listing of the new Virginia laws that took effect July 1, 2015.

Council Member Comments:_ There were none.

Executive Closed Session: Mr. Walker moved under the statue 2.2-3711 to go into closed session.

Ms. Stish moved to return to open session and adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth Regional Council, convened a Closed Meeting on this date pursuant to an affirmative recorded vote in accordance with the provisions of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. WHEREAS, Section 2.2-3712 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, requires a certification by the Council that such Closed Meeting was conducted in conformity with Virginia law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council hereby certifies that, to the best of each member's knowledge, (i) only public business matters lawfully exempted from Open Meeting requirements by Virginia law were discussed in the Closed Meeting to which this certification resolution applies, and (ii) only such public business matters as were identified in the motion convening the Closed Meeting were heard, discussed or considered by the Council.

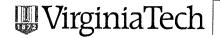

The following are brief updates on Virginia Cooperative Extension programs for the second quarter of 2015. If you would like more detailed information, please do not hesitate to contact the office.

Administrative Update:

 Amanda Elgin, a rising Longwood University senior, was hired through VCE's summer intern program. She will work a total of 400 hours over the summer to support local extension programs, primarily 4-H programs. Amanda had previously volunteered with local 4-H after school programs.

4-H Program Updates – Jennifer Bowen, Sr. Extension Agent, 4-H Youth Development:

- All 3rd, 5th, 7th, and 8th grade students from PECES and PECMS participated in **Natural Resource Education programming** at Holiday Lake 4-H Center throughout the spring. I taught classes in soils and aquatic ecology. These programs were funded through a grant from the Walter Payne Foundation.
- We offered a Spring Break beginning sewing day camp which filled with a waiting list (8 participants).
- We were invited by PECMS to offer our second annual **Reality Store** program with 8th grade students. Students were assigned a job and a family situation and had to make multiple choices on how to spend their income. The goal was to have money left at the end of the month after paying all necessary expenses.
- Four 4th grade classes and one local daycare center participated in the 4-H Embryology program, hatching chicks in the classroom.
- Anna Marie Vaught, a member of the **Prince Edward 4-H Livestock Club**, participated in the Piedmont Area Junior Livestock Show and Sale in Blackstone in May. **The Riding**

- I participated in training on VCE's InnoVAtive Leadership curriculum. I subsequently wrote and received a grant from the Virginia 4-H Foundation to implement an **Innovative Leadership Academy** for teens beginning in the fall of 2015.
- We offered 3 day camps in June: Baking 101 (8 participants), Baking 102 (11 participants), and Beginner Sewing (11 participants).
- Six youth and one teen volunteer participated in **Cloverbud Camp** at Holiday Lake 4-H Center. This is an overnight camping program for youth ages 5 8.
- **Junior 4-H Camp** was held in June with the following participants from Prince Edward County: 94 campers and CITs, 26 teens, and 19 adult leaders. Extensive teen and adult leader training was conducted prior to camp.
- I successfully renewed the Department of Social Services Promoting Safe and Stable Families Grant, providing \$18,000 in funding for VCE programs, Crossroads Prevention Services, the PECMS mentoring program (the ASK program) for males, and DSS programs for youth receiving time-limited reunification services.









FCS Updates – Caitlin Miller, Extension Agent, FCS

- Nine Master Gardener trainees participated in a class on companion planting and organic gardening.
- I partnered with the 4-H agent to offer a **beginning sewing day camp** during Prince Edward's spring break as well as a three day beginning sewing day camp during summer break..
- I organized and led a **Buy Fresh Buy Local** promotional meeting at the Farmville-Prince Edward library which took place in April.
- The last meeting of the year for the Prince Edward Extension **Sewing Club** took place in April and all participants completed their scalloped tote bag project.
- I partnered with Virginia Food Works to coordinate the 2015 Food Entrepreneur Workshop that took place at STEPS, Inc in April. There were more than 140 participants in attendance at the workshop.
- I taught a portion of the **Farmers Market Tune-up** program to instruct farmers market vendors and managers on how to accept SNAP benefits at the farmers market in addition to enrolling in the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program.

- I completed the **2015 Heart of Virginia Buy Fresh Buy Local Food Guide** which was printed at the end of May. Twenty thousand copies were printed half of which are being distributed by Centra in their medical facilities throughout the region.
- Representatives of the Farmville Community Marketplace, Town of Farmville, and the Department of Social Services met with Meredith Ledlie, state coordinator at Virginia Tech of SNAP at farmers markets, and I will commence plans to accepting SNAP benefits at the farmers market.
- The ANR agent and I continued workshops in the Prince Edward Extension Demonstration Vegetable Garden in April, May, and June. The following topics were covered: April- integrated pest management, attracting beneficial insects to the garden, scouting for pests; May- weed control, mulching, square foot gardening, succession planting; June- Trellising vines and tomatoes, and moisture management. Participants also received information on growing the following vegetables: lettuce, spinach, carrots, beets, potatoes, tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, cucumbers, squash, melons, and okra.
- As one of five representatives of Virginia Tech, I was invited to participate in the 4-VA
 Sustainable Agriculture Summit held at the Smithsonian Institute of Biological
 Conservation.







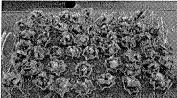
ANR Updates – Katy Overby, Extension Agent, ANR

- At the end of May, we finished up our twenty week Master Gardener Trainee Class. I taught the classes on Landscape Design, Organic Gardening, Composting, Raised Beds, Risk Management and, Equal Opportunity Protocol. There was a graduation celebration held in mid-June for the ten trainees that officially became Virginia Cooperative Extension Heart of Virginia Master Gardener Interns. I led a tour of our Demonstration Vegetable Garden during the graduation.
- We continued the workshops for the Demonstration Vegetable Garden and started harvesting in mid-June. (see FCS report above)
- During April I devoted five days of my time to the Third Grade Ag Days and Fifth Grade Ag Days at Southern Piedmont Agriculture Research and Extension Center in Blackstone. For the third graders, I spoke about sheep and their importance in agriculture and for the fifth graders, I helped them create an animal cell model and taught them about the significant parts of the cell.
- I assisted the 4-H agent in **Reality Store** at PECMS by helping students budget child care into their financial scenarios that they were assigned.

- The Tobacco Commission approved five more applicants from Prince Edward County for the Central Virginia Produce, Livestock, and Feed Storage Systems Improvement Program. I am responsible for presenting the guidelines and educational material to the applicants, collecting their paperwork for grant approval from the Tobacco Commission, and serving as the liaison between the producer and the Tobacco Commission through this grant process.
- In early May, VCE Planning District 14 (Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway, and Prince Edward) gathered for a Town Hall Meeting with guest speaker Ed Jones, Director of Virginia Cooperative Extension at the Moton Museum. The intention of this meeting was for the residents of Planning District 14 along with producers, local government officials, and County Administrators, to gather and have an open forum to discuss local needs and how Virginia Cooperative Extension can help meet those needs.
- In mid-June I presented at the Registered Technician Pesticide Training on
 Ornamental Plant and Turf Pests. After this training the attendees were required to
 take the Registered Technician Exam. For only the second time in 12 years, all of the
 trainees passed the exam.
- The last week in June, I assisted the FCS agent in teaching Cake Decorating for three days at 4-H Camp. Each camper that attended the class decorated their own individual cupcake and dispersed into groups to decorate a miniature cake. Caitlin taught some of the fundamentals of cake decoration, including different designs and shapes that can be made with different types of tips. The campers put these principles to work on their cupcakes and miniature cakes.
- On June 15 we held a Fruit Tree Summer Pruning Demonstration at Glasscock Orchard.
- At the end of June, I helped Bob Jones, Charlotte County ANR Agent, at the Produce Auction in Cullen. Every other Friday someone brings a **Product of the Week** for sampling by the auction participants. I made **Cucumber Salsa** on to highlight cucumbers and tomatoes as products of the week.











SNAP-Ed Updates - Pauline Stokes, Extension Agent, FCS/SNAP-Ed

- Collaboration with Piedmont Senior Resource Agency two Senior Citizens Café Sites in Prince Edward completed the Eating Smart and Moving More Curriculum
- Ten students in the **Family Preservation Services** summer program participated in the Growing Healthy Habits Curriculums.
- Prince Edward County Cooperative Extension and Pamplin Area Legacy Supporters sponsored a Children's Nutrition and Gardening Summer Program for six weeks at the Pamplin Depot. 12 students participated. The curriculum used was the Great Garden Detective Adventure: A Standards-Based Gardening Nutrition Curriculum for Grades 3 and 4. Beth Reynolds, a guest, from Long Ears Herbs Farm presented to the youth on Herbal Fun with kids in the Kitchen.
- Parent involvement has long been one of the cornerstones of Head Start, and fathers are encouraged to participate in all aspects of the program. Ten fathers and mothers attended a program on April 23rd during which food safety was discussed and the fathers made a fruit salad from fresh fruits.
- An ongoing workshop is offered for young mothers through the Pregnancy Support
 Center using the Eating Smart Throughout the Lifecycle curriculum. Three mothers are
 taking this workshop so far. During one session, a recipe was prepared for tasting and
 then they were given the ingredients to make that same recipe at home. Food was
 purchased through a MCH grant from the Prince Edward Health Department.
- Farmville GROWS Virginia Cooperative Extension SNAP-ED Family Nutrition Program Community Garden: Partners include Virginia Cooperative Extension, Heart of Virginia Master Gardener's Association, Community Development Institute Head Start, and Farmville Area Habitat for Humanity. The garden is sponsored by the Farmville Area Habitat for Humanity. Land used for the garden is owned by Habitat and Mr. Robert Taylor of Farmville. This garden is a work in progress but we are pleased that 10 families are participating so far. We have had several community people to donate items to us. A family donated some bricks for making family garden plots. Southern States Farmers' Cooperative donated the Plot Saver Deer Barrier System and the Electric Fence Wire. Lowes gave us a huge discount on some much needed supplies. Rev. Vincent Eanes plowed up the garden in rows for us. Habitat has been a great resource for us donating cinder blocks to section off garden plots.

Report to August Board of Supervisors:

- Focus of the Visitor Center continues to be: meet and greet visitors, answer phone call requests about the area, complete large fulfillment orders, all while showing visitors where they can spend their time and money in our region during their visit.
- The three marketing consortiums, Virginia's Retreat The Best Part of the Civil War ... The End The Heart of Your Adventure, are focusing on developing new endeavors for application to Virginia Tourism Corporation's (VTC) Fall Leveraging Marketing Grant. Through the leveraged funds of these three partnerships grant funding awarded by VTC will then be used by each consortium to expand marketing seeking to encourage travelers to stay longer spending more money during their visit. The Prince Edward County Tourism Office sits at the center of all three of these groups:
 - Virginia's Retreat is working on the Strategic Tourism Plan and developing a Music Trail with Virgina State Parks that will bring more visitors to the area.
 - Best Part is developing Learning Campus' for the stops along the last 36 hours of the American Civil War seeking to attract students and historians.
- The Heart of Your Adventure is restructuring with the new Executive Director of the Chamber, while awaiting the new leadership for Farmville Downtown. Focus will be on continuing to develop Farmville-Prince Edward County as a visitor Destination.
