- The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.
- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House, thereof, on Tuesday, the 12th day of July, 2016, at 7:00 p.m., there were present:

Also present: Wade Bartlett, County Administrator; Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator; James R. Ennis, County Attorney; and Scot Shippee, P.E, Resident Engineer, VDOT-Dillwyn.

Chairman Simpson called the meeting to order. Supervisor Gray offered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

In Re: Public Participation

William VanBenthuysen, Hampden District, stated the residents of Route 705, Lakeside Road, have been trying to get Rural Rustic funds and asked the Board to approve the Secondary Six-Year Plan.

Jacob McCann, Community Relations Coordinator from Southside Electric Cooperative, invited the Board to contact him for any County need. He then reported on the Youth Tour Program, which allows high school juniors to travel to Washington DC; he stated over 1,500 students from all over the world attend this event. Two students from Prince Edward County High School and one from Fuqua attended this year.

Supervisor Timmons asked for further information on the Lineman Program apprenticeship. Mr. McCann stated all graduates from the first class have secured employment and the second class began July 12. Another class will begin in October. Supervisor Timmons then asked if Southside Electric Cooperative owns any generating facilities and if there is any plan to incorporate solar energy. Mr. McCann stated all electricity is purchased wholesale currently; not all of the electricity is coal-powered and does include solar and other renewables. He added he does not know if there are any long-range plans for additional use of solar power.

Kenneth Jackson, Lockett District, requested the Board not comment on his personal issues. He then questioned the closed session meeting regarding a business and requested information regarding the potential number of jobs generated, potential tax revenue and a potential cost to taxpayers. He stated past investments have not provided what was proposed, adding the best investment the County can make is in education. Mr. Jackson then requested that presentations be shown to the citizens in the audience as well as to the Board; during the presentation of the landscaping project, the citizens were not able to see the diagrams. Mr. Jackson thanked the County Attorney and Deputy County Attorney for providing a synopsis prior to the public hearing at last month's meeting. Mr. Jackson then stated the Board has a different information pack than what is posted on the County's web site.

Bemeché Hicks, Lockett District, questioned the amount of County taxes given to the public schools for operation costs each year. Mr. Bartlett stated the schools are given all of the Real Estate taxes which is about half of the local taxes collected, plus about an additional million dollars. He said the Real Estate tax is equal to about \$7.3 million and a portion of the Personal Property taxes go to the schools also.

Supervisor Wilck stated Prince Edward County ranks 28th in the state for the amount of funding to the students, just outside the top quarter. That comes to \$11,400 for each student.

Supervisor Jones stated the informational packs the Board receives is the same as the one that is posted online.

Supervisor Wilck stated his opposition to changing the August Board meeting from the prescribed date and time. He stated the information will be relayed to Chairman Simpson and there is no need to change the date of the meeting. Discussion followed.

Chairman Simpson made a motion to change the date of the August Board meeting from August 9

to August 16. The motion failed for lack of a second. Discussion followed.

In Re: Highway Matters

Scot Shippee, P.E, Resident Engineer, VDOT-Dillwyn, introduced Carrie Shepheard, P.E., Assistant Resident Engineer, VDOT.

Mr. Shippee reported VDOT activities: mowing continues, crews are doing boom axe work and patching work. Crews are working on a shoulder in Prospect, gravel, and customer service calls.

Mr. Shippee stated the Route 617 bridge, on Sayler's Creek, is proceeding; the Route 633 bridge is ongoing and there is a one-lane closure. He said shoulder-work is being done at the intersection of Routes 360 and 750.

Supervisor Townsend said he provided information to Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, regarding the Route 633 bridge. Mrs. Puckett stated she spoke with Mr. Kevin Wright regarding the intersection where the fatality occurred. She stated when there is an accident, VDOT will go to the site to determine if the road itself had an impact and what can be done to address the issue if there is one. She said the County sign may be moved and the neighboring store-keeper may need to move their sign as well.

Supervisor Jones thanked VDOT for the work done on Route 612, Route 602 bridge; he said drainage issues on Route 636 have been addressed.

Supervisor Timmons thanked VDOT for the work on Route 664; he said the Loose Stones signs can be picked up.

Supervisor Pride asked if the cones along Route 667 are permanent. Mr. Shippee said they are not; he said the creek is eating away at the bank and VDOT is working with District Environmental and District Drainage departments to find a solution to move it naturally from the road. He said they are still working through the permitting process. He said the cones are placed as a warning at this point.

In Re: Public Hearing – County Secondary Six Year Plan

Chairman Simpson announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the County Secondary Six Year Plan for Fiscal Years 2017 through 2022 in Prince Edward County and on the Secondary System Construction Budget for Fiscal Year 2017. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, July 1, 2016 and Friday, July 8, 2016 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

All projects in the Secondary Six-Year Plan that are eligible for federal funds will be included in the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), which documents how Virginia will obligate federal transportation funds.

Scot Shippee, Resident Engineer, VDOT, reviewed the Secondary Six-Year Plan. Last year, the Number One priority for Prince Edward County's Secondary Routes was Route 725, Watson Boulevard, which has been moved to the bottom of the page and all others have moved up one step accordingly. For the FY17 Six Year Plan, the number one priority is Route 628, Campbell Crossing Road, and Route 705, Lakeside Drive, is second priority and is funded to a point where construction will begin in FY18, which starts after July 1, 2017. Discussion followed.

Chairman Simpson opened the public hearing.

Kenneth Jackson, Lockett District, complimented VDOT on the excellent job done on Route 736. He asked that a review be done on Piney Grove Road to slow the speed limit. He said the County Line store is not the problem but the hedges in the neighbor's yard causes blind spots. Mr. Jackson stated accidents at Routes 460 and 607 are common; there was one last week. He added Bradshaw Lane was on the Five Year Plan some years ago; VDOT needs to respond in some way.

William VanBenthuysen, Hampden District, questioned the paving done on Stokes Road. He stated that received asphalt while others get oil and stone.

Bemeché Hicks, Lockett District, thanked VDOT for the work done on High Rock Road and stated work is being done on the draining issues. He said the High Bridge Trail sign at County Line Market is an obstruction to the view. He added signs and hedges along the roadways need to be addressed; there has been an ongoing problem on Routes 307 and 460 for years.

Tom Dennison, Lakeside Road, reported the comparison between Lakeside and Campbell Crossing, stating Lakeside has more residents. Supervisor Timmons stated VDOT has additional criteria such as traffic counts; he said Campbell Crossing has been on the list longer than Lakeside and the long term goal is to get all the roads with some sort of paving; Lakeside Drive has been fast-tracked in comparison.

Mr. Shippee said Bradshaw Lane was on the Secondary Six-Year Plan years ago; it was taken off. There used to be two lists which added to the confusion; one was the Six-Year Plan and the other was a list of roads to be added to the Six-Year Plan. Discussion followed regarding Bradshaw Lane being state maintained.

Mr. Shippee stated Stokes Road had plant mix leveling because the base was failing. He said the funding discussed during this public hearing is for secondary roads only. Mr. Shippee said the Rural Rustic process is the quickest way to get the roads worked on; this takes the non-hard-surface roads and VDOT can do surface treatment. This provides minimal ditching, no geometric improvements, and takes the existing gravel surface and making it a hard surface. He said this funding is only to change the surface from one to another.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Simpson closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to adopt the resolution approving the FY17-FY22 Six-Year Plan and the FY17 Construction Program for Prince Edward County; the motion carried:

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA SIX-YEAR ROAD PLAN AND CONSTRUCTION PRIORITY LIST

WHEREAS, Sections 33.1-23.1 and 33.1-23.4 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended, provide the opportunity for each county to work with the Virginia Department of Transportation in developing a Secondary Six-Year Road Plan and budget; and

WHEREAS, this Board has previously agreed to assist in the preparation of this Plan, in accordance with the Department of Transportation policies and procedures, and participated in a public hearing on the proposed Plan (FY 2017 through 2022), as well as the Construction Priority List (FY 2017) on July 12, 2016, after being duly advertised so that all citizens of the County had the opportunity to participate in said hearing and to make comments and recommendations concerning the proposed Plan and Priority List; and

WHEREAS, Scot Shippee, Resident Engineer, Virginia Department of Transportation, appeared before the Board and re commended approval of the Six-Year Plan for Secondary Roads (FY 2017 through 2022) and the Construction Priority List (FY 2017) for Prince Edward County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that since said Plan appears to be in the best interests of the Secondary Road System in Prince Edward County and of the citizens residing on the Secondary System, said Secondary Six-Year Plan (FY 2017 through 2022) and Construction Priority List (FY 2017) are hereby approved as presented at the public hearing.

In Re: Sheriff - At Will Overtime Program

For the second half of FY16 (January 2016 – June 2016), the At-Will program has cost a total of

\$25,362.53 to include FICA costs. Fines actually collected for tickets issued from January - April total

35,132. Tickets written in May and June are pending disposition but based on historical data should result

in an additional \$16,000 in revenues bringing the total to over \$51,000. As has been the case for every sixmonth reporting period, the program is self-funded.

After a period of personnel shortages, the Sheriff was at full staff and able to man this program as had been done in the past. This increased the number of deputies available which resulted in more cost, which was still under the budgeted amount. While the cost escalated, the increased number of patrols resulted in a greater number of tickets being written which increased the revenues attributed to this program.

A total of 1,097 summons were issued under the At-Will program for July 2015 – June 2016. During the same period, 20 drug and three DUI arrests were made. Deputies working the At-Will program responded to 47 serious calls when the officers working normal patrol were working other calls.

The program is still self-funded and has provided additional manpower available to the Sheriff to answer calls. The Board of Supervisors appropriated funds to continue this program throughout FY17. No budget action is required if the Board approves the continuation of this program.

Sheriff Reed stated this program provides overtime to the deputies, manpower to the Sheriff's Department and safety to the county. He said this is a successful program which allows the deputies that are caught up in situations to have help. Sheriff Reed stated deputies have questioned the possibility of extending the overtime hours.

Supervisor Gray asked if Sheriff Reed has noticed an increase in morale; Sheriff Reed said he has. He added not all deputies participate but it does help.

Supervisor Gray stated it helps with extended visibility.

Supervisor Timmons asked how many hours the deputies work. Sheriff Reed stated they will sometimes have two or three days off that they can work; the shifts are 10 hours. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Gray, to authorize the increase of overtime hours to 40 hours per deputy per month, and to approve the continuation of the Sheriff's At-Will Overtime Program with six-month reporting.

Mr. Bartlett asked how the Board wishes the overtime to be funded. Supervisor Timmons stated it will pay for itself as there is more than enough revenue to cover the costs.

Supervisor Gray questioned if there were signs of work fatigue; Sheriff Reed said he has not seen any as the deputies are not allowed to work more than 12 hours daily, and the overtime worked is on their days off.

Chairman Simpson asked for the vote on Supervisor Timmons' motion, to authorize the increase of overtime hours to 40 hours per deputy, and to approve the continuation of the Sheriff's At-Will Overtime Program with the six-month reporting; the motion carried:

In Re: County Administrator's Report - YMCA Loan

Mr. Bartlett stated that on February 11, 2014, the Board of Supervisors approved providing the YMCA a \$50,000 loan each year for three years. The first \$50,000 was provided to the YMCA in February 2014. The second and third installments were contingent on the YMCA making adequate progress in addressing its cash-flow challenges. No interest is to be charged on the Loan. On September 8, 2015, the Board of Supervisors voted not to approve the release of additional funds to the YMCA.

Repayment of the loan was to begin five years after the first payment on terms to be determined. As of this date, no formal repayment exists concerning the \$50,000 loan. In order to provide the YMCA adequate notice of any repayment terms, a promissory note is proposed. The note as proposed requires two annual installments of \$25,000 to be paid in March of 2019 and 2020. The Note does allow the YMCA to designate any and all annual contributions from Prince Edward County to the YMCA from Fiscal Year 2017-2020 to be credited against the Note.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, to authorize the County Administrator to forward it to the Prince Edward County IDA to be enacted; the motion carried:

In Re: County Administrator's Report - Landfill Update

Mr. Bartlett stated that on April 12, 2016, the Board of Supervisors awarded a contract to Sargent Corporation for the construction of Cell E at the Prince Edward County landfill. All preconstruction activities have been completed and construction commenced on May 10, 2016. On July 1, 2016, approximately 65% of the cell construction has been completed. Work is progressing rapidly and is estimated to be completed on August 17, 2016 which is one week ahead of schedule.

All excavation, subgrade work and liner systems work has been completed. The drainage layer and leachate collection system are 40% complete. The filter, rain cap and seeding and mulching will commence once all other work has been completed. It is anticipated the contract will be completed with no change orders.

Supervisor Gray commended the work that has been completed.

In Re: Courthouse Security Committee - Appointment

Mr. Bartlett stated report from the Security Consultant will be received in the near future. The Courthouse Security Committee will soon schedule a meeting. He stated the committee comprises Supervisor Townsend, Supervisor Simpson and one member, Charles McKay, who is no longer on the Board of Supervisors and will need to be replaced, or the Committee can function with two members.

In Re: Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority

Mr. Bartlett stated the County of Prince Edward is a member of the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority. The members of the Authority are the Counties of Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Lunenburg and Prince Edward. The Authority was created by ordinance in November of 2000 for the purpose of supporting regional economic development efforts. The Authority owns the regional industrial park located on Route 360 in Charlotte County.

The Authority *Ordinance* provides that each locality may appoint two representatives to the Authority Board. Authority members shall be two of the following: the County Administrator, a member of the Board of Supervisors as a member of the Industrial Development Authority. Charlotte County is the fiscal agent for the Authority. The Charlotte County Attorney is recommending the member localities consider an amendment to the *Ordinance* that created the Authority.

At present, the Authority *Ordinance* stipulates that each Authority Board member may only serve two four-year terms. The *Code of Virginia* allows a member locality's appointees to be re-appointed as often as the member locality's governing body wishes. It is recommended that the Authority's *Ordinance* be brought into agreement with the *Code of Virginia*. Bill Hefty of the Law firm Hefty & Wiley was also present.

Chairman Simpson called the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors meeting to order.

In Re: Piedmont Regional Jail Governance

Vivian Giles, County Administrator of Cumberland County, led the meeting, the purpose of which was to discuss the possibility of changing the organizational structure of the Piedmont Regional Jail from a Board to an Authority. Mrs. Giles guided discussion regarding the various resolutions the member Counties would have to adopt to enact a Jail Authority and a service agreement to be approved by each County.

Supervisor Timmons requested Mrs. Giles discuss the pros and cons of changing from a Jail Board to a Jail Authority. Mrs. Giles stated there were two primary reasons. First, by enacting an Authority, the Counties would no longer have direct liability regarding any actions or operations of the Jail. As a Board, each County is liable for jail operations and can be sued directly. As an Authority, the Jail Authority would be an independent political subdivision of the state which would shield the individual counties from liability. The second, primary reason for creating an Authority would be to remove any debt related to the Jail from the Counties' balance sheets. As an Authority, the Jail could assume debt in its own name but any debt incurred by the Authority would be reflected on the Authority's balance sheet, not the individual Counties. Besides these two reasons, a Jail Authority could also own property in its own name.

The only con would be the ability of the Jail to issue debt. Some were concerned the Jail Authority could obligate the Counties to repay such debt. Mr. Wiley explained that because Jail Authorities do not have sustainable revenue streams outside of the member Counties, no lending institutions would lend money to any Jail Authority unless the member Counties provided a written "moral obligation" commitment from each member County to make annual appropriations for both debt service and operations, as a condition of any debt issuance.

Additional discussion ensued.

Smart Scale (HB2) Projects As the Board will recall, House Bill 2 (HB2) was signed into law in 2014 and directs the Commonwealth Transportation Board to develop and use a new scoring process to select the transportation projects that will receive VDOT funding. The new name for the HB2 program is Smart Scale. Project scoring is based on the following factors: congestion mitigation, economic development, accessibility, safety, environmental quality, land-use and transportation coordination.

Staff has discussed potential projects with Scot Shippee and Kevin Smith. There are three projects that have been identified that seem to be a good fit for this program. With the Board's concurrence, staff will work with VDOT on project design and funding applications. The potential projects include:


- 1. <u>US 460/VA 626 Intersection (at Prospect)</u>: This is the main intersection at Prospect. For a number of years VDOT has proposed "safety improvements" at this intersection. There is a significant accident history for the intersection.
- 2. <u>US 460/US 15/VA 628 Intersection (at Schools)</u>: This project would include a review of the traffic movements from the U.S. 460 exit ramps and the left turn lanes into Rt. 628 (Zion Hill Road). There is a significant accident history for both of these intersections.
- 3. <u>US 460 East Interchange</u>: This project would propose the build-out of the U.S. 460 interchange east of Farmville.





Summary: At its July meeting, the Board authorized a Public Hearing on an amendment to the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority Ordinance. The members of the Authority are the Counties of Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Lunenburg and Prince Edward. The Authority was created by ordinance in November of 2000 for the purpose of supporting regional economic development efforts. The Authority owns the regional industrial park located on Rt. 360 in Charlotte County.

The Authority Ordinance provides that each locality may appoint two representatives to the Authority Board. Authority members shall be two of the following: the County Administrator, a member of the Board of Supervisors, a member of the Industrial Development Authority. At present, the Authority Ordinance stipulates that each Authority Board member may only service two four-year terms. The Code of Virginia allows a member locality's appointees to be re-appointed as often as the member locality's governing body wishes. It is recommended that the Authority's Ordinance be brought into agreement with the Code of Virginia.

In Re: Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority Ordinance and Revenue Sharing Agreement

County Administrator, Mildred B. Hampton, advised the Board that the Counties of Prince Edward, Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland and Lunenburg were moving forward with the development of a new 400-acre regional industrial park, which will be located on U.S. 360 near Keysville. Funding for the park comes from a \$1,375,000 grant through the Virginia Industrial Site Development Fund (ISDF) and \$1,375,000 from the Tobacco Commission. No local funds will be necessary. One of the requirements of the ISDF program is that each of the participating counties adopt a revenue sharing agreement. The participating counties also felt it was important that the assets of the industrial park be held by a regional entity that could represent the interests of all of the member counties. The creation of a Regional Industrial Facility Authority would provide the mechanism. Additionally, each Board of Supervisors would appoint two representatives to serve on the authority.

Mrs. Hampton advised that the Charlotte and Lunenburg Counties had already adopted the ordinance to create the regional industrial facility authority and the revenue sharing agreement. She indicated there had been two changes made to the documents since they were originally distributed. The first was in the Authority Ordinance and concerned language about subsequent appointments to the Authority Board. The Second change revised the Revenue Sharing Agreement to give the decision making power of the distribution of funds to the Authority Board, rather than mandate it automatically be distributed to the Counties.

They also named Board Chairman, Hunter R. Watson; and County Administrator, Mildred B. Hampton, as the County's representatives on the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority.

The adopted documents read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE THE VIRGINIA'S HEARTLAND REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL FACILITY AUTHORITY

WHEREAS the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors (the Board) has determined that the economic growth and development of Prince Edward County and the comfort, convenience, and welfare of its citizens require the development of a large regional industrial facility; and,

WHEREAS the purpose of the large regional facility is to compliment the existing smaller facilities available in the County and to attract the business prospects that desire a large facility not otherwise available in the "Heartland Region"; and

WHEREAS the creation of a large regional facility will draw a large number of prospects, not otherwise coming into the County as industry support or business support to the larger regional industrial facility and will facilitate economic development in the County that would not otherwise be available; and

WHEREAS the Board has recognized that regional cooperation in industrial development will assist the County and other cooperating localities to achieve a greater degree of economic stability; and,

WHEREAS the Board has further determined that joint action through a regional industrial facilities authority will facilitate the development of need facilities and enhance the economic base for the member localities by developing, owning, and operating one or more facilities on a cooperative basis; and,

WHEREAS the Board has determined that formation of a regional industrial facilities authority in cooperation with the counties of Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Amelia and Lunenburg along with the Prince Edward County (the "Heartland Counties") and in compliance with the Virginia Regional Industrial Facilities Act, Chapter 64 of Title 15.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, will benefit the inhabitants of the region and other areas of the Commonwealth, for the increase of their commerce, and for the promotion of their safety, health, welfare, convenience and prosperity; NOW THEREFORE, be it ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia that:

In accord with Title 15.2, Chapter 64 of the 1950 Code of Virginia, as amended, there is hereby created the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority, provided:

THAT this ordinance shall become effective upon adoption of a similar ordinance by each of the Heartland Counties; and

THAT the adopting ordinance of each of the Heartland Counties shall contain provisions regarding the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority identical to the provisions as stated in the following ordinance, and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,

1) The Chairman of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors is authorized, upon review and majority vote of the members of the Board of Supervisors in favor of the Agreement, to execute an agreement establishing the respective rights and obligations of Prince Edward County and each of the other Heartland Counties with respect to the Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority consistent with Title 15.2, Chapter 64 of the 1950 Code of Virginia, as amended, and

2) Definitions.

"Act" shall mean the Regional Industrial Facilities Act, Chapter 64 of Title 15.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

"Agreement" shall mean the "Agreement for Cost Sharing and Revenue Sharing between each of the Heartland Counties."

"Authority" shall mean the regional industrial facility authority created hereby by cooperative action of each of the Heartland Counties and named herein, the Virginia Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority."

"Board of Directors" shall mean the Board of Directors of the Virginia Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority.

"Governing Body" shall mean the board of supervisors of counties that are members of the Authority.

"Member Localities" shall mean all members of the Virginia Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority, which initially include Amelia County, Buckingham County, Charlotte County, Cumberland County, Lunenberg County and Prince Edward County.

3) Creation, Name, Powers, Dissolution and Fiscal Year.

- a) There is hereby created, pursuant to the Act and in conjunction with the adoption of a similar ordinance by the Board of Supervisors of each of the Heartland's Counties, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth named the "Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority." The Virginia's Heartland Regional Industrial Facility Authority may use the short name, "Heartland Authority".
- b) The Authority is vested with the powers of a body corporate, including the power to sue and be sued in its own name, plead and be impleaded, and adopt and use a common seal and alter the same as may be deemed expedient. The Authority shall have all rights, duties and powers provided by provision of the Act, and including such powers, rights, and duties as may hereafter be set forth from time to time in the Act.
- c) The Authority may be dissolved by resolution of the Board of Directors in compliance with provisions for dissolution stated in the Act.
- d) The fiscal year for the Authority shall be the same as that of the Commonwealth.

Purpose.

The Authority is charged with the specific purpose to develop the "Virginia's Heartland First Regional Industrial Park" as a regional industrial park and for the additional purpose of future development of other industrial properties or other reasons as permitted by the Act and as agreed upon by the Member Localities.

Membership.

The Member Localities of the Authority are Amelia County, Buckingham County, Charlotte County, Cumberland County, Lunenburg County and Prince Edward County, each of which is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and each of which is authorized by the Act to participate in the Authority. The membership may, with the approval of the Board of Directors, be expanded in compliance with provision for expansion as stated in the Act.

6) Member Locality Agreement.

The Authority shall be governed by the Act, this Article, and by the Agreement executed by the Governing Body of each Member Locality. The Agreement shall establish the respective rights and obligations of the Member Localities and shall provide for revenue and economic growth-sharing arrangements with respect to tax revenues and other income and revenues generated by any facility owned by the Authority.

- 7) Board of Directors
- (a) The powers, rights, and duties conferred by the Act upon the Authority shall be exercised by a Board of Directors, which shall initially consist of two members appointed by the Governing Body of each Member Locality. The number of directors of the Authority may be supplemented by decision of and appointment by the Governing Bodies as permitted by the Act.
- (b) Each Member Locality shall initially appoint to the Board of Directors the County Administrator and either a member of the Governing Body or a member of the Industrial Development Authority. Subsequent appointments shall be selected from the following: the County Administrator, a member of the Governing Body or a member of the Industrial Development Industrial Authority.
- (c) Each member of the Board of Directors shall serve for a term of four years and may be reappointed for one additional four-year term, with the following exception regarding the initial Board of Directors to provide for staggered terms. One of the two members appointed from each Member Locality to the initial Board of Directors shall be appointed for a term of two years and may be reappointed for an additional four-year term. The term of office of the members of the initial Board of Directors shall begin on the date of the creation of the Authority.
- (d) Each member of the Board of Directors, before entering upon the discharge of the duties of the office, shall take and subscribe to the oath prescribed in section 49-1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and shall serve in compliance with the Act, this Article, and the Agreement.
- (e) The Board of Directors shall adopt bylaws, rules and/or regulations to carry out the provisions of the Act. The bylaws, rules, and/or regulations shall, among other things, specify the principal office for the Authority, identify the schedule and place for meetings of the Board of Directors, and provide for the general administration of the operations of the Authority.
- (f) Members of the Board of Directors shall be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties from funds available to the Authority.

(8) Principal office location, records, and title to property.

The principal office of the Authority shall be located within a Member Locality. All records shall be kept at such office. The title to all property of every kind belonging to the Authority shall be titled to the Authority, which shall hold such title for the benefit of its Member Localities.

(9) Funding.

Funding of the Authority shall be by appropriation as decided from time-to-time by the Governing Bodies of the Member Localities and from such other sources as are identified in the Agreement.

(10) Required Reports.

- (a) <u>Annual Reports</u>. The Board of Directors shall report to the Governing Body of each Member Locality annually, on or before the last March meeting of the Governing Body, on the activities of the Authority. In addition to oral presentation at the meeting, a written annual report shall be provided prior to the meeting and shall contain, at a minimum, the following information:
 - (i.) A financial update through December 31 of the current fiscal year,
 - (ii.) After completion of the first fiscal year, an audited financial report showing expenditures and revenues and a statement showing financial condition at the end of the preceding fiscal year;
 - (iii.) A written report, approved by the Board of Directors, of the activities and accomplishments of the Authority and recommendations regarding future activities of the Authority; and
 - (iv.) A list of tenants, purchasers or other persons occupying the Virginia's Heartland First Regional Industrial Park or any other regional industrial facilities developed by the Authority.
- (b) Special Reports. Upon written request of the Governing Body of any Member Locality, the Board of Directors shall report to the Governing Body within (30) days of receipt of the request or within a longer period if so provided in the written request. The special report shall describe the activities and financial status of the Authority within the six-month period immediately preceding the request, or as otherwise specified in the written request and shall be furnished to each Member Locality. A written report shall be provided if requested.

Summary:

During a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on May 31, 2016 the Board approved allowing the Prince Edward County IDA to assist in the issuance of up to \$9,900,000 of Bank Qualified Bonds for Ferrum College. The Prince Edward County IDA conducted a public hearing on July 29, 2016 on the application of Ferrum College requesting the IDA of Prince Edward County to issue up to \$9.9 million of revenue bonds or notes. No one spoke and the IDA unanimously approved the resolution agreeing to assist Ferrum College on the issuance of the bonds and recommending the Board of Supervisors approve the refunding of the prior bonds. Section 2 of the resolution specifically states the bonds will include statements that neither the IDA or Prince Edward County shall be obligated to pay the principal or interest of the bonds or any other costs incident to the issuance of the bonds, Attachment (1). Attachment (2) is a report from the Chairman of the IDA regarding the public hearing.

To cover a localities lack of liability for bonds that an IDA might issue for Ferrum or any other not-for-profit, Section 15.2-4909 of the Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act of the Code of Virginia provides that any bond issued by an IDA must specifically state that neither the Commonwealth nor any political subdivision thereof (Prince Edward County) nor the IDA shall be obligated to pay the bond except from revenues pledged therefor (in this case debt service payments specifically to be made by Ferrum). That section likewise provides that the directors of the IDA won't be personally liable on the bond. This language is put into the Code of Virginia to make it clear that the a local government and IDA that assists a 501(c)(3) has no legal responsibility on the debt. Thus there would be no risk or obligation for either the IDA or the County. The IDA does not receive any notices of payment or any other Bond management activities except for an annual Bond affidavit. Attachment (3) is the Fiscal Impact Statement as it affects Prince Edward County. As can be seen there are no such impacts.

As required by section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to proceed with the issuance of the Bonds, the Board of Supervisors must approve a resolution approving the issuance of the Bonds, Attachment (4)

RESOLUTION OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, there have been described to the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Authority") the plans of Ferrum College (the "Borrower") to (a) refund the outstanding principal balances of (i) the \$6,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2008) issued by the Industrial Development Authority of Floyd County, Virginia, (ii) the \$4,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2010) issued by the Industrial Development Authority of the County of Franklin (the "Franklin Authority") and (iii) the \$4,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2011) issued by the Franklin Authority (collectively, the "Prior Bonds"), and (b) pay all or a part of the costs of issuing the Bonds (as hereinafter defined);

WHEREAS, the Prior Bonds were issued to assist the Borrower in financing the construction, expansion, renovation and equipping of various buildings (collectively, the "Project"), including the renovation of Bassett Hall, the construction and equipping of two residence halls and the construction and equipping of the Hank Norton Center, which Project is located on the Borrower's campus on Route 602 in Franklin County, Virginia (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the Borrower has described the benefits to the County and Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Locality") and has requested the Authority to agree to issue its revenue bonds or notes, under the Virginia Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act (the "Act"), in such amounts as may be necessary to refund the Prior Bonds and pay the costs of issuing the Bonds;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. It is hereby found and determined that the location of the Project in the County will promote the welfare of the residents of the Locality and the County and surrounding areas, will be in the public interest and will be consistent with the purposes of the Act.

2. The Authority hereby agrees, subject to required approvals and the compliance of the proposed issue with applicable law, to assist the Borrower in every reasonable way to refinance the Project and refund the Prior Bonds and, in particular, to undertake the issuance of one or more of its revenue bonds or notes (the "Bonds") therefor in amounts now estimated not to exceed \$9,900,000 upon terms and conditions to be mutually agreed upon between the Authority and the Borrower. The proceeds from the sale of the Bonds shall be loaned by the Authority to the Borrower pursuant to an agreement or agreements which will provide for loan repayments to the Authority sufficient to pay the principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds and to

pay all other expenses in connection with the refunding of the Prior Bonds. The Bonds shall be issued in form and pursuant to terms to be set by the Authority.

3. To the extent consistent with federal tax laws, all costs and expenses in connection with the refinancing of the Project and the refunding of the Prior Bonds, including the fees and expenses of bond counsel and Authority counsel, shall be paid from the proceeds of the Bonds. If for any reason the Bonds are not issued, it is understood that all such expenses shall be paid by the Borrower and that the Authority shall have no responsibility therefor.

4. The Authority shall perform such other acts and adopt such further resolutions as may be reasonably required to implement its undertakings as hereinabove set forth, and if requested by the Borrower, and at the expense of the Borrower, it will make application to the Internal Revenue Service for such tax rulings as may be necessary in the opinion of bond counsel.

5. The Authority hereby recommends that the Board of Supervisors of the Locality (the "Board") and the Board of Supervisors of the County (the "County Board") approve the refunding of the Prior Bonds, the refinancing of the Project and the issuance of the Bonds.

6. The officers of the Authority are hereby authorized and directed to deliver to the Board and the County Board (a) a reasonably detailed summary of the comments expressed at the public hearing held with respect to the issuance of the Bonds, (b) a fiscal impact statement concerning the Project in the form specified in Section 15.2-4907 of the Code of Virginia, and (c) a copy of this resolution, which constitutes the recommendation of the Authority that the Board and the County Board approve the refinancing of the Project, the refunding of the Prior Bonds and the issuance of the Bonds.

7. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall expire one year after its adoption unless extended by the Authority; provided that this resolution shall continue to remain in full force and effect after the Bonds shall have been issued.

8. This resolution is adopted as a substitute for the resolution adopted by the Authority on June 28, 2016 in which the Authority recommended that the Board and the County Board approve the issuance of the Bonds.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing was conducted by the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Authority") at a meeting held at noon on July 29, 2016 on the application of Ferrum College (the "Borrower") requesting the Authority to issue up to \$9,900,000 of its revenue bonds or notes (the "Bonds") to (a) refund the outstanding principal balances of (i) the \$6,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2008) issued by the Industrial Development Authority of Floyd County, Virginia, (ii) the \$4,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2010) issued by the Industrial Development Authority of the County of Franklin (the "Franklin Authority") and (iii) the \$4,000,000 Industrial Development Revenue Bond (Ferrum College, 2011) issued by the Franklin Authority (collectively, the "Prior Bonds"), and (b) pay all or a part of the costs of issuing the Bonds. The Prior Bonds were issued to assist the Borrower in financing the construction, expansion, renovation and equipping of various buildings (collectively, the "Project"), including the renovation of Bassett Hall, the construction and equipping of two residence halls and the construction and equipping of the Hank Norton Center. Notice of the hearing was published on July 15, 2016 and July 22, 2016 in The Farmville Herald and on July 14, 2016 and July 21, 2016 in The Roanoke Times. The Project is located on the Borrower's campus on Route 602 in Franklin County, Virginia. Such public hearing was held in the River Room of Charley's Waterfront Café, 201 Mill Street, Farmville, Virginia. At such meeting, those persons interested in the issuance of the Bonds or the location and nature of the Project were given the opportunity to present their views.

The public comments, if any, received at the meeting are summarized in Exhibit A attached hereto.

After such hearing, the Authority voted to recommend the approval of the Bonds to the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia and the Board of Supervisors of Franklin County, Virginia (collectively, the "Boards").

Accordingly, the Authority hereby recommends to the Boards that they approve the issuance of the Bonds, as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, the refinancing of the Project and the refunding of the Prior Bonds.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. The Board approves the refinancing of the Project, the refunding of the Prior Bonds and the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority for the benefit of the Borrower, as required by Section 147(f) of the Code, to permit the Authority to assist in the refinancing of the Project and the refunding of the Prior Bonds.

2. The approval of the issuance of the Bonds, as required by said Section 147(f), does not constitute an endorsement of the Bonds, the creditworthiness of the Borrower or the economic viability of the Project. The Bonds shall provide that neither the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Commonwealth") nor any political subdivision thereof, including the County, Franklin County and the Authority, shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest on the Bonds or other costs incident thereto except from the revenues and receipts pledged therefor and that neither the faith or credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof, including the County, Franklin County, shall be pledged therefor.

3. The Bonds are hereby designated as qualified tax-exempt obligations for purposes of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code, but only to the extent the Bonds are issued during 2016. The County has not designated, and will not designate, more than \$10,000,000 of obligations to be issued during 2016 as qualified tax-exempt obligations for purposes of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code.

4. The Board understands based on representations from the Borrower that the Board of Supervisors of Franklin County, Virginia has adopted or will adopt a resolution which approves the issuance of the Bonds as required by Section 147(f) of the Code.

Summary:

Executive Mansion Request for Holiday Tree Ornaments

As was done last year the Governor is requesting local governments provide a Holiday Ornament for the Christmas Tree in the Governor Mansion's Ballroom. Attachment (1) is the letter from the Virginia Association of Counties (VACO) announcing this program. The ornaments must be submitted to VACO by November 1, 2016. The County could resubmit the same ornament that was submitted last year or conduct the same selection process that was used last year, Attachment (2). The current ornament contains displays of the Courthouse, Longwood University-Ruffner, Hampden-Sydney Bell Tower, Moton Museum, Train Station, High Bridge, State Parks, Tobacco Warehouse, County Seal and Light of Reconciliation. The Guidelines are identical to last years. The selection process placed a considerable burden on the County staff and would do so again. Since the guidelines are the same and the current ornament is excellent in its depiction of items unique to Prince Edward, I recommend the Board resubmit the existing ornament.

Request from Mayor of the Town of Crewe

Attachment (3) is a request from the Mayor of the Town of Crewe. The local governments in Nottoway County have presented a petition to their legislative delegation requesting 5% of total lottery sales be returned to the general fund of the localities. The letter and attachments outline the proposal.

Courthouse Landscape

During the July meeting of the Board of Supervisors the Board tabled any action until the County received the report from the security consultant. That report has been received but it will still be several weeks if not months before final decisions are made concerning actions to improve security. I contacted the Landscape Designer and received the attached e-mail, Attachment (4). As you can see she strongly recommends we make a decision in order for the work to be completed prior to the Vice-Presidential debate. The Board will wish to determine the next step to take.

Guidelines for "Home for the Holidays"

Gentlemen;

Attached for your information is a formal request from the elected leadership of the Nottoway County communities to their legislators requesting a change in the current Virginia state law to allow a five percent return of lottery sales to Virginia localities. This plan, as proposed, <u>will not</u> take away money from the school systems.

We believe this proposal will be of benefit to all localities in the Commonwealth and urge your offices, the Farmville Town Council and Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors go on record in support, by contacting your state representatives and by urging the Virginia Municipal League to make it a part of their 2017 legislative agenda.

The only way to accurately estimate what additional general revenues the Town and County could have received in 2015 (had this proposal been in place) is by knowing the total lottery sales from your vendors. However, by extrapolating what you received in lottery 2015 school funding (estimating it at 29% of city sales), a broad ballpark estimate suggests around \$460,000 in additional revenues for general funds. This might be significantly more <u>or</u> less as our proposal is based on locality retail sales of lottery tickets, not per capita as the school funding is allocated. We recommend you request from the Va Lottery the total 2015 lottery sales for your locality to see what 5% might mean to your general revenue budget.

I will be glad to speak on this proposal with you or any member of the city staff that you direct.

Subject: Lottery for Localities

Gentlemen;

We are requesting a 'Lottery for Localities'. Specifically we are requesting legislation that will allocate 5% of total lottery sales back to the general revenue funds of localities where those sales originated. It is envisioned the allocation will be culled from total sales and subtracted from that portion of the lottery pool designated as the 'prize pool' (approximately 60.6% of sales). In this way, the public school funding allocation (approximately 29% of sales) is untouched. No monies are diverted from public education by our formula.

The attached background paper and plan provides facts in regards to the Virginia State Lottery in Nottoway County (as a case study of a Virginia community). It outlines what we envision as a course for action that will benefit all Virginia's localities and Virginia's citizens. This plan has been presented to the governing bodies of the three towns and the county. These governing bodies have voted for support of this plan and seek legislation that will implement this concept to the benefit of all Virginians.

The revenue infusion a 'Lottery for Localities' can provide to local governments will have a positive impact for cash strapped rural communities facing an ever shrinking business and community tax base while demands for public services rise. We feel this is a discussion that needs to be initiated across the Commonwealth with local governments and state officials. We are open to constructive dialogue and suggestions on how make this concept a reality.

Lottery for Localities A Course for Action

1. Background: The Virginia State Lottery is a \$1.8 billion¹ state run enterprise. The sales of lottery tickets are untaxed by localities. The lottery been referred to as a 'backdoor tax' or 'regressive tax' in which the poor give money to the state government.² Lottery spending drains rural communities of dollars that might otherwise be spent energizing our local economies by generating local retail sales as well as meals, gas and lodging taxes for our local general revenue. Virginia Lottery disbursements for calendar year 2015 resulted in an estimated \$1.166 billion (60.6%) devoted to prizes; \$103 million (5.6%) was paid out to retailers and \$90.8 million (4.9%) was devoted to operating costs. That left \$533.8 million (28.9%) to be distributed to Virginia's public school systems in accordance to a state formula.³

2. Local Sales: In response to a request for information, the Virginia Lottery submitted the data below reflecting the Nottoway County calendar year 2015 sales of Virginia Lottery tickets.⁴

3. Local Education Return: The \$6.2 million in local sales results in just over \$2 million a year returning to Nottoway County Schools. Lottery proceeds are paid to the county school system twice a month. The formula used by the lottery to return monies to school systems is not based on locality sales but on a student <u>per capita</u> formula. For example, Fairfax County, the fastest growing county in Virginia and among the ten richest in the nation, received over \$36 million in lottery proceeds in FY2015.⁵

4. Prior Efforts at Taxation: In the 2012 Legislative Session Senator Frank Ruff proposed a bill for a sales tax on the purchase of lottery tickets. The Virginia Municipal League supported the measure. The Virginia Lottery opposed the bill and was successful in defeating the bill during the Senate Finance Committee hearing. VML Director of Fiscal Policy Neal Menkes says, "To the best of my knowledge no attempt has been made since 2012."⁶

5. Virginia Constitution: VML advises the Virginia Constitution, specifically Article X, Section 7-A "explicitly identifies public education as the sole purpose of Lottery proceeds." The Virginia General Assembly can redirect a portion of the Lottery Proceeds Fund for other purposes but it requires a 4/5 majority vote in both Houses (32 Senators and 80 House members).⁷ The power to change the formula to benefit all Virginia communities rests with the Virginia General Assembly.

6. Observations: Using 2015 lottery sales figures, if the Nottoway County lottery sales were taxed at 5% or had a 5% kick-back to locality general revenue funds, the county and towns would take in \$310,378.74.⁸ It is envisioned the 5% formula be split between the County and the Towns with the County receiving 40% of the total revenues generated in the incorporated towns and 100% of total revenues generated by retail outlets outside of the towns. Using 2015 sales figures this would result in the following (estimated):

<u>Note:</u> Three of the 23824 outlets are outside of Blackstone and in the County therefore the actual total for Blackstone would be less and the total for the county would be more. The data used was requested from the Lottery based on the zip codes of the Lottery retail outlets.

While larger communities might view these amounts as 'chump change', they do represent significant sums to rural communities. If Crewe received an additional \$61,000 it could pay down the debt from government mandates, improve infrastructure, etc. These are monies that could help town governments take care of big ticket items and desired community development projects which it seldom has funds to address.

Using 2015 figures, state lottery total sales were \$1.844 billion. Pulling off 5% off the total sales would result in \$92,200,000 that could be returned to localities.

Taking \$92.2 million from the 2015 prize payout portion *only* would reduce the payout fund from \$1.166 billion to 1.073 billion and <u>does not</u> take away from the amount returned to local

school systems.⁹ Lottery jackpots are announced ahead of sales. The diversion of the 5% of sales is invisible to individual players and will not impact those announcements nor deter people from playing the lottery.

Lottery returns to localities should be based on local sales and <u>not</u> a per capita basis. In this way, we in the locality only get a percentage of what is generated in our localities.

Further, the lottery funds that come to the localities should be unrestricted and for our general revenue to address local needs.

This should be viewed as a bi-partisan effort which benefits all Virginia's taxpayers and local governments regardless of the size of their populations.

- 7. Proposed Course of Action:
 - a. Enact legislation to allocate 5% of total lottery sales to the localities in which the sales are made.
 - i. Only the prize payout portion of the funds will be impacted (trimmed from 60.6% to 55.6% of total lottery allocations);
 - ii. These funds are to be culled by the Virginia Lottery from sales and placed in a separate 'Lottery for Localities' fund until payout;
 - iii. Payouts to localities to be made on a quarterly basis;
 - iv. Payouts to localities will go to incorporated town, county or city general revenue funds, based on total lottery sales in those localities;
 - v. Payouts to localities will be unrestricted in how they are spent.
 - vi. County governments would receive up to 40% of incorporated town lottery proceeds unless the county government opts for a lower percentage at the local level.
 - b. Phased Implementation:
 - i. Legislation passed in the 2017 session will take effect on 1 July 2017.
 - ii. It is envisioned the 5% would be culled from the last six months of 2017 sales and these could be paid by 15 January 2018 with follow-on payments after every quarter.

iii. This phased implementation gives the Virginia State Lottery more than six months to orchestrate the administrative procedures to accommodate the new legislative mandate while building the 'Lottery for Localities' pool.

Purpose of Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated the purpose of the meeting was for the Commonwealth Regional Council to have discussions with current members and their associates towns and eligible non-members on the CRC moving forward with necessary steps to obtain Economic Development District Designation from the Economic Development Administration.

Presentation: Ms. Hickman provided a media presentation.

Highlights of the Presentation:

An overview of Planning District 14's past Economic Development District Designation (1970-2005) through the Piedmont Planning District Commission (PPDC) was provided.

The PPDC covered the following localities: Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Lunenburg, Nottoway, Prince Edward, Blackstone, Crewe, Dillwyn, Farmville, Kenbridge, and Victoria. The former PPDC governing body consisted of 22 members, both elected and citizen representatives appointed by local member governments.

Ms. Hickman was hired as the Economic Development Planner for the PPDC, for which she was responsible for the Economic Development Administration program. The PPDC received planning grant funds for its efforts in providing planning assistance to member localities for the economic and community development initiatives which included: project development, grant writing, grant administration and technical assistance. During this time the PPDC did not charge for grant writing/technical assistance services as the EDA Grant provided funding for this assistance. The funding also was utilized to implement the Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) and conduct committee meetings.

Some examples of past funded PPDC, EDA Projects included:

1987 – Prince Edward County Industrial Park, \$777,000 EDA Grant, \$333,000 Local Contribution 1987-Lunenburg-Victoria Industrial Plant Acquisition and Renovation, \$324,000 EDA Grant, \$108,000 Local Contribution

1990-Blackstone Industrial Park (Phase II), \$552,000 EDA Grant, \$552,000 Local Contribution 1994-Charlotte County Industrial Park, \$750,000 EDA Grant, \$314,000 Local Contribution

1998-Town of Farmville Culvert Replacement Project, \$274,000 EDA Grant, \$92,250 Local Contribution

Currently, in order to be eligible for EDD designation a region must either contain at least one geographic area that is subject to the economic distress criteria; is of sufficient size or population and contains sufficient resources to foster economic development on a scale involving more than a single geographic area; and has an EDA approved Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). An EDD must be organized as one of the following: public organization formed through an intergovernmental agreement providing for the joint exercise of local government powers; or public organization established under state-enabling legislation for the creation of multi-jurisdictional areawide planning organizations; or a non-profit organization incorporated under the applicable non-profit statues of the state in which it is incorporated.

There are key changes that have occurred in the EDD process. In December 2015, Federal Regulations relating to the Economic Development Administration, Economic District Designation (EDD) were amended. The amended regulations no longer requires that the EDD policy boards, which are the governing board, meet a membership threshold of a minimum of 35% to include one or more representatives from chambers of commerce, institutions of post-secondary education, workforce development groups or labor groups. In lieu of membership thresholds, EDA maintains the requirement that the governing body of the EDD must demonstrate they broadly represent the principal economic interest of the region including the private sector, public officials, community leaders, representatives of workforce development boards, institutions of higher education, minority and labor groups and private individuals. An EDD must demonstrate the capacity to implement the EDA-approved CEDS, which includes designating a staff to oversee EDA designation and program requirements. EDD's must provide access for persons who are not members to make their views known concerning ongoing and proposed EDD activities.

The benefits of being an EDD include the CRC receiving funding (\$70,000 Grant/\$70,000 Cash Match) to support the regional organization and its services to members relating to economic and community development planning initiatives. Also, the CRC and its members would be covered by an EDA-approved CEDS and eligible to apply for EDA Grant funding for applicable projects identified regionally.

Current EDA Funding Programs include:

- Public Works
- Economic Adjustment
- Partnership Planning
- Trade Adjustment Assistance
- University Centers
- Research and National Technical Assistance
- Local Technical Assistance

Examples of EDA funded projects in the surrounding current EDA EDD's were presented in hand-out attachments from West Piedmont Planning District Commission, Southside Planning District Commission and Crater Planning District Commission.

Status of Planning Districts in Virginia Economic Development District eligibility:

- 10 Planning Districts that are EDD Districts: Lenowisco, Cumberland Plateau, Mount Rogers, New River Valley, Central Shenandoah, West Piedmont, Southside, Northern Neck, Crater and Accomack-Northampton
- 5 Planning Districts that are CEDS Districts (not approved EDD as of yet): Roanoke Valley-Alleghany, Region 2000, Richmond Regional, Middle Pennisula and Hampton Roads
- 6 Planning Districts that are not CEDS or EDD's: Northern Shenandoah, Northern Virginia, Rappahannock-Rapidan, Thomas Jefferson, CRC, and George Washington

It was noted the CEDS process is a long term process. Planning Districts listed that have a completed CEDS but have not received approval from EDA have in some cases been working on this for 2 years or more.

The CRC recently inquired on eligibility of CRC's current governing board structure (elected officials only) for eligibility of an EDD due to representatives also having other private sector and community positions. CRC was notified this would be questionable because CRC representatives are appointed on the basis of being elected officials. It was also noted it was questionable if a 5 member governing body represented a regions population of 78,704. This then would require the CRC to change the structure and representation for the governing body to meet EDA requirements.

The current CRC has never undertaken the EDA Comprehensive Economic Development District Strategy (CEDS) process which leads to an EDA-approved CEDS.

EDA does provide organizations the opportunity to apply for funding to support the development of a CEDS (\$50,000-\$60,000) 1:1 match required. Consultant can be hired to complete CEDS.

EDA determines acceptance of CEDS. If EDA approves CEDS, the organization then can be invited to apply for an EDA Economic Development District designation.

Main points of Questions and Discussion by Participants:

- Current discussions of pursuing EDD designation are the direct result of the Dialogue Session input this past year with member localities.
- Funding from the CRC general fund could be utilized for EDA matching funds.
- The PPDC and the Virginia's Heartland dissolved to create the current CRC that would combine planning and marketing under one roof. In doing so, the CRC chose to give up the EDD designation. If the CRC chooses to pursue EDD designation, this would be an investment of the funds from the prior PPDC and Virginia's Heartland that would be put to good use.
- The CRC will need to review EDA regulations and identify categories needed to address EDA criteria for board representation then have localities seek representatives for appointment.
- Participating localities would be appointing representatives to the CRC based on guidelines determined by the CRC after reviewing EDA guidelines.
- Need to get former eligible CRC members back to assist in seeking EDD designation.

- Will seeking EDD designation bring back former eligible member localities/entities as active members?
- What will be the footprint of the boundaries for the EDD designation sought?
- Does the CRC, in seeking EDD designation, have to use the footprint boundary of PD14 or can it utilize boundary of current active CRC members?
- If a non-member wants to join CRC after EDD designation is received that does not include them, can the EDD be amended to include them later?
- Is the CRC eligible for EDD designation if it does not include non-member localities?
- Should the CRC have discussion with DHCD about non-member localities of the CRC being moved to another Planning District at the next planning district boundary adjustment review?
- Governing board of the CRC should not be too big. Trouble with obtaining a quorum.
- Discussions of CRC governing board being around 12 representatives to meet guidelines.
- Need to meet with Bob Gittler, Virginia EDA Representative, to discuss options of CRC boundary for EDD designation.
- Need to determine if CRC staff would conduct CEDS or if there is a need to hire a consultant.
- Will need to review CRC Bylaws to determine amendments needed to meet EDA criteria.

Discussion and Evaluation of Commonwealth Regional Council's Next Steps: It was determined the following items need to be discussed at the August 4th CRC meeting:

- Review EDA Regulations for governing board members and determine requirements needed to address this issue
- CRC Bylaws need to reflect EDA regulations for EDD designation
- Need to schedule a meeting face-to-face with Bob Gittler, Virginia EDA Representative to discuss EDD designation
- Determine if the PD14 physical boundary has to be adhered to in pursuing EDD designation
- Determine if the CRC Staff will complete CEDS or a Consultant will be needed

Other Business: Ms. Foster passed out a letter from VDOT to the CRC concerning an upcoming review of the CRC's Title VI Program in August. Ms. Foster stated she planned to have some documents ready for the August 4th CRC meeting for review and action.

Approval of Minutes of June 2, 2016 Meeting

The minutes were approved by acclamation.

Treasurer's Report

June Financial Statements: The Treasurer stated he had reviewed the June Financial Statement as well as documentation provided for the checks when signing and all was in order. Mr. Timmons moved and Mr. Dunnavant seconded to approve the June Financial Statement as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: The Chairman did not have a report.

Report on Chief Administrative Officers Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated a copy of the Agenda was provided for information. Ms. Hickman noted if any Council Representative would like more information on items listed, to please let her know.

Council Approval of Professional Movers to Move CRC Office Contents: Ms. Hickman stated at the June 2nd CRC meeting the Council directed her to get a quote from Reliable Moving for professional moving services for the office to relocate to the 2nd floor of the Mill Building and provide the information to Council through email for approval through a Conference Call. Ms. Hickman reported a copy of the CRC Teleconference Meeting Minutes of June 8th were included in the Council packet. All 5 Council Members were present by phone.. Ms. Hickman stated the Council provided approval and authorized \$2,600 for utilizing Reliable Moving to move the office content to Suite 202, on the 2nd floor of the Mill Building. Expenditures up to \$1,200 toward additional moving costs associated with the move were also approved. Ms. Hickman stated the total expense authorization for the move was \$3,800.

Scoping the Future – Discussion of Innovative/Regional Ideas: There was discussion that once an item listed has been addressed it would be removed from the listing.

Old Business

Staff Reports:

Rescheduling of Economic Development Administration (EDA) Economic Development District (EDD) Designation Status (Council Representation) Work Session: Ms. Hickman stated at the June CRC meeting the Council requested that a meeting be held just prior to the July CRC monthly meeting pertaining to EDA Economic Development District Designation. However, it came to the attention of the staff there was a scheduling conflict with the Virginia Growth Alliance Meeting being held the same day at 10:00 a.m. Ms. Hickman stated she had contacted the County Administrators, Town Manager/and or Clerks to help identify another possible date in July for consideration to ensure that the meeting could be held as quickly as possible. Ms. Hickman referred the Council Representatives to the Attached correspondence. Ms. Hickman noted based on responses received thus far, it appeared the best date for attendance is Friday, June 22, 2016. Ms. Hickman stated all of the localities indicated this date was acceptable except for receiving no response from Charlotte County, and the Towns of Phenix and Charlotte Court House. Ms. Hickman stated there could potentially be 25 people in attendance.

Discussion was held on suitable locations to hold the meeting.

It was the consensus of the Council Representatives to allow Ms. Hickman to pick the most suitable location to hold the meeting. The preference for the time of the meeting was 9:00 a.m.

Mr. Walker moved and Mr. Gleason seconded to invite all eligible PD14 non-member localities/entities to the meeting to discuss possible Economic Development District Designation. Motion carried.

Submission of State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) Grant, Regional Emergency Communications Tower Improvements to Alleviate Dead Zones: Ms. Foster stated the CRC submitted a State Homeland Security Program Grant for the Regional Emergency Communications Tower Improvements to Alleviate Dead Zones on June 20th. Ms. Foster stated the CRC was the Applicant for the Regional Grant that proposes to erect eight Emergency Communication Towers in a four county area. Two towers are proposed for Amelia, four in Charlotte, one in Lunenburg and one in Prince Edward Counties. MBC, partnering with the CRC on the Application, is donating five towers to the project. This grant will fund the purchase and erection of three towers and the erection of the five donated towers by MBC. The grant request is for 1,296,856. The grant request includes 50,000 for the CRC to administer the project if it is funded. Review of the Applications is occurring now with anticipated letters of award going out between August $8 - 12^{th}$.

There was discussion on the proposed regional project.

Update on CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update: Mr. Fortune stated the Hazardous Identification and Risk Assessment portion of the Plan is almost complete. Mr. Fortune stated a meeting will be held on July 29th at 10:30 a.m. in the Mill Building Basement Conference Room for staff to present the results to stakeholders for review and comment. There will also be a brief discussion of public participation methods and the required update of mitigation actions for the Plan. The public is invited to the meeting and an advertisement will be placed in the newspaper. Once this is complete, CRC staff will begin working on the capability assessment and updating mitigation strategies. The Plan is on target to be completed by the end of the year.

Update on GO Virginia: Ms. Hickman stated there will be an update on the status of GO Virginia at the Virginia Association of Planning District Commission (VAPDC) Summer Conference at the end of July. Ms. Hickman stated she planned to attend only the day that this information will be shared. Ms. Hickman stated the GO Virginia legislation became effective July 1st. Based on information provided by VAPDC, GO Virginias Regions are being finalized. Ms. Hickman stated it was also noted that the GO Virginia State Board will not be in place before the VAPDC Conference. Ms. Hickman stated as reported

in June, a GO Virginia Working Committee has been formed to come up with a list of suggestions for the GO Virginia State Board and also suggestions for this region's GO Virginia Regional Council members. Virginia Growth Alliance (VGA) volunteers to the working committee include Vivian Giles (Cumberland), Jeff Reed (VGA), Charlotte Woolridge (Brunswick), Wade Bartlett (Prince Edward), Debra Crowder (Workforce Investment Board), three Planning District Representatives from the CRC, Southside and West Piedmont. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC appointed David Wingold, the CRC's Chairman at it's June Meeting. The group is still working on scheduling a meeting date.

Council Member Comments: No comments.

New Business

Staff Reports

Designation of FOIA Officer for CRC: Ms. Hickman stated effective July 1, 2016, House Bill 818 requires public bodies that are subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) to designate and publicly identify one or more FOIA officers whose responsibility is to serve as a point of contact for members of the public in requesting public records and to coordinate the public body's compliance with the provisions of FOIA. HB 818 also requires all FOIA officers to be trained at least annually by legal counsel or by the Virginia Freedom of Information Advisory Council. Ms. Hickman reported the CRC does fall under the provisions of HB 818 as well and will need to designate a FOIA Officer.

There was discussion on this matter.

Mr. Gleason moved and Mr. Timmons seconded to appoint Ms. Hickman as the Primary FOIA Officer and Ms. Foster as the Alternate FOIA Officer. Motion carried.

Announcement of HB2 Funded Projects in the Six Year Improvement Program (SYIP): Ms. Foster stated the Commonwealth Transportation Board at their June 14th meeting made the Final HB2 allocations. Ms. Foster stated the region did very well with all 7 projects in the Lynchburg District Grant Program being funded. Ms. Foster stated the CRC assisted Charlotte County in submitting the Crafton Gates Project. Ms. Foster stated in the Richmond District Grant Program only one project was submitted from the Region with the CRC assisting Lunenburg in applying for funding for the Route 675 Hardy Road Project. While this project did not receive HB2 funding, VDOT is working with Lunenburg to fund this Project through FHWA Highway Safety Improvement Funds.

There was discussion on when the projects that were allocated funds would begin construction. Ms. Foster stated she would ask VDOT for more information and provide this information to the Council Representatives.

Smart Scale (formerly HB2) Round 2 Application Cycle Opens: Ms. Foster stated the next round of VDOT Smart Scale, which were formerly known as HB2 Applications, will begin August 1st and close on September 30th. Ms. Foster stated she provided a copy of the Draft Policy Guide in the Council packet. Ms. Foster stated she was unable to attend the recent workshop due to a scheduling conflict, but Ms. Hickman attended in her absence. Ms. Foster stated the Dillwyn VDOT local Residency Administrators office should be contacting localities to discuss potential Smart Scale Projects for the upcoming Application round for projects in the Lynchburg VDOT District. Ms. Foster stated she has not determined yet if the Richmond District Administrators offices will also be contacting their localities.

Ms. Foster stated a Pre-Application is encouraged to be submitted by August 15th to guarantee VDOT technical assistance. Ms. Foster noted that last year the CRC staff offered to assist member counties with submitting one application each for the HB2 Program. Both Charlotte and Lunenburg Counties requested and received this assistance. Ms. Foster suggested this service could be offered again this year.

Mr. Timmons moved and Mr. Walker seconded for the CRC to offer to member localities the CRC's assistance in applying for one application each for the VDOT Smart Scale Program. Motion carried.

Announcement of VDOT Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Grant Final Allocations: Ms. Foster stated she had reported previously the Town of Charlotte Court House had tentatively received a reduced allocation for the Town's new Route 645 Sidewalk Project. However, after the Final Allocations were made at the June Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) meeting it was noted the Town received the full award of funding requested of \$251,856. The CRC assisted the Town in applying for funds and will be assisting with the administration of the project.

Buckingham County Request for Letter of Support: Ms. Hickman stated Buckingham County has requested a letter of support for the reissuance of the Virginia Water Protection (VWP) individual permit # 01-1282. Ms. Hickman stated information on the permit as well as a draft letter of support from the CRC were provided in the Council Representatives packet.

Mr. Dunnavant moved and Mr. Walker seconded for the CRC to provide a letter of support for the Buckingham VWP #01-1282. Motion carried.

CRC/SPDC/VGA to Host USDA Rural Development Roundtable Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated for the past couple of months Gail Moody, Southside Planning District Commission (SPDC), Jeff Reed, Virginia's Growth Alliance (VGA) and herself have been discussing with Anne Herring, Rural Development the idea of holding a Rural Development Roundtable for the CRC/SPDC regions which encompass the VGA region. Ms. Hickman stated Rural Development has held several Roundtable Meetings throughout the State but they have usually been for one region. Ms. Herring was very excited to be able to combine regions together at one meeting, especially after working with VGA on the Stronger Economies Together (SET) Process. Ms. Hickman stated this is an opportunity for local governments, community leaders, not-for-profits and other organizations within these areas to learn how they might partner with USDA Rural Development on community projects such as: broadband; community facility projects such as health care clinics, police and fire stations, community centers, schools and child care centers; energy improvements for small business and agricultural producers and Value added agricultural products; homeownership opportunities; startup or expansion of small businesses; and water sewer. Ms. Hickman stated they are tentatively planning to hold this event at the Southside Virginia Community College on August 24, 2016 from 9:00 - 12:00 Noon. Ms. Herring will be attending the July 26th Chief Administrative Officers (CAO) Meeting to discuss the details.

Council Member Comments: None

<u>Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRP)</u>: Ms. Foster stated there were two local projects:

-Acquisition of Buckingham-Maxey Property-EIR for future use as an VDOT Area Headquarters Site

-Application for Synagro Central, LLC in Amelia County for the land application of biosolids and water plant residuals.

The listed CIRP's were given a Level One, No Comment.

Other Business: Ms. Foster stated the next round for Rescue Squad Assistance Fund (RSAF) opens August 1st and will close on September 15th. Ms. Foster stated the Rescue Squads and Fire Departments as well as the Counties and Towns have been notified.

Mr. Timmons requested that the Rescue Squad and Fire Department in the Town of Pamplin to also be notified of the grant opportunities. Ms. Foster stated she would send this notice to them after obtaining contact information and would send upcoming announcements to them in the future. Mr. Timmons stated the Town of Pamplin needs assistance.

Council Member Comments: Mr. Gleason requested that Ms. Hickman provide more information on the discussions held at the Chief Administrative Officer's meeting. Ms. Hickman stated she would do so in the future.

The following are brief updates on Virginia Cooperative Extension programs for the second quarter of 2016. If you would like more detailed information, please do not hesitate to contact the office.

Administrative Update:

• Amanda Elgin, a recent Longwood University graduate, was hired through VCE's summer intern program. She will work a total of 400 hours over the summer to support local extension programs, primarily 4-H programs. Amanda had previously volunteered with local 4-H after school programs and was our intern last summer.

4-H Program Updates – Jennifer Bowen, Sr. Extension Agent, 4-H Youth Development:

- All 7th, and 8th grade students from PECMS participated in **Natural Resource Education programming** at Holiday Lake 4-H Center throughout the spring. I taught classes in forestry and aquatic ecology. These programs were funded through a grant from the Walter Payne Foundation.
- Four 4th grade classes and one 6th grade class participated in the **4-H Embryology** program, hatching chicks in the classroom.
- The first class of the **Prince Edward 4-H Innovative Leadership Academy** graduated in April. Nine high school students participated in the program. In addition to classroom time spent on leadership, communication, and teamwork skills, students also attended a Board of Supervisors meeting and School Board meeting. They conducted a SWOT analysis for the community from a youth perspective and then worked in teams to develop presentations on how a hypothetical \$250,000 could best be used to address youth issues.
- Prince Edward 4-H took 4 teams to the **Central District Food Challenge** competition. During this contest, teams must work together to make a dish from a given set of

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ingredients. They must then present the dish, along with facts about its nutritional value, and a cost analysis to a team of judges.

- I again served as co-chair of **Central District Contests**. There were 170 entries in Public Speaking, Presentations, Science Fair, and Photography from 16 counties and cities. Of these entries, 28 were from Prince Edward County.
- The Riding Star 4-H Horse and Pony Club hosted the Central District 4-H Qualifying Show at GLC. The Prince Edward 4-H Shooting Education Club received another grant from the Friends of the NRA to expand its archery component and to supply the shotgun class at Junior 4-H Camp with skeet and ammunition.
- FCS Agent Caitlin Miller and I offered a **Beginner Sewing day camp** in June with 10 participants. Each participant learned the parts and functions of several different types of machines. Each demonstrated basic piecing and quilting skills while making a checkerboard to take home.
- Nine youth, three teen leaders, and one adult volunteer participated in **Cloverbud Camp** at Holiday Lake 4-H Center. This is an overnight camping program for youth ages 5 8.
- Junior 4-H Camp was held in late June with the following participants from Prince Edward County: 84 campers and CITs, 30 teens, and 20 adult leaders. Extensive teen and adult leader training was conducted prior to camp.
- I successfully renewed the Department of Social Services **Promoting Safe and Stable Families Grant**, providing \$18,000 in funding for VCE programs, Crossroads Prevention Services, a community feeding program run by Ricky and Shirby Scott-Brown, and DSS programs for youth receiving time-limited reunification services.



FCS Updates - Caitlin Miller, Extension Agent, FCS

- In partnership with the **Piedmont Community Health Coalition**, I led the development and implementation of *Spring into Health: Just Outside Your Door*, a program designed to encourage community members to participate in healthy eating and active living resources available in Prince Edward County and Buckingham County. Twenty-six community members, including four Longwood University students, participated in Spring into Health.
- I participated in the *Earth Day Celebration* at the **Farmville Community Marketplace** to promote the FACES Grow-A-Row program and VCE activities.

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- I presented "Attracting Beneficial Insects" to 12 participants during the Master Gardener Lunch & Learn program in May.
- I represented VCE at the 2nd Annual **4-VA Sustainable Agriculture Summit** held at Morven Farm in Charlottesville.
- I finalized the design for the 2016 **Heart of Virginia Buy Fresh Buy Local Food Guide** in May. The organization received sponsorships from 6 businesses including Centra, Farm Credit, Benchmark Community Bank, Sentara, Community Memorial Hospital, and The Bank of Charlotte County. Fifteen thousand copies of the 2016 Food Guide were printed and are now being distributed.
- A tour of the **Prince Edward County Cannery** was provided to the Virginia SARE (Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education) Advisory Committee.
- In coordination with Pauline Stokes, a cooking demonstration was conducted at the **Farmville Community Marketplace** in June to encourage SNAP recipients to buy fresh produce at the farmers market.
- Sewing Club participants continued working on their individual projects throughout April and May. Each participant completed three projects throughout the 7 month-long program.
- FCS and 4-H hosted a **sewing day camp** in June, during which the participants learned how to make a game board for checkers using quilting techniques.
- I conducted research and wrote a 65-page report entitled, "Fields to FACES: Growing a Gleaning Network for Farmville Area Community Emergency Services" for my final capstone project. In May, I graduated from Green Mountain College with a M.S. degree in Sustainable Food Systems.

ANR Updates – Katy Overby, Extension Agent, ANR

- During the month of April, the 5th Grade and 3rd Grade Agriculture Days was conducted at the Southern Piedmont Agricultural Research and Extension Center (SPAREC) for six different counties. For three days I, along with Caitlin Miller, P.E. Local Foods Agent, and Laura Siegle, Amelia ANR Agent, helped the 5th graders make a model animal cell while teaching them about the parts of the cell and their functions. For two more days I, along with Dillon Robinson, Lunenburg 4-H Agent, taught 3rd graders about sheep as the animal and how they are beneficial in the agricultural and industrial world. The children were able to pet sheep and see different by-products of sheep such as yarn and beauty products.
- I, along with Caitlin Miller, conducted the second, third, and fourth of our **Grow Your Own Sustainable Vegetable Gardening Series** discussing direct seeding, planting, integrated pest management, attracting beneficial insects, scouting in the garden, weed control, mulching, square foot gardening, companion planting, succession planting, trellising, moisture management and many vegetables that are growing at this time of the year.
- On April 19th, Caitlin Miller, Pauline Stokes, FCS SNAP-Ed Agent, and I were privileged to be invited to speak to faculty and staff at **Longwood University** on "Healthy Eating" and "Vegetable Gardening". We were well appreciated, had a great turnout, and look forward to speaking again for them on similar topics.

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- I was in charge of making an Invasive Species Test for the Area V Envirothon Competition at Holiday Lake 4-H Center. I attended Envirothon on April 21 and graded/judged the tests in collaboration with the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District.
- I was invited to speak at the **Goochland-Powhatan Master Gardener's Annual Springfest** on "Choosing the Right Plant According to Site Conditions". This event has from 400 to 600 participants each year.
- I have started excepting applications for three grants that are part of the **Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission Programs**.
 - o Southside Virginia Pasture Infrastructure Program
 - o Southside Berry Grant
 - o Central Virginia Producer Support Grant Program
 - Please contact me with any questions you have regarding these grants.
- I attended the annual **Heart of Virginia Master Gardeners Association Plant Sale** in May. This is not just a plant sale, but also an opportunity to learn about different aspects of gardening that are presented on throughout the day.
- I spoke with a garden club out of Amelia County on pollination in the garden.
- I attended the Virginia Extension Service Association Annual Conference at Virginia State University to learn of happenings in the state as well as within our program associations.
- In June, I, along with a few other ANR Agents assisted in a **STEM Education Workshop** with SPAREC for children in the community.
- Also in June, there was a Virginia Sports Turf Managers Association Pesticide Recertification and Field Day at Longwood University. I helped teach some of the recertification topics and also attended the field day the following day.
- We had our **Registered Technician Training Class** at SPAREC in late June, where I helped teach a few of the recertification topics. There were multiple applicators present from Prince Edward County to receive their Registered Technician Pesticide Certification.
- I helped Jennifer Bowen- 4-H Agent, and Caitlin Miller, Local Foods Agent, with sewing class and cake decorating class at **Junior 4-H Camp** at Lake 4-H Center in late June as well.
- I have been privileged to share an intern with Cumberland County, due to the fact that they have not had an ANR Extension Agent. Jody Jeffries has gotten a well-rounded idea of what extension is all about this summer by helping during some of her internship.
- Much of my time as been devoted to answering field and homeowner questions coming into the office as well as maintaining the **Demonstration Garden** at the extension office.



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SNAP-Ed Updates – Pauline Stokes, Extension Agent, FCS SNAP-Ed

- Attended the **Community, Local and Regional Food Systems (CLRFS) Forum**, hosted by Virginia Cooperative Extension on March 29, 2016. I co-presented a PowerPoint on "Impact of Food Demonstrations at local Farmers Markets and Food Pantries. "
- Attended 4-H STEP **UP Youth in Action Leadership** *and Communication Seminar,* chaperoning six youth from my community.
- Met with Catherine Fleischman and Linda Eanes, to work toward the Center for Rural Culture being able to accept SNAP to expand the market for the producers. Currently, EBT (SNAP) cards are not allowed to be used for on line purchases. There is growing interest in increasing access to healthy, locally grown foods. We want to make this opportunity available to everyone including people who are receiving SNAP benefits. We are partnering with Center for Rural Culture, Local Roots Food Co-op (CSA). The delivery site and the meeting place will be at the Cumberland County Extension Office in Cumberland VA. Cumberland is known as a food desert and has no place to buy fresh, local grown fruits and vegetables.
- Attended the **Cancer Mini-Symposium** in Lynchburg for all Extension Agents and staff from the Central District.
- Presented a short presentation to **Diabetic Prevention Class** being held monthly at the Prince Edward Office on "Weighing and Measuring Foods".
- Attended the **National Health Conference** at Hotel Roanoke and Conference Center, Roanoke VA.
- Attended Nottoway County Resource Council meeting.
- Met with FCS, SNAP-Ed Agent in Brunswick County to deliver resources to Mecklenburg County Public Schools. Mecklenburg is one of 15 targeted school divisions the Virginia Department of Health identified as a priority for wellness interventions, including creating supportive nutrition environments and improving physical education and physical activity.
- Presented a PowerPoint to the Longwood Office of Human Service on Healthy Eating
- Attended Virginia Association of Family and Consumer Sciences and Virginia Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences 2016 Annual Meeting April 21st in Charlottesville VA.
- WebEx "JUST say Yes" training. The Just Say Yes to Fruits and Vegetables Program (JSY) encourages persons who receive food stamps to eat more fruits and vegetables by offering nutrition workshops, cooking demonstrations and other educational activities at food pantries, shelters, farmers' markets, and other community settings.
- Participated in the **Piedmont Community Health Coalition**, "**Spring into Health**" event. One of the places to visit was the Community Garden on Virginia Street. A healthy lifestyle begins with eating nutritious foods and physical activity. The Piedmont Community Health Coalition invited everyone to discover healthy eating and active living in their neighborhood.
- Participated in the YMCA's annual **Healthy Kids Day**. Healthy Kids Day is a national YMCA event and is the nation's largest health day for children. parents what we offer to the community and how new help in ensuring kids stay healthy in mind, body and spirit.

- The ESMM Farmers Market initiative aims to provide all shoppers with access to fresh, local, nutritious food. Programs are planned throughout the state to promote their SNAP EBT program. Caitlin Miller and I have planned and participated in programs at the **Farmville Farmers Markets**.
