



PROTOCOL FOR BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COMMENTS

- The Board of Supervisors sets aside ten (10) minutes near the beginning of each regular board meeting for each member of the Board of Supervisors to respond to comments made by citizens during "Public Participation," if he/she so desires.
- This is an opportunity for each individual member of the Board to express his/her own personal opinion in response to a citizen's concerns on matters of public interest.
- "Board of Supervisors Comments" is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.
- The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.
- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

on Tuesday, the 11th day of September, 2018; at 6:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Cooper-Jones called the special meeting to order.

Mr. Bartlett stated the Board members were provided a spreadsheet of names for the World War I

memorial. He said the Department of Defense (DoD) records were not kept on the soldiers by county,

therefore, we were not able to receive information from DoD. He said the information from the WWI

Museum served as a baseline. Other information was collected from several sources. Mr. Pempel and Mr.

Ray Gaskins did research from old FARMVILLE HERALD newspaper articles. Mr. Bartlett said the Library

of Virginia provided some details but few names. He said Magi Van Eps found information through

genealogical research; he said they are confident all names on the first page of the list did perish from serving

in action, wounds or disease caused by serving in World War I.

Supervisor Timmons asked for clarification on the criteria for inclusion. Mr. Bartlett stated the

policy approved by the Board of Supervisors states to be eligible for the Prince Edward County memorial

requires they be killed in action or declared dead as a result of participation in a hostile conflict or operation.

Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett led a review of the names of soldiers that were questionable to having been in the theater or died as a result of participation in the War. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Jones entered the meeting during the discussion.

Mr. Bartlett stated the second monument for conflicts after WWII, space was left on the plaque for more names. Supervisor Timmons agreed that space for additional names must be planned for the WWI memorial.

Mr. Bartlett said it will take six weeks to make the bronze marker; there are eight weeks until Armistice Day or Veterans Day in November.

In Re: Hurricane Florence Preparation

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett reviewed the latest emergency status and preparations for Hurricane Florence. She stated impacts are expected Thursday into Friday; there are 18 hours for preparation. She said a Declaration of Emergency was issued at 5:00 p.m., but the Board has to affirm that, so the Board will approve the Resolution of Affirmation confirming the Declaration of Local Emergency for Prince Edward County effective this evening.

Mrs. Puckett stated Worsham Baptist Church opened a Red Cross evacuation shelter at noon and will operate through the evacuation period. They may continue to operate through the storm and post-storm; this is for people heading away from the coastal areas. She said coordination has been ongoing with the Town of Farmville if a County shelter is needed. She said that since the temperatures are not drastic, citizens should shelter in place at home; shelters will be available for local people whose homes are destroyed due to fallen trees, flooding, tornado or other high winds. Additionally, fire stations will be open for water and charging stations for phones, and the YMCA will again make the showers available to Prince Edward County residents that have no power.

Mrs. Puckett said the Courthouse will put up the floodgates; they are coordinating with the Health Department to move their critical infrastructure to a higher floor so they don't lose technology or records.

She added the landfill and convenience sites may be closed due to the storm. Discussion followed regarding county generators and further action taken to prepare for the storm and to notify citizens of resources.

In Re: Resolution Celebrating the Life of Andrew Dalton Elder, Sr.

Mrs. Puckett stated Appomattox County and Charlotte County, along with Prince Edward County, are adopting a Resolution Celebrating the life of Dalton Elder. One presentation copy, with the signature of all three counties, will be signed, with a service at a later time at the Pamplin Fire House. This will be presented to the family and a copy will be presented to the fire department. She asked that the Board consider adoption.

Supervisor Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Emert, to approve the Resolution Celebrating the Life of Andrew Dalton Elder, Sr.; the motion carried unanimously:

Chairman Cooper-Jones called the September meeting to order. She then made the following statement:

Last week, the members of the Board of Supervisors received an anonymous letter from an employee of the Prince Edward County Elementary School. In that letter, the employee lists allegations against school administration. But in the same letter, the employee acknowledged that the elementary school is now accredited, implying that the school administration had no hand in assisting and guiding these achievements. The allegations in the letter may or may not be true. This statement is not meant to determine the validity of the allegations. Instead, the purpose of this statement is to inform the citizens of Prince Edward County of the limitations of the role of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as it pertains to the Prince Edward County Public Schools and their administration.

The Board of Supervisors has no statutory role in the governance of the school. Per Article 8, Section 7 of the Constitution of Virginia and Section 22.1-28 of the Code of Virginia, 'The supervision of the schools is vested in the local school board.' Neither the State Constitution nor

the Code of Virginia allow any mechanism for the Board of Supervisors to oversee any aspect of the day to day operation of the school.

The only role granted to the Board of Supervisors is to provide funding for the operation of the school. That role however is highly restricted. Sections 22.1-94 and 115 of the Code of Virginia restrict the Board of Supervisors to only provide funding to the schools in nine major classifications and prohibits the Supervisors from making adjustments in individual line items of the school budget. Prior to the passage of the referendum in 2017, that changed the process for the selection of school board members from appointed by the Board of Supervisors to elected by the citizens of Prince Edward County, the Board of Supervisors had, small as it might have been, the ability to influence the School Board with the possibility of not reappointing school board members. The Board of Supervisors no longer has that ability.

I conclude this statement by informing all the citizens of Prince Edward County, if you have concerns with the operations of the Prince Edward County Public Schools, please follow the process the school system has adopted to report concerns. If unsuccessful, citizens are entitled to contact members of the School Board and attend and speak at the School Board meetings. After completing this process, the citizens' only recourse is at the ballot box.

That concludes my statement, and I thank the public and the Board for allowing me to make this statement. Thank you.

Supervisor Timmons offered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

In Re: Recognitions

Chairman Cooper-Jones said "Recognitions" is an opportunity for the Board of Supervisors to recognize achievements in our community, with a focus on the accomplishments of the students at the Prince Edward County Public Schools and Fuqua School.

Chairman Cooper-Jones said the Board of Supervisors recognizes Coach James E. Scott for his Outstanding Service to the Prince Edward County Public Schools. Coach Scott has coached the Prince Edward County Varsity Basketball Team for 38 years. Over the course of his career, Coach Scott has led by example and inspired his teams toward excellence and sportsmanship. He has encouraged his players to be exceptional leaders on and off the court. The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors congratulates Coach Scott for his outstanding career and commends him for his service and his dedication to the students he has coached.

Coach Scott thanked the Board for recognizing him and thanked Prince Edward County Schools, "Thanks for believing in me and I enjoyed the run."

Chairman Cooper-Jones called for a moment of silence for the 9/11 commemoration.

In Re: Public Participation

Vicky Page, Leigh District, announced the Friends of the Farmville/Prince Edward Community Library provide service to the community and the library. She said the Friends received an email from Matt Claybrook, Assistant Park Manager at Twin Lakes State Park, which has established a kiosk for a free library at their site, requesting assistance with keeping it stocked with books. She said the Library Board approved their request. Ms. Page then announced the upcoming Friends Champagne & Chocolates Gala, to be held October 19 from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. Tickets are \$25 per person and proceeds will go to fund children's programs for the libraries in the Central Virginia Regional Library System.

Summer Martin, Farmville, expressed her concerns regarding voter registration education for the students of Longwood [University] and the Town of Farmville, Virginia. She stated there have been recent issues with registration education and a lack of education for students. She said people have been rushed to the polls in Prince Edward County; she said they were not informed that they would be voting in local town council and county elections. She requested policies that can be used in training people in recruiting and education, including absentee ballots and in recognizing where they should be voting, in their hometowns. She also stated voter laws in Virginia do not allow post office boxes to be used as an address for registering to vote; Longwood University holds students accountable through their post office boxes at the Longwood Mail Office. She asked for training for students that sign up to help registering other students.

Chairman Cooper-Jones stated the State Board of Elections for Virginia website has the complete process of how you register to vote and all other necessary information; if people plan to register more than 25 voters, they need to obtain certification. The State Board of Elections will send you up to 200 applications. The site also covers absentee information, and if you wish to change your registration to vote here, you have to change it from your hometown to Prince Edward County in order to vote here, but if you do not want to change your registration and just want to help, all the information is on the State Board of Elections website. Chairman Cooper-Jones offered to meet with Ms. Martin to assist in understanding the process.

Liz Chassey, Southside Center for Violence Prevention & Madeline's House, thanked the Board for providing funding. She said the basic operational costs are covered by grants, but the money provided by the County goes to helping the residents.

In Re: Board Comments

Supervisors Emert, Pride, Timmons, Wilck, Townsend and Southall thanked everyone for attending the meeting.

Chairman Cooper-Jones stated Prince Edward County has declared a local emergency due to Hurricane Florence:

DECLARATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY County of Prince Edward, Virginia

WHEREAS, as County Administrator/Director of Emergency Management of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, I do hereby find:

- 1. The National Weather Service and the National Hurricane Center are forecasting severe weather caused by Hurricane Florence, which is anticipated to impact the County of Prince Edward beginning Thursday, September 13, 2018 and extending at least through Sunday, September 16, 2018; and
- 2. The impacts of Hurricane Florence could produce damaging high winds, significant periods of sustained heavy rainfall, widespread power outages, and catastrophic flooding throughout the County of Prince Edward; and
- 3. That these severe weather conditions have the potential to impact life, safety and peril to property and create significant transportation issues, which necessitate the proclamation of the existence of a local emergency; and

PPTRA RESOLUTION FOR 2018 County of Prince Edward, Virginia

In accordance with the requirements set forth in VA. CODE ANN. §58.1-3524 C.2. and §58.1-3912 E., as amended by Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly (2004 Special Session I) and as set forth in *Item 503.E.* (Personal Property Tax Relief Program) of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly, any qualifying vehicle sitused within the County of Prince Edward, Virginia commencing January 1, 2018, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:

- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,000 or less will be eligible for 34.75% tax relief; and
- Personal use vehicles with assessed value of \$1,001 or more shall receive 34.75% tax relief on the first \$20,000 in assessed value; and
- All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying" (such as business use vehicles, motor homes, etc.) will not be eligible for any form of tax relief under this program; and
- In accordance with Item 503.D.1. of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly, the entitlement to personal property tax relief for qualifying vehicles for tax year 2005 and all prior tax years shall expire on September 1, 2006. Supplemental assessments for tax years 2005 and prior years that are made on or after September 1, 2006 shall be deemed "non-qualifying" for purposes of state tax relief and the local share due from the taxpayer shall represent 100% of the tax assessable.

In Re: FY19 Budget Amendments

Mr. Bartlett said that when the County received the final statement of award from DCJS for the Victim Witness grant, it contained \$1,758 more funding than the preliminary grant documents.

Mr. Bartlett then said the Sheriff has requested the use of \$3,000 from the forfeited asset fund to pay the cost of the annual dues for participation in the Piedmont Regional Task Force. The drug task force also includes the Town of Farmville and the Counties of Buckingham and Cumberland. These dues have been paid from the Forfeited Asset fund because of the direct link of the actions of the task force and the generation of forfeited assets. The Sheriff has approximately \$26,000 in this fund.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Scot Shippee, PE, Resident Engineer, VDOT, presented a maintenance update; he said the crews are doing buzz-bar and boom axe work on the eastern end of the county, and are cutting grass. He said the surface treatment contractor is making their way around the county; the maintenance forces are patching roads ahead of next year's surface treatment schedule. Gutter work is being done on Route 460, and plant mix leveling still needs to be done on Hard Times Road, Oliver Road and the County Line Road/Route 15 Intersection. He said crews have been through picking up trash bags from the inmate and State force crews. Mr. Shippee said currently crews are working on storm preparations, checking equipment, pipes and flood

zones. He said residents should expect problems and asked that people be patient and stay off the roads to allow crews to do the work. He also stated no one should go into the flood waters. Primary roadways will be worked on first, then secondary; he said the expected rainfall will damage the unpaved roads.

Mr. Shippee said he is still waiting on a response to Supervisor Townsend's issue; he told Supervisor Pride that for Abilene Road to be eligible for road edge lines, the road must have a traffic count with 3,000 vehicles per day and a geometric total width of 20 feet. He said Abilene Road does not meet the criteria.

Mr. Bartlett asked if Lakeside Drive is complete. Some people have said it is much better than it had been but they thought it would be better. Mr. Shippee said after the Rural Rustic roads are complete, they are placed on the surface treatment schedule for next year. Once surface treatment is complete, some of the imperfections will be smoothed out.

Supervisor Southall said he has received good comments regarding Greentown Road; he said patching has been done on Farmville Lake Road and asked if there are plans to have it paved. Mr. Shippee will look into that and report back. He said typically, when plant mix is put down, it is preparation for paving, and when skin patches are put down, typically that is to hold the road together until they can make a long term solution.

Supervisor Timmons said the treatment on Darlington Heights Road looks nice.

Mr. Bartlett said Sulphur Springs Road has washed out at the bridge; Mr. Shippee said he will look at that location.

Mr. Bartlett asked if a four-way stop is possible at Pin Oak Road. Mr. Shippee said it is not recommended for a four-way stop because it does not meet the requirements; it has low traffic, no accidents, and existing warning signs are already at the intersection.

Supervisor Wilck asked if the move from Dillwyn is official yet. Mr. Shippee said it is not yet complete.

<u>In Re: Public Hearing – Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance Amendments</u>

Chairman Cooper-Jones announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on proposed amendments to the County's Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was

advertised according to law in the Friday, August 24, 2018, and Friday, August 31, 2018 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett said that during a previous discussion at the August Board meeting, amendments have been proposed to the *County's Ordinance to Regulate and Protect the Sandy River Reservoir and Adjacent County-Owned Properties*. The proposed amendments have been advertised for a public hearing and have been reviewed by the County Attorney. County staff also discussed the proposed amendments with Conservation Law Enforcement Office Gavin Fariss, as DGIF is a primary law enforcement agency for the reservoir; he had no objections.

Supervisor Timmons said the verbiage has been cleaned up; Mr. Bartlett says the wording allows Mr. Fariss to enforce the regulations.

Chairman Cooper-Jones opened the public hearing.

Mark Kernohan, Farmville, said he and his wife chose to move to Farmville because of the bounty of natural resources; he said they are supportive of this initiative to put kayaks into Sandy River Reservoir at more than one location.

Charles Green, Farmville, stated the access proposed seems very fair. He said the Friends of the Appomattox do a clean-up of the site twice a year.

Damien Fehrer, Farmville, stated as a resident of Prince Edward County, he feels blessed to have the Sandy River Reservoir which is being used more and more by paddlers. He said keeping the access points open is important to the use of the lake, which is three miles long from the dam down through the south-east finger, and restricting access to the north end of the lake would mean a six-mile round trip to fully access the southern shores of the lake.

George Patton, Lockett District, said he lives right on the Sandy River Reservoir and the road is heavily traveled with kayaks, trailers and people using drugs. He stated he called the Sheriff's office because someone was at his truck and it took the officers 35 minutes to arrive. He reported trash is still an issue; he has to pick it up from his property. Mr. Patton said someone relieved themselves in the woods where he keeps his kayaks and asked if a porta-john could be provided as it contaminates the reservoir. Mr. Patton then stated the dry fire hydrant is not kept clear of parked cars.

Dr. Samuel Martin, Lockett District, stated there is increased traffic with kayaks, but the trash situation has improved. He said overall, it isn't much different than five years ago. He said he too has to clean up his property from trash, but it's a small price to pay for living there.

Chairman Cooper-Jones asked Mr. Bartlett to look into marking off the fire hydrant.

Mr. Brian Butler, County Attorney, said the County may adopt, by ordinance, regulations to prevent people from parking there, but State Code that prevents someone from parking within 15 feet of a hydrant.

Mr. Bartlett stated more research will need to be done regarding the dry hydrants; there are some at several locations. Some are on private property but not all; the impact will need to be evaluated.

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said there has been discussion regarding making improvements to the area in regards to the signage, the barricade, the delineation of the hydrant, and the parking areas.

Mr. Bartlett said porta-johns are \$100 per month to rent; research would need done on placement and any other regulations.

Supervisor Wilck said he would like to table this issue until information can be received on the hydrants and suggested meeting with the residents at the site.

Supervisor Timmons said the Properties Committee met with Mr. Patton and his wife out at the site, and a barrier and signs can be placed to bar access; a porta-john can be put there. He added it is a state road and people may utilize that facility. He suggested that when there is a problem, residents should call the Sheriff, and keep calling to let them know there is an issue. He said this proposed ordinance also allows the Game Warden to make arrests and keep the trailers out.

Mr. Bartlett said once they find the regulation in the State Code, they can mark around the dry hydrant; discussion followed.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Cooper-Jones closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to approve the amendments to the *County's Ordinance to Regulate and Protect the Sandy River Reservoir and Adjacent County-Owned Properties*, and look at placing a porta-john in the area, and to investigate the delineation of the hydrant; the motion carried:

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.2-1429 1-13 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA, 1950, AS AMENDED

Sec. 82-31.

- a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
 - 1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
 - 2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy River Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640 at the end of Route 792, in designated parking areas at the end of Route 606 and Route 799, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
 - 3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
 - 4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward, with the exception of waterfowl hunting, which requires no county permit. No hunting of any kind shall be allowed on Sunday.
 - 5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
 - 6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind or description.
 - 7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
 - 8) Operation in or on the reservoir of *a windsurfer*, *sailboard or* any wind-propelled vessel, *other than a sailboat*, length of which *shall not* exceeds sixteen (16) feet.
 - 9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
 - 10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.

- 11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
- 12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
- 13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
- 14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.
- 15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicles, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.
- 16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads. Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measurers and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.
- 17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- 18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners without express written permission from the Prince Edward County Administrator, may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- 19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the County-owned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
- 20) The siting of dwellings not closer than 200 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir, so long as the soil treatment area is located not less than 500 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- 21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-owned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- 22) The launching of any watercraft, other than canoes, kayaks and small vessels without the use of a trailer entering the water, is prohibited at designated sites at the end of Route 799 or Route 606; watercraft may be launched by hand only at these designated sites. All watercraft to be launched by the use of a trailer entering the water shall use the concrete ramp at the end of Route 792.
- (b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property

surrounding the Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of the authorization, and shall maintain the area in that condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

(c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. A second violation of this section within three years is a Class 2 misdemeanor. A third violation of this section within three years is a Class 1 misdemeanor, as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

In Re: Public Hearing – eTicket Ordinance

Chairman Cooper-Jones announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the adoption of an ordinance establishing an electronic summons system and fee structure for the County of Prince Edward. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, August 24, 2018, and Friday, August 31, 2018 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated the new CAD system in the Sheriff's Office has the capability to operate an electronic summons system. Such a system allows a Sheriff's deputy to print and issue a summons from their vehicle. This is the preferred method of issuing a summons because by using the system, it automatically populates both the Sheriff and Supreme Court data bases whereby the information does not have to be reentered by clerks in the offices of the Sheriff or Courts. To be able to implement this system required the purchase of in-car computers and printers. The funding to purchase such equipment was included as part of the expense of the new CAD system which was budgeted and appropriated in FY18. We will have to pay an annual maintenance fee to maintain this system and will also have to replace equipment as it ages and/or breaks.

To offset both the purchase and maintenance of the system, the General Assembly amended the Code of Virginia allowing governing bodies to assess an additional sum which cannot exceed \$5 as part of each criminal or traffic case. For the County to begin imposing this fee, the Board much pass an ordinance authorizing such a fee. The County Attorney drafted a proposed amendment to the County's Code which

allows the imposition of this fee. The Board has authorized a public hearing for the September Board meeting on this draft ordinance.

Chairman Cooper-Jones opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Cooper-Jones closed the public hearing.

<u>Section 38-34 – Electronic summons system fee; amount; administration</u>

There is hereby imposed, in addition to any other fees prescribed by law, the sum of \$5.00 in each criminal and traffic case in which the defendant is convicted of a violation of any statute of the Commonwealth or any ordinance of the County filed in the general district court and the circuit court. The clerk of court in which the action is filed shall collect the assessment and remit it to the County treasurer. The County treasurer, subject to appropriation by the board of supervisors, shall disburse such funds in accordance with Section 17.1-279.1 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

In Re: Community Policy Management Team Appointment

Mr. Bartlett stated the General Assembly created the Children's Services Act (CSA) to create a collaborative system of services and funding that is child centered, family focused and community based to address the needs of troubled at-risk youths and their families. Chapter 52 of Title 2.2 of the *Code of Virginia* outlines the requirements of this program.

To receive CSA funds from the Commonwealth of Virginia, Section 2.2-45204 of the Code directs every County to establish a Community Policy and Management Team (CPMT). Membership of the CPMT is specified in Section 2.2-5204 of the Code and states the CPMT shall include:

- One elected official or an appointed official (presently the County Administrator)
- The local agency heads or their designees of the (1) Community Services Board, (2) Juvenile Court Services Unit, (3) Department of Health, (4) Department of Social Services, and (5) Local School Division.

- Representative of a private organization or association of providers for children's or family services if such organizations are located within the locality.

- A Parent representative.

The CPMT's private organization representative has resigned. The CPMT is requesting the Board appoint Wesley Inge to serve as the representative of a private organization. Mr. Inge serves as the Regional Director at the Family Preservation Services, Inc. He has 18 years of experience in the child services and family preservation field, and has a Masters in Counseling. He is well aware of the challenges faced by

families and their children. This appointment will be for the unexpired term of the former incumbent and

 $will \ run \ from \ September \ 12, 2018-June \ 30, 2020. \ The \ CPMT \ is \ also \ requesting \ Mindy \ Osborn \ be \ appointed$

as Mr. Inge's alternate. Mrs. Osborn has 10 years of experience in child services and family preservation.

She currently serves as the Regional Coordinator and Therapeutic Day Treatment Director for Family

Preservation Services, Inc.

In Re: County Administrator's Report – Virginia Scenic River Program

Mr. Bartlett said Appomattox County contacted DCR expressing interest in having portions of the

Appomattox River designated as a Scenic River. DCR has responded to Appomattox County and is seeking

support from the other five jurisdictions that border the river on its way to the Powhatan border.

Virginia's Scenic Rivers Program's intent is to identify, designate and help protect rivers and

streams that possess outstanding scenic, recreational, historic and natural characteristics of statewide

significance for future generations. After an evaluation process, if the river is deemed worthy, the local

government must then have its local legislators present a bill to the General Assembly, which then must pass

a resolution adopting the river into the system of scenic rivers.

Mr. Bartlett said staff has reviewed the Virginia Scenic River Program website and offers the

following information:

What Scenic River Designation Does

• Designation encourages protection of and preservation of the river.

Designation declares the protection of a river's scenic values to be a beneficial purpose of water

resource policy.

• Designation requires appointment of an administering agency, usually the Department of

Conservation and Recreation (DCR).

• Designation requires the Virginia Scenic River Advisory Board, whose members are appointed by the Governor, to advise the Director of DCR on federal, state or local plans that impact the

designated river segment and to give local citizens a voice in river-related issues.

After designation, the General Assembly must approve construction of any dam or other structure

that would result in an impediment to the natural flow of the river.

• For properties along the designated scenic rivers, a special tax assessment may be given to reduce

the tax liability, as valued by the State land Evaluation Advisory Council, if adopted by the locality.

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• The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) recognizes Virginia's designated Scenic River System. This acknowledgment of the program ensures that the qualities of the designated river are considered during licensing or relicensing of federal projects on that river.

What Scenic River Designation Does Not Do

- Designation does not give the state control over land use.
- Designation carries with it no land use controls.
- Designation does not give the public any right to use privately owned land.
- Virginia does not commercially promote its scenic rivers.
- Recreational use of the rivers currently in the Scenic Rivers System has not increased any more than the use of high quality streams that are not in the system.

Based on information that staff has reviewed, participating in the study and designation of the river may provide riparian landowners and other local citizens a stronger voice in any government action or decisions that have the potential to impact "their" river.

Following discussion, Supervisor Wilck suggested waiting for more information on the Scenic River designation; the Board concurred.

In Re: Strategic Planning Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Strategic Planning Committee, consisting of Supervisor Pride, Chair, and Supervisors Emert and Wilck met Tuesday, August 28, 2018 to discuss the process of conducting the strategic retreat and how to focus the discussion during the retreat. There was discussion on the need to hire a facilitator or use County Staff and the need to narrow the focus of the Strategic Plan.

The Committee makes the following recommendations:

- 1) Hire Mrs. St. Clair to serve as facilitator.
- 2) Assessment interviews only be conducted for Supervisors Emert and Southall.
- 3) Reduce the Scope of the Strategic Plan by focusing on items the Board can control.
- 4) Keep Education as a Critical Target Area but eliminate Priority #2 because most of the Key Tasks/Activities are functions of the School Board, not the Board of Supervisors.
- 5) Under the Critical Target Area Education, amend the Key Tasks/Activities of Priority #1 by replacing item C "Review results of citizen survey conducted in 2013" with the following: "Receive annual updates from the School Board on the status of School Accreditation."

Mrs. St. Clair strongly recommends conducting the assessment interviews with all Board members. She states the assessment interview is an integral part of the strategic planning process and not, as many think, merely a preparatory process. It is the first step in developing a plan and process of change. The

interview is where some of the most important work occurs. During the one-on-one interviews, Board members can concentrate and feel open to elaborate where they think the County is in its direction and how they might like to see that direction change. They can also freely express how they want their relationship with other Board members and Staff to proceed and state their vision of the future. This process is best done initially on one-on-one interviews and not in a group. She also stated with a new Board Chair, and with two new members, the Prince Edward County Board has experienced substantial change which has caused the dynamics of the Board relationships to also change significantly.

Mrs. St. Clair's proposal is to conduct all interviews on the same day and allocate an hour for each Board member. The fee will be the same whether she interviews two members or all.

Supervisor Pride asked if an hour is allocated or up to an hour allocated. Mr. Bartlett stated if the full hour is not needed, it would then not be necessary.

The County received the Fire Program funds or Aid to Localities (ATL) in the amount of \$50,655. 

Summary:

The following request, if approved by the Board, is contingent upon the outcome of the November 6th election for the Office of Clerk of Circuit Court. The timing of the election, the anticipated rescheduling of the November Board meeting to November 20th, coupled with the County holiday schedule for Thanksgiving will provide only two- and one-half days for the County's entire payroll to be updated and then completed; thus, the reason for my request prior to the election.

Following the November election, adjustments will have to be made to the personnel compliment for the Clerk of Circuit Court. Due to timing issues and the fact that the interim clerk, Lynnette Coe, is running unopposed, I am requesting the Board make decisions involving salaries in the Clerk's office at the October Board meeting so that the County Administrator's Office will have adequate time to make the appropriate adjustments to payroll.

Mrs. Coe has already been in contact with the Comp Board and has received approval, contingent on the outcome of the election, for the Comp Board changes mentioned below. Because the proposed changes merely realign existing comp board funds the changes can be approved at the technician level and are not subject to approval by the Compensation Board. Mrs. Coe had served as the Chief Deputy prior to being named the Interim Clerk. That position has remained open with the comp board funds for the position being used to hire temporary help. After the election the Chief Deputy position must be filled in order to continue receiving the funding from the Comp Board. Mrs. Coe plans on promoting from within with each existing employee, except one, being moved to a different position.

The attached spreadsheet displays the proposed adjustments and impacts. The total impact to the County when comparing County costs before Mrs. Eppes retirement to the County's cost after the election is a decrease in cost of \$29,398 when including all benefit costs and Comp Board reimbursements.

Summary:

The renovation project of the Courthouse has been a constantly shifting program that has expanded to include the STEPS CENTRE and an MOU with STEPS and a location for Social Services. The Board has approved four contracts associated with the renovation of the Courthouse and the renovation of the STEPS CENTRE. The first contract approved on November 21, 2017 in the amount of \$235,279 consisted of \$165,079 for A&E work for Courthouse renovations and \$70,200 for A&E work for the STEPS CENTRE. This was a revision to the original A&E contract with Crabtree Rohrbaugh & Associates, Architects approved in July 2017. The second contract approved on December 12, 2017 in the amount of \$4,500 was for an infrared inspection of the STEPS CENTRE roof to determine the extent of moisture penetration. The third contract was approved by the Board on February 6, 2018 in the amount of \$32,750 for the A&E for the STEPS roofing project. The fourth contract was for the reroofing of the STEPS CENTRE originally approved on May 8, 2018 but inability to reach an agreement with the low bidder delayed the award of the contract until August 2018 in the amount of \$744,628.

The Budget amendments below reflect the adjustments to the FY18 and FY19 Budgets for the A&E and infrared inspection costs for the Courthouse and STEPS building.

Title 15.2. Counties, Cities and Towns
Chapter 25. Budgets, Audits and Reports

§ 15.2-2507. Amendment of budget.

A. Any locality may amend its budget to adjust the aggregate amount to be appropriated during the current fiscal year as shown in the currently adopted budget as prescribed by § 15.2-2504. However, any such amendment which exceeds one percent of the total expenditures shown in the currently adopted budget must be accomplished by publishing a notice of a meeting and a public hearing once in a newspaper having general circulation in that locality at least seven days prior to the meeting date. The notice shall state the governing body's intent to amend the budget and include a brief synopsis of the proposed budget amendment. Any local governing body may adopt such amendment at the advertised meeting, after first providing a public hearing during such meeting on the proposed budget amendments.

B. Pursuant to the requirements of §§ 15.2-1609.1, 15.2-1609.7, 15.2-1636.8, and 15.2-1636.13 through 15.2-1636.17 every county and city shall appropriate as part of its annual budget or in amendments thereto amounts for salaries, expenses and other allowances for its constitutional officers that are not less than those established for such offices in the locality by the Compensation Board pursuant to applicable law or, in the event of an appeal pursuant to § 15.2-1636.9, by the circuit court in accordance with the provisions of that section.

Summary: The County has received a special use permit application from Par 5 Development Group, LLC to permit the construction of a retail establishment along with illuminated signage located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Prince Edward Highway (US 460) and Harris Creek Road located on Tax Map Parcel 019-A-68E owned by Steven and Susan Bower.

The proposed Dollar General store will be approximately 9,100 square feet and provide 38 parking spaces and have illuminated signage. This is an allowed use in the A1, Agricultural Conservation District by Special Use Permit. The store will operate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday through Sunday, receive one delivery by tractor trailer once a week during normal operation hours, and utilize "Night Friendly" LED lighting. The developer is working with VDOT staff to address traffic controls, safety concerns and necessary road improvements.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on September 18, 2018. One person spoke in opposition to the request for the following:

- The proposed project did not meet the goal for a diversified economic base as referenced in the Comprehensive Plan; one of the strategies to meet the goal is to assess the retail base and determine the adequacy and diversity of the retail base and then to make sure it is suitable for the population and demographics of the area. There are two existing convenience stores, and three Dollar General Stores within a 15-minute drive of the area.
- Land Use Goals as set forth in the County's Comprehensive Plan and the protection of ground and surface water resources.
- The illumination of the proposed signs and the landscape buffer between the commercial and agricultural parcels.
- The health of residents was a concern, and that the food products offered should be healthy options.
- Concerns that Prince Edward County residents must be provided job opportunities with a living wage and just not minimum wage jobs.

The applicant provided the following information regarding the concerns:

- The sales model for Dollar General is convenience, with a goal of stores every two to five miles.
- Extensive site market research team looks at areas to make sure the store will provide what the community needs.

- Dollar General Market Research has proven that the stores can stand alone; it will not take away from adjacent convenience stores. Dollar General will provide goods currently not available at local conveniences stores.
- The site will be developed in a manner that 60% of stormwater will be treated onsite and that they will purchase 40% in nutrient credits allowed by the code.
- The store will use approximately 200 gallons of water a day, which is far less than the usage of a household or adjoining livestock.
- The lighting will be Nigh Sky friendly LED and will face downward.
- The site will comply with all landscape regulations.
- Dollar General offers rapid advancement career opportunities and people may transfer to the distribution center in Danville where pay is higher.
- Dollar General assists the local population by providing scholarships for students within a ten-mile radius for both college and technical schools.

The Planning Commission recommended forwarding the matter to the Board of Supervisors for approval with the following conditions:

- Landscape buffer consisting of Leland Cyprus trees along the side and rear of the property lines
- Monument sign internally illuminated with no changeable copy
- Brick veneer front with wainscoting trim (Similar to the Rice Store location)
- VDOT approval
- Final Site Plan approval from County Staff
- Approved Erosion & Sediment Control/Stormwater plan

Summit Design and Engineering Services is filing this Land Use Application for Special Use Permit on behalf of Par 5 Development Group, LLC. The current zoning of Tax Map Parcel is 019 A 68E is A-1, Agricultural Conservation District.

This proposed SUP would satisfy the following goals and objectives of the 2014 Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan.

Economic Development:

Goal: To stabilize, balance and strengthen the economy of Prince Edward County.

Objective 2: Promote the retention and growth of existing County businesses, and location of new businesses in the County.

The property is presently zoned A1, Agricultural Conservation District, and this zoning classification permits retail sales after issuance of a Special Use Permit.



In Re: Public Hearing - Special Use Permit - Par 5 Development Group

Chairman Prengaman announced this was the date and time scheduled for a Public Hearing on a request by Par 5 Development Group, LLC for a Special Use Permit to operate a Retail Sales Establishment and have illuminated signage located on Tax Map Parcel 019-A-68E. This is an A1, Agricultural Conservation District. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, September 7, 2018 and Friday, September 14, 2018 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Prengaman reviewed the process for public hearings.

Mr. Rob Fowler, Zoning Director, stated the County has received a Special Use Permit application to permit the construction of a retail establishment along with an illuminated freestanding sign-located at the north-west corner of the intersection of Prince Edward Highway (US 460) and Harris Creek Road on Tax Map Parcel 019-A-68E owned by Steven and Susan Bower.

Mr. Fowler said the proposed Dollar General store will be approximately 9,100 square feet, will provide a minimum of 38 parking spaces, will have between eight to ten employees and have illuminated signage. This is an allowed use in the A1, Agricultural Conservation District by Special Use Permit.

The store will operate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday through Sunday, receive one delivery by tractor trailer a week during normal operating hours, and utilize "Night Friendly" LED lighting.

Mr. Fowler said that following an approval by the Planning Commission, it will go before the Board of Supervisors; they will have to submit a formal site plan, and erosion and storm water control plans will need to be approved. He said it is in agreement with the Comprehensive Plan and is in a development corridor.

Zach Ivey, Par 5 Development Group, LLC stated they are seeking a special use permit (SUP) to develop a 70' x 130' 9", 9,100 square foot retail store with eight to ten employees, with operating hours between 8:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m. The proposed new building has a total of 7,263 square feet of retail floor space which would require a minimum of 37 parking spaces by Zoning Ordinance. There is a total of 38 standard parking spaces and two handicapped/van accessible spaces being proposed. He said this is similar to the one recently built in Rice and will provide economic advantages in the county, with eight to ten full time jobs with full benefits and advancement opportunities, along with sales tax and tax revenues advantages for the County.

Mr. Ivey stated the Par 5 Development Group has built 125 Dollar General stores; the stores are developed and built in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. He said they also build other commercial retail, restaurants, and residential projects.

The establishment, maintenance, and operation resulting from the SUP will not be detrimental to or pose any danger to the public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare. Furthermore, the issuance of the SUP will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other properties in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the surrounding neighborhood. The establishment of the SUP will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the surrounding property for uses permitted in the district.

The proposed structure will incorporate an appealing architectural exterior that will not be at variance with the immediate neighborhood or character of the applicable district and will not cause a substantial depreciation of the properties in the neighborhood. All portions of the building and site design have been proposed in a manner that will meet all applicable codes and guidelines in order to be in harmony with the intended spirit and purpose of the Zoning Ordinance.

The site will be served with on-site well and septic system. Adequate facilities will be provided by the engineer for utilities, access roads, drainage and storm water areas, etc. The entrance will be designed and will meet or exceed Virginia Department of Transportation standards. The site improvements will provide ample space for consumers to park while also providing for safe ingress and egress, thereby providing for the safety of those utilizing the facility and provide for access of fire and safety equipment to the site. The parking areas have been designed to be in harmony with the adjacent properties and promote the health, safety and general welfare of the community. The parking arrangement as shown on the site concept plan is designed in order to provide a formal

and flowing site with standardized parking and drive aisle, landscaping and visual appeal. Facilities will be located in order to minimize noise, glare, or odor effects on adjoining properties and properties generally in the district.

Refuse and service areas will be screened from view from public areas and surrounding properties. Trash will be removed from the business on a regular basis and the site will be kept in a neat and orderly manner. Appropriate screening and buffering will be provided of a similar type, dimension and character of the surrounding neighborhood and meets or exceeds the standards of the Zoning Ordinance.

Mr. Ivey said they are requesting that the proposed sign be illuminated, however, site signage will be designed to not impede sight distance or constitute a nuisance. Lighting will be dark skies friendly and will not produce glare or spillover onto adjacent properties or the adjacent roadway. All setbacks and other open spaces are provided for in the concept design.

The proposed use is compatible with the surrounding neighborhood and the other properties in the zoning district. All portions of the building and site design have been proposed in a manner that will meet all applicable codes and guidelines of the Prince Edward County Zoning Code.

Chairman Prengaman asked where the closest Dollar General stores are located. Mr. Ivey said the closest ones are in Cumberland and in Appointance.

Chairman Prengaman then questioned when, if approved, are they planning to begin construction. Mr. Rob Love said State agencies begin a review which allows two 45-day reviews and a 30 day review for final approval. After those reviews and comments, they anticipate beginning construction in February with approximately 120-150 days to complete with opening next summer.

Commissioner Peery asked if the turn lane on Route 460 is sufficient. Mr. Fowler stated the developer has submitted plans to VDOT and are working with them. Mr. Love stated that to date, they have provided auto turns and a tractor trailer simulation for [VDOT] to review. Mr. Ivey added there will be one trailer a week during off peak hours for deliveries, with smaller trucks delivering as needed.

Chairman Prengaman opened the public hearing.

Alecia Daves-Johnson, Prospect District, expressed her concerns about the wording in the advertisement for tonight's public hearing which only identified the property by tax map number. She stated the public would not refer to sites by their tax map numbers, she requested clarity in the announcements. Mrs. Daves-Johnson then stated she saw the notice in the Friday, September 14 newspaper and said the Code requires a five-day notice. She said the proposed economic development goals in the Comprehensive Plan were referenced; one of those has an objective to develop a diversified economic base. She said one of the strategies to meet that goal is to assess the retail base and determine the adequacy and diversity of the retail base and then to make sure it is suitable for the population and demographic of the area. She said there are two existing convenience stores, and three Dollar General stores within a 15-minute drive of the proposed site. Mrs. Daves-Johnson then expressed her concern regarding land-use goals as set forth in the County's Comprehensive Plan and the protection of the ground and surface water resources. She asked what low-impact techniques will be used since everyone relies on their wells and aquifers. Mrs. Dayes-Johnson said another concern is the proposed sign, lighting and the buffer that is needed between commercial and agricultural parcels. She reported litter from another existing commercial site in the vicinity is not managing their litter, and said the property maintenance and community appearance codes must be enforced. Mrs. Daves-Johnson stated the health of the residents is also a concern, and said the food products offered should be healthy options. She added Prince Edward County residents must be provided job opportunities with a living wage and not just minimum wage jobs. She expressed her appreciation regarding the proposed brick façade and asked if the construction will be done by a Dollar General or Summit team or if it will employ local contractors and construction workers. She concluded by requesting, if this project is approved, that they request an improved turn lane onto Route 608 North, First Rock Road.

Mr. Ivey stated the sales model is convenience, with a goal of stores every two to five miles. The extensive site market research team looks at areas to make sure the store will provide what the community needs. He said DG Market Research has proven that the stores can stand alone; it will not take away from the convenience stores. He said that similarly to the Rice site, it was agreed that 60% of stormwater will be treated onsite and will purchase 40% in nutrient credits. He added the well will supply approximately 200 gallons a day, which is less [usage] than a household. The monument sign has been approved, and all lighting is Night Sky friendly LED and all face

downward. He said the hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m.; the site will meet all landscaping regulations of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance.

Mr. Ivey stated Dollar General has a nationwide maintenance theme which is a system that makes employees of the store pick up trash if there is any; if there is an issue, citizens may call the Maintenance Hotline to report, as happened in Norfolk. A Maintenance Team will be sent out to fix a problem as well as any landscaping issues such as dead trees or bushes. He said Dollar General is very serious about their image. He said Dollar General offers rapid advancement opportunities and people may transfer to the distribution center in Danville where pay is higher. He said Dollar General provides scholarships for students within a ten-mile radius for both college and tech schools.

Mr. Ivey then stated they hire all local contractors to build the stores to keep the money in the county. He said any contractor may put in a bid for the work. The only two positions not hired locally are the site manager and the project manager, both of which are from Dollar General.

Mr. Ivey concluded by stating the \$1.5 million refers to the site work that goes on, such as the hill that will need to be cut out; that is where the cost comes in. He said the architectural upgrades to the building, such as brick, cement and stone façades, also increase the cost.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Prengaman closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Jones said the buffers proposed for the two sides need to be Leland cypress or spruce could be added to the other sides of the property. He asked for clarification that a monument sign is in the plan, and said the store in Rice is doing well and they keep the store appearance very good. He added the issue with Route 608 could be brought to the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Prengaman said he learned about the No Litter program previously; he said the Special Use Permit Request for the Dollar General in Prospect raised concerns regarding the monument sign, lighting, the landscape buffer, management of the litter, low impact development techniques and ensuring the guidelines are being followed.

Commissioner Jones made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Jenkins, to approve for recommendation to the Board of Supervisors regarding a request for a Special Use Permit by Par 5 Development Group, LLC to operate a Retail Sales Establishment and have illuminated signage, located on 019-A-68E, with the following conditions:

- Buffering of the neighboring residential sides with Leland Cyprus
- Monument sign, backlit with fixed message
- Brick veneer front with wainscoting on front
- VDOT shall approve the proposed facility and the applicant will provide all required improvements

- a. <u>Voting Credentials for VACo Annual Meeting</u> -- The Board will wish to designate its voting delegate and alternate for the VACO Annual Business Meeting (See Attachment).
- b. November Board Meeting Date -- The November Board meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 13, 2018, which conflicts with the VACo annual meeting. The Board will wish to consider changing the date of the November Board meeting. The Chair has recommended Tuesday, November 20, 2018.
- c. <u>Citizen Alerting System</u> The Town of Farmville has invited the County to participate in a public safety citizen alerting system contract with them with *Everbridge*. This enables the Town and County to work together and coordinate citizen alerts and gives each jurisdiction full access and use of the program. The capabilities of the system include: National Weather Service severe weather warnings, GIS targeting, flexible group management, multiple options for contact data management, with voice recording, text to speech conversion, text formatting, and SMS. This program could be used for public safety incidents to include: severe weather (tornado, flash flooding), evacuations, shelter in place, missing persons/search and rescue operations, dam emergencies, etc. It can also be used for county employee notifications and other non-emergency communications. The total cost of the system is \$6,480/year. We are working with the Town on the allocation of the cost, and will have that information by the Board meeting. *Everbridge* is on state contract.
- d. WWI Monument Dedication Ceremony Fuqua School has kindly invited the County to participate with them in a Veteran's Day Ceremony. The Fuqua School program will be held at Crute Stage in downtown Farmville at 11:00 a.m. on Monday, November 12, 2018. At the conclusion of their approximately 50 minute program, the audience will be invited to join the County on the Courthouse Lawn for the dedication of the County WWI Monument. We anticipate this program to span about 20 minutes, which will include brief remarks by a Board member, followed by the unveiling of the monument and then a benediction. We have confirmed the arrival of the monument and name plaque for the event (see attachment). County staff is in the process of finalizing the coordination and details with Fuqua School. The Board will wish to select a member to speak on behalf of the Board.
- e. Structure of Planning Commission Membership Members of the Board have indicated an interest in possibly restructuring the County Planning Commission so there is representation from each County voting district. Currently the members are selected at-large with general consideration for geography; however, Farmville District #801 and Hampden District #401 do not have a citizen on the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission comprises 10 members (9 citizens/1 Board member). The allocation of the nine citizen members is six "County representatives" and three "Town representatives." Attached is a listing of the current membership. The Board adopted a Resolution on April 11, 2006 changing the structure of the Planning Commission to require three of the nine citizen members to be residents of the Town of Farmville.

As per the CRC's ongoing efforts to provide grant writing services to Prince Edward County Public Schools, the following activities have taken place since August 10, 2018:

- Cam Johnson, Regional Planner, and I have offered to approach the owner of the local McDonalds on behalf of the schools for potential fundraising activities. Ms. Tammy Hurt, STEM Coordinator, advised by e-mail dated August 27 that she would check with the school administration and get back to us.
- Ms. Hurt and I looked into an Acellus Game Changer Grant to help fund STEM activities. Their grants will fund a portion of the materials they would provide for the program, so other sources of funding would be needed.
- Cam Johnson passed on to Ms. Hurt some potential sources for stocking the STEM lab at the Middle School. They include:
 - o The Toshiba America Foundation.
 - o The Lockheed Martin Corporation.
 - o The American Honda Foundation
 - o The Small, Rural School Achievement Program.
- I passed on information to Ms. Hurt about VDOT Safe Routes to School (SRTS) QuickStart mini-grants (\$1,000 to fund SRTS education and encouragement activities) and Walkabout mini-grants (the Local Technical Assistance Coordinator serving the region will conduct a walkabout and create a written report based on their findings). Applications for both programs are due by September 13; however, the QuickStart mini-grant program has another round of applications due October 11.
