

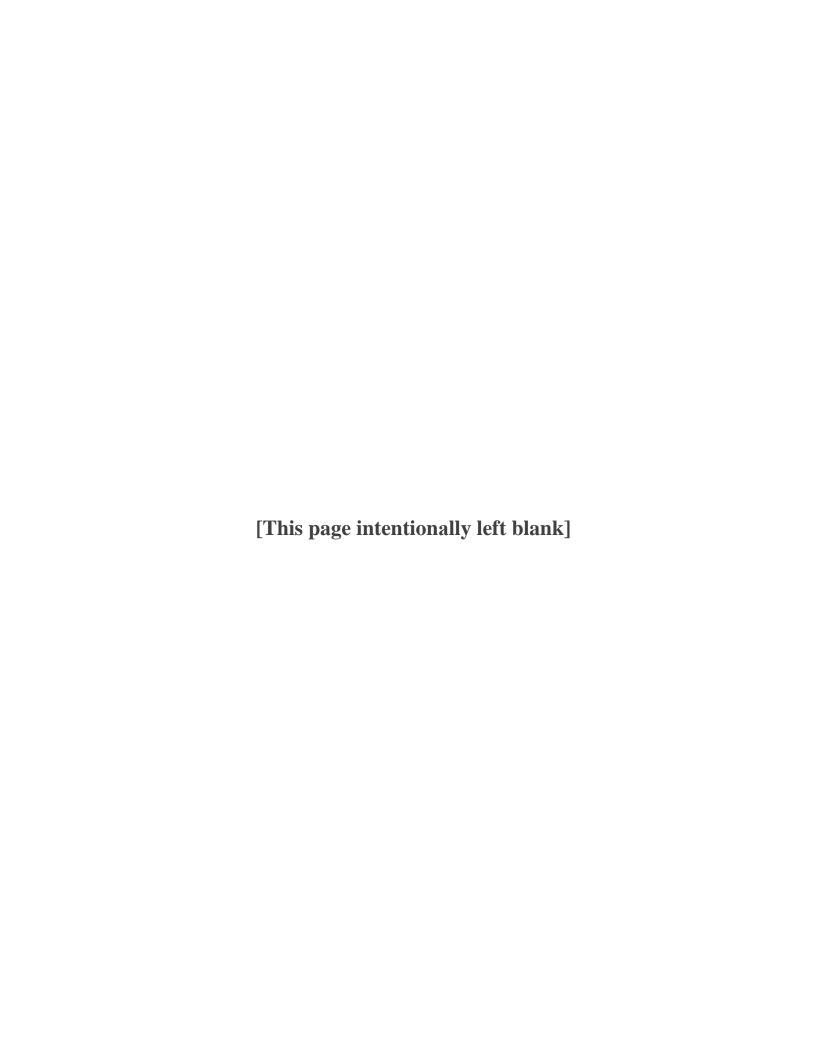

To further assist public information, the Board requests our Administrator, Attorney or county staff to immediately correct any factual error that might occur.

The Board's adopted *Protocol for Public Participation* sets aside 20 minutes for citizen comments. The time allotted for each speaker will be determined by the total number of citizens who have signed up to speak, but will not exceed five minutes.

- This is an opportunity for each individual member of the Board to express his/her own personal opinion in response to a citizen's concerns on matters of public interest.
- "Board of Supervisors Comments" is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.
- The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.
- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or member(s) shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

Chairman Cooper-Jones called the November meeting to order.

Supervisor Pride offered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

In Re: Recognitions

Chairman Cooper-Jones stated "Recognitions" is an opportunity for the Board of Supervisors to recognize achievements in our community. She said while they learned that Mr. Showalter would not be available to attend the meeting, the Board of Supervisors has a special honor and privilege in recognizing an outstanding citizen leader. Mr. Robert M. Showalter served the community on the County's Industrial Development Authority from July 1, 1982 until his retirement on June 30, 2018. During his tenure on the IDA, he served as the Vice Chair from 1988 to 1996 and as its Chairman from 1996 until June 30, 2018. The Industrial Development Authority is an important partner to the County with our ongoing economic

development efforts. She asked the citizens to help congratulate and thank Mr. Showalter for his 36 years of citizen volunteer service to the County of Prince Edward.

In Re: Public Participation

Vicky Page, Friends of the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library, thanked VDOT for their work in clearing the roads during the power outage. She then stated the mission of The Friends is to be of service to the community and the library, support the library and to raise revenue for library needs. As fundraising committing chair, she holds two book sales each year and for the past few years, The Friends has hosted the Champagne and Chocolate Gala held in the fall. She said the Friends were able to raise just under \$1,000 from the book sale, and that approximately 90 tickets were sold for the Fourth Annual Gala along with having a record number of sponsors. The net proceeds will benefit the Children's programs and activities for the Central Virginia Regional Library System, which more than doubled from the previous year. She expressed her gratitude to the sponsors and the community for the continued success.

In Re: Board Comments

Supervisors Emert, and Townsend thanked everyone for attending the meeting.

Supervisor Pride congratulated Supervisor Southall on his election to the Board.

Chairman Cooper-Jones thanked VDOT for all the services provided to Prince Edward County through and after Hurricane Michael. She said "Thank you to VDOT for the [work during the] past two storms. It was a tremendous amount of work, trees down everywhere, and people complaining, but I take my hat off to you for the service that you provided to Prince Edward County because being without lights was a really bad experience. I've been here 35 years – my first real experience with no lights, so I'm thankful. I do appreciate you."

Supervisor Wilck thanked VDOT and the Town of Farmville for the work done to restore power after the storm; he said their staff was out cutting off and picking up limbs all over the place.

Supervisor Southall thanked all of the citizens of District 101 for their support, and thanked the Board members and County staff for accepting him. He also thanked VDOT for all their hard work.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Scot Shippee, PE, Resident Engineer, VDOT, thanked the Board for the kind comments. He said his employees have been working really hard over the last couple weeks and he knows they will all appreciate it as well.

Mr. Shippee reported recent work has been focused on recovery from Hurricane Michael. He said crews are still working on slope and pipe repairs in various locations, and they are still out performing debris removal, all while patching potholes and trying to keep the riding surfaces safe. He presented a brief summary on Hurricane Michael, countywide: he said there were roughly 47 hurricane-related call-outs, not tree related, 36 of which were flooded overtop or washed out roads. He said Route 600 and Route 613 remain closed with major damage, with a price tag of right around \$1 million to fix. Work is being performed under an Emergency Force contract for our construction region. He said our crews have been working repairing a lot of these washouts; the work on Rt. 613 is not structure related. He said the work on Route 612 is another road that they worked on. Mr. Shippee said the cost of the cleanup from this one storm is estimated at \$150,000, the repairs to the shoulders and unpaved roads is estimated at \$200,000; overall the storm damage is estimated at \$1.6 million in Prince Edward County alone, and district-wide, it is estimated at \$12-\$15 million. He said they are working with FEMA to see what qualifies for reimbursement, but there are no guarantees. He explained the process of tallying the information to submit for reimbursement.

Mr. Shippee said the mowing will continue as soon as possible; crews from Buckingham and Appomattox counties are assisting. He said that in June, measurable rain fell 12 out of 30 days; from mid-July to the end of August, it rained 17 out of 21 days with a one-week break in September and in October there were about six working days before the hurricane hit. He asked that everyone keep that in mind that

the dry days are not just for mowing but it's when they have to tackle all the other big projects, such as safety and investment standpoints, it's a higher priority. He said the road surfaces are the priority; it is getting close to snow season, preventative maintenance needs to be done.

Mr. Shippee then announced the Farmville residency is now open and there will be a ribbon cutting in the first part of next year.

Supervisor Pride questioned if Allen Farm Road is still closed; Mr. Shippee said it is.

Supervisor Jones said the tree debris to the sides of the roads will hinder snow removal; he asked if VDOT can ask for help in removing the trees. Mr. Shippee said Prince Edward County and Charlotte County were hardest hit, and other counties are helping.

Supervisor Townsend asked if mowing has been subcontracted; Mr. Shippee said there has been no mechanism to do that this year, and what is spent on subcontractors for mowing comes from Prince Edward County's maintenance budget.

Supervisor Townsend said he will e-mail a list of road issues to Mr. Shippee; Mr. Shippee said he will review the list and make certain all are being covered.

Mr. Bartlett said a sign stating the road closure on New Bethel Road has been requested; he said the problem is that the closure is about 1.5 miles down the road but citizens aren't aware of the closure at the intersection with Route 15. Mr. Shippee said that with the volume of signs needed at various locations, there weren't enough signs.

In Re: Request from IDA – Hampden-Sydney College Bonds

Mr. Bartlett stated the Prince Edward County IDA conducted a public hearing on November 6, 2018 on the application of Hampden-Sydney College requesting the IDA of Prince Edward County issue up to \$15 million of revenue bonds. Representatives of Hampden-Sydney are present to answer any questions. If the IDA does not approve the request this matter will be removed from the agenda.

Section 3 of the Resolution proposed to be approved by the IDA specifically states the bonds will not constitute a debt or pledge of faith and credit of the IDA or County. In addition, Section 2 of the Resolution recommended to be approved by the Board of Supervisors contains a similar statement. Finally, Section 15.2-4909 of the *Code of Virginia* states that any Bonds issued pursuant to the Commonwealth's

Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act "shall not be deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit" of either the Commonwealth, or any political subdivision which includes the Locality which created the Authority issuing such bonds. The section goes on to state that any bonds issued pursuant to the

Act must have a statement on the face of the bonds stating this limitation.

That section of the state code likewise provides that the directors of the IDA won't be personally liable on the bond. This language is put into the *Code of Virginia* to make it clear the local government and IDA that assists a 501(c)(3) has no legal responsibility on the debt. Thus, there would be no risk or obligation for either the IDA or the County concerning the repayment of the bonds. The IDA does not receive any notices of payment or any other Bond management activities except for an annual Bond affidavit. Attachment (4) is the Fiscal Impact Statement as it affects Prince Edward County. As can be seen there are no such

impacts.

As required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to proceed with the issuance of the Bonds, the Board of Supervisors must approve a resolution approving the issuance of the Bonds.

Mr. Glenn Culley stated the college is requesting revenue bonds through the IDA, not to exceed \$15 million, using it to construct and equip a new dormitory on campus, the renovation of the existing dorms on campus and any other capital projects that may be associated with that. He said it would also be for coverage of bond issuance expenses. He said currently they have 1,046 beds and enrollment of 1,072 students, indicating there is a need. He said over two-thirds of the students come from Virginia.

Mr. Bartlett said this is not an obligation of the County or the IDA.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Pride, to approve the Resolution with the caveat that this approval expires on December 31, 2018, and to authorize the County Administrator and/or the Chairman to sign all necessary documents required for the issuance of the bonds; the motion carried:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Authority") has considered a request from the President and Trustees of Hampden-Sydney College (the "College"), for the issuance of the Authority's revenue bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$15,000,000 (the "Bonds") on behalf of the College;

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the Bonds will be used to assist the College in financing the acquisition, construction, equipping and development of the following facilities (collectively, the "Project"):

- A new dormitory facility;
- Improvements and renovations to existing student housing buildings;
- Other miscellaneous capital expenditures with respect to the property of the College; and
- The costs of issuing the Bonds and financing the Project;

WHEREAS, the Project will be located on the College's Hampden-Sydney College campus at Hampden-Sydney, Virginia, 23943, in Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "County"), off of U.S. Route 15 approximately six miles south of the Town of Farmville, such campus is the College's principal place of business:

WHEREAS, the College is a Virginia nonstock corporation that is exempt from income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code");

WHEREAS, the College is a private, independent, accredited and nonprofit institution of collegiate education in the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Commonwealth") whose primary purpose is to provide collegiate or graduate education and not to provide religious training or theological education and no portion of the Project will be utilized as a chapel or similar facility;

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code") provide that the highest elected governmental unit of the locality having jurisdiction over the issuer of private activity bonds and over the area in which any facility financed with the proceeds of private activity bonds is located must approve the issuance of such bonds;

WHEREAS, the Authority issues its bonds on behalf of the County and the Project will be located in the County;

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Board") constitutes the highest elected governmental unit of the County;

WHEREAS, following a public hearing held by the Authority on November 6, 2018, the Authority adopted a resolution (the "Inducement Resolution") in which it recommended and requested that the Board approve the issuance of Bonds by the Authority on behalf of the College;

WHEREAS, a copy of the Inducement Resolution, a reasonably detailed summary of the comments expressed at the Authority's public hearing and the College's Fiscal Impact Statement have been filed with the Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA

1. The Board approves the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority in a principal amount not to exceed \$15,000,000, which may be issued in one or more series and from time to time, for the benefit of

the College, as required by Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Virginia Code, to permit the Authority to assist in the acquisition, construction, equipping, development and financing of the Project.

- 2. The approval of the issuance of the Bonds does not constitute an endorsement to a prospective purchaser of the Bonds of the creditworthiness of the Project or the College. Further, as required by Section 15.2-4909 of the Virginia Code, the Bonds shall provide that neither the Authority nor the County shall be obligated to pay the Bonds or the interest thereon or other costs incident thereto except from the revenues and moneys pledged therefor and neither the faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth nor any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority and the County, shall be pledged thereto.
 - 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

In Re: Request from Farmville Volunteer Fire Department

Mr. Bartlett stated the Town Manager has forwarded a request from the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department for the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County to approve a resolution allowing them to provide Basic Life Support services within the corporate limits of the Town of Farmville. He said he contacted the Town and ascertained the Town Council voted unanimously to approve the request from the Farmville VFD.

Section 15.2-955 of the Code of Virginia requires approval of the governing body before any volunteer fire or EMS agency can be established in the locality. In Counties, that governing body is the Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Bartlett said this request seems to stem from a report provided by the Virginia Department of Fire Programs. This report was conducted in response to a request from the Town of Farmville for the Department to "conduct a complete and thorough review of the fire system in Farmville."

Mr. Bartlett stated the Town provided a revised resolution which specifies the Farmville VFD is requesting approval to provide Basic Life Support Services without transport, which was the item of most concern. He recommended the revised resolution be amended further by adding the phrase "Basic Life Support Services, Without Transport" and deleting the statement "these services." This would ensure there is no confusion on what services are approved and reiterates the services requested in the second paragraph of the resolution.

Supervisor Jones asked if there will be coordination so both aren't sent to the same emergency event.

A representative from the Farmville VFD said both agencies are notified to respond; he said it is their intent to respond to major medical incidents and provide assistance and medical care until EMS arrives and takes the patient to the hospital.

Supervisor Wilck made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to approve the Resolution of Support for the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department Basic Life Support Services; the motion carried:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Support for the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department Basic Life Support Services

WHEREAS, Section 15.2-955 of the Code of Virginia, 1950 as amended, requires local governing approval of any emergency medical service organization operating within that locality; and

WHEREAS, the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department is requesting approval from the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors to provide Basic Life Support services, without transport, within the corporate limits of the Town of Farmville, Prince Edward County; and

WHEREAS, the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors has determined it to be in the best interest of the citizens within the corporate limits of the Town of Farmville, Prince Edward County for the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department to provide these services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors grants approval to the Farmville Volunteer Fire Department to provide <u>Basic Life Support Services</u>, <u>Without Transport</u>, and to obtain the agency license per approval of the Office of Emergency Medical of Virginia.

<u>In Re: Request from Frederick County – Tax Exempt Status of Local Agencies</u>

Mr. Bartlett said the County of Frederick sent a letter requesting the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors approve a resolution supporting Delegate David LaRock's bill which would repeal the local tax-exempt status of those organizations listed in Section 58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001 of the Code

of Virginia on July 1, 2024, after which the local government would then decide if the organization should

be tax exempt.

Prior to January 1, 2003, the Constitution of Virginia required all organizations requesting tax

exempt status for both State and Local taxation to be approved by a vote of both houses of the General

Assembly. Effective January 1, 2003 the Constitution of Virginia was amended and transferred the decision-

making authority regarding local tax exemption from the General Assembly to the local governing body. But

the organizations previously designated as tax-exempt by the General Assembly have maintained that status

and are listed in Sections 58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001.

The letter outlines the County of Frederick's reasons for requesting the amendment to the state code.

The main reason is that a company operating a retirement community was awarded tax exempt status in 1986

which provides it an unfair advantage over other such companies that are not tax exempt and it is forcing

County taxpayers to provide an annual subsidy to the company. A secondary reason is the County has

standards it applies to agencies requesting tax exemption and the same standards were not applied by the

General Assembly, therefore, companies are being treated differently.

The following organizations in Prince Edward County would be impacted by this legislation which

would require them to come to the Board and request tax exempt status: SCOPE, STEPS, Crossroads.

Section 58.1-3605 of the Code of Virginia already provides a process for a local government to

request an organization be removed from the list of tax-exempt organizations but that process requires a vote

of the General Assembly for each such organization.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RESOLUTION

Resolution Supporting Delegate David LaRock's Legislative Proposal Regarding Tax Exemptions

- **WHEREAS**, §§58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, exempt various individually designated properties from taxation; and
- **WHEREAS**, these tax-exempt designations were authorized by actions of the Virginia General Assembly; and
- **WHEREAS**, in November 2002 a referendum was approved that permitted the General Assembly to adopt legislation enabling localities to exempt property from taxation; and
- **WHEREAS**, during the 2003 General Assembly session HB 1750 was adopted, which detailed the procedure for how the granting of exemptions was to be done and also how a previously granted exemption could be revoked; and
- **WHEREAS**, §58.1-3605 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, provides for a process by which a locality may seek revocation of a tax-exempt designation under §58.1-3650.1 et seq. which a local governing body wants to remove from its exempt property list. This process requires legislation and action by the General Assembly; and
- **WHEREAS**, Delegate David LaRock has proposed a bill which would repeal §\$58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, relating to tax exemptions; and
- WHEREAS, this bill would terminate existing exemptions previously granted by the General Assembly pursuant to §§58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, as of July 1, 2024 and would enable localities to exempt by ordinance the real and/or personal property of any entity whose property tax exemption has been repealed.
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, expresses its support for Delegate LaRock's proposed legislation as it completes the process started in 2003 to enable localities to decide the appropriateness of tax exempt requests; and
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, requests that the Virginia Association of Counties support this proposal as part of its 2019 legislative agenda.

WHEREAS, effective 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 11, 2018, as a result of the impacts of Hurricane Michael, W.W. Bartlett, County Administrator, as the Director of Emergency Management of the County of Prince Edward, found that the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, faced dangerous public safety conditions resulting in peril to life and property, which necessitated a Declaration of Local Emergency; and

WHEREAS, effective 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 17, 2018, W.W. Bartlett, County Administrator, as the Director of Emergency Management of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, found that the dangerous public safety conditions resulting in peril to life and property had abated, and therefore the Declaration of Local Emergency was terminated; and

WHEREAS, Section 44-146.21 of the *Code of Virginia* requires that such Declaration of Local Emergency be approved and affirmed by Board of Supervisors, as the governing body of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, within forty-five days of the declaration;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, that the Declaration of Local Emergency, dated October 11, 2018, attached hereto and incorporated herein fully by reference, be, and the same hereby is approved and affirmed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, and affirmed by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, that said Declaration of Local Emergency was terminated effective 5:00 p.m. on October 17, 2018.

In Re: County Administrator's Report: Request from FACES

Mr. Bartlett said FACES Food Pantry has presented a letter to the County requesting the County waive permit fees for soil disturbance, soil and erosion, stormwater and any building permit fees. The stormwater fee is \$944; the County has paid \$420 for an engineer's review of the plan. He said the land disturbance/E&S fee is normally \$350 while the building permit fees will be approximately \$1,240. The total would be \$2,534.

FACES has received a \$400,000 grant from Feedmore, their parent organization, to assist in building a new facility adjacent to the YMCA. Feedmore must provide a match of at least \$250,000.

Dr. Wayne McWee said the significance is that for every dollar that the County waives, that amount goes toward the match that is needed to get the \$400,000 from Feedmore. He said they would also accept any additional funding; the Town of Farmville is going to receive a request to waive the water and sewer connection fees and additional funding to help with site preparation. He said FACES serves approximately 750 households weekly.

In Re: County Administrator's Report: Landfill Equipment

Mr. Bartlett requested authorization from the Board to expend \$5,000 to purchase a used motor grader from Louise Wright. He said this piece of equipment will greatly decrease the amount of time for the Solid Waste employees when required to maintain and/or build new roads at the Landfill, and maintain the lots at the convenience sites. This machine will also be extremely useful to help clear snow and ice at those facilities mentioned. No budget adjustment is required. Mr. Bartlett said the Board approved an increase in the solid waste budget on August 14, 2018 of \$120,000 in the construction equipment line item to purchase a Track Loader. He said the County was able to find a machine for \$82,500, and said he would charge the \$5,000 to the same line item.

Supervisor Wilck said he has seen a tractor-trailer with a County logo on it, pulling a tank; he said the noise from the brakes is "ungodly." Mr. Bartlett said the tank is filled with leachate because of the rain. He explained what leachate is and how it is treated. Mr. Bartlett stated the truck was being worked on today.

In Re: Strategic Retreat

Mr. Bartlett provided the report from the facilitator on the Board's strategic retreat, along with a revised Vision graphic.

The Vision graphic was revised to reflect the Board's discussion during the retreat. Specific changes to the Vision graphic included:

- 1) Collaboration a new bullet point listing Youth/Recreation organizations was added.
- 2) Cultural Center was eliminated from the list of Themes but the bullet points regarding Destination, Tourism, Historical Buildings and College Offerings were added to the Economic Development theme.
- 3) Economic Development the bullet points concerning access to broadband and the airport were removed.
- 4) Mobility unchanged.
- 5) Fiscal Responsibility unchanged.
- 6) Public Education unchanged.
- 7) Public Safety two new bullet items concerning emergency shelter and Continuity of Operations were added.
- 8) County Operations this new theme was added.

The priorities listed were also amended from the earlier plan based on discussions at the retreat. He said the revised priorities are clearer and more realistic and the change removes some items on the earlier list the Board either felt were no longer a priority or were not a responsibility of the Board.

The Board concurred to review the report and revised priority list for action in December.

In Re: Properties & Community Development Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett said the Properties Committee, consisting of Supervisor Timmons (Chair), Supervisor Cooper-Jones and Supervisor Townsend met October 16, 2018 and discussed ways to improve maintenance of County property, especially the seven convenience sites. The Committee had a dialogue with the County Administrator and the Director of Public Works on ways to improve the maintenance of County property.

The first topic revolved around the sheds at the convenience sites. While three are relatively new, there are four that need to be replaced or rebuilt. The County has been using wooden sheds but to make these adequate, the County must fit out the buildings which is an extensive job requiring considerable manhours taking staff away from other duties or hiring contractors at considerable cost. The wooden sheds then last only 10-15 years. The committee is recommending the County transition from wooden sheds to Concrete Masonry Units (concrete block) with metal roofs to be used at the convenience sites. These buildings will last for decades, require less maintenance, provide better comfort and protection to the employees and save the County considerable cost in the long run. The Committee recommends enough funds be placed in the budget to allow the construction of two CMUs in each of the next two fiscal years.

Mr. Bartlett said the discussion then moved to workloads and manpower requirements. It was explained that difficulty in hiring staff for the landfill operations required the Director of Public Works to expend a great deal of his time at the landfill to ensure all DEQ requirements were met. In addition, the extremely wet summer and fall required an abnormally large number of tanker trips to remove leachate from the Leachate pond which took many manhours. While we are now fully staffed at the landfill, it has taken a considerable amount of time to catch up on the backlog of work which is still being done. The Committee expressed their desire to see improvement at the convenience sites as their conditions reflected on the County. They would like to see the bins kept painted and the grounds better maintained. Staff informed the Committee that employees painted the bins in the past and the grounds may have been kept in better shape but that with the aging of County Buildings, the expansion of County facilities and the loss of a position in public works have now made that very hard.

As the Courthouse and convenience sites have aged, the maintenance requirements have increased considerably. The County has also acquired the SCOPE building, which is old and requires considerable maintenance effort, and the County now owns the STEPS CENTRE which has a large grassy area that must

be maintained. The Committee was informed that during the recession, a Building & Grounds Maintenance employee retired and the position was not filled in order to save money. That position has never been filled since that time. The Committee is recommending that the funds in the budget for part-time in the Public Works Department be moved to full-time and the vacant Building & Grounds full-time position be filled. Because the funds for the part-time position have not been expended and we are almost halfway through the fiscal year, there are enough funds in the budget to pay for the salary of the new position for the remainder of the fiscal year but we will need to increase the Health Insurance expenditure line by \$3,500 and the VRS expenditure line by \$1,400. For the outyears, this position would increase the annual budget by \$24,000 to \$25,000 annually.

Supervisor Wilck asked if this will mean more can be done at the convenience sites. Mr. Bartlett said it is likely that one person won't make that much of a change. He said the insurance provided by the state will not cover roadside trash pickup for the community service workers through Piedmont Court Services. Discussion followed regarding insurance and verification of manhours for the community service workers. Mr. Bartlett stated the County could obtain insurance for community service workers if so desired. Supervisor Wilck directed this cost be determined.

Supervisor Townsend stated he would like to see all seven buildings be put on the list for replacement, with two each fiscal year and the fourth year there would be just one to be replaced. He also suggested collaborating with Mrs. Maxey to get the community service workers to the landfill and convenience sites. Mr. Bartlett said there are a lot of people that live near several of the convenience sites; he said the people without transportation problems can be sent to other sites. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Wilck said he noticed the contract with the Department of Justice is about to expire and asked for a report. Mr. Bartlett said the judge signed the release; the County is out of monitoring by the Department of Justice.

Chairman Cooper-Jones said the costs could be less; she added the findings of the report should be made public regarding Donald Hunter as they reported no criminal findings.

Prior to conducting business, the owner or operator of a dance hall shall obtain a permit from the County Administrator before a license can be issued. A maximum period of thirty (30) days from application of permit is allowed for investigation of the dance hall and other proceedings. After such investigation, the Board of Supervisors will then act upon the approval of such permit of the applicant. Upon the approval of said permit the owner will be given a signed form from the County Administrator to be presented to the Commissioner of Revenue, whereupon the operator will be issued a license at a cost of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), or that proration thereof, to be paid to the County Treasurer.

No dance hall permit shall be issued to anyone having previously been convicted of a felony, nor shall any permits be issued unless the premises on which the dances shall be conducted comply with all fire and safety codes of the County of Prince Edward and Commonwealth of Virginia.

All dance halls and dance hall establishments shall discontinue dancing and close for business each night not later than 2:00 a.m.

It shall be unlawful for any dance hall establishment to allow any alcoholic beverages on its premises unless the establishment is licensed by the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for "on the premises" alcoholic beverage sales.

Any person within a dance hall who is found to be intoxicated or under the influence of alcohol, marijuana or any other drug or narcotic, shall upon the order of the proprietor or management personnel or police officer, leave such place forthwith and not return until sober; and failure to obey such order shall constitute a violation of the ordinance and shall be classified as a class three (3) misdemeanor.

The owner of a dance hall is responsible for maintaining control of his individual dance hall establishment patrons to the best of his ability. Lack of such effort to control the patrons or a continual request for police assistance may initiate action to review the permit and license of said establishment by the County of Prince Edward or the Circuit Court Judge.

The owner or operator shall, at his expense, provide security officers as follows:

- (1) At least one (1) security officer for the first one hundred (100) patrons, or portion thereof, shall be in attendance at any public dance hall. Thereafter, an additional security officer shall be provided for every additional one hundred (100) such patrons, or portion thereof; and
- (2) For purposes of this section, a "security officer" shall be a deputy, peace officer, or special police officer, if such an off-duty assignment is permitted by such appointee's department, or a private security officer procured by the public dance hall owner or operator, through a private security business licensed pursuant to the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Failure to comply with this requirement shall result in revocation of the dance hall permit issued to such owner or operator.

Violations of the county ordinance or any of its sections will be considered a class three (3) misdemeanor and be punishable thereof. Each day of violation of any section will be considered a separate offense.



Summary:

The Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors, appropriated \$315,000 for the purchase of a new radio system for the sheriff. The system has been ordered at a final cost of \$312,743.

The Courthouse renovation project contains adjustments to the Sheriff's Dispatch and the atrium to allow public access to Dispatch after hours while restricting access to the rest of the Courthouse. This involves the purchase of new furniture to allow rearrangement of dispatch. After discussions with the Architect it is recommended the new dispatch furniture be purchased now. This will allow the Sheriff's office to achieve full use of the new radio system and reduce the time needed to complete the renovations in dispatch by consolidating the new dispatch equipment, new GIS system and new camera monitors onto furniture specifically designed to hold the equipment. This will allow organization of the cabling and a reduction of the number of power lines.

The furniture is on a GSA contract thus does not need to be bid. The Town of Farmville, Appomattox County, and many other local 911 centers in Virginia use the same furniture.

The furniture is costly because it is specifically designed to hold/support equipment in 911/dispatch offices. It is custom built to the room (the company has been on site 5 times) and has spoken with the architect to ensure the furniture is deigned appropriately. The items are made to withstand 24/7 use with heavier steel and thicker cores compared to office furniture, with removal panels to allow ease of access to the equipment and cabling, the furniture contains its own internal power and cabling ports and are customized to the space with a lifetime warranty.

Issue: PUBLIC HEARING: FY19 Budget Amendment

Summary:

The renovation project of the Courthouse has been a constantly evolving project that has expanded to include the STEPS CENTRE and an MOU with STEPS and the decision to build a new building for Social Services. During the October meeting of the Board of Supervisors the Board authorized the advertisement of a Public Hearing concerning amending the County's FY19 Budget to reflect the cost associated with the reroofing of the former STEPS CENTRE.

Section 15.2-2507 of the Code of Virginia requires a public hearing to be conducted prior to amending a budget by greater than one percent. The County's adopted FY19 budget is \$54,174,847. Any budget amendment greater than \$541,748 requires a public hearing prior to adopting the amendment. The original roofing contract was for \$744,628 plus \$7.50 per square foot for any decking that needed to be replaced once the EDPM was removed and the decking could be inspected. While the contractor is still wrapping up this project and we do not have the final report/cost it appears a total of almost 37,000 sqft of decking was replaced which exceeded the contract allowance of 10,000 sqft. There was also a credit for the switch from EDPM to TPO and the need to replace the roof hatch. It appears the final cost will be somewhat less than the amount contained in the required advertisement of \$954,628 (Attachment 1) but the exact amount is yet to be determined and I would recommend the budget be amended as advertised with any amount not expended to be used for the interior renovations.

Summary:

The County has received a special use permit application from Atlantic Pipeline, LLC to permit the construction of an unmanned microwave tower to serve as part of the telecommunications network for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC (ACP) project located on the west side of Route 617, Saylers Creek Road, approximately .06 miles north of Route 307, Holly Farms Road, on a parcel owned by Terri Atkins Wilson, identified as Tax Map 042-A-47, Prince Edward County, VA. This is an in the A1, Agricultural Conservation District.

The proposed tower will be 225' feet in height and will be lighted as required by the FAA with one top flashing beacon and flashing side beacons at the towers midpoint. The lease area dimensions will be 100' X 120/ and the compound will be fenced.

Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC has agreed to provide the County co-location opportunities without compensation for emergency services equipment. There are no existing towers or structures in the area that can accommodate the proposed tower which will serve as the backbone for the ACP communication network to monitor, control and ensure the security and safety of the project. The property is presently zoned A1, Agricultural Conservation, and this zoning classification permits towers, with related unmanned equipment buildings by Special Use Permit.

Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC conducted several aerial balloon test with staff from the Saylers Creek Battlefield State park and it was determined that the proposed tower would have no impact on the view shed from the park grounds and not be visible from the park properties.

The Prince Edward County Board of Zoning Appeals conducted a Public Hearing on November 20, 2018 and granted a variance to allow the tower to exceed the limited 199' height limitation based on topography of the site.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on November 20, 2018 and no one spoke in opposition to the request. The Planning Commission recommended forwarding the matter to the Board of Supervisors for approval.

This is an A1, Agricultural Conservation District.

Mr. Fowler said the tower will be 225' in height and will be lighted as required by the FAA with one top flashing beacon and flashing side beacons at the tower's midpoint. The lease area dimensions will be 100'X 120' and the compound will be fenced and secured. Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC will provide the County co-location opportunities without compensation for emergency services equipment. There are no existing towers or structures in the area that can accommodate the proposed tower which will be the backbone for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline communication network to monitor, control and ensure the security and safety of the project. This property is presently zoned A1, Agricultural Conservation, and this zoning classification permits towers, with related unmanned equipment buildings by Special Use Permit.

The Board of Zoning Appeals conducted a Public Hearing on November 20, 2018 at 10:00 a.m. to receive citizen input prior to considering action for granting a variance from Section 3.100(C)3 of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance which restricts the height of towers to no greater than 199 feet in height. The Board of Zoning Appeals granted the variance on the height of the tower during their meeting.

Mr. Fowler said Staff does not have any concerns of negative impacts on the surrounding properties associated with the request.

Mr. Fowler stated that several months ago, Atlantic Coast Pipeline representatives met with Saylor's Creek Battlefield Park Rangers and performed a balloon test at key locations in the park and determined there is no adverse impact on the park or the skyline view. Mr. Fowler said Atlantic Coast Pipeline will allow the County to collocate emergency equipment on the tower but it will not be available for other commercial collocation. He added there had been no inquiries and no opposition.

Commissioner Jones stated he rents farmland from Mrs. Atkins Wilson, on the same parcel. This tower will be no asset or detriment to him, but could abstain if others view his participation as a conflict of interest. There was no opposition to Commissioner Jones participating in the public hearing.

Sarah Perkinson, Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC, stated the tower is for the telecommunications system for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline project. This tower will be located at a valve site for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, on the pipeline; it allows them to communicate between the different valve sites on the project as well as the main control systems located in Bridgeport. She said it allows them to monitor the pipeline for safety, and also if there were to be any type of issue, it allows them to close the valves, including the one at this site, versus having to deploy someone out which could take more time.

Commissioner Peery asked how far apart the towers can be. Ms. Perkinson stated it varies due to topography of the land; she added that the next one over is in Nottoway County.

Commissioner Hunt questioned use by the County. Ms. Perkinson stated the County EMS may collocate but not commercial entities such as Verizon or Comcast.

A Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia in Support of Ratification by Virginia of the Equal Rights Amendment to the United States Constitution

- WHEREAS, equality under the law is a fundamental value of Americans and the people of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia; and
- WHEREAS, legislation and court decisions have increased women's access to education, employment, and public service; and
- WHEREAS, that same legislation can be repealed and the Supreme Court may strike legislation or retreat from its own precedent, thereby eliminating or abridging legal rights currently enjoyed by women, girls, and their families; and
- WHEREAS, Americans value the continued participation of women in education, the military, public service, and other spheres of our society; and
- WHEREAS, inclusion of the Equal Rights Amendment in the Constitution would require courts to apply the same strict level of scrutiny it applies to test the constitutionality of government action based on race, religion, or national origin; and
- WHEREAS, an overwhelming majority of Americans reported in a 2015 poll that they support an amendment to the United States Constitution to guarantee equal rights for both men and women; and
- WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment was passed in 1972 by Congress, which imposed a seven-year ratification deadline on states, later extended to ten years; and
- WHEREAS, the Constitution does not expressly authorize Congress to impose ratification deadlines on the states, and, moreover, if Congress does have such power, then it also has the power to extend or eliminate its deadlines; and
- WHEREAS, the American Bar Association reaffirmed its support for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment in 2016; and
- WHEREAS, well after the 1982 deadline set by Congress, Nevada in 2017 and Illinois in 2018 ratified the Equal Rights Amendment, bringing the total number of states that have ratified the amendment to 37, just one shy of the 38 needed to satisfy the Constitutional requirement that an amendment be ratified by three-fourths of the states to become valid; and

WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment states:

- Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.
- Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.
- Section 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that we, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, support the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment; and
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that we, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, urge the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, as proposed by Congress on March 22, 1972, during the 2019 legislative session.

Summary:

The Prospect Depot project is slowly moving forward. The plans have been completed except for a few administrative details. The attached MOA has been signed by all parties except for Prince Edward and the Prospect Historical Society, attachment (1). I have reviewed the MOA and proposed to the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) that section I - Demolition of Prospect Depot (DHR ID No. 073-0061) be amended to remove the requirement to (1) number and remove the foundation stones and reset them using the numbers as a guide and (2) completely remove the requirement to build a "fake chimney" and use the existing original brick.

The reason I requested these changes is (1) Safety of those having to number the stones and remove the brick before demolition was completed, (2) The stones can be removed and reset using photographic images of the stones prior to demolition. (3) The remaining brick are not structurally sound and (3) The project is a "re-interpretation" of the Depot not a replica.

DHR has agreed to those changes which would have been in Section I under the STIPULATIONS section of the MOU.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT AMONG THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION, THE VIRGINIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, THE VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, THE PROSPECT HISTORICAL SOCIETY, AND THE VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND RECREATION, REGARDING DEMOLITION OF THE PROSPECT DEPOT, PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, Prince Edward County (the County) proposes to demolish the Prospect Railroad Station, herein referred to as the Prospect Depot, (DHR No. 073-0061), located in the Village of Prospect, Virginia, and construct a replacement building on the same site for the purposes of a trail head for the High Bridge Trail and a transportation museum (VDOT Project No. EN01-073-116, PE101, RW201, C501, UPC 59780), hereinafter referred to as the Project (Appendix A-Location Map); and

WHEREAS, the County anticipates receiving Federal financial assistance for the Project from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) through the FHWA's Transportation Enhancement Program, administered in the Commonwealth of Virginia by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT); and

WHEREAS, the Project is being administered by the County, on behalf of the Prospect Historical Society (PHS), pursuant to a Project Administration Agreement executed with the VDOT's Commissioner of Highways; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA has determined that the provision of financial assistance for the Project is an undertaking, as defined in 36 CFR 800.16(y); and

WHEREAS, the FHWA, with assistance from the County, has consulted with the Department of Historic Resources (DHR), which serves as the Virginia State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO), on the Project, pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (54 U.S.C. 306108); and

WHEREAS, the FHWA, with assistance from the County and in consultation with the SHPO, has defined the Area of Potential Effects (APE) for the Project in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(a)(1); the APE for direct and indirect effects (Appendix B) encompasses the footprint of the original Prospect Depot building and parcels within or adjacent to the construction limits, respectively; and

WHEREAS, a limited archaeological assessment of the Project area, conducted in 2000 by Dr. James W. Jordan, Archaeologist at Longwood University, recovered several artifacts associated with the Prospect Depot; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA, with assistance from the County and in consultation with the SHPO, has determined that the Project lies outside of the American Battlefield Protection Program's Potential National Register boundaries for the Appomattox Station Battlefield (DHR Inventory No. 165-5001) but the existing Prospect Depot (DHR ID No. 073-0061) is a contributing property to the Prospect Historic District (073-5050), which is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA, with assistance from the County and in consultation with the SHPO, has determined that the Project, which will require the complete demolition and removal of the ruins of the original Prospect Depot, will have an adverse effect on the Prospect Historic District; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA, with the assistance of the County, has consulted with the SHPO to resolve the adverse effects of the Project on historic properties in accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, 54 U.S.C. 306108, and its implementing regulations, 36 CFR Part 800; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA has notified the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) of the adverse effect of the Project by letter dated September 20, 2018, and the ACHP, by letter dated October 22, 2018, has chosen not to participate in consultation; and

WHEREAS, the County is administering the Project and is responsible for implementing certain stipulations under this Memorandum of Agreement (Agreement), and the FHWA has invited the County to be a signatory to the Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.6(2)(iii);and

WHEREAS, the VDOT, as administrator of the FHWA's Transportation Enhancement Program in the Commonwealth of Virginia, has participated in this consultation pursuant to 36 CFR 800. 2(c)(4), and the FHWA has invited the VDOT to be a signatory to this Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.6(2)(iii); and

WHEREAS, the PHS is participating in the development of the Project with the County, and is responsible for implementing certain stipulations under this Agreement; and the FHWA has invited the PHS to be a signatory to the Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.6(2)(iii);

WHEREAS, the Project is located on Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) property known as High Bridge Trail State Park and DCR is responsible for implementing certain stipulations under this Agreement; and the FHWA has invited the DCR to be a signatory to this Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.6(2)(iii).

NOW, THEREFORE, the FHWA, the SHPO, the County, VDOT, PHS, and DCR agree that the Project shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to take into account the effects of the Project on historic properties.

STIPULATIONS

The FHWA shall ensure that the following measures are carried out:

I. Demolition of Prospect Depot (DHR ID No. 073-0061)

- A. The remediation for lead based paint and demolition of the historic Prospect Depot shall commence only after the County has salvaged certain intact character-defining, original features. The County shall complete the salvage of the following features within one year from the date of execution of this Agreement:
 - i. The stones from the 1853 foundation, which the County shall photograph, remove and reset on the exterior of the new building in a manner resembling as closely as possible the original foundation, relying on the photographs taken before the demolition and any historical photographs of the Depot that provide evidence of the original pattern and appropriate mortar type and color (if applicable).

Due to the instability of the remaining structure, the County will rely on a visual inspection of the structure to determine if any additional character-defining, original features are of suitable structural integrity to justify salvage and reuse. Should the County identify additional features that will be salvaged prior to remediation for lead based paint and demolition, the County shall notify the Signatories which features will be salvaged and their intended reuse.

B. Prior to commencing demolition of the Prospect Depot, the County shall provide written notification to the SHPO and VDOT of completion of the salvage work.

II. New Construction

- A. The County shall construct the new building within three (3) years of the execution of this Agreement in accordance with the design plans dated June 16, 2018 (as may be amended through the Commonwealth of Virginia's design approval process by the Department of General Services, Bureau of Capital Outlay Management), which include the following design elements:
 - i. Construction within the footprint of the original building;
 - ii. Utilizes new materials for the envelope and interiors; and
 - iii. Respects the form, massing, and scale of the original building.
- B. All interpretation and marketing materials shall clearly identify the new building as a reinterpretation of the historic depot.
- C. The DCR shall develop a landscape plan within four (4) years from execution of this Agreement and forward it to the Signatories for their review and comment. The landscape plan shall be implemented by DCR and the DCR shall provide documentation to the SHPO and VDOT evidencing its completion within five (5) years from execution of this Agreement.
- D. The County shall provide documentation to the SHPO and VDOT evidencing completion of construction of the new building within three (3) years of the execution of this Agreement.

III. Transportation Museum and Interpretation

- A. PHS and DCR shall develop for installation in the new building a transportation museum which shall include a brief history of the Village of Prospect and the role the original depot played in its development, a history of the original depot and the events that led to its demolition and reinterpretation, a visual reference showing the original depot, and information about the design of the original depot (alterations, segregated waiting rooms, etc.). PHS and DCR shall forward the text of the components of the museum to the Signatories for review and comment before implementation. PHS and DCR shall complete installation of the transportation museum, and the County shall provide the SHPO and VDOT documentation evidencing that completion within four (4) years of the execution of this Agreement.
- B. DCR shall construct and install on the grounds of the reconstructed Prospect Depot an interpretive sign about the history of Prospect Village and the Prospect Depot during the Civil War and the role the depot played leading up to General Lee's surrender to General Grant at Appomattox Courthouse. DCR shall install the interpretative sign and provide documentation to the County evidencing that installation, and the County shall provide the SHPO and VDOT a copy of that documentation, within four (4) years of the execution of this Agreement.

IV. Professional Qualifications

A. All archaeological and architectural documentation carried out pursuant to this Agreement shall be conducted by or under the direct supervision of an individual or individuals who meet, at a minimum, the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards (48 FR 44738-9, September 29, 1983) in the appropriate discipline.

V. Preparation and Review of Documents

- A. All technical materials prepared pursuant to this Agreement shall be consistent with the federal standards entitled Archaeology and Historic Preservation: Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines (48 FR 44716-44742, September 29, 1983) and with the SHPO's Guidelines for Conducting Historic Resources Survey in Virginia (rev. 2017), or subsequent revisions or replacements to these documents.
- B. The Signatories agree to provide comments to the County, the PHS, or the DCR, as appropriate, on all plans, technical materials, and other documentation arising from this Agreement within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt. If no comments are received from a Signatory within this review period, the County, the PHS, and the DCR may assume that the non-responding party has no comment. The County, the PHS, and the DCR shall ensure that all comments received within the thirty (30) calendar-day review period are addressed in the final plans, technical materials, and other documentation.

VI. Post-Review Discoveries

- A. In the event that a previously unidentified archaeological resource is discovered during ground-disturbing activities associated with construction of the Project, the County shall require the construction contractor to halt all construction work involving subsurface disturbance in the area of the resource and in surrounding areas where additional subsurface remains can reasonably be expected to occur. Work in all other areas of the Project may continue.
- B. The County shall notify the other Signatories within two (2) working days of the discovery. In the case of prehistoric or historic Native American sites, the FHWA shall also notify any federally recognized Indian tribes with an interest in the area and the County shall notify appropriate Indian tribes recognized by the Commonwealth (hereinafter "Virginia Indian tribes") within two (2) working days of the discovery.
- C. The County shall ensure that an archaeologist meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards (48 FR 44739) shall investigate the work site and the resource, and then the County shall forward to the other Signatories, the federally recognized Indian tribes, and the appropriate Virginia Indian tribes an assessment of the NRHP eligibility of the resource (36 CFR 60.4) and proposed treatment actions to resolve any adverse effects on historic properties. The other Signatories, the federally recognized Indian tribes, and the appropriate Virginia Indian tribes shall respond within five (5) working days of receipt of the County's assessment of NRHP eligibility of the resource and proposed action plan. The County, in consultation with the FHWA, shall take into account the recommendations of the other Signatories, the federally recognized Indian tribes, and the appropriate Virginia Indian tribes regarding NRHP eligibility of the resource and the proposed action plan, and then carry out appropriate actions.

D. The County shall ensure that construction work within the affected area does not proceed until (1) appropriate actions are implemented and the County has submitted to the SHPO and the VDOT documentation evidencing that implementation or (2) the SHPO determines that the located resource is not eligible for inclusion on the NRHP and the County has provided VDOT documentation of that determination.

VII. Treatment of Human Remains

- A. The County shall treat all human remains and gravesites in a manner consistent with the ACHP "Policy Statement Regarding Treatment of Burial Sites, Human Remains and Funerary Objects" (February 23, 2007; http://www.achp.gov/docs/hrpolicy0207.pdf).
- B. Human remains and associated funerary objects encountered during the course of actions taken as a result of this Agreement shall be treated in a manner consistent with the provisions of the Virginia Antiquities Act, Section 10.1-2305 of the Code of Virginia and its implementing regulations, 17 VAC5-20, adopted by the Virginia Board of Historic Resources and published in the Virginia Register on July 15, 1991, and the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (25 U.S.C. 3001) and its implementing regulations, 36 CFR Part 10. In accordance with the regulations stated above, the County may obtain a permit from the SHPO for the archaeological removal of human remains should removal be necessary.
- C. In the event that the human remains encountered are likely to be of Native American origin, whether prehistoric or historic, the FHWA shall immediately notify any federally recognized Indian tribes with an interest in the area, and the County shall immediately notify appropriate tribal leaders of Virginia Indian tribes. The FHWA and the County shall determine the treatment of Native American human remains and associated funerary objects in consultation with the federal Indian tribes and appropriate tribal leaders of Virginia Indian tribes.
- D. The County shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure that the general public is excluded from viewing any Native American gravesites and associated funerary objects. The Signatories to this Agreement shall release no photographs of any Native American gravesites or associated funerary objects to the press or to the general public.

VIII. Dispute Resolution

- A. Objection by Signatory
 - i. Should any Signatory to this Agreement object in writing to the FHWA regarding any plans provided for review pursuant to this Agreement, or should any Signatory to this Agreement object in writing to the FHWA regarding the manner in which measures stipulated in this Agreement are being implemented, the FHWA shall first consult with the objecting party to resolve the objection. If the FHWA determines that the objection cannot be resolved through such consultation, the FHWA shall then consult with all Signatories to this Agreement to resolve the objection. If the FHWA then determines that the objection cannot be resolved through consultation, the FHWA shall forward all documentation relevant to the objection to the ACHP, including the FHWA's proposed response

to the objection. Within thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of all pertinent documentation, the ACHP shall exercise one of the following options:

- 1. Advise the FHWA that the ACHP concurs in the FHWA's proposed response to the objection, whereupon the FHWA will respond to the objection accordingly; or
- 2. Provide the FHWA with recommendations, which the FHWA shall take into account in reaching a final decision regarding its response to the objection; or
- 3. Notify the FHWA that the objection will be referred for comment pursuant to 36 CFR 800.7(a)(4), and proceed to refer the objection and comment. The FHWA shall take the resulting comment into account in accordance with 36 CFR 800.7(c)(4).
- ii. Should the ACHP not exercise one of the above options within thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of all pertinent documentation, the FHWA may assume the ACHP's concurrence in its proposed response to the objection.
- iii. The FHWA shall take into account any ACHP recommendation or comment provided in accordance with this stipulation with reference only to the subject of the objection; the FHWA's responsibility to carry out all actions under this Agreement that are not the subjects of the objection shall remain unchanged.

B. Objection from Public

At any time during implementation of the measures stipulated in this Agreement, should a member of the public object to the FHWA or the County regarding the manner in which the measures stipulated in this Agreement are being implemented, the FHWA shall notify the Signatories to this Agreement and consult with the objector to resolve the objection. The Signatories may request that the FHWA notify the other consulting parties to this Agreement about the objection as well.

IX. Amendments and Termination

- A. Any Signatory to this Agreement may propose to the FHWA that the Agreement be amended, whereupon the FHWA shall consult with the other Signatories to consider such an amendment. 36 CFR 800.6(c)(7) shall govern the execution of any such amendment. Any Signatory to this Agreement may terminate it in accordance with the provisions of 36 CFR 800.6(c)(8).
- B. If the FHWA, the County, and VDOT decide they will not proceed with the Project, they may so notify the Signatories and then this Agreement shall become null and void.
- C. In the event that this Agreement is terminated or rendered null and void, the County shall submit to the SHPO a technical report on the results of any archaeological investigations conducted prior to and including the date of termination, and shall ensure that any associated collections and records recovered from VDOT right of way are curated in accordance with 36 CFR Part 79.

D. In the event of termination, the FHWA shall either execute a memorandum of agreement with the Signatories under 36 CFR 800.6(c)(1) or request the comments of the ACHP under 36 CFR 800.7(a).

X. Duration

This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect for five (5) years after the date of the last signature of a Signatory party. At any time in the six (6)-month period prior to such date, the County may request that the Signatory parties consider an extension of this Agreement. No extension or modification shall be effective unless all Signatories to the Agreement have agreed with it in writing.

XI. Execution

CICNIATODY DADTY.

This agreement may be executed in counterparts, with a separate page for each Signatory. The FHWA shall ensure that each Signatory is provided with a copy of the fully executed agreement.

Execution of this Agreement by the FHWA and the SHPO and its submission to the ACHP in accordance with 36 CFR 800.6(b)(1)(iv), shall, pursuant to 36 CFR 800.6(c), be considered to be an Agreement with the ACHP for the purposes of Section 110(l) of the NHPA. Execution and submission of this Agreement, and implementation of its terms, evidence that the FHWA has afforded the ACHP an opportunity to comment on the proposed undertaking and its effect on historic properties, and that the FHWA has taken into account the effect of the undertaking on historic properties.

County Administrator's Report

Summary:

The County has been informed our State Enterprise Zone whose expiration date is December 31, 2019 will not be renewed. This will be a major blow to our economic development efforts.

This program has been the single most effective state program the County has incentivizing both local companies and new companies to locate in Prince Edward County. Many local companies have benefited from this designation which has helped defray the cost of investment in new or renovated buildings and the training to expand their workforce. Over the last 19 years Prince Edward County Businesses have received approximately \$4 million in incentives and created hundreds of jobs.

Prince Edward received an Enterprise Zone designation from the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) in 2000 for a 20-year period that will expire at the end of 2019. Over the last 19 years the regulations governing the EZ program have changed. Section 59.1-542 of the State Code limits the number of Enterprise Zones (EZ)in the Commonwealth to 30 this number was greater in the past. The section also limits the time a locality can have an EZ to an initial 10-year period with up to two five-year renewal periods for a total of 20 years.

We have been informed the reason our zone will not be renewed is that there are currently more than 30 such zones designated in Virginia and DHCD must reduce the number of zones to meet this requirement. In addition, we will have reached the 20-year limit stated above.

Restricting the number and length of time a locality can have a designated EZ zone appears to be arbitrary and is not based on need. Section 59.1-545 of the State Code lists three distress factors that will count for at least 50% of the consideration for a locality's application for designation. These are (1) Average unemployment rate over the last 3 years, (2) average median gross income over the last 3 years, and (3) Average percentage of students receiving free or reduced-price lunches over the last 3 years. Prince Edward is worse than the state average in all three categories.

§ 59.1-542. Enterprise zone designation.

A. Upon the Department's announcement of periodic zone designation competitions, the governing body of any county or city may make written application to the Department to have an area or areas declared an enterprise zone. Such application shall include a description of the area or areas to be included, the development potential of these areas, the need for special state incentives, the local incentives that shall be provided to support new economic activity, and other information that the Department deems necessary to assess requests for designation.

- B. Two or more adjacent localities may file a joint application for an enterprise zone. Localities applying for a joint zone shall demonstrate a regional need for an enterprise zone and a regional impact that could not be achieved through a single jurisdiction zone. Applicants for a joint zone shall also specify what mechanisms will be used to ensure that the economic benefits of such a zone are shared among the applicant localities.
- C. An enterprise zone may consist of no more than three noncontiguous areas. The aggregate size of these noncontiguous zone areas shall be as follows:
- 1. For cities, the minimum size of an enterprise zone shall be one-quarter square mile and the maximum size of an enterprise zone shall be one square mile or seven percent of the jurisdiction's land area or an area that includes seven percent of the population, whichever is largest.
- 2. For towns designated as enterprise zones under former §§ 59.1-272 through 59.1-278, 59.1-279.1, or 59.1-280.2 through 59.1-284 of the Enterprise Zone Act (§ 59.1-270 et seq.), the size of an enterprise zone shall conform to the size requirements for cities in subdivision 1.
- 3. For unincorporated areas of counties, the minimum size of an enterprise zone shall be one-half square mile and the maximum size of an enterprise zone shall be six square miles.
- 4. For consolidated cities the enterprise zones in cities for which the boundaries were created through the consolidation of a city and county or the consolidation of two cities, the enterprise zone shall conform substantially to the size requirements for unincorporated areas of counties in subdivision 3.

In no instance shall a zone consist only of a site for a single business firm. Localities shall be limited to three enterprise zone designations.

- D. A joint enterprise zone shall consist of no more than three noncontiguous zone areas for each participating locality. The aggregate size of these noncontiguous areas shall be specified by regulation.
- E. Upon recommendation of the Director of the Department, the Governor may designate up to 30 enterprise zones in accordance with the provisions of this chapter. Such designations are to be done in coordination with the expiration of existing zones designated under earlier Enterprise Zone Program provisions. The initial round of six zone designation applications and approval may be conducted prior to adoption of final program regulations provided that the process is consistent with the provisions of this chapter. Enterprise zones shall be designated for an initial 10-year period except as provided for in subsections A and B of § 59.1-546. Upon recommendation of the Director of the Department, the Governor may renew zones for up to two five-year renewal periods. Recommendations for five-year renewals shall be based on the locality's performance of its enterprise zone responsibilities, the continued need for such a zone, and its effectiveness in creating jobs and capital investment.
- F. Localities that have zone designations are responsible for providing the local incentives specified in their applications, providing timely submission of enterprise zone reports and evaluations as required by regulation, verifying that businesses and properties seeking enterprise zone incentives are physically located within their zones, and implementing an active local enterprise zone program within the context of overall economic development efforts.

Chapter 49. Enterprise Zone Grant Program

§ 59.1-545. Application review.

A. After announcement of a periodic zone designation application process, the Department shall review each application upon receipt and secure any additional information that it deems necessary for the purpose of evaluating the need and potential impact of a zone designation.

B. The Department shall complete review of the applications within 60 days of the last date designated for receipt of an application. After review of the applications the Director of the Department shall recommend to the Governor those applications with the greatest potential for accomplishing the purpose of this chapter. If an application is denied, the governing body shall be informed of that fact, along with the reasons for the denial.

C. Consideration for enterprise zone designations shall be based upon the locality-wide need and impact of such a designation. Need shall be assessed in part by the following distress factors: (i) the average unemployment rate for the locality over the most recent three-year period, (ii) the average median adjusted gross income for the locality over the most recent three-year period, and (iii) the average percentage of public school students within the locality receiving free or reduced price lunches over the most recent three-year period. These distress factors shall account for at least 50 percent of the consideration given to local governments' applications for enterprise zone designation.

Attached is the report from the facilitator on the Board's strategic retreat, attachment (1). Also attached is a revised Vision graphic, attachment (2).

The Board was provided these documents at the November 8, 2018 meeting of the Board of Supervisors. The Board was to review the report and revised priority list and discuss any changes they deem necessary and then adopt the revised priority list and determine the next steps to be taken.

The Vision graphic was changed to reflect the Board's discussion during the retreat. Specific changes to the Vision graphic included;

- (1) Collaboration a new bullet point listing Youth/recreation organizations was added.
- (2) Cultural Center was eliminated from the list of Themes but the bullet points regarding Destination, Tourism, Historical Buildings and College Offerings were added to the Economic Development theme.
- (3) Economic Development besides the additions mentioned above the bullet points concerning access to broadband and the airport were removed.
- (4) Mobility was not changed.
- (5) Fiscal Responsibility was not changed.
- (6) Public Education was not changed.
- (7) Public Safety two new bullet items concerning emergency shelter and Continuity of Operations were added
- (8) County Operations this new theme was added.

The priorities listed on pages 7-9 were also amended from the earlier plan based on discussions at the retreat. It appears the revised priorities are clearer and more realistic and removes some items on the earlier list the Board either felt were no longer a priority or were not a responsibility of the Board.

The last page of the report contains a recommended list of the next steps. After the Board adopts a revised Vision, Mission and Priorities it is recommended that (1) the County Administrator will develop a strategic plan with work tasks for each of the 19 priorities, (2) The Board will initiate the Education strategy, (3) County Administrator will develop a report mechanism to report progress on the strategic priorities.





PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Virginia Association of Counties, in partnership with Virginia Tech and Virginia Cooperative Extension, offers county supervisors an opportunity to enhance their capacity to effectively and efficiently lead their respective counties by participating in the Virginia Certified County Supervisors' Program.

The Virginia Certified County Supervisors' Program features a five-course curriculum. Each course begins with a six-hour classroom session that is topically driven and reflective of the subject matter being covered.

Following the classroom session is an eight-week home study period. Each course participant is assigned relevant articles and books and completes assignments drawn from the readings on a weekly basis. The final component is a concluding six-hour classroom session.

Since its inception in 2005, more than 50 supervisors representing over 40 counties have enrolled, working towards their credentials as a certified county supervisor.

A variety of topics are discussed during the closing session including a review of the books and the assignments completed by each class member.

Each course is designed to provide the participant with a solid understanding of the subject or topic being examined. Faculty from Virginia Tech and Virginia Cooperative Extension, VACo staff and local government practitioners from across the state serve as the program's core faculty.

Making a Governance Difference: The Role of Purpose Driven Policy, Deliberation and Decision Making

Decision making is challenging when multiple elected officials, government professionals, and citizens are involved. Nonetheless, there must be a clear process to move from defining a problem to implementing a course of action and then evaluating the outcome realized. The class examines legal principles established by the U.S. and Virginia Constitution's, the Dillon Rule, as well as other ordinances and regulations which influence policy making and decision making.

Funding Public Services in the 21st Century: The Role of Budgeting

In a perfect world a county budget will be driven by county goals. Establishing a budget policy and linking the county budget with clearly defined goals may be a new concept to some elected officials. The legal basis for the county operating budget and the capital improvement budget are discussed. Various forms of county budgeting are explored including line item, program, performance, zero-based and outcomes based budgeting. Local county budgets are analyzed searching for unique features and successful methodologies that are transferrable to other localities.

Inventing Your County's Future: The Role of Community Planning

Through the examination of a variety of county comprehensive plans, class members assess the opportunities and challenges associated with land use planning. Focus is also given to knowing what local residents want for their community and ways to involve county residents in planning for tomorrow. The legal foundations of planning and zoning are reviewed and the key players in the community planning process are identified.

Managing While Leading: Understanding Your Powers, Duties and Responsibilities

Boards of Supervisors are elected to serve specific roles and guide county functions as defined by the Code of Virginia. This course reviews the powers, duties, and responsibilities of the local Supervisor in addition to identifying the skill set needed to establish a governance policy body that is consequential. Avoiding poor performance and learning how to blend leadership with strategic thinking is a course outcome.


New Ventures

he statutory provisions of Virginia Code Chapter 15.2 apply to most zoning and land use matters that come before town and city councils and boards of supervisors, as well as their agencies and officials. These provisions are tedious and complex. However, the realities of zoning and land use lawsuits are not. Like most lawsuits, one reality of these lawsuits is that they are instigated by the desire of property owners or developers to reverse the action taken by the local government and obtain a monetary award of compensation. Yet, another reality is that most of these lawsuits never meet the legal criteria required for the courts to make monetary awards to plaintiffs. Moreover, like all lawsuits, a third reality is that these lawsuits are very expensive. Finally, the fourth reality is that the only reason a developer or landowner plaintiff wins these lawsuits is due to the failure of the city, town or county, as well as their agencies and officials, to comply with the statutory provisions of Virginia Code Chapter 15.2 and other legal requirements.

All members of town and city councils, boards of supervisors, as well as their agencies and officials, would do well to remember these four realities.

Remember Ben Franklin's Advice

Ben Franklin's maxim is the best advice for any city, town and county, as well as their agencies and officials, when it comes to most zoning and land use matters: "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." When considering any zoning or land use matter, these governmental entities and their officials should make it their normal practice to "lawyer up" and request their staff and local government attorney to carefully explain the statutory and legal requirements applicable to every zoning, building code, subdivision ordinance, or land use matter, as well as every utility, service authority, and demolition issue that comes before their council or board in order to ensure compliance.


A ten-year history of zoning and land use lawsuits

During the last ten years, the participating local government members and VML Insurance Programs have defended over fifty lawsuits arising out of zoning and related land use matters. Approximately one-third of those zoning lawsuits involved the issuance of or refusal to issue special use permits. A special use permit is also known as a "conditional use permit" because the property owner has no absolute right, under the local zoning code, to the proposed land use and must apply to obtain local government zoning approval of the proposed use. Local government entities frequently grant the proposed zoning use contingent upon certain conditions. The lawsuits mentioned above that involved special use permits included

the complete spectrum of property uses: Single family housing, multifamily housing, housing for the elderly or lower income individuals, commercial properties, mixed-use properties; and properties involving the redevelopment of central business districts, marinas, industrial areas, former courthouse properties, and an abortion clinic.

Approximately another third of these land use and zoning lawsuits involved the appeal of decisions by city or town councils, boards of supervisors, building code officials, zoning appeal boards, historic and architecture review boards, and other local government agencies in approving or denying subdivision plans, site plans, and other approvals or denials. The property uses involved in these appeals also varied widely and included decisions arising out of plans for roads and traffic lights; setback requirements for buildings, accessory buildings, fences, utilities, wells, other improvements, and landscape buffer easements; demolition of blighted and other properties; easement disputes, and requests for variances from building code and zoning requirements.

The remaining third of these lawsuits involved more unusual tort and constitutional complaints seeking zoning and monetary relief arising out of zoning and land use matters, as well as constitutional rights to use public water, sewer, and other utilities and services; to pay reasonable fees for these utilities and services; to prevent takings of property and property rights as a result of zoning, building, safety, architectural, or historic laws or regulations; to prevent demolition of blighted properties; to prevent developments, improvements, and public and private uses of properties (including boat ramps, comprehensive redevelopment of central business districts, and mixed use residential, commercial, and industrial uses); to construct improvements on private property that conflict with



public easements, and to use and develop private property for the sale of obscene literature, devices, or tattoos. The scope of this article does not address lawsuits involving the constitutional lawsuits arising out of zoning classifications that exclude panhandling, certain assemblies, or defamatory, racist or other hostile speech.


The results in zoning and land use lawsuits over this ten-year history

With respect to the special use lawsuits stated above, in approximately half of these lawsuits, based upon the advice of legal counsel, the participating local government members successfully requested the courts to enter orders re-instating the matters on the docket of the local government; thereafter reconsidering and reversing their prior actions, and taking new actions on the matters in question in order to comply with the statutory requirements that were previously violated. These reconsidered matters essentially resolved approximately onehalf of these special use lawsuits. Moreover, the majority of the other remaining special use lawsuits were also dismissed by the courts for failure to adequately state a claim. With respect to the site and subdivision plat lawsuits stated above, in approximately ten percent of these lawsuits similar remedial measures were taken by the local governments which disposed of the lawsuits. The remaining ninety percent of these lawsuits were dismissed for failure to state a valid claim. Finally, with respect to the zoning/tort and constitutional lawsuits, virtually all of these lawsuits were dismissed for failure to state a valid claim or settled without monetary payment.

The final reality of zoning and land use lawsuits

The purpose of this article is not to discuss the statutory or other legal requirements relating to specific land use and zoning actions under Title 15.2 of the Virginia Code, but simply to provide the big picture of the history and nature of the complaints and the actions taken by participating local government members and VML Insurance Programs working cooperatively in order to defend and resolve land use and zoning lawsuits over the last ten years. Hopefully, all local governments, their agencies, and elected and appointed officials will remember Ben Franklin's advice and seek the support, aid, and guidance of their staff and local government attorneys in order to be well-prepared for the challenging and complex issues presented by all land use and zoning matters prior to making any decisions or taking any actions or votes on these matters. The successful history of participating local government members and VML Insurance Programs working together to defend and resolve land use and zoning lawsuits over the last ten years proves a final reality of zoning and land use law: Zoning and land use law is as difficult to understand for most attorneys as it is for real people!
