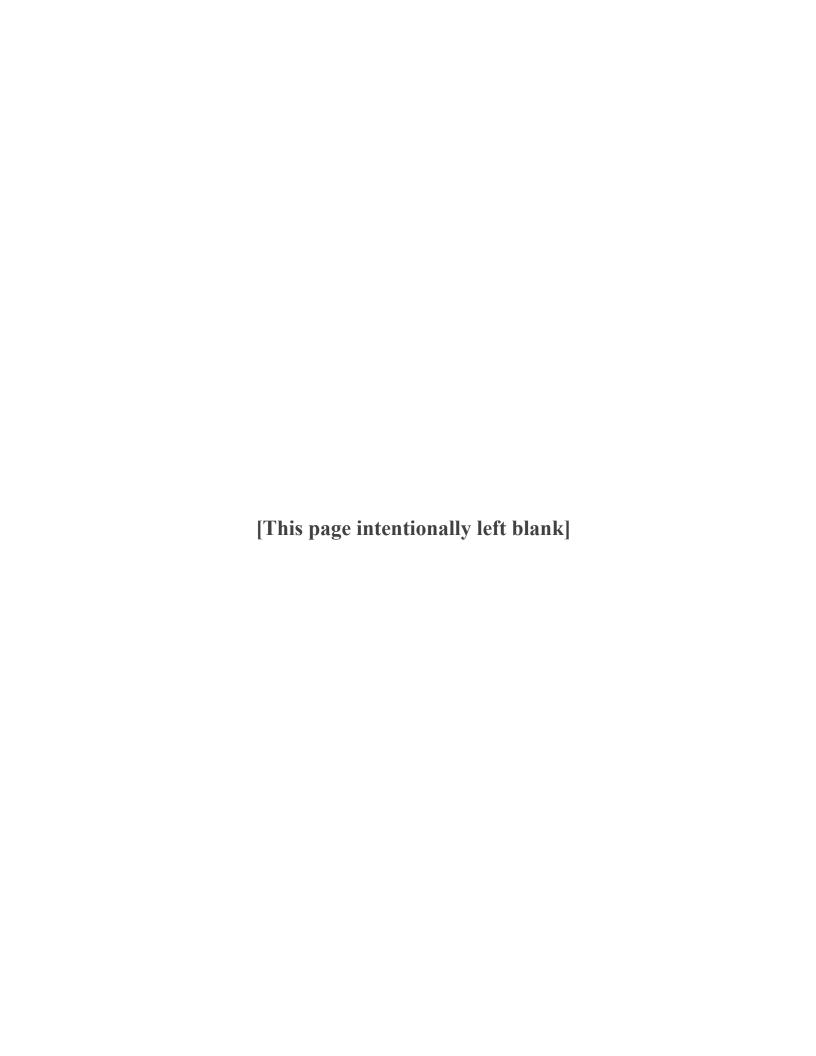

PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

(As amended January 2019)

I. ATTENDANCE AND ADJOURNMENT

All members shall make a reasonable effort to attend meetings of the Board. If unable to attend, a member shall notify the Chairman or County Administrator.

A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and must be present to proceed to business. A smaller number of members may adjourn or send for absentees. Special meetings of the Board may be called in accordance with Section 15.2-1418 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour set by the Board for regular or special meetings. He shall immediately call the Board to order and determine if a quorum is present; if so, he shall have the minutes of the preceding meeting submitted. Any errors or omissions shall, upon motion and carried, then be corrected. The minutes, being found correct, shall be signed by the Chairman and Clerk and shall be the authentic record of the proceedings of the Board of Supervisors.

II. CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

Annually at the first meeting in January of the Board of Supervisors, the Board shall elect from its membership a Chairman and Vice-Chairman, each of whom shall serve a term for one year, expiring on December 31 of the year elected, or until their respective successors shall be elected. In the case of the absence of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall preside at the meeting; in the absence of both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, the members present shall choose one of its members as temporary Chairman.

The position of Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board shall be rotated annually among the Board members. The rotation process will commence with the most senior member, that is being the member from District 101 serving as Chairman and the member from District 201 serving as Vice Chairman. Seniority will be based on cumulative months/years of service on the Board of Supervisors, which need not be consecutive. In keeping with this policy, the selected Vice Chairman will be elevated the following year to serve as Chairman. Upon completion of serving a term as Chairman that district's Board member would move to the end of the rotation list. A Board member shall have a minimum of one year of service on the Board prior to election as the Vice-Chairman and two years of service prior to election as the Chairman. Should a member of the Board decline to seek the nomination as Chairman or Vice Chairman, that district's Board member would move to the end of the rotation list of seniority and the rotation would proceed to the next higher district number. If a tie shall occur in the seniority of Board members, the Board member from the lower numbered district shall succeed as Vice Chair/Chair first.

Commencing with the organizational meeting held on January of 2016, the following would be the rotation based upon the members in office as of January 2016:

The day, time, and place of regular board meetings shall be determined at the January meeting.

If a Board of Supervisors meeting is cancelled due to inclement weather, the meeting will be held on the following Thursday, unless a holiday, in which case the meeting would be held on the following Tuesday. Pursuant to Virginia Code 15.2-1516, all hearings and other matters previously advertised shall be conducted at the continued meeting and no further advertisement is required.

III. CLERK

The County Administrator shall serve as Clerk to the Board.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board shall be duly drawn by the Clerk and shall be submitted for approval at the next regular monthly meeting following their draft.

The Clerk shall appoint a deputy as recording secretary if required or needed by the Board.

IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

After the call to order the Board shall proceed to the agenda. The normal order of the agenda shall be as below, except at the January organizational meeting and as subject to rearrangement by the Chairman, absent objection by the Board. At the organizational meeting in January, the first order of business shall be the election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman and approval of the Board's operating procedures.

V. PREPARATION OF AGENDA

The County Administrator shall see that the preparation and printing of Board papers, ordinances, resolutions, petitions, and other applicable documents, be completed within such time that members of the Board may receive the documents at least 72 hours before the meeting of the Board.

The County Administrator shall close the upcoming Agenda on the Wednesday prior to the meeting of the Board. Any item submitted after this deadline will not be considered for action unless recommended by the County Administrator.

VI. CONSENT AGENDA

The Chairman and County Administrator shall style routine, non-controversial matters requiring Board action on a Consent Agenda. Items may be removed from the Consent Agenda and place on the Regular Agenda on recorded vote by a majority of the Board members present. Only one motion is necessary to adopt all recommendations and action items on the Consent Agenda.

There shall be no debate or discussion by any member of the Board or the public regarding any item on the Consent Agenda, beyond asking questions for simple clarification.

VII. CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum. When two or more members speak at the same time, the Chairman shall name the person who shall speak first.

A motion or proposition shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Chairman or any member. Any motion or proposition may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or other action of the Board upon it, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Board. Otherwise, meetings shall be conducted in accordance to <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> (Procedures for Small Boards).

VIII. TAKING THE VOTE

When a motion in order is made, a second shall be required. The Chairman shall then state the exact motion and indicate that it is open to debate. After the motion has been debated, the Chairman shall put the question in the following forms: "As many as agree that, etc. (as the question may be) let it be known by raising your right hand", and "Those opposed by the same sign."

According to the Constitution of Virginia, a majority of all elected members shall be necessary to adopt any ordinance or resolution appropriating money exceeding the sum of \$500.00, imposing taxes, or authorizing the borrowing of money. Otherwise, a resolution, ordinance, or other proposition shall be adopted by vote of the majority of Board members present and voting. A tie vote shall mean the defeat of the motion voted on.

A member may abstain and be entered in the minutes as present and abstaining.

The Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, Title 2.2, Chapter 31, (State & Local Government Conflict of Interest Act) shall control with respect to a member's participation and voting.

IX. RECONSIDERATION

After a question has been decided, it may be reconsidered on the motion of any member who voted with the prevailing side, provided the motion is made on the same day as the decision carried. All motions to reconsider shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting.

X. WITHDRAWAL OF EXHIBITS

Original papers, filed as exhibits with any ordinance or resolution, may be withdrawn by the patron or upon his order. In such case, he shall leave attested copies, and shall pay the Clerk for the cost of copying.

XI. MANUAL AND RULES

The rules of parliamentary practice in <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, except when they are inconsistent with the rules established by the Board.

The Rules of the Board shall be reviewed and adopted in January of each year. These Rules may subsequently be suspended or amended by a two-third vote of the entire Board. Upon a motion to suspend or amend, the mover shall be allowed two minutes to state the reasons for his motion, and one member opposed to the motions shall be allowed an equal time to object.

XII. APPOINTMENTS

All appointments of Board representatives to commissions, authorities, committees, etc. shall be made once the individual leaves the position or on expiration of his term, and not later than two meetings after the individual has left. The Board shall attempt to honor appointments from representative districts and shall not discriminate based on sex, age, handicap, race, or origin.

At the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees. The committees shall meet at the regular times and in conformity with the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. In selecting members of committees, the Chairman of the Board shall make nominations after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. The Board may amend the Chairman's nominations and shall confirm the assignments. Standing committees shall consider such matters as referred by the Board, and shall report at regular meetings of the Board.

If the Board votes not to have standing committees, it may act as a committee of the whole on matters normally referred to standing committees. However; the Chairman after consulting with the County Administrator, may appoint special (ad hoc) committees to carry out specific tasks. This shall be done after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. A special committee shall automatically cease to exist once it has completed its specific task.

XIII. PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Chairman may, at his discretion, set an appropriate and consistent time limit on all speakers at a public hearing. All speakers shall come forward and identify themselves by name and address before stating their position. If a public hearing becomes disruptive, the Chairman may adjourn or continue, in accordance with the Code of Virginia.

XIV. CLOSED SESSIONS

All discussions held in Closed Session as outlined in the Freedom of Information Act shall represent privileged information held by those involved. Release of such information by a Board member outside the session shall be considered a breach of these by-laws, and the member shall be subject to censure. Specific purpose of closed session shall be stated in accordance with Section 2.2-3711 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Upon return to regular session after a closed session, the County Attorney and/or Chairman shall state the nature of the closed session in as specific terms as appropriate.

In open session, a roll call vote shall be recorded in the minutes, certifying that only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements and only such business matters as were identified in the motion were discussed or considered. Any member of the public body who believes there was a departure from the requirements shall so state prior to the vote. The statement shall be recorded in the minutes.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED

PROCEDURE IN SMALL BOARDS

In a board meeting where there are not more than about a dozen members present, some of the formality that is necessary in a large assembly would hinder business. The rules governing such meetings are different from the rules that hold in other assemblies, in the following respects:

- --Members are not required to obtain the floor before making motions or speaking, which they can do while seated.
- --There is no limit to the number of times a member can speak to a question, and motions to close or limit debate generally should not be entertained.
 - --Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending.
- --Sometimes, when a proposal is perfectly clear to all present, a vote can be taken without a motion having been introduced. Unless agreed to by general consent, however, all proposed actions of a board must be approved by vote under the same rules as in other assemblies, except that a vote can be taken initially by a show of hands, which is often a better method in such meetings.
 - -- The chairman need not rise while putting questions to vote.
- --The chairman can speak in discussion without rising or leaving the chair; and, subject to rule or custom within the particular board (which should be uniformly followed regardless of how many members are present), he usually can make motions and usually votes on all questions.

EFFECT OF PERIODIC PARTIAL CHANGE IN BOARD MEMBERSHIP

In cases where a board is constituted so that a specific portion of it is chosen periodically (as, for example, where one third of the board is elected annually for three-year terms), it becomes, in effect, a new board each time such a group assumes board membership. Consequently, all unfinished business existing when the outgoing portion of the board vacates membership falls to the ground; and if the board is one that elects its own officers or appoints standing committees, it chooses new officers and committees as soon as the new board members have taken up their duties, just as if the entire board membership had changed. The individual replacement of persons who may occasionally vacate board membership at other times, however, does not have these effects.

In Re: Selection of Operating System: Committees or Committees-of-the-Whole

The Rules of the Board state that "at the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees." If the Board would vote not to have standing committees, it may act as a "committee of the whole."

Chairman Wilck recommended the Board operate as a committee of the whole, with the following standing committees: the Finance Committee, the Legislative Committee, the Personnel Committee, the Property & Community Development Committee, the Strategic Planning Committee, the Library Committee, the Audit Committee, and the Bus Committee is an ad hoc committee.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PUBLIC HEARINGS RULES OF PROCEDURE

- 1. Public Hearings the order of presentation shall be as follows, unless varied by the Chairman.
 - a. Staff report.
 - b. Applicant's presentation.
 - c. Comments, statements or presentations from members of the public.

The order of speakers will be:

- 1) Those in support of the matter,
- 2) Those with questions or concerns,
- 3) Those opposed,
- 4) Rebuttals (limited by the Chair as to number and time-see below),
- 5) Questions by the Board members of speakers.

d. Additional rules:

- The Chair can permit speaking out of the order in #c above as deemed necessary to enable the public to fully participate.
- If able, speakers must stand at the lectern and address the Board.
- All comments shall be directed to the members of the Board of Supervisors. Debate is prohibited. This includes debate among speakers or speakers/Board members/staff.
- Presentation by the applicant and other speakers shall be limited to a time set by the Chairman.
- Additional time, for any portion, may be granted at the discretion of the Chairman.
- The Chair will set the number of minutes permitted for rebuttal and has the discretion to change the number.
- The Chair has the authority to limit or decrease time for any portion of the public hearing due to the number of potential speakers, or repetition, or any other concern.
- Remarks shall be confined to the matter under discussion and shall be relevant.
- 2. Speakers arriving after the commencement of the hearing and/or who are not on the sign-up sheet will be recognized at the discretion of the Chairman.

- 3. Repetitive testimony is discouraged.
- 4. The Chairman shall have the authority to end a presentation that violates these rules or for other cause.
- 5. Following discussion of all matters considered in the public hearing, the Board members will consider one of three actions regarding each matter:
 - Approval (with conditions, as applicable);
 - Denial: or
 - Table for further review.
- 6. Once the public comment period has been closed, no further public input will be permitted unless clarification is requested by a Board member. The response shall address only those questions raised by the member.

This is an opportunity for citizens to speak and the Board to listen carefully to citizen expressions of concern and opinion.

Citizens are expected to conduct research on topics prior to Board meetings and this forum provides citizens with an opportunity to inform elected officials of their findings and positions on matters of public interest and concern.

Citizens wishing to speak during Public Participation are asked to please sign the Public Participation register prior to the beginning of the meeting.

Citizens are respectfully requested to state their full name and address for the record.

The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.

Citizens shall speak for a maximum of five (5) minutes, unless more time is granted by the Chair.

In the event that more than four (4) speakers wish to be heard during citizen's time, the Chairman shall allocate the twenty (20) minutes among speakers in an equitable manner. An extension to the twenty (20) minute limit can be granted by the Chair.

Comments from citizens who are not residents of Prince Edward County will be entertained once all County residents are heard.

Signs, placards, posters or like material are not permitted in the Board Chamber, adjoining areas or County offices.

The Board asks that citizens remain seated during the meeting unless called upon to stand for recognition as a speaker, official duties, physical necessity, or to enter or leave the meeting.

The use of profane, vulgar, obscene or threatening speech is not permitted and can result in removal from the meeting.

Over the past five years, the County has underrun the annual budget while at the same time improving the County services to its citizens. The annual underrun of the County budget has been used to increase its fund balance. Additionally, the County's debt service has decreased and the County has recently taken advantage of refinancing the remaining debt at a lower rate thus reducing the annual payments.

The Fund balance now has sufficient funds to pay for much, if not all, of the upcoming projects at the STEPS building, the new County Social Services building, and for the revisions/upgrades to the Courthouse.

The County has also experienced a growth in new businesses with the latest partner being the YakAttack manufacturing facility.

This Board has instituted many procedural changes to guarantee fair and equal treatment of every citizen in Prince Edward County and not just the privileged few.

The Board has moved from personal agendas that were prevalent in the past to a place where personal agendas have been set aside. I urge the Board to continue with this approach to governance.

Each of us must be totally honest and continually ask ourselves why we vote the way we do and will this vote benefit the citizens of Prince Edward County.

At this time, I am respectfully submitting my resignation to be effective January 31, 2019. I wish each of the Board members the very best and that each of you seek God's wisdom for every decision that you make.

I also wish to thank the citizens of the Buffalo District and Prince Edward County for their trust, support, and confidence by allowing me to serve them these past five years.

May God bless the United States, the great State of Virginia, and especially the citizens of Prince Edward County.

Chairman Wilck announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on a Special Use Permit application from Par 5 Development Group, LLC to permit the construction of a retail establishment, along with illuminated signage, located at 8277 Patrick Henry Highway (US 360) on Tax Map Parcels 107-A-30, 107-A-31, 107-A-32, and 107-A-33, owned by Harvie and Rebecca Whitus. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Wednesday, December 26, 2018 and Wednesday, January 2, 2019 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Fowler stated the County has received a special use permit application from Par 5 Development Group, LLC to permit the construction of a retail establishment, along with illuminated signage, located at 8277 Patrick Henry Highway (US 360) on Tax Map Parcels 107-A-30, 107-A-31, 107-A-32, and 107-A-33, owned by Harvie and Rebecca Whitus.

Mr. Fowler said the proposed Dollar General store will be approximately 9,100 square feet and provide 35 parking spaces and have illuminated signage. This is an allowed use in the A1, Agricultural Conservation District by Special Use Permit. The store will operate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday through Sunday, receive one delivery by tractor trailer once a week during normal operation hours, and utilize "Night Friendly" LED lighting. The developer is working with VDOT staff to address traffic controls, safety concerns and necessary road improvements.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on December 18, 2018; two neighbors and one person who owns rental property across Patrick Henry Highway from the proposed project spoke. No one spoke against the proposed project, but did raise concerns regarding lighting, buffers and stormwater issues and trash/litter. The developer agreed to the following:

- Construct a privacy fence along the sides and rear of the property
- All lighting will be Night Sky friendly and face downward
- Would research if the wall sign could be dimmed after the store closed
- That the site would be monitored for trash and litter daily
- That an approved Erosion and Sediment Control/Stormwater Plan would be submitted and approved by Prince Edward County
- The site will comply with all landscape regulations

Mr. Fowler said the Planning Commission recommended forwarding the matter to the Board of Supervisors for approval with the following conditions:

- Landscape buffer consisting of privacy fencing along the sides and rear of the property lines
- Monument sign internally illuminated with no changeable copy

Chairman Wilck announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on a request by Jamestown Presbyterian Church for a Special Use Permit to construct a new building to operate a Private Educational Facility located on Tax Map Parcel 27-(6)-C-O, just North of 1751 Lockett Road, Rice,

VA. This is an A1, Agricultural Conservation District. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Wednesday, December 26, 2018 and Wednesday, January 2, 2019 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Fowler stated the County has received a special use permit application from Jamestown Presbyterian Church for the construction and operation of a Private Educational Facility for up to fifty (50) children located on Tax Map Parcel 27-(6)-C-O, just North of 1751 Lockett Road, Rice, and owned by Jamestown Presbyterian Church.

The proposed facility will offer full-time and part-time enrollment options for K-12 grade students and will operate Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. After-school activities will occur from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., on occasion. The proposed school will utilize a combination of outdoor learning and community service projects as a foundation for the curriculum development and transportation will be provided by the parents. There will be up to seven teachers/staff employed.

Mr. Fowler said the property is zoned A1, Agricultural Conservation, and this zoning classification permits a Private Educational Facility by Special Use Permit. Access to the new facility will be provided through the existing church access.

The Planning Commission conducted a public hearing on December 18, 2018 concerning this application and made a recommendation for approval. No one spoke against and four spoke in support of the application at the public hearing. The Planning Commission recommended forwarding the matter to the Board of Supervisors for approval. Staff does not have any concerns of negative impacts on the surrounding properties associated with the request.

Angela Whittaker, Director of the Full Circle School, stated there is a wonderful partnership with the school and church. She said they intend to keep the expansion as "green" as is possible. She said the grades will expand to include second grade through high school; she added they are grateful for and appreciate the support.

Supervisor Southall asked how many will be employed at the school. Ms. Whittaker said there are currently two employees are full time and one is part time; she said next year there will be three full-time employees. They currently have 11 students and by the end of this school year, expect to have 15-17 enrolled, and by fall they expect at least 22 students attending the school.

Beverly Hines, Jamestown Presbyterian Church Trustee, said they have enjoyed having the school at the church; it is a wonderful opportunity to use the school as a mission. She said they anticipate capping the enrollment at about 50 students, but the school has outgrown the building.

Chairman Wilck opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Wilck closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Timmons asked if the Planning Commission had additional conditions; Supervisor Jones said there were no additional to the normal building requirements.

In Re: Fire Association Capital Expenditure Financing Fund

Mr. Bartlett stated that in 2011, the Board of Supervisors approved the creation of the Fire Association Capital Expenditure Financing Fund. He said the County makes available to the members of the Fire Association up to \$600,000 in low interest financing for the purchase of trucks, apparatus and equipment. Section 15.2-954 of the *Code of Virginia* authorizes any locality to make loans to any nonprofit organization furnishing firefighting or rescue services.

At present, the Prospect Volunteer Fire Department and the Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad have outstanding loans. Prospect borrowed \$187,500 in March of 2016 and still has \$75,000 outstanding. PEVRS borrowed \$120,000 in March of 2017 and still has \$96,000 outstanding.

Mr. Bartlett reviewed the Master Agreement, signed by all of the VFD and the Rescue Squad, which contains the procedures by which the Fire Association will request funds to be provided and for which organization, and the County will create a promissory note, which provides that in the event of a default each member of the Association guarantees repayment of the loan.

At its December 19, 2018 meeting, the Prince Edward Area Firefighters Association approved a request from the Hampden-Sydney Volunteer Fire Department for \$90,000 of funding to finance the purchase of self-contained breathing apparatus (Airpaks).

Chief L. W. Gilliam, Hampden-Sydney Fire & Rescue, requested a loan for \$90,000 for SCBA Airpaks; he said the current Airpaks are 28 years old. He said the company that provides the current style was bought out twice and is closing, and in two years they will not be able to get parts. He said new packs would provide an extra 25 minutes of working time; each new Airpak is \$7,500. He stated the \$90,000 would only replace half of the current inventory.

WHEREAS, regulations governing Emergency Medical Services (EMS) in the Commonwealth of Virginia, as codified in 12VAC5-31-370, mandate that each EMS agency that responds to medical emergencies for its primary service area shall be a Designated Emergency Response Agency (DERA), and shall provide services within its primary service area as defined by the local EMS response plan as required by EMS regulation 12VAC5-31-610; and

WHEREAS, the following EMS agencies are Designated Emergency Response Agencies as defined by EMS Regulation 12VAC5-31-10 in Prince Edward County:

Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad, Inc.
Hampden-Sydney Volunteer Fire Department, Inc.
Meherrin Volunteer Fire & Rescue, Inc.
Pamplin Volunteer Fire Department and EMS, Inc.
Farmville Volunteer Fire Department, Inc.

WHEREAS, Prince Edward County has been divided into seven fire districts which are identified on the Fire District Response Map maintained by the Farmville Emergency Communications (911) Center; and

WHEREAS, the individual EMS agencies are independent corporations that are best able to determine compliance with EMS regulations and to formulate a response plan for their primary service areas;

resignation shall not be revocable after the date stated for resignation or after the 45th day before

the date set for the special election.

2. If the Board does not wish to immediately call for the election the same *Code* section states:

"The governing body ... SHALL within 15 days of the occurrence of the vacancy, petition the

Circuit Court to issue a writ of election to fill the vacancy."

- 3. The Board will need to determine if it wishes to petition the Court to hold the election in concert with the elections on November 12, 2019 or request a special election to be held at another time which would cost the County approximately \$7,000.
- 4. If the Board wishes to hold a special election other than on November 12, 2019, several restrictions come into play. Section 24.2-682 of the *Code of Virginia* lays out the guidelines of when special elections can be held. No special election can be held within 55 days of a general or primary election. No special election can be held on the same day as a primary election. A special election can be held on the same day as a general election.
- 5. We have been informed there will be a primary on June 11, 2019. Therefore, no special election can be held on that date nor for the 55 days prior to that date. That means a special election could be held as late as April 16, 2019. Section 24.2-507 of the *Code of Virginia* states for special elections, the deadline to submit a declaration of candidacy and file the petitions is "(i) at least 60 days before the election or (ii) within five days of any writ of election or order calling a special election to be held less than 60 days after the issuance of the writ or order." *Code* Section 24.2-510 states exactly the same time frames for political parties to nominate by methods other than a primary. What this means is if the order calling for the special election is filed on or before February 14, 2019 to hold the special election on April 16th, the 60-day rule is met. This means candidates would have to declare and file their petitions by February 14. It also means parties would have to nominate their candidates by February 14. If the order calling for the special election is filed after February 14 for April 16, there would be less than 60 days before the special election and candidates would only have five days to decide to run and obtain the necessary petition. Either way there would not be much time for prospective candidates to do what is necessary.
- 6. If the decision is to request an election after the primary, but before the general election, the special election could be held no later than September 17, 2019. This would allow more time for candidates to file; this would still cost the County \$7,000.

Supervisor Timmons stated that at the previous meeting, the Board voted to not have the judges appoint someone, but to have the Board appoint his successor. He said that because of the time constraints and being fair to everyone, he felt the Board must consider appointing someone. He said he would like the Board to advertise, take applications and then appoint someone, and come the General Election in November, they could run [for office] and take it from there.

the Board can advertise and take applications, and then interview everyone or narrow it down. Discussion

followed.

Chairman Wilck said he feels there is a need to advertise; he added there will be many applicants

and there are two potential applicants so far.

Supervisor Timmons said the Board adopted a policy of being open and transparent; he said his

motion was to authorize staff to advertise for filling the vacancy.

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said the advertisement could run next

Wednesday, January 30 and the following Friday, February 1, 2019, with a deadline for applications February

8, 2019 at noon. She said the Board could choose to review them prior to the Board meeting on Tuesday,

February 12. Discussion followed.

The Board concurred to meet Tuesday, February 12, 2019 at 5:00 p.m. for a closed session to discuss

the potential appointment or announcement of a plan to interview applicants.



WHERAS, in June 2005, the County of Prince Edward jointly participated in a Feasibility Study with the Town of Farmville to develop recommendations for the completion of the Farmville US 460 East Interchange; and

WHERAS, the Feasibility Study was in part funded by VDOT's Rural Transportation Planning Grant Program through the Piedmont Planning District Commission.; and

WHERAS, the study concluded "...the economic development opportunities for the eastern route 460 Business corridor were severely limited due to the lack of access to westbound 460"; and

WHERAS, US 460 is identified in VTRANS 2040 Multimodal Transportation plan as a Corridor of Statewide Significance that traverses the Commonwealth from Beckley, West Virginia to Hampton Roads, Virginia, and

WHERAS, the current interchange does not provide westbound access from Business 460 to U.S. 460 or eastbound access from U.S. 460 to Business 460; and

WHERAS, this limited access has negatively impacted the development of a major commercial corridor in the Town of Farmville; and

WHERAS, the limited access forces heavy trucks to travel through residential communities or through the middle of the Town of Farmville on a two-lane road; and

WHERAS, this route forces these trucks to cross pedestrian crosswalks used by students of Longwood University to traverse from their Dorm rooms to their classrooms, the Library and Cafeteria, thereby jeopardizing their safety; and

NOW, THEREFOR, BE IT RESOVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward hereby supports the completion of the Interchange and urges the Virginia Department of Transportation to recognize the need and provide the necessary funding to complete this Interchange.

Shentel Cable Television Franchise Renewal

Summary:

Shenandoah Cable Television, LLC, doing business as Shentel is requesting to renew the existing Franchise Agreement which was originally adopted in 1993. The Franchise Agreement was last renewed in June of 2010 effective in December 2008.

Per section 15.2-2108.21 of the Code of Virginia such agreements shall have a term of 15 years. Section 15.2-2108.1.1.C of the Code of Virginia states "...no new or renewed cable franchise entered into on or after January 1, 2007 shall include a franchise fee as long as cable services are subject to the Virginia Communications Sales and Use Tax." Shentel is subject to this tax which is capped at 5% per chapter 6.2 of Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia.

Shentel pays this tax directly to the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth then remits to the County our portion as part of the Telecommunication Tax we receive each month.

With deregulation franchise agreements no longer provide exclusive monopolies to cable companies. As stated in the heading this is a non-exclusive franchise meaning any other provider could enter the market if they so wished. No longer having the authority to negotiate the franchise fee, the primary purpose of the franchise agreement is to reach agreement on the use of public rights of way, and to require Shentel to indemnify the County for any work done in the rights of way.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO TELE-MEDIA CORPORATION AND ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS TO OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A COMMUNITY TELEVISION SYSTEM; SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THAT GRANT OF FRANCHISE; PROVIDING FOR THE COUNTY REGULATION OF THE COMMUNITY TELEVISION SYSTEM; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA, THAT

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited the "Community Antenna Television Franchise Ordinance" (Ordinance).

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this Ordinance the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. Terms of art not otherwise defined herein, whether capitalized or not, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act of 1992 (the "1992 Cable Act"). When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

- 2-1 "County" is the unincorporated portion of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia
- 2-2 "Grantee" is Tele-Media Corporation or any person or entity who succeeds Tele-Media Corporation as Grantee hereunder in accordance with the provisions of this Franchise.
- 2-3 County Administrator is the County Administrator of Prince Edward County, Virginia
- 2-4 "Board of Supervisors" is the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia
- 2-5 "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind
- "Community Antenna Television System", hereinafter referred to as "CATV System" or "System", means a system of coaxial cables or other electrical conductors and equipment used or to be used primarily to receive television or radio signals directly or indirectly off-the-air and transmit them to subscribers for a fee
- 2-7 "Annual Gross Operating Revenues" means any and all compensation and other consideration derived directly by Grantee from subscribers in the County for regularly furnished Basic CATV service, and shall not include revenues derived from per channel charges, per program charges, leased channel revenues, advertising revenues or taxes on services furnished by Grantee imposed directly on any subscriber or user by any town,

county, state or other governmental unit and collected by Grantee for such governmental unit.

- 2-8 FCC shall mean the Federal Communications Commission
- 2-9 Residential Subscriber (Subscriber) shall mean a purchaser in good standing of any service that a Grantee delivers to any Home provided that service is not utilized in connection with a business, trade or profession.
- 2-10 Home is any single family dwelling unit whether a house, apartment, trailer or rented room.
- 2-11 Local Government Occupied Buildings are those buildings owned in whole or in part by Prince Edward County, Virginia or occupied in whole or part by County officials in furtherance of County government objectives and shall include without limiting the generality of the foregoing all volunteer fire and/or rescue companies located within the County.
- 2-12 Signals shall mean and refer to all frequencies provided by or permitted to be inserted by a Grantee on the System operated by such Grantee.
- 2-13 Streets shall mean all public streets, alleys, public rights of way now laid out or dedicated within the County.
- 2-14 1992 Cable Act is the Cable Television Consumer Protection & Competition Act of 1992 amending the Communications Act of 1934 (the "1992 Cable Act").

granted by the County to Grantee the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways, and public places now laid out or dedicated, and all extensions, thereof, and additions thereto in the County, on poles, wires, cable, underground conduits, manholes, and other television conductors and fixtures, and to use poles, wires, cables and other facilities of persons, providing consent is obtained from such persons, necessary for the maintenance and operation in the County a community television system for the interception, sale and distribution of television and radio signals.

- Non-exclusive Grant. The right to use and occupy said streets, alleys, public ways and places, or the facilities of other places for the purposes herein set forth shall be non-exclusive, and the County reserves the right to grant a similar use of said streets, alleys, public ways and places, to any person at any time during the period of the Franchise.
- 3-2 No franchise granted hereunder shall limit Grantee to serving only one portion of the

County, it being the intent of this Ordinance to allow Grantee to construct, operate and maintain a CATV System to all unserved portions of the County to which they desire to extend such service, subject only to the requirements of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. RATES. The County specifically retains all rights to regulate the rates for the provision of cable service subject to the provisions of relevant Federal and State legislation.

SECTION 5. COMPANY LIABILITY - INDEMNIFICATION. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between Grantee and the County that Grantee shall, and does by its acceptance of this Ordinance specifically agree to save the County harmless from all losses sustained by the County on account of any suit, judgement, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from the granting of this Franchise. The above shall include, but shall not be limited to damages arising out of copyright infringement and all other damages arising out of the installation, operation or maintenance of the CATV System authorized herein, whether or not any act or omission complained of is authorized, allowed, or prohibited by this Franchise.

- 5-1 Grantee, by its acceptance of this Ordinance, specifically agrees that it shall maintain throughout the term of its Franchise, liability insurance, insuring the County and the Grantee against all claims or damages in the minimum amounts of at least:
 - (1) \$1,000,000 for bodily injury or death to any one person, and \$1,000,000 for bodily injury or death resulting from any one accident.
 - (2) \$1,000,000 for property damages resulting from any one accident.
 - (3) All of the foregoing insurance contracts shall be issued and maintained by companies authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Virginia and acceptable to the County and said contracts shall provide for thirty (30) days written notice of any cancellation to both the County and the Grantee herein.

SECTION 6. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS AND ORDINANCES. Grantee shall, at all times during the life of its Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercises of the police power by the County and to such reasonable regulation as the County, State or Federal Government shall hereafter provide. Any lawful modification resulting from amendment of Cable Operational Rules and Technical Standards Part 76 of the Rules and Regulations of the FCC shall be incorporated into this Ordinance on the date such modifications become obligatory under federal regulations, or in the event no obligatory date is established, within

one year of adoption, or at the time of the renewal of the terms of its Franchise, which ever occurs first.

SECTION 7. TERRITORIAL AREA INVOLVED. This Ordinance relates to the present unincorporated areas of the County.

- 7-1 Except as provided in Section 7-2 of this Ordinance, Grantee shall provide service to all Persons requesting such within the County, contiguous to Grantee's existing System, as long as it is economically feasible to do so. As used herein "economically feasible" shall mean that there are at least 28 occupied homes per linear mile and shall be based upon a measurement taken from the outermost extremity of the potential extension area back through and measured along the shortest path of available streets, alleys, public right of ways and public places now laid out or dedicated for such, inclusive of limited access and private easements.
- Grantee shall be entitle to recover from each Person desiring to become a Subscriber, whose home is contiguous to Grantee's existing System, in those instances where the economically feasible requirements of Section 7-1 of this Ordinance are not met, the direct, total cost of that portion of combined trunk and feeder line extension which exceeds one hundred fifty feet and shall be based upon a measurement taken from the outermost extremity of the line extension area back through and measured along the shortest path of available streets, alleys, public ways and public places now laid out or dedicated for such, inclusive of all limited access and private easements, and including any existing System contiguous thereto from which an extension can be made. Each Person along the extension area shall share on a pro-rata footage basis the direct total cost of constructing the line extension pursuant to the following payment plan: 1/3 thereof to be paid prior to Grantee's ordering all required line extension materials, 1/3 thereof to be paid upon delivery of all required line extension materials and prior to Grantee's commencing construction of the line extension and the final 1/3 thereof to be paid prior to Grantee's connecting each person to the System as a Residential Subscriber. Each Person not initially contributing to the direct total cost of the line extension pursuant to the payment plan specified in this section or in the instance of each additional home constructed and occupied along the line extension or in the instance of a home in existence and not occupied at the time of construction of the line extension, shall prior to Grantee's connecting such Person to Grantee's System as a Residential Subscriber reimburse each Person who made the initial payment pursuant to the payment plan

specified in this section on a pro-rata footage basis.

- 7-3 Each person contributing toward the direct total cost of the line extension agrees to waive all ownership interest in the line extension. All equipment and components of the line extension, including but not limited to cable wire, electronics and pedestals shall at all times remain the exclusive property of the Grantee.
- 7-4 Grantee shall install a CATV service drop line to Residential Subscribers of a home requesting such. The cost of the service line installation will be at the rate specified in Grantee's prevailing schedule of Installation Charges.

SECTION 8. APPLICATION TO FCC. Grantee shall, within sixty (60) days from the date of the acceptance of its Franchise, make proper application to the FCC for all permits, licenses or approvals required by law for the construction and operation of a CATV System and shall promptly and diligently pursue the granting of all applicable FCC permits.

SECTION 9. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SYSTEM. Grantee shall operate its Cable System as required by the FCC's Rules and Regulations, including any and all minimum standards, and updates thereof, prescribed by the FCC pursuant to the provisions of Section 16 of the 1992 Cable Act (amending Section 624 (e) of the Communications Act of 1934), and, pending the FCC's adoption of the afore-referenced standards, shall ensure compliance with all provisions of FCC Rule Section 76.605 (Technical Standards), and any amendments thereto, throughout all parts of the County to which it provides service.

Grantee shall render efficient service, respond to Subscriber service problems and correct malfunctions as promptly as possible, and, under normal circumstances, shall respond immediately to service outages involving more than one Subscriber in a localized service area and shall respond to service outages involving an individual Subscriber only by the end of the business day next following receipt of notice of such outage, taking into consideration safety and force majeure circumstances.

Grantee shall maintain a local business office or agent which Subscribers may telephone during regular business hours without incurring added toll charges so that CATV maintenance service shall be promptly available. Grantee shall maintain an emergency maintenance phone available to all Subscribers on a toll-free basis.

Grantee shall comply with customer service standards established by the FCC pursuant to Section 8 of the "1992 Cable Act" (amending Section 632 of the Communications Act of 1934) upon adoption by the FCC of such standards.

SECTION 10. RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING
OPERATION. Grantee shall render its service in accordance with the rules and regulations as specified herein, in the

County now applicable to their operation, or such rules and regulations as may be hereafter promulgated by the County or by any public regulatory agency of the State of Virginia or the United States.

SECTION 11. COMPLIANCE WITH THE CABLE ACT AND THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION. Grantee and the County shall, at all times, comply in all material respects with the provisions of the "1992 Cable Act" and the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the FCC, as the same may be amended from time to time, with respect to the operation of the System. This obligation shall include adherence in all material aspects by Grantee to the Rules and Regulations of the FCC with respect to technical and engineering specifications involved in the construction of CATV systems and signal carriage therein and adherence in all material respects by the County with the obligations applicable to a "franchising authority" under the "1992 Cable Act". In order to inform the residents of the County as to the channel carriage and programming the System, Grantee will utilize local advertising.

SECTION 12. PROGRAM ALTERATION. All programs of broadcasting stations carried by Grantee shall be carried in their entirely as received, with announcements and advertisement and without additions.

SECTION 13. SERVICE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT OCCUPIED BUILDINGS AND COUNTY SCHOOLS AND PUBLIC SCHOOLS. Upon request from the County, Grantee shall install one (1) cable television service drop connecting one (1) television set for the reception of Basic Service, as such is currently and hereinafter defined, in each of the County's municipal owned buildings, fire department main building and rescue squad main building. Such installation and monthly service to one (1) television outlet shall be at no cost to the County, fire department and rescue squad. Installation of additional television sets will be billed to the County Administrator in accordance with Grantee's prevailing installation and monthly service charges or if custom work is required, at time and materials.

SECTION 14. EMERGENCY USE OF FACILITIES. In the case of any emergency or disaster, Grantee shall, upon request of the Board of Supervisors, make its facilities accessible to the County for use during such emergency or disaster period, provided such access is technically feasible, subject to such standards as the FCC may prescribe pursuant to Section 16 (b) of the 1992 Cable Act (amending Section 624 of the Communications Act of 1934 relating to emergency information).

SECTION 15. OTHER BUSINESS ACTIVITIES.

(a) Grantee hereunder shall not engage in the business of selling, repairing, or installing television receivers, radio receivers or accessories for such receivers within the County during the term of its Franchise. (b) This Ordinance authorizes only the operation of a CATV System as provided for herein, and does not take the place of any other franchise, license, or permit which might be required by Grantee.

SECTION 16. PROMULGATION OF RULES. Grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the proper operation of the CATV System, and to assure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its Subscribers. Provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not violate provisions hereof or the laws of the State of Virginia or of the United States.

SECTION 17. SAFETY REQUIREMENTS.

- (a) Grantee shall at all times employ ordinary care and shall install and maintain in use commonly accepted methods and devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damage, injuries, or nuisance to the public.
- (b) Grantee shall install and maintain its wires, cables, fixtures, and other equipment in accordance with the requirements of the National Electric Code, and in such manner that they will not interfere with any installation to the County or of a public utility serving the County.
- (c) All structures, and all lines, equipment and connections in, over, under and upon streets, sidewalks, alleys and public ways and places of the County, where ever situated or located, shall at all times be kept and maintained in a safe, suitable, substantial condition, and in good order and repair.

SECTION 18. CONDITIONS OF STREET OCCUPANCY.

- 18-1 <u>Use</u>. All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by grantee or used in other poles or facilities within the County shall be so located as to cause minimum interference with the proper use of streets, alleys and other public ways and places to cause minimum interference with the rights of reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of the said streets, alleys, or other public ways and places.
- 18-2 Restoration. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by the County Administrator or his duly appointed agent, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of

- any street or alley disturbed in as good conditions as before said work was commenced.
- Relocation. In the event that at any time during the period of Grantee's Franchise the State or County shall lawfully elect to alter, or change the grade of any street, alley or other public way, or to alter, change, or install public utilities, Grantee, upon reasonable notice by the State or County, shall remove, relay, and relocate its poles, wires, cables, and underground conduits, manholes and other fixtures at its own expense.
- Placement of Fixture. Grantee shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any gas, electric or telephone fixture, water hydrant, or water and sewer mains, and all such poles or other fixtures placed in any street or otherwise shall be placed within the dedicated easements for such and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets, alleys and public ways, all to be approved by the County Administrator, or his duly appointed agent of said County and in accordance with existing County policy.
- 18-5 Temporary Removal of Wire for Building Moving.
 Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the County, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and shall not exceed the actual costs of the Grantee. Grantee shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. Grantee shall be given no less than three (3) days advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.
- 18-6 Tree Trimming. Grantee shall have the authority to trim trees upon an overhanging street, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the County so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of the County and at Grantee's expense.

SECTION 19. PREFERENTIAL OR DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES PROHIBITED. Grantee shall not, as to rates, charges, service facilities, rules, regulations or in any other respect, make or grant any preference or advantage, provided nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale or charges for bulk billed multiple installations at the same time or within the same building, nor shall it be deemed to prohibit the Grantee from providing free basic service to County schools, or local government occupied buildings.

SECTION 20. REMOVAL OF FACILITIES UPON REQUEST. Upon termination of service to any subscriber, Grantee shall

promptly remove all its facilities and equipment from the premises of such Subscriber upon request of the Subscriber.

SECTION 21. COUNTY RIGHT IN FRANCHISE.

- 21-1 County Rules. The right is hereby reserved by the County to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained and existing applicable ordinances, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of the police power, provided that such regulations, by ordinance, or otherwise, shall be reasonable, and not in conflict with the rights herein granted and shall not be in conflict with the laws of the State of Virginia or of the United States.
- Use of System by County. The County shall have the right during the life of Grantee's Franchise to install and maintain free of charge upon the poles of Grantee any wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police or fire alarm system so long as such wires and pole fixtures do not interfere with the CATV operation of Grantee and are installed in accordance with the requirements of the National Electric Code.
- 21-3 Supervision and Inspection. The County shall have the right to supervise all construction or installation work performed subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and to make such inspections as it shall find necessary to insure compliance with governing ordinances.
- 21-4 Procedure after Expiration of Franchise. At the end of the Franchise term, the County shall have the right to determine whether Grantee shall continue to operate and maintain its System pending the decision of the County as to the granting of another Franchise for its future maintenance and operation of such System.

SECTION 22. PAYMENT TO THE COUNTY. Grantee shall pay to the County annually the amount equal to five percent (5%) as is currently allowable in Section 14 of the "1992 Cable Act", or such higher percentage as may be subsequently allowable under Section 14 or any other applicable statue, of the Annual Gross Operating Revenues during the year for the use of the streets and other facilities of the County in operation of the CATV System and for County supervision thereof. Such fee shall be paid not later than one hundred fifteen (115) days after the close of the Grantee's fiscal year.

SECTION 23. RECORDS AND REPORTS. The County shall have access during normal business hours to all of the Grantee's plans, contracts, and engineering, accounting, financial, statistical, customer and service records relating to the property and operation of Grantee and to all other records required to be kept hereunder; provided that nothing contained herein shall be construed to allow the County or any other person(s) access to any personally

identifiable information concerning any Subscriber.

- 23-1 Company Rules and Regulations. Grantee shall have the right to adopt reasonable rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business. Copies of such rules, regulations, terms and conditions adopted by the Grantee for the conduct of its business shall be available to Subscribers and to the County.
- 23-2 Gross Revenue. Grantee shall file an annual summary report showing gross revenue received by the Grantee from its operations with the County during the preceding year and such other information as the County shall request and such other properties and expenses related to the Grantee's services within the County.

SECTION 24. TERM OF FRANCHISE. The Franchise and rights granted hereunder shall take effect and be in force from and after the final passage thereof, as provided by law and upon filing of acceptance and all other instruments required herein by Grantee with the Board of Supervisors, and shall continue in force and effect for a term of fifteen (15) years.

SECTION 25. TRANSFER OF FRANCHISE. Grantee shall not sell or transfer its CATV System, nor transfer any rights under a Franchise to another person without prior written approval by the Board of Supervisors and such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. No sale or transfer shall thereafter be effective until the vendee, assignee or lessee has filed in the office of the County Administrator an instrument, duly executed, reciting the fact of such sale, assignment or lease.

SECTION 26. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 27. PENALTIES. Any violation by Grantee, its vendee, lessee or successor, of the provisions of this Franchise or any material portions thereof, or the failure promptly to perform any of the provisions thereof, shall be cause for the forfeiture of this Franchise and all rights hereunder to the County after written notice to Grantee and continuation of such violation, failure or default.

SECTION 28. SIGNAL QUALITY REQUIREMENTS; SERVICE TO BE PROVIDED.

- (1) Grantee shall engineer, install, maintain, operate and equip the System herein provided so as to meet the technical standard of the FCC and the 1992 Cable Act.
- (2) The signals distributed by Grantee shall be the best possible signals available under the

circumstances existing at the time and shall provide the best possible quality reception to each Subscriber.

- (3) Grantee shall demonstrate by instruments and otherwise to the Board of Supervisors that a signal of adequate strength and quality is being delivered.
- (4) The following channels shall be available ' through the Community Antenna Television System, subject to the provisions of Section 4 and Section 5 of the 1992 Cable Act and any subsequent enactment governing channel carriage:

SECTION 29. FRANCHISE REVOCATION.

Whenever Grantee shall refuse, neglect or (a) willfully fail to construct, operate or maintain its cable television system or to provide service to its Subscribers in substantial accordance with the terms of this Ordinance and

any agreement representing the grant of a Franchise, or any applicable rule or regulation, or materially breaches its Franchise Agreement, or practices any fraud or deceit upon the County or its Subscribers within the County or if such Franchisee becomes insolvent, as adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction, or is unwilling or unable to pay its uncontested debts, or is adjudged bankrupt, or seeks relief under the bankruptcy laws, then the Franchise may be revoked.

(b) In the event the County believes that grounds for revocation exist or have existed, it will notify Grantee in writing, setting forth the facts on which such belief is grounded. If, within thirty (30) days following such written notification, the Grantee has not furnished reasonably satisfactory evidence that corrective action has been taken or is being actively and expeditiously pursued, or that the alleged violations did not occur, or that the alleged violations, except those involving financial matters, were beyond Grantee's control, the County may call and give notice of a hearing to consider revocation of Grantee's Franchise. If the County, following such hearing, finds that grounds for revocation exist, it may thereupon by Ordinance duly adopted revoke for cause the Franchise granted to Grantee.

SECTION 30. NOTICE REQUIREMENTS FOR MATTERS AFFECTING EXISTING FRANCHISE. Every direction, notice or order to be served upon Grantee, shall be sent certified return receipt to the office designated by Grantee whose address shall be provided to the Board of Supervisors before the Grantee commences operation of his System. Every notice to be served upon the Board of Supervisors shall be delivered to the County Administrator's Office, 111 South Street, Courthouse Annex Building, Farmville, Virginia. The delivery of such notice shall be deemed to have been at the time of receipt.

SECTION 31. AMENDMENTS TO THIS ORDINANCE. At any time during the term of any Franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance, the County or Grantee may propose amendments to this Franchise Ordinance by giving written notice of such proposed amendments to all other parties directly affected by such proposals and the County and Grantee shall within a reasonable time after such notice negotiate in good faith to agree on a mutually satisfactory amendment.

SECTION 32. ACCEPTANCE OF FRANCHISE. No Franchise shall be deemed as granted pursuant to this Ordinance unless such grant be approved by a Resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors and within thirty (30) days after such approval the applicant therefore acknowledges, in a writing provided by the County, its acceptance of the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 33. FORCE MAJEURE. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary herein, neither the County nor any

Grantee shall be held liable for, or suffer any penalty or detriment for, any failure to comply with any provision of this Ordinance or any Franchise granted hereunder, if such failure to comply arises from any act of God or any other condition not within the reasonable control of such non-complying person.

WHEREAS, Franchisee and Franchise Authority have continued to follow and be bound by the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has requested the consent of the Franchise Authority for the renewal of the Franchise in accordance with the requirements of the Franchise and applicable law; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has represented that it will comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority believes that it is in the best interest of the community to approve the renewal of the Franchise granted to Franchisee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FRANCHISE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The Franchise Authority hereby approves and consents to the renewal for a term of ten years of the Franchise, all in accordance with the terms of the Franchise and applicable law and Franchisee shall comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise.

SECTION 2: The Franchise Authority confirms that the renewal term of the Franchise shall be for a term of fifteen (15) years deemed to have commenced on December 14, 2018 and ending on December 13, 2033.

SECTION 3: The Franchise Authority agrees that the pledge of, or grant of a security interest in, the Franchise to any lender(s) of Shenandoah Cable Television, LLC or its affiliates, for the purpose of securing indebtedness, shall not require the consent of Franchise Authority and is hereby authorized.



On January 24, 2019 the Board of Supervisors accepted the proposal from Blair Construction for the construction of the new building for Social Services and STEPS upon the acceptance of various value engineering proposals being accepted to arrive at a final price. The Properties Committee met with the Architect, General Contractor and the Electrical Subcontractor on January 30, 2019.

The Committee reviewed various Value Engineering (VE) proposals. The Committee recommends the following VE proposals be accepted for the new Social Services/STEPS building: Additional saving maybe available after further research and consultation with YAKATTACK.

- 1. Tempered glass vice bulletproof glass at transaction windows Savings = \$25,000 min.
- 2. Delete High Density Storage and thickened concrete Savings = \$56,000
- 3. Run power and phone overhead vice underground Savings = \$25,000
- 4. Change Emetco 22-gauge roof to 24-gauge VR-16 Architectural Panel & Nucor Classic Wall Panels Savings = \$115,000
- 5. Substitute untreated truss's etc. with sprinkler system for Fire treated Savings =\$50,000

TOTAL SAVINGS = \$271,000

The Committee recommends the following VE proposals be accepted for the STEPS CENTRE

- 1. Allow set screw steel fitting for all EMT regardless of size. Savings = \$2,400
- 2. Allow MC cable throughout the building where allowed by code savings = \$7,500
- 3. Change cooper feeder wire to aluminum conductors savings = \$21,000
- 4. Install Fire Alarm cable in open air less conduit savings = \$5,500
- 5. Remove NETA testing and allow CEC to perform testing savings = \$7,000
- 6. Remove lighting relay panels, add occupancy sensors built into the fixtures on manufacturing floor, if YAKATTCAK approves—savings \$6,800

CRC Activities

- CRC was awarded an Economic Development Administration (EDA) Grant to develop a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). A CEDS Committee was appointed and is currently developing the CEDS with the assistance of CRC staff and the Berkley Group.
- Beginning July 1st the CRC began providing Grant Writing at no charge to member localities as well as non-profits (501c3's) located within the localities.
- CRC was contracted by the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to collect, provide local review
 and submit the CRC region's data for the development of the DEQ Chesapeake Bay Watershed
 Implementation Plan, Phase III.
- CRC submitted Regional Top Priority Census Tracts for consideration of Opportunity Zone Designations.
- CRC assisted the Town of Drakes Branch in procuring an engineer to develop the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) funded Downtown Flood Study. The CRC is also assisting the Town in overseeing the finalization of the Study.
- CRC is assisting member counties in developing County Debris Management Plans.
- CRC is assisting member counties in developing Memorandum's of Understanding for disaster assistance.
- CRC is administering the Virginia Department of Health funded Town of Phenix Water System Improvement Project.
- CRC is administering the Virginia Department of Transportation funded Charlotte Court House Evergreen Road Sidewalk Project.
- CRC is administering the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development funded Town of Dillwyn Housing Rehabilitation Project.
- CRC is assisting with the Joint Lunenburg/Kenbridge/Victoria Comprehensive Plan Update.
- CRC is assisting with the Keysville Comprehensive Plan Update.
- CRC hosted regional FOIA training for member locality's staff.
- CRC provides funding source information to member county schools.



CRC CEDS Update

Work on the Commonwealth Regional Council's (CRC) new Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the five CRC member counties is progressing, and still on track for completion in March 2019. The project is being funded by a grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA), with the CRC providing in-kind as a match.

Todd Gordon, Director of Planning with the Bridgewater-based Berkley Group (the consultant working with the CRC and the CEDS during this process-pictured above), gave a presentation on the project's status during the December 19, 2018 CRC Monthly Council Meeting. The CEDS Committee identified Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats for the region. The consultant, using that information plus demographic, workforce, and other data they and their partners compiled, have developed a draft vision statement and strategic goals that will be part of the CEDS. The next steps are to finalize the draft report and submit it to the CEDS Committee and public for review.

The CEDS, once completed, will identify locally-grown strategies to guide regional economic development, encourage partnerships and collaboration, and improve economic outcomes and overall quality of life in the region. The CEDS is a prerequisite for federal designation as an Economic Development District through the EDA and must be updated at least once every five years.

The CEDS, once completed and approved by EDA, will make covered localities eligible for EDA grants that could fund a wide variety of infrastructure and technical assistance projects. Additionally, once the CEDS is approved, the CRC can pursue designation from the EDA as an Economic Development District.

CRC Wrapping UP Work on Phase III of Chesapeake Bay WIP

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) has been working alongside the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to assist with Phase 3 of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP). The CRC was tasked with making revisions to the regional urban input deck; along with a list of programmatic actions to supplement Best Management Practices (BMPs) included in the input deck.

The CRC convened meetings on July 23, 2018, August 30, 2018, October 22, 2018 and December 11, 2018 to engage local officials, stakeholders and citizens in the WIP process. The CRC also attended a joint meeting with the DEQ and Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) on December 6, 2018 in Remington, Virginia. This meeting was scheduled by DEQ to present all final revisions/comments to the regional urban and agriculture input decks.

The CRC has worked to compile accurate and corresponding data for the BMPs on the ground in the region—the compilation of this data served as the final revisions to the regional urban input deck for the CRC. In addition to the work done to collect all BMPs implemented in the region, the CRC worked to compile a list of programmatic actions that were also submitted to DEQ in the final input deck. All final deliverables have been met in the contract with DEQ, and the CRC is currently in discussions for a contract extension with DEQ to assist in the final implementation of the WIP before the submission to the EPA on August 9, 2019. The draft WIP is to be made available to planning district commissions on April 12, 2019, with the final WIP being submitted to the EPA on August 9, 2019.

CRC Awarded SHSP Grant for Additional Emergency Planning

On August 31, 2018, Governor Ralph Northam announced Homeland Security Grant awards for the 2018 application cycle. The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) was awarded \$19,475.00 for the development of a Volunteer, Donation Management and Coordination Plan for the CRC Region. The plan will help CRC member localities plan for and deal with any influx of volunteers and donations that come into the region as a result of a major disaster. The Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM) received more than 110 requests totaling \$8 for competitive grants in the 2018 grant cycle. The CRC's application was one of 48 statewide that received funding totaling \$2.2 million.

In addition to the competitive grants, VDEM awarded a total of \$2.5 million in non-competitive grants for 30 projects. That included an award of \$70,000 to Lunenburg County for supporting the regional radio cache team. Lunenburg is one (1) of five (5) radio cache teams strategically located across the State.

CRC Staff Attends VDOT Local Programs Workshop

Funding Programs, Project Issues Discussed

On September 18, 19, and 20, 2018, Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) staff attended the sixth annual VDOT Local Assistance Workshop. This workshop focuses on providing an overview of local programs and training for program management and project development. The Workshop is meant to bring together local government, VDOT, and private sector staff to discuss delivery of the local transportation program.

The workshop included plenary sessions at the beginning and end, plus breakout sessions throughout the three days. Plenary session speakers included Stephen Birch, Commissioner of Highways, VDOT; Jessie Yung, Virginia Division Administrator, Federal Highway Administration; and Catherine McGhee, Director of the Virginia Transportation Research Council. During the Plenary Sessions, speakers provided an update on efforts to ensure localities have the tools to effectively deliver transportation projects and efforts to provide innovative transportation solutions in Virginia.

CRC staff was able to attend a number of sessions.

Some important points that came out of the breakout sessions include:

VDOT staff stressed the importance of utilizing the Locally Administered Projects (LAP)-tool for projects, while coordinating with VDOT. VDOT staff advised, repeatedly, that the LAP-MAP would be useful in project development, delivery, close out and audits.

Secondly, VDOT staff focused on the importance of partnering for successful local projects. Staff highlighted current initiatives at both the State and Federal levels regarding the Local Program. Stephen Birch, VDOT Commissioner of Highways, spoke extensively about the Local Program and the efforts to ensure that locals had the necessary tools needed to effectively deliver transportation projects.

The dates and location for next year's workshop will be announced at a later date.

CRC Grant Writing Update

STEPS Receives VHDA Grant

The CRC would like to congratulate STEPS, Inc., which learned on December 7, 2018 that the Virginia Housing Development Authority (VHDA) awarded them a grant of \$20,000 to fund the development of an Affordable Housing Strategic Plan for Prince Edward County. The CRC assisted with the application, which was submitted on November 6, 2018. The Plan will help Prince Edward County address affordable housing, which was identified as a need in the County's Comprehensive Plan (the area is experiencing a shortage of affordable housing). The study area will include the County and the Town of Farmville. It will target those in need of affordable housing, including: first-time homeowners, the young workforce, lower income citizens, citizens with disabilities and the elderly. STEPS will work with a consultant and the Affordable Housing Coalition, which was formed to explore housing needs and consists of various stakeholders (Prince Edward County, Town of Farmville, Centra Southside Community Hospital, Farmville Area Habitat for Humanity, Prince Edward County Schools, FUQUA School, Longwood University, and Hampden-Sydney College) in the development of this study. The CRC will administer the project.

CRC Assists Local Departments with RSAF Grant Applications

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) assisted with two (2) applications for the most recent round of the Rescue Squad Assistance Fund (RSAF), which closed on September 15. The CRC assisted with the following applications:

- Drakes Branch Volunteer Fire Department (DBVFD, Charlotte County), for funding to purchase extrication equipment.
- Prince Edward County Rescue Squad, for funding to purchase a new ambulance.

In January, the CRC learned that the DBVFD was awarded \$17,534.48 through the program.

The RSAF, administered by the Virginia Department of Health, provides funding to non-profit EMS agencies and organizations in Virginia. Eligible items include EMS equipment and vehicles, computers, EMS management programs, courses/classes and projects benefiting the recruitment and retention of EMS members. The CRC would like to congratulate the DBVFD on their award.

CRC Assists Victoria Fire & Rescue with AFG application

The most recent round of DHS/FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) applications was a little earlier this year than in recent years, with the application period running from September 24 to October 6, 2018. Since 2001, AFG has helped firefighters and other first responders obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training, and other resources needed to protect the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards.

For the most recent round, Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) staff assisted Victoria Fire & Rescue (VFR) in Lunenburg County with an AFG application for funds to purchase new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) and related gear. The CRC would like to wish VFR luck with its application.

CRC Assists WBWF with grant applications for educational outreach

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) assisted the Ward Burton Wildlife Foundation (WBWF) with three (3) grant applications to help cover costs for expanding its Educational Outreach program. The CRC assisted with applications to the Coca-Cola Foundation to cover material costs, and the Virginia Environmental Endowment and S.C. Johnson to help cover program costs.

For many years, the Foundation has had an educational outreach program to teach youth about the importance of our natural resources. The outreach consisted of classroom visits to local schools by Ward Burton, former NASCAR driver and winner of the 2002 Daytona 500, inviting youth to The Cove (a 2,500-acre preserve owned by the WBWF and located near Clover, VA), and providing them with outdoor experiences such as hunting, camping, shooting, and fishing. The Foundation is looking to expand that outreach so they can take the program directly to all public schools in Virginia's Region 8 – which includes all five counties in the CRC Region. The WBWF is also partnering with Virginia State Parks to provide hands-on learning experiences at the parks.

The CRC would like to wish the Foundation luck with its outstanding grant requests.

CRC Assists Lunenburg County with BTF Application

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) assisted Lunenburg County and Lunenburg County Public Schools in applying for a Baseball Tomorrow Fund (BTF) Grant. The BTF is a joint initiative between Major League Baseball (MLB) and the MLB Players Association. The fund awards grants to organizations involved in the operation of youth baseball and softball programs and facilities. The County is seeking funds from the BTF to assist in constructing new ball fields for both the softball and baseball programs, which would also benefit both the local Babe Ruth League and Dixie Youth programs. The application for the BTF grant was submitted on October 1, 2018, with funding announcements expected in the winter.

DHCD Funding Programs for Spring 2019

The Department of Housing and Community Development recently announced three (3) grants with deadlines in the spring of 2019:

Industrial Revitalization Fund (IRF): The program is targeted toward vacant non-residential structures whose poor condition creates physical and economic blight to the surrounding area in which the structure is located. Eligible properties shall include those formerly used for manufacturing, warehousing, mining, transportation and power production, as well as large-scale "white elephant" structures. The maximum level of funding for this grant is \$600,000, and requires at least a dollar-for-dollar match. No more than five percent (5%) local match will be accepted as in-kind or cash for out-of-pocket administrative costs. Applications are due by March 1, 2019. http://www.dhcd.virginia.gov/index.php/business-va-assistance/blighted-structures/industrial-revitalization-fund-irf.html

DHCD Commercial District Affiliates Grant (CDA): The program is designed to assist organizations and communities undertake downtown revitalization efforts. Eligible projects include non-profit organizational development, market studies, branding, design projects, entrepreneur support programs, economic vitality projects and other consultant projects that contribute to downtown neighborhoods. Award amounts do not exceed \$7,000, and requires no match unless a design project is pursued. Community Business Launch (CBL): The CBL is designed to assist communities in taking a systems approach to defining and pursuing an asset-based small business development strategy. The maximum CBL award for FY '20 is projected to be \$45,000. Local governments, non-profit economic development organizations, Main Street Associations and regional economic development groups are eligible to apply for this funding. There is a 25% match for single applicants. The match should consist of cash and in-kind support. Businesses must be open by September 30, 2020. VDH-ODW Releases Funding Solicitation for Water System Improvements

The Virginia Department of Health-Office of Drinking Water (VDH-ODW) has released updated information on the upcoming round of grant/loan funding. A number of localities in Planning District 14 have used VDH-ODW funds in recent years for planning and/or construction activities to repair and improve their public water systems.

Typically, there are two different pots of funding – the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Program, which provides funding (usually loans) for larger construction projects such as water distribution system repair and replacement; and the Water Supply Assistance Grant Fund (WSAG), which provides grants for smaller construction projects such as construction/upgrade of wells and storage tanks and planning grants to develop preliminary plans and engineering documents for future construction funding applications. Applications are due by April 1 (can be postmarked), with a how-to-apply workshop webinar tentatively scheduled for February 20, 2019.

CRC Project Update

Emergency Planning Activities Moving Ahead

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) is moving closer to completion of activities related to its State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) grant that was awarded in 2017. The grant is funding the development of FEMA-approved debris management plans and Memorandums of Understanding for disaster assistance for the localities in the CRC Region. Draft Debris Management Plans has been developed for Amelia, Buckingham, and Charlotte Counties, and data collection has begun on draft Plans for Lunenburg and Prince Edward Counties. Working with one of the local County Attorneys, CRC staff has developed a draft MOU that is being reviewed by the other localities. The CRC has until March 31, 2019 to complete the scope of the current grant.


Dillwyn Housing Project: Bids for First Set of Houses

The Town of Dillwyn's Housing Rehab project is now moving along, with the first two (2) houses bid out in December (bids were opened on December 17, 2018) and construction on those houses expected to begin in January or February 2019. The CRC is assisting the Town with this project, which is funded by a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) through the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). In addition to these two houses, four (4) others are slated for rehab or substantial reconstruction and one (1) vacant house will be demolished. The hope is that the Rehab Specialist hired by the Town, Roanoke-based Southeast Rural Communication Action Project (RCAP), will be able to begin work write-ups for the next group of houses in the Spring.

Drakes Branch Flood Protection Study Near Completion

The Town of Drakes Branch Downtown Area Flood Study is set for completion in January. The study, funded by the Department of Conservation and Recreation, is intended to further refine the flood area and identify solutions to flooding issues in the downtown area, which were identified as a need during the planning phase of the Town's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Downtown Revitalization project. Richmond area-based A. Morton Thomas and Associates has been hired to conduct the study. Tasks involved include hydraulic and hydrologic modeling and survey of the study area, a conceptual plan for improvements and funding scenarios, and a revised flood plain map. The consultant and CRC presented findings and a draft report to the public at a Community Meeting in October – just days after Hurricane Michael came through the area, causing major flooding in Drakes Branch and other parts of the region.

Related to Hurricane Michael, on December 18, 2018, the President approved a federal disaster declaration for the event covering multiple localities in Virginia – including Amelia, Charlotte, Lunenburg, and Prince Ed-



ward Counties. As a result, localities covered under the declaration are eligible for FEMA Public Assistance and other funding to help recover from damages related to Michael. Anyone needing assistance related to Michael should contact Gene Stewart (540 -383-5126) or Lucy Carter Smith (804-922-0454) with The Virginia Department of Emergency Management, Region 3.

Work Progressing on Local Comprehensive Plans

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) is working on two local Comprehensive Plans:

Lunenburg/Kenbridge/Victoria Joint Comp Plan Update: The CRC is continuing to assist Luneburg County and the Towns of Kenbridge and Victoria with an update of their Joint Comprehensive Plan. The draft Plan was reviewed by the Joint Working Committee in December 2018 and January 2019, and CRC staff is working with the Committee on some final revisions to complete the document. Adoption of the Plan is expected to occur in the late Winter or early Spring.

Keysville Comp Plan Update: The CRC is working with the Town of Keysville on an update of its Comprehensive Plan. The first part of this process was a Community Meeting, held on November 15, 2018 at the Keysville Fire Department to gather citizen input on issues of importance to the Town. Building on the input received from that meeting, CRC staff is now working with the Town's Planning Commission to develop a survey for receiving additional input. The Plan Update for Keysville is expected to be complete in the Spring of 2020.

- The Honorable Arthur Townsend of Victoria (Lunenburg County Sheriff), appointed to the Virginia State Crime Commission.



PDCs/RCs were formally created by the General Assembly in 1968 through the Virginia Area Development Act (VADA), in response to a growing recognition that growth and infrastructure problems often transcend local boundaries. PDCs/RCs were intended to encourage and facilitate local government cooperation in addressing problems and opportunities that are greater than any one locality. VADA was superseded by the Regional Cooperation Act of 1995, which made some changes to the Regional Planning Process.

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Dear Member,

Southside Electric Cooperative (SEC) has contracted with **Townsend Tree Service** to conduct right-of-way maintenance along the Cooperative's more than 7,400 miles of overhead line. Townsend contractors will be trimming trees, clearing brush and removing hazard trees, which may cause damage to SEC's electrical grid and interrupt service to our members. As a courtesy, we wish to inform you that this work will be performed in your area over the next several weeks.

Representatives from Townsend Tree Service, Davey Resource Group and SEC will be working together to identify trees that have the potential to interfere with co-op infrastructure if left unchecked. Right-of-way maintenance practices will be conducted in accordance with American National Standards Institute's (ANSI) A300 standards and techniques, as approved by the International Society of Arboriculture. ANSI A300 standards require lateral pruning, which is healthier for trees and promotes growth away from electrical lines.

Trimming is not performed for aesthetics, rather, it is conducted with line clearance and tree health in mind. Some trimming styles may include the 'V' Trim, 'L' Trim and Side Trim, or a combination thereof. Minimum trimming clearances are twenty (20) feet horizontally and fifteen (15) feet vertically to any tree, limb, or branch.


Hazard tree removal will also be performed to eliminate dead, decayed, diseased and otherwise hazardous (leaning, unstable, etc.) trees that pose a threat to SEC lines and poles.

By adhering to these industry standards, SEC can achieve the line clearances described in its current Terms and Conditions, allowing us to increase and maintain reliability, safety and accessibility of the electrical grid.



- Holly Mitchell, General Manager of the new project Dominion Public Market came for a cannery tour. This mixed-use market and kitchen will be hosting workshops and other events.
