

Summary: "Recognitions" is an opportunity for the Board of Supervisors to recognize achievements in our community, with a focus on the accomplishments of the students at the Prince Edward County Public Schools and Fuqua School, and our employees and our citizens volunteers who serve the County of Prince Edward.

- A. The Fuqua School National Geographic Geography Bee is held each year for 5th through 8th graders. This year, the Geography Bee was held in early January. Joshua Milligan, a 7th grader at Fuqua School, was the winner. Joshua has moved on to compete in the National Geographic Regional Bee through an online assessment. We are anxiously awaiting the results.
- B. The Fuqua School Scripps Spelling Bee is held each year for students in grades 4th-8th. The Spelling Bee was held this year on January 31. Elena Salamo, a 4th grader at Fuqua School, was the Fuqua School Spelling Bee winner. Elena moved onto the Scripps Regional Spelling Bee at The Waldorf School in Richmond on February 3rd. (Results to follow)
- C. Makayla Morris was awarded a State Championship Ring for winning the High Jump at the Virginia High School Outdoor Track and Field Championships held at East Rockingham High School last spring. This is Makayla's fourth State Championship in the High Jump. Makayla is a senior this year and will participate in Indoor Track and Outdoor Track this winter and spring. Hopefully Makayla will finish her career with a full hand of Championship Rings!
- D. For nearly ten years, the PECES art classes have been invited by the Moton Museum Director of Education (PE graduate Cainan Townsend) to help decorate the museum for the holidays. Beginning with the Community Holiday Social on Monday, December 9th, art work by Mrs. Utzinger's and Ms. Eamigh's art classes is being displayed on six six foot paper trees. Each year the decorations are based on a variety of themes: Winter holidays from around our country and world, Virginia Standards of Learning, and Seasonal themes. This year the art teachers and students are particularly excited about our tropical themed trees inspired by our PECES teachers from Jamaica and Trinidad.

In Re: Adoption of Board By-Laws

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, stated an amendment to the By-Laws is necessary to continue the rotation of the position of Chair and Vice-Chair, as follows:

Mr. Bartlett said because of the stipulation that a Board member shall have a minimum of one year service prior to election as Vice-Chairman and two years' service prior to election as Chair, requires the rearrangement of the schedule as adopted in January 2019. That schedule would have Supervisor Townsend (301) serving as Chair in 2020 with Supervisor Gilliam (501) serving as Vice-Chair. Supervisor Townsend meets the service criteria and per the policy he could be elected Chair, but Supervisor Gilliam has not served the minimum of one year to serve as Vice-Chair. It is proposed that District 501 be moved down the schedule and serve as Vice-Chair in 2022. This would elevate Supervisor Emert (601) to serve as Vice-Chair in 2020 and Chair in 2021 with Supervisor Pride (401) as Vice-Chair. While this proposal does not place Supervisor Gilliam (501) at the end of the list, it would allow each District to have its Supervisor serve as Chair in the eight-year rotation and meets the spirit of the rotational policy.

PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

(As amended January 2019)

I. ATTENDANCE AND ADJOURNMENT

All members shall make a reasonable effort to attend meetings of the Board. If unable to attend, a member shall notify the Chairman or County Administrator.

A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and must be present to proceed to business. A smaller number of members may adjourn or send for absentees. Special meetings of the Board may be called in accordance with Section 15.2-1418 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour set by the Board for regular or special meetings. He shall immediately call the Board to order and determine if a quorum is present; if so, he shall have the minutes of the preceding meeting submitted. Any errors or omissions shall, upon motion and carried, then be corrected. The minutes, being found correct, shall be signed by the Chairman and Clerk and shall be the authentic record of the proceedings of the Board of Supervisors.

II. CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

Annually at the first meeting in January of the Board of Supervisors, the Board shall elect from its membership a Chairman and Vice-Chairman, each of whom shall serve a term for one year, expiring on December 31 of the year elected, or until their respective successors shall be elected. In the case of the absence of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall preside at the meeting; in the absence of both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, the members present shall choose one of its members as temporary Chairman.

The position of Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board shall be rotated annually among the Board members. The rotation process will commence with the most senior member, that is being the member from District 101 serving as Chairman and the member from District 201 serving as Vice Chairman. Seniority will be based on cumulative months/years of service on the Board of Supervisors, which need not be consecutive. In keeping with this policy, the selected Vice Chairman will be elevated the following year to serve as Chairman. Upon completion of serving a term as Chairman that district's Board member would move to the end of the rotation list. A Board member shall have a minimum of one year of service on the Board prior to election as the Vice-Chairman and two years of service prior to election as the Chairman. Should a member of the Board decline to seek the nomination as Chairman or Vice Chairman, that district's Board member would move to the end of the rotation list of seniority and the rotation would proceed to the next higher district number. If a tie shall occur in the seniority of Board members, the Board member from the lower numbered district shall succeed as Vice Chair/Chair first.

Commencing with the organizational meeting held on January of 2016, the following would be the rotation based upon the members in office as of January 2016:

The day, time, and place of regular board meetings shall be determined at the January meeting.

If a Board of Supervisors meeting is cancelled due to inclement weather, the meeting will be held on the following Thursday, unless a holiday, in which case the meeting would be held on the following Tuesday. Pursuant to Virginia Code 15.2-1516, all hearings

and other matters previously advertised shall be conducted at the continued meeting and no further advertisement is required.

III. CLERK

The County Administrator shall serve as Clerk to the Board.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board shall be duly drawn by the Clerk and shall be submitted for approval at the next regular monthly meeting following their draft.

The Clerk shall appoint a deputy as recording secretary if required or needed by the Board.

IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

After the call to order the Board shall proceed to the agenda. The normal order of the agenda shall be as below, except at the January organizational meeting and as subject to rearrangement by the Chairman, absent objection by the Board. At the organizational meeting in January, the first order of business shall be the election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman and approval of the Board's operating procedures.

V. PREPARATION OF AGENDA

The County Administrator shall see that the preparation and printing of Board papers, ordinances, resolutions, petitions, and other applicable documents, be completed within such time that members of the Board may receive the documents at least 72 hours before the meeting of the Board.

The County Administrator shall close the upcoming Agenda on the Wednesday prior to the meeting of the Board. Any item submitted after this deadline will not be considered for action unless recommended by the County Administrator.

VI. CONSENT AGENDA

The Chairman and County Administrator shall style routine, non-controversial matters requiring Board action on a Consent Agenda. Items may be removed from the Consent Agenda and place on the Regular Agenda on recorded vote by a majority of the

Board members present. Only one motion is necessary to adopt all recommendations and action items on the Consent Agenda.

There shall be no debate or discussion by any member of the Board or the public regarding any item on the Consent Agenda, beyond asking questions for simple clarification.

VII. CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum. When two or more members speak at the same time, the Chairman shall name the person who shall speak first.

A motion or proposition shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Chairman or any member. Any motion or proposition may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or other action of the Board upon it, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Board. Otherwise, meetings shall be conducted in accordance to <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u>, <u>Newly Revised</u> (Procedures for Small Boards).

VIII. TAKING THE VOTE

When a motion in order is made, a second shall be required. The Chairman shall then state the exact motion and indicate that it is open to debate. After the motion has been debated, the Chairman shall put the question in the following forms: "As many as agree that, etc. (as the question may be) let it be known by raising your right hand", and "Those opposed by the same sign."

According to the Constitution of Virginia, a majority of all elected members shall be necessary to adopt any ordinance or resolution appropriating money exceeding the sum of \$500.00, imposing taxes, or authorizing the borrowing of money. Otherwise, a resolution, ordinance, or other proposition shall be adopted by vote of the majority of Board members present and voting. A tie vote shall mean the defeat of the motion voted on.

A member may abstain and be entered in the minutes as present and abstaining.

The Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, Title 2.2, Chapter 31, (State & Local Government Conflict of Interest Act) shall control with respect to a member's participation and voting.

IX. RECONSIDERATION

After a question has been decided, it may be reconsidered on the motion of any member who voted with the prevailing side, provided the motion is made on the same day as the decision carried. All motions to reconsider shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting.

X. WITHDRAWAL OF EXHIBITS

Original papers, filed as exhibits with any ordinance or resolution, may be withdrawn by the patron or upon his order. In such case, he shall leave attested copies, and shall pay the Clerk for the cost of copying.

XI. MANUAL AND RULES

The rules of parliamentary practice in <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, except when they are inconsistent with the rules established by the Board.

The Rules of the Board shall be reviewed and adopted in January of each year. These Rules may subsequently be suspended or amended by a two-third vote of the entire Board. Upon a motion to suspend or amend, the mover shall be allowed two minutes to state the reasons for his motion, and one member opposed to the motions shall be allowed an equal time to object.

XII. APPOINTMENTS

All appointments of Board representatives to commissions, authorities, committees, etc. shall be made once the individual leaves the position or on expiration of his term, and not later than two meetings after the individual has left. The Board shall attempt to honor appointments from representative districts and shall not discriminate based on sex, age, handicap, race, or origin.

At the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees. The committees shall meet at the regular times and in conformity with the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. In selecting members of committees, the Chairman of the Board shall make nominations after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. The Board may amend the Chairman's nominations and shall confirm the assignments. Standing committees shall consider such matters as referred by the Board, and shall report at regular meetings of the Board.

If the Board votes not to have standing committees, it may act as a committee of the whole on matters normally referred to standing committees. However; the Chairman after consulting with the County Administrator, may appoint special (ad hoc) committees to carry out specific tasks. This shall be done after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. A special committee shall automatically cease to exist once it has completed its specific task.

XIII. PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Chairman may, at his discretion, set an appropriate and consistent time limit on all speakers at a public hearing. All speakers shall come forward and identify themselves by name and address before stating their position. If a public hearing becomes disruptive, the Chairman may adjourn or continue, in accordance with the Code of Virginia.

XIV. CLOSED SESSIONS

All discussions held in Closed Session as outlined in the Freedom of Information Act shall represent privileged information held by those involved. Release of such information by a Board member outside the session shall be considered a breach of these by-laws, and the member shall be subject to censure. Specific purpose of closed session shall be stated in accordance with Section 2.2-3711 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Upon return to regular session after a closed session, the County Attorney and/or Chairman shall state the nature of the closed session in as specific terms as appropriate.

In open session, a roll call vote shall be recorded in the minutes, certifying that only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements and only such business matters as were identified in the motion were discussed or considered. Any member of the public body who believes there was a departure from the requirements shall so state prior to the vote. The statement shall be recorded in the minutes.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED

PROCEDURE IN SMALL BOARDS

In a board meeting where there are not more than about a dozen members present, some of the formality that is necessary in a large assembly would hinder business. The rules governing such meetings are different from the rules that hold in other assemblies, in the following respects:

- --Members are not required to obtain the floor before making motions or speaking, which they can do while seated.
- --There is no limit to the number of times a member can speak to a question, and motions to close or limit debate generally should not be entertained.
 - --Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending.
- --Sometimes, when a proposal is perfectly clear to all present, a vote can be taken without a motion having been introduced. Unless agreed to by general consent, however, all proposed actions of a board must be approved by vote under the same rules as in other assemblies, except that a vote can be taken initially by a show of hands, which is often a better method in such meetings.
 - -- The chairman need not rise while putting questions to vote.
- --The chairman can speak in discussion without rising or leaving the chair; and, subject to rule or custom within the particular board (which should be uniformly followed regardless of how many members are present), he usually can make motions and usually votes on all questions.

EFFECT OF PERIODIC PARTIAL CHANGE IN BOARD MEMBERSHIP

In cases where a board is constituted so that a specific portion of it is chosen periodically (as, for example, where one third of the board is elected annually for three-year terms), it becomes, in effect, a new board each time such a group assumes board membership. Consequently, all unfinished business existing when the outgoing portion of the board vacates membership falls to the ground; and if the board is one that elects its own officers or appoints standing committees, it chooses new officers and committees as soon as the new board members have taken up their duties, just as if the entire board membership had changed. The individual replacement of persons who may occasionally vacate board membership at other times, however, does not have these effects.

In Re: Selection of Operating System: Committees or Committees-of-the-Whole

The Rules of the Board state that "at the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether

to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name,

composition, and function of each of the several committees." If the Board would vote not to have standing

committees, it may act as a "committee of the whole."

Mr. Bartlett stated if the Board chose to operate with standing committees, Chairman Townsend set

forth his recommendations for committee membership, as follows:

Library Committee: Supervisor Wilck (Chair), Supervisor Booth, Supervisor Pride Audit Committee: Supervisor Townsend, Supervisor Emert, Supervisor Gilliam

Fire/EMS Committee: Supervisor Gilliam, Supervisor Booth, Supervisor Townsend

Bus Committee (Ad Hoc): Supervisor Cooper-Jones (Chair), Supervisor Jones, Supervisor Wilck

PSAP Committee: Supervisor Jones (Chair), Supervisor Townsend

Supervisor Wilck suggested having only two members on the Audit Committee because the Board

doesn't have any oversight and "if you put three people on it, it opens up to a public situation and then you

lose the oversight you had." Mr. Bartlett stated that any committee meeting, even with only two members,

by regulation must be advertised and can be attended by the public unless it goes into closed session.

Chairman Townsend stated for the sake of transparency, it needs to have three members, and stated

he doesn't want hidden agendas; he said the Board can change that.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PUBLIC HEARINGS RULES OF PROCEDURE

- 1. Public Hearings the order of presentation shall be as follows, unless varied by the Chairman.
 - a. Staff report.
 - b. Applicant's presentation.
 - c. Comments, statements or presentations from members of the public.

The order of speakers will be:

- 1) Those in support of the matter,
- 2) Those with questions or concerns,
- 3) Those opposed,
- 4) Rebuttals (limited by the Chair as to number and time-see below).
- 5) Questions by the Board members of speakers.
- d. Additional rules:
 - The Chair can permit speaking out of the order in #c above as deemed necessary to enable the public to fully participate.
 - If able, speakers must stand at the lectern and address the Board.
 - All comments shall be directed to the members of the Board of Supervisors. Debate is prohibited. This includes debate among speakers or speakers/Board members/staff.
 - Presentation by the applicant and other speakers shall be limited to a time set by the Chairman.
 - Additional time, for any portion, may be granted at the discretion of the Chairman.
 - The Chair will set the number of minutes permitted for rebuttal and has the discretion to change the number.
 - The Chair has the authority to limit or decrease time for any portion of the public hearing due to the number of potential speakers, or repetition, or any other concern.

- Remarks shall be confined to the matter under discussion and shall be relevant.
- 2. Speakers arriving after the commencement of the hearing and/or who are not on the sign-up sheet will be recognized at the discretion of the Chairman.
- 3. Repetitive testimony is discouraged.
- 4. The Chairman shall have the authority to end a presentation that violates these rules or for other cause.
- 5. Following discussion of all matters considered in the public hearing, the Board members will consider one of three actions regarding each matter:
 - Approval (with conditions, as applicable);
 - Denial; or
 - Table for further review.
- 6. Once the public comment period has been closed, no further public input will be permitted unless clarification is requested by a Board member. The response shall address only those questions raised by the member.

Protocol for Public Participation

The Board of Supervisors sets aside twenty (20) minutes near the beginning of each regular board meeting for citizen comment.

This regular agenda item is termed "Public Participation." During this period, the Board receives comment from any citizen of Prince Edward County on any matter not scheduled for a public hearing.

This is an opportunity for citizens to speak and the Board to listen carefully to citizen expressions of concern and opinion.

Citizens may ask questions of the Board or individual Board members; however, Public Participation is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.

Citizens are expected to conduct research on topics prior to Board meetings and this forum provides citizens with an opportunity to inform elected officials of their findings and positions on matters of public interest and concern.

Citizens wishing to speak during Public Participation are asked to please sign the Public Participation register prior to the beginning of the meeting.

Citizens are respectfully requested to state their full name and address for the record.

The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.

Citizens shall speak for a maximum of five (5) minutes, unless more time is granted by the Chair.

In the event that more than four (4) speakers wish to be heard during citizen's time, the Chairman shall allocate the twenty (20) minutes among speakers in an equitable manner. An extension to the twenty (20) minute limit can be granted by the Chair.

Comments from citizens who are not residents of Prince Edward County will be entertained once all County residents are heard.

Signs, placards, posters or like material are not permitted in the Board Chamber, adjoining areas or County offices.

The Board asks that citizens remain seated during the meeting unless called upon to stand for recognition as a speaker, official duties, physical necessity, or to enter or leave the meeting.

The use of profane, vulgar, obscene or threatening speech is not permitted and can result in removal from the meeting.

Citizens are requested to turn off or deactivate the sound from all cell phones, pagers, or other electronic communication devices.

Protocol for Board of Supervisors Comments

- The Board of Supervisors sets aside ten (10) minutes near the beginning of each regular board meeting for each member of the Board of Supervisors to respond to comments made by citizens during "Public Participation," if he/she so desires.
- This is an opportunity for each individual member of the Board to express his/her own personal opinion in response to a citizen's concerns on matters of public interest.
- "Board of Supervisors Comments" is not designed to allow debate between Board members and citizens.
- The Chairman of the Board will establish the order of speakers and will maintain decorum.
- Each Board member shall be allotted an opportunity to speak for a maximum of one (1) minute; unless additional time is yielded by another member of the Board. In the event a Board member or members shall be absent, unallocated time shall not be allocated to Board members in attendance.
- Following each Board member's comment period, the remaining two (2) minutes shall be set aside for appropriate response, and shall be divided equally between those members of the Board wishing to respond, and as directed by the Chairman.

In Re: Recognitions

"Recognitions" is an opportunity for the Board of Supervisors to recognize achievements in our community, with a focus on the accomplishments of the students at the Prince Edward County Public Schools and Fuqua School, and our employees and our citizen volunteers who serve the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Townsend stated an employee of the County, Billy Coe, went above and beyond the call of duty on January 2, 2020. He said a call went out and Mr. Coe took his own boat to Rice Creek Road when he learned two brothers were in danger because of a boat overturning; one brother swam to shore, but the other brother could not swim. Mr. Coe took his boat which allowed the First Responders to rescue the victim; Mr. Coe also provided dry clothes to the victim for the First Responders to get the victim to the hospital.

Chairman Townsend then recognized Supervisor Wilck for his outstanding job as Chair during 2019. He said Supervisor Wilck is passionate about the initiative for the East Third Street Exchange, and it was made clear that Supervisor Wilck wants the best for the County.

In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Townsend stated Public Participation is a time set aside for citizens to share their thoughts, ideas and concerns. An official record is made of each person's contribution tonight and will be directed to the County Administrator for follow-up; any necessary follow-up will be noted and tracked.

Vicky Page, Leigh District, spoke as representative of the Friends of the Community Library; she invited the Board members to the Friends' Informational Breakfast on January 22 at 8:00 a.m., where they would be brought up to date with the new things that have happened at the library and will provide a tour. She then said the "Little Free Library Project" is working well; she said the first one was installed in November 2014 in Rice. She said a lot of books have gone through it and the unit is showing wear, and new larger units which have metal roofs have been approved. She said the unit at the Prospect site will be replaced next.

Lee Bidwell, Leigh District, stated she will not give her address as was directed at the December meeting on the Second Amendment Sanctuary proposal. She said she was disappointed and disheartened that the Board voted to defy the democratic process and go on record to obstruct any laws regarding gun control that might be passed with the Constitutionally dictated legislative process. She said she wanted to comment on the undemocratic way the special-called meeting was handled, and to offer suggestions on how to avoid problems in the future. She said that one of the most troubling aspects of the meeting is that speakers publicly give their address, "especially in front of 600 gun-toting, self-proclaimed sharpshooters." She said she read the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors Rules as amended, and urged that Rule 13, regarding speakers providing name and address, be amended. She said she understood that it is to prove the speaker lives in the county, but asked they be allowed to use some other fashion to prove residency. She said she felt her personal safety was at risk to be able to express her views as intimidation suppresses free speech. The Board needs to protect the rights of all citizens to speak without fear of repercussions.

Ms. Bidwell said that according to Robert's Rules of Order, after a motion is made, the Chair is to call for discussion but no call was made for discussion of the draft resolution. She said the alternate draft motion did have discussion and Supervisor Wilck called for discussion. She said much of the crowd seemed satisfied with the alternative until Supervisor Wilck pointed out that it did not specifically include [the words] "Sanctuary City" language. She said that with the motion he supported, he did not call for discussion and went straight to the vote, demonstrating clear bias and unwillingness to consider alternatives or amendments

to the proposal. She said it was clear that his mind, as well as those of the majority of the Board, was made up before the public hearing. She said the purpose of a public hearing is to listen to citizen input before making an informed decision. She said the Board needs to adopt policies, procedures and leadership behaviors that allow for civil, respectful public exchange of ideas and Board members must base their voting decisions on thoughtful, careful consideration of all constituents.

Ian Danielsen, Farmville District, stated while his comments are pointed and critical regarding the December 17 meeting, he holds Mr. Wilck in high esteem and good faith as he does all Board members and staff. He said he values the relationship and collaboration. He stated he is a citizen deeply concerned over the ways in which last December's public hearing regarding gun sanctuary was handled. He urged the Board to engage in heightened communication to ensure that in future meetings, the attendees' rights are not usurped. He said it was not accurate to be called a public hearing because so many who were in support of the resolution were allowed to disrupt and prevented opponents from freely speaking, the meeting turned instead into more of a one-sided rally. He said when his peer, Susan, attempted to give comment, she was so roundly and hostilely booed, jeered and shouted down, she respectfully requested that the time denied her be reinstated, but it was not afforded her. When the clock reached zero, she was again shouted down by the unruly crowd and she left abruptly in tears, essentially drummed out. He said he brought his nine-year-old son to see a civic hearing in action, his son was made so anxious he crawled into his lap and asked that they leave. He said as they left, a gentleman took him aside and apologized saying the crowd acted horribly. Another man followed him out of the school and said all the hate speech was constitutional. Mr. Danielsen said that is just an example of a tactic of intimidation was used to highjack the process and denied opponents of the measure of any real chance to speak.

Mr. Danielsen said the Board didn't maintain order among supporters of the resolution, and in one constituency's defense of their Second Amendment rights, they trampled on others' First Amendment rights. He said this is not a new strategy; this was planned, systematic and worst of all, permitted, and a case in point of "freedom for me, but not for thee."

Mr. Danielsen said Supervisor Wilck did apologize and but the apology didn't state what should have been done or what will be done in future. He said the integrity of future meetings will be assessed according to their ability and willingness to guarantee that all points of view will be heard without hostile interference. He said the meeting could have been suspended or ended when the meeting was clearly out of

order, or utilized the resource of the Sheriff's office to ensure order. He said given the systematic Sanctuary Circuit rides through the state this past fall, the Board should have expected this and asked that the Board, in the future, preplan actions for ensuring order, fairness and equality. He said citizens can expect the same from some of the constituencies, among many who feel the ends justified the means because the means weren't checked but were reinforced. He asked in what future settings will they use intimidation as a strategy to squelch viewpoints other than their own, such as future Board meetings or at voting precincts.

John Miller, Farmville District, expressed his thanks for the support of the Board for the Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad and thanked the Board for the investment through the EMS Levy. He said it provided a catalyst for other agencies and governmental authorities to invest in the Squad. He said an offer was made to fill the Executive Director position and that offer has been accepted. He said the Squad is aggressively pursuing grants, including one to replace the radio system. He said the current system is old and replacement parts are no longer made. He said the grant requires a 50/50 match and asked the Board to consider an amendment to include \$25,900 up-front "advance" to place an order for new radios by the end of February. He said the funds are not needed until July; this would allow the Squad to get the radios for half price. He said the radios (14) total cost is \$62,000; an entire system would be several million dollars

Ryan Taney, Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad President, thanked the Board for its support, stating the Board is instrumental in helping the Squad grow in the community and meet its needs. He said the Squad has overcome trying times and has succeeded in part thanks to the Board's guidance. He asked the Board to reach out with any questions or concerns.

Mr. Bartlett asked how long the Rescue Squad has to spend the grant funding. Mr. Miller said they have to have the funding match approval by the end of February and the PO order in to the State by June or July.

Chairman Townsend referred the request to the EMS Committee for their review and recommendation back to the Board.

Supervisor Jones asked if the February 11 [2020] meeting would allow enough time; following some discussion, Mr. Miller said that it would give enough time.

In Re: Board Comments

Supervisor Wilck stated that in regards to the [December 17] meeting, no one [else] sitting on this Board has any blame and accepted all the blame, but not as much as Ms. Bidwell suggested. He said he was overwhelmed, expecting only 350-400 people. He said that Ms. Bidwell told him that the only people that were asked their names were those opposed. He said the reason for that was that the list of everybody else that was signed up with their name and district, so there was no need to [ask]. He said the Board needs their names for the record and it is put into the minutes. He said when Ms. Bidwell made accusations that were not true, he did hang up. He apologized for other things, saying he tried to stop people talking over other speakers by banging the gavel and holding his hand up, but with 600 raucous people, he had little effect and isn't sure what he could have done. Supervisor Wilck said he wrote a letter to the Editor [of the Farmville Herald], but the publisher said it was too long and placed it in as a column. He said people stopped and thanked him for the way the meeting was handled; he said it was nobody's responsibility but his.

Supervisor Pride thanked the citizens for attending and welcomed Supervisor Booth.

Supervisor Gilliam asked the two citizens that spoke during Public Participation to contact him regarding their concerns, and to share his with them. He then welcomed Supervisor Booth.

Chairman Townsend thanked the citizens for attending and thanked the Board for their confidence in him as Chair. He said he will do the best he can for the Board and the citizens. He congratulated Sheriff Epps and Supervisor Booth; he asked the citizens to continue their support and voice concerns.

Supervisor Emert welcomed all to the meeting and welcomed Supervisor Booth and Sheriff Epps.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones congratulated Chairman Townsend, Vice-Chairman Emert, Supervisor Booth, and Sheriff Epps. She thanked the citizens for their participation. She then said the gun sanctuary meeting was a disgusting action regarding how it was handled. She said that in the newspaper, according to Mr. Wilck, "I asked Jerry Townsend and Pattie Cooper-Jones who sat near me and voted differently from the way I voted, if they thought I had handled the meeting fairly and they both responded 'yes.' That question was never asked of Pattie Cooper-Jones because Mr. Wilck did not speak to me, I heard him addressing Jerry Townsend, but that conversation never happened because I did not think the meeting was handled fairly." She said life goes on and the Board is here to serve the constituents and do what they need the Board to do to serve the citizens of Prince Edward County.

Supervisor Jones said he wished to reiterate the congratulations to all the new office-holders, and said that he hopes the Board learned from that public hearing because it did get out of control. He said in the future the Board can be better prepared for it.

Supervisor Booth said Happy New Year to all and thanked all for coming to the meeting.

Mr. Bob Timmons, Chair, reported Juvenile Court and their offices are moved in and the Clerk of the Court has been moved in. He said the construction on the sally-port, the entrance, the atrium and the Magistrates office area will be completed by the end of this month. He said the relocation should be complete by mid-February. He stated the final two phases are the Commonwealth Attorney's office which has the stud-walls erected and the General District Courtroom and office area will be started tomorrow. Those should be complete and occupied by mid-March. He said there is a meeting with the Properties Committee to review details; there is one more change order that is being worked on, and a total of change orders with all the properties will be less than \$50,000. He said the renovation is ahead of schedule and under budget.

In Re: Commonwealth Regional Council Dues Refund

Ms. Melody Foster, Executive Director of the Commonwealth Regional Council, presented a dues refund to Prince Edward County in the amount of \$4,830.60.

Ms. Foster explained that the Annual CRC Membership Dues Policy states that at the end of each fiscal year, if the CRC Audited Cash Fund Balance is in excess of \$500,000, the dollar amount over this amount will be divided and returned to the member counties.

The Board will need to decide if they want to accept the check or reinvest this amount with the CRC. If reinvested, it could be used to provide a match for any future grants that the CRC would administer for the County; if the refund is accepted, it will be placed into the General Fund's Fund Balance.

Mr. Bartlett recommended the Board accept the refund in order to keep a continuous even amount to be provided to the CRC.

Supervisor Pride made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Gilliam, to accept the refund of \$4,830.60 from the Commonwealth Regional Council; the motion carried:

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Scott D. Frederick, P.E., stated crews are busy with typical winter routine maintenance schedule; he said they are running the boom axe behind the guard rails and on the slopes and doing brushcutting. He said they are machining shoulders, adding stone in low spots; he said Darlington Heights Road, Five Forks Road, Singleton Road, Worsham Road, and Abilene Road will be next. He said potholes are being filled.

Mr. Frederick said work is being done on the Route 652, Harris Creek Road Bridge; there are a few loose ends they are tying up and are demobilizing the structure and bridge crew equipment, and starting to tie the roadway back in. He said it appears completion will be on February 1. He said the Operational Safety Improvement funds are being used for spot leveling near the landfill, and for radius improvements on Route 15, work at the school and on County Line Road at Route 15. He said those funds are usually about \$70,000; \$55,286 has been spent, \$15,308 remains. He said VDOT plans to use that funding for 18"-widenings on some inside-curve areas where traffic runs off the road, in the hopes to bring the crash rate down.

Mr. Frederick then requested a work session on the Six Year Plan. Following some discussion, it was determined the work session will be held Tuesday, February 11, 2020 at 5:00 p.m.

Mr. Frederick asked for road issues. He stated currently in line for review or work include the pond on Morris Creek and the spillway which is clogged again. He said they will look at the ditch on Singleton

Road; work needs to be done on a culvert on Spring Creek Road due to the road settling, and he is going to look for accident data regarding the turn-off at Route 460 and Rice's Depot Road for a Smart Scale project.

He said there is a possible sight distance issue on Harris Creek Road at the Dollar General.

Supervisor Pride asked about the speed study on Douglas Church Road. Mr. Frederick said it has been submitted; he said they do not allow convex mirrors as has been suggested for use.

Chairman Townsend said the bridge at Worsham Road over Briery Creek has potholes that would knock a vehicle out of alignment; it also has a weight limit issue.

Mr. Bartlett said citizens have called Supervisor Booth regarding Briarwood. The hydrology has changed due to the construction and during rain events, flooding occurs and the ditch needs to be reworked.

Supervisor Emert asked for a speed study on Peaks Road, and requested the 25mph limit be extended down to First Ridge.

Supervisor Jones asked about the work on Old Ridge Road. Mr. Frederick said he reviewed VDOT's report and sent it back for a second review.

Supervisor Gilliam asked the status of work on Green Bay Road, Route 696. He said there is a sight issue. Mr. Frederick said he will check into this issue.

In Re: Public Hearing – Amendments to the TransTech Alliance Regional Development Ordinance and Agreement

Chairman Townsend announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing prior to considering amendments to and the approval of the Transtech Alliance Regional Development Agreement. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, January 3, 2020 and Friday, January 10, 2020 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated that at its December meeting, the Board approved advertising a public hearing on proposed amendments to the TransTech Alliance Regional Development Agreement, which must be adopted by Ordinance. The Board of the TransTech Alliance, doing business as the Virginia Growth Alliance (VGA), has voted to amend both the Regional Development Agreement and the By-Laws.

Mr. Bartlett said the substantive change proposed in the Agreement can be found in Item 9 – Withdrawal of Membership. The existing agreement states that members can withdraw by merely giving a six-month's written notice to the other members. The proposed change requires the leaving Jurisdiction to

adopt a resolution of withdrawal and still requires a six-month written notice to the other members. Mr. Bartlett added that Section 15.2-1300 of the *Code of Virginia* requires joint agreements be approved by

ordinance.

Chairman Townsend opened the public hearing.

Paul Hoffman, Prospect District, stated his approval of the amendment. He said he wanted to speak

about Economic Development and the County's role in that. He said that like most citizens of Prince Edward

County, most of his worldly wealth is in real estate in Prince Edward County. He said he looks to the Board

of Supervisors to help protect the value of that property and therefore, the tax base which helps fund the

services. He said that is done through economic development, which is one of the few things done that a

return is expected. The challenge is if the County is not engaged in Community Development, funding just

the most basic of services means localities must raise [tax] rates on citizens. He said Prince Edward County

is fortunate currently and asked that the Board not neglect economic development.

Mr. Hoffman said the VGA allows the Board to partner with other communities, learn from them

and participate with them. He said the cost of participating in the VGA is about \$20,000, which is "a whiff"

in a \$23 million budget; he added the \$9 million on education, of which the principle purpose is to prepare

the student to enter the workforce. He said it would be nice to have jobs in Prince Edward County so that

after they're educated, they could stay here, buy property, contribute to the economy. He asked that the

Board invest in the County's future, and said if they don't invest, he fears for what the future may bring for

this County.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Townsend closed the public hearing.

EMS Tax

Mr. Bartlett stated the budget approved for the EMS fund was \$300,000. Of that amount \$255,000 was budgeted for Vehicles, \$8,920 for communication equipment and \$36,080 was to remain in the fund balance. As of January 7, 2020, a total of \$261,437 has been collected. This is 87% of the levy and is a normal collection rate, more will be collected as time goes on. There has been \$254,386 expended for one ambulance and \$8,919.14 on communication equipment. Mr. Bartlett said he is working with PEVRS to determine their long-term needs to include the paid director and ascertaining the help being provided by the partners – the Town of Farmville, Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney College. He presented an updated six-year summary of anticipated Revenues and Expenses.

Mr. Bartlett said the Town of Farmville is providing fuel and up to \$50,000 for labor and repairs for the ambulances.

Mrs. Broadwater said the Town is paying for the parts and labor. Mr. Bartlett asked if the ambulances are staying on the road better; Mr. Miller said all five are operational.

Mr. Bartlett said the plan is to immediately buy another ambulance this fiscal year with the total cost to be almost \$519,000; he said this will expend more than collected but that the County would front the money. He said the following year, the County would purchase another ambulance, giving them three ambulances. He said the projection is to buy an ambulance every other year; every 8-10 years one would be rotated out and replace it. He said this budgeting forecast will help build solid response units, but doesn't take into account what improvements the new director will make. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said no action is needed. He asked that the EMS make sure the new radios will fit into the new system just installed in the Sheriff's office.

Update on Revenues

Mr. Bartlett presented an update on the Revenues. He stated the County revenues are extremely strong in almost every category. He said one of the best is the local sales tax; if it continues at the rate is has been, the County will be about \$200,000 over the budgeted amount and would be the highest amount ever collected in sales tax. He said the Public Service Corporation, which are utilities, and are assessed by the State Corporation Commission and that amount is never seen until they tell us what it is. This jumped up about \$79,000 greater than what was budgeted. He said the Treasurer's office is doing a great job on

collecting the Personal Property tax and the DMV Stop is helping with collections and helps increase the penalty and interest collected. He said \$100,000 more in each should be collected this fiscal year. Collections are strong at the landfill because of a large amount of demolition, such as at Longwood University.

Supervisor Wilck questioned how the proposed landfill in Cumberland would affect Prince Edward County's landfill. Mr. Bartlett said it will not affect Prince Edward County at all in the short-term because Cumberland does not use Prince Edward County's landfill, but it could have an effect in the future.

In Re: Other Business

Mr. Bartlett said one night a year, a count is taken of the homeless; this year the Point In Time Homeless Count will be taken Wednesday, January 22 at 6:00 p.m. to January 23 at 6:00 a.m. He said they go where the homeless are known to shelter and the information is used to provide statistics.

In Re: Discussion of FY 2021 Budget Process

Mr. Bartlett said that as the Board is aware, the County borrowed \$7 million for the construction. He stated he estimates the County's FY 2020 revenue will be \$1 million over budgeted amounts. He stated due to the loan payments, the County's debt service payments will be approximately one-half million dollars more than they would have been without taking out the \$7 million loan, for the next four years. This was anticipated by the County as was the increase in revenues. The plan was to use the additional revenues and the natural annual growth in revenues of \$345,000 to allow the County to afford the debt increase without having to raise taxes.

Mr. Bartlett said he learned from VACo that currently, there are no bills to increase salaries; he said pay raises are a very costly thing for everyone, state and the County included, because that is the vast majority of expenses are salary. He said this year, a lot of the increase in additional revenue has to do with the construction equipment that was in the County for the pipeline; he said a lot of the machinery has been moved out and there will be less in the future. He said the personal property revenues are going up and the Real Estate assessment may increase.

Mr. Bartlett said the County should be fine for FY 2021. He said there a few large projects:

- Replace HVAC for the Courthouse. Mr. Bartlett said the HVAC is now 22 years old; two of three compressors have been replaced at a cost of \$18,000 each. The newest compressor was replaced three years ago. He said there are 12 fan boxes at about \$1,000 each; five were replaced last year. He stated last year an estimate for replacement was \$180,000.

- <u>Phone system</u>. Mr. Bartlett stated the Toshiba telephone system currently used is no longer being made, replacement parts are very difficult to get. That system was approximately \$60,000-\$70,000.
- <u>Vehicles</u>. Mr. Bartlett said the Sheriff's Department is requesting several vehicles; currently, two of their vehicles need engines.
- <u>Courthouse</u>. Following the construction in the Courthouse, work will need to be done to change the carpeting in all the other offices that weren't included. He said the elevator will be worked on after the construction is finished.
- Roof. Mr. Bartlett said insulation is buckling due to water damage under a roof on the Third Street side of the building; he said most of the water has been stopped, and only comes in when there is a hard rain and a lot of wind. He said it may be coming down the brick two-story wall above the flat roof, and the flashing on the roof may be bad. He said the cost to remove the brick, put down new flashing, and re-roof with a modified roof design, which is estimated to cost at least \$50,000.
- Convenience sites, paving. Mr. Bartlett said another project is paving the convenience sites where the citizens would drive; the sites are in Worsham and Rice; this would cost approximately \$60,000.
 - Mr. Bartlett said the total for these projects would be approximately \$350,000 \$400,000.

Mr. Bartlett stated the County is currently holding the reassessment; the information will not come into account until the following budget year.

Supervisor Jones left the meeting at this time.

Mr. Bartlett stated he didn't feel the Board would need to increase taxes. Mr. Bartlett said the Transient Occupancy Tax is approved, but is not enacted. He said it is not only for hotels and motels, but is also for B&B, tipis, Airbnb, and campgrounds. The state limits Counties at 5% but even if only rented for the weekend, it could provide approximately \$30,000 per year. He said this would not take into account the rooms at the Executive Inn.

Mr. Bartlett stated there is a bill in the General Assembly that would make the transient occupancy tax apply to state facilities as well, such as Twin Lakes.

Supervisor Wilck questioned the dispute regarding the Prince Edward County and Nottoway County line.

Mrs. Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said County Staff met with the Nottoway Sheriff, the County Administrator, the Board of Supervisors member and their 911 address coordinator; she said no one disputed the County line. She said the line for the PSAP and provisioning boundary have to coincide with the law enforcement jurisdictions. Mrs. Puckett said a meeting with the GIS department from the State will be held February 24 to draw the line. She said there are several houses where the line goes

through the property, through the yard or through the house; the two Sheriffs will have to decide which law enforcement agency will be dispatched first. She said they only discussed this from a public safety issue standpoint. She said any other factors that would be affected, such as taxation, would need to be elevated to the Board of Supervisors' level committee, which would be the Chairman and Supervisor Jones. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett asked if there were other recommendations or comments.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated the hallways are in need of fresh paint. Mr. Bartlett said while there is nothing in the current budget for this, the multi-colored tile will be replaced; he said the painting can be done in-house. He said several offices may need to buy furniture; the existing furniture will be moved but may not fit into the new offices.

Supervisor Booth suggested hiring a full time, in-house IT person. She described issues with the programming in the Commissioner of Revenue office before she retired. Mr. Bartlett said the software is old and the company had to write a special program for it. Supervisor Cooper-Jones mentioned discussing sharing the IT person at the Library. Mr. Bartlett said Mr. Headley gives a lot of help to the Commissioner of Revenue's office and the Treasurer's Office on the accounting side in addition to the IT service. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Booth questioned who will maintain the building after the reconstruction is complete.

Mr. Bartlett said the custodial staff will take care of maintenance; he said more will be expected.

Chairman Townsend said there had been some discussion regarding two part-time positions. Mr. Bartlett said that isn't in the current budget but it can be explored. Discussion followed.

Chairman Townsend said the Finance Committee will take the recommendations under consideration.

Chairman Townsend then said he would like the Strategic Planning Committee to meet to make changes or recommendations and present those to the Finance Committee for their consideration during the budget process. He said he would like Mr. Bartlett to present a "State of the County" address in July, to recap the Board's accomplishments and provide vision for the new fiscal year.

Chairman Townsend stated he would like the Planning Commission to begin the revision of the Comprehensive Plan. He said it has been several years since it was done; he said this process takes a while. Mr. Roark has a lot of experience and will be a great help.

Supervisor Pride stated Mr. Bartlett will consider a date for the Strategic Planning Committee and contact all members.

Chairman Townsend stated the Personnel Committee interviewed an applicant for the Community Development Specialist / Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator position and the Committee recommends hiring this applicant. However, Mr. Bartlett only appropriated \$40,000 for the position, and this gentleman currently earns over \$50,000. Chairman Townsend said it will now go to the Finance Committee to see if the County can pay this position \$62,000. Chairman Townsend listed this applicant's qualifications.

Supervisor Wilck stated this applicant is highly qualified and has a dozen certifications and is experienced.

The public hearing notice was advertised in the January 29th and February 5th, 2020 editions of the Farmville Herald, Attachment (3). The proposed light is ground mounted and will shine upward onto the sign and is facing away from any structure and will be shining into a wooded area owned by Prince Edward County. The sign is 8 feet wide and the masonry columns are 6 feet in height. The placement of the lighting fixture will cause any light to shine away from any existing structure, Attachment (4).

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on January 21, 2020. No one spoke during the public hearing and the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the Special Use permit.








Figure 2 Tenative Development Plan Austin Woods Farmville

Commissioner Jones said that if the rezoning is passed, the developer would still have to come before the Planning Commission with a site plan. Mr. Bartlett said that is correct; the developer didn't want to proceed until this issue could be addressed.

Commissioner Jones then asked if the developer has gone before Town Council and asked if the County approved it but the Town [of Farmville] did not, would that kill the project. Mr. Bartlett said the majority of the property is in the county, and recommended a voluntary boundary adjustment to take the 120+/- acres into the Town, because of the entrance to the property and as it is within the Town's water and sewer service area. He said some of the property is wetlands and cannot be developed. Discussion followed.

Chairman Prengaman stated this public hearing is only looking at the rezoning request. He then opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Prengaman closed the public hearing.

Chairman Prengaman said there is potential for development for the County or Town, more homes and people, with a possible impact on businesses in the area. There are a lot of hoops for the developer to meet.

Issue: PUBLIC HEARING: Amendment to Zoning Ordinance

Summary:

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 21, 2020 to consider the proposed amendment to the County Zoning Ordinance by adding a Special Use Permit process for "Construction Camps" in the A-1, Agricultural Conservation District, to allow temporary housing (i.e. recreational vehicles) for employees/labor drawn to the area by large construction projects.

This would add "Construction Camps" to Section 2-100.3. B.5 of the Zoning Ordinance.

The definition of Construction Camps is:

"Sites that provide temporary sites and connections for recreational vehicles for a large influx of employees/labor drawn to the area by large extended construction projects. These camps are meant to minimize the strain on local resources, limit social impacts on the community and allow control and order to be imposed on the occupants."

Construction camps closely resemble campgrounds in layout and operation and campgrounds are already an allowed use in the A1 zone by special use permit. There are only two major differences between a construction camp and a campground both in the operational arena. First, per Department of Health regulations a campground has to have a bathhouse while construction camps do not. Second, for campgrounds the board has limited the length of stay to only 30 days while in a construction camp the length of the stay is not limited. But there is no state requirement to limit the length of stays at a campground.

The following is an excerpt of the minutes of the regular meeting of the Prince Edward County Planning Commission held January 21, 2020.

In Re: Public Hearing – Amendment to Zoning Ordinance

Chairman Prengaman announced this was the date and time scheduled for a Public Hearing on an amendment to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance to allow Construction Camps in the A-1, Agricultural Conservation District by Special Use Permit. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Wednesday, January 8, 2020 and Wednesday, January 15, 2020 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, stated this amendment would add "Construction Camps" to Section 2-100.3.B.5 of the Zoning Ordinance and add a Special Use Permit process for "Construction Camps" in the A-1, Agricultural Conservation District, to allow temporary housing (i.e., recreational vehicles) for employees and/or labor drawn to the area by large construction projects. Mr. Bartlett said Construction Camps are meant to minimize the strain on local resources, limit social impacts on the community and allow control and order to be imposed on the occupants. He said campgrounds have been allowed in the A-1 District since 2007.

Commissioner Watson asked for clarification on the difference between the construction camp and a campground. Mr. Bartlett said the difference is usually the length of time that people can stay. He said campers can stay a maximum of 30 days; construction camps do not have that restriction and people can stay for the duration of the construction job. Mr. Bartlett said all other regulations are the same as a campground. He gave an example of special septic systems are required for a camp having over 24 sites.

Chairman Prengaman said construction camps have been previously approved but not in the A-1 zoning district. Mr. Bartlett said that was correct; he said A-1 is the largest area designation in the county.

Commissioner Hunt asked what effect it would have on the water system. Mr. Bartlett said wells would have to be drilled, according to the number of campsites.

Chairman Prengaman opened the public hearing.

Steven Samaras, Lockett District, asked if there are two projects, he is interested in the one at Rice. He said a campground has a limit of a 30-day stay, his concern is once it is done being a construction camp, or if the pipeline project falls through and the project is abandoned, what becomes of the campground. Chairman Prengaman said a regular campground has a different designation, this would be a construction camp. Mr. Bartlett said the Special Use Permit goes with the land but the landowner could request a different use. Chairman Prengaman stated that once the construction camp use would be finished, the owner could come back to the Planning Commission for the campground use which would require another permit.

Brian Lokker, Lockett District, asked where he could find the updated Zoning Ordinance. He stated the one currently available on the website is from 2007 and asked how to access the amendments since that time. He then stated no information regarding the hearings was on the web site and asked for the definition of a construction camp. Mr. Bartlett said the County is in the process of updating the web site and should be done by this summer. He said the Zoning Ordinance amendments should be on it then.

Eric Hodges, Lockett District, expressed concerns regarding safety and the increased violence that could come with the camp; he asked what kind of safety measures will be in place. Chairman Prengaman stated designations were placed on previous camps regarding security including a timeframe on how often police would be traveling through the area. He said other sites have stipulated that an attendee had to be on site. He said these can also be added as stipulations to the special use permits.

Jim Pohl, Lockett District, asked about the occupancy on each camp site; he then asked about the property setbacks. He expressed his concern regarding the number of people potentially occupying two acres, condensed into a minimum amount of space. He said this location is very close to the Trail, questioned the state easement, and also expressed concern about leaching from the septic because it is higher than the creek below.

Chairman Prengaman clarified this public hearing is for the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to add the definition and allow for a Construction Camp to be permitted by Special Use Permit in the A-1 Zoning District, and not for a specific location or property.

Mr. Samaras stated that this amendment being county-wide, perhaps a stipulation would be to limit the number of people, adding concerns regarding traffic and density. He said the Trail takes in a lot of property in the A-1 district.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Prengaman closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Watson stated the amendment appears to be a natural add-on with just a slight adjustment from the definition of campground. He said each project would be scrutinized. He stated this just gives the ability to grant in a zone that seems well-suited to that use.

Chairman Prengaman said stipulations can be added to individual proposed projects, and forward recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

Commissioner Jones said the Ordinance never had a need to include this type of use before. Commissioner Jones then made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Watson, to approve for recommendation to the Board of Supervisors to add the definition for Construction Camp to A-1 Zoning District by Special Use Permit; the motion carried:

Issue: PUBLIC HEARING: Special Use Permit – Construction Camp - Ellington

Summary:

The County has received a Special Use Permit Application from Mr. & Mrs. Ellington to construct and operate a Construction Camp on Tax Map Parcel 40-A-23, Attachment (1). This Parcel is located Southwest of the intersection of Highway 460 and Pisgah Church Road (SR735), Attachment (2). The public hearing notice was advertised in the Farmville Herald on January 29 & February 5, 2020, Attachment (3). This is an A-1 Agricultural Conservation District. In addition to requesting the use of the property as a Construction Camp for the duration of the building of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP), the Ellington's are requesting to be allowed to continue to use the site as a campground following the completion of the ACP. Campgrounds are an allowed use in the A-1 zone by Special Use Permit. Construction Camps would be allowed by Special Use Permit in the A-1 zone if the Board of Supervisors approve an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance allowing Construction Camps as an allowed use by Special Use Permit in the Agricultural Conservation District, A-1.

The request includes a site plan detailing the construction of up to 25 camp sites on the property, an office/bathhouse and a Dumpster Pad to hold waste, Attachment (4). The entrance would be off of Pisgah Church Road. The sites will be graveled and a storm water plan must be submitted and approved prior to final site plan approval. Water would be provided from wells and sewage would be handled by an on-site sewage system which must be approved by the Virginia Department of Health. The entrance permit must be approved by the Virginia Department of Transportation.

The site currently contains a natural buffer along its borders, Attachments (5) & (6). The latest traffic data shows an annual average daily traffic volume of 100 vehicles on Pisgah Church Road at the intersection with US 460. From 2013 – 2019 VDOT data shows there was one accident at the intersection of Pisgah Church Road and US 460. There were an additional three accidents in the near vicinity. All three of those were single vehicle accidents, two occurred when a vehicle struck a deer and the other was a single vehicle having a head-on collision with an object other than another vehicle, Attachment (7). Attachment (8) is an email from the VDOT Resident Engineer stating a campground of this size would generate 14 annual average daily trips. Attachments (9) and (10) list the adjoining property owners notified of the request and the letter mailed to each.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on this request on January 21, 2020. Six people spoke at the public hearing. The major concerns were (1) Loss of peace and quiet, (2) Would the property be used for permanent residences if the project failed, (3) The natural buffer be maintained, (4) One adjoining property owner asked a privacy fence be erected along his property line, (5) the

request for the Construction Camp and Campground uses be separated, (6) The site plan appears to violate the 35 foot minimum set back requirement, (7) The increase in traffic and (8) the possible high density of people, (9) the lowering of property values. A draft of the minutes of the Planning Commission's January 21, 2020 are contained in Attachment (11).

The public hearing was closed and the Planning Commission asked questions of Mr. Ellington and sought ways to mitigate negative impacts. After discussion the Planning Commission unanimously approved recommending approval of the Construction Camp but not the Camp Ground with the following conditions:

- 1. Site Plan and Erosion & Sediment Control and Stormwater approvals be obtained prior to construction.
- 2. VDOT Approval for the Site entrance
- 3. Approval from the Department of Health for both water and septic systems
- 4. Existing Natural buffer along the property lines not be disturbed or removed.
- 5. Lighting be glared-shielded to prevent light from extending beyond the property.
- 6. Facilities be provided for trash.
- 7. Quiet hours are maintained from 10:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m.
- 8. Site be free of litter and debris at all times.
- 9. A woven wire six-foot-high fence be erected along the border of tax map parcels 40-A-23
- 10. Tents be restricted from the Construction Camp.

The Health department requires Construction Camps and Campgrounds to meet the same conditions in regards to water supply (wells) and treatment of sewage (septic systems) the only difference is that Campgrounds must have a bath house while Construction Camps do not. This is because The Health Departments assume no tents or camping trailers without plumbing will be allowed in a Construction Camp. The above conditions exceed the conditions placed on the two other sites approved for Construction Camps, specifically items 8, 9 & 10 listed above. A sunset provision of three years after the beginning of the construction period was also imposed of the previously approved Construction Camps.

The above conditions also closely align with the conditions imposed on the one approved Camp Ground in the County. Differences are (1) sites must be vacated for at least 72 hours between stays which were limited to 30 days per the Rules and Regulations submitted by the property owner, (2) Signage at the entrance to the camp ground must list the cell number or contact number of the property owner and (3) A set of Rules and regulations submitted by the property owner, Attachment (12).

While the Planning Commission only recommends the Construction Camp use be approved at this time, County Staff is confused as to the reason for that recommendation as no justification was stated. If the rules and regulations in Attachment (12) are made a condition for approval of the campground and it requires a bathhouse per Health Department requirements, it would have a stricter set of operational guidelines than the Construction Camp. By delaying the approval of the

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special use request for the property it would allow the Board to determine if the use as a Construction Camp creates an undue burden on the adjoining property owners. But with a completely different set of customers using a Construction Camp as compared to a Campground and stricter rules staff does not believe comparing the impacts of the two uses is appropriate. Staff believes a better comparison of the impact of a campground is the history associated with the one existing campground in the County as long as the rules in Attachment 12 are approved as a condition. Staff is not aware of any problems with the existing campground. As such Staff does not believe there to be any advantage in withholding approval of the Special Use request for a camp ground if the Board approves the use as a Construction Camp. Staff recommends the change over from a Construction Camp to a Camp Ground occur no later than 30 days after the completion of the ACP construction project which will be considered complete when the local Construction Office at the old SMI site closes.

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



He stated water would be provided from wells and sewage would be handled by an on-site sewage system which must be approved by the Virginia Department of Health. The entrance permit must be approved by the Virginia Department of Transportation.

Mr. Bartlett stated the site currently contains a natural buffer along its borders. The latest traffic data shows an annual average daily traffic volume of 100 vehicles on Pisgah Church Road at the intersection with US 460. From 2013-2019, VDOT data shows there was one accident at the intersection of Pisgah Church Road and US 460. There were an additional three accidents in the near vicinity. All three of those were single vehicle accidents; two occurred when a vehicle struck a deer and the other was a single vehicle having a head-on collision with an object other than another vehicle.

Mr. Bartlett said staff recommends the following conditions be imposed if the Planning Commission approves the Special Use Permit:

- 1. Site Plan and Erosion & Sediment Control and Stormwater approvals be obtained prior to construction
- 2. VDOT Approval for the Site entrance
- 3. Approval from the Department of Health for both water and septic systems
- 4. Existing Natural buffer along the property lines not be disturbed or removed
- 5. Lighting be glare-shielded to prevent light from extending beyond the property
- 6. Facilities be provided for trash
- 7. Quiet hours are maintained from 10:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m.
- 8. Site be free of litter and debris at all times

Chairman Prengaman said it appears the Planning Commission is looking at a dual special use permit which would transfer from a construction camp to a campground.

Andy Ellington stated his property is located along the Rails To Trails; he said he has been in negotiations with Atlantic Coast Pipeline as they are in need of housing space if the pipeline is ever approved. He said when he first bought the property, his desire was to open a campground due to the area not having enough hotels for the people coming for the historical attractions. He said his intent is to request that after the construction camp is done and the pipeline is built, he would like to maintain a campground with the access to Rails To Trails. He said this would be an economic boost for the area and would be monitored strictly, as most campgrounds are, with quiet times; he said it will be well-maintained throughout its operation.

Mr. Ellington said the plans for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline were drawn in 2017; they have met many of the hurdles they never thought would arise. He said the ACP anxiously awaits the decision from the Supreme Court early this year, anticipate construction to begin early next year, and is seeking these campgrounds to house their construction workers because there is no housing or hotel space in Prince Edward County.

Mr. Bartlett asked if the Ellingtons have contacted a representative from High Bridge Trail State Park. Mr. Ellington said that they have; he said he requested access to enter the Rails To Trails from the campground, and was advised that this can be done with an application permit process. He added that they welcomed this.

Commissioner Sandlin asked Mr. Ellington to elaborate on the planned security. Mr. Ellington stated security is their utmost concern as there are a lot of people against the pipeline and they (ACP) have to protect their workers and the community.

Commissioner Jones asked what type of security is planned for after the construction camp would become a campground. Mr. Ellington said by then he would like the Sheriff's office to come through [the campground], and he would monitor the site himself.

Commissioner Peery asked if Mr. Ellington plans to have an office onsite. Mr. Ellington said he would for the campground.

Chairman Prengaman opened the public hearing.

Steven Samaras, Lockett District, said he understands that the Ellingtons would like to handle both at the same time, because of the sewer, wells, and electric, but his concerns are that if it becomes a campground and if it doesn't succeed, what happens to the property at that time. He said he is concerned that people will use it as permanent residences. He said sites with a 30-day stay limit as a campground would eliminate that possibility. He said he is also concerned that there would not be an attendant, and is happy that the pipeline camp would be monitored, and when it becomes a public campground, it would be in Ellingtons' interest to keep people from pulling in off Route 460 and camping for free.

Larry Clements, Lockett District, expressed his concern about the property bordering the majority of this project. He stated four generations of his family have lived and enjoyed the privacy and quiet, and that his house is on the back of his property and has enjoyed that privacy for over 60 years. He stated he has nothing against his neighbors, but is concerned about what will happen to the quiet that they have had. He requested that, in addition to the natural buffer, a privacy fence be installed on the property line.

Brian Lokker, Lockett District, said the request overlaps with two separate proposals. He asked how the conditions placed on the construction camp would carry over to the campground. He said the

narrative statement presented shows nothing as to how additional conditions would be addressed, such as noise, odor, dust or fumes, or how the proposed use is compatible with the adjacent properties, adding that it is not compatible and would depend on how the neighbors' concerns are addressed. He then questioned the duration of construction camp and then the changes for the campground.

Chairman Prengaman said the construction camp would be designated as such for as long as the construction camp is needed and construction is going on. He said when the pipeline is completed, the workers would move on to the next site where they would be working.

Mr. Lokker said the request should be split into two separate requests. He asked if they would bring in campers or singlewides.

Chairman Prengaman said usually they are campers or trailers; people travel with the construction crews. He said they typically use larger campers or five-wheelers as these are the workers' homes.

Mr. Lokker asked about noise restrictions. Chairman Prengaman said quiet time would be stipulated from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., seven days a week.

Mr. Lokker then asked about the lighting and security since the property borders four residences. Chairman Prengaman said the glazed shielded lighting would be set down and inward, not to go beyond the perimeter of the site, and is a normal condition set into the special use permit.

Mr. Lokker then said it appears this project violates the ordinance minimum 35-foot setback. He asked about a review of the conditions and how this will work for the community. He then stated the agenda and information regarding the project was not online for review.

Lori Pohl, Lockett District, expressed her concerns regarding the number of people living on each of the 25 proposed lots, on less than five acres. She said she is also concerned about the cars and traffic in the area, and said it must be limited. She said it is "horrifying enough to lose your property values and to lose the land around you that you're living at. Been there now for thirty years and I am frustrated by the constant barrage that we've had on the little town of Rice. Not that sure why it would be okay to do this to us and sure it would not go through in Farmville."

Jim Pohl, Lockett District, asked in talking about the occupancy of the trailers, who owns the trailers, how many people would be in each one of them, and stated they could have 100 people on less than four acres. He asked if there would be electric or propane hookups.

Mr. Ellington said the electric hookups will be 50-amp service.

Mr. Pohl then expressed his concern about the location of the sewer and the possible leaching into the creek below. He then asked with this amount of underground wire and plumbing, someone needs to keep an eye on it. He asked about the easement from the Trail, and said the plan butts up against the Trail and it is marked where he himself cannot go in relation to the Trail.

Mr. Ellington said there will be three wells; the septic tank will be located in front of the office with a pumping station to pump it back. Mr. Bartlett asked if there would be preliminary treatment in the front tank; Mr. Ellington said it would.

Mr. Pohl asked how long the construction camp would be active, how many miles of pipeline are in the county, and who will pay for the occupancy.

Chairman Prengaman said it hasn't been established when the pipeline will begin construction, and no stipulation of a start and end time has been established.

Mr. Bartlett said there are not many miles of pipeline in Prince Edward County, and goes through the northeastern corner of Prince Edward County. He said the construction workers usually pay occupancy.

Chairman Prengaman stated camps will be competing for the occupancy of the workers, and there are positives for the County such as increased revenue at gas stations, restaurants, retail, and if they bring their families, in the schools.

Mr. Bartlett said he is not concerned about the capacity of the schools; he said when he started in 2007, there were 2,500 students and now that number is down to 2,000. He said the campsites would have gravel, or impervious surfaces; the plans will have to take that into account and they would have to build stormwater ponds and Erosion and Sediment Control as if it was an asphalt area to take care of the runoff.

Mr. Pohl asked where the stormwater pond would be located. Mr. Bartlett said that would be up to the engineer and the County would have to get it approved by a second engineer for the site and Stormwater Plan. Mr. Bartlett said not all sites have to have stormwater ponds; some may have basins or a level-spreader, and it depends on calculations by engineers. Discussion followed.

Eric Hodges, Lockett District, stated he is in opposition to the camps and said there is space somewhere more appropriate in the County than the residential area being proposed. He questioned the viability of a campground along Route 460.

Mr. Bartlett said it is against the law for the Planning Commission to issue or deny a permit for anything based on viability; he said that is not the Planning Commission or Board of Supervisors' decision.

Commissioner Watson said if the applicant wants to do the project, that is his risk. Discussion followed.

Chairman Prengaman said the County has approved camps, some on the edge of town in which no activity has occurred. He said it is up to the individuals where to stay.

Mr. Ellington said he is a lifelong resident of Rice and when he first purchased the property it was overgrown. He cleared the lot for the beauty of the Rice community and maintains it regularly. He said his heart is in Rice and he desires to have something that will add to the community. He said he would rather see a campground than a hotel or Family Dollar. He said that Rice will continue to grow. He said this is the first step of many for this [project] coming to fruition. He said as a developer, he will not do anything else until he gets support of the Planning Commission and the Board [of Supervisors] before exhausting any more money into this project.

Commissioner Jones asked if he would consider putting a privacy fence on the property line. Mr. Ellington said he would, and had been asked if he would leave the buffer when he first cleared the lot. He said he did so and discussion followed regarding the type of privacy fence.

Commissioner Jones said a fence would be a permanent barrier to keep people wandering onto private property from the campground. Mr. Ellington asked if a woven wire fence would be acceptable; discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett asked if Dominion has been in touch regarding transportation of the workers from the camp to the work site. He said they do not want individual cars because there is no parking available for the cars. Mr. Ellington said that is up to them but stated they want to limit as much traffic around the construction area because they are concerned for their protection while on the construction sites from people that are protesting the project.

Chairman Prengaman said the County does not deal with Dominion or any other company in relation to the camp and is only involved in considering a Special Use Permit.

Commissioner Peery asked how many people are expected. Mr. Ellington said that according to Maxey & Associates, and assuming two employees at the office and 25 RV sites, and using traffic rates for a mobile home park, the average traffic is 133 vpd, with the computed hourly volume for the entrance would be 16 vehicles per hour and in the afternoon, worst case, 9 vph entering and 7 vph exiting the site. He said Pisgah Church Road has a average daily trip count of 100 vpd, with a peak hour of 12 vehicles per hour in one direction. Route 460 has an annual average daily trip count of 14,000 vpd and a peak hour of 679 vph in one direction. He said a moderate volume entrance would be required on the camp.

Commissioner Jones said he learned that they would have a bus service for the campers because they do not have enough places to park the ears; he said many already have busses.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Prengaman closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Jones said with the stipulations that staff has, restricting the use of tent camping during the construction camp phase, a woven wire fence on the property line and natural buffer, and add spruce to block the view.

Chairman Prengaman said he feels they need to separate the construction camp use and a campground use would allow a transition between the two; he suggested they only look at the construction camp during this public hearing, delete the campground and readdress that as a separate Special Use Permit. Discussion followed.

Commissioner Peery recommended a six-foot high fence.

Chairman Prengaman said the six-foot privacy fence, woven wire and the tree buffer, and no tent-camping would be stipulations. He said it would have to be approved by VDOT for the entrance and approved by the Health Department, the site has to be reviewed by an engineer once the requestor has their proposal in place, otherwise no construction can occur.

Commissioner Watson stated the Planning Commission gathers the information and makes recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Prengaman stated the Board will approve or deny the request at the following meeting. Discussion followed.

Chairman Prengaman said the Planning Commission is amending the application slightly and considering only the construction camp and not for the campground. He said the eight stipulations that are routine and two additional stipulations are as follows:

- 1. Site Plan and Erosion & Sediment Control and Stormwater approvals be obtained prior to construction
- 2. VDOT Approval for the Site entrance
- 3. Approval from the Department of Health for both water and septic systems
- 4. Existing Natural buffer along the property lines not be disturbed or removed
- 5. Lighting be glare-shielded to prevent light from extending beyond the property
- 6. Facilities be provided for trash
- 7. Quiet hours are maintained from 10:00 until 6:00 a.m.
- 8. Site be free of litter and debris at all times
- 9. Fence, six-foot high, wire or woven fence
- 10. Tents restricted from the construction camp

Commissioner Jones made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Hunt, to approve for recommendation to the Board of Supervisors, the Special Use Permit application for a construction camp for the duration of construction of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, with the ten stipulations as follows:

- 1. Site Plan and Erosion & Sediment Control and Stormwater approvals be obtained prior to construction
- 2. VDOT Approval for the Site entrance
- 3. Approval from the Department of Health for both water and septic systems
- 4. Existing Natural buffer along the property lines not be disturbed or removed
- 5. Lighting be glare-shielded to prevent light from extending beyond the property
- 6. Facilities be provided for trash
- 7. Quiet hours are maintained from 10:00 until 6:00 a.m.
- 8. Site be free of litter and debris at all times
- 9. Fence, six-foot high, wire or woven fence
- 10. Tents restricted from the construction camp

Welcome to Briery Creek Lake RV Sites:

This is written to serve as added information to our guests regarding our requirements. The sheet outlines rules, regulations and codes of conduct to which you agree to abide by during your stay with us. The park reserves the right to refuse service to anyone or have any guest removed for violations of the following rules.

ALL RV SITE RULES AND REGULATIONS MUST BE FOLLOWED AT ALL TIMES AND SITES MUST BE KEPT NEAT, CLEAN, UNCLUTTERED AND FREE OF LITTER INCLUDING CIGARETTE BUTTS.

Quiet time will be from 11:00 PM to 7:00 AM

There is a strict limitation of a 30 day maximum stay.

Sites must be free of storage containers, household items, tools, refrigerators or anything not normally associated with regular camping. Briery Creek Lake RV Sites is not responsible for theft.

Guests are not to add any items to their site that would give the appearance of a full time home. Additionally, no altering of the site is allowed without the permission of the manager.

All table coverings, patio mats, rugs, awning lights or decorations must be kept neat to maintain Briery Creek Lake RV Site standards.

No clothes lines will be strung outside.

Trash pick-up is Monday and Friday at noon. Trash must be properly bagged and placed in the dumpsters located on the property. Trash is not to be placed out at night. Any trash accumulated during the day must be taken to the dumpster located on the property. Do not dump any food outside any site for any reason.

No washing of rigs or automobiles on Briery Creek Lake RV Site property. Commercial dry wash may be used.

All individuals riding bikes or mechanized devices including, but not limited to, scooters, mopeds, etc. must wear a safety helmet while riding on Briery Creek Lake RV Site property. No riding of such items after dark is permitted.

All RV's must be kept road ready and able to evacuate, under their own power, on short notice.

Pets are welcome. The following restrictions apply:

Pets shall not be tied outside unattended and must be under control of owner at all times. If you pet barks or otherwise makes noise when left alone, make arrangements for your pet while you are away. No dog pens (portable or permanent) are allowed on Briery Creek Lake RV Site property. Issue: County Administrator's Report

Summary:

A. The County was notified by the Schools they have received a School Equipment Safety Grant in the amount of \$34,621. The School requests the Board of Supervisors above a budget amendment and appropriate the same funds as shown below.

- B. The Finance Committee comprised of Supervisor Cooper-Jones, chair and Supervisors Emert and Jones met on February 5, 2020. One topic was a request by the Sheriff to increase his budget by \$16,000. These funds are needed to replace engines in two of his cars. These cars still have life left in them our insurance company is still assessing the damage on one of the vehicles and we will receive a payment but we do not know the amount at this time. Additionally, the sheriff is short cars at this time and needs the cars repaired quickly. The Committee reviewed the revenues the Sheriff's department has generated from the At-Will program. For the first seven months of the year \$128,136 has been collected. This program will generate at a minimum \$199,176 this fiscal year and if the current rate is maintained it is projected a total of \$228,775 will be collected. The budget only contains \$170,000 for this revenue. The Committee recommends the Board amend the FY20 budget by \$16,000 and appropriate the same funds as shown below
- C. With the recent water rescue it became apparent there was a need for a boat that would be available immediately in case it was needed. Several years ago, the Sheriff's department acquired two small boats, motors and trailers from the Federal Surplus Program. The Sheriff realized these boats were not being used to their fullest and had the potential to be available for use if a need arose in the future. The Sheriff contacted the Federal Authorities and they have agreed he could surplus the boats. The Code of Virginia allows the Board to donate equipment to Volunteer Fire Departments (VFD). The VFD are in the process of developing capabilities for various emergency situations one of which is water rescue. But that process is ongoing and final decisions have not been made of which department will specialize in each of the emergency needs. I recommend the Board surplus the Boats, Motors and Trailers and allow the County Administrator to donate them to the VFD that eventually will be participating in water rescues.

January 2020 Summary

Announcement

After the success of the Open House event in November, we decided to host a second event in March to specifically attract farmers to tour the cannery before their season becomes busy. We'll have samples of VFW recipes available for attendees to taste so they can plan to save some of their harvest to make value-added products with us later this year. The Open House is Thursday, March 5th from 4 to 7pm.

From the Production Floor

January was very busy at the cannery, especially considering that Kathleen, our Production Manager, took a much-deserved vacation at the end of the month. We fit ten production days in before she left, three of which were for Rupen's, a client who makes seven different curry sauces. We produced over 3,300 jars of his sauces over those three days with the help of 12 employees. It was the first multiple-day production of that size that we've done for a client, and we learned a lot through its planning and execution. It was overall a success, and we are planning another large-scale production for Rupen's in March.

We hosted Garner's Produce for two pepper jelly production days, and during the first one they brought two media staff from the Virginia Farm Bureau. They tooks pictures and videos of everyone working, and interviewed Kathleen and Garner's Farm Manager. I'll share the content as soon as it's published.

Garner's brought us peppers to prepare for processing in November, but January was their first production with us. They grow produce on 110 acres in Westmoreland County, and we are looking forward to making more products with them this season- especially strawberry jam!

In the Office

VFW's Board of Directors met on January 13th and voted on a final version of our mission statement: "Virginia Food works guides food producers in taking their product from recipe to retail." At our next meeting in April, we will continue our strategic planning to rework our vision statement.

The cannery is currently available to commercial clients Tuesday-Friday. We are already booking into mid-March, so please try to reach out 4-6 weeks ahead of when you'd like to schedule production.

The home canning season opens in June, after which point reserving the cannery will require more advanced notice for just Tuesday, Thursday and Friday productions. We are recommending that our regular clients get a production run in before the "busy season" starts this summer.

Report to February Board of Supervisors:

- Happy New Year! We are preparing the community for Bike Virginia 2020 which takes place June 19 24. Registration opened on January 1st, and all of the hotels filled up in two weeks! Bike Virginia staff tell me that they are already more than 50% registered for the 1,600 cyclists who will be here for six days this summer.
- We are working to connect the organization helping the cyclists find other housing options, including lodging in surrounding communities.
- We will host a video conference in March or April between Bike Virginia staff and the many local resources that need information to prepare for this event.
- 2019 Visitor Guestbook stats reflect that 21.4% of the visitors who stop in here state High Bridge Trail State Park as the reason for their visit. Second place goes to those visiting family or friends at 13.3% followed by 11.5% seeking Information on the community and 10% who are travelers who simply left US460 due to the signage.
