Summary:

Attached is the proposed Advertisement for the FY19 budget. The format closely follows those of previous years. New this year is the Health Insurance Fund. The Health Insurance Fund is an internal control fund used to track payments made to Anthem and our Insurance Consultant. Funds in which employees are paid are charged based on the number of employees and the plan types they choose. Moneys are transferred from these funds into the Health Insurance Fund and payments are made from this fund.

As the state code dictates the attached advertisement is for informational purposes only and contains no tax or fee increases.

To maintain the County's budget schedule would require the Board of Supervisors to authorize the advertisement of a Public Hearing to be held on April 23, 2019 at 7:00 p,m. This public hearing would be for both the County and School budgets and Tax Levies. The advertisement would appear in the April 12th and 19th editions of the Farmville Herald.

Chairman Wilck stated "Recognitions" is a chance to recognize people that have done something extraordinary.

Chairman Wilck said the Prince Edward County Public School District Spelling Bee was held January 22, 2019. Nine students from Fourth to Eighth Grade participated. The winner of the spelling bee was Nayana Adhikari from the Fourth grade. The winning word was "affidavit." Elizabeth McElfresh and Gabrielle Roldan, seventh graders, came in second and third place, respectively. He asked the students to stand and be recognized. Chairman Wilck then said the Prince Edward County High School Scholastic Bowl team recently completed the team's fifth consecutive trip to the Virginia 2-A regional competition. They had a regular season record of nine wins and three losses and took second place in the conference tournament to advance to regionals. Team members we would like to recognize are Rachel Kinzer, Tiba Hamza, Meera Mishra, Zachyron Little, Antonio Harvey, and Kathryn McElfresh. He asked them to stand and be recognized.

Ms. Gwendolyn McQuaige-Hicks, Principal of the Prince Edward County High School, stated the students are not in attendance because they have other sports events and games; she said she would pass along the Board's recognition of their efforts.

Chairman Wilck said three Prince Edward County High School photography students, Alpiniki Jackson, Ellis Jones and Alia Muhammad, met and collaborated with school staff to beautify the walls of the School Board Conference Room by including photography of students. Canvas photos are displayed on the walls making the room more student-centered. He said the Board wants to recognize these three students for their work on this project. He asked them to stand and be recognized.

Ian Danielsen, Assistant Professor, Social Work, Longwood University, presented an update on the students' efforts regarding Child Abuse Awareness Month. He said three major events are planned: there will be a Sex Abuse Prevention presentation, in collaboration with Social Services and the Commonwealth Attorney's office, to be held at the Farmville Train Station on June 9, 2019 at 5:30 p.m.; this event is free of charge. He said a press conference will be held April 9; Ms. Megan Clark, Commonwealth's Attorney and representatives from Social Services will be present, and students will be making statements to talk about the prevalence of child maltreatment in general. He said the students will also promote a campus "Abuse Prevention Month" during April with a pinwheel campaign to raise awareness.

Chelsey White, Manager, Farmville Downtown Partnership, presented information on the fourth annual Downtown Partnership SOUP Event. She said it will be held March 29, 2019 from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. at LCVA. She said a soup dinner will be provided, and everyone one in attendance will be able to vote on proposals on projects that will improve Downtown Farmville. The winners will receive grant money to make their projects a reality. She said tickets are \$5.00 and will be available at the door, or at her office in the Regional Visitor's Center.

In Re: FY18 Audit Report

Mr. Bartlett said the County's lead Auditor will review the County's FY18 Audit.

The County's cash position increased from approximately \$11.6 million to \$13.4 million during FY18, an increase of approximately \$1.8 million or 15.5%. Of the \$13.4 million, \$1.5 million resides in the landfill construction budget which has been set aside for construction and closure costs associated with the landfill. But these funds are not legally restricted and could be used for other purposes if the Board so desires.

Revenues in the County's General Fund exceeded budgetary amounts by \$826,386. Collections exceeding the budget in Personal Property taxes (\$418,463), Local Sales Tax (\$114,176) and taxes on recordation and wills (\$73,308) accounted for \$605,967 or 73.3% of this amount. In addition to increased collections most of the County's departments and Constitutional offices under expended their budgets. The single largest expenditure savings was from the efforts of the Regional Jail which allowed the County to save \$433,068 when compared to the budget.

Josh Roller, CPA with Robinson, Farmer, Cox, said an unmodified or clean opinion has been issued; this is the best opinion that they can issue. He reviewed the findings of the FY18 Audit Report, pointing out several key sections.

In Re: Highway Matters

Ms. Carrie Shepheard, Acting Resident Engineer, VDOT, Farmville Residency, presented the maintenance update: Route 613 is now open; guardrail installation and resurfacing will be done but the road is open to traffic. Route 600 is expected to be open by the end of April as the steel beams for the guardrails are being fabricated. She then said the Litter Pick Up Initiative will begin on the primary routes, on Route 460 on Monday [March 18, 2019], then they will work their way through the County.

Ms. Shepheard said a meeting is scheduled for April 16 at 5:30 p.m. for the Six Year Plan and reprioritizing the Rural Rustic program. She asked that the Supervisors submit roads for review and possible inclusion in the program.

Mr. Bartlett said the roads next in line currently in the Six Year Plan are Nursery Road, Millers Lake Road and Dempsey Road.

Ms. Shepheard stated that April is Highway Safety Month; April 8 through 12 is National Work Zone Awareness Week to bring attention to safety in work zones; on April 8 a vigil will be held at the VDOT Workers Memorial on Afton Mountain; and April 10 is "Go Orange Day" and everyone is encouraged to wear orange in support of work zone safety, and share their photos on social media with the tagline "Drive Like You Work Here."

Chairman Wilck asked where the upcoming meeting will be held; Ms. Shepheard said it will be held in the Lynchburg District and will contact him with the date.

Supervisor Emert reported an issue on Pin Oak Road, between Routes 1040 and 1002, where water is running under a house because the drainage is filled with leaves.

Supervisor Townsend thanked VDOT for the chevrons on Leigh Mountain Road, and for filling the potholes.

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Supervisor Jones said there were numerous potholes on Route 307; Ms. Shepheard said they have been addressed earlier this week on the Prince Edward County side.

Mr. Bartlett asked for details regarding the litter program. Ms. Shepheard said the inmate crew in Prince Edward County will start this week or next week on the primary routes; she said contractors will be hired for secondary mowing, and prior to that cut, there will be litter pick-up as well.

Mr. Bartlett said that at the February Board meeting, the Social Work class from Longwood University requested the Board consider adopting a proclamation to designate April 2019 as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Prince Edward County. He said the Governor is also doing a statewide proclamation.

Proclamation Recognizing April 2019 as Child Abuse Prevention Month

WHEREAS, regardless of who they are or the circumstances of their birth, every child has the right to safe, secure, and supportive environments, free from abuse and neglect; and

WHEREAS, during Child Abuse Prevention Month, Virginians are reminded of the courage it takes to raise a child and that fundamental human rights mean living free from violence and abuse; and

WHEREAS, child abuse is considered to be one of our nation's most serious public health problems, with scientific studies documenting the link between the abuse and neglect of children and a wide range of medical, emotional, psychological, and behavioral disorders; and

WHEREAS, child abuse can disrupt early brain development, and serious chronic stress can impair the development of nervous and immune systems; and

WHEREAS, keeping children safe from abuse means playing an active role in their lives, having check-ins, and teaching them the warning signs of abuse and how to protect themselves; and

WHEREAS, child abuse prevention creates a more compassionate society, one which places a high value on the welfare of children; and

WHEREAS, creating communities where families can access an array of support and resources to address the social, emotional and physical health of their children is the best way to combat child abuse; and

WHEREAS, Virginia remains committed to sustaining safe, nurturing, and supportive environments for families raising children; and

WHEREAS, effective child abuse prevention programs succeed because of partnerships between families, social services agencies, schools, faith communities, civic organizations, law enforcement agencies, and the business community; and

WHEREAS, displaying a pinwheel during the month of April will serve as a positive reminder that together we can prevent child abuse and neglect, and in doing so keep children safe;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, does hereby recognize April 2019 as **CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH**, and calls this observance to the attention of all our citizens.

In Re: Citizen Volunteer Appointments – Board of Zoning Appeals

Mr. Bartlett said a resignation letter was received from Mr. R. Samuel Coleman from the County's Board of Zoning Appeals. Mr. Coleman was just re-appointed to the BZA in December 2018.

Mr. Bartlett said that in accordance with Section 15.2-2308 of the *Code of Virginia*, every locality that has enacted a zoning ordinance shall establish a board of zoning appeals that consists of either five or seven residents of the locality, and is appointed by the circuit court for the locality. He said historically, the Board of Supervisors has made a recommendation to the Circuit Court Judge for appointments to the BZA. The terms of office for BZA members shall be for five years each and appointments to fill vacancies shall be only for the unexpired portion of the term. Members may be reappointed to succeed themselves. Members of the BZA shall hold no other public office in the locality, except that one may be a member of the local planning commission.

Mr. Bartlett said the position has not been advertised, however, the County does have one current Citizen Volunteer Application for a position on the Board of Zoning Appeals. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Townsend said in keeping with transparency, the position should be advertised. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Pride, to advertise the vacancy on the Board of Zoning Appeals; the motion carried:

In Re: Shentel - Cable Television Franchise Renewal

Mr. Bartlett stated that the attorney from Shenandoah Cable Television, LLC, telephoned and they were unable to get a representative to attend the Board meeting but plan to attend next month. He recommended the Board table the issue. The Board concurred.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said the Veterans Council has been serving the Piedmont Planning District for quite a while. He said it is currently a volunteer organization; they have instituted a Piedmont Area Veterans Council, which has been certified by the state as a 501(c)3, and serves Prince Edward County and six adjoining counties. When they first came to Prince Edward County, the County let them use the Worsham Clerk's office to meet with veterans. Then the Town of Farmville donated a house on Longwood Avenue near their Public Works lot. They averaged 647 contacts a month. They help veterans and widows of veterans to complete complicated forms that would allow them to get funds from little-known programs. Mr. Bartlett said the Council helped the veterans receive approximately \$8 million; in 2018 alone, Prince Edward County veterans received \$1.1 million in compensation benefits. He said several veterans have approached him to express their gratitude for what the Council has done for them, as some is truly life-changing.

Mr. Bartlett said the Veteran's Council is requesting financial assistance of \$10,000 from each of the counties participating. He said the Town is giving \$10,000 in addition to the space for meeting with the veterans. Mr. Bartlett reviewed several examples of the assistance provided by the Veterans Council.

Supervisor Emert made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, to approve a \$10,000 donation for the Veteran's Council; the motion carried:

Chairman Wilck said that when the Library was set up, they owned the building, and the proceeds from the sale would go into the new building. It took longer to sell and the new building had been financed; the funds belong to the Library. Currently, a committee consisting of representatives of the Library, the Town and the County must approve any capital expenditure. He said there is approximately \$200,000 in that fund. He said he would like to pass a resolution to allow the Library to handle those funds on their own. He added it is only to be used for capital items and will only be spent on the Farmville-Prince Edward Community Library.

Rick Ewing, Director, Central Virginia Regional Library, said that in order for the Library to use the funds, they would need to go before the Library Board for approval. He said it would not be a freespending sort of thing.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to liquidate or dissolve the Trust Fund and the money be transferred to the Central Virginia Regional Library; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said the Properties Committee met with the architects, the Judges and Chief Magistrate, for discussion of some minor changes. He said the County is closer to issuing an RFP for bids; the architect is asking for an adjustment in his contract as the project is now going on three years. He said the delay is due to changes made by the County, some of which were beyond control. Mr. Bartlett said the Properties

Committee recommends adding \$60,000, with \$30,000-\$40,000 to the architect and the rest in contingency for further changes.

Supervisor Townsend made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, to authorize the County Administrator to allocate \$60,000 for the Court House project architect and contingency fund; the motion carried:

Chairman Wilck said that last month, discussion was held regarding the inclusion of citizens on some of the committees and the possibility of paying them for their participation in the meetings. He said he spoke with Mr. Bob Timmons regarding the Properties Committee, and Mr. Timmons said he did not want remuneration but would like coverage of expenses. Chairman Wilck said he would like the Board to pay up to \$200 per meeting if citizens are included in the committees.

Chairman Wilck made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Pride, that the County can pay up to \$200 per meeting plus expenses to citizens for their expertise in Committee meetings; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett stated the County received documentation from the Tobacco Commission where they have confirmed the County's request for the grant funds subject to the terms of the agreement that we have and which has been approved by the Board. He said one is the allocation, which is actually a reimbursement, 20

for the electrical upfit. He said the County will submit the bill and will get reimbursement. He would like authorization to make the payment to YakAttack for \$116,000 to allow them to begin their project. He said the TROF funds are secured with a bond, and he recommended that the County provide YakAttack with the \$116,000.

Supervisor Emert made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to authorize the County Administrator to provide payment to YakAttack for \$116,000; the motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said the County has received a letter from STEPS, Inc. regarding the Affordable Housing Coalition. STEPS is attempting to obtain Federal funding of \$3 million to purchase 343 acres at The Manor, most of which is currently owned by the Hampstead Group. He said the acreage includes the Old Manor House, and the property would be used for a mixed income group of houses. Several organizations have expressed their support.

Mr. Bartlett said the County would have to approve any Master Plan and site plan. Hampden Sydney controls what goes on in the CDA area.

Mr. Bartlett said their letter has been sent to seven politicians: Senator Kaine, Senator Warner, Delegate Riggleman, Delegate Spanberger, Delegate Whitman, Delegate Cline, and Delegate McEachin. Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said he has hired one Building & Grounds worker and he has another applicant who is highly qualified; discussion followed.

Supervisor Pride announced she will be holding a Town Meeting Thursday, March 14, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. in the Crawley Forum.

Chairman Wilck called the special meeting to order as the Joint Meeting with Prince Edward County School Board.

Dr. Barbara Johnson, Superintendent, stated she appreciates the Board of Supervisors and the School Board for taking the time to work together to share in the development of the children. She then presented a review of the preliminary School Budget proposal for 2019-2020. Dr. Johnson requested an additional \$591,679 from Local Funds and is receiving approximately \$450,000 more from Federal and State funding, for a total increase of \$1,120,127.

Dr. Johnson reviewed accomplishments and contributions to the community; there is a new vision, mission and strategic plan. She said that part of the strategic plan is making sure they are working in the community and are an asset to the community. She said children painted several VDOT snow plows, and Walmart and the Farmville Jaycees helped to renovate the bathrooms at the Middle School. She added they helped to organize the Youth Leadership Summit with Hampden-Sydney [College] and the Farmville Chamber of Commerce and Cumberland County Public Schools. She said there is a mural that was donated from Monty Montgomery at the Middle School, which is a direct result of our building relationships and

being a part of the Virginia Children's Book Festival. Dr. Johnson said they supported Christmas Mothers, helping to distribute some of the gifts and helping with the pre-packaging. She said they also won the Golden Hammer award by helping with Habitat for Humanity, where the children went out to work on the building in Prospect. She then stated they opened their High School Pantry for the high school students that are in need, with a partnership with the Alliance Club, Centra and the Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Johnson said she is proud of the school system and the community. She said she increased communication with social media and "email and text blasts" to promote what is going on at the schools and the parents and friends can be invited.

Dr. Johnson began a review of the budget. She said the STEM initiative is continuing, she said the support given is not just academic, but also developmental and by providing a safe environment. She said they continue to recruit and retain qualified staff. Dr. Johnson said the budget development begins usually in October, by gathering information and looking for patterns and trends in the data on academic success, absenteeism and tardiness. In late November or early December, each principal and department meet to present what they see as needs for their schools and/or departments. All information is then presented to the School Board.

Dr. Johnson reviewed the Revenue and Expenditure Comparisons. She then presented needs for the upcoming year, which includes a Special Education Early Childhood teacher, an Assistant Principal for the Middle School, two teachers for grade six History and Science, Special Education teacher, and an additional Technology Assistant. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Pride questioned if the Math position has been filled at the Middle School. Dr. Johnson said it has not. Supervisor Pride then asked if that position is in addition to the current requests; Dr. Johnson said that is correct.

Dr. Johnson said that during the meeting with the Finance Committees, a question was raised about the ELL Teacher. At the point where a system has 58 children, the school would need an additional ELL teacher. Currently there are 46 children; 30 of these speak Spanish and the rest are Vietnamese. She said twelve more students would trigger the mandate for the additional teacher.

Discussion followed on the Incentive Programs, Technology VPSA Grant which is an additional \$72,400. Dr. Johnson said the schools can get their server from that funding; the school must have a server,

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as the current servers are nearly at capacity. She said the buses and fleet are being equipped with GPS, and that needs to be completed.

Dr. Johnson said they narrowed the prospective budget increase from \$595,000 to \$447,000. She then said they are looking at a 5% salary increase, which is the state mandated Standard of Quality increase. She said they are receiving \$388,000 from the State for the pay raise, but it will cost Prince Edward County \$749,000. She said the reason is that the State says you have to give 5% for all SOQ-funded positions. She said there are additional positions and this increase must be given to all of the staff. She said that last year, a 2% increase was given to teachers only, along with an update to the salary scale. This year, they are mandated to give a 5% increase.

Dr. Johnson said the total increase from the State is \$528,000. Only \$388,000 is for the supplement. She said if you take away the increase from the state, that leaves \$667,000.

Dr. Johnson then said the health care premiums went down by 2%. She said they are trying to be diligent with the money and they put out a bid to look at different companies and plans; all were between 19%-33% increase, so they will stay with the current company.

Dr. Johnson said the end result is \$591,000 needed to fund these positions. She said there are other things that will be purchased with grant money, such as a Bullying Prevention Program for the middle school students.

Dr. Johnson then reported the elementary school is accredited; she said they are not at their maximum potential but they are working hard and it shows in the efforts of the elementary school, the middle school, and the high schools.

Supervisor Pride said that the 5% [increase] is mandated for SOQs, and asked about increases for other staff, such as the bus drivers, secretaries, and others. Dr. Johnson said the 5% [increase] is across-theboard because the Prince Edward County Schools culture is what is done for one is done for others. She said last year, with the teacher shortage and trying to create incentives, the 2% increase could only be done for teachers because of the large health insurance increase last year. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gilliam entered the meeting at this time.

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Chairman Wilck said this school district has the least Town involvement that he's seen. He said most colleges require certain math courses; if there is no math teacher, that damages a lot of students. He asked if some of the larger businesses and companies might chair a math teacher or another teacher that is necessary. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Pride asked if salary was a determining factor in the lack of a math teacher in the middle school and the high school. Dr. Johnson said they are just that hard to find; salary is a factor, but there is a shortage. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Townsend asked what the total vacancy is now. Ms. Freda Reid stated there are two Special Education vacancies and a History and Social Science position at the high school; two math teachers at the middle school, one of which is math remediation or intervention; and a science position. Dr. Johnson said they started short this school year to begin with to meet the budget demands from last year. She said if they start early enough, they should be able to fill those positions. She said they had to cut \$800,000 last year; they need the staffing back. Discussion followed.

Dr. Johnson said that if a new employee gets a signing bonus, the employee must stay for the full year. She said that policy was enacted because people were leaving mid-year after getting the bonus. She said the schools also offer tuition reimbursement to teachers, but they must stay on for three years.

Supervisor Emert asked if the starting pay for instructors is \$68,000 for Special Education, Sixth grade History and sixth grade Science. Dr. Johnson said that is the average starting pay; she said she cannot guarantee that a teacher coming in is going to start on Level 1.

Supervisor Emert then asked if \$125,000 is the average starting pay for an Assistant Principal for Middle school. Dr. Johnson said it is, but also depends on experience and includes the entire benefits package.

Supervisor Townsend stated he read a report that there was \$100,000+ in grant funds that the school did not get reimbursed because the school did not request reimbursement before the deadline.

Dr. Johnson said it was a delay; the school will get that money and it was approximately \$113,000 for the Detention Center position.

Chairman Womack stated that the walk-through, talked about the Strategic Plan, and said there is a lot of water damage in the Building G, the third-grade building.

Supervisor Townsend said that during the tour of the elementary school, it was observed that the roof is leaking and it appears to be a grading issue with the water behind the building. He said children should not be in classrooms in that that type of environment. He said the water has to be deterred from the building. Supervisor Townsend said no capital issues were mentioned.

Dr. Johnson said she did not make capital issue requests because over the last two years, she stated that eventually they would need to address the buildings, whether they are fixed or having a new building. She said they have started to replace the roof on the elementary building in sections; over the last two years, approximately \$140,000-\$150,000 has been spent on the roof. She said the lower roof and the gymnasium roof would cost approximately \$391,400. She said they have not included any capital projects in the budget. She said a significant amount was spent on the heating and air system with Honeywell, and sections on the roof is being done. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Townsend said the School's improvement plan is included in the County's Capital Improvement Plan. He said they are discussing a contingency line in the budget for capital improvements. He said there is no reason for the Schools to have a CIP and the County to have one, as it's all inclusive. He said if the problems aren't corrected, they will deteriorate and it will be up to the County to pay to fix them. He stated good educators are necessary for the children and the environment must be conducive for learning.

Mr. Bartlett said the County's health insurance increase is 5%; he asked if the Board would like to meet with the Insurance Consultant. The Board agreed.

Mr. Bartlett then said the County has the opportunity to buy a used road tracker for \$7,000 for use at the landfill; that would allow the use of the lowboy to haul equipment to go to the convenience sites to do work. He said a budget increase is not necessary.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to authorize the County Administrator to purchase a used road tracker for \$7,000 for use at the landfill; the motion carried:

Summary:

Shenandoah Cable Television, LLC, doing business as Shentel is requesting to renew the existing Franchise Agreement which was originally adopted in 1993. The Franchise Agreement was last renewed in June of 2010 by resolution effective in December 2008. A representative from Shentel will be at the Board meeting to answer questions.

Per section 15.2-2108.21 of the Code of Virginia such agreements shall have a term of 15 years. Section 15.2-2108.1.1.C of the Code of Virginia states "...no new or renewed cable franchise entered into on or after January 1, 2007 shall include a franchise fee as long as cable services are subject to the Virginia Communications Sales and Use Tax." Shentel is subject to this tax which is capped at 5% per chapter 6.2 of Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia.

Shentel pays this tax directly to the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth then remits to the County our portion as part of the Telecommunication Tax we receive each month.

With deregulation franchise agreements no longer provide exclusive monopolies to cable companies. As stated in the heading this is a non-exclusive franchise meaning any other provider could enter the market if they so wished. No longer having the authority to negotiate the franchise fee, the primary purpose of the franchise agreement is to reach agreement on the use of public rights of way, and to require Shentel to indemnify the County for any work done in the rights of way.

WHEREAS, Franchisee and Franchise Authority have continued to follow and be bound by the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has requested the consent of the Franchise Authority for the renewal of the Franchise in accordance with the requirements of the Franchise and applicable law; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has represented that it will comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority believes that it is in the best interest of the community to approve the renewal of the Franchise granted to Franchisee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FRANCHISE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The Franchise Authority hereby approves and consents to the renewal for a term of ten years of the Franchise, all in accordance with the terms of the Franchise and applicable law and Franchisee shall comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise.

SECTION 2: The Franchise Authority confirms that the renewal term of the Franchise shall be for a term of fifteen (15) years deemed to have commenced on December 14, 2018 and ending on December 13, 2033.

SECTION 3: The Franchise Authority agrees that the pledge of, or grant of a security interest in, the Franchise to any lender(s) of Shenandoah Cable Television, LLC or its affiliates, for the purpose of securing indebtedness, shall not require the consent of Franchise Authority and is hereby authorized.

SECTION 4: This Resolution shall have the force of a continuing agreement with Franchisee, and Franchising Authority shall not revoke, amend or otherwise alter this Resolution without the consent of Franchisee.

RESOLUTION OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VA APPROVING THE RENEWAL OF THE CABLE TELEVISION FRANCHISE

WHEREAS, JetBroadband VA, LLC ("Franchisee") owns, operates, and maintains a cable television system ("System") serving Prince Edward County, Virginia pursuant to a franchise agreement which expired on December 13, 2008 (the "Franchise") issued by Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Franchise Authority"), and Franchisee is the duly authorized holder of the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has requested the consent of the Franchise Authority for the renewal of the Franchise in accordance with the requirements of the Franchise and applicable law; and

WHEREAS, Franchisee has represented that it will comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise; and

WHEREAS, the Franchise Authority believes that it is in the best interest of the community to approve the renewal of the Franchise granted to Franchisee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FRANCHISE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The Franchise Authority hereby approves and consents to the renewal for a term of ten years of the Franchise, all in accordance with the terms of the Franchise and applicable law and Franchise shall comply with the terms and conditions of the Franchise.

SECTION 2: The Franchise Authority confirms that the renewal term of the Franchise shall be for a term of ten (10) years deemed to have commenced on December 14, 2008 and ending on December 13, 2018.

SECTION 3: This Resolution shall have the force of a continuing agreement with Franchisee, and Franchising Authority shall not revoke, amend or otherwise alter this Resolution without the consent of Franchisee.

TO REPRESENT ALL CITIZENS, PROVIDE LEADERSHIP, CREATE VISION AND SET POLICY TO ACCOMPLISH EFFECTIVE CHANGE, PLANNED GROWTH AND PROVIDE ESSENTIAL SERVICES WHILE MAINTAINING AND ENHANCING THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO TELE-MEDIA CORPORATION AND ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS TO OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A COMMUNITY TELEVISION SYSTEM; SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THAT GRANT OF FRANCHISE; PROVIDING FOR THE COUNTY REGULATION OF THE COMMUNITY TELEVISION SYSTEM; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA, THAT

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited the "Community Antenna Television Franchise Ordinance" (Ordinance).

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this Ordinance the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. Terms of art not otherwise defined herein, whether capitalized or not, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act of 1992 (the "1992 Cable Act"). When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

- 2-1 "County" is the unincorporated portion of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia
- 2-2 "Grantee" is Tele-Media Corporation or any person or entity who succeeds Tele-Media Corporation as Grantee hereunder in accordance with the provisions of this Franchise.
- 2-3 County Administrator is the County Administrator of Prince Edward County, Virginia
- 2-4 "Board of Supervisors" is the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia
- 2-5 "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind
- 2-6 "Community Antenna Television System", hereinafter referred to as "CATV System" or "System", means a system of coaxial cables or other electrical conductors and equipment used or to be used primarily to receive television or radio signals directly or indirectly off-the-air and transmit them to subscribers for a fee
- 2-7 "Annual Gross Operating Revenues" means any and all compensation and other consideration derived directly by Grantee from subscribers in the County for regularly furnished Basic CATV service, and shall not include revenues derived from per channel charges, per program charges, leased channel revenues, advertising revenues or taxes on services furnished by Grantee imposed directly on any subscriber or user by any town,

county, state or other governmental unit and collected by Grantee for such governmental unit.

- 2-8 FCC shall mean the Federal Communications Commission
- 2-9 Residential Subscriber (Subscriber) shall mean a purchaser in good standing of any service that a Grantee delivers to any Home provided that service is not utilized in connection with a business, trade or profession.
- 2-10 Home is any single family dwelling unit whether a house, apartment, trailer or rented room.
- 2-11 Local Government Occupied Buildings are those buildings owned in whole or in part by Prince Edward County, Virginia or occupied in whole or part by County officials in furtherance of County government objectives and shall include without limiting the generality of the foregoing all volunteer fire and/or rescue companies located within the County.
- 2-12 Signals shall mean and refer to all frequencies provided by or permitted to be inserted by a Grantee on the System operated by such Grantee.
- 2-13 Streets shall mean all public streets, alleys, public rights of way now laid out or dedicated within the County.
- 2-14 1992 Cable Act is the Cable Television Consumer Protection & Competition Act of 1992 amending the Communications Act of 1934 (the "1992 Cable Act").

SECTION 3. GRANT OF AUTHORITY. There is hereby granted by the County to Grantee the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways, and public places now laid out or dedicated, and all extensions, thereof, and additions thereto in the County, on poles, wires, cable, underground conduits, manholes, and other television conductors and fixtures, and to use poles, wires, cables and other facilities of persons, providing consent is obtained from such persons, necessary for the maintenance and operation in the County a community television system for the interception, sale and distribution of television and radio signals.

- 3-1 Non-exclusive Grant. The right to use and occupy said streets, alleys, public ways and places, or the facilities of other places for the purposes herein set forth shall be nonexclusive, and the County reserves the right to grant a similar use of said streets, alleys, public ways and places, to any person at any time during the period of the Franchise.
- 3-2 No franchise granted hereunder shall limit Grantee to serving only one portion of the

County, it being the intent of this Ordinance to allow Grantee to construct, operate and maintain a CATV System to all unserved portions of the County to which they desire to extend such service, subject only to the requirements of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. RATES. The County specifically retains all rights to regulate the rates for the provision of cable service subject to the provisions of relevant Federal and State legislation.

SECTION 5. COMPANY LIABILITY - INDEMNIFICATION. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between Grantee and the County that Grantee shall, and does by its acceptance of this Ordinance specifically agree to save the County harmless from all losses sustained by the County on account of any suit, judgement, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from the granting of this Franchise. The above shall include, but shall not be limited to damages arising out of copyright infringement and all other damages arising out of the installation, operation or maintenance of the CATV System authorized herein, whether or not any act or omission complained of is authorized, allowed, or prohibited by this Franchise.

- 5-1 Grantee, by its acceptance of this Ordinance, specifically agrees that it shall maintain throughout the term of its Franchise, liability insurance, insuring the County and the Grantee against all claims or damages in the minimum amounts of at least:
 - (1) \$1,000,000 for bodily injury or death to any one person, and \$1,000,000 for bodily injury or death resulting from any one accident.
 - (2) \$1,000,000 for property damages resulting from any one accident.
 - (3) All of the foregoing insurance contracts shall be issued and maintained by companies authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Virginia and acceptable to the County and said contracts shall provide for thirty (30) days written notice of any cancellation to both the County and the Grantee herein.

SECTION 6. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS AND ORDINANCES. Grantee shall, at all times during the life of its Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercises of the police power by the County and to such reasonable regulation as the County, State or Federal Government shall hereafter provide. Any lawful modification resulting from amendment of Cable Operational Rules and Technical Standards Part 76 of the Rules and Regulations of the FCC shall be incorporated into this Ordinance on the date such modifications become obligatory under federal regulations, or in the event no obligatory date is established, within one year of adoption, or at the time of the renewal of the terms of its Franchise, which ever occurs first.

SECTION 7. TERRITORIAL AREA INVOLVED. This Ordinance relates to the present unincorporated areas of the County.

- 7 1Except as provided in Section 7-2 of this Ordinance, Grantee shall provide service to all Persons requesting such within the County, contiguous to Grantee's existing System, as long as it is economically feasible to do so. As used herein "economically feasible" shall mean that there are at least 28 occupied homes per linear mile and shall be based upon a measurement taken from the outermost extremity of the potential extension area back through and measured along the shortest path of available streets, alleys, public right of ways and public places now laid out or dedicated for such, inclusive of limited access and private easements.
- 7-2 Grantee shall be entitle to recover from each Person desiring to become a Subscriber, whose home is contiguous to Grantee's existing System, in those instances where the economically feasible requirements of Section 7-1 of this Ordinance are not met, the direct, total cost of that portion of combined trunk and feeder line extension which exceeds one hundred fifty feet and shall be based upon a measurement taken from the outermost extremity of the line extension area back through and measured along the shortest path of available streets, alleys, public ways and public places now laid out or dedicated for such, inclusive of all limited access and private easements, and including any existing System contiguous thereto from which an extension can be made. Each Person along the extension area shall share on a pro-rata footage basis the direct total cost of constructing the line extension pursuant to the following payment plan: 1/3 thereof to be paid prior to Grantee's ordering all required line extension materials, 1/3 thereof to be paid upon delivery of all required line extension materials and prior to Grantee's commencing construction of the line extension and the final 1/3 thereof to be paid prior to Grantee's connecting each person to the System as a Residential Subscriber. Each Person not initially contributing to the direct total cost of the line extension pursuant to the payment plan specified in this section or in the instance of each additional home constructed and occupied along the line extension or in the instance of a home in existence and not occupied at the time of construction of the line extension, shall prior to Grantee's connecting such Person to Grantee's System as a Residential Subscriber reimburse each Person who made the initial payment pursuant to the payment plan

specified in this section on a pro-rata footage basis.

- 7-3 Each person contributing toward the direct total cost of the line extension agrees to waive all ownership interest in the line extension. All equipment and components of the line extension, including but not limited to cable wire, electronics and pedestals shall at all times remain the exclusive property of the Grantee.
- 7-4 Grantee shall install a CATV service drop line to Residential Subscribers of a home requesting such. The cost of the service line installation will be at the rate specified in Grantee's prevailing schedule of Installation Charges.

SECTION 8. APPLICATION TO FCC. Grantee shall, within sixty (60) days from the date of the acceptance of its Franchise, make proper application to the FCC for all permits, licenses or approvals required by law for the construction and operation of a CATV System and shall promptly and diligently pursue the granting of all applicable FCC permits.

SECTION 9. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SYSTEM. Grantee shall operate its Cable System as required by the FCC's Rules and Regulations, including any and all minimum standards, and updates thereof, prescribed by the FCC pursuant to the provisions of Section 16 of the 1992 Cable Act (amending Section 624 (e) of the Communications Act of 1934), and, pending the FCC's adoption of the aforereferenced standards, shall ensure compliance with all provisions of FCC Rule Section 76.605 (Technical Standards), and any amendments thereto, throughout all parts of the County to which it provides service.

Grantee shall render efficient service, respond to Subscriber service problems and correct malfunctions as promptly as possible, and, under normal circumstances, shall respond immediately to service outages involving more than one Subscriber in a localized service area and shall respond to service outages involving an individual Subscriber only by the end of the business day next following receipt of notice of such outage, taking into consideration safety and force majeure circumstances.

Grantee shall maintain a local business office or agent which Subscribers may telephone during regular business hours without incurring added toll charges so that CATV maintenance service shall be promptly available. Grantee shall maintain an emergency maintenance phone available to all Subscribers on a toll-free basis.

Grantee shall comply with customer service standards established by the FCC pursuant to Section 8 of the "1992 Cable Act" (amending Section 632 of the Communications Act of 1934) upon adoption by the FCC of such standards.

SECTION 10. RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING OPERATION. Grantee shall render its service in accordance with the rules and regulations as specified herein, in the County now applicable to their operation, or such rules and regulations as may be hereafter promulgated by the County or by any public regulatory agency of the State of Virginia or the United States.

SECTION 11. COMPLIANCE WITH THE CABLE ACT AND THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION. Grantee and the County shall, at all times, comply in all material respects with the provisions of the "1992 Cable Act" and the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the FCC, as the same may be amended from time to time, with respect to the operation of the System. This obligation shall include adherence in all material aspects by Grantee to the Rules and Regulations of the FCC with respect to technical and engineering specifications involved in the construction of CATV Systems and signal carriage therein and adherence in all material respects by the County with the obligations applicable to a "franchising authority" under the "1992 Cable Act". In order to inform the residents of the County as to the channel carriage and programming the System, Grantee will utilize local advertising.

SECTION 12. PROGRAM ALTERATION. All programs of broadcasting stations carried by Grantee shall be carried in their entirely as received, with announcements and advertisement and without additions.

SECTION 13. SERVICE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT OCCUPIED BUILDINGS AND COUNTY SCHOOLS AND PUBLIC SCHOOLS. Upon request from the County, Grantee shall install one (1) cable television service drop connecting one (1) television set for the reception of Basic Service, as such is currently and hereinafter defined, in each of the County's municipal owned buildings, fire department main building and rescue squad main building. Such installation and monthly service to one (1) television outlet shall be at no cost to the County, fire department and rescue squad. Installation of additional television sets will be billed to the County Administrator in accordance with Grantee's prevailing installation and monthly service charges or if custom work is required, at time and materials.

SECTION 14. EMERGENCY USE OF FACILITIES. In the case of any emergency or disaster, Grantee shall, upon request of the Board of Supervisors, make its facilities accessible to the County for use during such emergency or disaster period, provided such access is technically feasible, subject to such standards as the FCC may prescribe pursuant to Section 16 (b) of the 1992 Cable Act (amending Section 624 of the Communications Act of 1934 relating to emergency information).

SECTION 15. OTHER BUSINESS ACTIVITIES.

(a) Grantee hereunder shall not engage in the business of selling, repairing, or installing television receivers, radio receivers or accessories for such receivers within the County during the term of its Franchise.

(b) This Ordinance authorizes only the operation of a CATV System as provided for herein, and does not take the place of any other franchise, license, or permit which might be required by Grantee.

SECTION 16. PROMULGATION OF RULES. Grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the proper operation of the CATV System, and to assure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its Subscribers. Provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not violate provisions hereof or the laws of the State of Virginia or of the United States.

SECTION 17, SAFETY REQUIREMENTS.

- (a) Grantee shall at all times employ ordinary care and shall install and maintain in use commonly accepted methods and devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damage, injuries, or nuisance to the public.
- (b) Grantee shall install and maintain its wires, cables, fixtures, and other equipment in accordance with the requirements of the National Electric Code, and in such manner that they will not interfere with any installation to the County or of a public utility serving the County.
- (c) All structures, and all lines, equipment and connections in, over, under and upon streets, sidewalks, alleys and public ways and places of the County, where ever situated or located, shall at all times be kept and maintained in a safe, suitable, substantial condition, and in good order and repair.

SECTION 18. CONDITIONS OF STREET OCCUPANCY.

- 18-1 Use. All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by grantee or used in other poles or facilities within the County shall be so located as to cause minimum interference with the proper use of streets, alleys and other public ways and places to cause minimum interference with the rights of reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of the said streets, alleys, or other public ways and places.
- 18-2 <u>Restoration</u>. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by the County Administrator or his duly appointed agent, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of

any street or alley disturbed in as good conditions as before said work was commenced.

- 18-3 <u>Relocation</u>. In the event that at any time during the period of Grantee's Franchise the State or County shall lawfully elect to alter, or change the grade of any street, alley or other public way, or to alter, change, or install public utilities, Grantee, upon reasonable notice by the State or County, shall remove, relay, and relocate its poles, wires, cables, and underground conduits, manholes and other fixtures at its own expense.
- 18-4 <u>Placement of Fixture</u>. Grantee shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any gas, electric or telephone fixture, water hydrant, or water and sewer mains, and all such poles or other fixtures placed in any street or otherwise shall be placed within the dedicated easements for such and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets, alleys and public ways, all to be approved by the County Administrator, or his duly appointed agent of said County and in accordance with existing County policy.
- 18-5 Temporary Removal of Wire for Building Moving. Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the County, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and shall not exceed the actual costs of the Grantee. Grantee shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. Grantee shall be given no less than three (3) days advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.
- 18-6 <u>Tree Trimming</u>. Grantee shall have the authority to trim trees upon an overhanging street, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the County so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of the County and at Grantee's expense.

SECTION 19. PREFERENTIAL OR DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES PROHIBITED. Grantee shall not, as to rates, charges, service facilities, rules, regulations or in any other respect, make or grant any preference or advantage, provided nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale or charges for bulk billed multiple installations at the same time or within the same building, nor shall it be deemed to prohibit the Grantee from providing free basic service to County schools, or local government occupied buildings.

SECTION 20. REMOVAL OF FACILITIES UPON REQUEST. Upon termination of service to any subscriber, Grantee shall

promptly remove all its facilities and equipment from the premises of such Subscriber upon request of the Subscriber.

SECTION 21. COUNTY RIGHT IN FRANCHISE.

- 21-1 <u>County Rules</u>. The right is hereby reserved by the County to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained and existing applicable ordinances, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of the police power, provided that such regulations, by ordinance, or otherwise, shall be reasonable, and not in conflict with the rights herein granted and shall not be in conflict with the laws of the State of Virginia or of the United States.
- 21-2 Use of System by County. The County shall have the right during the life of Grantee's Franchise to install and maintain free of charge upon the poles of Grantee any wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police or fire alarm system so long as such wires and pole fixtures do not interfere with the CATV operation of Grantee and are installed in accordance with the requirements of the National Electric Code.
- 21-3 <u>Supervision and Inspection</u>. The County shall have the right to supervise all construction or installation work performed subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and to make such inspections as it shall find necessary to insure compliance with governing ordinances.
- 21-4 <u>Procedure after Expiration of Franchise</u>. At the end of the Franchise term, the County shall have the right to determine whether Grantee shall continue to operate and maintain its System pending the decision of the County as to the granting of another Franchise for its future maintenance and operation of such System.

SECTION 22. PAYMENT TO THE COUNTY. Grantee shall pay to the County annually the amount equal to five percent (5%) as is currently allowable in Section 14 of the "1992 Cable Act", or such higher percentage as may be subsequently allowable under Section 14 or any other applicable statue, of the Annual Gross Operating Revenues during the year for the use of the streets and other facilities of the County in operation of the CATV System and for County supervision thereof. Such fee shall be paid not later than one hundred fifteen (115) days after the close of the Grantee's fiscal year.

SECTION 23. RECORDS AND REPORTS. The County shall have access during normal business hours to all of the Grantee's plans, contracts, and engineering, accounting, financial, statistical, customer and service records relating to the property and operation of Grantee and to all other records required to be kept hereunder; provided that nothing contained herein shall be construed to allow the County or any other person(s) access to any personally

identifiable information concerning any Subscriber.

- 23-1 <u>Company Rules and Regulations</u>. Grantee shall have the right to adopt reasonable rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business. Copies of such rules, regulations, terms and conditions adopted by the Grantee for the conduct of its business shall be available to Subscribers and to the County.
- 23-2 <u>Gross Revenue</u>. Grantee shall file an annual summary report showing gross revenue received by the Grantee from its operations with the County during the preceding year and such other information as the County shall request and such other properties and expenses related to the Grantee's services within the County.

SECTION 24. TERM OF FRANCHISE. The Franchise and rights granted hereunder shall take effect and be in force from and after the final passage thereof, as provided by law and upon filing of acceptance and all other instruments required herein by Grantee with the Board of Supervisors, and shall continue in force and effect for a term of fifteen (15) years.

SECTION 25. TRANSFER OF FRANCHISE. Grantee shall not sell or transfer its CATV System, nor transfer any rights under a Franchise to another person without prior written approval by the Board of Supervisors and such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. No sale or transfer shall thereafter be effective until the vendee, assignee or lessee has filed in the office of the County Administrator an instrument, duly executed, reciting the fact of such sale, assignment or lease.

SECTION 26. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 27. PENALTIES. Any violation by Grantee, its vendee, lessee or successor, of the provisions of this Franchise or any material portions thereof, or the failure promptly to perform any of the provisions thereof, shall be cause for the forfeiture of this Franchise and all rights hereunder to the County after written notice to Grantee and continuation of such violation, failure or default.

SECTION 28. SIGNAL QUALITY REQUIREMENTS; SERVICE TO BE PROVIDED.

- (1) Grantee shall engineer, install, maintain, operate and equip the System herein provided so as to meet the technical standard of the FCC and the 1992 Cable Act.
- (2) The signals distributed by Grantee shall be the best possible signals available under the

circumstances existing at the time and shall provide the best possible quality reception to each Subscriber.

(3) Grantee shall demonstrate by instruments and otherwise to the Board of Supervisors that a signal of adequate strength and quality is being delivered.

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(4) The following channels shall be available through the Community Antenna Television System, subject to the provisions of Section 4 and Section 5 of the 1992 Cable Act and any subsequent enactment governing channel carriage:

SECTION 29. FRANCHISE REVOCATION.

(a) Whenever Grantee shall refuse, neglect or willfully fail to construct, operate or maintain its cable television system or to provide service to its Subscribers in substantial accordance with the terms of this Ordinance and any agreement representing the grant of a Franchise, or any applicable rule or regulation, or materially breaches its Franchise Agreement, or practices any fraud or deceit upon the County or its Subscribers within the County or if such Franchisee becomes insolvent, as adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction, or is unwilling or unable to pay its uncontested debts, or is adjudged bankrupt, or seeks relief under the bankruptcy laws, then the Franchise may be revoked.

(b) In the event the County believes that grounds for revocation exist or have existed, it will notify Grantee in writing, setting forth the facts on which such belief is grounded. If, within thirty (30) days following such written notification, the Grantee has not furnished reasonably satisfactory evidence that corrective action has been taken or is being actively and expeditiously pursued, or that the alleged violations did not occur, or that the alleged violations, except those involving financial matters, were beyond Grantee's control, the County may call and give notice of a hearing to consider revocation of Grantee's Franchise. If the County, following such hearing, finds that grounds for revocation exist, it may thereupon by Ordinance duly adopted revoke for cause the Franchise granted to Grantee.

SECTION 30. NOTICE REQUIREMENTS FOR MATTERS AFFECTING EXISTING FRANCHISE. Every direction, notice or order to be served upon Grantee, shall be sent certified return receipt to the office designated by Grantee whose address shall be provided to the Board of Supervisors before the Grantee commences operation of his System. Every notice to be served upon the Board of Supervisors shall be delivered to the County Administrator's Office, 111 South Street, Courthouse Annex Building, Farmville, Virginia. The delivery of such notice shall be deemed to have been at the time of receipt.

SECTION 31. AMENDMENTS TO THIS ORDINANCE. At any time during the term of any Franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance, the County or Grantee may propose amendments to this Franchise Ordinance by giving written notice of such proposed amendments to all other parties directly affected by such proposals and the County and Grantee shall within a reasonable time after such notice negotiate in good faith to agree on a mutually satisfactory amendment.

SECTION 32. ACCEPTANCE OF FRANCHISE. No Franchise shall be deemed as granted pursuant to this Ordinance unless such grant be approved by a Resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors and within thirty (30) days after such approval the applicant therefore acknowledges, in a writing provided by the County, its acceptance of the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 33. FORCE MAJEURE. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary herein, neither the County nor any

Grantee shall be held liable for, or suffer any penalty or detriment for, any failure to comply with any provision of this Ordinance or any Franchise granted hereunder, if such failure to comply arises from any act of God or any other condition not within the reasonable control of such noncomplying person.

Issue:	Request for Local Tax Exemption Request

Summary: The President of Farmville Area Community Emergency Services (FACES) has submitted a request for all of its facilitates, vehicles and equipment to be exempt from local taxation. FACES is in the process of expanding its operations and has acquired 2.5 acres of land valued at \$250,000. It is their intention to erect a 7,000 sqft building on the property.

Prior to January 1, 2003 the Constitution of Virginia required all organizations requesting tax exempt status for both State and Local taxation be approved by a vote of both houses of the General Assembly. Effective January 1, 2003 the Constitution of Virginia was amended and the decision-making authority regarding local tax exemption was transferred from the General Assembly to the local governing body. The organizations previously designated as tax-exempt by the General Assembly have maintained that status and are listed in sections 58.1-3650.1 through 58.1-3650.1001.

Section 58.1-3651 of the Code of Virginia contains the process by which a local government can designate an organization as being tax-exempt from local taxation, Attachment (1). This requires the Board of Supervisors to adopt an ordinance exempting the property of FACES from local taxation but only after holding a public hearing with a notice of the hearing being published at least once in a local newspaper.

The following organizations in Prince Edward County were exempted from taxation by the General Assembly prior to 2003 – SCOPE, STEPS, Crossroads. All YMCAs are specifically exempted per Section 58.1-3606.5. Also exempted, per Section 58.1-3606.6, are the building, the land it occupies and the FF&E of any benevolent or charitable organization and used exclusively for lodge purposes or meeting rooms, such as the Moose and Elk lodges.

§ 58.1-3651. Property exempt from taxation by classification or designation by ordinance adopted by local governing body on or after January 1, 2003.

A. Pursuant to subsection 6 (a)(6) of Article X of the Constitution of Virginia, on and after January 1, 2003, any county, city, or town may by designation or classification exempt from real or personal property taxes, or both, by ordinance adopted by the local governing body, the real or personal property, or both, owned by a nonprofit organization, including a single member limited liability company whose sole member is a nonprofit organization, that uses such property for religious, charitable, patriotic, historical, benevolent, cultural, or public park and playground purposes. The ordinance shall state the specific use on which the exemption is based, and continuance of the exemption shall be contingent on the continued use of the property in accordance with the purpose for which the organization is classified or designated. No exemption shall be provided to any organization that has any rule, regulation, policy, or practice that unlawfully discriminates on the basis of religious conviction, race, color, sex, or national origin.

B. Any ordinance exempting property by designation pursuant to subsection A shall be adopted only after holding a public hearing with respect thereto, at which citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard. The local governing body shall publish notice of the hearing once in a newspaper of general circulation in the county, city, or town where the real property is located. The notice shall include the assessed value of the real and tangible personal property for which an exemption is requested as well as the property taxes assessed against such property. The public hearing shall not be held until at least five days after the notice is published in the newspaper. The local governing body shall collect the cost of publication from the organization requesting the property tax exemption. Before adopting any such ordinance the governing body shall consider the following questions:

1. Whether the organization is exempt from taxation pursuant to § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954;

2. Whether a current annual alcoholic beverage license for serving alcoholic beverages has been issued by the Board of Directors of the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Authority to such organization, for use on such property;

3. Whether any director, officer, or employee of the organization is paid compensation in excess of a reasonable allowance for salaries or other compensation for personal services which such director, officer, or employee actually renders;

4. Whether any part of the net earnings of such organization inures to the benefit of any individual, and whether any significant portion of the service provided by such organization is generated by funds received from donations, contributions, or local, state or federal grants. As used in this subsection, donations shall include the providing of personal services or the contribution of inkind or other material services;

5. Whether the organization provides services for the common good of the public;

6. Whether a substantial part of the activities of the organization involves carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation and whether the organization participates in, or intervenes in, any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office;

7. The revenue impact to the locality and its taxpayers of exempting the property; and

8. Any other criteria, facts and circumstances that the governing body deems pertinent to the adoption of such ordinance.

C. Any ordinance exempting property by classification pursuant to subsection A shall be adopted only after holding a public hearing with respect thereto, at which citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard. The local governing body shall publish notice of the hearing once in a newspaper of general circulation in the county, city, or town. The public hearing shall not be held until at least five days after the notice is published in the newspaper.

D. Exemptions of property from taxation under this article shall be strictly construed in accordance with Article X, Section 6 (f) of the Constitution of Virginia.

E. Nothing in this section or in any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall affect the validity of either a classification exemption or a designation exemption granted by the General Assembly prior to January 1, 2003, pursuant to Article 2 (§ 58.1-3606 et seq.), 3 (§ 58.1-3609 et seq.) or 4 (§ 58.1-3650 et seq.) of this chapter. An exemption granted pursuant to Article 4 (§ 58.1-3650 et seq.) of this chapter may be revoked in accordance with the provisions of § 58.1-3605.

Summary: Cumberland County is requesting that the Prince Edward Board of Supervisors approve amendments to the joint Prince Edward/Cumberland Solid Waste Management Plan. Cumberland approved the proposed amendments at its February 12, 2019 Board meeting (Attachment (1). Please note that the attached document does not contain any of the appendices because, none of those were amended in any way. The attached document does contain, all of the changes approved by Cumberland County. The substantive changes are primarily found on pages 13-18 of the document, though other relevant amendments may be found throughout. The need to amend the document was to remove the Allied/Republic landfill as a solid waste disposal option, and to replace that facility with the proposed Green Ridge facility. The Allied/Republic facility will not be constructed. The company has gone so far as to contact DEQ to surrender their part A and part B permits for the construction of the landfill.

In order for the Green Ridge landfill project to proceed, Prince Edward County must adopt/approve the amended document. While Cumberland County had to hold a public hearing before approving the amendments Prince Edward does not. Per section 9 VAC 20-130-130 of the Virginia Administrative Code when a Solid Waste Management Plan includes multiple localities, the locality submitting a major plan amendment only has to conduct a public hearing in the County involved in the major amendment.

While we are looking at the plan, I am recommending a few minor amendments be made to reflect changes to operating practices that have occurred over the last few years. These are (1) Amending Chapter 4 to (a) reflect the County now operates 7 convenience centers not 6; (b) that the County no longer recycles any glass; (c) that tires and white goods are collected at the convenience sites; (d) more landfill cells have been constructed; (e) the County now operates the landfill and (f) the County's fund balance is larger – (2) Amending Chapter 5 to state the site life is based on updated data – (3) Amending Chapter 7 to eliminate the sentence stating the County plans to open a convenience site in Pamplin. These are considered minor plan amendments and do not require a public hearing prior to approval by the Board.

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CHAPTER 1 -INTRODUCTION

_____A. Background

This Solid Waste Management Plan represents a revision of the original Regional Solid Waste Management Plan, dated July 1, 1991 and subsequent update of that regional plan on July 1, 1997. The original plan and the subsequent update were prepared by the Piedmont Planning District Commission (PPDC). This plan is a "sub-regional" plan involving two of the six counties that were sponsors of the previous planning efforts: Prince Edward County and Cumberland County.

This sub-regional approach was the culmination of several meetings of the Piedmont Planning District Commission and a Solid Waste Management Planning Forum. All of these -meetings were open to the public for comments and input. A detailed account of each of these meetings is presented in Appendix A. An overview of each of these meetings is provided below:

At the April3, -2003 full commission meeting, two representatives of the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) made a presentation regarding the requirements of the Regulations for Solid Waste Management Planning, Amendment 1. During the discussion that ensued, several people questioned whether they could provide an update to the old plan. The DEQ response was that the localities can review their old plan, bring it up to date, and submit it to the DEQ. Several commissioners expressed concern that the update of the solid waste plan represented an unfunded mandate. The discussion concluded with the consensus of the Commissioners being to take the regional approach for the preparation of the Solid Waste Management Plan.

On April1<u>1</u>7, -2003, the PPDC held an open-t;t forum pertaining to Solid Waste Management Planning for the region. As a result of the discussions held regarding the three approaches identified by PPDC staff:

- 1) Individual plans for each jurisdiction
- 2) Mini-Regional Plans
- 3) Regional Plan

It was determined that the majority of the localities were leaning towards Options 1 and 2. PPDC, therefore, concluded that there was no consensus for the development of a regional solid waste plan.

At the May 1, 2003 full commission -meeting, the Solid Waste Management Plan status was a major agenda item with a status report from the Executive Director that provided the results of the April 17, 2003 solid waste planning forum and a recommendation that PPDC suspend further consideration of the development of a regional plan, but be prepared to provide technical assistance to interested localities regarding demographic statistical data. The matter was tabled by the PPDC for further discussion at a subsequent meeting.

At the June 5, 2003 full commission -meeting, an update of the Solid Waste Management Plan status was again provided by the Executive Director of the PPDC. Only one other locality had sent a letter to PPDC regarding its preference regarding the three options (approaches) to the development of a solid waste management plan. It was reported that this did not change the weighted preference of options chosen and, therefore, it was determined that there remained no consensus for a regional Solid Waste Management Plan.

As a consequence of these meetings and the stated preferences of a majority of the localities within the PPDC, Prince Edward County and Cumberland County decided to develop a sub-regional plan that would be used to guide the management of the solid wastes generated within their respective jurisdictions for the duration of the 20-year planning period.

B. Purpose

The Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) for Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties has been prepared to meet the requirements and provisions of the Regulations for Solid Waste Management Planning (9 VAC 20-130-10 et seq., Amendment 1). This sub-regional plan is the outgrowth of the PPDC meetings highlighted above. The Plan will:

- describe the existing solid waste management infrastructure of the two counties;
- define future solid waste management needs; and
- describe the preferred waste management systems.

C. Scope

The Plan includes discussions on the following elements of the solid waste management spectrum for the municipal solid waste (MSW) generated within the two counties:

- generation;
- collections;

- recycling; and
 - disposal

The plan considers the elements of the Solid Waste Management Hierarchy as they relate, in a practical manner, to the relevant demographic characteristics of the service area. The hierarchy ranks methods of solid waste management from most preferred to least preferred as follows:

- Source Reduction
- Reuse
- Recycling
- Resource Recovery (Waste to- Energy)
- Incineration
- Landfilling

The Plan does not address infectious medical wastes and other items not normally considered as MSW such as:

- radioactive wastes;
- sewage sludges and biosolids;
- industrial wastes; and
- hazardous wastes (as defined by the Virginia Hazardous Waste Management Regulations)

D. Plan Development Responsibilities

The Plan has been developed by Prince Edward County in collaboration with Cumberland County. Prince Edward County has retained the services of Resource International, Ltd., to assist it in developing the sub-regional plan and providing technical input.

E. Plan Development and Adoption

The Plan was developed in the second quarter of calendar year (CY) 2004. It was formally adopted early during the third quarter of CY 2004. Copies of the resolutions of Plan approval from each of the two jurisdictions are included as Appendix B. A public hearing on the Plan was held on June 28, 2004, at the Prince Edward County Courthouse. The results of the public hearing are included in Appendix C. A public hearing on the Plan was conducted on July 13, 2004 at the Cumberland County Courthouse. The results of the public hearing are included in Appendix C. The Plan was submitted to the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (VDEQ) on July 1, 2004, with the resolutions and public hearing results submitted in follow-up correspondence to the VDEQ.

F. **DEQ Review Process**

Correspondence from the DEQ dated November 12,2004 was received on or about November 22,2004 to which was attached DEQ's "Waste Management Plan Completeness Review" checklist. In response to the completeness review comments, the Prince Edward County and Cumberland County Solid Waste Management Plan was revised and re-submitted to the DEQ on February 10, 2005.

In a letter dated June 28, 2006, the DEQ submitted it's Technical Review Comments regarding the Prince Edward County and Cumberland County Solid Waste Management Plan. Responses to the Technical Review Comments were developedby Resource International and submitted to DEQ on August 31, 2006. On December 7, 2006, DEQ requested that the Plan include all solid waste facilities currently within Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties as they appear in DEQ's database. This listing of active, inactive, and closed facilities is incorporated as Appendix G. Appendix I is a copy of the DEQ approval letter of the "original" Solid Waste Management Plan.

G. Intent to Amend Plan

The Plan is currently being amended to reflect preliminary information about a planned municipal waste landfill facility to be located in Cumberland County. Information regarding existing facilities is already incorporated into this Plan. Addition of the planned facility to the Plan will require a major amendment to the current Plan and requires public participation. Documentation from the public participation/hearings, responses to citizen comments and the final outcome of the anticipated board resolution process <u>will be</u> is included in Appendix H. Additional or updated information about the planned facility that becomes available will be incorporated into the Plan prior to the VADEQ's final review and acceptance of the Amended Plan.

CHAPTER 2 -SERVICE AREA DESCRIPTION




FIGURE 1 SERVICE AREA NOTE: ALL LOCATIONS ARE APPROXIMATE.

The service area encompassed within the Plan is shown graphically in Figure 1.


A. Existing Development Trends

The information within this Section (2.A) and the following section (2.B) has been primarily derived from the PPDC 2003 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy. The planning district within which Prince Edward and Cumberland County are a part of is described as "one of the most economically challenged regions in the State of Virginia". Both Prince Edward County and Cumberland County are largely rural with few large industries and manufacturing facilities. Approximately 71% of the Prince Edward County work force finds employment within the County. This compares with 29% for Cumberland County. Unemployment rates for the two counties from the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC) indicates a slight increase in unemployment for both counties between 2001 and 2002. Cumberland County's unemployment rate increased from about 2.4% to 2.9% during this period and Prince Edward County's increased from about 3.9% to 4.9%. Overall, in the State of Virginia, the rates increased from about 3.6% to 4.1%. Table 1 is an update of Table 3 that appeared in the July 1, 1997 Solid Waste Plan prepared by the PPDC.

This in tUurn, often inhibits growth in the locality or region because investments in needed infrastructures do not happen or are slow to occur. This situation is aggravated where unemployment rates are elevated. As can be seen from the previous Table, the unemployment rate for Prince Edward County remains above the state-wide average.

Environmentally-sound Solid Waste Management within the two counties remains a significant public function that demands a continuing allocation of resources. Along with highways, railroads, water, wastewater, schools and healthcare providers, well run and funded waste management facilities are an attraction to industrial, commercial, and residential development.

B. Future Development Trends

It can be seen from review of Tables 1 and 2, that unemployment within Cumberland County and Prince Edward County has been relatively steady since 1995. Whether this trend continues depends upon a number of factors, some of which are beyond the control or influence of Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties (Federal environmental regulations and tax codes; outsourcing; fossil fuel supplies, etc.).

However, population projections (provided by the Virginia Employment Commission) that span the period of this Plan and then some, show a continued modest increase in the population of both Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties over the next several decades (as can be seen from Table 3).

The percent increase in the total population for the 20-_year period 2000 to 2020 is projected to be 24.9%. That fraction of the infrastructure dealing with solid waste management and disposal must be in place to accommodate the needs associated

with this forecast of the population within the planning area. In a subsequent chapter we will see that, in-deed, it does.

Although there has been a service decline noted in the railroad section of the transportation infrasturtureinfrastructure serving the planning area, the highway infrastructure with east-west Route 60 (Cumberland County), east-west Route 460 (Prince Edward County) and the north_"south Route 15 corridors remain strong with good development potential associated with their current design.

With the reasonable possibility that Route 60 will be improved to a four-lane corridor through Cumberland County; Route 15 would likewise be improved to a four-lane corridor; and Route 460/360 be incorporated in a limited access interstate style system connecting the east coast to the mid-west (the TransAmerica Corridor) significant industrial, commercial, and residential development could occur during the latter half of the planning period.

CHAPTER 3- GENERAL GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

A. Goals

These remain the same as those espoused in the 1997 Solid Waste Management Plan Update for Solid Waste District 14 prepared by the Piedmont Planning District Commission.

- Solid Waste Management and disposal to be carried out in accordance with pertinent Federal, State, and Local plans, regulations and land use policies such that protection of the natural environment and the health and well-being of the public is achieved. This is to be accomplished in such a manner that the natural assets of Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties (its soil, water and air) are utilized wisely for the common good of the public.
- Develop, operate, and maintain solid waste management facilities and programs in an efficient and timely fashion to meet the solid waste management needs of the jurisdictions covered by this plan.

B. Objectives

- Establish and maintain an on-going planning, Plan amendment, and Plan implementation process to meet the future solid waste management needs of Prince Edward and Cumberland Counties.
- Provide adequate flexibility in the Plan to provide for unforeseen needs, events, or situations; utilization of new facilities that may come on-line; and incorporation of new technologies.
- Establish an integrated waste management strategy focusing on the recycling and landfilling elements of the solid waste management hierarchy.
- Continue to strive to meet or exceed state mandated recycling rate_of 15% for rural localities.

C. Milestones

Milestones for the development of disposal cells at the Prince Edward County Landfill and milestones for phased closures are presented in Appendix D.

CHAPTER 4- EXISTING SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM




FIGURE 2 SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT FACILITIES

Figure 2 shows the existing active solid waste management sites within or near the Plan area. The only landfill within the Plan area is the Prince Edward County Landfill. There is one existing private regional landfill within Amelia County which is adjacent to both Prince Edward County and Cumberland County to the east.

A. Prince Edward -County

Collection of municipal solid wastes generated within the County is left up to the individual homeowner or business. The generator may elect to contract with a private hauler to remove wastes from the premises, or may elect transporting the wastes to one of six-seven public convenience centers or two" roll-on/roll-off-sites-that are located throughout the County. From these facilities the County transports the wastes to the County Landfill for disposal.

Recycling containers are located at each of the public convenience centers. Materials collected for recycling include clear container glass (brown and greenglass was dropped from the program in 2002), plastics, newsprint, and cardboard. Small truck and passenger car tires and white goods are collected at <u>these thelandfill</u>. Recycled materials are processed locally by a private firm. Except within the Town of Farmville, it is up to the generators to take their recyclables to these facilities. The Town of Farmville provides curbside pick-up of plastics, newsprint,and clear glass. A private firm in the area picks up cardboard from some businesses within the County. For calendar year (CY) 2003, Prince Edward County realized a recycling rate of 13.24%. For CY 2005 it was 20.4%. This represents an increase of 54.1% over the CY 2003 recycling rate.


There currently are no solid waste treatment programs within Prince Edward County as that term is defined in the VSWMR. There are currently no plans to implement any such programs in the future. If there are advances in solid waste management technology that would result in plans to implement given treatment processes, the Solid Waste Management Plan will be revised to reflect the change or changes.

Prince Edward County currently utilizes inmate work crews, overseen by VDOC and scheduled by VDOT, to keep primary and some secondary highways clear of litter. In addition, individuals who receive community service sentences are assigned to other secondary roads within the County to pick-up litter. These individuals usually have to pick up a certain amount of trash, (measured in filled bags) to successfully complete their sentences.



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In the future, Prince Edward County plans to augment these two programs with an "Assign-a-Highway" program. In this program, judges will assign a stretch or segment of a highway to individuals who are on probation or parole. The individuals would be responsible for periodically picking up litter along the assigned highway during the time the court oversees them. Prince Edward County operates its own Subtitle D Landfill. It constructed its third-fifth lined cell, Cell C-E in the Summer of $2004 \ 2017$. The capital costs associated with the continued operation of

the landfill as related to new disposal cell construction and partial closures are shown in Appendix D.

The Prince Edward County Sanitary Landfill is located off of State Route 648 in Prince Edward. The nearby counties of Buckingham and Cumberland also have used the facility. The landfill site encompasses approximately 99± acres. There are approximately 65 acres that are currently being used or are proposed for use as sanitary landfill space. The operation of the facility is contracted out to a privatefirm. In 2018 the County began operating the landfill with its own employees after the private firm contracted to operate the landfill expressed its desire to cease operations.

Only municipal solid waste acceptable for disposal at sanitary landfills are disposed of at the facility. No medical, infectious, or hazardous waste are accepted at this facility. Animal carcasses, such as cats, dogs, and farm animals, are accepted.

Brush and certain yard wastes are burned at the landfill to reduce the volume of solid waste placed in disposal cells. The County reuses waste materials such as cinder blocks, asphalt and brick for access roads and ramps at the landfill. Special programs that the County, periodically engages in includes property clean-ups with trustees from the Piedmont Regional Jail; public education on recycling within the County through pamphlets available from the County Administrator's Office; and the clean-up of illegal tire dump sites.

Prince Edward County presently has a landfill capital fund that takes in approximately \$300,000 annually. In the past, General Fund revenues have been used to supplement the landfill capital fund as needed. General Fund revenues also have been used to fund other County solid waste management and recycling programs. General fund revenues will continue to be used to supplement future capital expenditures not fully covered by the landfill capital fund during the planning period. Prince Edward County maintains a fund balance of between \$3-58-10 million so there should be sufficient monies available for all future solid waste management projects undertaken during the planning period.

B. Cumberland County

Cumberland County closed its three landfills in the mid-nineteen nineties and constructed public convenience centers at each of the three sites. The Hamilton Landfill was closed in August 1994; the Madison Landfill in July 1995; and the Randolph Landfill in June 1997. Wastes are transported from these facilities to a recycling facility pursuant to the County's contract with Container Rentals LLC.-the Prince Edward County Landfill or to the Maplewood Landfill in Amelia-County. The convenience centers are manned and open Monday through Sundayaturday. It is up to the waste generator to get the waste from his/her premises to the public convenience centers. The approximate location of each of these facilities is shown on Figure 2.

Recycling containers are located at each of the public convenience centers. Materials collected for recycling include glass containers (all colors), aluminum cans, plastics (#1 and #2), cardboard, newsprint, mixed papers, tires (at Madison) and white goods. Yard waste and brush also are collected at the Madison Facility. Recycled materials are collected and processed locally by private firms. For CY 2003 Cumberland County realized a recycling rate of 33.7%, for CY 2004 it was 33.5%, and for CY 2005 it was 27.6%.

Cumberland County's current litter control efforts include participation in: the_-Community Diversion Incentive programs operated in direct coordination with the general district court; the Adopt-a-Spot and Adopt-a-Highway programs sponsored by VDOT; periodic community and/or organization sponsored roadside litter pickups and campaigns; and, periodic river cleanups in partnership with the Friends of the Appomattox.

Cumberland County periodically promotes public participation in abandoned vehicle recovery efforts and special household hazardous waste collection events. The success of these programs is due in part to public education efforts by the county to increase participation in the event or events. Cumberland County encourages, and will continue to encourage, participation in community anti-litter and cleanup campaigns through educational and guest program presentations to schools, individuals, and civic or social organizations.

In the future, Cumberland County will continue its efforts in litter control by actively participating in and/or promoting the above programs. _Special programs in which the County periodically engages includes participation in an abandoned vehicle recovery program and special household hazardous waste collection events.

Cumberland County does not have an operating landfill. However, funding of its current solid waste management programs, such as its convenience centers, have been from General Fund revenues. Continued funding of these programs for the duration of the planning period will either be from the general fund or through host fees if a privately owned and operated municipal solid waste landfill is sited within the County.

Green Ridge Recycling and Disposal Facility, LLC (Green Ridge)The Cumberland County Development Company, LLC (CCDC), a private waste disposal company,affiliated with Allied, Inc. is proposing to site and permit a new Solid Waste Management Facility in Cumberland County, Virginia. The _proposed facility is considered to be in general conformance with this <u>Solid Waste</u> <u>Management</u> Plan as well as, the County's Comprehensive Plan and future <u>Ddevelopment plans</u>. The actual siting and permitting of this proposed facility is_subject to local zoning / planning approvals and permit approvals by the DEQ in accordance with the Virginia Solid Waste Management Regulations (VSWMR). The proposed landfill will be

located <u>approximately eight miles</u> east of Cumberland County Courthouse approximately 6 miles alongon US Route 60 at Maxey Mill Creek. Figure 3 shows the approximate location of the proposed landfill. Access to the proposed facility will be from <u>Route 60a new industrial park to be located off US Route 60</u>. The specific location of the proposed access road will be subject to VDOT approval-aswell as, local zoning and planning approvals.

The proposed <u>Green Ridge</u>Cumberland County Development Company, LLC landfill will be a sanitary landfill accepting Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) primarily serving Cumberland County and the rest of Virginia, including the Richmond Metropolitan Area. Under the terms of the Host Agreement, with Cumberland County, MSW can also be accepted from <u>a 500-mile radius of the landfill-Maryland-</u> and the Washington, DC area. Wastes from North Carolina may also be accepted, but only upon specific future approval of the County. Waste Generation for Cumberland County is not

projected to increase significantly in the near future, and the estimates provided in Table 4 are considered valid.

The landfill's regular operating hours will be twenty-four hours per day on weekdays, opening at 6:00 a.m. on Monday morning and closing at 11:59 p.m. on Friday evening, and 6:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Saturdays.-5:30am to 5:30pm, Monday through Saturday. The landfill will be closed on Sundays and on New Years Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

permits for the new facility are obtained from DEQ is permitted. Actual facility details will be determined during the DEQ permitting process. The disposal area is expected to foot print is contain approximately 265550 acres. The planned gross capacity of the facility has been calculated based on conceptual information at approximately 5569 millionon

cubic yards. The net airspace will be determined during the design of these sys-tems and development of the operational parameters for the facility during the DEQ Part A and Part B application process. The allowable waste stream accept-anceacceptance rate will be limited by the Host Agreement, which also provides for free solid waste dis-posal and recycling incentives to residents of Cumberland County. The maximum amount of waste that can be accepted on any given day will be 57000 tons. Thequarterly average waste acceptance rate cannot exceed 5000 tons per day. At this rate the life of the proposed facility is estimated at 21.2 years. Because the average annual waste receipt and effective in-place waste densities will vary, the practical life of the facility will range from 25 to 35+ to 50 years. The longer life assumes a higher in-place waste density and a lower average annual waste receipt.

Due to the conceptual nature of the proposed facility, additional amendments to the Plan, if necessary, will be implemented at the appropriate time in accordance with 9 VAC20-130-10 et seq., Amendment 1. Any such amendments are anticipated to be Minor Amendments.

C. Solid Waste Management Planning (SWMP) Unit Recycling Rate


The recycling rate for the region is approximately 22.4%. The population density for the region based upon 2000 Census data (28,737) and a total 649 square miles is approximately 44.28 people per square mile. As of July 1, 2006, the mandatory recycling rate for a Solid Waste Management Planning Unit (SWMPU) with a population density of less than 100 people per square mile is 15%. The Prince Edward County *I* Cumberland County SWMPU meets this requirement.

The Counties will continue to look for improvements in recycling activities and practices during the planning period. If the recycling rate for the SWMPU drops below the current goal of 15%, then the Solid Waste Management Plan will be amended to incorporate a recycling action plan. The recycling action plan will cover the required milestones to meet the 15% recycling rate goal.

D. Collection/Transfer

The existing system of solid waste collection and transportation throughout the SWMPU is to be continued through the planning period. The existing system is functioning well and no significant changes are proposed. The counties will continue to evaluate the collection and handling of solid wastes and look for improvements that can be made to the system during the planning period. It is not intended at this point to supplant the public convenience facilities that faithfully serve the needs of the residents within the SWMPU with larger and more expensive transfer stations given the nearness of the disposal sites. In the event that a change in the current collection and transportation system is warranted, the Solid Waste Management Plan will be amended to reflect the change.


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


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E. Central Archive

The United States Environmental Protection Agency and the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality maintain data on sites and facilities that have been permitted as disposal sites under the Solid Waste Management facility

regulations, and of sites and facilities that have been permitted as treatment, storage, and disposal sites under the Hazardous Waste Management Regulations. The office of the County Planner of -Prince Edward County in Farmville, Virginia will be the local Central Archive to receive and record information on permitted and closed disposal sites. Such information will be available for public scrutiny. To make current information available for public review, the Prince Edward County Planner will request periodically during the planning period that the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality provide copies of its latest

database of permitted and closed sites. Similarly, the Prince Edward County Planner will periodically request the latest lists of Superfund sites and sites with potentially hazardous issues from the EPA. Sites with potential waste disposal issues are frequently identified by private entities during the Environmental Site Assessment process. To the extent that the results of these site assessments are provided to the Prince Edward County Planning Office, the inventory of active and closed disposal sites will be updated and forwarded to the director of the DEQ. Similarly, new disposal sites will be documented and recorded with a copy of that information sent to the director of the DEQ.

The office of the County Planner for Prince Edward County in Farmville, Virginia will also serve as the local Central Archive to receive and record information on the amount of solid waste produced within the SWMPU. The waste records from the Prince Edward County landfill are maintained in this office as well the County's - records relative to recycling. Information on waste generation records and recycling records from Cumberland County will be submitted to this office. This information will, in turn, be submitted to the director of the DEQ.

F. Recycling Markets

Recyclables from the SWMPU are taken to three different privately owned and operated facilities.

White goods and other metals are taken to J & J Recycling in Farmville, VA. J & J is a scrap metal and salvage yard that collects, processes and transports metals to different end users in the mid-Atlantic area.

Tires are taken to Emmanuel Tire's -Appomattox location and then are transported to Emmanuel's -main processing plant in Baltimore, MD.

Household recyclables (cardboard, newspaper, plastic containers, and clean glass containers) are taken to STEPS, Inc., a recyclable material brokerage and processing facility in Farmville, VA. After processing and or sorting, STEPS transports the materials by truck to Chesapeake Fibers in Richmond, VA.

CHAPTER 5- WASTE GENERATION AND COMPOSITION

A. Waste Generation

The projected rate of filling and site life of the Prince Edward County Landfill is based on the current rate of volume utilization and a 2018 topographic <u>surveyweight records from 1997 through 2000</u>. The rate of filling was calculated based on an in-place density of the waste of 1250 lbs_/cu._-yd (estimated from a density evaluation performed after Cell A had been in operation for approximately at least one year). At present, the facility receives approximately 82 tons of solid waste per day. This amount was escalated by 1 percent per year_y-_in accordance with area population projections.

Cells A through F of the Prince Edward County Landfill have a combined disposal airspace volume (waste and daily/intermediate cover materials) of approximately 1,805,954 cubic yards. Based on the above escalation rate, the proposed cells will have a projected site life of approximately 24.20 years.

Table 4 provides an estimate of the amount of solid wastes generated within Prince Edward County and Cumberland County coincident with the population projection for the Area. Published data from the United States Environmental Protection Agency was used for per capita generation. This number is 4.51 pounds per capita per day. As a comparison, tonnages received at the landfill and escalated as described above, are also provided. The quantities differ by about 7%.

Β. Waste Composition

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No published waste composition studies for either Prince Edward County or Cumberland County are available. Annual locality recycling rate reports only provide information or quantities of materials pulled from the waste stream prior to landfilling. Table 5 presents typical material percentages as published by the EPA and other sources.

In reviewing the above information, it is important to note, in particular, the increasing role of plastics, not only over the last half century, but also over the last 10 years. This has a direct impact on recyclying rate estimates that are based solely on weight. In actuality, we may be recycling more food and beverage containers, but because product packaging continues to shift to plastics away from heavy glass and metal containers, it appears that we are seeing little or no increase or, in someame cases; even a decrease in our recycling programs.

C. Waste Character

Based upon the most recent data from Form DEQ 50-25 (Solid Waste Information and Assessment Program Reporting Table), the following represents a current percentage breakdown of the waste stream in the defined categories.

Since the SWMPU is primarily rural in character, and is expected to generally remain that way based upon population projections, it is not expected that these percentages will vary significantly in the future. Table 4A presents a forecast of these waste categories.

CHAPTER 6- SOLID WASTE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

A. Prince Edward County

Prince Edward County owns and operates its own Subtitle D Sanitary Landfill with an estimated capacity that spans the 20-year Plan period. This considers the continuation of accepting waste from both Cumberland County and Buckingham County during this time frame.

The strategic location of the public convenience centers and accompanying recycling centers will serve the citizens of the County well during the planning period.

The closure of the County's landfill scheduled to occur just beyond the tail-end of the planning period will require the County to consider alternative disposal options starting midway through the planning period.

B. Cumberland County

Cumberland County currently has no active disposal facility located within its borders. It transports waste that are collected at the public convenience centers to <u>a</u> recycling facility pursuant to the County's contract with Container Rentals <u>LLC</u>either Prince Edward County Landfill or the Maplewood Recycling and Waste Facility in Amelia County. Prince Edward County's facility, as indicated above, has available capacity through the 20-year planning period. Maplewood's currently permitted capacity-is about 19.8 million tons.

The planned <u>Green RidgeCCDC</u> facility, if permitted, will provide disposal capacity for the foreseeable future at no charge to County residents by the terms of the Host Agreement, a copy of which <u>is should be</u> available for review in the County's offices and on the County's website.

The strategic location of the three public convenience centers in the north, central and southern parts of the County should continue to serve the citizens well for the remainder of the planning period.

The closure of the Prince Edward County Landfill just beyond the end of the planning period and the continuing availability of other regional landfills are critical issues for the County to periodically review and evaluate.

Based on initial projections of capacity and waste receipts, the proposed facility would have an expected life of 25-to 35+ to 50 years.

CHAPTER 7 - PREFERRED WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

A. General

It is important to recognize that the minost appropriate waste management system for a given municipality or region is dependent on the demographics, geology, and resources of that municipality or region. Thus the extent to which the different elements of the Solid Waste Management Hierarchy are incorporated in the plan will often variy considerably from municipality to municipality or region to region. The Solid Waste Management Hierarchy -(originally developed and promoted by the USEPA) is usually depicted as a pyramid with the most preferred element at the top and the lease preferred at the bottom:

Source Reduction Reuse, Reuse, Reuse Recycling, Recycling, Recycling Resource Recovery, Resource Recovery Incineration, Incineration, Incineration Landfilling, Landfilling, Landfilling, Landfilling,

Ironically, the least preferred element (landfilling) is the foundational element for the remaining elements and is the one element common to all integrated waste management strategies. Although, source reduction, reuse and recycling in certain locations can have a significant impact on reducing the amount of solid waste material_łand_filled, it is not practical to consider that these three elements, in the foreseeable future, would dramatically reduce the amount of waste that will have to be landfilled.

Source Reduction:

This element of the solid waste management hierarchy, along with reuse, is for all intents and purposes, out of the direct control of the municipal jurisdiction within the service area of this plan. It could involve such disparate entities as manufacturers designing, manufacturing, and packaging products to minimize waste, and consumers purchasing products and services with an eye towards reducing the generation of waste materials. Because the goal of

source reduction is not to produce waste, it is difficult to gauge the effectiveness of educational programs (indirect measures) that may be instituted by a locality. Source reduction practices are not tracked within the service area of this plan.

Very similar to source reduction, this element could involve one time or multiple reuse of containers or packaging materials such as plastic or paper grocery bags and food containers (such as plastic margarine tubs); and donating clothes (in good condition) to charitable organizations for redistribution to others. Reuse practices also are not tracked within the service area. Expansion of reuse practices would rely heavily upon educational programs, but as with source reduction, it would be difficult to measure the effectiveness of dollars spent on such educational programs.

Thus it is that the top two preferences are difficult to implement and problematic to measure. However, the counties will continue to look for economical ways to promote source reduction and reuse during the planning period. Existing recycling information available to the public will be augmented with educational and informational programs on reduction and reuse as public funding will allow.

Recycling provides businesses, individuals, and families the opportunity to return valuable resources (both renewable and non-renewable) back to the manufacturing/industrial sector to produce new products. In the process, it reduces the amount of virgin materials needed and the production process likely will use less energy using recycled feedstocks of metals, glass, plastics, and paper.

Localities in the service area of the plan can have an impact on recycling activities through programs and facilities provided or made available to businesses and residences within their respective jurisdictions. Drop-off areas and public convenience facilities have been designed or

upgraded to include recycling boxes or containers. Future considerations would include limited curbside recycling programs in more density populated areas within the service area covered by this plan.

The mandated recycling rate for the region (SWMPU) is being met. If the rate drops below the currently mandated 15% for rural areas, the Solid Waste Management Plan will be amended to include implementation timelines incorporated therein.

Resource recovery, also referred to as Waste-to-Energy (WTE), is not a cost effective element of the hierarchy for implementation in a service area of the size associated with this plan. Most existing WTE facilities are in the 1000 TPD or greater through-put capacity. At a per capita generation rate of 4.51 lbs./day this would reflect a service area population of about 440,000. Such facilities also are difficult to site and permit because of stricter air emissions requirements, difficulties with jurisdictional political agreements, and intense public opposition. Incineration is the same as WTE except that energy (usually in the Incineration is the same as WTE except that energy (usually in the form of steam or electricity) is not recovered from the burning process.

Landfilling, in the simplest terminology, is the engineered burial of solid wastes. Modem landfill facilities incorporate composite liner systems of soils and flexible membranes to serve as barriers to preclude the contamination of groundwater beneath the facility. Porous media and piping in a "leachate collection zone" above the liner system allows for the contaminated liquids to flow to a collection point where it is removed and treated on site or hauled or pumped to a treatment plant. Gas generated from the decomposition of wastes is vented and/or recovered. Groundwater and landfill gas monitoring points represent fail safe mechanisms alerting an owner to potential problems.

Landfilling of municipal solid waste generation within the region covered by this plan will remain the most

viable and economic method for the management of the waste stream. Landfilling will be integrated with viable recycling programs and, therefore, recycling and landfilling will form the cornerstone of the integrated waste management strategy for the region covered by this plan. Waste reduction and reuse will be promoted as funding permits.

This element of the solid waste management hierarchy, along with reuse, is for all intents and purposes, out of the direct control of the municipal jurisdiction within the service area of this plan. 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Landfilling: Landfilling, in the simplest terminology, is the engineered burial of solid wastes. Modem landfill facilities incorporate composite liner systems of soils and flexible membranes to serve as barriers to preclude the containmation of groundwater beneath the facility. Porous media and piping in a "leachate collection zone" above the liner system allows for the contaminated liquids to flow to a collection point where it is removed and treated on site or hauled or pumped to a treatment plant. Gas generated from the decomposition of wastes is vented and/or recovered. Groundwater and landfill gas monitoring points respresent fail safe mechanisms alerting an owner to potential problems.

CHAPTER 8 - IMPLEMENTATION ISSUES

There are no significant implementation issues as the two counties are currently managing their solid wastes. Recycling is not mandatory within each county, but if either County would decide to implement curbside collection in more densely populated areas, the mechanisms would have to be developed to define the area, insure participation, and cover the costs. Provisions of disposal services would be accomplished through agreements or contracts with providers. If new public or private disposal facilities are identified, be they landfill or a new/emergent technology, local, state, and/or federal permits will need to be filed with their requisite public participation programs involving public meetings, public hearings, and comment periods.

In essence the Solid Waste Management Plan for Prince Edward County and Cumberland County is self-implementing upon formal approval of the plan by each County and approval of the plan by the Department of Environmental Quality. The existing system of solid waste management throughout the planning area is functioning well and no significant changes are proposed in the near future.

Cumberland County is the site of a proposed municipal waste landfill being developed by <u>Green Ridge Recycling and Disposal Facility, LLC</u>the Cumberland County Development-Company. If this site applies for and receives the necessary local government and state government approvals and/or permits, it will be the primary disposal facility for Cumberland County.

The Counties will continue to look for improvements to the management system during the planning period. In the event that a change is necessary, the Solid Waste Management Plan will be amended to reflect that change.

9 VAC 20-130-130. Public Participation.

A.Each solid waste planning unit shall provide for public participation during plan development through such means as public meetings or citizen advisory committees.

B.Prior to submission of a plan or major amendment the solid waste planning unit shall publish a notice and hold a public hearing on the plan. When the solid waste planning unit represents multiple government units, the unit submitting a major plan amendment(s) needs to conduct the above public participation requirements only in the county or locality involved in the major amendment. A record of the public hearing, a copy of all written comments and the submitter's response to all comments received shall be submitted with the plan or plan amendment.



Utilizing the cannery in this way will maximize our outreach and revenue for the summer months.
- New clients Cedric and Joshua Warren made a test batch of their "A Dab a Do" Cajun-style barbecue sauce
- New client Robert and his partners at Gourmet Hemp Foods made a test batch of three products, all featuring hemp products: a "Hemp Hottie" hot sauce, a Honey Barbecue and a Marinara.
- Returning client Ed and Cindy of Sweet and Savory of Mecklenburg have signed a contract with a convention center and are hoping to expand in the wholesale market. They made batches of peach, strawberry, and blackberry preserves this month.
- Other clients in the cannery this month included: Pennacook Peppers Pepper Jelly, Agriberry fruit puree, Sweet on the Bubbly jams, Rupen's Indian Simmer Sauces, Dia de Los Burritos hot sauce, and Nona's Italian Cucina marinara.

In the Office

- Allie and Michelle finished up an application for a \$20,000 Specialty Crop Block Grant to help move more local specialty crops through the cannery by way of an outreach campaign, a pricing calculator for prospective clients and a produce purchasing pilot program. Fingers crossed we get it!

- CRC staff are collecting and compiling data from the Town of Keysville Surveys for the Keysville Comprehensive Plan Update. CRC staff have also completed a draft of Sections I & II.
- Dillwyn CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Project Construction has begun on some of the properties. Staff are still working with DHR on mitigation actions for the project.
- Lunenburg/Kenbridge/Victoria Comprehensive Plan Update The Towns of Kenbridge and Victoria have held Public Hearings and have also adopted the Plan Update.
- Dillwyn VDOT Streetscape Project CRC staff are working with VDOT and the consultant to finalize the bid package to obtain federal authorization to bid the project.
- Phenix Water System Project The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) has approved the revised PER. CRC staff are working with Phenix representatives for next steps.
- CRC CEDS The CRC is seeking public input on the Draft CEDS. CRC staff attended Farmville, Buckingham, and Amelia Chamber of Commerce Meetings to seek public input on the Draft CRC Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). CRC staff and the Chairman of the CEDS Committee, Jordan Miles, were guests on WFLO Call Flo to discuss the CRC CEDS. Copies of the document are also available at all 5 county administrators offices and local libraries. Local media were also sent a Press Release on the CEDS.
- STEPS, Prince Edward Affordable Housing Strategic Plan The Housing Coalition has met with the Consultant and developed a Survey and plan for Focus Group meetings.
- CRC staff developed Regional Priorities for the Department of Housing and Community Developments Community Development Block Grant Program. The CRC approved the priorities at their March meeting.
- CRC staff developed and disseminated the 2018 Recycling Report for the region to localities.
