Summary:

During the budget work session on March 28, 2018 the Board had several questions concerning how STEPS used the funding Prince Edward County provided and what were the guidelines for the distribution of funding in the funding STEPS received from various sources as it pertained to the Energy Share Program, and The Homeless Solutions Program.

Attached is information provided by STEPS that hopefully provides that information. The first attachment provides information regarding the Energy Share Program. This includes the criteria that STEPS must follow to determine who is eligible for this program and how the funds can be used. These funds are available for use in Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward. During the most recently completed quarter 39% of all households receiving assistance were from Prince Edward County.

The second Attachment provides information regarding the Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (VHSP) which includes Shelter Operations, Rapid Rehousing and Prevention

The third attachment provides a short summary of how STEPS uses the \$20,000 the Board of Supervisors provides STEPS.

The final attachment is the intake form that STEPS must use for the various housing programs funded by state funds. The use of this form is mandated by the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD).

Energy Share

The *Energy Share* program is a partnership between Dominion Energy and STEPS to assist citizens who meet certain criteria with their utility expenses in the counties of Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward.

Eligibility Criteria

To qualify, the one of the following criteria must be met:

- Over the age of 60;
- · Households with children under the age of five;
- Households who have someone with a disability;
- Medically fragile; and
- Veterans

To receive assistance without meeting one of the above eligibility criteria, the household must be without of power or have a "Disconnection Notice" from their power company. Although Dominion Energy does not have income eligibility criteria, STEPS has, with Dominion Energy's permission, started requesting that individuals who have financial resources to pay their own bill, justify the need. If justification is not provided, services are not received. Due to limited funds, STEPS reserves the right to deny pledges to any citizen/household found to be ineligible for services or for providing fraudulent information.

In the heating season, STEPS *Energy Share* may fund up to \$600.00 towards a heating expense. This can be assisting with an electric bill, payment for oil, propane or wood. Individuals over the age of 60 can qualify for assistance twice per season but cannot exceed a \$600.00 maximum.

In the cooling season, STEPS *Energy Share* may fund up to \$300.00 towards a cooling source, but only if there is a "Disconnection Notice." Individuals over the age of 60 can qualify for assistance twice in a season but cannot exceed the \$300.00 maximum.

When there is an active allotment, there is a weekly review of calls and those in the most immediate need are served first.

Statistics - July 1, 2017 through March 30, 2018

The Energy Share program has served 398 households from July 1, 2017 - March 30, 2018.

In the most recent quarter (January – March, 2018) 157 households were served; 61 or 39% were Prince Edward residents.



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Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (VHSP)

Our "homeless funding" is provided through a grant from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development, referred to as the "Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (VHSP)." This funding drops each July 1st and is divided into three (3) distinct "pots of money." We serve the following counties with these dollars: Amelia, Buckingham, Cumberland, Lunenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward.

VHSP funds client services in three programs:

- Shelter Operations this is the smallest pot of funds, approximately \$4,000, for the entire twelve-month period. We have no money remaining for this service. Since the funds for this service are so limited, we do all we can to link those in need with other resources: Salvation Army shelters, etc. The challenge is that we are not allowed to shift the funds between the allocated pots and in our area, we most definitely need more shelter dollars as there are no shelters so hotel rooms are typically our only source of "shelter." For victims of fire or other natural disasters, we have developed a strong relationship with the Red Cross. The Red Cross will typically pay for the "shelter" nights and we can then offer "rapid rehousing" dollars to get the clients set up in a new rental location.
- Rapid Rehousing has approximately \$38,000 available for a twelve-month period and have no funds remaining in this category. This service is not income based, but more "situational based," which means folks are typically vulnerable. They may be living in a shelter, like Salvation Army or Madeline's House (domestic violence). We can then provide case management services to help them get set up in a new living situation: paying rental deposits, utility deposits, etc. It is imperative that clients realize we are required to perform a "habitability inspection" before we can encumber any funds for their use. So, if they have already signed a lease, we may not be able to help. Again, with these funds, there are a number of "processes" that must be followed. Once we assist in "rehousing" them, their income then becomes a factor if ongoing case management is needed. For example: a family has been burned out, but prior to the fire the family was stable due to the income in the home (father working, etc.); Red Cross will shelter them; STEPS is called to "rapidly rehouse" them. We can provide case management services to advocate with a landlord, talk with utility companies and made a pledge to pay the deposit, etc. Once the family moves in, continued case management services may be provided if the income level is below the threshold for services.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY STEPS

- Energy Share (utility assistance)
- Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (VHSP)

Uses of the \$20,000 provided by Prince Edward County. "Job Training, Employment and Support Services for PE Citizens with Disabilities and other Barriers to Employment."

These uses include:

- Job training, job coaching and placement assistance for PE citizens with disabilities - The most visible are those individuals who work at our recycling site and work in our sewing plant. These individuals require frequent retraining due to their intellectual disabilities. We offer tours to local special education classes and serve on community panels to educate and advocate for the rights of adults with disabilities. We also provide soft skills training (preemployment skills training) and assist clients from the local department of social services to prepare for, apply for, obtain and maintain employment. This is often a challenging population to work with as they are being mandated by DSS to secure employment. The third target population served is that of senior citizens living in poverty who need to secure employment, Title V program. The PE County Visitor's Center has been a valued partner in this program by agreeing to host several of our clients. The seniors served in this program need to improve their employability skills and local community partners agree to provide those skill building experiences in exchange for STEPS paying the wages.
- Intensive case management and supervision Our individuals with intellectual disabilities require increased supervision to ensure health and safety is always in the forefront. We have an part-time Employment Services Case Manager who works directly with our clients with disabilities. We also have a full time Workplace Supports Case Manager who carries open cases on all of our clients referred from DSS. The full time Title V Case Manager provides everything necessary to ensure our seniors are placed in a job/partner match and provides coordination for physical and emotional treatment, food security and many other critical needs. Maintaining close contact with our clients is a cornerstone to their success.
- Transportation to/from work None of our clients with disabilities drive. While
 a small number ride on either Farmville Area Bus (FAB) or Piedmont Regional
 Transit, most depend on our STEPS transportation system. Without adequate
 public transportation in the region, even our clients from DSS need
 transportation until they can obtain employment. Then we phase out of
 transporting and facilitate them purchasing a car or ride-sharing with fellow
 employees. Maintaining a safe, adequate fleet of vehicles is expensive and
 challenging at best.
- Advocacy We represent our clients both locally, state and on the federal level. Part of our county funds go to pay dues to two (2) advocacy

Tax Levies for Public Hearing & Authorize Public Hearing for FY19 Budget

Summary:

The proposed budget submitted by the County Administrator contained no tax or fee increases and the recommendation is to advertise no such increases for CY18.

To maintain the County's budget schedule would require the Board of Supervisors to authorize the advertisement of a Public Hearing to be held on April 17, 2018 at 7:00 p,m. This public hearing would be for both the County and School budgets.

The General Assembly has not approved a state budget, therefore, the funding provided by the Commonwealth is subject to change. The proposed budget contains the same amount of local funding for FY19 as is contained in the FY18 budget - \$8,440,984. It is recommended that level of funding be held constant and once the General Assembly approves a budget, if the approved budget provides less funding than advertised the School Board will be required to amend the budget request.
