Also present: Wade Bartlett, County Administrator; Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator; Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development; and Kevin Wright, Interim Residency Administrator, VDOT. Mark McKissick, Assistant VDOT Residency Administrator; and Keith Halbohn, Transportation Contract Administrator, VDOT.

Chairman Fore called the Special Meeting to order to discuss the Six Year Plan with the Virginia Department of Transportation.

In Re: VDOT Six Year Plan

Kevin Wright, Interim Residency Administrator, VDOT, reviewed the County's Six Year Plan. He said available funds are only in "telefeed", which are funds collected through telephone bills, and are state funds; no federal funds are allocated.

Mr. Wright recommended moving the Back Hampden-Sydney Road project to Priority #1, and moving Route 638 project to Priority #2 because of the lack of funding. He assured the Board if the state would require the expenditures to date on the Route 638 project to be refunded, that project should be put back to the Priority #1 spot. Further discussion followed. Keith Halbohn, Transportation Contract Administrator, said if Route 638 is put below Route 643, the County is not requesting the project be dropped from the Plan, it is just changing its priority status. It would drop from lack of funds. Discussion followed.

Mr. Wright advised the Back Hampden-Sydney Road project could be split into two projects; there is approximately \$2 million, which is enough funding to build two-thirds of a mile of the project. Further discussion followed.

Federal Bridge funds can be used for the Lockett Road bridge; all bridge projects are now being managed by the District office where they're using federal bridge funds. Route 638 project will drop off the Six Year Plan due to no funding, and will go onto the list in Lynchburg as a Bridge Priority Project for the County.

Chairman Fore asked for a consensus to adjust the Priority 1 project from Route 638 to Route 643, and begin initial work on breaking the Route 638 project into two projects. The Board concurred.

Mr. Wright said the Hidden Lake Road project will go to advertisement with construction to begin during the summer of 2010. He said the Aspen Hill Road project (Route 601) currently has \$1 million, which is one-third of the funds necessary; he recommended that as the width meets the standards, to use the available funds and surface-treat the road. Chairman Fore said that road will be heavily used because of the High Bridge Trail and asked if it would hold up under heavy use.

Mr. Wright said the road will be strengthened with additional base and it would hold up well under increased traffic. He said work on the project may begin by late summer.

Discussion followed on Recreational Access funds.

Supervisor Jones asked who will do the work; Mr. Wright said the work would be advertised for bid and contractors would perform the work.

The Board concurred that the Aspen Hill Road project would be paved-in-place.

Mr. Wright then said he can incorporate the changes to the Six-Year Plan and Budget for presentation at a public hearing on the Six-Year Plan.

Supervisor McKay said Route 666 has a dangerous hill, just past Douglas Church Road. Mr. Wright said he will submit the issue to the safety engineers; it may qualify for safety program funds, or can be added to the Six-Year Plan. Supervisor McKay reported the bridge on Route 667 (Buffalo Creek) has problems and asked that it be examined.

Discussion followed on the second section of the Aspen Hill Road project. Mr. Halbohn said any funds left from the Hidden Lake Road project could be added to the unpaved road project. Mr. Wright added that the second section of Aspen Hill Road project into the Unpaved Road Fund; he said the accumulated tele-fees could be transferred to that project and show it as accumulating funds. If there are funds from the Aspen Hill Road project, they could be transferred to the next priority without having to update the Plan.

Chairman Fore requested Mr. Wright make the amendments to the Six-Year Plan and Budget; the Public Hearing on the Six-Year Plan was scheduled for Tuesday, April 6, 2010 at 7:00 p.m.

Discussion followed on the Route 628 project.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Wright stated VDOT is working on routine maintenance: potholes, brush trimming and putting down gravel. He asked that any safety needs be reported to the area headquarters.

Mr. Wright said the Lynchburg District made it a goal to focus on resurfacing of roads to minimize potholes; the pavement ratings for the Lynchburg District are generally the top-rated district in the state.

Discussion regarding the Elam Country Estates subdivision; Mr. Wright stated that it does not qualify for Rural Addition funds because it is too new; the Code of Virginia does not allow it to be taken in by Rural Addition. He said the residents may put up half of the funding and it may then qualify for Revenue Sharing; another option would be for the residents to completely rebuild the roads to state standards and then turn them over to the state.

Mr. "Gene" Watson expressed his thanks for the recognition and said it was an honor and a privilege to serve Prince Edward County for 24 years and to work with many fine people; he said it was a team effort.

Supervisor Simpson expressed his regrets regarding the Mary E. Branch Community Center kickoff ceremony; he was out of town.

In Re: Highway Matters

Chairman Fore stated the Board of Supervisors met at 5:00 with VDOT for a work session, and as the VDOT representatives had to attend another meeting elsewhere, the Board discussed the issues at that meeting. He then asked for any comments to forward to VDOT.

In Re: Request from STEPS, Inc.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, said STEPS, Inc. is in the process of creating a secure document destruction and shredding business. Congressman Perriello obtained a \$300,000 earmark for STEPS, Inc. to be used to purchase equipment and training needed for the new business.

Mr. Bartlett explained that the Department of Education has been assigned the oversight of these funds, and has informed STEPS, Inc. that it will be several months before these funds will be dispersed to STEPS, Inc. To move the process along, Ms. Sharon Harrup, CEO of STEPS, Inc., requested an interest-free "bridge loan" of \$150,000 to allow STEPS to obtain the equipment; the full amount will be repaid in full after the funds are received from the Department of Education. Mr. Bartlett added that the earmarked funds may be expended prior to the funds being received.

Supervisor McKay made a motion to approve provision of an interest-free loan to STEPS, Inc. in the amount of \$150,000 as requested.

Supervisor Simpson inquired as to the length of time until the funds will be released from the Department of Education.

Ms. Harrup said that she is unable to give a specific time; she added that forms must be filled out and submitted. Ms. Harrup said these funds have been set aside for STEPS; no one can take the funds and the Federal government cannot rescind these funds. Ms. Harrup said \$150,000 loan would go to the purchase of shredding and baling equipment and bins, which have been ordered. The other \$150,000 earmarked for STEPS, Inc. is for training and obtaining FBI clearance for all employees. She added that STEPS has interested customers, and a delay in the schedule to get the business operational could force those customers to look elsewhere for the service.

Discussion followed.

Supervisor McKay amended his motion to approve the provision of an interest-free loan to STEPS, Inc. in the amount of \$150,000 as requested, and to appropriate the funds from the General Fund's Fund Balance, and to allow the County Administrator to make the appropriate adjustments to the current budget, and to authorize the County Administrator to execute the loan on behalf of the Board of Supervisors. In Re: Public Hearing - School Board Appointments

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing on the School Board appointments and called on Supervisor Simpson to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 101, consisting of William W. Poulston, Chair, LaVaonna H. Lyle, and Kate L. Shorter; and Supervisor Wiley to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 801, consisting of Michelle Raybold, Chair, Ernestine Herndon, Patricia Holcomb, Nancy Phaup, and Ruth Watkins. No nominations were received from the floor. Chairman Fore closed the public hearing and asked the Committees to report at the April 2010 meeting with the lists of candidates for consideration for appointment to the Prince Edward County School Board.

In Re: Public Hearing - Motor Vehicle License Tax

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Simpson asked about a provision for disabled veterans; Mr. Bartlett stated disabled veterans are automatically exempt on one vehicle by State Code, as long as the vehicle is registered with the DMV as such.

Supervisor Simpson then asked about antique vehicles that are being restored or that have an antique license. Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, stated this ordinance applies only to licensed vehicles.

Supervisor Gantt said the tax rate on farm trucks is proposed at \$30, and it would be simpler to have all rates set at \$25. Mrs. Beverly Booth, Commissioner of Revenue, stated farmers get a reduction on the real estate tax assessment. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt made a motion to approve the amendments to the Vehicle License Ordinance and to approve the tax rates with a change in the "farm trucks" rate set at \$25.

Discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said two amendments are necessary to the Vehicle License Ordinance: Division 2, Section 74-51 (c) should be deleted; and Section 74-52 should read as follows: "The license tax provided for in this division shall be due and payable annually on the same date as the County Personal Property Tax, as allowed by the state."

Supervisor Gantt restated his motion to reduce the farm truck tax from \$30 to \$25; delete Section 74-51 (c); and amend Section 74-52; the motion carried:

ARTICLE II: VEHICLE LICENSE

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Section 74-51. Levy of License Tax.

- a) For each year beginning with January 1 thereof and ending with December 31 following until otherwise changed, there is hereby levied and there shall be collected from every person owning a licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer, which is normally garaged, stored or parked within the county, a license tax on such licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer, at the rates set forth in this division.
- b) If it cannot be determined where the licensed motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer is normally garaged, stored or parked, or if the owner is a student attending an institution of higher learning, the situs for the imposition of this license tax shall be the domicile of the owner. For the purposes of this division the term "domicile" shall mean:
 - 1) A place of abode in the county of more than 60 days irrespective of any intention on the part of that person to return to or establish a residence outside the county at some future date; or
 - 2) The office or place of business in the county of any corporation or firm.

Section 74-52. Date license tax due.

The license tax provided for in this division shall be due and payable annually on the same date as the County Personal Property Tax, as allowed by the state.

Section 74-53. Amount of license tax

An annual license tax to be paid to the county by owners of licensed motor vehicles and trailers shall be as follows:

These taxes shall be in effect as of January 1, 2010. (Ord. of 5-11-76, §23-17; Ord. of 8-11-92)

Section 74-54. Exemptions.

Specifically exempt from the terms of this division are the following:

- 1) All persons who are residents of the Town of Farmville or Town of Pamplin and have paid a motor vehicle license tax on vehicles to the Town of Farmville or Town of Pamplin.
- 2) Any motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer owned by a nonresident and used exclusively for transporting into and within the county for sale, in person or by employees, wood, meats, poultry, fruits, flowers, vegetables, milk, butter, cream or eggs produced or grown by that individual and not purchased for sale.
- 3) Any vehicle exempt from licensing requirements by the commonwealth.
- 4) Motor vehicles, trailers or semitrailers owned by an officer or employee of the commonwealth who is a nonresident of the county and uses the vehicle in the performance of his duties for the commonwealth under an agreement for such use.
- 5) Any motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer owned by a dealer or manufacturer for sale or sales demonstration.
- 6) All active members of volunteer fire departments and rescue squads located in or serving the county on one automobile owned by such active member, but shall secure license plates and decals as required by this article and pay license fees on all other vehicles owned by such active member.
- 7) Any motor vehicle owned by a new resident moving to the county from another state locality and having paid a license fee to that locality for that motor vehicle shall be exempt until the prior locality's expiration date.

(Ord. of 5-11-76, § 23-18; Ord. of 6-8-76: Ord. of 10-12-04)

Section 74-55. Payment of county property tax.

The license tax provided for in this division shall be in addition to any other county property tax. No motor vehicle shall be licensed under this division until the applicant for such license shall have paid all personal property taxes properly assessed or assessable against the applicant by the county.

Section 74-56. Refunds.

There shall be no refund or proration of any license tax paid for any vehicle disposed of or moved out of the county after January 1 of each year.

In Re: Public Hearing - Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls CDA

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls CDA. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 12, 2010, February 19, 2010 and February 26, 2010 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a

newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore stated that at the February 9, 2010 meeting, the Board approved a request from the Prince Edward County IDA to consider amending the Ordinance which created the Granite Falls CDA.

The first proposed amendment to the ordinance is in regard to Facilities and Services; the second amendment is in regard to changes in the membership of the CDA.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Henry Shelton, Prospect District, expressed his concern on the appearance of a conflict of interest since the CDA Board is comprised of Board of Supervisors members. He asked if any of the Board members are shareholders. Mr. Shelton then asked if the citizens would be responsible in the event of default.

Chairman Fore said the County has no money involved through the CDA. Mr. Bartlett said a specific state statute exempts the County from obligations of the CDA.

Mr. Shelton then expressed his concern regarding the increase in property tax assessments and regarding the Water Authority.

Mr. Kenneth Jackson, Leigh District, expressed his concern regarding how citizens will be protected if the entire Board of Supervisors membership is on the Granite Falls CDA.

Mr. Bartlett stated when the Board of Supervisors meets as the Board of Supervisors, it would adjourn that meeting and would need to reconvene as the CDA in order to discuss CDA business. There would be two separate, advertised meetings, and the public would be invited.

Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Gantt said he would be more comfortable with the appointment of a citizen to the CDA. He said there is no conflict of interest, but there may be an appearance of a conflict of interest.

Discussion followed on the appointment of citizens to the CDA. Chairman Fore stated the Board of Supervisors or the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors makes the appointments to the CDA.

Mr. Bartlett recommended approval of the ordinance and to allow himself and the County Attorney to research state code regarding succession protocol.

Mr. James Ennis, County Attorney, said the initial CDA Board would hold the election of officers and would set up the Articles of Incorporation and the bylaws. He said the bylaws would provide for succession. Mr. Ennis said the members would then have the option to resign.

Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development, said the funding issue has a deadline two-months out.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ORDINANCE CREATING THE GRANITE FALLS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia (the "Board of Supervisors") authorized the creation of the Granite Falls Community Development Authority (the "CDA") by ordinance entitled "Ordinance Creating the Granite Falls Community Development Authority", adopted November 17, 2009 (the "Ordinance"); and

WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia (the "Authority"), as the owner of the land in the CDA and Prince Edward Development LLC (the "Purchaser") as the proposed purchaser of such land submitted a Petition, dated August 14, 2009 (the "Petition") requesting the Board of Supervisors to create the CDA; and

WHEREAS, the Authority and the Purchaser have submitted an Amendment to Petition requesting that the CDA be authorized to finance certain additional facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors desires to provide that the members of the CDA Board shall consist of the members of the Board of Supervisors, each such DCA board member to be appointed for a term of office coterminous with such member's term of office as a member of the Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing has been held on March 9, 2010, by the Board of Supervisors on the adoption of this Ordinance and notice has been duly published in accordance with the requirements of Section 15.2-5156 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Act"); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia as follows:

1. <u>Amendment of Paragraph 3 of Ordinance</u>. The Ordinance is hereby amended so that the first sentence of Paragraph 3 of the Ordinance reads as follows:

The CDA is created for the purpose of exercising the powers set forth in the Act, including financing, construction, acquiring and developing, and owning and maintaining if necessary, certain public improvements in connection with the development of a hotel and conference center, which

public improvements may include sewer system improvements, roads and road improvements, landscaping, parking, the Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center and such other facilities and services as are permitted by the Act, as set forth in the Petition, as amended by the Amendment to the Petition.

2. <u>Amendment of Paragraph 6 of the Ordinance</u>. Paragraph 6 of the Ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 6. <u>Membership of the Authority</u>
 - a) The powers of the CDA shall be exercised by an authority board consisting of eight members, such number being equal to the number of members of the Board of Supervisors, and such alternate members as the Board of Supervisors may appoint. The members of the Board of Supervisors shall constitute the members of the CDA Board and the term of each member of the CDA Board shall be coterminous with such member's term of office as a member of the Board of Supervisors, unless provided otherwise by resolution of the Board of Supervisors in accordance with the provision of Section 15.2-5113 of the Act.
 - b) The initial members of the CDA board shall be as set forth in the Articles of Incorporation for the terms set forth therein.

3. <u>Articles of Incorporation</u>. The County Administrator is authorized and directed to execute and file Articles of Incorporation with the State Corporation Commission in substantially the form on file with the County Administrator with such changes or corrections as the County Administrator may approve prior to filing.

4. <u>Recordation of Ordinance</u>. In accordance with Section 15.2-5157 of the Act, a copy of this Amending Ordinance, together with the Ordinance, shall be recorded in the land records of the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of the County of Prince Edward for each tax map parcel in the CDA District and the CDA District shall be noted on the land records of the County.

5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Mr. Ennis stated the settlement agreements and petitions for the Bush 4-B project were prepared, signed, filed with the Circuit Court, the Judge has entered an order confirming the easements to the County, and the funds have been disbursed to the landowners.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said the Board of Supervisors approved a request at the November 17, 2009 meeting to the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) requesting an amendment to the CRC's by-laws and charter allowing citizen representatives to serve as members of the Council. The CRC has denied the request.

He said these are very important as the eligibility and funding available to a locality from various federal programs are based on population numbers or other demographic information collected during the Census. Census data are used to reapportion seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and for the subsequent redistricting of state and local governments. Census data help to determine how more than \$400 billion per year in federal funding is distributed to tribal, state and local governments for important social services that affect local communities. Census data can help fund services for people in poverty, establish facilities for people with disabilities, determine locations for hospitals and senior centers, and forecast transportation needs, such as new roads and public transit options. He said it is imperative the citizens complete the questionnaires or surveys.

It is an exercise of the second – I'm lost for a word – not option – second right of refusal; the PEFYA being first, the County being second. We need to ensure that the "Field of Dreams" remains the "Field of Dreams." There has been a lot of years and a lot of work that has gone into that field by your organization and the folks before you all, to make that thing what it is today. And it provides for our county children a top-notch recreational program. The Board of Supervisors does not want that program to stop. The Board of Supervisors wants PEFYA to continue to operate that program just exactly like they're doing right now. We don't have any idea of telling you how to run the program. All we want to do is own the field so that you will continually have a place for our kids. That's all we want, and we want you to know that up front. There's been a mention of the Y[MCA]; the Y[MCA] doesn't enter this equation whatsoever. We want the PEFYA to continue to operate like you've been doing. Now, that is – that's pretty much it in a nutshell. You guys know that you have the first option of buying the field. And you can do so; if you've got the money, you can do so."

Supervisor Gantt said their option could be sold or split.

Chairman Fore said if the option is not exercised, the Board of Supervisors has voted to purchase the property. He then asked if there were any questions of the Board.

Mr. Bruce Davis, PE-FYA Vice-President, suggested a partnership between PE-FYA, the Town of Farmville, and Prince Edward County. He asked if the County can donate the land to PE-FYA to ensure the land would be used for recreational facilities. Chairman Fore stated he didn't believe so.

Supervisor Simpson said he had no problem with purchasing the property and giving full charge of the property to PE-FYA, and suggested that the property would be deeded to PE-FYA with a clause that it would revert to the County if its use is discontinued.

Mr. Ryan Johns, member of the PE-FYA Board, expressed concern that the capital expenditures would never actually belong to PE-FYA.

Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gantt asked if the funds could be borrowed. Mr. Bartlett said it would be a cash transaction.

Supervisor Campbell said that in discussion with Dr. Gordon the Town will continue to support PE-FYA. Supervisor Campbell said the programs need to continue to be run as they are for the children today and the children in the future. Supervisor Wiley said she supports funding for PE-FYA.

Supervisor Simpson asked if anyone else has offered to deed the land to PE-FYA with the clause that it revert to the purchaser in the event PE-FYA discontinues use of the property.

Mr. Carter said the PE-FYA Board of Trustees has five members; the Board of Directors consists of 11 members.

be part of the public/private partnership known as the Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center. The grant submittal date is March 31, 2010.

Mrs. Carney said part of the grant application requires holding two public hearings; the first was held on March 4, 2010 at which time Andre Gilliam of the Commonwealth Regional Council spoke regarding which type CDBG grants the County had previously been awarded or if the County currently had any open CDBG grants, which the County does not.

Mrs. Carney said while there is no specific matching fund requirement, the grant will score more favorably with a higher match pledge. The estimated cost of the hospitality training center is \$14 million. The total project estimated cost is \$42 million, creating 95 full-time equivalent job positions. She explained that this does not represent the number of indirect jobs to be created and local economic impact to area companies and tradesmen associated with the development of the project, and more than 100 jobs are estimated to be created as a result of the project construction. Mrs. Carney said the remaining funding sources for the Hospitality Training Center include other grant opportunities and IDA financing that will not be a liability to the County of Prince Edward. Submittal of the grant application does not represent an obligation to accept the funds if awarded or any financial obligation if other funding sources do not materialize. Mrs. Carney added that this project will not displace anyone in a housing area and no businesses will be closed.

Mrs. Carney then reviewed the Fact Sheet dated March 16, 2010 and a draft CDBG application. She explained the information is preliminary and will be further refined as the project continues.

Supervisor Wilck entered the meeting at 12:14 p.m.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing on the CDBG Application for Granite Falls Conference and Hospitality Training Center.

Jack Houghton, Farmville District, expressed his concern regarding the time of the public hearing as it is inconvenient for the public, and stated public hearings are preferable in the evening hours. He then said information regarding the CDBG application was not readily available, and that the Fact Sheet and resolution were helpful but general in nature. He asked the distribution of prospective jobs within the hotel, conference and training center and the pay scales for those jobs, and asked if the project can proceed without the rest of the facility, should it not materialize. He then asked if a "flag hotel" has yet committed to the project, and what grants are anticipated and how much funding is expected. Mr. Houghton asked if the Prince Edward Hospitality and Training Institute is the institute that will be created because of the consortium, and asked if a feasibility study or market study has been done. He then said the citizens of Prince Edward County strongly support effective economic development initiatives but the citizens must be advised of the anticipated projects.

Mr. Robert Anderson spoke in support of the proposed training center.

Ms. Jennifer Wall spoke in support of the project, and said the training center would provide jobs for tradesmen during construction and an opportunity for full time employment. She said at the Prince Edward County Public Schools' Tech Center which has a culinary school; the students have no natural center to go, and this training center would offer more opportunities for the area youth.

Mr. Robert Atkinson, owner of W. C. Newman Concrete, spoke in support of the project which would create work in the community.

Mrs. Pattie Cooper-Jones, Farmville District, spoke in support of economic growth but expressed concern on things passing without thorough investigation. She said the economy is in "bad shape" and asked why another hotel would be built at the expense of the taxpayers.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to adopt the resolution authorizing the submittal of a CDBG application in the amount of \$700,000 to VDHCD for the Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center and to authorize the Board Chairman and/or the County Administrator to sign all necessary grant documents to execute the application, grant reports and grant contract; the motion carried:

She said state revenues will be cut between \$1.1 million up to \$2.1 million. She said they are waiting for final word regarding VRS rates.

Mr. Wade Bartlett, County Administrator, asked if it is yet known what VRS will do in the final quarter of this year. Ms. Wahrman said she has no confirmation regarding the VRS holiday for the last

quarter of the fiscal year. The holiday would provide a savings of approximately \$189,000. It would offset the cut for the rest of this fiscal year; instead of approximately \$417,000, it would equal a cut of approximately \$280,000

Mr. Stanley Jones, Division Superintendent, said state funding cut for the rest of FY 10 is \$417,000.

Mr. Russell Dove, School Board Chairman, asked if schools can expect level funding. Mr. Bartlett said the Board's direction is to try to level fund with the exception of the debt service.

Mr. Dove then asked about the carry-over of funds in the amount of \$377,000. Chairman Fore said it is too early in the budget process to be able to tell.

Mr. Bartlett asked about the main use of the \$377,000. Mr. Dove said it would be spent on improvements to the football field as there is a need to repair unsafe playing surfaces. He said it would not go to operational expenses.

Mr. Dove presented a break-down of the Carry-Over Funds as follows:

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

Issue:	Amendment to Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance

Summary: The County has received a request for the Board to consider amending the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance to reduce the set back requirements which currently prohibits the siting of sewage systems and treatment works within 500 feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir. The enforcement of the County's ordinance basically prohibits the construction of dwellings within the 500 foot setback, as the state definition of sewage systems includes the commode, piping, etc.

Since the adoption of this provision in 2005, advancements in treatment systems available to homeowners have increased. The Board may wish to revisit this setback requirement and consider reducing it, dependent upon the type of sewage system which will be installed. One option would be to keep the current setback in place for dwellings using a conventional treatment system, where there is a single septic tank and drainfield, while allowing a reduced setback for dwellings using more advanced technologies such as alternative on-site sewage systems.

County staff, in consultation with the Virginia Department of Health, has drafted a possible amendment to the Sandy River Ordinance for the Board consideration. The amendment has been reviewed by the Count Attorney. If the Board should wish to proceed with an amendment to the ordinance, a public hearing is required.

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.1-13 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA 1950, AS AMENDED

Sec. 82-31.

- (a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
 - (1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
 - (2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy River Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640, at the end of Route 792, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
 - (3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
 - (4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward.
 - (5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
 - (6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind α description.
 - (7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
 - (8) Operation in or on the reservoir of a windsurfer, sailboard or any wind-propelled vessel, other than a sailboat, length of which shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet.
 - (9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
 - (10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - (11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
 - (12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
 - (13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
 - (14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.

- (15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicle, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.
- (16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads. Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measures and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.
- (17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- (18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners with express written permission from Prince Edward County may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- (19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the County-owned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.

CURRENT LANGUAGE:

(20) The siting of "sewerage systems" and "treatment works", as defined by the State Board of Health Sewage Handling and Disposal Regulations, within five hundred (500) feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.

POSSIBLE AMENDMENT:

- (20) The siting of dwellings using "conventional onsite sewage systems," as defined by Virginia Board of Health regulations, within 500 feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir. Dwellings utilizing an "alternative on-site sewage system" with "secondary effluent" or better as defined by Virginia Board of Health Regulations, and approved by the Virginia Department of Health, may be sited not closer than 200 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir, so long as the soil treatment area is located not less than 500 feet from the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- (21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-owned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- (b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of the authorization, and shall maintain the area in that

condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

(c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall, on conviction of a first offense of a violation of this section, be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Board of Health 12VAC5-613 Emergency Regulations for Alternative Onsite Sewage Systems

Part 1: General

12VAC5-613-10. Definitions. The following terms used in this chapter shall have the following meanings. Terms not defined in this chapter shall have the meanings prescribed in Chapter 6 of Title 32.1 of the *Code of Virginia* or in 12VAC5-610-20 et seq. (or successor regulation) unless the plain reading of the language requires a different meaning.

"Ammonia nitrogen" or "ammonia" means the non-ionized form of reduced nitrogen (NH3).

"Ammonium nitrogen" or "ammonium" means the ionized form of reduced nitrogen (NH_4^+) .

"Alternative onsite sewage system," "AOSS," or "alternative onsite system" means a treatment works that is not a conventional onsite sewage system and does not result in a point source discharge.

"Biochemical oxygen demand" (BOD) is the measure of the amount of oxygen required by bacteria for stabilizing material that can be decomposed under aerobic conditions.

"BODs" or "biochemical oxygen demand, five-day" means the quantitative measure of the amount of oxygen consumed by bacteria while stabilizing, digesting, or treating biodegradable organic matter under aerobic conditions over a five-day incubation period; expressed in milligrams per liter (mg/L).

"Conventional onsite sewage system" means a treatment works consisting of one or more septic tanks with gravity, pumped, or siphoned conveyance to a gravity distributed subsurface drainfield.

"Disinfection" means a process used to destroy or inactivate pathogenic microorganisms in wastewater to render them non-infectious.

"Dissolved oxygen" (DO) means the concentration of oxygen dissolved in effluent, expressed in mg/l or as percent saturation, where saturation is the maximum amount of oxygen that can theoretically be dissolved in water at a given altitude and temperature.

"Effluent" means partially or fully treated sewage flowing from a treatment unit or septic tank.

"Ksat" means saturated hydraulic conductivity.

"Large AOSS" means an AOSS that serves more than 3 single-family residences or a non-residential facility with an average daily sewage flow in excess of 1,000 gpd.

"Local health department" means the local health department having jurisdiction over the AOSS.

"Maintenance" means performing adjustments to equipment and controls and in-kind replacement of normal wear and tear parts such as light bulbs, fuses, filters, pumps, motors, or other like components. Maintenance includes pumping the tanks or cleaning the building sewer on a periodic basis. Maintenance shall not include replacement of tanks, drainfield piping, distribution boxes, or work requiring a construction permit and installer.

"Nitrate nitrogen" or "nitrate" means the stable form of oxidized nitrogen (NO3-)

"Nitrite nitrogen" or "nitrite" means the unstable form of oxidized nitrogen (NO2⁻⁾

"Non-tidal surface waters" means any perennial stream, river, lake, pond, or other body of water which is not affected by tidal actions. A perennial stream is one that is shown as a solid blue line on a United States Geological Survey (USGS) topographic map.

"Operate" means the act of making a decision on one's own volition (i) to place into or take out of service a unit process or unit processes or (ii) to make or cause adjustments in the operation of a unit process at a treatment works.

"Operation" means the biological, chemical, and mechanical processes of transforming sewage or wastewater to compounds or elements and water that no longer possess an adverse environmental or health impact.

"Operator" means any individual employed or contracted by any owner, who is licensed or certified under Chapter 23 (§ 54.1-2300 et seq.) of Title 54.1 as being qualified to operate, monitor, and maintain an alternative onsite sewage system.

"Organic loading rate" means the biodegradable fraction of chemical oxygen demand (biochemical oxygen demand, biodegradable FOG, and volatile solids) delivered to a treatment component in a specified time interval expressed as mass per time or area; e.g., pounds per day or pounds per cubic foot per day (pretreatment); pounds per square foot per day (infiltrative surface or pretreatment). For a typical residential system these regulations assume that biochemical loading (BOD₅) equals organic loading.

"Owner" means the Commonwealth or any of its political subdivisions, including sanitary districts, sanitation district commissions and authorities, any individual, any group of individuals acting individually or as a group, or any public or private institution, corporation, company, partnership, firm or association which owns or proposes to own a sewerage system or treatment works.

"pH" means the measure of the acid or base quality of water that is the negative log of the hydrogen ion concentration.

"Project area" means a recorded lot or a portion of a recorded lot owned or controlled by easement by the owner of an AOSS upon which an AOSS is located or contiguous to an a soil treatment area and is designated as such for purposes of compliance with the performance requirements of this chapter. In the case of an AOSS serving multiple dwellings, the project area may include multiple recorded lots as in a subdivision.

"Relationship with an operator" means an agreement between the owner of an AOSS and operator wherein the operator has been retained by the owner to operate the AOSS in accordance with the requirements of this chapter.

"Reportable incident" means one or more of the following: an alarm event, any failure to achieve one or more performance requirement, loss of power, removal of solids, replacement of media, or replacement of any major component of the system including electric and electronic components, pumps, blowers, and valves. Routine maintenance of effluent filters is not included.

"Saturated hydraulic conductivity" means a quantitative measure of a saturated soil's ability to transmit water when subjected to a hydraulic gradient.

"Secondary effluent" means effluent that has been treated to produce BOD₅ and TSS concentrations equal to or less than 30 mg/L each on a 30-day average basis and a total and an NH₃ content equal to or less than 1 mg/L.

"Secondary treatment" means biological and chemical treatment processes, individually or in combination, designed to remove organic matter.

"Settleable Solids" means a measure of the volume of suspended solids that will settle out of suspension within a specified time, expressed in milliliters per liter (mL/L).

"Sewage Handling and Disposal Regulations" or "SHDR" means 12VAC5-610-20 et seq. or successor regulation adopted by the Board of Health.

"Small AOSS" means an AOSS that serves no more than 3 single family residences or a non-residential facility with an average daily sewage flow of less than or equal to 1,000 gpd.

"Subsurface drainfield" means a system installed within the soil and designed to accommodate treated sewage from a treatment works.

"Soil treatment area" means the physical location in or on the naturally-occurring soil medium where final treatment and dispersal of effluent occurs; includes subsurface drainfields, drip dispersal fields, and spray fields.

"Tertiary effluent" means effluent that has been treated to produce BOD₅ and TSS concentrations equal to or less than 10 mg/L each on a 30 day average basis, a total NH₃ content equal to or less than 1 mg/L.

"Total Kjeldahl Nitrogen" or "TKN" means a measure of the total concentration of organic nitrogen, ammonia, and ammonium nitrogen

"Total nitrogen" means the measure of the complete nitrogen content of wastewater including TKN, nitrate nitrogen, and nitrite nitrogen expressed in mg/L.

"Total residual chlorine" (TRC) is a measure of the combined available chlorine and the free available chlorine available in a sample after a specified contact time.

"Total suspended solids" means a measure of the mass of all suspended solids in a sample typically measured in milligrams per liter (mg/L).

"Treatment train" means a site-specific combination of components that make up a wastewater treatment system; a simple example of a treatment train is a septic tank and a soil treatment area.

"Treatment unit" or "treatment device" means a method, technique, equipment, or process other than a septic tank or septic tanks used to treat sewage to produce effluent of a specified quality before the effluent is discharged to a soil treatment area.

"Turbidity" means the relative clarity of effluent as a result of the presence of varying amounts of suspended organic and inorganic materials or color.

"Vertical separation" means the vertical distance between the point of effluent application to the soil and a limiting condition of the site of the soil treatment area such as seasonal high ground water, bedrock, or other restriction.

Statutory Authority

§§32.1-12, 32.1-164, and 2.2-4011 of the Code of Virginia.

12VAC5-613-20. Purpose and Authority. Pursuant to the requirements of Va. Code §§ 32.1-12 and -164 et seq., 2.2-4011, and Acts of Assembly 2009, Chapter 0220, the Board of Health has promulgated this chapter to:

A. Establish a program for regulating the operation and maintenance of alternative onsite sewage systems;

B. Establish performance requirements for alternative onsite sewage systems;

C. Establish horizontal setbacks for alternative onsite sewage systems that are necessary to protect public health and the environment;

Issue:	Request from Tri-Boro Off Premise Signage

Summary: The County has received a letter from Fred DeMaio, President of Tri-Boro Shelving & Partition Corporation (See letter attached). Mr. DeMaio is requesting a change in the Prince Edward Industrial Park Covenants to allow the installation of two signs 48" by 96" inches or 4 ft. by 8 ft. along Route 628 Commerce Road and Dominion Drive. This is part of a planned marketing campaign to add two signs on the Tri-Boro Building along with signs along Route 15, Highways 360 and 460. The intent is to attract customers interested in buying metal shelving systems like those sold at Lowes and Wal-mart into Tri-Boro's Show room at their manufacturing facility on Dominion Drive.

The **PROCTECTIVE CONENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS** for the Prince Edward Industrial Park that were Adopted March 10, 1992, do not allow for such signage or billboards (See covenants attached). Under "A. Approval of Plans, item 1" the covenants specifically state:

No improvements, signs, outdoor lighting, fences, walls or public utility structure shall be erected, placed, or altered on any building site until the building or other improvement plans, specifications and plot plan showing the location of such improvements on the particular building site have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County as to conformity and harmony of external design with existing structures in the development, and as to location of the improvements on the building site giving due regard to the anticipated use thereof as same may affect adjoining structures, uses and operations, and as to location of the improvements with respect to topography, grade and finished ground elevation.

Under "A. Approval of Plans, item 2" the covenants specifically state:

No billboards or advertising signs other than those identifying the name, business, and products shall be permitted, except that a sign offering the premises for sale or lease may be permitted. . . No signs shall be erected or altered without the prior approval of the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County.

To comply with Mr. DeMaio's request the Industrial Park Covenants would have to be amended. After careful review by staff and to ensure the continued uncluttered attractiveness of the park, staff does not support the amendment of the Park Covenants.

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PROTECTIVE COVENANTS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS FOR THE PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY INDUSTRIAL PARK COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

Adopted: March 10, 1992

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, hereinafter referred to as the "County", is the owner of the Prince Edward County Industrial Park, hereinafter referred to as "Park" and

WHEREAS, the County intends to sell and/or lease parcels of land in the Park for industrial uses,

NOW, THEREFORE, the County hereby declares and provides that each and every parcel of the Park shall be conveyed subject to the following conditions, covenants, restrictions which shall be binding upon the Grantee, his heirs, successors, or assigns, to insure proper use and appropriate development of each building site and the grounds thereof; to protect the environment and aesthetics in this Park; to guard against the erection thereof of structures built of improper or unsuitable materials; and in general to provide for a high quality of development so that each building site will not adversely affect the health or safety of residents or workers in the area nor be detrimental to the use or development of other properties in the Park, and

FURTHER, that a copy of this covenant shall be recorded in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County, Virginia, and shall be binding upon and running with the land, including each and every parcel whether sold or leased in whole or in part and by reference made a part of each and every deed, option, lease or other grant of any interest in and to any parcel thereof as a part of the terms thereof.

A. <u>Approval of Plans</u>

- 1. No improvements, signs, outdoor lighting, fences, walls, or public utility structure shall be erected, placed, or altered on any building site until the building or other improvement plans, specifications and plot plan showing the location of such improvements on the particular building site have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County as to conformity and harmony of external design with existing structures in the development, and as to location of the improvements on the building site giving due regard to the anticipated use thereof as same may affect adjoining structures, uses and operations, and as to location of the improvements with respect to topography, grade and finished ground elevation.
- 2. No billboards or advertising signs other than those identifying the name, business, and products shall be permitted, except that a sign offering the premises for sale or lease may be permitted. No signs which have an intermitting beam or rotating

beam shall be permitted. Directional signs of two feet square or less are permitted. No signs shall be erected or altered without the prior approval of the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County.

- 3. Outside storage shall be confined to locations and screening thereof as approved in writing by the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County.
- 4. Landscaping shall be required in form and manner acceptable to, and according to plans approved in writing by the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County.

B. <u>Yard Requirements and Uses</u>

The minimum front yard set back shall be fifty (50) feet. The maximum front yard set back shall be one hundred (100) feet. Rear yard and side yard set backs shall be no less than twenty-five (25) feet, unless otherwise specified in the subdivision plat of said park, which shall be controlling, except that the minimum corner side yard shall be fifty (50) feet.

C. Parking Requirements

- 1. The Grantee shall not use any of the property within the minimum front yard set back for the parking of any automobiles, trucks, equipment, or the storage of any materials whatsoever.
- 2. The Grantee shall provide adequate paved off-street parking for all employees, clients and visitors.
- 3. No parking, loading, or unloading shall be permitted on any public road right-ofway.

D. Building Requirements

- 1. The minimum size of the principal building, excluding buildings for storage and/or service, shall be 7,000 square feet.
- 2. No temporary buildings, travel trailers, mobile homes, or storage facilities shall be stored on a lot except such buildings, trailers, homes or facilities which may be necessary during construction periods but then only for the periods during which actual construction is being pursued.
- E. <u>Utility Requirements</u>
 - 1. The Grantee shall be required to connect to the municipal water and waste water systems of the Town of Farmville unless otherwise approved by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County.

2. Distribution of primary electrical service to the Park shall be overhead in design. Individual electrical service to the Grantee shall be underground primary and underground secondary, unless otherwise approved by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County. The cost of the installation of the electrical service, both primary and secondary, shall be paid by the Grantee.

F. Sale or Lease Arrangements

- 1. The sale or lease of all parcels of land in this Park by the County shall be done and made in accordance with and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 15.1-18, 15.1-261.1 and 15.1-262 of Title 15 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.
- (a) In the event the grantee, his heirs, successors or assigns, fail to commence construction from within one year from the date of purchase, the County shall have the unqualified right and option, in its sole discretion, to repurchase the land at the original sale price. The County's failure to repurchase shall not be deemed a waiver of the right and option to repurchase.
 - (b) The term "commence construction" shall mean that the planned improvement is under contract for construction by a duly licensed contractor which contract shall have a completion date, and a commencement of work date of not less than six (6) months from the date of said contract, and shall be secured by a payment of and performance bond satisfactory to the County which shall include the County of Prince Edward as a named obligee.
- 3. (a) Should the grantee of any parcel of unimproved land desire or intend to sell or transfer said parcel or any part thereof, the County shall have the right of first refusal to purchase the same at the original sale price. In such instances the grantee shall notify the County by registered letter of its desire or intent to sell.
 - (b) In the event the County does not exercise its right of first refusal as provided above within forty-five (45) days from receipt of said registered letter, the grantee shall be free to sell said parcel or part thereof to a third party, subject to all of the conditions, covenants and restrictions set forth herein.

G. Maintenance and Operation

1. All grass, trees and shrubbery shall be kept in good appearance at all times. All grass and weeds shall be cut and shrubbery trimmed as necessary to maintain a neat appearance. If these conditions are not maintained satisfactorily to the County, the County may serve written notice upon the owner or his agent and if not complied with within one week, the County may correct the condition and bill grantee for actual cost of same.

- 2. No operation, manufacture, or building use in the Park shall produce or effect noise, vibration, dust, gas, smoke, heat, light, industrial waste, toxic matter, or odor to an extent or quantity as to endanger or to be detrimental to the public health, safety, comfort, or welfare of the park or of the community; and can be declared a public nuisance by the County.
- 3. Site storm drainage maintenance shall be performed by the grantee.

H. <u>Applicability</u>

. . **.** .

- 1. The right is hereby expressly reserved by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County to waive, modify, alter or amend all or any part of these covenants, conditions and restrictions from time to time as circumstances justify.
- 2. The enforcement of the restrictions and covenants contained within this Resolution shall be by proceedings at law or in equity against any person or persons violating or attempting to violate any covenant, condition or restriction, either to restrain violation or to recover damages. Such proceedings may be commended by any owner or owners of lots in said Park or by the County.
- 3. Invalidation of any one of these restrictions contained within these covenants, by judgement or court order, shall in no way affect any of the other provisions hereof which shall remain in full force and effect.
- 4. Grantor's approval of any building plans, specifications, site or landscape plans or elevations or any other approvals or consents given by grantor pursuant hereto or otherwise, shall not be deemed a warranty, representation or covenant that such buildings, improvements, landscaping or other action taken pursuant thereto or in reliance thereon whether by grantor or anyone else complies with, or is not in violation of any applicable laws, rules, regulations, the sole responsibility for all of same being upon the grantee and grantor is hereby expressly released and relieved of any and all liability in connection therewith.
- 5. The right is hereby reserved by the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County to retain easements for utilities as required.
- 6. These protective covenants, conditions and restrictions shall be in full force and effect immediately upon adoption by resolution of the Board of Supervisors. It shall be in effect for a period of twenty (20) years and shall be automatically renewable for successive periods of ten (10) years each thereafter unless and until otherwise terminated by the governing body.

Issue:	County Administrator's Report - Alternate Route 628

Summary:

It has been envisioned the County's portion of the cost associated with this project would be paid by the developer with financing through the CDA, the funds being derived from a special levy on all taxable real property located within the CDA district, namely the project. But even before the development of this project the Board had a long-time desire to move Route 628 due to safety reasons associated with the Schools complex.

Prince Edward County requested and was awarded a VDOT Revenue Sharing Project for the relocation of Route 628. We have received the standard project administration agreement from VDOT and on December 8, 2009 the Board authorized the County Administrator and the Board Chairman to sign all documents to execute the agreement.

To date we have not signed the VDOT agreement because (1) we had not selected an engineering firm to design the road and move the project forward, and (2) signing the agreement could potentially cause the County to begin incurring costs.

The developer has yet to secure all of his financing and as such, there is still the possibility the Hotel/Conference/Training center will not be built. If it is not built the cost of relocating 628 not covered by VDOT would have to be paid by the County. The developer estimates it will be August before all of the components of the financing will be committed. That means if the County moves ahead with hiring an engineering firm and signing the VDOT Revenue Sharing Agreement we risk having to pay costs incurred through August with County dollars. That amount is estimated not to exceed \$50,000 through August 2010.

To keep the project on schedule with the Hotel/Conference/Training Center opening in February 2012, we need to sign the agreement which will trigger the hiring on an engineering firm.

Recommendation: The Board has three possible decisions. First, is the Board interested in relocating Route 628 even if the Granite Falls Project is not developed? If so, we move ahead and investigate the ability of the County to create a service district which enables the County to establish a new revenue stream to recover the cost of the road from the property owners who directly benefit from the road. Second, if the board is willing only to relocate the road if the Granite Falls project is developed but we are willing to move the project forward knowing we may risk the \$50,000 – sign documents and hire an Engineer. Third, we will relocate the road only if the Granite Falls project is developed and we are not willing to risk the \$50,000 – wait to sign documents and hire an Engineer. The third option may impact the developer's ability to complete the project.

As the Board Chairman of the County of Prince Edward, I felt it important to relate to you the value of the Office of Commissioner of the Revenue, and your Commissioner, Beverly Booth, in particular. If you share my feelings, what follows may already be obvious to you.

As you know, Commissioners of the Revenue, along with their Treasurer colleagues, and the local governing body, comprise the traditional form of government in 128 of Virginia's 134 localities. This form of government has withstood the test of time in large part because we are directly accountable to the citizens we represent and because of the fundamental 'checks and balances' it affords them. The local governing body sets the tax rate, the Commissioner assesses and the Treasurer collects. No one component of government has complete taxing authority over its citizens.

In these challenging economic times, Beverly Booth and her office should be considered a core function of your local government. Without the efforts of this office all other functions of your local government would remain unfunded. In short, the Commissioner's office is the *one office* in a position to most assist the County of Prince Edward with identifying and generating revenue. It makes little sense to reduce funding for the very office which is most closely identified with revenue generation.

All Commissioners of the Revenue face tremendous fiscal challenges but still operate their offices with limited resources. We are extremely efficient with these resources and are, therefore, a very good value to the taxpayer. The cost to operate a typical office is less than .02¢ per revenue dollar administered.

I direct your attention to the enclosed "Discovery" circular and article from *Governing Magazine*. This circular illustrates the essence of what we do and what is possible when a cooperative approach is taken. It was placed in the hands of every member of the Virginia General Assembly recently.


Cross-Checking for Sales Tax

County leaders in Georgia are concerned that not all businesses are submitting sales taxes. In these tough economic times, counties need all the revenues they can collect to help balance budgets. To figure out where there may be missing funds, four counties participated in a pilot in which county lists of business licenses were cross-checked with the state department of revenue's list of businesses with sales tax accounts. In Hall County, almost 1,000 businesses were not present on the department of revenue's list, reports <u>The</u> <u>Gainesville Times</u>, suggesting that there are

businesses not submitting sales tax to the state. House Democratic Leader DuBose Porter estimated that the amount of tax missing could equate to \$250 million, reports the <u>Atlanta Journal-Constitution</u>. Hall County officials are using some of the findings in the pilot study to encourage local sales tax collecting (since the state currently collects taxes). (*Photo: House of Sims on Flickr*)



DISCOVERING MONEY IS OUR JOB AND WE DO IT WELL.

These are dire economic times for Virginia and every dollar added to local and state revenue makes a significant difference. Virginia's **Commissioners of Revenue** are making that difference through discovery of unpaid and misallocated tax dollars.

The Commissioners of Revenue are responsible for the fair administration of taxes levied by the Commonwealth and local government. They handle a myriad of duties in service to citizens, their localities and to the Commonwealth. Commissioners insure that business licenses, business and personal property assessments, cigarette tax stamps, etc. are monitored and held in compliance with Virginia Code and local ordinances. Additionally, Commissioners of Revenue act as a liaison between the taxpayers and the Commonwealth by ensuring that many taxpayer inquiries are resolved at the local level.

Commissioners work continuously to discover unreported state and local revenues. This year alone, Commissioners discovered that a major Virginia corporation had leased equipment to the Commonwealth but had failed to report that equipment. Commissioners identified the amount, approximately **\$5,000,000**, and coordinated the collection of delinquent tax, spanning three years. Another example of discovery is Augusta County's identification of \$1,100,000 in previously undocumented equipment, which brought an additional **\$16,450** to the county.

To prepare their annual budgets, localities must be assured that one aspect of their revenue stream, the 1% "local option" of state sales tax, is precisely the amount due to them. By counter checking tax rolls, Commissioners of Revenue can determine if the correct percentage has been allocated to the localities. In 2008, the Commissioner in Fairfax City discovered over **\$1,900,000** in sales tax revenue that had been misallocated.

Careful and accurate discovery of revenue sources is critical not only in Virginia but in other states as well. In 42 of the 50 United States, elected constitutional officers partner with their states to secure complete and accurate assessment and collection of all tax revenue. As an example, *Governing Magazine* (see article opposite page) reports that in an effort to ensure that all businesses operating in Georgia were remitting sales taxes, Georgia officials partnered with local revenue officers and cross-checked business license records with state sales tax records. As a result of this partnership, *The Gainesville Times and Atlanta Journal Constitution* both reported that in one county alone, almost 1,000 businesses were not properly remitting sales taxes to Georgia and that the amount of missing revenue could be **\$250,000,000**. This type of partnership between the state and localities symbolizes what is possible to ensure that all revenues are properly remitted.

Discovery is what Virginia's Commissioners of Revenue do, and we do it very well. Particularly at this most critical time, Virginia's Commissioners of the Revenue are ready and eager to partner with all Commonwealth agencies to discover every possible revenue source.

Through a wide network of partnerships at state and local levels, Virginia Cooperative Extension brings the resources of Virginia's land-grant universities, Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, to the people of the commonwealth in rural and urban communities. We would not be able to fulfill this mission without the critical support of our partners, most notably in the very communities where our local offices are housed. We greatly value and rely on your local support for the delivery of our programs and appreciate stakeholder input. You provide an invaluable local foundation for our programs, which is essential for our community-based programming.

Extension is currently conducting a strategic planning and restructuring process. As part of this process, we are identifying specific, low-priority or duplicative programs that we will eliminate. Over the next 18 months, we will also create an organizational structure that meets the budget realities we are facing. The restructuring effort will ensure our organization remains relevant and has the flexibility to respond to current and emerging needs of all communities. We will keep you, our local partners, stakeholders, and supporters informed as this process evolves.

Dear Ms. Fishburne:

l received a copy of your letter of March 2, 2010 regarding the conditions of the roads in Elam Country Estates Subdivision in Prince Edward County and wanted to respond to your concerns.

While we certainly appreciate your frustration with the condition of the roads, the Department is unable to perform any maintenance on private roads. By law, the only way VDOT could perform this work is if the roads were added as state roads into the secondary system of highways.

There are three ways to have your road added into the state system for maintenance. The first is by Rural Addition, which is a program that would construct the roads to meet minimum standards. According to the Code of Virginia, section 33.1-72.1 a "street" must be shown and recorded on a plat or otherwise opened to the public use prior to July 1, 1992 to be eligible for state construction funding (Rural Addition). Since all of the roads in Elam Country Estates were constructed after this date, the roads are not eligible for construction and acceptance under this program.

The second method would be by our Revenue Sharing program. Under this program, VDOT will pay one half of the costs for construction of the road, and once construction was complete, the road would be accepted into the state secondary system of highways. The matching funds typically come from the property owners along the road being constructed. Should you wish to pursue this method, you can contact the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors who must make the request to the Department for these funds, and can guide you through the requirements to accomplish this.

The third method is for the road to be completely reconstructed to meet current design standards, including surfacing of the road. Once the reconstruction is complete, the road can be added to the secondary system. This would have to be accomplished by either the developer or the property owners. If you would like to pursue this option, you can call Daryl Edwards of this office at 434-983-2017 for more information.

Remember: census data help determine how more than \$400 BILLION in Federal funds are distributed to state, local and tribal areas each year. A complete count of your community in the census will help ensure that your community gets its fair share of census-based funding for the next ten years. If everyone across the nation mailed back their form, taxpayers could reduce the cost of taking the census by about \$1.5 billion.

Treasurer's Report

February Financial Statements: Dr. Bates referred members to the Treasurer's report enclosed in the Council packet for comments. Dr. Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded the approval of the report as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report: No Report.

Executive Committee Report: The Executive Committee did not meet in February, therefore there was no report.

Budget Committee Report: No meeting was held in February, therefore there was no report. Ms. Hickman stated she will be meeting with the Budget Committee in March.

Report on Chief Administrative Officer's Committee Meeting: Ms. Hickman stated the meeting was well attended and included Ms. Sherri McGuire, Executive Director of the Longwood Small Business Development Center, as the guest speaker. Ms. Hickman stated the guest speaker for March will be Ms. Debra Crowder with the South Central Workforce Investment Board.

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<u>Old Business</u>

President & Staff Reports:

<u>Discussion – Farmville/Hampden-Sydney Membership:</u> Ms. Hickman stated she had contacted Hampden-Sydney's President's Office again and was now notified that the President would not be available until this Summer for a meeting. There was discussion on the matter and it was decided to have Ms. Hickman to continue to try and set up a meeting.

Ms. Hickman stated additional budget request letters were sent to Farmville, Hampden-Sydney, Nottoway and Blackstone this past month to consider membership in the CRC.

Update on CRC Rural Long Range Transportation Plan

Ms. Foster stated the CRC's Transportation Committee met on February 24th. The Committee reviewed the State Consultant's traffic count locations for the Identified Transportation Deficiency areas in the CRC's Rural Long Range Transportation Plan. Also discussed at the Committee meeting was information provided by the VDOT Residencies that April 23, 2010, is the day the transitions will begin for the final cuts to VDOT. It was however noted, that this transition of change in services will take several months and will likely continue into the Fall. It was stated the level of service by Residencies that many counties currently enjoy will change somewhat over the coming months. One example noted was that VDOT Residency personnel will only attend Board of Supervisors meeting when specifically requested for a specific item or report.

CRC Sidewalk Survey Results, Partnership with Longwood University, Dr. Walter Witschey: Ms. Foster gave a PowerPoint presentation on the CRC Sidewalk Survey Results. Slides were created by Longwood students participating in the project. Ms. Foster stated VDOT requested that CRC conduct a sidewalk survey in the CRC region to obtain data on the sidewalk locations. It was stated that currently VDOT did not have very accurate information on the locations of sidewalks in the region. Due to large land area in the CRC region the project was broken up into the two VDOT regions: Lynchburg and Richmond districts. It was decided to survey the Lynchburg VDOT District region first which includes Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland and Prince Edward counties. During this process it was also decided to collaborate with Longwood University to complete the project. Ms. Foster stated Dr. Walter Witschey, Professor of Anthropology and Science Education, with Longwood University was contacted to assist in the project. Dr. Witschey's Fall Class of Introduction to Geographic Information Systems (GIS) was selected to assist in the project. Dr. Witschey stated this was an opportunity for the students to use GIS in a real world example and also to assist the CRC in completing a project goal. Dr. Witschey stated 14 students used handheld GPS units in the field to accurately map the locations of the sidewalks. Students were accompanied in the field by CRC staff. Students also utilized Google Earth technology to prepare field maps of locations before going out in the field. Ms. Foster stated the project was very successfull and thanked Dr. Witschey and Longwood University for allowing the CRC the opportunity to collaborate on this project. Ms. Foster stated because of the successful project, VDOT has already been notified that the CRC will be requesting similar assistance from Dr. Witschey in mapping the sidewalks in the Richmond District during the coming fiscal year. Dr. Witschey also thanked the CRC for the opportunity his students were provided in participating in this project. Ms. Foster stated maps of the sidewalk locations will be provided to the localities in the coming months.

<u>CRC Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update:</u> Mr. Fortune stated the State has contacted FEMA and requested an amendment to the CRC contract to reflect in-kind match by some of the localities in the project. Mr. Fortune stated Lunenburg County is the only county that will not be supplying an in-kind match. Mr. Fortune stated he has contacted the rest of the localities to request hourly rates of assigned staff in order to provide estimates to FEMA. Mr. Fortune stated he had not received the information as of this date from Charlotte, Buckingham or Prince Edward. A kick-off meeting is planned for late March or early April.

<u>Report on 2010 Local Food Systems Symposium</u>: Ms. Terry stated Prince Edward previously requested the CRC assist in facilitating a workshop on sustainable agricultural opportunities.

Ms. Martha Walker with Virginia Cooperative Extension was contacted to assist the CRC in this endeavor. Ms. Terry stated Ms. Walker put together the speakers for the program and coordinated with the CRC to make the arrangements for the Symposium. Ms. Terry stated the 2010 Local Food Systems Symposium was held on March 2, 2010, in the Mill Street Conference Room (downstairs). Ms. Terry stated the Symposium was attended by 35 people and 12 presenters. Ms. Terry stated there was good feedback from participants.

VAPDC 2010 Winter Conference: Ms. Hickman reported that Ms. Foster and herself attended the VAPDC 2010 Winter Conference in Richmond on February 17, 2010. Ms. Hickman stated the conference had a variety of good topics. Ms. Hickman stated two items were noted. There is a Virginia Liaison Office which keeps track of Federal legislation and regulations and keeps Virginia Cabinet members abreast of issues dealing with federal policies and funding. The new appointee, Ms. Jeannemarie Davis, pointed out since funding is scarce right now localities may be able to address mandates by talking to representatives about policies that can loosen regulations rather than asking for more funding. Also, Bill Shelton of the Department of Housing and Community Development gave a legislative report. Mr. Shelton came to the meeting directly from the General Assembly where the Governor had just released his budget proposal. Mr. Shelton noted several themes of focus relating to planning including: focus on development and commercial growth in new land development; several bills relating to tracking and monitoring growth in Urban Development Areas; new opportunities for economic development in agribusiness; capitalizing on cultural tourism; tax credits for clean energy and an emphasis on small business expansion. It was also noted there appeared to be a swing toward regulatory relief in land issues and mandates.

Ms. Hickman stated since the release of the Governor's budget it is apparent that many issues will have a major impact on the localities in this region. The final outcome will not be known until the close of the session.

Council Member Comments: None.

New Business

President & Staff Reports

<u>Call To Action – Senate Budget Amendment to Eliminate State Funding for all PDC's:</u> Ms. Hickman stated staff issued a call to action to CRC Council Members, local administrative chiefs as well as other agencies and related individuals to notify them of the Senate Budget Bill that proposes to eliminate all state funding for the PDCs across the State of Virginia. The House Budget Bill proposes a 15% cut in funding for PDCs. Ms. Hickman stated the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions has been very active in fighting this measure as well as keeping the PDCs informed of updates. It was also noted that the Virginia Association of Counties has also endorsed the PDCs continued funding.

Ms. Hickman stated State funding as well as member investments is utilized by the CRC as flexible funding to provide match to other funding received by the CRC. Ms. Hickman stated based on the current adopted budget, State funding equates to 20% of the budget. Ms. Hickman stated currently the conferees are negotiating the final budget. The General Assembly is scheduled to adjourn on Saturday, March 13, 2010, however, every indication is that there

will be an extension. Ms. Hickman encouraged members to contact legislators and request they endorse the House Budget Bill and help defeat the Senate Budget Bill.

Ms. Hickman stated staff would watch this closely and would provide an update.

<u>Request from Amelia County for CRC Contract Amendment for the Amelia County CDBG</u> <u>Telecommunications Planning Project</u>: Mr. Fortune stated last year the CRC assisted Amelia County in applying and implementing a CDBG Planning Grant for Telecommunications. Mr. Fortune stated the County has since that time applied for and received an additional \$22,000 in planning grant funds. Amelia has requested that the CRC assist in implementing this grant. Mr. Fortune stated enclosed in the Council packet is the request from Amelia County to amend the original CRC's contract with the County.

Mr. Bennett moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the contract amendment between the CRC and Amelia County. Motion carried.

<u>Prince Edward Request for a Letter of Support for the IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training</u> <u>Center</u>: Ms. Hickman stated enclosed in the Council packet is a request from Prince Edward County for a letter of support for the IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center project. The Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center is a part of a public/private partnership to build a full service 175 room Hotel, Conference and Hospitality Training Center in Prince Edward County. The County intends on applying for grant funds and requests this letter of support for the project.

Mr. Fore moved and Mr. Osl seconded for the CRC to provide a letter of support for the Prince Edward County IDA's Granite Falls Hospitality Training Center project. Motion carried.

<u>2010 CDBG Regional Priorities Resolution:</u> Ms. Terry stated each year the Department of Housing and Community Development requests that Planning Districts solicit input on regional priorities from the localities for the upcoming Community Development Block Grant competition. Ms. Terry stated all of the localities in the CRC region were notified and requested to provide input. Ms. Terry stated 11 comments were received. Enclosed in the Council packet is the final proposed Regional Priorities for Planning District 14.

Mr. Osl moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the proposed 2010 CDBG Regional Priorities Resolution. Motion carried.

<u>Tourism/Marketing Update</u>: The Chairman stated the information is provided in Council packets for review.

Council Member Comments: There were none.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRPS): There were no local CIRPS.

<u>Council Member Comments:</u> There were none.

Other Business:

<u>Request from the Town of Kenbridge</u>: Ms. Hickman stated the Town of Kenbridge has requested assistance for grant writing services to the Virginia Tobacco Commission, Department of Environmental Quality, Department of Housing and Community Development and the USDA for an emergency wastewater project to include replacement of five pump stations and 9,500 feet of existing sewer line. Ms. Hickman stated the Town has discussed the project with all of the agencies and has been requested to submit applications. Ms. Hickman stated this request was not received in time to be included in the Council packet.

Mr. Wingold moved and Dr. Bates seconded to approve the request for Grant Writing Services from the Town of Kenbridge. Motion carried.

Dr. Bates moved and Mr. Osl seconded to go into closed session pursuant to VA Code Section 2.2-3711.5. to discuss matters dealing with Economic Development. Motion carried.



SCHOOLS PUTTING MORE LOCAL FOODS ON THE MENU

School food service programs' efforts to serve locally grown and Virginia-grown products have elementary school pupils bellying up to the salad bar and high school seniors weighing campus dining programs as they select colleges.

irginia's Farm-to-School Program, distributors and school nutrition directors are working to serve up foods from their own and surrounding communities.

"It took some time, and things were moving slowly but the program is growing now and helping source more local food in schools," said Matthew Benson, a community viability specialist for Virginia Cooperative Extension.

School systems in the counties of Augusta and Rockbridge and the cities of Harrisonburg, Staunton and Waynesboro are combining their purchasing power to acquire about 30,000 pounds of ground hamburger and beef patties for the 2010-2011 school year from a farmer and processor in Lexington.

The Local Food Hub in Charlottesville helps 17 schools in Charlottesville and the counties of Albemarle, Greene and Nelson to purchase local foods. The community-funded nonprofit operates a local food distribution center and gathers produce from more than 30 small farms.

"We deliver it to institutions, restaurants and grocery stores and address the volume needs and quality concerns of schools," said Kate Collier, Local Food Hub director.

Children have grown up shopping in chain grocery stores and are used to all produce being available throughout the year, whether it tastes good or not, Collier said. "Teachers say they enjoy learning more about seasonality and the local farms where the food is grown. They are passing that information on to their students. The children really seem to enjoy the variety of food, and farmers' stories."

It makes more sense economically to purchase local food, said Lisa Landrum, district nutrition supervisor for Goochland County Public Schools.

When Goochland County High School began serving Virginia-grown Fuji apples, students started going through a case a day, she said.

Landrum ordered sweet potatoes from Virginia Beach to serve in Goochland schools for National Agriculture Week in March 2009 and invited the grower to speak to elementary school students.

"It's really a great opportunity for students to learn where their food comes from," she said. She followed that up by featuring local ground beef in April and strawberries in May.

"The strawberries were picked the morning of delivery and were only a day old when we served them," Landrum said. "The children can really taste the freshness."

To get her "toes in the water," Andrea Early, nutrition program director for Harrisonburg City Public Schools, purchased local hydroponic Bibb lettuce for the schools last year.

"It was very workable, and the price was comparable to that of the pre-chopped romaine lettuce we had been buying," Early said. "We need to eat more fresh foods, and it is important for people, especially children, to understand where their food comes from and appreciate it."

Harrisonburg's schools feature local apples, watermelon, tomatoes, squash and peaches, when in season, as well as wholewheat flour, beef and pork. Early is interested in blanching and freezing green beans and berries this summer to use next year.

The elementary schools offer a salad entrée, which students are buying and actually eating, Early said.

"I was amazed! I thought out of a school of 400 that five would want salad, but instead we're serving 40 to 50 salads. They buy it and eat it. It's neat."

College students' tastes driving local emphasis in dining halls

College students are "sitting up and taking notice," about what they eat and where their food is grown—it's even affecting their choice of schools.

"Several first-year students have told me that campus food sustainability was factored into their college decision," said Kendall Singleton, sustainability coordinator for UVA Dining/ARAMARK.

About 16 percent of UVA Dining's food is local. "Serving local food is just one of many collective efforts that have big repercussions for our students and the local economy, and we plan to continue increasing the amount of local food purchased," Singleton said.

All of the university's apples and potatoes are locally grown, and local eggs, salsa, grassfed beef, cheese, squash, tomatoes, lettuce and cabbage are served when in season.

Washington and Lee University also serves local food on a daily basis.

In 2007, 8 percent of the food served at the university was local. That has grown to 30 percent in the main dining hall and 18 percent overall. All of the apples, hamburgers, potatoes and milk are local, and the school also features local berries, honey, flour, peanuts, eggs, beef, chicken and yogurt.

"Students get to eat good food and drink good milk. The staff noticed a difference in taste and flocked to it," said Christopher Carpenter, W&L special projects coordinator. "I noticed that everyone was going for the local tomatoes and was told that they were so much better. It's hard to go back to the old, crunchy tomatoes we used to get."

Carpenter said serving local food offers an economic benefit as well.

"We spend \$20,000 a year on local beef per school year. ... Many times, people forget the essential pillar to the global economy is our local economy. Local food is a part of that pillar."

Students at George Mason University in Fairfax enjoy fresh, local produce from supplier Keany Produce of Washington through the school's food service contract with Sodexho Campus Services.

"We would like to serve more local food," said Peter Schoebel, Mason Dining executive chef.
