At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House,

thereof, on Tuesday the 10th day of March, 2009; at 7:00 p.m., there were present:

William G. Fore, Jr. Sally W. Gilfillan Robert M. Jones Charles W. McKay James C. Moore Howard F. Simpson Lacy B. Ward Mattie P. Wiley

Also present: Wade Bartlett, County Administrator; Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator; Jonathan L. Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development; James Ennis, County Attorney; Sharon Lee Carney, Director of Economic Development & Tourism; Alan Leatherwood, Resident Highway Engineer; and Mark McKissick, Assistant Resident Engineer.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor Moore offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Sheila Gibbs, Leigh District, expressed concerns regarding the condition of Rainbow Lane. She said the dirt road leads to ten residences and the conditions of the road are not feasible for transportation. Mrs. Gibbs asked how the road can be paved and included in the county or state maintenance program. Chairman Fore asked for a state road number; Mr. Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said Rainbow Lane is a private road.

Jeffrey Anderson, Leigh District, agreed with Mrs. Gibbs and said the half-mile long road is a safety hazard. He asked why Rainbow Lane is considered a private road, and asked how to get the road paved and maintained.

Mary Clements, Leigh District, said Rainbow Lane is a dangerous road, and the road is beginning to deteriorate. She said she is concerned that emergency vehicles may have difficulty in getting to the residences because of the condition of the road. Mrs. Clements said prior to purchasing the house, she and her husband learned of an association that, for a yearly fee, would maintain the road; no one else on Rainbow Lane knew anything about it. She also asked how to get the road paved and maintained by the county or state.

Amanda Jackson, Leigh District, requested a presentation by Dr. Schafran of Old Dominion University and Draper Aden Associates to inform the citizens of the test results from the Sandy River Reservoir testing and the project in general. Chairman Fore said contact will be made with both to determine a date for a presentation.

Sharon Dotson, Leigh District, expressed concerns regarding the draft overlay ordinance. She said the citizens want best management practices for the water but is concerned that it is being done for appearances because of the landfill. She gave a history of the Sandy River Reservoir project and The Manor. She said a bond was executed for financing and asked about the costs. Supervisor Gilfillan asked if the bonds referred to had been sold; Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said the bonds of the CDA are not debt or bonds of the County of Prince Edward, and it is unknown if they were sold. They may have been bonds or debt of the CDA, but they would have clearly stated on the face that they were not debt of the County of Prince Edward. No County money is in the CDA or in the Poplar Hill project. Discussion followed.

Tim Dotson, Leigh District, asked about the need for water testing of the reservoir, adding the water sources surrounding the reservoir were not tested. He asked how many Board members approve of the restrictions presented in the draft Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District ordinance. Supervisor Jones said the ordinance is being revised by the Planning Commission, and until the changes are complete, he cannot give an opinion. Supervisor Moore stated that he received the Conflict of Interest Opinion which determined no conflict of interest, and as a private citizen, felt the ordinance had been too restrictive. He said it needs to be revised.

Kenneth Jackson, Lockett District, inquired about the discrepancies with the land sale and the process taken. He submitted a request for a list of all RFPs for the past two years, and requested use of the

Board room by the Prince Edward County Community Association. He claimed improper notice was given for the public hearing on February 24, 2009. Mr. Jackson then said he spoke with Mr. Spates, Farmville Town Manager, who reported the annual cost to maintain the water line would not be \$5,000 a year as Mr. Bartlett had said at the February meeting, but \$60,000-\$65,000 a year.

Pattie Cooper-Jones, Farmville, expressed her concerns that a water treatment facility is not needed at this time. She said a need has not been demonstrated, and submitted a petition of 324 signatures opposing the construction of a water treatment facility and a waste water treatment facility.

Bemeché Hicks, Lockett District, said the infrastructure necessary to support a water treatment plant is not in place at this time. He said businesses would help offset costs and provide jobs, but without them, the taxpayers would pay for the system. He also expressed concern about businesses that are closing and leaving the county, and wanted the Board of Supervisors to place stipulations on any new businesses locating in Prince Edward County be required to pay good wages and benefits.

Jack Houghton, Farmville, said the Board should provide cogent, logical answers to the citizens regarding the water system. He said a water system should be customer supported and self-sustaining, but the County system has virtually no customers and will not have more customers without significant additional investments. He added development is planned at The Manor that will need public utilities, but there are no prospective customers or partners. He asked where the revenue will come from as there is no generation of cash surplus. Mr. Houghton said he is not aware of a plan for a solvent water system in the foreseeable future, and asked if other options were available.

Supervisor Ward asked about the difference between the figures presented by Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator, at the February 24, 2009 meeting and the one presented by Mr. Houghton; he also asked about the negotiations with the Town of Farmville. Mr. Bartlett said the maintenance costs of the lines would be minimal as the system is relatively new. He said the costs would be more if something were to break. Mr. Bartlett said he has spoken with Mr. Spates several times but that no agreement had been reached. He added the cost estimate he presented was for maintaining the line; new taps were not included in the estimate, as they are operational costs.

In Re: Public Hearing: School Board Appointments

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board Appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 20, 2009 and February 27, 2009 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore opened the Public Hearing and called on Supervisor Gilfillan to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 701, consisting of Dr. Geoffrey Orth, Michelle Giese, Dr. Robert Lynch, Betty Sumner, and Connie Young; and Supervisor McKay to introduce the Citizen Committee for District 401, consisting of Shelby Asal, Dr. John Eastby, and Pam Venable. No nominations were received from the floor.

Jerry Todt, District 701, asked about the procedure for the selection of school board members. Chairman Fore gave him a "Criteria for Selection of School Board Members" sheet.

Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

In Re: Commissioner of Revenue's Request: Tax Relief for Elderly & Disabled Ordinance

The Commissioner of Revenue requested the Board consider amendments to the County's ordinance providing tax relief for elderly and disabled citizens.

Chairman Fore recommended the appointment of a committee comprising Supervisor Simpson; Supervisor Wiley; Beverly Booth, Commissioner of Revenue; Mr. Bartlett; and James Ennis, County Attorney to review the existing ordinance and the recommendations of the Commissioner of Revenue. The Committee can then present their recommendations to the full Board for amendments to the County ordinance to insure the intent of the ordinance is maintained. The Board concurred.

In Re: Planning & Community Development Report

Mr. Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, updated the Board on the complaints presented during the February Board meeting regarding the Parc Crest Apartments. He said the issue had been investigated and no children were found residing at the apartment in question. Mr. Pickett said a full time care assistant is necessary for the tenant in that apartment as well. He added the representatives from Park Properties (owner of Parc Crest) will be installing "Private Property – Violators Will Be Towed" signs and parking permits and passes will be required in an effort to reduce some of the noise and traffic issues.

Mr. Pickett reported that five county residents attended the shelter that had been opened at Wilck's Lake due to the significant power outages caused by the recent winter storm. He said the Red Cross and

social workers were present to assist the residents. He added the residents that attended the shelter had called the Sheriff's Department for assistance.

Supervisor Moore inquired about the progress made in getting the wheelchair for the courthouse. Mrs. Puckett said staff is currently obtaining prices.

In Re: County Attorney's Report

Mr. Ennis said the proposed policy would establish a protocol for all newly elected and appointed officials to advise them of the existence of the Conflict of Interest Act and what procedure they should follow if they suspect they have a conflict of interest or wish to get a ruling from a Commonwealth's Attorney's office. He said the policy includes a form to be used as a disclosure statement. The official would be required to disclose interest prior to participation and prior to a vote that's taken. Every time the topic comes up in a meeting, it is required that a new disclosure be done orally and put into the minutes of the meeting, as well as the disclosure form be signed which certifies that the statements of disclosure are true and correct, and that the member is able to participate. He added it is advisable for the Board of Supervisors to consider the adoption of a policy for how public officials in Prince Edward County should respond to questions regarding conflicts of interest.

Chairman Fore recommended the adoption of the policy.

Supervisor Ward asked for clarification on the inclusion of businesses and contractors, and if the vote was necessary at this meeting. Mr. Ennis said it does not cover businesses, contractors or private individuals, only elected or appointed officials. Further discussion followed.

Supervisor Gilfillan said if approved, this policy should be presented to each elected and appointed member on January 1 of each year.

Conflicts of Interest Policy

I. Introduction

Our system of government is dependent in large part on its citizens maintaining the highest trust in their public officials. 1995 Va. Op. Atty. Gen. 2. The conduct and character of public officials is of particular concern to state and local governments, because it is chiefly through that conduct and character that the government's reputation is derived. 1995 Va. Op. Atty. Gen. 2.

The purpose of the Conflict of Interests Act (*Virginia Code § 2.2-3100 et seq.*) is to assure the citizens of the Commonwealth that the judgment of public officers and employees will not be compromised or affected by inappropriate conflicts. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3100*. To this end, the Act defines certain standards or types of conduct that clearly are improper.

The Act does not address all appearances of conflict and, in those cases; the public official must determine whether participation in a matter presents an unacceptable appearance of impropriety that will affect the confidence of the public in the official's ability to perform his or her duties impartially.

A knowing violation of the Act has serious consequences. A knowing violation is a misdemeanor (*Virginia Code § 2.2-3120*) and constitutes malfeasance in office (*Virginia Code § 2.2-3122*). In addition to criminal fines and penalties, a knowing violation may result in forfeiture of the office or employment (*Virginia Code § 2.2-3122*), the forfeiture of the value derived from the violation, and civil penalties in the amount of the value derived from the violation (*Virginia Code § 2.2-3124*).

Although the Conflict of Interests Act also covers conflicts arising in the contracting process, this policy pertains only to conflicts arising from a public official's personal interest in matters coming before a public body and other generally prohibited conduct. This policy also covers conflicts of interest not specifically covered by the Act.

Except as expressly stated otherwise, the term *public official* includes members of the County's public bodies, advisory agencies, committees and employees (collectively referred to as a *public body*).

II. Procedure if a conflict of interest in a transaction may exist

A public official should review pending matters and agenda materials for possible conflicts of interest and then do the following:

A. Notify the County Attorney's Office

If the public official believes that a conflict of interest may exist, the official should contact the County Attorney's Office immediately so that it is aware of the possible conflict, provide advice and, if necessary, assist the public official with the preparation of the required disclosure statement before the matter is considered.

After a full disclosure of the facts, the County Attorney's Office will advise the public official to seek an advisory opinion from the Commonwealth's Attorney.

B. Request an advisory opinion from the Commonwealth's Attorney

The Commonwealth's Attorney is charged to render advisory opinions as to whether the facts in a particular case would constitute a violation of the provisions of the Conflict of Interests Act to the County's public officials. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3126(B)*. If the public official believes that a conflict of interest may exist, he or she should make a full disclosure of the facts to the Commonwealth's Attorney and request a written opinion from that office. If the official relies in good faith on the opinion of the Commonwealth's Attorney, the official is immunized from prosecution for a knowing violation of the Act. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3121(B)*.

In order for this immunity to be effective, it is critical that the public official is certain that all of the facts are disclosed to the Commonwealth's Attorney. It is also important that the opinion request be made in sufficient advance of the public body's consideration of the matter so that the Commonwealth's Attorney has adequate time to prepare the written opinion. Finally, if the public official will participate in the matter based on the Commonwealth's Attorney's opinion, the official should have the written opinion prior to his or her participation.

C. Request Attorney General to review Commonwealth's Attorney opinion, and judicial review

If the opinion given by the Commonwealth's Attorney indicates that the facts would constitute a violation of the Conflict of Interests Act, the public official affected by the opinion may request that the Attorney General review the opinion. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3126(B)*. A conflicting opinion by the Attorney General acts to revoke the opinion of the Commonwealth's Attorney. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3126(B)*.

Regardless of whether an opinion of the Commonwealth's Attorney or the Attorney General has been requested and rendered, any person has the right to seek a declaratory judgment or other judicial relief as provided by law. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3126(B).

III. Determining whether a personal interest in a transaction exists

A conflict of interest exists if the public official has a *personal interest in the transaction*. The italicized words are defined by statute.

A. Personal interest.

A *personal interest* is a financial benefit or liability accruing to a public official or to a member of his or her immediate family. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3101. A member of the *immediate family* is either a spouse or any other person residing in the same household as the officer or employee, who is a dependent of the officer or employee, or of whom the officer or employee is a dependent. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3101.

A *dependent* is a son, daughter, father, mother, brother, sister or other person, whether or not related by blood or marriage, if the person receives from the

officer or employee, or provides to the officer or employee, more than one-half of his financial support. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3101*.

A personal interest exists in any of the following situations:

- 1. *Ownership in a business*: Ownership in a business if the ownership interest exceeds three percent of the total equity of the business.
- 2. Income from property or business: Annual income that exceeds, or may reasonably be anticipated to exceed, \$10,000 from ownership in real or personal property or a business.
- 3. Salary, compensation, benefits paid or provided by business: Salary, other compensation, fringe benefits, or benefits from the use of property, or any combination thereof, paid or provided by a business that exceeds, or may reasonably be anticipated to exceed, \$10,000 annually.
- 4. *Ownership of property:* Ownership of real or personal property if the interest exceeds \$10,000 in value and excluding ownership in a business, income, salary, other compensation, fringe benefits or benefits from the use of property.
- 5. Personal liability on behalf of business: Personal liability incurred or assumed on behalf of a business if the liability exceeds three percent of the asset value of the business. A business is a corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise, association, trust or foundation, or any other individual or entity carrying on a business or profession, whether or not for profit. Virginia Code § 2.2-3101.

B. Transaction

A *transaction* is any matter considered by the board or commission, whether in a committee, subcommittee, or other entity or department of the County, on which official action is taken or contemplated. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3101*.

C. Personal interest in a transaction

A personal interest in a transaction is a personal interest of an officer or employee in any matter considered by his agency. Virginia Code § 2.2-3101. A personal interest exists when an officer or employee or a member of his immediate family has a personal interest in property or a business, or represents any individual or business and the property, business or represented individual or business: (1) is the subject of the transaction; or (2) may realize a reasonably foreseeable direct or indirect benefit or detriment as a result of the action of the agency considering the transaction. Virginia Code § 2.2-3101.

Notwithstanding the above, a personal interest in a transaction is not deemed to exist where a member of the Board of Supervisors serves without remuneration as a member of the board of trustees of a not-for-profit entity and the Board member or member of his immediate family has no personal interest related to the not-for-profit entity. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3101*.

IV. What to do if a public official has a personal interest in a transaction

If a public official has a personal interest in a transaction, he/she must respond in one of the following ways:

A. When disclosure and disqualification required

A public official must disqualify himself or herself from participating if the transaction applies *solely* to the property or business in which he or she has a personal interest. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3112(A)(1)*. However, a public official is not disqualified merely because the official is a party in a legal proceeding of a civil nature concerning the transaction. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3112(D)*.

Once the public official is disqualified, he or she may not vote or in any other manner act on the matter. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3112(A)(1)*. However, an employee (not a board member or commissioner) who is disqualified may represent himself or a member of his immediate family in the transaction provided he does not receive compensation for the representation and makes a proper disclosure of the conflict. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3112(B)*.

A public official who is disqualified, or otherwise elects to disqualify himself, must promptly disclose the existence of his interest. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(E)*. The disclosure is typically announced by members of a public body during the meeting when the particular matter is called, and is set forth in writing in a form prepared by the County Attorney's Office and signed by the public official. The disclosure is reflected in the public records for five years in the office of the administrative head of the public body. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(E)*.

B. When disclosure required, participation allowed

A public official may participate in a transaction if he or she is a member of a business, profession, occupation, or group, the members of which are affected by the transaction. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3112(A)(2)*. This means that if the transaction affects not only the property or business in which he or she has a personal interest, but also other properties or businesses, the public official may participate in the transaction. For example, the Attorney General has determined that a member of an airport commission was not required to disqualify himself from participating in a commission's vote on an application for funding to acquire the member's property if the transaction included property owned by others as well. *1995 VA. Op. Atty. Gen. 2.* In that case, the commission was considering acquiring.

A public official who has a conflict of interest because of his membership in a business, profession, occupation or group is required to declare his interest. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(G)*. The declaration must state: (1) the transaction involved; (2) the nature of the official's personal interest affected by the transaction; (3) that he is a member of a business, profession, occupation, or group the members of which are affected by the transaction; and (4) that he is able to participate in the transaction fairly, objectively, and in the public interest. *Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(G)*. The disclosure is typically announced by members of the public body during the meeting when the particular matter is called, and is set forth in writing in a form prepared by the County Attorney's Office and signed by the public official.

The disclosure is reflected in the public records for five years in the office of the administrative head of the public body. Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(G). If

reasonable time is not available to comply with these disclosure provisions prior to participating in the transaction, the public official must prepare and file the required declaration by the end of the next business day. Virginia Code § 2.2-3115(G).

If a public official is unable to make the statements in the declaration of the interest without reservation, he or she should not participate in the matter and disqualify himself or herself from participating in the transaction.

C. When neither disclosure nor disqualification required

A public official may participate in a transaction if it affects the public generally, even though his or her personal interest, as a member of the public, may also be affected by the transaction. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3112(A)(3).

V. What it means to participate in a transaction

A transaction includes any matter considered by the public body on which official action is taken *or contemplated*. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3101. Thus, the *transaction* begins when some future action is contemplated, *e.g.*, when a complete application for a special use permit is filed with the County, and continues until a final decision is made by a County public body.

Participation is not included in the Act. However, it is clear that during the decision making process, *participation* includes not only voting on the transaction, but also engaging in any discussion related to it. The practice of some public bodies is for a disqualified official not to sit with the public body while the transaction is being considered so there is no question as to whether the disqualified official participated. Some public officials may even choose to leave the hearing room so that there is no question that the official tried to influence the public body through hand gestures and body language. Such an extreme measure, of course, is not required.

Participating in a transaction extends beyond the hearing room. Because a *transaction* includes any matter on which official action is contemplated, *participation* reasonably includes any activity that may influence the matter for which official action is contemplated, including talking to the applicant, other citizens, County staff and members of the County's public bodies. This broad application is consistent with the liberal interpretation to be given to the Act to effectuate its purposes.

VI. Avoiding the appearance of impropriety even though statutory conflict of interest does not exist

The Conflict of Interests Act does not address all conflicts of interest. There may be circumstances when a public official's interest in a transaction may not be a conflict within the meaning of the Act, but which may lend itself to an appearance of impropriety. In those cases, it is incumbent upon the public official to determine whether participating in the transaction presents an appearance of impropriety. *1995 Va. Op. Atty. Gen. 2.*

In determining whether an appearance of impropriety exists, the public official should consider: (1) whether the appearance of a conflict is unacceptable; and (2) whether the appearance of a conflict will affect the confidence of the public in the public official's ability to perform his or her duties impartially. *1995 Va. Op. Atty. Gen. 2.* If either of these elements is present, the public official should seriously consider disqualifying himself or herself from participating in the matter.

VII. The effect of disqualification on a public body's ability to transact business

If a disqualification leaves less than the number of members required by law to act, the remaining member or members have authority to act for the public body by majority vote. *Virginia Code* § 2.2-3112(C).

VIII. Generally prohibited conduct

In addition to those situations when a public official may have a personal interest in a transaction, the Conflict of Interests Act prohibits certain interests in contracts and other general conduct. Conflicts of interests arising in contracts are addressed in Virginia Code § 2.2-3105 *et seq.* This section addresses other conduct prohibited by Virginia Code § 2.2-3103, which provides that the following conduct by County officers and employees is declared to be unlawful:

- 1. Solicit or accept money or other thing of value for services: Except for special benefits authorized by law, an officer or employee may not solicit or accept money or other thing of value for services performed within the scope of his official duties, except the compensation, expenses or other remuneration paid by the County.
- 2. Offer or accept money or other thing of value for employment, appointment or promotion: An officer or employee may not offer or accept money or any other thing of value in consideration of obtaining employment, appointment, or promotion of any person with any governmental or advisory agency.
- 3. Offer or accept money or other thing of value to use position for contract purposes: An officer or employee may not offer or accept any money or other thing of value for or in consideration of the use of his public position to obtain a contract for any person or business with any governmental or advisory agency.
- 4. Use confidential information for personal or another's gain: An officer or employee may not use for his own economic benefit, or that of another party, confidential information which he has acquired by reason of his public position and which is not available to the public.
- 5. Accept money or other benefit that may influence performance: An officer or employee may not accept any money, loan, gift, favor, service, or business or professional opportunity that reasonably tends to influence him in the performance of his official duties. This rule does not apply to any political contribution actually used for political campaign or constituent service purposes and reported as required by Virginia Code § 24.2-900 et seq.
- 6. Accept opportunity that may influence performance: An officer or employee may not accept any business or professional opportunity when he knows that there is a reasonable likelihood that the opportunity is being afforded him to influence him in the performance of his official duties.
- 7. Accept honoraria: An officer or employee may not accept any honoraria for any appearance, speech, or article in which the officer or employee provides expertise or opinions related to the performance of his official duties. The term honoraria does not include any payment for or reimbursement to a person for his actual travel, lodging, or subsistence expenses incurred in connection with the appearance, speech, or article or, in the alternative a payment of money or anything of value not in excess of the per diem deduction allowable under Section 162 of the Internal Revenue Code.

- 8. Accept a gift where its timing and nature questions impartiality: An officer or employee may not accept a gift from a person who has interests that may be substantially affected by the performance of the officer's or employee's official duties under circumstances where the timing and nature of the gift would cause a reasonable person to question the officer's or employee's impartiality in the matter affecting the donor.
- 9. Accept gifts frequently so as to raise appearance of impropriety: An officer or employee may not accept gifts from sources on a basis so frequent as to raise an appearance of the use of his public office for private gain.

Each of these prohibitions will be liberally construed to apply as broadly as reasonable under the circumstances.

In Re: Other Business

Supervisor Ward suggested that the letter from Mr. Jack Houghton to Mr. Bartlett be answered.

He said all citizen requests should be answered, as the Board has been accused of violating the law repeatedly.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett briefly reviewed the proposed meetings and work session schedule for the completion of the FY 2010 County Budget. He said the schedule closely follows the meeting schedule held in 2008.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be an eligible voter and resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - 10. Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

Summary: For the past year the Industrial Development Authority has been working towards the development of 44 acres at the Prince Edward Business Park into 4 "ready-to-go" industrial sites. On March 1, 2009 construction bids for the site work were received with the winning bid coming in by Harold Collins Clearing and Grading, at \$526,516. The engineering costs for Hurt & Proffitt to continue the next phase of the project work is approximately \$39,475. Planning on a 4.5% project contingency of \$24,009, the total estimated cost of the project is \$590,000. The work would begin May 1, 2009 and to be complete in 120 days or by August 28th, 2009. To help offset this cost, the County has received a reimbursable grant award from the Tobacco Commission in the amount of \$193,510, effectively making the park development actually costing the County \$396,490. In addition, there are potentially other grant possibilities that the County may apply for.

The cost of grading and clearing of the sites is much less than the \$1.2 million originally projected 18 months ago due to the down turn in the economy, making this an excellent time to take advantage of reduced costs. Construction plans and engineering for the site development have already been completed by Hurt & Proffitt for \$67,994 and permits from DEQ and the Corp of Engineers have been issued, making the park construction ready to begin. With the approval of the Board of Supervisors, the IDA will make the official contract award to Harold Collins Clearing and Grading at their April 16, 2009 meeting. With the appropriation of the requested \$590,000 from the Economic Development Fund to the IDA, the IDA will also manage the development of the proposed industrial sites, and the grant requirements by the Tobacco Commission.



Issue:	Flood Control Dams - O&M Agreements and O&M Plans

Summary: Operation and Maintenance Agreements

Prince Edward County and the Piedmont Soil & Water Conservation District (PSWCD) are sponsors for 14 flood control structures (dams) in the County. Construction of 9 dams in the Buffalo Creek Watershed dates back to the 1960's and construction of the 5 dams in the Bush River Watershed has been completed as recently as 1999.

Last year, the USDA - Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) requested that the original O&M Agreements associated with these dams be updated and supplied a template which included an estimate of annual maintenance costs. This 'financial plan' component gives the sponsors an opportunity to estimate costs for maintenance items and is intended as a planning tool to help sponsors plan for maintenance. Jonathan Pickett and Alecia Daves-Johnson have worked with NRCS and the PSWCD to prepare the updated O&M Agreements in a version that satisfies all three parties, as closely as possible. The PSWCD, our co-sponsors, approved the plans at their February 2009 Board Meeting and ask that the County join them in approving these new Agreements and Plans. The O&M Agreements require a signature.

The O&M responsibility includes the replacement of any component of the structure as needed, during the life of the dam (most of these have 100 year life from the date that construction was completed). Sponsors are also obligated to complete all maintenance, repair, or replacement activities with a reasonable time after identification of such need. The document further outlines the basic responsibilities of each party, as summarized below:

- **NRCS** will provide technical and engineering assistance as resources are available. NRCS will also provide assistance with the O&M Documents and provide As-Built plans when requested.
- **PSWCD** will ensure inspections are performed and maintenance items are addressed, also keeping Emergency Action Plans updated. Landowners will be provided with conservation planning and application activities to ensure the land treatment will protect the life span and proper functioning of the dams.
- **Prince Edward County** will assist with funding an annual amount necessary to satisfy the maintenance needs (which can include funding and grants from VA or other sources), and will consider the flood control structures in the Comprehensive Plan and land-use planning to ensure that land-use changes will not increase the hazard classification of the dams.

Operation and Maintenance Plans

The O&M Plan is part of the O&M Agreement. It defines the responsibilities for operating, inspecting and maintaining floodwater retarding structures. It describes the structures and provides a list of estimated costs associated with the expected maintenance items through the life of the dam, broken down into annual amounts. The Plan provides more technical detail of the maintenance items, while the Agreement describes the relationship of the Sponsors and NRCS, gives general maintenance descriptions and property management standards.

Staff has reviewed the O&M Agreements and O&M Plans. The concerns with the documents are outlined below for your consideration:

- 1. Any revision is by mutual consent of Sponsors and NRCS. (A review of the O&M Agreement is required every 5 years.)
- 2. This version gives NRCS the flexibility to meet their obligations "to the extent that its resources permit," although this same flexibility is not extended to either of the sponsors.
- 3. Proposed agreements between the Sponsors and other parties for the operation or maintenance of the dams will not negate the Sponsor's responsibility identified in the O&M Agreement.
- 4. If NRCS determines that the Sponsors have failed to comply with the O&M provisions, consequences may include requiring the Sponsors to reimburse the Federal government for the financial assistance provided by NRCS. There is no language that establishes consequences should NRCS fail to comply.

The County can decline to sign these new revisions and O&M formats and maintain the existing O&M Agreements (some date 50 years ago). However, Dam Safety and Maintenance has been an item of growing popularity in the State and Federal legislative arenas. The financial component of the new O&M Plans is to encourage maintenance planning and will serve to *validate the needs of local sponsors when seeking increased funding support for these structures from the state and federal partners.*

Attachments:	 One copy of an O&M Agreement and an O&M Plan is included for your review. The O&M documents are the same for all structures, with identifying language specific to each dam. There is one exception, Bush #7, "Hobgood's" on Route 633, which is designed to be a dry pond structure (no permanent pool). The annual maintenance costs for Bush #5 and Bush #7 are a little higher. Operation and Maintenance Agreement Dam Site No. 4B Bush River Watershed, Prince Edward County, Virginia

This Agreement made on _______ is between the United States Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service, hereinafter referred to as NRCS, and the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District and Prince Edward County, Virginia, hereinafter referred to as the Sponsors.

The Sponsors and NRCS agree to carry out the terms of this agreement for the operation and maintenance (O&M) of the following structure in the Bush River Watershed in Prince Edward, Virginia. This structure is a part of the Bush River Watershed Plan that was approved on July 28, 1982, under the authority of Public Law 83-566.

• Floodwater retarding structure Dam No. 4B - located on Bush River approximately 6 miles upstream of Farmville, located in Prince Edward County, Virginia.

The Sponsors' responsibility for O&M begins when the structure is determined complete by NRCS. This responsibility shall include the replacement of any component of the structure as needed. This O&M Agreement remains in effect until July 18, 2101. After the expiration of this O&M Agreement, the Sponsors may still continue to be liable until the structure is removed or modified to eliminate potential hazards.

This Operation and Maintenance Agreement supersedes the original Operation and Maintenance Agreement for Dam No. 4B executed on September 2, 1999.

General

- A. The Sponsors shall:
 - 1. Be responsible for inspecting, operating and performing, or having performed, all operation, maintenance, and replacement activities associated with the floodwater retarding structure No. 4B as described in the Operation and Maintenance Plan;
 - 2. Complete all maintenance, repair, or replacement activities within a reasonable time after the identification of such need;
 - 3. Obtain prior NRCS approval of all plans, designs, and specifications for any planned alteration to the structure;
 - 4. Be responsible for the replacement of structure components that have a design life of less duration than the program life of the structure as specified in the O&M Plan;
 - 5. Prohibit the installation of any structure or facility that will interfere with the operation or maintenance of the structure;
 - 6. Notify NRCS of any proposed agreement with other parties for the operation or maintenance of all or any part of the structure, and provide NRCS with a copy of the executed agreement. Such agreements will not negate the Sponsors' responsibility as stated in this agreement;

Inspections and Reports

The Sponsors shall inspect the structure as specified in the O&M Plan. NRCS may inspect the structure at any reasonable time during the period covered by this agreement. At the discretion of the State Conservationist, NRCS personnel may assist the Sponsors while conducting the inspections.

The Sponsors shall prepare a written report of each inspection and provide a copy to the NRCS District Conservationist within 30 days from the date the inspection was conducted. The report shall include the following:

- Date(s) of inspection;
- Names of inspectors and participants;
- Features of the practice that were inspected;
- Description of conditions observed;
- Maintenance work required; and
- Planned maintenance work schedule.

Any unusual circumstances observed between annual inspections shall be reported immediately to the local NRCS District Conservationist.

If this structure is classified as a low or significant hazard structure, the hazard class must be verified every 5 years by a registered professional engineer.

Records

The Sponsors shall retain a record of all inspections and O&M performed including costs and completion dates. Records shall be maintained as detailed in the O&M Plan and shall be made available to NRCS upon request.

Financial Plan

The following are anticipated average annual costs for O&M and the method of financing that the Sponsors will use to obtain funds. The O&M Plan for the structure will contain individual component costs, along with an amount to be placed into a budget account to be used for O&M activities. All costs will be updated at least once every 5 years to account for inflation using the Bureau of Reclamation's Water Resources Construction Cost Index, and to adjust the amount to be added to the escrow account.

Floodwater retarding structure No. 4B = \$4,060.00 (estimated) /year – financed through annual funding by the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District and Prince Edward County.

Violations

This O&M Agreement is a legally binding contract which shall be enforced as necessary to protect the interests of the government and the general public.

If NRCS determines that the Sponsors have failed to comply with the provisions of the O&M Agreement and O&M Plan, consequences may include requiring the Sponsors to

Property Management Standards

- 1. This attachment prescribes uniform standards governing the utilization and disposition of property furnished by the Natural Resources Conservation Service or acquired in whole or in part with NRCS funds. Sponsors are responsible for observing the standards set forth herein. Sponsors are authorized to use their own property management standards and procedures as long as the provisions of this attachment are included.
- 2. Definitions:
 - (a) <u>Real property</u>. Real property means land, including land improvements, structures and appurtenances thereto, excluding movable machinery and equipment.
 - (b) <u>Personal property</u>. Personal property means property of any kind except real property. It may be tangible -- having physical existence, or intangible -- having no physical existence, such as patents, inventions, and copyrights.
 - (c) <u>Nonexpendable personal property</u>. Nonexpendable personal property means tangible personal property having a useful life of more than one year and an acquisition cost of \$300 or more per unit. A grantee may use its own definition of nonexpendable personal property provided that such definition would at least include all tangible personal property as defined above.
 - (d) <u>Expendable personal property</u>. Expendable personal property refers to all tangible personal property other than nonexpendable property.
 - (e) <u>Excess property</u>. Excess property means property under the control of any grantee which, as determined by the head thereof, is no longer required for its needs or discharge of its responsibilities.
 - (f) <u>Acquisition cost of purchased nonexpendable personal property</u>. Acquisition cost of an item of purchased nonexpendable personal property means the net invoice unit price of the property including the cost of modifications, attachments, accessories, or auxiliary apparatus necessary to make the property usable for the purpose for which it was acquired. Other charges such as the cost of installation, transportation, taxes, duty or protective in-transit insurance, shall be included or excluded from the unit acquisition cost in accordance with the grantee's regular accounting practices.
- 3. Use and Disposition of Real Property:
 - a. Title to real property shall vest in the sponsor subject to the condition that the sponsor shall use the real property as long as needed for the purpose for which it was acquired and in accordance with the O&M Agreement.

- (2) Shared use. During the time that nonexpendable personal property is held for use on the project or program for which it was acquired, the sponsor shall make it available for use on other project or program if such other use will not interfere with the work on the project or program for which the property was originally acquired. First preference for such other use shall be given to other projects or programs sponsored by NRCS; second preference shall be given to other projects or programs sponsored by other Federal agencies. If the property is owned by NRCS, use on other activities not sponsored by the Federal government shall be permissible if authorized in writing by the State Conservationist.
- c. <u>Disposition of other nonexpendable property</u>. When the sponsor no longer needs the property as provided in 5b above, the property may be used for other activities in accordance with the following standards:
 - Nonexpendable property with a unit acquisition cost of less than \$1,000.00. The sponsor may use the property for other activities without reimbursement to NRCS or sell the property and retain the proceeds.
 - (2) Nonexpendable personal property with a unit acquisition of \$1,000 or more. The sponsor may retain the property for other uses provided that compensation is made to NRCS or its successor. The amount of compensation shall be computed by applying the percentage of NRCS participation in the cost of the original project or program to the current fair market value property. If the sponsor has no need for the property and the property has further use value, the sponsor shall request disposition instructions from NRCS.

The NRCS shall determine whether the property can be used to meet NRCS's requirements. NRCS shall issue instructions to the sponsor no later than 120 days after the grantee request and the following procedures shall govern:

- (i) If so instructed or if disposition instructions are not issued within 120 calendar days after the sponsor's request, the sponsor shall sell the property and reimburse NRCS an amount computed by applying to the sales proceeds the percentage of NRCS participation in the cost of the original project or program. However, the sponsor shall be permitted to deduct and retain from NRCS's share \$100 or ten percent of the proceeds, whichever is greater, for the sponsor's selling and handling expenses.
- (ii) If the sponsor is instructed to ship the property elsewhere, the sponsor shall be reimbursed by NRCS with an amount which is computed by applying the percentage of the sponsor participation in the cost of the original grant project or program to the current fair market value of the property, plus any reasonable shipping interim storage costs incurred.

theft of nonexpendable property shall be investigated and fully documented; if the property was owned by NRCS, the sponsor shall promptly notify NRCS.

- (5) Adequate maintenance procedures shall be implemented to keep the property in good condition.
- (6) Where the sponsor is authorized or required to sell the property, proper sales procedures shall be established which would provide for competition to the extent practicable and result in the highest possible return.
- 6. <u>Expendable personal property</u>. Title to expendable personal property shall vest in the sponsor upon acquisition. If there is a residual inventory of such property exceeding \$1,000 in total aggregate fair market value, upon termination or completion of the agreement and if the property is not needed for any other Federally sponsored project or program, the sponsor shall retain the property for use on non-federally sponsored activities, or sell it, but must in either case, compensate NRCS for its share. The amount of compensation shall be computed in the same manner as nonexpendable personal property.
- 7. <u>Intangible property</u>:
 - a. <u>Inventions and patents</u>. If any program produces patentable items, patent rights, processes, or inventions, in the course of work sponsored by NRCS, such fact shall be promptly and fully reported to NRCS. Unless there is a prior agreement between the sponsor and NRCS on disposition of such items, NRCS shall determine whether protection on the invention or discovery, including rights under any patent issued thereon, shall be allocated and administrated in order to protect the public interest consistent with "Government Patent Policy" (President's Memorandum for Heads of Executive Departments and Agencies, August 23, 1971, and Statement of Government Patent Policy as printed in 36 FR 16889).
 - b. <u>Copyrights</u>. Except as otherwise provided in the terms and conditions of the agreement, the author or the sponsor is free to copyright any books, publications, or other copyrightable materials developed in the course of or under an agreement, but NRCS shall reserve a royalty-free nonexclusive and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, the work for government purposes.

Operation and Maintenance Plan Dam Site No. 4B Bush River Watershed, Prince Edward County, Virginia

This document supplements the Operation and Maintenance (O&M) Agreement signed by the USDA, Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors, dated September 2, 1999. It may be revised by mutual consent of all signatory parties.

This plan defines responsibilities for operating, inspecting, and maintaining floodwater retarding structure No. 4B. This is a single-purpose flood prevention structure with a permanent lake, and under normal maintenance will be self-operational.

These responsibilities shall remain in effect until July 18, 2101. After the expiration of this O&M plan, the Sponsors may still continue to be liable until the structure is removed or modified to eliminate potential hazards.

Description of the Practice:

4

Dam No. 4B is located approximately 6 miles south of Farmville, Virginia, upstream of Rt. 628 on Mountain Creek, which is a tributary to the Bush River in Prince Edward County, Virginia. This structure was designed as a low hazard dam. The dam is owned by the Piedmont SWCD, and serves as a flood control structure for Farmville, Virginia. The dam is an earthen structure, 540 feet long, with a height of 48 feet. The principal spillway inlet is reinforced concrete. The spillway outlet is a 48-inch diameter concrete conduit with a riprap impact basin. A 400-foot wide grassed auxiliary spillway with a splitter dike is located on the right abutment.

Operation & Maintenance:

The Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District and Prince Edward County will be responsible for all operation & maintenance activities. The structure is self-operating, except for the drain gate. Normal operation of the drain gate should be limited to inspections. Maintenance along the shoreline of the reservoir may require the operation of the slide gate to lower the water level for short periods of time to complete the needed maintenance. The principal spillway slide gate shall be opened and closed once each year, as a minimum, to ensure proper operation.

Estimated Annual O&M Costs:

The Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors are responsible for the operation and maintenance activities for Dam No. 4B. Funds for these activities will be obtained as detailed in the O&M Agreement. It is estimated that the average annual cost of maintenance will be \$4,060.00 for this structure. See below O&M Cost Estimate for a detailed breakdown of costs.

Maintenance Items

It is the responsibility of the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District and the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors to ensure that the following maintenance items, as a shall be killed or removed before it reaches one inch in diameter (stalks of woody growth). All herbicide application shall be done in accordance with applicable Federal, State and local regulations. (\$50.00)

- (10) Access Road Maintain the access road to the dam in drivable condition. Remove any obstructions to the passage of vehicles and add gravel as needed to prevent ponding of water or erosion of the roadbed. (\$10.00)
- (11) Easements/land rights The terms and conditions of all easements and land rights documents shall be checked for potential violations. (N/A)
- (12) Replacement of Components Timing for replacement of components should be evaluated during annual O&M inspections. The following items are not expected to retain operational capability for the 100-year program life of the dam and are anticipated to be replaced.
 - trash racks; (\$20.00)
 - slide gates & hardware (gates, stems, stem guides, anchors, anchor bolts, etc.); (\$300.00)
 - fences/gates; (N/A) and
 - rodent guards. (\$5.00)

A schedule for corrective actions shall be developed for completion of identified maintenance work in a timely manner.

Personnel:


All personnel involved in conducting inspections and performing O&M activities shall be properly trained and equipped. NRCS may assist in training sponsor employees. NRCS shall accompany the sponsor(s) on inspections for the first 3 years after completion of the structure. After the first three annual inspections, NRCS may continue to provide employees to accompany the sponsor during subsequent O&M inspections, if requested by the sponsors and if NRCS resources are available. (Training \$70.00)

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The Emergency Action Plan for this structure outlines a sequential list of contingencies to be followed in the event this structure is subject to imminent failure or periods of high water flow. The Sponsors are responsible for ensuring that this plan is reviewed annually and updated as needed. Copies of the updated plan shall be provided to NRCS and to the Director, State Dam Safety Office. A current copy of the plan will be available for review at the Piedmont Soil and Water Conservation District office, Farmville, Virginia. (Updates and exercises **\$265.00**).

PROCEDURE FOR DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS REAL PROPERTY

Whenever the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, Virginia deem it in the best interest of the citizens of said County to dispose of any surplus real property owned by said County, the following procedure shall be followed:

1. A public hearing shall be conducted prior to the disposition of said real property. In no event shall the public hearing be conducted no more than ninety days prior to the sale of the property. Notice of the public hearing shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in said County not less than once a week for two successive weeks. Notice may also be posted on the County web page and posted on the notice board in the Prince Edward County Courthouse. The public hearing shall not be scheduled within seven days of the last date of publication.

2. After the required public hearing and upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board of Supervisors, the property shall be declared surplus and shall be advertised for sale not less than once a week for four successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the County and in either the *Richmond Times-Dispatch* or *Lynchburg News and Advance* once a week for two successive weeks. Sale shall be by public auction and shall not be conducted within seven days of the date of the last advertisement.

3. County shall obtain an appraisal of the value of said surplus property and shall accept no bid which is less than the appraised value. The appraisal shall be no older than one year.

4. Property transfers from the County to the Industrial Development Authority or other governmental entities or authorities and transfers by leasehold agreements are expressly exempt from this procedure.

5. Recognizing that there may be market conditions or other circumstances which are time sensitive that could adversely affect the value of any such property, the Board of Supervisors may deviate from all or any of this procedure upon the unanimous vote of the Board members in attendance.

6. To the extent that the terms of this procedure may conflict with the Code of Virginia, the Code of Virginia shall be controlling.

Summary: In the coming months, the County Attorney's office will be conducting a comprehensive review of the *County Code* to insure the *County Code* is in full compliance with the *Code of Virginia*. Dear Wade,

I have reviewed your letter of March 12, 2009 concerning some issues that have come before the County Board of Supervisors regarding costs to maintain the water and sewer lines to the Manor.

I do not know Mr. Jackson nor recall a conversation but I could have spoken to him at some time. I also do not remember any discussion about the \$60 - \$65,000 cost per year.

I have thought about your letter and given careful consideration to what I think it would cost to maintain the lines. I will share that with you as follows:

- The Town of Farmville has staff at the department of public works on call seven (7) days a week 24 hours a day. The Town compensates each of them extra each week for being on call. They have rotating weeks and they are on call for a week at a time.
- I feel one of the most important items is maintenance of the pump station. The public works department check Town's weekly and do preventative maintenance routinely. This could take from three (3) hours to six (6) hours depending on the work involved.
- Water lines breaks with change in temperatures or lines hit by contractors. This could involve an extensive amount of time.
- Miss Utility tickets are a big item and if construction picks up at the Manor this could create a major time consuming issue, with regard to the marking the utility lines.

My best estimate for this, if you were asking would be:

- 1. A retainer to be on call and respond to repairs or emergencies \$1,000/monthly
- 2. Bill for actual labor, equipment and materials as shown on attached list

I hope this addresses your concerns. If you wish to discuss this, please give me a call.

I am writing to clarify the position of Prince Edward County on the U.S. 15 Project. We respectfully decline the project proposed by representatives of the Lynchburg District, which was to three-lane a section from Route 628 to Dominion Drive and then upgrade a two-lane section to Rt. 646 (Farmville Lake Road).

The County understands the need to compromise because of funding constraints. In fact, I spoke to that very issue at the March 11, 2009 VDOT Public Input meeting in Lynchburg. The County of Prince Edward believes that a fair compromise is to four-lane U.S. 15 from Rt. 628 to Rt. 646 (Farmville Lake Road), which is a distance of about one mile. This would move the southern terminus of the project up to Rt. 646 (Farmville Lake Road), but still accomplish the safety improvements needed on the northern end of the project.

This is to formally notify you of the final flood hazard determination for your community in compliance with Title 44, Chapter I, Part 67, Code of Federal Regulations. On September 1, 1978, the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) that identified the Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs), the areas subject to inundation by the base (1-percent-annual-chance) flood, in the Unincorporated Areas of Prince Edward County, Virginia. Recently, FEMA completed a re-evaluation of flood hazards in your community. On December 8, 2008, FEMA provided you with Preliminary copies of the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report and FIRM that identify existing flood hazards in your community.

FEMA has addressed all comments received on the Preliminary copies of the FIS report and FIRM. Accordingly, the FIS report and FIRM for your community will become effective on October 2, 2009. Before the effective date, FEMA will send you final printed copies of the FIS report and FIRM.

Because the FIS for your community has been completed, certain additional requirements must be met under Section 1361 of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as amended, within 6 months from the date of this letter. Prior to October 2, 2009, your community is required, as a condition of continued eligibility in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), to adopt or show evidence of adoption of floodplain management regulations that meet the standards of Paragraph 60.3(d) of the enclosed NFIP regulations (44 CFR 59, etc.). These standards are the minimum requirements and do not supersede any State or local requirements of a more stringent nature.

It must be emphasized that all the standards specified in Paragraph 60.3(d) of the NFIP regulations must be enacted in a legally enforceable document. This includes adoption of the current effective FIS report and FIRM to which the regulations apply and the other modifications made by this map revision. Some of the standards should already have been enacted by your community in order to establish eligibility in the NFIP. Any additional requirements can be met by taking one of the following actions:

- 1. Amending existing regulations to incorporate any additional requirements of Paragraph 60.3(d);
- 2. Adopting all the standards of Paragraph 60.3(d) into one new, comprehensive set of regulations; or
- 3. Showing evidence that regulations have previously been adopted that meet or exceed the minimum requirements of Paragraph 60.3(d).

Communities that fail to enact the necessary floodplain management regulations will be suspended from participation in the NFIP and subject to the prohibitions contained in Section 202(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 as amended.

In addition to your community using the FIS report and FIRM to manage development in the floodplain,

FEMA will use the FIS report to establish appropriate flood insurance rates. On the effective date of the revised FIRM, actuarial rates for flood insurance will be charged for all new structures and substantial improvements to existing structures located in the identified SFHAs. These rates may be higher if structures are not built in compliance with the floodplain management standards of the NFIP. The actuarial flood insurance rates increase as the lowest elevations (including basement) of new structures decrease in relation to the Base Flood Elevations established for your community. This is an important consideration for new construction because building at a higher elevation can greatly reduce the cost of flood insurance.

To assist your community in maintaining the FIRM, we reviewed our records to determine if any previous Letters of Map Change (i.e., Letters of Map Amendment, Letters of Map Revision) will be superseded when the revised FIRM panels become effective. According to our records, no Letters of Map Change were issued previously for the affected FIRM panels.

The FIRM and FIS report for your community have been prepared in our countywide format, which means that flood hazard information for all jurisdictions within Prince Edward County has been combined into one FIRM and FIS report. When the FIRM and FIS report are printed and distributed, your community will receive only those panels that present flood hazard information for your community. We will provide complete sets of the FIRM panels to county officials, where they will be available for review by your community.

The FIRM panels have been computer-generated. Once the FIRM and FIS report are printed and distributed, the digital files containing the flood hazard data for the entire county can be provided to your community for use in a computer mapping system. These files can be used in conjunction with other thematic data for floodplain management purposes, insurance purchase and rating requirements, and many other planning applications. Copies of the digital files or paper copies of the FIRM panels may be obtained by calling our Map Service Center, toll free, at 1-800-358-9616. In addition, your community may be eligible for additional credits under our Community Rating System if you implement your activities using digital mapping files.

If your community is encountering difficulties in enacting the necessary floodplain management measures, we urge you to contact William G. Browning, Director, Division of Dam Safety and Floodplain Management, Department of Conservation and Recreation, at (804) 786-3914 for assistance. At a reconvened meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House, thereof, on Tuesday the 7th day of April, 2009; at 5:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Fore called the reconvened meeting to order and stated the purpose of the meeting was to hear the Prince Edward County budget presentations, and called upon Dr. Patricia Watkins, Superintendent of the Prince Edward County Schools, to present the proposed School Budget.

In Re: Presentation of School Budget

Dr. Watkins presented the Proposed Operating Budget for FY 2009-2010. She stated the School Board remains committed to the mission of providing the best quality of education to all students in the community. She reviewed the challenges presented by the current economic climate, and stated the Board is taking a proactive approach, and looked at alignment of services, prioritized programs, and targeted budget cuts. She said the main goal continues to be improving the achievement of all students in the community.

Supervisor Moore entered the meeting at this time.

Dr. Watkins reviewed the proposed School Budget; she said there has been a \$1,134,000 reduction

in funds from the state. She added the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act, also known as the

Stimulus Plan, will go toward non-recurring needs. Dr. Watkins reviewed the School Budget presentation;

a brief discussion on the Food Service Program and the cost for fuel for the school buses followed.

Dr. Watkins thanked the School Board for their support and guidance.

Chairman Fore called a ten-minute recess.

In Re: Presentation of the Proposed County Budget

Chairman Fore called the meeting back to order and called upon Mr. Bartlett, County

Administrator, for the presentation of the proposed County Budget.

Mr. Bartlett read the transmittal letter, as follows:

I am pleased to present to the Board of Supervisors my recommended budget for Prince Edward County for Fiscal Year 2010 (FY10). While County Revenues are forecast to fall significantly placing pressure on our ability to maintain current service levels, I do not propose any tax rate or fee increases. This is in response to the desire of the Board who recognize the challenging economic environment County residents are facing.

After deducting the transfers between funds the proposed budget totals \$44, 098,107 for the county operations and the school system. The overall budget is effectively balanced drawing only \$523 from the combined fund balances of the various funds.

The proposed budget includes \$27.69 million for the school system, \$11.61 million for general governmental operations and \$1.25 million for the new utility system. This represents an overall decrease of \$1.3 million from the County's FY 09 Budget.

Excluding the use of debt and the fund balance, General Fund revenues fell almost \$822,000 when compared to the FY09 original budget. Facing this decline in revenues, I was forced to make very hard decisions, in order to present a balanced budget without requiring a tax increase.

Factors shaping the FY10 Proposed Budget

The FY10 proposed budget incorporates the Board's direction to present a budget with no tax increases, little if any use of the fund balance but at the same time maintain core service levels. During your strategic planning retreat on January 24, 2009 you strongly encouraged me to review County operations and recommend changes that would result in savings which could be sustained in future years.

The FY10 proposed budget process comes amid the most challenging period of economic turmoil and uncertainty most of us have ever seen. Major factors shaping the proposed budget were declining business activity, rising unemployment, increasing health care and insurance costs and significant reductions in revenues received from the Commonwealth. One statistic which conveys the scope of this economic downturn is the unemployment rate. Unemployment in Prince Edward County reached 8.3% in February 2009,

compared with 5.1% in February 2008. This is the highest unemployment level for the County since at least 1997.

In difficult economic times there is an inverse relationship between the demand for governmental services and the state of the economy. Thus, unlike businesses which see a reduction in demand, government experiences an increase in demand for services during recessions. Our residents who are facing economic distress look first to their local government to provide the support they need. Providing such support during this period of declining revenues represents a considerable challenge for the County in FY10.

There are a number of outside factors that may still impact the FY10 budget. Final decisions and implementing instructions regarding the Commonwealth's budget have not been received and specific guidance concerning the Federal stimulus plan is still being developed. Thus, there is still great uncertainty regarding the final disposition of State and Federal funding at the local level but we must proceed with the information we have at hand.

FY10 Reduction Strategies

The Board of Supervisors has expressed its concern for the citizens who are struggling during this period of economic uncertainty. You made it clear to me you wanted an FY10 Budget submission that contained no tax or rate increases, funded education at the highest level possible and at the same time maintained the core services provided to the citizens of the County.

This was a daunting challenge, one which cannot be met by the actions of the County staff alone. Departments which report directly to me account for only \$4.5 million or approximately 10% of the entire County budget. To meet the challenge laid out by the Board of Supervisors required the help and sacrifice of the Schools, Constitutional Officers and the many outside organizations which receive funds from the County.

I realize many of the reduction strategies will result in less funding for various organizations which may cause them to have to make difficult decisions or raise funds elsewhere. My recommendations are not made lightly and are focused on reducing capital not operational expenditures. It is my desire that our partners use the funds provided to maintain the daily services they provide our citizens. I strongly recommend they delay capital purchases, just as we have at the County.

In addition to eliminating most capital purchases, the reduction strategy also includes no cost of living/merit pay increases for county employees and reductions in part-time staffing.

The Prince Edward County School Board has requested \$7,968,525 in local funds for operations, which represents level funding as compared to the FY09 budget. I am recommending funding of \$7,868,525. This is a reduction of \$100,000 over the requested amount or only a 1.25% reduction. Recognizing the education of our children is one of the cornerstones in fostering future prosperity for the County, I only assigned 12% of the revenue shortfall to the school system. This is significantly less than the percentage of local funds provided the school system this fiscal year.

Under the proposed budget, more than 55% of local funds are dedicated to the schools and will be used for the school system's operational, capital and debt service needs.

Besides the \$100,000 reduction to the schools, I am recommending a reduction in operating hours of the solid waste convenience sites. This action will save approximately \$80,000. All sites will be open on Saturday and Sundays. The reduced hours are based

on the public's use of the various sites. The three busiest sites will be closed one day per week. Of the rest of the sites all but one will be closed two days a week. The site which receives the least traffic is proposed to be closed three days per week.

As stated above, I propose a large reduction in capital expenditures. Only three capital projects totaling \$152,500 are recommended. This is a reduction of \$954,500 in capital expenditures from last FY.

1 recommend the \$15,000 provided annually to each Volunteer Fire Department for equipment purchases be suspended this fiscal year. This will save \$105,000. This reduction only involves funds used for equipment; the \$53,000 provided to each department for daily operations is still being funded.

Numerous reductions spread throughout the General Fund saved an additional \$70,828. Almost no County department, Constitutional Office or county-supported program was spared from the reductions.

Tax rates

The FY10 proposed budget contains no tax rate increases in either the real estate or personal property taxes. As required by state code a reassessment was completed in 2008 of all Prince Edward County properties. Overall, property values increased an average of 45%. The Board of Supervisors has indicated its desire to see the tax equalized to offset the increased values. The equalized real estate tax rate is 40 cents per \$100 of value.

It is recommended the tangible personal property tax rate be maintained at \$4.50 per \$100 of value. This steady rate coupled with large decreases in automobile tax values means the citizens will see a reduction in their tax burden. The combined effect of a steady tax rate and declining automobile values has resulted in a reduction of \$447,532 in the forecasted collection of personal property taxes associated with automobiles. This was the single largest revenue reduction for Prince Edward County.

While many counties in the state are increasing their tax rates to recoup this revenue loss, you indicated that during this global economic crisis it would be best for our citizens if the County could absorb this revenue decrease. While a rate increase may not increase the actual amount of taxes paid by our citizens as compared to last year, the amount would still be more than if rate the is held steady. With the rising unemployment and underemployment of our citizens, the take home pay of many of our residents is falling and many are struggling with their monthly bills. In a small way we are relieving the financial stresses faced by our residents by holding the rate steady and reducing their tax burden.

Revenues

Almost all local and state revenue sources will decline this FY. The chart below displays the changes in the major revenue categories as compared to last FY.

I am forecasting a decline of almost \$822,000 in the County's revenues. The single largest local revenue decrease is in Personal Property Tax with a decrease of \$447,532. The main reason for this decline is the lower assessment of used vehicles but the decrease in new cars sales also contributed to this decrease. Local sales tax is estimated to fall by \$200,000. This is a 7.1% decrease and reflects the slowdown in economic activity. Revenue generated from investments is expected to fall by almost \$60,000 which is a reflection of the lower interest rates. Most of the other revenue sources will also post decreases and contribute to the overall decline.

One exception is the real estate tax revenue, which I forecast will increase by about \$158,000. This increase is not the result of the reassessment; it represents the tax revenues collected on new construction. While our local economy is slowing down, Prince Edward County is in much better shape compared to most of the rest of the state and nation. We still have new construction albeit at reduced levels and property values are holding steady.

Conclusion

I look forward to our future work sessions and realize the Board may recommend changes to the proposed budget. That is understandable and expected. I will recommend caution against the use of the County's fund balance to restore any funding reductions. This economic environment is unlike any we have seen. We cannot predict the future and when the economy may turn around or if the recession will become worse. If either of those happens we may very well have to use part of the fund balance to serve our citizens at the levels they will need. Thus, I highly recommend we maintain the current fund balance levels.

Mr. Bartlett then reviewed the Prince Edward County Budget report. Discussion of various

budget items followed.
