- 5. Establish a Committee System The Rules of the Board state that "at the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees." If the Board votes not to have standing committees, it may act as a "committee of the whole".
- 6. Appointments: Personnel Committee The Board of Supervisors has one "standing" committee the Personnel Committee. The members are appointed annually by the Chairman at the Board's organizational meeting in January of each year. The 2008 membership on the Personnel Committee was: Supervisor Howard Simpson, Chair; Supervisor Sally Gilfillan; Supervisor James Moore; and Supervisor Mattie Wiley.

COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

I. ATTENDANCE AND ADJOURNMENT

All members shall make a reasonable effort to attend meetings of the Board. If unable to attend, a member shall notify the Chairman or County Administrator.

A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and must be present to proceed to business. A smaller number of members may adjourn or send for absentees. Special meetings of the Board may be called in accordance with Section 15.1-538 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour set by the Board for regular or special meetings. He shall immediately call the Board to order and determine if a quorum is present; if so, he shall have the minutes of the preceding meeting submitted. Any errors or omissions shall, upon motion and carried, then be corrected. The minutes, being found correct, shall be signed by the Chairman and Clerk and shall be the authentic record of the proceedings of the Board of Supervisors.

II. CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

At the first meeting in January of each year, the Board of Supervisors shall elect one of its members as Chairman and one other of its members as Vice-Chairman. The term of office for the Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be for two years, but they may be re-elected.

The Chairman shall preside at all meetings at which he is present. The Vice-Chairman shall preside at all meetings at which the Chairman is absent and may discharge any other duty of the Chairman during his absence or disability.

The day, time, and place of regular board meetings shall be determined at the January meeting.

III. CLERK

The County Administrator shall serve as Clerk to the Board.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board shall be duly drawn by the Clerk and shall be submitted for approval at the next regular monthly meeting following their draft.

The Clerk shall appoint a deputy as recording secretary if required or needed by the Board.

IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

After the call to order the Board shall proceed to the agenda. The normal order of the agenda shall be as below, except at the January organizational meeting and as subject to rearrangement by the Chairman, absent objection by the Board. At the organizational meeting in January, the first order of business shall be the election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman and approval of the Board's operating procedures.

- B. Consent Agenda
 - Acceptance of Treasurer's Report
 - Approval of Minutes
 - Approval of Warrant List
- C. Highway Matters
- D. Business for Board Consideration
- F. County Administrator's Report
- G. Closed Session
- H. Correspondence
- I. Informational Items
- J. Upcoming Meetings
- K. Monthly Reports from Local Departments
- L. Adjournment

V. PREPARATION OF AGENDA

The County Administrator shall see that the preparation and printing of Board papers, ordinances, resolutions, petitions, and other applicable documents, be completed within such time that members of the Board may receive the documents at least 72 hours before the meeting of the Board.

The County Administrator shall close the upcoming Agenda on the Wednesday prior to the meeting of the Board. Any item submitted after this deadline will not be considered for action unless recommended by the County Administrator.

VI. CONSENT AGENDA

The Chairman and County Administrator shall style routine, non-controversial matters requiring Board action on a Consent Agenda. Items may be removed from the Consent Agenda and place on the Regular Agenda on recorded vote by a majority of the Board members present. Only one motion is necessary to adopt all recommendations and action items on the Consent Agenda.

There shall be no debate or discussion by any member of the Board or the public regarding any item on the Consent Agenda, beyond asking questions for simple clarification.

VII. CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum. When two or more members speak at the same time, the Chairman shall name the person who shall speak first.

A motion or proposition shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Chairman or any member. Any motion or proposition may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or other action of the Board upon it, except a motion to reconsider, which

shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Board. Otherwise, meetings shall be conducted in accordance to Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised (Procedures for Small Boards).

VIII. TAKING THE VOTE

When a motion in order is made, the Chairman shall state the exact motion and indicate that it is open to debate. After the motion has been debated, the Chairman shall put the question in the following forms: "As many as agree that, etc. (as the question may be) let it be known by raising your right hand", and "Those opposed by the same sign."

According to the Constitution of Virginia, a majority of all elected members shall be necessary to adopt any ordinance or resolution appropriating money exceeding the sum of \$500.00, imposing taxes, or authorizing the borrowing of money. Otherwise, a resolution, ordinance, or other proposition shall be adopted by vote of the majority of Board members present and voting. A tie vote shall mean the defeat of the motion voted on.

A member may abstain and be entered in the minutes as present and abstaining.

The Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, Title 2.1, Chapter 40.2, Section 639.30 et seq shall control with respect to a member's participation and voting. (Conflict of Interest-Section 2.1-639.30 et al, Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.)

IX. RECONSIDERATION

After a question has been decided, it may be reconsidered on the motion of any member who voted with the prevailing side, provided the motion is made on the same day as the decision carried. All motions to reconsider shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting.

X. WITHDRAWAL OF EXHIBITS

Original papers, filed as exhibits with any ordinance or resolution, may be withdrawn by the patron or upon his order. In such case, he shall leave attested copies, and shall pay the Clerk for the cost of copying.

XI. MANUAL AND RULES

The rules of parliamentary practice in <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, except when they are inconsistent with the rules established by the Board.

The Rules of the Board shall be reviewed and adopted in January of each year. These Rules may subsequently be suspended or amended by a two-third vote of the entire Board. Upon a motion to suspend or amend, the mover shall be allowed two minutes to state the reasons for his motion, and one member opposed to the motions shall be allowed an equal time to object.

XII. APPOINTMENTS

All appointments of Board representatives to commissions, authorities, committees, etc. shall be made once the individual leaves the position or on expiration of his term, and not later

than two meetings after the individual has left. The Board shall attempt to honor appointments from representative districts and shall not discriminate based on sex, age, handicap, race, or origin.

At the January meeting of each year, the Board shall vote whether to operate with a system of standing committees during the year. If it does, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of each of the several committees. The committees shall meet at the regular times and in conformity with the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. In selecting members of committees, the Chairman of the Board shall make nominations after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. The Board may amend the Chairman's nominations and shall confirm the assignments. Standing committees shall consider such matters as referred by the Board, and shall report at regular meetings of the Board.

If the Board votes not to have standing committees, it may act as a committee of the whole on matters normally referred to standing committees. However; the Chairman after consulting with the County Administrator, may appoint special (ad hoc) committees to carry out specific tasks. This shall be done after soliciting from members of the Board their preferences as to committee assignments. A special committee shall automatically cease to exist once it has completed its specific task.

XIII. PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Chairman may, at his discretion, set an appropriate and consistent time limit on all speakers at a public hearing. All speakers shall come forward and identify themselves by name and address before stating their position. If a public hearing becomes disruptive, the Chairman may adjourn or continue, in accordance with the *Code of Virginia*.

XIV. CLOSED SESSIONS

All discussions held in Closed Session as outlined in the Freedom of Information Act shall represent privileged information held by those involved. Release of such information by a Board member outside the session shall be considered a breach of these by-laws, and the member shall be subject to censure. Specific purpose of closed session shall be stated in accordance with Section 2.2-3711 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Upon return to regular session after a closed session, the County Attorney and/or Chairman shall state the nature of the closed session in as specific terms as appropriate.

In open session, a roll call vote shall be recorded in the minutes, certifying that only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements and only such business matters as were identified in the motion were discussed or considered. Any member of the public body who believes there was a departure from the requirements shall so state prior to the vote. The statement shall be recorded in the minutes.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED

PROCEDURE IN SMALL BOARDS

In a board meeting where there are not more than about a dozen members present, some of the formality that is necessary in a large assembly would hinder business. The rules governing such meetings are different from the rules that hold in other assemblies, in the following respects:

--Members are not required to obtain the floor before making motions or speaking, which they can do while seated.

- -- Motions need not be seconded.
- --There is no limit to the number of times a member can speak to a question, and motions to close or limit debate generally should not be entertained.
 - --Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending.
- --Sometimes, when a proposal is perfectly clear to all present, a vote can be taken without a motion having been introduced. Unless agreed to by general consent, however, all proposed actions of a board must be approved by vote under the same rules as in other assemblies, except that a vote can be taken initially by a show of hands, which is often a better method in such meetings.
 - -- The chairman need not rise while putting questions to vote.
- --The chairman can speak in discussion without rising or leaving the chair; and, subject to rule or custom within the particular board (which should be uniformly followed regardless of how many members are present), he usually can make motions and usually votes on all questions.

EFFECT OF PERIODIC PARTIAL CHANGE IN BOARD MEMBERSHIP

In cases where a board is constituted so that a specific portion of it is chosen periodically (as, for example, where one third of the board is elected annually for three-year terms), it becomes, in effect, a new board each time such a group assumes board membership. Consequently, all unfinished business existing when the outgoing portion of the board vacates membership falls to the ground; and if the board is one that elects its own officers or appoints standing committees, it chooses new officers and committees as soon as the new board members have taken up their duties, just as if the entire board membership had changed. The individual replacement of persons who may occasionally vacate board membership at other times, however, does not have these effects.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PUBLIC HEARINGS RULES OF PROCEDURE

- 1. Public Hearings the order of presentation shall be as follows, unless varied by the Chairman.
 - a. Staff report.
 - b. Applicant's presentation.
 - c. Comments, statements or presentations from members of the public.

The order of speakers will be:

- 1) Those in support of the matter,
- 2) Those with questions or concerns,
- 3) Those opposed,
- 4) Rebuttals (limited by the Chair as to number and time-see below),
- 5) Questions by the Board members of speakers.

d. Additional rules:

- The Chair can permit speaking out of the order in #c above as deemed necessary to enable the public to fully participate.
- Speakers must stand at the podium and address the Board.
- All comments shall be directed to the members of the Board of Supervisors. Debate is prohibited. This includes debate among speakers or speakers/Board members/staff.
- Presentation by the applicant and other speakers shall be limited based on the number of persons wishing to address the Board. The time limit to be determined by the Chairman.
- Additional time-for any portion-may be granted at the discretion of the Chairman.
- The Chair will set the number of minutes permitted for rebuttal and has the discretion to change the number.
- The Chair has the authority to limit or decrease time for any portion of the public hearing due to the number of potential speakers, or repetition, or any other concern.
- Remarks shall be confined to the matter under discussion and shall be relevant.
- Speakers arriving after the commencement of the hearing and/or who are not on the sign-up sheet will be recognized at the discretion of the Chairman.
- 3. Repetitive testimony is discouraged.
- 4. The Chairman shall have the authority to end a presentation that violates these rules or for other cause.
- Following discussion of all matters considered in the public hearing, the Board members will consider one of three actions regarding each matter:

- THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, does hereby note with great sadness the passing of a fine Virginian, James Henry Lyle, Sr.; and be it

In Re: County Bank-Qualified Line of Credit

Jimmy Sanderson, Davenport Public Finance, said a Request for Proposals for a line of credit had been advertised and sent to 25 national, regional and local banking institutions; one response was received from BB&T Bank, offering up to \$2.5 million in a bank-qualified loan. He then reviewed a summary of the proposal.

Mr. Sanderson emphasized the security to the bank is a Leasehold Deed of Trust on the Sandy River Reservoir, and explained the County could not lose fee simple ownership of the property, but if the County would default on the loan, the County would only lose leasehold for six years. He explained the

\$2.5 million proposal would solidify the Water Agreement with the Town of Farmville and would put the funding mechanism in place and would preserve a portion of the bank qualified limitation for 2008. Mr. Sanderson said taking \$1.2 million from the County's undesignated fund balance, which currently is approximately \$8 million, could be alleviated by taking advantage of the bank qualified loan, and recommended this course of action given the possible budget cuts from the state level.

Discussion on the proposal followed.

Supervisor Ward inquired about the proposed amount of the loan offered. Chairman Fore said \$1.25 million would be paid to the Town of Farmville for the Water Agreement with the Town; the remaining \$1.25 million would be paid to the Town of Farmville in December 2009. Supervisor Ward then asked about financing for the Library. Mr. Bartlett said the Town of Farmville is in the process of obtaining financing for the Library as agreed.

Mr. Sanderson then reviewed the Resolution Requesting the Industrial Development Authority (IDA) of Prince Edward County, Virginia, to Issue a Lease Revenue Note to Finance the Costs of Facilities for the County. He said the Sandy River Reservoir would be leased to the IDA who would then lease it back to the County under the Financing Lease; the County would then make the annual payment for the Debt Service. The Leasehold Deed of Trust provides the bank a security on the Leasehold Interest on the property. He said the resolution requests the authority to issue the note in a maximum amount of \$2.5 million, which will be repaid by payments made under the Financing Lease. Further review and discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said this is merely a funding mechanism to do what was agreed upon with the Town of Farmville. He said it would be a three-year loan which could be refinanced for a longer term at a later date.

Supervisor Gilfillan asked for more detail regarding the lease to the IDA. Mr. Ennis, County Attorney, said there is a provision that would not impair the ownership by the County and to affect an assignment to the Water/Sewer Authority during the loan with the proper documentation provided to the bank. The members of the Water/Sewer Authority would be guaranteeing payment, and would enhance the security position because there are more payors responsible for the debt. He added the language used in the

documents is standard for any standard Deed of Trust form that any lender would provide as in a residential

loan.

Supervisor Ward asked about the fee paid for the establishment of the credit line. Mr. Bartlett said

the fee is the same amount as previously discussed when contemplating a \$10 million loan because the

work to secure it is the same.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to approve the Resolution Requesting the Industrial

Development Authority of Prince Edward County, Virginia, to Issue its Lease Revenue Note to Finance the

Costs of Facilities for the County.

Supervisor Ward asked the importance of the vote at that time. Mr. Bartlett said there is a time

constraint to draw down the funds. Mr. Ennis said it is a vehicle to effectuate the loan process; in addition

to the funding it will provide, it gives the County the flexibility to consider other capital projects.

Supervisor Ward said he wished to discuss other projects and how to fund them. Chairman Fore

said the County has agreed with the Town of Farmville to purchase that infrastructure, and their current

action is to determine where the funding will come from. Supervisor Jones said \$1.25 million must be paid

to the Town of Farmville in 21 days. Supervisor Wiley said obtaining funds in this manner will allow the

County to leave funds to give towards other projects. Mr. Bartlett said the Board of Supervisors is

obligated to fund this project, as the Board determined this to be the top priority; the recommendation is to

approve this resolution because of the uncertainty in borrowing and possible state budget cuts.

Supervisor Moore called for the motion made by Supervisor Simpson. The motion carried:

Mr. Bartlett said Mable Shanaberger reported approximately 78% of the real estate tax has been

collected. He said she still had three days of collections to enter, and there doesn't appear to be a slow-

down in the real estate collection rate.

Mr. Sanderson then reviewed the Capital Plan, with emphasis on the goals and objectives and the

existing debt profile of Prince Edward County; the Peer Group Comparatives; Historic Revenue and Fund

Balance Trends; and Capital Plan Modeling. He then explained how the differences in the proposed costs

would affect the County's financial plan. Mr. Bartlett said the differences are dependent upon the PPEA.

He added the only figure that would not vary is the amount for the Water Agreement with the Town of

Farmville, and the Library is fairly well set as well.

Mr. Sanderson discussed key revenue assumptions. Mr. Sanderson said each 1¢ of property tax in

2010 equals \$158,119. He said the Board must prioritize the projects; laying out what each project would

cost gives a sense of what the impact to the County would be. He said the debt affordability analysis

shows, on a conservative level, what the impact would be. He said having financial policies in place would

help the County strategize for the maintainable debt affordability. Mr. Bartlett said if the Board would

choose it could go for bid and learn the cost, and make a determination at that point depending on the

importance of the project. He added a delay of a year or two on a project would make a substantial

difference in the impact. Further discussion followed.

Chairman Fore thanked Mr. Sanderson for attending. He suggested holding a work session prior

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor Moore offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

George Kurtz, Leigh District, said he is in support of a year-round dog confinement law, and wished to personally advise the Board that this is a serious issue and can be substantiated by the Animal Control Officers and the Game Warden. He added his neighbors have the same issues, and offered to assist in any way.

Thomas Curtis, Leigh District, said he is also in support of a year-round dog confinement law. He said the issue intensifies after the confinement period, and after every hunting season, the owners remove the dogs' collars and let the dogs run loose.

Rhonda Redd read a letter to the Board from Deloris Smith and Marjorie Anderson of Rice, Virginia, dated December 9, 2008 in reference to Miller Lake Road (Route 613):

"Dear Board Members,

This comes to extend thanks and appreciation; our hearts are filled with joy because Miller Lake Road (Route 613) between Routes 606 and 611 is finally a hard surface road. Every time we see or hear a vehicle, especially the school buses go up and down the road we say thank you. There is no longer dust blowing into and/or onto our houses, lawns, porches, etc. Even more, there is no more mud and wear and tear damage to our vehicles due to the ruts in the road.

Many thanks to all of you, but a special thank you to our district supervisor, Bobby Jones, for his commitment, keeping his word, and doing all he could by staying on top of the project. He readily kept us informed, talked with property owners for the right of way, making other contacts and being extremely cooperative with a very pleasant attitude.

Another special thank you goes to Robert King for his many contacts relative to the involvement of the right of ways as well as other highway matters, property beautification and constantly doing all he could to see a successful completed project. Again, thank you all immensely and we wish you and your family a healthy, joyous Christmas and New Year."

Jacqueline Vaughan, Prospect District, said she wished to share her concerns regarding the proposed water supply system that Prince Edward County wants to build. She asked that before further action is taken, the Board listen to the citizens' concerns and answer questions. Ms. Vaughan asked if the project is currently necessary in light of the current economic factors. She said if the County cannot get a customer base, the burden would fall on the taxpayers in the entire county, while only the southern end of the county would appear to benefit. Ms. Vaughan asked that any increase in tax rates be dedicated to fully support the upcoming school budget, and asked that any decisions be made on regular board meeting nights and not at reconvened meetings. She then said she would provide a list of concerns and questions to Supervisor Ward.

Sam Bigelow, Farmville District, asked why the value of properties doubled, and if a tax increase is necessary, how much would it be.

Marvin Vaughan, Prospect District, asked that the Board members be mindful of their decisions. He said the tax assessors have reassessed homes at \$70,000-\$80,000 on properties not worth \$10,000. He asked how the figures are determined, adding that the citizens are currently struggling financially. Mr. Vaughan said he understood the need for economic growth, but if a business comes to Farmville, no one can shop there.

A citizen from the Leigh District said her home was converted from a storage barn in 1980 on a slab of concrete with wood siding. She said it has no central heat or air, has only about 1,500 square feet of

living space, on five acres of land. She said her assessment went up 57%, which is higher than the 49% reported in the <u>Richmond Times Dispatch</u>. She said she had been in touch with the Commissioner of Revenue and the Reassessment office, and is still unclear as to how her property value increased at that rate with no improvements made to her property. She asked what she may expect in the way of relief as she is on a fixed income.

A citizen, also of the Leigh District, said her property has been in her family for over 30 years, and she and her husband built a home in 2004. She said within eight months after completion, the reassessment went up \$66,000. She said in 2007, real estate was out of control, but in 2009 it is rock bottom, and properties are not worth the assessed value. She asked that she be reassessed to reflect a fair market value.

Supervisor Ward said he was encouraged by the number of citizens in attendance. He said too often, citizen input is not heard, and it cannot be heard if the citizens do not take the opportunity to speak to it. He said whatever decisions are made, all members are responsible as majority rules. Supervisor Ward said the citizens must be kept aware of the Board's actions and meetings must be held at hours convenient to the citizens. He said he had been unaware that the Board would be voting to borrow \$2.5 million at the earlier reconvened meeting. He said a consultant had been hired to bring a line of credit for \$10 million; the Requests for Proposals were sent to 25 banks, and only one responded, offering only \$2.5 million. He said with the state of the economy, it would be foolish to spend \$25-30 million on water now. He asked the citizens to attend and give input to the Board, and thanked them for attending.

Supervisor Gilfillan said it was important to acknowledge that she never made decisions where she felt forced into it, nor rushed or with a lack of information on the topic. Supervisor Ward said he had only been speaking for himself.

In Re: Public Hearing - Amendment to the Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the November 21, 2008 and November 28, 2008 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Alecia Daves-Johnson, County Planner, said part of operating the local Erosion and Sediment Control Program in compliance with Virginia regulations requires Prince Edward County to conduct inspections of single family homes every two weeks. She said this is creating a difficulty due to staffing and the increasing number of single family homes sites. She said the County can adopt an "Alternative Inspection Program (AIP)" which has been drafted and will use a numeric scoring system to determine the priority and frequency of inspections needed for each single family home site.

Mrs. Daves-Johnson said two corrections are necessary to the draft; under "Basis for Classification," the Class 2 ranking score should read "20-25", and the following paragraph is to be removed:

CERTIFICATION OF PERSONNEL: Individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections shall hold, at a minimum, a Responsible Land Disturber Certification issued pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Responsible Land Disturber Program. It is highly preferred that individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections (i.e. certified inspectors, building inspectors, third-party contractors) also hold the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Inspector certification.

She said if the Board approves the Alternative Inspection Schedule for Single Family Homes, it is contingent upon approval by the Virginia Soil & Water Conservation Board.

Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one else wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Supervisor Jones made a motion to approve the addition of the Alternative Inspection Schedule for Single Family Homes to the Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance, with corrections. The motion carried unanimously:

Alternative Inspection Program - Single Family Homes
Addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance
** DRAFT 2 **

PURPOSE:

The alternative inspection program described herein for Prince Edward County is designed to provide for oversight of land-disturbing activities that are most pertinent to home building in order to improve on-site compliance and most effectively utilize available resources (staff) to meet specific home construction trends while addressing specific environmental conditions within Prince Edward County. This alternative inspection program is an addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance which addresses urban land-disturbing activities and their regulation.

AUTHORIZATION:

- \$ \\$10.1-566 of Title 10.1 Chapter 5, Article 4 of the Code of Virginia and \\$4VAC50-30-60 of the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Regulations.
- \$ Section 46-60 of the Code of Prince Edward County, "Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance of Prince Edward County"

POLICY:

To most effectively utilize local staff and protect the resources of Prince Edward County and the Commonwealth, Prince Edward County will implement an alternative inspection program for single family home construction based on a system of priorities. The system of priorities will be based upon the amount of disturbed project area, site conditions, stages of construction, and site conditions noted on previous inspections.

Prince Edward County utilizes an Agreement in Lieu of a Plan for Erosion and Sediment Control plans concerning Single Family Home construction projects. Alternative inspection procedures that address single-family homes must only include home sites covered by an approved "Agreement in Lieu of a Plan" or "Erosion and Sediment Control (ESC) Plan". An ESC Plan is required for homes sites that disturb more than one acre or have limits of disturbance within fifty (50) feet of wetlands or waters of the Commonwealth. Project sites located within the Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District are subject to additional requirements.

This policy outlines procedures for implementing an ESC inspection process for a visual appraisal of

single-family home sites by building inspectors or other local representatives. Erosion and Sediment Control measures employed on typical single-family home sites are generally controlling a smaller area of land disturbance, and are less complicated, at risk for failure, or likely to cause off-site damages, when compared to larger commercial, industrial, municipal, or subdivision sites.

CERTIFICATION OF PERSONNEL: Individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections shall hold, at a minimum, a Responsible Land Disturber Certification issued pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Responsible Land Disturber Program. It is highly preferred that individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections (i.e. certified inspectors, building inspectors, third-party contractors) also hold the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Inspector certification.

ESC INSPECTION SCHEDULE:

All home construction sites covered by the single-family home alternate inspection program should receive an ESC inspection at the following landmarks:

- Pre-construction (prior to excavation of foundation) i.e. concurrent with 9-1-1 addressing
- Footing excavation 2.
- Backfilling of subgrade walls / fine grading 3.
- Project completion (Prior to issuance of Certificate of Occupancy) 4.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- 1. The erosion and offsite environmental impact potential of regulated projects shall be determined by an evaluation of the topography, soil characteristics, acreage disturbed, proximity to water resources, and proximity to adjacent property lines.
- 2. After plan review and a site visit, the plan reviewer, program administrator, or appointed inspector will assign a ranking score to the project using the approved Tabular Rating System.
- 3. Ranking Scores will be assigned to projects based on site specific erosion potential and offsite environmental impact. These Ranking Scores will use a point system to determine the frequency of inspections. A lower point score will require a less frequent inspection schedule; a higher point score will require a more frequent inspection schedule.
- 4. The ranking and inspection frequency of a project may be adjusted to a higher or lower classification by the program administrator based upon complaints, violations, inspections, and stages of construction.
- 5. The Tabular Rating Form shall be attached to the approved plan and made a part of the project file maintained by the Building Office. The ranking score shall be written on the building permit application.

BASIS FOR CLASSIFICATION:

The following classifications shall be assigned to projects based on a plan review, preliminary site visit and computation of a Ranking Score:

Class	Ranking Score	Criteria Description
CLASS 1	13-19	Total acres disturbed under one acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 0-7 percent and greater than or equal to 300 feet; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.
CLASS 2	20-25	Total acre disturbed under one acre; disturbed area is 50 feet to 150 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 7-15 percent and greater than or equal to 150 feet; weighted soil K-factor is between .24 and .36.

CLASS 3	26-33	Total acres disturbed over one acre; disturbed area is less than 50 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are greater than 15 percent and greater than or equal to 75 feet; weighted soil K-factor is greater than .36.
CLASS 4	0-12	Total acres disturbed under one-half acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; a buffer of very good dense grass or better greater than 300' exists, slopes are less than 7 percent; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.

FREQUENCY OF INSPECTIONS:

- 1. Projects which disturb greater than two (2) acres or cross a live water course shall require site inspections at a minimum two-week frequency, and do not require the computation of a Ranking Score.
- 2. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at the beginning and completion of projects. Upon project completion, a final ESC inspection will be scheduled. This inspection shall be completed PRIOR to the issuance of Certificate of Occupancy.
- 3. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at a minimum frequency according to the following schedule:

- 4. All inspections will be documented on an inspection log maintained as a part of each project file. Project owners will receive copies of inspection reports with violations noted.
- 5. Inspection return frequency is not limited to the above schedule and will increase in frequency due to runoff producing storm events or documented violations.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Mark McKissick, Assistant Resident Engineer, said the project on Route 460 Westbound at Bush River is complete, Route 360 Westbound at Meherrin is complete, and the Slaydon Forest Rural Addition is almost finished. He said the work being done on the High Bridge Trail has most of the crossings lowered at most of the intersections although some are not yet paved. Mr. McKissick said construction is ongoing on Route 757 near Pamplin where it had been washed out.

Mr. McKissick then reported VDOT is now looked upon as one of three emergency responders in the state, along with the State Police and the National Guard. He said second is safety, and third is core maintenance service, which include minor repairs instead of staying on a regular maintenance program. He said VDOT receives funding through the gas tax, and that has been reduced due to the cost of gasoline. He said FY 08-09 budget had been reduced \$40 million, and he received indication of an additional \$227 million reduction in FY 09. Mr. McKissick said employment vacancies are not being filled, and the policy

for snow removal has been cut, meaning fewer plows and a decrease in service. Mr. McKissick said notification was received that the Secondary Six Year Budget of \$4.1 million that had been approved for Prince Edward County, is to be reduced by \$1.2 million, a cut of approximately 25%.

Mr. McKissick said there may be a new Public Works Act at the Federal level; a plan has already been submitted for approximately \$51 million in case the money becomes available.

Supervisor McKay said a request for a sign at Route 665 and Route 15 South at Worsham had been made, but there has been no action. He said the intersection of Routes 692 and 133 is also dangerous as there was another accident there last week. Mr. McKissick said the sign at Route 15 had been changed to a larger sign, and will look into the other location.

Supervisor Moore advised Mr. McKissick of the potholes on Route 460 East near Rice. Mr. McKissick said they are aware of the potholes, and the repairs that have been made do not "hold" for long.

In Re: Appointment - Prince Edward County Planning Commission

Mr. Brian Lee said he would like the opportunity to serve on the Planning Commission, adding that he is proactive more than reactive.

Two Planning Commission members' terms expire December 31, 2008. Appointments to the Planning Commission are necessary, with a term of office effective January 1, 2009 and expiring December 31, 2012. Chairman Fore instructed the Board members to vote for two.

feeding and care given prior to adoption.

Chairman Fore asked about the number of animals currently in the shelter. Mr. Foster said five

runs are currently being used, and there were 12 runs. Mrs. Horn said over 800 animals have been housed

this year, with a 50% walk out rate.

Mrs. Horn said there had been 15 calls for nuisance animals during the confinement period, and 37

calls to date for nuisance and aggressive animals since the confinement period has ended. She explained

that a nuisance animal does damage to the property of the neighbor, and an aggressive animal growls and

won't allow you to exit your home. Neither is considered a "stray" animal.

Supervisor Moore asked about the procedure for hunting dogs. Mr. Foster said they are covered

under the State Code; any hunting dogs left for more than 48 hours would be picked up. Mrs. Horn said the

hunting dogs are not normally the ones that do damage.

In Re: Reassessment Update

Mr. Chris Venable, Wampler-Eanes, gave an update on the reassessment process and said there have been 417 appointments scheduled for hearings; 300 of those have been seen to date. He added they expect to review 1,400 properties. He said the last day for hearings is Friday, December 12, 2008, but they won't turn anyone away; he added appeals may be mailed in but must be postmarked December 12, 2008. He said Wampler-Eanes has also done appeals over the phone for those that cannot get to the office, and they are making every effort to accommodate the citizens.

Mr. Venable said the average increase in value is 49%, which - over a six year period – is average for the area. He said the surrounding counties have been reassessed at a higher percentage. Mr. Venable said the price of land has doubled statewide, and a large landowner may have seen a large increase. He said that they have gone from a manual to a computer system, and there have been some errors made in the 14,000 properties, and asked that anyone with a problem contact them.

Further discussion followed about the process used. Mr. Venable said the reassessment values are set by market value of recent sales in the area. He said after the hearing process with Wampler-Eanes, complaints may be taken to the Board of Equalization; after that, the next step would be to take the issue to Circuit Court.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said there are two minor changes to the Library Agreement regarding the value of the land and adjustments regarding the maintenance issues. He said the agreement had been drafted by Mr. Ennis, and Mr. Spates, Farmville Town Manager, agrees to the changes. Mr. Bartlett said the Town would be responsible for the maintenance cost for the grounds, minor maintenance costs of the parking area and the other paved areas, and minor repairs of the building with costs not to exceed \$100. He said any maintenance or repairs exceeding \$100 would be the responsibility of the library.

Mr. Bartlett said should the building be sold in the future, the County would receive two-thirds of the sale proceeds but not to exceed the County's original construction cost; if the proceeds from the sale of the building is less than the initial amount, the County would receive two-thirds of the proceeds. He added that should the building cease to be used by the Town as a Library, the County would be reimbursed its full investment.

Mr. Bartlett said the low bid was received from Coleman Adams.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be a resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person must be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - 6. Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - 7. Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - 9. Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

MOTON 2011

A Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward, Virginia named its first high school for African American students in honor of Robert Russa Moton, a son of Prince Edward County, who rose to become a national leader in education and in race relations; and

WHEREAS, it was from this building, the Robert Russa Moton High School, that on April 23, 1951 African American students led by Barbara Rose Johns, niece of civil rights pioneer Reverend Vernon Johns, staged a walk-out to protest the separate and unequal conditions of their overcrowded, all-black school; and

WHEREAS, the lawsuit that followed, *Davis v. County School Board of Prince Edward*, was one of the five cases included in the United States Supreme Court landmark 1954 *Brown v. Board of Education* decision, which ended segregation in America's public schools; and

WHEREAS, between 1954 and 1959, the Commonwealth of Virginia's strategies for avoiding integration included "massive resistance", which meant that schools would close rather than integrate; and

WHEREAS, as an outcome of efforts to maintain segregated schools in Prince Edward County, all public schools were closed from 1959 to 1964; and

WHEREAS, following four years without public schools, the Prince Edward County Free School system was created in 1963, funded through foundation, corporate and private support, and leasing equipment and buildings from the County; and

WHEREAS, on May 26, 1964 with *Griffin v. County School Board of Prince Edward*, the United States Supreme Court ruled that Prince Edward County could no longer deny County school children their constitutional rights to an education equal to that afforded by the public schools in other parts of Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the Prince Edward County Public Schools were reopened in the fall of 1964; and

WHEREAS, in 1995, the Robert Russa Moton school building was retired from service by the Prince Edward County School Board and was sold by Prince Edward County to the Martha E. Forester Council of Women to be used as a museum dedicated to the study of civil rights in education; and

WHEREAS, in 1998, the Robert Russa Moton Museum was designated a National Historic Landmark, the highest level of historical recognition offered by the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service; and

WHEREAS, in 2003, the Virginia General Assembly adopted a Resolution of Profound Regret for the state's role in the closing of the Prince Edward County Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, during the 2004 session, the Virginia General Assembly created the Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship Program for the purpose of assisting students who were enrolled in the public schools of Virginia between 1954 and 1964, in jurisdictions in which public schools were closed to avoid desegregation; and

WHEREAS, on July 21, 2008, the Virginia Civil Rights Memorial was dedicated on the grounds of the Virginia State Capitol, honoring the struggle begun in Prince Edward County on April 23, 1951; and

WHEREAS, on July 21, 2008, the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors illuminated *The Light Of Reconciliation* in the bell tower of the Prince Edward County Courthouse in honor of Barbara Rose Johns and the students of Robert Russa Moton High School and all the children of our county, for their historic role in ending public school segregation in the United States, and with sorrow for closing schools; hoping that when we raise our eyes to see this light, may we also incline our hearts and minds to shine our own light of reconciliation toward all people;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the undersigned members of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, hereby wish to express our support for the Robert Russa Moton Museum funding request in the amount of \$750,000 to provide for the design, fabrication and installation of *The Massive Resistance Gallery* of Moton 2011; and

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, does hereby respectfully request support from the members of the Virginia General Assembly for the \$750,000 to fund *The Massive Resistance Gallery*, which will present the history of Virginia's reaction to *Brown v. Board of Education* and recognize the courage and personal sacrifice made by citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia to bring about change in our nation's struggle for civil rights;



Issue: Resolution – Commonwealth's FY 2010 Budget Shortfall

Summary: VACo is urging Virginia's 95 counties to adopt VACo's model resolution (copy attached) regarding the state budget troubles. The resolution seeks to partner with the Commonwealth in addressing the 2009-2010 state budget shortfall approaching \$3 billion, and offers specific state budget and revenue recommendations to the governor and the Virginia General Assembly. Counties are urged to adopt the resolution and communicate their actions to Gov. Timothy M. Kaine and legislators.

The 2009 legislative session is scheduled to convene on Wednesday, Jan. 14. VACo is asking counties to adopt the resolution in advance of 2009 VACo-VML Legislative Day, Thursday, Feb. 5. The House and Senate will adopt their respective budgets soon after Legislative Day. The resolution and its recommendations are the byproduct of VACo's Overarching 2009 Priority Policy statement regarding State and Local Fiscal Sustainability. The statement is included in VACo's 2009 Legislative Program. (Copy attached)

The resolution includes five specific budget and revenue recommendations, which are intended to help the state effectively resolve the state budget shortfall and mitigate the impact of the shortfall on Virginia's counties. VACo recognizes that some counties will use the list of recommendations as a "menu," choosing to adopt some but not all five. The VACo model is a template; counties are encouraged to tailor their resolutions to address specific local concerns.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

Regarding the Commonwealth's FY 2010 Budget Shortfall

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward, Virginia is committed to ensuring fiscal sustainability at the local and state levels of government because fiscal sustainability enables the Commonwealth and its local governments to provide high quality, cost effective, core public services that benefit Virginians today and for generations to come; and

WHEREAS, the current difficult economic and financial times require government, at all levels, to evaluate service delivery responsibilities and to determine the continued importance of programs meeting critical needs; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth must resolve an estimated 2009 and 2010 biennial revenue shortfall approaching \$3 billion that may continue to escalate in the near term; and

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward must also resolve significant local revenue shortfalls for these periods as well; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth's General Fund supports most critical core government services including public education, health and human resources, including the Comprehensive Services Act, public safety, natural resources and environmental services by dedicating almost 50 percent of the state's General Fund to local governments (with 74 percent of this funding supporting K-12 public education); and

WHEREAS, if one level of government establishes and ensures a priority, it is then incumbent upon that level of government to adequately fund the services necessary to meet that priority; and

WHEREAS, the current economic environment threatens the sustainability of these critical core public services if the Commonwealth is required to reduce its contribution to the financial partnership between the state and local governments including the County of Prince Edward; and

WHEREAS, specific and necessary state budget reductions may impact a wide array of core public services, including but not limited to public education, the Comprehensive Service Act, and public safety, and many local governments, including the County of Prince Edward, will absorb significant state reductions in 2009 and may be compelled to increase real property taxes to help ensure the continuation of vital core public services; and

WHEREAS, the County of Prince Edward stands ready to partner with the Commonwealth to make the difficult budgetary decisions required, including thoroughly evaluating programs and working together to maintain a structural balance between revenues and expenditures that promotes the long-term viability of our Commonwealth;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of County of Prince Edward, Virginia respectfully offers the following budget and revenue recommendations for the 2009 legislative session to the Governor and Virginia General Assembly:

- Budget and appropriate sufficient withdrawals from the state's Revenue Stabilization Fund ("Rainy Day Fund") to help offset necessary state budget reductions. Global and national financial markets are imbalanced; consequently, Virginia is one of many states facing a significant state revenue shortfall. The Commonwealth is required to replenish the Fund when economic conditions improve, and the County of Prince Edward supports recapitalizing the Fund in better economic times.
- Before budgeting and appropriating necessary state budget reductions, revisit recent state tax exemptions. Since the late 1990s the state has enacted more than \$1.8 billion in net biennial tax reductions and specific General Fund transfers.
- Oppose the enactment of new unfunded and under-funded state mandates that
 will impose new costs on local governments. Additionally, consider repealing
 specific, unfunded and under-funded state mandates. In the area of public
 education, the Governor and Virginia General Assembly should consider
 providing localities and school districts maximum flexibility to i) suspend
 specific mandates and ii) manage specific public education reductions.
- Enact a law authorizing equal taxing authority for counties. Counties should be enabled, like cities and towns, to institute specific taxes, including a meals tax without a referendum. The new sources of revenue would be tailored to the needs of a jurisdiction and could help local governments protect adequate funding for the core government services including K-12 public education, and reduce county dependence on property taxes.
- Consider additional possibilities for mitigating the impact of state cuts on local
 governments. Local governments may have to make cuts in services because of
 flat or decreasing real estate revenues. Permit local governments, at their option,
 to implement a one-half percent increase in the sales tax as a way to minimize the
 potential burden passed on to homeowners through increased real property taxes.

FURTHERMORE, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward offers these recommendations in the spirit of compromise and partnership to the Governor and Virginia General Assembly.

Overarching Priority

State and Local Fiscal Sustainability

VACo is committed to protecting state and local fiscal stability, which will enable the Commonwealth to provide core public services that are critical to the long-term economic vitality of Virginia.

Fiscal stability also ensures the Commonwealth and its local governments can continue to provide cost effective, quality services with equitable and sufficient tax structures. However, difficult financial times require government at all levels to evaluate its service delivery to determine the continued importance and viability of the programs created to meet critical needs.

The counties in Virginia stand ready to partner with the Commonwealth to make the tough decisions required. State and local leaders must continue to thoroughly evaluate difficult decisions and work together to maintain a structural balance between revenues and expenditures, which promotes the long-term viability of our Commonwealth.

VACo is concerned with protecting the reliability and sustainability of the Commonwealth's general fund, which is critical to state funding of its partnership with local government.

The general fund supports most core government functions—public education (K-12 and higher education), health and human resources, public safety, natural resources and environmental services. If one level of government establishes a priority, it is then incumbent upon that level of government to adequately fund the services necessary to meet that priority. The current economic environment threatens the sustainability of

these critical services if the Commonwealth reduces its contribution to our financial partnership.

The use of the state's Revenue Stabilization Fund in 2009 will help to buffer the Commonwealth from cuts that will harm the important results that have been achieved.

To that end, and to allow Virginia's economy the opportunity to grow back to support these critical advances, the state should budget a withdrawal from the state's Revenue Stabilization Fund ("Rainy Day Fund") for consecutive years (one for FY 2009 and an additional withdraw for FY 2010). Without the General Assembly and governor authorizing using a portion of the Rainy Day Fund in FY 2009 and 2010, it is apparent that delivery of the core government services will be decreased to the detriment of Virginians.

VACo also calls upon the Commonwealth to strengthen the stability of the Commonwealth's general fund by initiating state tax reform. Significant tax reform will help reduce pressure on local government leaders who continually must consider raising real estate tax rates to fund K-12 public education, public safety, the comprehensive services act, mental heath and mental retardation, and other critical local services.

Tax reform should include a restructuring of the state income and sales and use taxes with the intent to stabilize and increase revenues to meet current and foreseeable core service demands. Reform should also include a revisiting of specific state tax reductions the Commonwealth made during good economic times that may no longer be affordable. A critical evaluation of

the user fee structure that funds transportation should be made to allow the Commonwealth to address deteriorating transportation systems throughout the Virginia. Although a core government service, the Commonwealth historically has funded transportation with dedicated non-general funds in order to reserve the general fund for the additional core services.

To meet its mandated level of service delivery local governments require sufficient and sustainable revenue streams. VACo suggests that the Commonwealth grant counties and cities the option, by action of the local governing body without a referendum, to adopt a 0.5 percent sales and use tax to offset state budget reductions to localities.

If appropriate to a particular jurisdiction, the new dollars will help local leaders to fund adequately K-12 public education and the other critical government services; while lessening continued pressure on local property taxes, including real, personal and business. VACo also continues to support equal taxing authority for cities and counties.

VACo's Priorities

Aid to Localities

VACo requests the Commonwealth to use the most current population statistics available, such as those developed by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service, for the purposes of determining state aid to those localities that have experienced growth since the last census. Those localities that have remained stable or have lost population should be held harmless and funded based on the last U.S. Census results.

Annexation Moratorium

VACo supports full funding of the Commonwealth's HB 599 commitments. VACo also supports the continuation of the current moratorium on city annexations regardless of whether those commitments have been met. The moratorium has promoted more intergovernmental cooperation between cities and counties; has allowed counties to plan for future growth and economic development within their borders; and has enabled counties to protect their tax base in order to provide needed services to citizens.

Deployment of Broadband Internet Services

VACo urges the Commonwealth to assist communities throughout Virginia in providing connectivity or universal access to broadband Internet services. Assistance should include a combination of economic incentives as well as statewide budgetary and statutory policies. Universal access throughout the state will enhance economic growth. Broadband refers to the high-speed transmission of electronic information usually in connection with the Internet.

Education Funding

VACo supports full state funding for public education (including the SOQ, targeted incentive programs, capital and maintenance support, and teacher salaries). Full state funding should be achieved without reduction to other parts of the federal and state public education budgets or to the other core services. As state general funding diminishes local autonomy should be increased and state education mandates reduced.

Animal Control - Confinement

Summary:

<u>Confinement</u>: The Board requested an opportunity to discuss and consider the County's running-at-large/confinement period. Currently, the County's ordinance (copy attached) establishes the County's confinement period from March 1 – August 31. As you will recall, an e-mail in your November Board pack from Mr. George Kurtz (copy attached) requested that the Board consider year-round confinement. The Board has requested that the County's Animal Control Officers (Ray Foster and Vicki Horn) be present at the January Board meeting (as this issue was tabled from the December Board meeting).

The Board also requested that the County invite Bill Powers from the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries to the January Board meeting and he has indicated he will attend. Officer Foster and Officer Horn have prepared a report for the Board on the number of complaint calls they have received since September 1 concerning dogs running at large. They are also prepared to answer any questions the Board may have.

Any change to the County's confinement period (running at large) will require an amendment to the animal control ordinance and a public hearing.

application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year.

Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies.

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE



* Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time from March 1 to August 31. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person, after having been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is running at large, who is the owner or custodian of the dog thereafter found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.

- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
- (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
- (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
- (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
- (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
- (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.
- (d) Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96.

Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.66 et seq.

I live in Meherrin and have had trouble with a neighbors dogs since day one (6+ years). They get a batch of puppies every year in late spring and never once pen them up.

They constantly come on to our property, run deer, chase our cats and this year have growled at us when we walk our property. During deer season, they are purposely run through our property even though it is posted.

The Animal control officer says there is nothing they can do now because of the 6 month confinement law. The county administrator (Sarah Puckett) says the same thing. Sarah suggested I contact you.

I think it is an absolute outrage that I pay taxes, own the land, post it and yet have no rights when it comes to dogs. When hunting season starts, the trouble gets worse. The clubs again purposely run dogs across our property. The fact is that the non-owners have more rights than the owners.

Dog owners can come on legally posted land at will under the guise of retrieving dogs. They can let dogs roam at will any where any time during the non-confinement period. The land owner can do nothing.

I would like to see a year round confinement law passed. Hunters should use the dogs and collect them after the hunt and return them to the pen. I would really like to see deer hunting with dogs outlawed. There is no longer accessible land to make the practice fair to the land owners who suffer form packs of digs running all over the property.

I am a hunter. I bow hunt, muzzle load hunt and fire arm hunt. I spend months in the woods patterning deer and finding out where to hunt with bow and muzzle loader. The second the dogs start running all my prep work is for nothing. My own land becomes the free for all for anybody. Where is the benefit of ownership and paying taxes?

I respectfully request you consider a year round confinement law and put some teeth into trespass laws to protect the land owners.

<u>Demotion</u> – Movement from one class of position to another of a lower salary range in which the employee meets the minimum qualification requirements.

<u>Dependent</u> – A family member who is claimed as a dependent on the employee's Federal Income Tax Return.

<u>Discipline</u> – Action taken against an employee ranging from verbal reprimand to dismissal depending on the severity of the employee's unsatisfactory work performance or misconduct.

<u>Dismissal</u> – An involuntary separation of an individual's employment initiated by the County.

<u>Employee</u> – An individual who, in consideration of wages or salary for the benefit and under the control of the County and is compensated through the County payroll. "Employee" shall not include:

- Members of the County's Board of Supervisors;
- 2. Constitutional Officers and their employees, unless the officer has elected to be covered by the County's personnel system. Constitutional Officers may elect to become part of the County's Classification and Compensation system and Personnel Policies by executing an agreement with the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors at adoption of these Policies; and, upon the initiation of each term of office for the Constitutional Officer:
- 3. Members of boards, commissions and authorities;
- 4. Employees of the School Board; and,
- 5. Independent contractors.

<u>Essential Personnel</u> – Employees who hold certain positions, which provide necessary health, safety and emergency County services regardless of adverse conditions.

<u>Full-Time Permanent Appointment</u> – Appointment to a full-time permanent position indicates that the employee is to work for the County on a full-time continuous basis, without time limitation and requiring a regularly scheduled work period.

Full-Time Temporary Appointment – Appointment to a full-time temporary position indicates that the employee is scheduled to work for a maximum of one year. Temporary employees shall not receiv Incumbent – An employee occupying a position in the County service.

<u>Layoff</u> – A temporary or indefinite reduction in the workforce due to economic conditions, technological changes, lack of work or other appropriate reasons, initiated by the County and usually through no fault of the employee.

<u>Maternity Leave</u> – Pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions associated with birth shall be treated as any other temporary disability with respect to sick leave, annual leave, compensatory time and leave without pay.

Merit Salary Increase – An increase in compensation established in the Compensation Plan, which may be granted to eligible employees after completion of the appropriate length of service and a performance evaluation rating which satisfies the requirements for advancement.

<u>Non-essential Employee</u> – An employee who is not required to work during adverse conditions. Adverse conditions are declared and defined by the County Administrator.

- Part-Time Permanent Appointment An appointment to a part-time position that is routinely scheduled to work for the County on a continuous basis, without regard to time limitation. Permanent part-time employees work less than eight hours, or less than 40 hours per week or less than 52 weeks per year. Employees occupying part-time permanent positions shall receive fringe benefits as specified in these policies.
- Part-Time Temporary Appointment An employee that is routinely scheduled to work for a period of less than one year. Part-time temporary employees work less than eight hours per day; or less than 40 hours per week. Temporary employees shall not receive fringe benefits.

<u>Performance Evaluation</u> – A systematic review of employees in the effective accomplishment of their assigned duties and responsibilities. A recommendation for a salary increase may or may not be included in the evaluation.

Personnel File – Official file of information pertaining to each employee.

<u>Position Classification Plan</u> – The official system of grouping of similar positions into appropriate classes based upon the respective duties, typical tasks and qualifications.

<u>Probationary Period</u> – The working test or trial period of employment beginning on the first day of work.

<u>Promotion</u> – Movement from one class of position to another of a higher salary range in which the employee meets the minimum qualification requirements.

<u>Qualifications</u> – The minimum education, experience and any special job-related requirements, which must be fulfilled by a person preliminary to appointment or promotion.

Reclassification – A change in the classification of a position or group of positions.

<u>Re-Employment</u> – When an employee's services are terminated and that employee is subsequently employed again with the County.

Regular Employee – The status of a classified employee who has successfully completed the initial probationary period. Regular employees work 35 hours per week for not less than 52 weeks per year. Annual leave sick leave and holidays shall count as time worked.

<u>Reinstatement</u> – The time an employee returns to work from an authorized leave of absence or goes from a non-pay status into a paid status. Reinstatement means that the employee is treated as if on leave without pay for the time s/he was away from the County.

Resignation – Voluntary separation initiated by an employee who chooses to leave the County service.

<u>Safety-Sensitive Position</u> – Positions that require possession of a CDL as a condition of employment are considered safety-sensitive.

<u>Salary Range</u> – The rate of pay assigned to a group of steps.

Salary Step – A rate of pay assigned to one of the steps in a salary range.

<u>Secondary (Outside) Employment</u> – Employment in any capacity other than the employee's primary County job.

<u>Supervisor</u> – An employee who has the responsibility for directing and evaluating the work of other employees.

- C. The calculation of annual and sick leave accrual is based on a standard pay period.
- D. Charges for authorized leave shall be made on an actual usage basis and rounded to the nearest one-half hour.
- E. Department Heads will assure standard leave record maintenance is performed and those current leave records are submitted to the County Administrator's Office each month.
- F. Employees are responsible for providing required leave forms to the appropriate staff in a timely manner.
- G. No employee shall use leave that has not been earned. If an employee is off and does not have sufficient leave to cover the balance for that pay period, leave without pay shall be reflected on the employee's time sheet as approved absence or as unauthorized absence, if the time off was not approved.
- H. All County employees, including temporary employees, are eligible for leave without pay.
- I. Leave shall accrue while an employee is on approved paid leave. Leave shall not accrue if an employee is on unauthorized leave, military leave without pay or leave without pay as specified within this policy.
- J. False or fraudulent use of leave or failure to follow this policy may be cause for disciplinary action, including dismissal.

8.4 HOLIDAY LEAVE

- A. Scheduled Holidays
 - 1. The County observes the same holidays as the Commonwealth of Virginia.
 - The Board of Supervisors may designate additional holidays.
- B. Eligibility
 - 1. Regular full-time employees shall receive paid holiday leave.
 - * 2. Regular part-time employees who are specifically required by the County to work on a holiday are eligible to receive a proportional amount of paid holiday leave based on the annual leave accrual table: (DELETE SECTION)
 - Temporary M and part-time employees are not entitled to paid holiday leave.
- C. Policy
 - 1. <u>Exclusion from Overtime Computation</u> Holiday leave shall not be counted as hours worked for determining overtime.
 - 2. <u>Holiday on a Mandatory Workday</u> Eligible employees who are required to work on a holiday shall be compensated as determined by the County Administrator.
 - 3. <u>Holiday During Paid Leave</u> A holiday falling within a period of paid leave shall not be counted as a workday in computing the amount of leave taken. However, when an employee is absent on a holiday on which s/he is scheduled to work, the time shall be deducted from annual leave or be charged to leave without pay, whichever is appropriate.

- 4. <u>Holiday During Unpaid Leave</u> When a holiday falls within a period of leave without pay or immediately preceding or following such leave, the employee shall receive no pay for the holiday.
- 5. <u>Appointment or Separation on a Holiday</u> The appointment or separation of an employee shall not be effected on a holiday unless the employee worked that day.

8.5 ANNUAL LEAVE

A. Annual Leave Accrual

1. Regular full-time employees shall earn annual leave at a rate based upon completed calendar month of service as follows:

0 – 4 years of continuous service	8 hours per month
5 - 9 years of continuous service	10 hours per month
10 – 14 years of continuous service	12 hours per month
15 – 19 years of continuous service	14 hours per month
20 – 24 years of continuous service	16 hours per month
25 or more years of continuous service	18 hours per month

- → 2. Regular part-time employees shall earn annual leave proportionate to the amount of time worked. DELETE SECTION
- * 3. Temporary Mil and part-time employees do not earn annual leave.
 - Maximum annual leave accrual rates are as follows:

0 - 4 years of continuous service
 5 - 9 years of continuous service
 10 or more years of continuous service
 240 hours
 288 hours

5. During the calendar year, an employee may accrue more than the maximum levels as stated above. Leave beyond the maximum levels that is not used by the beginning of the first full pay period of the new calendar year shall be forfeited.

B. Granting of Annual Leave

- So far, as possible, annual leave shall be set at a time mutually agreeable to the employee and the County. Annual leave shall normally be granted each calendar year, unless a department director specifically defers an employee's vacation because of work requirements.
- 2. The annual leave credits provided may be used, at the option of the employee, to provide for paid absences due to vacation or other personal purposes (including sickness) or for paid absences exceeding credit available for other kinds of leave.
- 3. No annual leave credit shall be provided for service less than a full semi-monthly pay period. The credit for a full semi-monthly pay period or more, but less than one calendar month shall be one-half the accrual rate to which the employee is

entitled for one calendar month of service. No annual leave credits shall be provided during any period of absence immediately following an absence of sixty calendar days.

- C. Payment of Annual Leave Upon Separation
 - 1. Upon separation, an employee shall receive payment for annual leave up to the maximum accrual rate. Payment shall be calculated using the employee's base hourly rate of pay at the time of separation.
 - 2. In the case of the death of an employee, the unused annual leave credit shall be paid to the employee's estate.
- D. Effect of Change of Appointment Status

An employee who transfers from a temporary to permanent position, without a break inservice, may receive annual leave credit from the date of temporary appointment. Annual leave credit is conditional upon the following:

- The full-time permanent

- 1. The permanent position must be identical or nearly identical to the temporary position in duties and level of responsibility; and,
- 2. The employee must have worked an average of 30 hours per week in the temporary position. (→€ L € T €)

8.6 SICK LEAVE

- A. Sick Leave Accrual
 - 1. Regular full-time employees shall accrue one and one-quarter day of sick leave for each completed calendar month of service. There is no limit for accumulated sick leave. Upon favorable termination, an employee who has accumulated over ninety (90) days of sick leave will be reimbursed for thirty percent (30%) of the first ninety (90) days of accumulated leave. The remainder of the leave shall be unreimbursable and forfeited by the employee.
- 2. Regular part-time employees accrue sick leave proportionate to the amount of time worked.

 Temporary and part-time

 3. All other employees do not accrue sick leave.
- B. Granting of Sick Leave

The department director shall grant sick leave to eligible employees in accordance with the following provisions:

- 1. Leave for sickness shall not exceed the total amount credited to an employee at the time of absence. Sick leave shall not be advanced.
- 2. Leave without pay may be granted for sickness extending beyond the employee's earned sick leave balance.
- 3. Employees may use available annual leave and compensatory leave for sick leave when sick leave has been exhausted.

CHAPTER 9

BENEFITS

The County offers a comprehensive benefits program. Employees are encouraged to contact their department director or the County Administrator's Office with any questions about the benefits program.

It is important that employees advise the County Administrator's Office of any personal status changes (i.e., marriage, divorce and change in dependents or beneficiaries) which could affect their benefits. The following benefits are offered by the County.

9.1 **HEALTH INSURANCE**

Primary Health Care



The County offers one primary health care program for employees. The County pays 100% of the full time, employee's share of the premium, and varying amounts for dual and family coverage as determined by the Board of Supervisors. Retiree health benefits are offered by the County to retired employees with thirty (30) years of County service upon reaching the age of sixty. No cash payments will be made to individuals and these benefits cease when the retired employee becomes Medicare eligible.

9.2 RETIREMENT



The County is a member of the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System. The County pays both the employer's and employee's cost of participation in VSRS, for full-time, permanent

В Amount of Benefit

- 1 VSRS offers several alternative methods of receiving retirement benefit payments (these options are outlined in the Handbook for Members).
- 2. The amount of the retirement benefit is based on three factors: the employee's average final compensation (average of highest 36 consecutive months of salary), years of service credit and age.

C. Notice of Retirement

Employees planning retirement should contact the County Administrator's Office four months prior to retirement to ensure sufficient time for application of all retirement benefits.

D. Disability Retirement

- Employees may apply for disability benefits if they become mentally or physically 1. unable to perform their present duties, and the disability is likely to be permanent.
- 2. Regular disability retirement (for conditions that are not work-related) may be granted if medical conditions warrant and all other qualifications established under the retirement program are met.

 A work-related disability results from a cause compensable under the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act. The amount of compensation provided by the retirement program is coordinated with any benefits received under Workers' Compensation and Social Security disability benefits.

9.3 GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

The County pays the cost of the premium for group life insurance provided by the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System, for full-time permanent employees.

Optional life insurance is also provided by the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System. The cost of the premium for the optional life insurance coverage shall be paid by the employee

9.4 DEFERRED COMPENSATION

The County offers a deferred compensation plan. Employees may participate in the plan at their option. The cost of participation in the deferred compensation plan shall be paid by the employee.

9.5 CAFETERIA PLAN

Employees may choose to participate in the cafeteria benefits plan offered by the County. The cost of participation in the cafeteria plan shall be paid by the employee.

9.6 WORKERS' COMPENSATION

A. Coverage

- 1. The County provides Workers' Compensation insurance coverage at no cost to employees. This insurance program covers an injury (by accident) or illness (occupational disease) which arises out of and in the course of employment that requires medical, surgical or hospital treatment. Workers' Compensation coverage is provided to all regular and temporary employees, both full and part-time.
- 2. There are several types of benefits provided by the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act, which generally include time-loss benefits after seven (7) calendar days for temporary or permanent partial disability, death benefits, paid medical expenses and rehabilitation services.

B. Program Administration

- Notification to the County Administrator's Office shall be within two hours of the
 first business day following any injury or illness, which occurred during emergency
 or other hours outside the regular business day. The County Administrator shall be
 notified immediately (at home if after hours) in the event of a fatality.
- 2. Each department shall establish procedures for notification of appropriate personnel for emergency and after-hours situations, including notification of injury or illness of employees during such times. Departmental procedures shall be communicated to all employees affected.

Summary:

- 1. As authorized by the Board of Supervisors on October 14, 2008, an RFP was issued to retain a firm to serve as financial advisor for the County. We received responses from two firms Davenport & Company and Springsted. A committee comprising the Treasurer, Assistant County Administrator and County Administrator independently reviewed and ranked the two proposals. Interviews with representatives of the two firms were also conducted. All three committee members judged Davenport to be the firm best able to serve as the County's financial advisor. No retainer is required; payment is based on a project basis.
- 2. To ensure the County has specialized legal counsel, if needed, concerning the unsolicited PPEA proposal that has been submitted, I recommend we engage the services of a firm to provide legal review and advice concerning both the PPEA process and the contract issues regarding the proposal submitted. Attached is a letter of Engagement from the firm of Troutman Sanders, who has served as outside legal counsel to the County on a number of water/infrastructure issues over the last ten years.
- 3. In 2006, the Board of Supervisors conducted a Planning Retreat and established a five-year action plan. Several items contained in that plan have been accomplished and the economic and political environments have changed drastically since the plan was adopted. As such, I recommend the Board of Supervisors schedule a half-day meeting in late January/early February to discuss and adopt a new Strategic vision/plan for the County. It is envisioned this new plan will provide direction to the County staff and direction in the development of the budget for the upcoming fiscal year by clearly stating the Board's current vision for the County of Prince Edward.
- 4. As we are aware, the County is in the process of completing a reassessment of real property. The assessors have reassessed the properties in the County and have held their appeal process. We are now at the stage where a Board of Equalization must be impaneled. The Circuit Court Judge has the responsibility to appoint the members of this Board of Equalization, and the Board of Supervisors is responsible for setting the compensation of the members. It is recommended compensation be set at \$100 per day. This is the amount set for the last Board of Equalization in 2003 and is above what surrounding counties have paid.



Subject: Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District

Over the past year-and-a-half, county staff and volunteer citizen committees have been working to draft a "Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District (RPOD)" document, which would become an amendment to the county zoning ordinance. The purpose of this document would be to set guidelines designed to protect the reservoir and its tributaries from pollution and sedimentation. As you are probably aware, the reservoir is anticipated to become a public water supply within the next few years, and protection of the water quality and quantity is very important.

You are receiving this notice because according to county records you own property in the watershed, and therefore, might be affected by the proposed regulations. The areas most affected will be those within the Reservoir Protection Area (RPA). These are, for the most part, environmentally sensitive areas, where manmade activities will have the most impact on the reservoir. Attached is a list of those areas identified as being in the RPA. Areas of the watershed outside the RPA would, in most cases, see little or no affect from the proposed regulations.

In order to provide you with more information on the RPOD, the county has scheduled a public informational meeting on January 22, 2009 at 7:00 p.m., in the Board of Supervisors Room of the Prince Edward County Courthouse. County staff will discuss the document and attempt to answer any questions you may have. Prior to the meeting, you can review the complete text of the document on the county web-site: www.co.prince-edward.va.us. Click on the "Site Map" selection on the left side of the home page; then scroll down to the Planning & Zoning Office, where the document can be accessed (see Sandy River RPOD Ordinance Draft). If you would like a hard copy of the document, please contact my office (434-392-8837), and we will be glad to mail you a copy.

Finally, I strongly encourage you to contact me, if you have questions. I can discuss your particular situation and let you know how the RPOD guidelines might affect you.

I wanted to share with you some information regarding an appropriations earmark that I submitted that will yield benefits for every jurisdiction in the 5th District. In the FY09 Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations measure, I have secured an earmark for a pictometry visual intelligence technology project for the entire 5th District, coordinated by the Albemarle County Emergency Communications Department. This technology has very beneficial applications for law enforcement, first responders, and local government entities. The earmark has cleared the House and is being conferenced as part of the omnibus appropriations bill.

After the measure has been signed by President Obama, in late 2009, each county and city will receive a high-resolution aerial photo-imaging library of their particular locality and accompanying software that manipulates these images. Pictometry technology enables public safety personnel to view and analyze any building, intersection, or feature in a county or city from their laptop, workstation, or mobile device within a few seconds. First responders can use these images to pre-plan response logistics for major structures and facilities or measure hose distance from water sources and hydrants to fires. Law enforcement can utilize the tools to coordinate plan searches, raids and seizures, or analyze evacuation routes and traffic control.

While the House Appropriations Committee has approved the legislation including funds for the 5th District pictometry project, the FY 2009 omnibus spending measure is on track to be finalized.

Fact Sheet: Pictometry Visual Intelligence Tool for Localities of the 5th District of Virginia

Law enforcement, first responder, and local government agencies can use pictometry visual intelligence technology to see up to 12 different views of any feature in their jurisdiction within a matter of seconds from libraries of digital, full color aerial imagery and geo-spatial information. While pictometry libraries consist of orthogonal (straight down) images like ordinary aerial imaging, over 80% of the images are oblique (taken from angles) so that features can be easily seen in their entirety. These images reveal the front, back, and sides of objects of interest rather than just their tops. Within seconds, a law enforcement officer can literally view and analyze any house, building, intersection, fire hydrant, tree, or any feature in the jurisdiction from their laptop, workstation, or mobile device.

A few examples of the features and functions this visualization technology provides include:

- Images are digitally captured and cameras are calibrated with a U.S. Geologic Survey camera calibration process.
- Software tools permit users to measure, annotate, and overlay data on the images
- Oblique viewing software integrates directly in ESR1's ArcIMS and ArcGIS software (industry standard E911 call taker and dispatch software)
- Applications include: search, raid, and seizure planning, positive surveillance operations, accident reconstruction, pre-emptive and concurrent tactical planning, crowd control and evacuation planning, traffic control analysis, land/air coordination in search and rescue efforts, and assessing the physical attributes of building entries and exits

Project Description

The Albemarle County Emergency Communications Department (ACECD), identified as the recipient of the funding, will administer the program for the 18 counties and 4 cities of the 5th District. This program will provide unlimited seat licenses for all local agencies operating in this twenty-two jurisdiction area for image libraries. The funding also provides a full suite of library management, measurement and annotation software tools, installation support, training, and customer support.

Each locality will coordinate with ACECD to prepare flight plans for the jurisdictions. The jurisdictions will receive their data as well as data for contiguous counties that are also included in this initiative. ACECD will provide training and user support services for the participating localities.
