November 12, 2008

At a reconvened meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House, thereof, on Wednesday the 12<sup>th</sup> day of November, 2008; at 5:30 p.m., there were present:

Also present: Wade Bartlett, County Administrator; Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator; and James Ennis, County Attorney.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order, stating that its purpose was a work session to review the proposed library construction contract with the Town of Farmville; the proposed contract with the Town of Farmville for the water system; and to discuss the staff retreat and the re-prioritization of items.

### In Re: Library Options

Chairman Fore said he received an e-mail from Lowell Frye of November 5, 2008 regarding funding for the proposed library, requesting continued support from the Board. Chairman Fore said the e-mail stated the bids were lower than anticipated, and Mr. Frye said the opportunity cannot slip away, and requested the Board take action.

Chairman Fore said the three options on the library agreement were presented to the Board members prior to the VACo meeting, and that discussion was held between Mr. Bartlett and Mr. Spates, Town of Farmville Manager, and the legal representatives of the two entities to result in the three draft options. Chairman Fore asked the Board for input to determine which option to support; negotiations with

the Town would then continue. He said the County will fund two-thirds of the cost, but the source of funding has yet to be determined.

Supervisor Moore asked if the Town has done anything to this point. Mr. Bartlett said the Town has accepted the construction bids; the lowest is from Coleman Adams. He said there are approximately 32 days remaining under the written contract.

Supervisor Gilfillan said the library is necessary for economic development. She opened discussion on the option to let the Town own the building and be responsible for the maintenance. Concerns were raised that the Town would bill the library for the services; Chairman Fore said the County does not share in the maintenance costs for the existing library, and there would need to be an annual budget request to the County from the library just as before.

Mr. James Ennis, County Attorney, said that a County/Town agreement on an annual appropriation cannot be made ahead of time. He said future Boards may decide on two-thirds support. He then said the Board should set dollar figure on the construction contract with a limit set on change orders. He said contractors may bid low and make up the difference through change orders, and advised approval from the County be necessary on an amount exceeding a set dollar figure. Mr. Bartlett said the original contract had a cap of \$1,000. Further discussion on a cap amount followed.

Supervisor Gilfillan said grant opportunities could cut costs for the supplies for the library, and asked if anyone was researching grants for computers and other library equipment. She suggested a library tax rate be set until the library project is complete.

Further discussion on the application of possible grant awards followed. Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said the agreement could specify that cost reductions offset by grants and donations should be reduced from the project cost and distributed two-thirds, one-third between the County and the Town. She said a 10% contingency should absorb change orders. Chairman Fore said Mr. Ennis recommended any change orders with a total construction budget of more than \$1,000 must be approved by the County and the Town, with change orders not to exceed an amount determined by the Board. Mr. Ennis said the contingency typically cover site development costs and unknown material cost fluctuations, and not necessarily change orders.

Chairman Fore said that could be governed by the Building Committee, as the administration having the power to make decisions during construction by the Committee.

Mr. Ennis said the construction costs could be funded at two-thirds, not less than \$3,070,000, nor more than \$4.2 million. He said it can be capped by agreeing to pay a capped amount, and suggested adding "less grant funding received." Further discussion followed.

The Board agreed that any construction change orders that would increase the total construction budget by more than \$1,000 must be approved by the County and the Town, with total change orders not to exceed \$61,400.00 without consent of the County.

Chairman Fore said one difference between Options 1 and 2 is ownership of the building as in "Option 1 - the Town use of library ceases to exist and uses the building for Town purposes, the Town must reimburse the County the original cost."

Further discussion regarding the responsibility for maintenance of the building and annual operating expenses followed. Mrs. Puckett said the County must meet the state match funding requirements or the library would lose their state funding. Mr. Ennis said it was discussed because they clarify the responsibility of the Library Board of Directors, and it was determined that neither the County nor the Town wished to be involved in personnel decisions, but would act as fiscal agent, will fund part of the construction, and oversee the construction, but do not wish to run the library on a day to day basis.

Supervisor Wiley asked about the name of the library; Mrs. Puckett said it may be the Central Virginia Regional Library, Farmville-Prince Edward County Branch.

Chairman Fore said the County has agreed to fund two-thirds of the cost of the library. He said the County has so many capital projects in the near future, decisions must be made after Davenport completes the study and renders the ability to repay the money. He said nothing will be signed until it has been determined the County can afford the projects.

Supervisor Ward asked if it had been advertised to secure a financial advisor. Mr. Bartlett said the County did advertise for a financial advisor and the deadline for those bids is November 21, 2008. He said the Board engaged Davenport to preserve a \$10 million bank qualification that runs on a calendar year basis, and to complete a financial analysis which needs to be complete before the County can make an

informed decision on the library or any other project. Further discussion followed regarding the duties of a financial advisor.

Supervisor Ward inquired about the report Davenport presented at the meeting on November 6, 2008. Supervisor Jones said Davenport gave an idea on the process on how a county could get a line of credit. Mr. Bartlett said Davenport instructed the Board on the process, bank qualifications, and the timelines that are necessary. He said he had asked them about the process, because prior to doing this type of project, a financial package is necessary. Further discussion followed.

Chairman Fore asked the Board for a determination on the option to submit to the Town of Farmville. The Board agreed on Option 2, with a few revisions. Mr. Bartlett said Town Council will review the agreement and a joint meeting will be scheduled for actual votes and signatures. He said the financial analysis will be completed in the near future. Mr. Bartlett also suggested scheduling public hearings on these projects.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor Moore called upon a citizen to lead the pledge to the flag; Supervisor Moore then offered the invocation.

#### In Re: Public Participation

Chairman Fore said the Board spent the previous hour and a half in a work session discussing the construction contract between the Town of Farmville and the County of Prince Edward. He said the draft contract presented three options, and after making a few changes, the Board has selected one of the options. He said the draft contract will now go to the Town of Farmville for their consideration.

Jason Milne, Farmville, requested support of the Board for a one to two acre off-leash dog park to be established near Lowe's for the citizens to socialize, exercise and have a safe environment for their dogs to run. Mr. Milne said the park would require the purchase of benches and fencing, and would include clean-up facilities. He said rules and regulations would be enforced, and asked the assistance of the Board

with zoning and permit issues, to help secure funds for the construction and maintenance of the park; to provide refuse pickup; mowing the field; and police patrol of the park.

Lowell Frye, Farmville, said he was glad to thank the Board for their support of the library in this difficult financial time. He said it is time to invest in this project as the bids received were about half the amount expected. He thanked the Board for helping the project move forward.

Jack Houghton, Farmville, offered support for the library project as well. He then said he had requested copies of documents from the Town of Farmville regarding the extension of public utilities to The Manor Resort, which included a letter of November 16, 2007 from the County to The Manor which described a commitment made by the Board of Supervisors to The Manor. The letter mentions a telephone poll of the Board members that authorize specific representation to The Manor Resort. Mr. Houghton said he mentioned this letter in June of 2008 suggesting there may have been a FOIA violation. He said as the transaction did have significant cost implications for the County; all public business must be conducted in public.

Mr. Houghton said the County Administrator made new representations to The Manor in July 2008 through the new utility authority relating to the same subject of the November letter, but clearly conditioning the representations on the Authority Board approval during a regular meeting. This letter would appear to be consistent with the Virginia Open Meeting Law.

Mr. Houghton said that at the October 2008 Board meeting, Supervisor Ward made a motion to conduct a formal review of the apparent violation of the Virginia Open Meeting Law, it had been defeated with a vote of seven against. He said Supervisor Jones had said he had a document that explained the matter; Mr. Houghton said the public has no such document. He asked the Board to provide open government and transparency.

**Peggy Epperson**, Farmville, advised the Board of the services of the library, and said due to an increase in state aid, the library will be open until 9:00 p.m. four nights a week. She thanked the Board for their continued support.

# In Re: Approval of Minutes

Supervisor Ward said he had a question due to the earlier meeting regarding a county financial advisor. He said at a previous meeting there had been discussion on engaging a financial advisor, but after seeing the advertisement in the Farmville Herald, he learned Davenport and Associates is a financial advisor and is already working.

Mr. Bartlett said that during the meeting held November 6, 2008, the County did engage Davenport to prepare bid information to secure a line of credit. He said Davenport is not in an advisory position but is providing a service. He said Davenport has also been engaged to do an analysis of the County because of the time constraints on the construction bids for the library project, which expire December 14, 2008. Mr. Bartlett said the Financial RFP is similar to the annual engineering service contract, and would allow the County to hire an advisor without having to go to bid for each project. He said the County will most likely pick more than one firm.

Supervisor Ward asked when Davenport was authorized to prepare the report given at the November 6, 2008 meeting. Mr. Bartlett said he had been in contact with Davenport to find out the process to obtain a line of credit. Davenport provided a generic report on the process to follow to obtain a line of credit; there was no charge to the County. Supervisor Jones added that if Davenport fails to secure a line of credit for the County, there is no charge.

Supervisor Ward suggested that any decision that may cost the County significant money should be public. He referred to a discussion during the November 6, 2008 meeting regarding the timeline and process. Supervisor Gilfillan said discussion on the need for a financial advisor began in August 2008, and other services had been discussed as well.

# In Re: Public Hearing - Amendment to the Sandy River Reservoir Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Ordinance to Regulate and Protect the Sandy River Reservoir and Adjacent County-Owned Properties.

Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the October 24, 2008 and October 31, 2008 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Pattie Cooper-Jones asked if the water supply is absolutely necessary and at what burden to the

taxpayers. She said she felt the Board will go forward with the water supply system no matter what the

citizens wish, adding that the County would "not invest this kind of money without moving forward."

Supervisor Ward said the changes would accommodate the plans for the water supply system.

Mr. Bartlett explained that Southside Electric Cooperative contacted the County several weeks

prior to the meeting as they need to build an electric transmission line which would span the reservoir to

allow increased capacity and better service to their customers. He said under the current ordinance, the

construction would not be allowed; this served as a genesis to the changes to the ordinance. He said once

the limitations of the ordinance were realized, it was felt necessary to include anything that could

potentially occur in the future, including telecommunications, fiber optic cables, phone lines, and possibly a

water intake, pumping stations, and the like. It was re-written to allow any public utilities to work on

county property to better serve the citizens of the county.

There being no one else wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROTECT THE SANDY RIVER RESERVOIR AND ADJACENT COUNTY-OWNED PROPERTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 15.1-13 OF THE

CODE OF VIRGINIA 1950, AS AMENDED

Sec. 82-31.

21

- (a) The following activities are hereby declared to be unlawful in that part of Lockett Magisterial District of Prince Edward County known as Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir:
  - (1) Presence of persons, boats, or other personal property at anytime in areas marked "No Trespassing," without the express written permission of the county administrator.
  - (2) Parking on any County-owned property surrounding the reservoir other than in the Sandy River Reservoir Public Use Area located off Route 640, at the end of Route 792, or in any other area specifically designated by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors as a Public Parking Area.
  - (3) Littering or dumping of any type, kind or description.
  - (4) Hunting or trapping of any type, kind or description without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward.
  - (5) Conducting fishing tournaments in which prizes are awarded without an express written permit issued by the County of Prince Edward and Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
  - (6) Diving, snorkeling or swimming of any type, kind or description.
  - (7) Operation in or on the reservoir of any unlicensed watercraft or any type of watercraft propelled by an engine in excess of ten (10) horsepower.
  - (8) Operation in or on the reservoir of a windsurfer, sailboard or any wind-propelled vessel, other than a sailboat, length of which shall not exceed sixteen (16) feet.
  - (9) Operation in or on the reservoir of any jet ski.
  - (10) Sale of any and all commodities or services anywhere in either the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, as well as the posting of any kind of advertisement of any description, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
  - (11) Discharging any firearm, including but not limited to any weapon which propels a projectile by pneumatic means, unless sanctioned by the County of Prince Edward.
  - (12) Possession of any type of alcoholic beverage while on the premises.
  - (13) Presence on the reservoir or the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person under the age of twelve (12) years, unless such person is accompanied by an individual who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
  - (14) Camping and lighting or maintaining any kind of fire, unless such activity has been sanctioned or is sponsored by the County.
  - (15) Use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir by any person riding any type of motorized or non-motorized vehicle, bicycle or horse and use of any part of the reservoir or such County-owned property for ice skating or sledding, unless any such use has been expressly sanctioned by the County.

- (16) The use of any of the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir, other than those areas specifically designated by the County as such, for boat access to and from the reservoir including, but not limited to construction of piers, docks and access roads.
  - Individuals owning property adjacent to the county buffer who have a county-approved and permitted boat access ramp shall continue to be responsible for the soil erosion and sedimentation measures and for the safe maintenance and upkeep of the ramp. The permit is not transferable to any future owners of the property. Permittee must carry liability insurance and show annual proof thereof.
- (17) Cutting, removing or altering any trees, brush or other vegetation now growing or hereafter established in the reservoir or on the County-owned property surrounding the reservoir and removing, altering or otherwise disturbing the reservoir or any County-owned land surrounding the reservoir.
- (18) Withdrawal of water for any purpose, with the exception that adjacent property owners with express written permission from Prince Edward County may withdraw reasonable amounts of water for irrigation and domestic purposes until such time as water therein is used for public water supply.
- (19) Stocking of any fish or other aquatic species in the reservoir or animal on the County-owned property, without written permission of Prince Edward County and the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.
- (20) The siting of "sewerage systems" and "treatment works", as defined by the State Board of Health Sewage Handling and Disposal Regulations, within five hundred (500) feet of the normal pool elevation of the reservoir.
- (21) Discharging a firearm, as defined in paragraph 11 of this section, on any county-owned land, on or within 300 feet of a public parking area.
- (b) The Board of Supervisors may, by resolution, authorize the construction and maintenance of public utilities, including electrical supply lines, water and sewer treatment plants, water and sewer supply lines, and telecommunications transmission lines that benefit the public at large and are constructed and maintained by a public utility company, Prince Edward County, or by a public utility authority created pursuant to state law, on Sandy River Reservoir and on any County-owned property surrounding the Sandy River Reservoir. As a condition of said authorization, the entity responsible for the construction or maintenance of the public utility shall restore the affected property to the same condition as it existed on the date of the authorization, and shall maintain the area in that condition for the duration of the authorization, to the extent that is practical and consistent with prevailing utility maintenance practices in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- (c) Except for those activities specifically authorized by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Paragraph (b), any person who shall knowingly commit any of the acts declared unlawful in (a) above, shall, on conviction of a first offense of a violation of this section, be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor as same as defined in Section 18.2-11 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

### In Re: Israel Hill Historic Marker

Mrs. Jo Smith, representing the Farmville-Prince Edward Historical Society, said that the Historical Society has voted to sponsor a Virginia State Highway Marker commemorating "Israel Hill." In 2005, the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) was seeking suggestions for markers documenting important African-American history in Virginia. At the May 9, 2005 meeting, the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing the placement of an Israel Hill marker. DHR had funds at that time for only ten markers and Israel Hill was not selected. Mrs. Smith said the marker cost is \$1,350; co-sponsorship of the marker is being sought from the Town of Farmville and Prince Edward County, each sharing the cost equally with the Historical Society. Each share would be \$450.00. Mrs. Smith said the Town of Farmville approved co-sponsoring the marker. The application is due to DHR by December 1, 2008. The sign will be cast after the DHR Board meets in March 2009, to act on the Historical Society's application. The proposed location for the marker is the intersection of US 460/15 West and Lane Street.

In Re: Sandy River Reservoir Resource Protection Overlay District (SRRRPOD)

Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said the staff and consultant

team from Draper Aden Associates have worked to develop a Protection Overlay District ordinance for the

Sandy River Watershed. He said the purpose of the overlay ordinance is to provide means of ensuring

water quality and quantity protection for this future drinking water supply reservoir. He said the project

budget has been exhausted due to overwhelming public input, additional public meetings, draft revisions to

incorporate steering committee changes, and compiling five mapping scenarios.

Mr. Pickett said the ordinance is very close to completion; changes resulting from the legal review

comments and public feedback need to be made to the document. He said the resulting draft ordinance will

require public hearings complete with presentation and then inclusion of any additional changes. Final

maps depicting the Resource Protection Area will be printed and the ordinance will then be prepared for

distribution.

Mr. Pickett said a revised agreement with Draper Aden is necessary to complete the work on the

SRRPOD. He explained that Task 1 and Task 3 are covered; the necessary items for Task 2 could not be

done in-house, with an anticipated cost of \$1,000.00 to plot index sheets for Public Hearings and minor

changes to mapping. He said Task 4 anticipates at least two additional public meetings and up to four

additional meetings at a cost of \$3,000.00 per meeting. Task 5 anticipates a cost of \$4,000.00 to

incorporate comments from public hearings and the legal review.

Alternative Inspection Program - Single Family Homes
Addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance

\*\* DRAFT 2 \*\*

PURPOSE:

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The alternative inspection program described herein for Prince Edward County is designed to provide for oversight of land-disturbing activities that are most pertinent to home building in order to improve on-site compliance and most effectively utilize available resources (staff) to meet specific home construction trends while addressing specific environmental conditions within Prince Edward County. This alternative inspection program is an addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance which addresses urban land-disturbing activities and their regulation.

### **AUTHORIZATION:**

- \$ \\$10.1-566 of Title 10.1 Chapter 5, Article 4 of the Code of Virginia and \\$4VAC50-30-60 of the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Regulations.
- \$ Section 46-60 of the Code of Prince Edward County, "Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance of Prince Edward County"

#### POLICY:

To most effectively utilize local staff and protect the resources of Prince Edward County and the Commonwealth, Prince Edward County will implement an alternative inspection program for single family home construction based on a system of priorities. The system of priorities will be based upon the amount of disturbed project area, site conditions, stages of construction, and site conditions noted on previous inspections.

Prince Edward County utilizes an Agreement in Lieu of a Plan for Erosion and Sediment Control plans concerning Single Family Home construction projects. Alternative inspection procedures that address single-family homes must only include home sites covered by an approved "Agreement in Lieu of a Plan" or "Erosion and Sediment Control (ESC) Plan". An ESC Plan is required for homes sites that disturb more than one acre or have limits of disturbance within fifty (50) feet of wetlands or waters of the Commonwealth. Project sites located within the Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District are subject to additional requirements.

This policy outlines procedures for implementing an ESC inspection process for a visual appraisal of single-family home sites by building inspectors or other local representatives. Erosion and Sediment Control measures employed on typical single-family home sites are generally controlling a smaller area of land disturbance, and are less complicated, at risk for failure, or likely to cause off-site damages, when compared to larger commercial, industrial, municipal, or subdivision sites.

**CERTIFICATION OF PERSONNEL:** Individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections shall hold, at a minimum, a Responsible Land Disturber Certification issued pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Responsible Land Disturber Program. It is highly preferred that individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections (i.e. certified inspectors, building inspectors, third-party contractors) also hold the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Inspector certification.

#### ESC INSPECTION SCHEDULE:

All home construction sites covered by the single-family home alternate inspection program should receive an ESC inspection at the following landmarks:

- 1. Pre-construction (prior to excavation of foundation) i.e. concurrent with 9-1-1 addressing
- 2. Footing excavation
- 3. Backfilling of subgrade walls / fine grading
- 4. Project completion (Prior to issuance of Certificate of Occupancy)

### IMPLEMENTATION:

- 1. The erosion and offsite environmental impact potential of regulated projects shall be determined by an evaluation of the topography, soil characteristics, acreage disturbed, proximity to water resources, and proximity to adjacent property lines.
- 2. After plan review and a site visit, the plan reviewer, program administrator, or appointed inspector will assign a ranking score to the project using the approved Tabular Rating System.

- 3. Ranking Scores will be assigned to projects based on site specific erosion potential and offsite environmental impact. These Ranking Scores will use a point system to determine the frequency of inspections. A lower point score will require a less frequent inspection schedule; a higher point score will require a more frequent inspection schedule.
- 4. The ranking and inspection frequency of a project may be adjusted to a higher or lower classification by the program administrator based upon complaints, violations, inspections, and stages of construction.
- 5. The Tabular Rating Form shall be attached to the approved plan and made a part of the project file maintained by the Building Office. The ranking score shall be written on the building permit application.

#### BASIS FOR CLASSIFICATION:

The following classifications shall be assigned to projects based on a plan review, preliminary site visit and computation of a Ranking Score:

Class	Ranking Score	Criteria Description	
CLASS 1	13-19	Total acres disturbed under one acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 0-7 percent and greater than or equal to 300 feet; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.	
CLASS 2	20-26	Total acre disturbed under one acre; disturbed area is 50 feet to 150 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 7-15 percent and greater than or equal to 150 feet; weighted soil K-factor is between .24 and .36.	
CLASS 3	26-33	Total acres disturbed over one acre; disturbed area is less than 50 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are greater than 15 percent and greater than or equal to 75 feet; weighted soil K-factor is greater than .36.	
CLASS 4	0-12	Total acres disturbed under one-half acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; a buffer of very good dense grass or better greater than 300' exists, slopes are less than 7 percent; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.	

### FREQUENCY OF INSPECTIONS:

- 1. Projects which disturb greater than two (2) acres or cross a live water course shall require site inspections at a minimum two-week frequency, and do not require the computation of a Ranking Score.
- 2. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at the beginning and completion of projects. Upon project completion, a final ESC inspection will be scheduled. This inspection shall be completed PRIOR to the issuance of Certificate of Occupancy.
- 3. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at a minimum frequency according to the following schedule:
- CLASS 1 At the beginning and completion of the project and every eight weeks.

  CLASS 2 At the beginning and completion of the project and at least every four weeks.

  CLASS 3 At the beginning and completion of the project and at least every two weeks.

  CLASS 4 None. Project is referred to Building Inspectors for routine Building Inspection and Monitoring. The project may be subjected to ESC inspections by the program administrator based upon complaints, violations, building inspection notes, and stages of construction.

- 4. All inspections will be documented on an inspection log maintained as a part of each project file. Project owners will receive copies of inspection reports with violations noted.
- 5. Inspection return frequency is not limited to the above schedule and will increase in frequency due to runoff producing storm events or documented violations.

### In Re: Citizens Alert System Grant

Jonathan Pickett said the County has been notified it has been awarded a \$12,500 Citizens Alert System grant, which will be used to assist the Town of Farmville in paying for the town's citizen alert system. This system is available to up to 10,000 customers and is presently under-utilized. In Re: Materials Recovery Facility (MRF)

Jonathan Pickett said County staff recently met with Sharon Harrup of STEPS, Inc. to discuss the

possible establishment of a materials recovery facility at the county landfill, which would allow recyclables

to be sorted out of the incoming waste thus increasing the county's recycling rate and saving landfill space.

He said it would also offer additional employment. Mr. Pickett reported County staff and Ms. Harrup also

met with representatives of the USDA's Rural Development office concerning financing the project, and

learned that long term low interest loans are available. He said a preliminary engineering report and

feasibility study must be conducted, and if the project is found to be feasible, the County could apply for

Rural Development funding. The county received a quote of \$17,180 for the preliminary study.

Mr. Pickett expressed concerns that due to the relatively low volume of waste, the project may not

be feasible, but the study would provide the information on the waste and how much recyclable material is

being landfilled. He said it is possible to lengthen the life of the landfill and the cost avoidance of closing

and opening new landfill cells would make this venture economically viable. He added the report costs can

be covered within the county's current refuse disposal budget; no additional appropriation will be

necessary.

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### In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said a review of the revenues showed a slight decrease in the sales/use tax. He said that because of a delay in receiving it from the state, only two months have been received. While those two months are less than the corresponding months from last year, it is still within the budget and the second highest the County has ever seen. The budget for that was \$2.8 million; the County can expect to meet that as it's early in the year. He said there have been some downturns in the recordation and grantors tax, deeds, which is due to fewer real estate transactions.

Mr. Bartlett then said that during the summer, a company had been hired to assist with the indoor plumbing program. He said they have identified the first citizen for assistance and bids are being sought. He said the program works to upgrade homes and also provides work for local contractors.

### In Re: Other Business

Chairman Fore said Mr. George Kurtz sent an e-mail regarding problems with others' dogs running on his property for the past six years, and requested consideration of a year-round leash law. Chairman Fore said currently dogs must be confined six months of the year. He asked the Board to consider this issue and contact their constituents to determine the need for a year-round leash law.

Supervisor McKay said hunting dogs are excluded under state law.

Mrs. Puckett said she will contact the Animal Control Officers to appear at the December Board meeting, as they are deluged with calls and complaints from the public.

Chairman Fore then said he had the opportunity to review an e-mail received from Mr. David Foster regarding the Public Protection Class (PPC) ratings of the county fire departments. Chairman Fore said the letter stated some of the fire departments have very low ratings, which result in higher insurance premiums for homeowners. Mrs. Puckett said fire alarms count for 10% of the rating; the number of engines and amount of water, 50%; and the amount of community water supply, 40%, which includes dry hydrants and pumper trucks. She explained the rating scale is from 1-10, with 10 being the lowest, and of the fire departments in Prince Edward County, the ratings stood as follows:

Darlington Heights 9

Farmville 6

Hampden-Sydney 6

Meherrin 9

Pamplin 7 (town), 9 (rural)

Prospect

Rice 9

Mrs. Puckett said the fire companies in the county have the highest capability of doing a good job; the Public Protection Classification affects homeowner insurance rates.

Chairman Fore said the County provides a large amount of funding to the fire departments, and they should apply for this type of inspection. He asked the staff to continue researching the indicators as expressed in the letter from Mr. Foster.

Mrs. Puckett advised the Board that Mr. Foster is willing to attend a meeting to provide further information.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion to adjourn the meeting.

Supervisor Moore asked that the Board consider a resolution for Mr. James Lyle, who passed recently. Chairman Fore said he had already instructed the staff in this matter.

Supervisor Ward expressed his concern regarding the large sums of money being spent on projects. He said the Board needs to keep the citizens informed, and suggested referendums be held. He added he believes in open government and that all citizens are entitled to all information except that which is protected by law.

Mr. Bartlett said there is some confusion, as there have been no obligations to move forward with any capital projects at this time. He said there are several capital projects being considered, including the water system, the library, the work at the industrial park, and work at the schools. He said the process has been open, and no agreements have been signed. Mr. Bartlett said the PPEA guidelines require the County to advertize for bids, which are due December 15, 2008. He said once those are received, the Board will have a more detailed cost estimate; at that time, determinations can be made as to the size of the plant or size of water line and how far it would be run which would provide a more precise cost projection. Mr. Bartlett said Davenport was hired to do a financial analysis to provide further information for this reason.

Supervisor Ward said two examples of not being open with the public are the letter from the County Attorney to The Manor making certain representations and a verbal agreement to run a line from Hampden-Sydney to The Manor. He said he found out about that by reviewing the Accounts and Claims.

Chairman Fore called Supervisor Ward out of order due to the topic of discussion not adhering to the pending motion. Supervisor Simpson then called for the question.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order, stating that its purpose was a work session to prioritize the proposed capital projects, and to discuss the draft water and sewer agreement between the Town of Farmville and the County. He then asked the Board members to rank the proposed capital projects in order, with one being highest priority.

Supervisor Ward expressed his support of the library project.

Chairman Fore said the Board's priority ranking of the projects will be forwarded on to Davenport and Associates to determine a more accurate report of what the County can afford. Mr. Bartlett said Davenport had called for QZABs in 2006 and two bidders responded; last year only one bidder responded. He said QZABs are not being done because the economic environment. He added the money can be borrowed in other ways, just not in the form of QZABs.

The tally of the priority rank is as follows:

Supervisor Gilfillan suggested the Board consider supporting the development of agriculture as economic growth in the County with the current economic instability.

Supervisor Ward asked if the budget included any of these projects. Mr. Bartlett, County Administrator, said there was no money in the current budget; Supervisor Jones said some of the money in the Economic Development Fund could be used. Mr. Bartlett said Davenport is assessing the County's overall financial health to show the impact of each project and the ability of the County to pay each one back. He added that "afford" is a relative term as the Board decides what it can and cannot afford; the choice to keep the tax level or to raise it is a choice the Board would have to make.

Supervisor Jones said other participants could enter into the water plant project, and that must be a consideration. Further discussion on the water plant project and the intake project followed.

Supervisor Gilfillan stressed the work on the library project over the years has been considerable and asked that the bid not be allowed to expire. Supervisor Ward said the library project should go forward, and said the discussion on the water and sewer plant and the intake project is confusing the priority. He then asked if the agreement with the Town of Farmville is signed, will the County still proceed with the development of a water treatment plant. Chairman Fore said the priorities were being determined.

Discussion followed on the feasibility of the water treatment plant and the work being done by Davenport. Questions were raised regarding a customer base for a water treatment plant. Supervisor Jones said several localities have shown interest in obtaining water service, which would provide a customer base.

Supervisor Simpson expressed his concern regarding the reports from Davenport and the difference between the ones they submitted four months ago which stated the County could afford all of the projects. Mr. Bartlett said those reports were working documents and it did not state the County could afford to do all of the projects without an impact; he said all of those items would require either revenues, grants, or some other funding from the County's revenue structure at that time. Mr. Bartlett added the

report stated the sewer plant would not be afforded under the revenue and the reduced debt structure that the County had at that time.

Supervisor Ward said the water line from Hampden Sydney to The Manor and the purchase of the wells are not listed. Mr. Bartlett said The Manor has not responded to his letter. Supervisor Jones said the only reason the County considered the purchase of the wells was due to the moratorium placed at that time by the Town of Farmville. He said if this agreement is passed with the Town, those wells would not be necessary.

Chairman Fore then turned the discussion to the draft water and sewer agreement.

Supervisor Ward asked if the County owes money to the Town of Farmville or the CDA, as the agreement states "The County agrees to pay Two Million and Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500,000.00) to the Town for the system to be conveyed, payable in two installments..." He said the draft contract states "a portion of its water supply and wastewater system ('the system to be conveyed') located in the County and described as beginning at the "METERING POINT" as shown on the Nash drawing and continuing in a southeasterly direction along the existing water supply and waste water system treatment lines and service system until the end thereof." Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said that description refers to existing lines. Supervisor Ward then asked if the lines were constructed by the Town for the CDA, and if any government funding was involved. Mrs. Puckett said the project had not been administered by the County and all sources of funding were unknown. Mr. Bartlett said in a document received from the Town of Farmville, the Town did provide some funding and from in-kind labor for the project. He said \$400,000 +/- and another \$110,000 connected to a Dominion power line, Tobacco Commission funds were received. He said the document showed that of the \$1 million from the Tobacco Commission, more than half of that was used to build the road. He added the price included the lines the Town installed on their own, as well as the pump station. Supervisor Jones said the price would include the right to purchase water and sewer service from the Town.

Discussion followed on the Settlement and General Release Agreement. Supervisor Ward expressed his concern that the CDA would be released from their obligation to the Town.

Mr. Ennis said the Town of Farmville proposed the condition in the Settlement and General Release Agreement would include a mutual release of liability. The Town made the Water/Sewer

Agreement contingent upon a mutual release being executed, and the first document references that in Section 2. The contract of January 11, 2000 has three named parties - the Town of Farmville, Prince Edward County, and the CDA. Mr. Ennis said, "Also in the law there exists what is known as third party beneficiaries of a contract, and this mutual release is attempting to cover all of the known potential thirdparty beneficiaries who may come in and allege that one party or the other has breached the agreement of January 11, 2000, and has therefore suffered damage. It simply attempts to clean up all of the potential plaintiffs that might come forward with a claim by having all of them enter into an agreement where they release each other from any liability under the Agreement of 2000. The language is plain; the language has been reviewed by the Town Attorney. I have to assume they understand what the word 'debt' means when they read it. They understand who the parties are that are being required to sign this document, to put any questions about the contract of January 11, 2000 to rest forever, that it will not be the subject of any future dispute because if all of the parties and the potential third-party beneficiaries have entered into this release, and specifically declared that document to be null and void as to any obligations that were created, there will exist no potential for a future lawsuit. The Town [of Farmville] would not have required that contingency in this agreement if they did not have some legitimate concern about a lawsuit. It was their requirement. They put that language in there; they drafted this document first and sent it over to be reviewed. I have reviewed it; I have revised it. This is about the ninth draft of this document. But at no time has that language been changed from their original proposal because they are firm on that point. I don't know if they perceive that they are forgiving some debt that somebody owes, but it's been reviewed, the language is acceptable to the Town Attorney that is contained in it. And I don't know whether they think some portion of the \$2.5 million is going to be applied to some debt that they claim the CDA owes, or not. I only know that the price was negotiated and that they set that as a condition of executing this document. I drafted the release document and that too has been reviewed by the Town Attorney and they didn't have any problem with the language."

Supervisor Ward said his concern is the process in which certain past events occurred, and said he tends to look deeper due to issues involving the CDA and The Manor.

Supervisor Simpson said certain changes needed to be made to the draft agreement, including the word "thousand" omitted from Page 2, to read "The County agrees to pay Two Million and Five Hundred

Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000.00) to the Town for the system to be conveyed, payable in two installments, without interest..."; and Section 3. currently states "The County shall construct, ..." and should state "The Town shall construct, maintain, repair and operate at its sole expense such water supply and wastewater system as is necessary to provide water and wastewater service ..."; and to allow County employees the ability to inspect the meter to insure correct readings.

After discussion on the changes to be made, Supervisor Simpson made a motion to approve the amended Water/Sewer Agreement with the Town of Farmville. The motion carried:

Issue: PUBLIC HEARING Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance

#### Summary:

As you recall, at its November meeting, the Board authorized a Public Hearing for December 9, 2008 to gather citizen input concerning the proposed addition of an Alternative Inspection Schedule for Single Family Homes to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance.

Part of operating our local Erosion and Sediment Control program in compliance with Virginia regulations requires Prince Edward County to conduct inspections of single family home construction. The state regulations require these inspections every two weeks unless the County adopts an "Alternative Inspection Program (AIP)." Given our present staffing and resource levels and the increasing number of single family home sites, the Erosion and Sediment Control Program Administrator has drafted an "Alternative Inspection Program for Single Family Homes" Policy which will use a numeric scoring system to determine the frequency of inspections needed for each Single Family Home site. This system of prioritizing inspection frequencies is based upon the amount of disturbed project area, site conditions, and stages of construction. It is desirable for this policy to be included as an addendum to the current Erosion and Sediment Control Program ordinance.

Typically, single family home sites pose less threat of environmental degradation when compared to larger commercial, industrial, municipal or subdivision sites. Therefore, steering limited staff time toward these larger sites and allowing an alternative inspection frequency for single family homes better utilizes resources to address specific environmental conditions within Prince Edward County and still operates within the requirements of the Virginia regulations.

# Prince Edward County Alternative Inspection Program - Single Family Homes Addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance

\*\* DRAFT 2 \*\*

#### PURPOSE:

The alternative inspection program described herein for Prince Edward County is designed to provide for oversight of land-disturbing activities that are most pertinent to home building in order to improve on-site compliance and most effectively utilize available resources (staff) to meet specific home construction trends while addressing specific environmental conditions within Prince Edward County. This alternative inspection program is an addendum to the Prince Edward County Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance which addresses urban land-disturbing activities and their regulation.

#### AUTHORIZATION:

- §10.1-566 of Title 10.1 Chapter 5, Article 4 of the Code of Virginia and §4VAC50-30-60 of the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Regulations.
- Section 46-60 of the Code of Prince Edward County, "Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance of Prince Edward County"

#### POLICY:

To most effectively utilize local staff and protect the resources of Prince Edward County and the Commonwealth, Prince Edward County will implement an alternative inspection program for single family home construction based on a system of priorities. The system of priorities will be based upon the amount of disturbed project area, site conditions, stages of construction, and site conditions noted on previous inspections.

Prince Edward County utilizes an Agreement in Lieu of a Plan for Erosion and Sediment Control plans concerning Single Family Home construction projects. Alternative inspection procedures that address single-family homes must only include home sites covered by an approved "Agreement in Lieu of a Plan" or "Erosion and Sediment Control (ESC) Plan". An ESC Plan is required for homes sites that disturb more than one acre or have limits of disturbance within fifty (50) feet of wetlands or waters of the Commonwealth. Project sites located within the Sandy River Reservoir Protection Overlay District are subject to additional requirements.

This policy outlines procedures for implementing an ESC inspection process for a visual appraisal of single-family home sites by building inspectors or other local representatives. Erosion and Sediment Control measures employed on typical single-family home sites are generally controlling a smaller area of land disturbance, and are less complicated, at risk for failure, or likely to cause off-site damages, when compared to larger commercial, industrial, municipal, or subdivision sites.

**CERTIFICATION OF PERSONNEL:** Individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections shall hold, at a minimum, a Responsible Land Disturber Certification issued pursuant to the requirements of the Virginia Responsible Land Disturber Program. It is highly preferred that individuals conducting Home Construction Inspections (i.e. certified inspectors, building inspectors, third-party contractors) also hold the Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Inspector certification.

#### **ESC INSPECTION SCHEDULE:**

All home construction sites covered by the single-family home alternate inspection program should receive an ESC inspection at the following landmarks:

- Pre-construction (prior to excavation of foundation) i.e. concurrent with 9-1-1 addressing
- Footing excavation
- Backfilling of subgrade walls / fine grading
- Project completion (Prior to issuance of Certificate of Occupancy)

#### **IMPLEMENTATION:**

- 1. The erosion and offsite environmental impact potential of regulated projects shall be determined by an evaluation of the topography, soil characteristics, acreage disturbed, proximity to water resources, and proximity to adjacent property lines.
- 2. After plan review and a site visit, the plan reviewer, program administrator, or appointed inspector will assign a ranking score to the project using the approved Tabular Rating System.
- 3. Ranking Scores will be assigned to projects based on site specific erosion potential and offsite environmental impact. These Ranking Scores will use a point system to determine the frequency of inspections. A lower point score will require a less frequent inspection schedule; a higher point score will require a more frequent inspection schedule.
- 4. The ranking and inspection frequency of a project may be adjusted to a higher or lower classification by the program administrator based upon complaints, violations, inspections, and stages of construction.
- 5. The Tabular Rating Form shall be attached to the approved plan and made a part of the project file maintained by the Building Office. The ranking score shall be written on the building permit application.

#### BASIS FOR CLASSIFICATION:

The following classifications shall be assigned to projects based on a plan review, preliminary site visit and computation of a Ranking Score:

Class	Ranking Score	Criteria Description
CLASS 1	13-19	Total acres disturbed under one acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 0-7 percent and greater than or equal to 300 feet; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.
CLASS 2	20-26	Total acre disturbed under one acre; disturbed area is 50 feet to 150 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are 7-15 percent and greater than or equal to 150 feet; weighted soil K-factor is between .24 and .36.
CLASS 3	26-33	Total acres disturbed over one acre; disturbed area is less than 50 feet from any property lines, water resources, or public streets; slopes are greater than 15 percent and greater than or equal to 75 feet; weighted soil K-factor is greater than .36.
CLASS 4	0-12	Total acres disturbed under one-half acre; greater than 150 foot buffer between disturbed area and any property lines, water resources, or public streets; a buffer of very good dense grass or better greater than 300' exists, slopes are less than 7 percent; weighted soil K-factor is equal to or less than .23.

#### **FREQUENCY OF INSPECTIONS:**

- 1. Projects which disturb greater than two (2) acres or cross a live water course shall require site inspections at a minimum two-week frequency, and do not require the computation of a Ranking Score.
- 2. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at the beginning and completion of projects. Upon project completion, a final ESC inspection will be scheduled. This inspection shall be completed PRIOR to the issuance of Certificate of Occupancy.
- 3. All permitted land-disturbing activities will be inspected at a minimum frequency according to the following schedule:
- CLASS 1
  CLASS 2
  At the beginning and completion of the project and every eight weeks.
  At the beginning and completion of the project and at least every four weeks.
  At the beginning and completion of the project and at least every two weeks.
  At the beginning and completion of the project and at least every two weeks.
  None. Project is referred to Building Inspectors for routine Building Inspection and Monitoring. The project may be subjected to ESC inspections by the program administrator based upon complaints, violations, building inspection notes, and stages of construction.
- 4. All inspections will be documented on an inspection log maintained as a part of each project file. Project owners will receive copies of inspection reports with violations noted.
- 5. Inspection return frequency is not limited to the above schedule and will increase in frequency due to runoff producing storm events or documented violations.

PUBLIC HEARING - Zoning Ordinance Amendment - R2 General Residential

#### Summary:

A Public Hearing is scheduled on December 9<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 p.m. before the Board of Supervisors to gather citizen input on revising the Zoning Ordinance to allow Manufactured Homes by Special Use Permit in the R2 General Residential Zoning District. In the current Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, Manufactured Homes are not permitted in the R2 General Residential Zoning District. The past Zoning Ordinance allowed manufactured homes by Conditional Use Permit, and its omission in the rewritten, current ordinance is believed to have been an oversight.

A Public Hearing considering this same matter was held before the Planning Commission on November 18, 2008 at 7:30 pm. Following the public hearing, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend adding Manufactured Homes to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance Section 2-400.3 (B) Special Use Permit in the R2 General Residential District with the conditions of (a) individual units, (b) one home per residential lot, (c) a continuous permanent foundation.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by William Porterfield.

The minutes of the September 16, 2008 meeting were reviewed. Mr. Wilck made a motion to accept the minutes.

The Public Hearing for consideration of a Zoning Ordinance amendment was opened. Dr. Porterfield asked Jonathan Pickett to explain more about what was proposed in the request.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING:**

The Public Hearing was advertised as follows:

Request by county staff to determine whether manufactured homes should be included as a Special Use in the County's R-2 (General Residential) Zoning District. The siting of manufactured homes in the R-2 zone is presently not permitted.

Mr. Pickett explained that while considering a recent request from a citizen seeking to place a manufactured home on their land, he discovered that the current zoning ordinance no longer permits the placement of a manufactured home in the R-2 (General Residential) zoning district. The past ordinance did allow this use through a Conditional Use Permit. He presented the current Zoning Map to show the affected area and explained that the conditional use request had not

occurred often, citing only two applications during the past zoning ordinance. He pointed to some places in the General Residential Zoning District that already have manufactured homes in place, and other places within the district that are larger, single family home sites where the manufactured homes might be more objectionable. He suggested considering manufactured homes on a case by case basis as a solution to including the use in the R-2 district.

There being no one from the public present to speak, Dr. Porterfield opened the floor for questions.

- Mr. Wilck: Can you do that (case-by-case) indiscriminately or is it better to do it with a Special Use Permit? Mr. Pickett replied that the use of consistent criteria during the decision making process is critical.
- Mr. Mason: Why were the manufactured homes not allowed in the R-2 District in the new ordinance. Mr. Pickett replied that it was most likely an oversight that this was not intentional. The old ordinance allowed manufactured homes through a conditional use permit.
- Dr. Porterfield: Does anyone wanted to consider the condition of requiring a permanent foundation? Tommy Pairet agreed that a permanent foundation should be part of the SUP approval. Dr. Porterfield suggested that instead of "permanent" use "continuous foundation," so that the home would not be on pillars, but on a continuous foundation. Pairet expressed agreement.
- Mr. Coleman: How might a permanent foundation requirement affect someone that is installing a manufactured home as a temporary dwelling while constructing another home on their property? After some general discussion of options, Mr. Pairet pointed out that policing several variables would be difficult. Dr. Porterfield expressed that the cost of removing a permanent foundation should not deter this use. Mr. Coleman expressed concern about the construction waste this would create.

Dr. Porterfield declared the public hearing closed. He then offered a motion to add Manufactured Homes to Section 2-400.3 (B) Special Use Permit in the R2 General Residential District with the conditions of individual units, one home per residential lot, with a continuous permanent foundation

Tommy Pairet seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously (Mr. Jones not present).

#### Planning Commission Recommendation:

Add Manufactured Homes to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance Section 2-400.3 (B) Special Use Permit in the R2 General Residential District with the conditions of (a) individual units, (b) one home per residential lot, with (c) a continuous permanent foundation.

#### Citizen Inquiry:

Mr. Pickett introduced Mr. Dave Furlong. He is interested in opening a manufactured home park somewhere in Prince Edward County, location yet to be determined. Mr. Dave Furlong approached the Planning Commission and introduced himself. He is presently developing multifamily homes on Commerce Rd. He explained his inquiry as due diligence for developing a manufactured home park in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance Section 2-600 "MHP Manufactured Home Park District". He sought general input from the Planning Commission as

to what he should consider as he moves forward with his plan to construct a manufactured home park. There was much discussion and Mr. Furlong was encouraged to look at the more stringent conditional use criteria that was part of a past zoning ordinance as he prepares his proposal. He was provided a copy of the outdated design criteria.

Mr. Jones entered the meeting (following the conclusion of a special called Board of Supervisors meeting).

#### **Information Items:**

#### Sandy River Reservoir Overlay District:

Tentatively, a Public Hearing of Draft 5 is planned for January 20, 2009. A draft will be provided for Planning Commission review by the December 16<sup>th</sup> meeting. Planning Commissioners were asked to submit their review comments of the 4<sup>th</sup> Draft as distributed to them in June to Alecia Daves-Johnson in the Planning Department as soon as possible.

#### Route 15 Commercial Corridor:

Comments are still expected for the first draft. Subsequent drafts will be forthcoming following the County Administrator's and Planner's comments. Mr. Coleman supported the inclusion of Low Impact Development guidelines in the ordinance. February 2009 is the targeted date for the completion of the Corridor Overlay District document, coinciding with the selection of a VDOT contractor for the Route 15 corridor expansion project.



Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

#### Sec. 10-61. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year.

#### Sec. 10-62. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

#### Sec. 10-63. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies.

#### **DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE**



# \chi Sec. 10-70. Prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time from March 1 to August 31. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person, after having been notified by any animal control officer or other officer of the law that the dog is running at large, who is the owner or custodian of the dog thereafter found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.

- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
- (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
- (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
- (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
- (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
- (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-03.1, 18.2-03.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.
- (d) Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such vicious or destructive dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

# Sec. 10-71. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

#### **DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT**

#### Sec. 10-80. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96.

#### Sec. 10-81. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.66 et seq.

I live in Meherrin and have had trouble with a neighbors dogs since day one (6+ years). They get a batch of puppies every year in late spring and never once pen them up.

They constantly come on to our property, run deer, chase our cats and this year have growled at us when we walk our property. During deer season, they are purposely run through our property even though it is posted.

The Animal control officer says there is nothing they can do now because of the 6 month confinement law. The county administrator (Sarah Puckett) says the same thing. Sarah suggested I contact you.

I think it is an absolute outrage that I pay taxes, own the land, post it and yet have no rights when it comes to dogs. When hunting season starts, the trouble gets worse. The clubs again purposely run dogs across our property. The fact is that the non-owners have more rights than the owners.

Dog owners can come on legally posted land at will under the guise of retrieving dogs. They can let dogs roam at will any where any time during the non-confinement period. The land owner can do nothing.

I would like to see a year round confinement law passed. Hunters should use the dogs and collect them after the hunt and return them to the pen. I would really like to see deer hunting with dogs outlawed. There is no longer accessible land to make the practice fair to the land owners who suffer form packs of digs running all over the property.

I am a hunter. I bow hunt, muzzle load hunt and fire arm hunt. I spend months in the woods patterning deer and finding out where to hunt with bow and muzzle loader. The second the dogs start running all my prep work is for nothing. My own land becomes the free for all for anybody. Where is the benefit of ownership and paying taxes?

I respectfully request you consider a year round confinement law and put some teeth into trespass laws to protect the land owners.

Issue: Sesquicentennial Committee

Summary: The Virginia Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War Commission ("the Commission") was created in 2006 by the General Assembly for the purpose of preparing for and commemorating the 150th anniversary of Virginia's participation in the American Civil War. In September 2007, the Commission extended an invitation to each locality in the Commonwealth to form a sesquicentennial committee to aid in the planning for the commemoration period. At the November 14, 2007 Board of Supervisors meeting, the Board agreed to participate in the state's proposed commemoration and designated Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development and Tourism to represent Prince Edward County to the Commission.

In addition to the Commission's response form, which was completed in November 2007, to formally be able to utilize the 150th Commemoration logo and participate in other statewide commemoration activities, the Commission is requesting a formal Resolution by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors indicating the County's participation, establishment of a local committee and supervision of the use of the 150th Anniversary logo. This means that the Prince Edward County Board needs to agree to be locally responsible for the use of the 150th Anniversary logo to assure the integrity of the event or activity being endorsed on behalf of the Commission, to avoid inappropriate use of the logo in unauthorized activities, events or publications.

The already established joint Tourism Advisory Board, with the Town of Farmville, has agreed to function as the local core committee and coordinate community wide events during the sesquicentennial period from 2011 to 2015 such as the Library of Virginia campaign to photograph and scan Civil War relics and documents; joint marketing of special events like the new High Bridge Trail State Park, new Sailor's Creek Visitor Center; completion of the Prospect Depot and trail head; and new Museum of the Confederacy.

Due to a recent realignment in responsibilities in the Economic Development & Tourism Office, the primary contact for tourism-related activities for the County is now delegated to Magi Van Eps, Marketing Assistant for the Office, under the supervision of Sharon Carney, Director. This change will necessitate the Board to appoint Magi as the County's primary contact to the Commission.

Dear Mr. Bartlett:

The Virginia Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War Commission was created during the 2006 Session of the General Assembly for the purpose of planning for and commemorating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Virginia's participation in the American Civil War, the duration of which will be 2011 through 2015.

Virginia leads the nation by being the first state to create a Sesquicentennial Commission and formally begin planning for the commemoration. As you know, the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Civil War holds tremendous educational, economic, and tourism opportunities for the Commonwealth. Not only was Virginia the central focus of the Civil War in the 1860's, but it is still at the center, in terms of what visitors can see and experience today:

- Virginia has, far and away, more Civil War sites than any other state, including over 400 that are linked by the Civil War Trails program. In addition to touring the battlefields, travelers can visit world-class museums, historic homes, cemeteries, Civil War libraries and research centers, and much more.
- 'Heritage tourism' is one of Virginia's biggest resources. Civil War scholars and enthusiasts flock to the Commonwealth from all over the United States. In fact, data from the Virginia Tourism Corporation shows that the Civil War traveler tends to stay longer and spend more money than the average visitor to Virginia.
- The story of Virginia's participation in the war is statewide - there is not a county, city, or town in the Commonwealth that was unaffected by the Civil War. There are hundreds of Civil War-related sites throughout the state that serve to better educate Virginians, and those who travel to Virginia, as to the pivotal role the Commonwealth held in the war. The strength of that geographic dispersal means that visitors do not have to travel to a specific place to experience the history no matter where they are in the state, there is nearby Civil War history to take in.

It would be helpful to the Commission's work if your locality would form a local sesquicentennial committee to begin planning for the four-year statewide commemoration period. Further, please consider designating a liaison to work with the Commission, who would communicate regularly on plans in development and events occurring within the locality. While the Commission is planning statewide

programs to commemorate the sesquicentennial, including traveling exhibitions, strong involvement at the local level is crucial. The Commission is working with statewide partners, including the Civil War Trails program, to promote local participation. Local history, after all, is the foundation on which all else is built.

To every extent possible, the local sesquicentennial committee should include representatives of:

- Office of the chief administrative official
- Governing body (i.e., City Council or Board of Supervisors)
- Tourism industry organizations
- Chamber of Commerce or economic development office
- Education community (e.g., Superintendent, teachers, PTA representatives, etc.)
- Local battlefields and National Park Service personnel
- Civil War museums and facilities
- Public and private nonprofit organizations and agencies engaged in commemorating historical events

Once the local committee designee is named, please forward the enclosed form to Cheryl Jackson, Commission Staff Coordinator. Staff will remain in close contact with the local liaison, providing technical assistance to the committee as needed. Please feel free to contact Ms. Jackson if you have any questions, at (804) 786-3591 or by email: cjackson@leg.state.va.us.

One final note as you begin planning. It is important to realize that this is a commemoration, not a celebration. There is no joy to be found in a war that caused the deaths of over 620,000 Americans, divided families, and tore apart a nation. Commemorative events and activities should be solemn remembrances that are meaningful to, and inclusive of, all Virginians. The Commission is firm in its resolve to portray a balanced story of Virginia's participation in the American Civil War that includes the African-American, Union, and Confederate perspectives.

On behalf of the Virginia Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War Commission, I look forward to working with you and other localities throughout the Commonwealth as we begin planning for the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the American Civil War. The beginning of the commemoration period is fast approaching and promises to provide an opportunity to better understand our past so that we can come together to embrace our future.

The final JLARC report, issued in October 2005, included a number of recommendations for the Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS). One of the JLARC recommendations was that VDSS provide an annual financial statement to each local department, local government, and to the public. The third annual report for state fiscal year 2008 activity was recently completed.

A copy of your locality's financial statement for fiscal year 2008 is enclosed. The statement represents a synopsis of program and administrative costs for the social services provided to your community. The statement also reflects the share of costs paid by federal, state, and local governments.

A state-wide summary is also enclosed to provide a benchmark for reviewing your locality's data. These statements are intended to provide you with a better view of the total social services system as it exists within the Commonwealth.

To produce this report, VDSS gathered locality data from several VDSS systems, as well as from other state agency systems and websites. Every effort is made to ensure the report is as accurate and useful as possible. We welcome any comments you may have that would assist us in refining and improving the report in the future.
