Last year, the Commonwealth Regional Council started setting annual Regional Legislative Priorities to pursue during the session of the General Assembly. The effort was quite successful ... the two top priorities for the Region were funded by the General Assembly. These included \$7.5 million for the High Bridge Trail and \$200,000 for the Commonwealth Regional Council's economic development efforts.

### Commonwealth Regional Council Legislative Priorities

As you know, the Commonwealth Regional Council has initiated a process for establishing <u>regional legislative</u> <u>priorities</u> to be submitted to the Virginia General Assembly for support, adoption and funding. The process is designed to:

Establish a limited list of key projects that will strengthen the economy or well-being of the Commonwealth Region; and,

then seek the collective support of the Region's General Assembly members to pursue passage and required funding of these priorities.

This is an on-going annual effort to have the Region speak with "one voice" during sessions of the General Assembly. Through cooperation, the region can achieve greater success than having each local government go-it-alone!

What is a regional priority? A regional priority is any project which clearly addresses a community need and which will provide substantial regional benefit to more than one community. Once developed, the priority list of key projects should send a message to the General Assembly that the Region is both 1) united in its project needs; and, 2) committed to a realistic, limited and defensible list of projects that will allow the region to grow and prosper for the benefit of all citizens of the Region.

What projects are worthy of consideration? All projects that would have a regional benefit for multiple localities in the six County region (Amelia, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Lunenburg and Prince Edward) are worthy of consideration by the Regional Legislative Priorities Committee.

The Regional Legislative Priorities Committee will consider the beneficial impact that submitted projects will have on the region and the local community. Any government or organization submitting a proposed project for consideration is encouraged to "think big". Projects selected as priorities are generally expected to be large and beyond the funding capabilities of local governments or private fund raising efforts. The priorities are to generally support public purposes such as economic development & tourism, educational opportunities, cultural opportunities, or other public needs.

How do projects receive consideration? Any local government or non-profit citizen's organization may submit proposals for consideration by the Regional Legislative Priorities Committee. Those groups which submit projects are asked to provide the following information to help the Priorities Committee in its evaluation of projects.

- Project Title and Statement of Need or Reason for the Project
- Project Impact (whom will the project serve?)
- Estimated Costs of the Project
- Amount of any Local Funding to Support the Project
- Regional Benefits (what and how will other localities benefit through the implementation of the project?)
- What are other benefits or impacts of the proposed project

Projects must be submitted in writing on the attached submission form to the Regional Legislative Priorities Committee c/o The Commonwealth Regional Council, PO Box P, Farmville, Virginia 23901 by the date specified in the distribution letter attached with this information sheet.

During the last session of the General Assembly the process worked very well. Total funding was approved by the General Assembly to complete the High Bridge Trail State Park and \$200,000 was allocated to help assist with the continuing start-up of the Commonwealth Regional Council's economic development program.

Week of September 8<sup>th</sup> – mail out information letter and appropriate materials

Friday, October 10<sup>th</sup> – all priority proposals due back to CRC Office

Thursday, October 23<sup>rd</sup> — Legislative Priority Committee meets to evaluate proposed priorities and establish Regional Priorities list for 2009 Session of the General Assembly

Week of November 1<sup>st</sup> – Priorities transmitted to Members of General Assembly

### 2009 Priority Legislative Positions for VACo Region 4 Meeting

### March 31, 2008

1. State Funding for Localities – The County of Prince Edward is on the long list of Virginia localities voicing their objections to the cuts in state funding for state mandated programs administered by local governments. We believe that the Commonwealth and the General Assembly cannot continue to cut state funding and yet also continue to block all opportunities for localities to generate new, equitable revenue streams, by means other than increasing local property taxes.

We strongly encourage Virginia localities to not accept the unidentified 4.2% reduction from the state. Instead, we urge all local governments to reimburse the state for your savings share, which will help us all keep the state aid programs at an unreduced level.

2. Transportation Funding – This past month, Prince Edward County held its annual Secondary Six-Year Plan public hearing. Last year's approved plan included only one regular construction project for the reconstruction of 1.3 miles of state secondary road. Between last April and this April, the VDOT estimated cost of this project increased from \$1.9 million to \$4.8 million. Based on our current allocation, it will take us from now until the year 2020 to fund this one regular construction project. So, essentially, our Six-Year Plan is a Twelve-Year Plan for one project.

Also, the County is very concerned about the VDOT policy to <u>always</u> fund federal-aid projects first. This policy has led to a lack of flexibility for localities to direct funds where the "need" exists and to projects the County can afford.

The County of Prince Edward urges the General Assembly to make transportation funding the focus of a 2008 Special Session and provide enhanced and/or new funding strategies for secondary road funding and maintenance.

Our Board does wish to thank the General Assembly for the corrective action it took this year to restore the Revenue Sharing Program to the structure that better serves the needs of smaller local governments.

- Judicial Funding The Board of Supervisors requests that the General Assembly fund the new Judgeship positions that for the past two years have been recommended by the Judicial Council of Virginia, approved by the Senate, and recommended by the House Courts of Justice Committee.
- 4. **Agriculture and Natural Resources** The County of Prince Edward strongly encourages the Virginia General Assembly to invest more state dollars and agency services in the support of living landscapes/production agriculture to ensure a sustainable future where our lands can provide food for our citizens, resource materials for the production of alternative energy (such as bio-diesel and bio-mass), and conservation of natural resources and wildlife habitat through incentives such as conservation easements and Purchase of Development Rights, which also promote long-term protection of the environment of the Commonwealth.

### **Wood to Energy Workshops**

### **Extension Agent Forestry and Natural Resources**

Sustainable...a word we use almost daily, however many do not often understand its meaning and the individual responsibility involved for a landowner. This is especially true when we discover that we can do a better job of efficiently utilizing the waste that we accumulate from our homes to the woods. Sustaining a forest resource in the midst of demands for energy and fuel raises more questions for landowners and local leadership. There will be two workshops offered by Virginia Cooperative Extension this fall in an effort to give research-based answers to these questions regarding maintaining a sustainable forest resource in Southside.

If you are interested in learning more about the latest research findings with regards to the resource availability, then these two-hour programs will satisfy your interest and questions about utilizing wood resources for bioenergy. Guest speakers from the wood products industry and research forest specialists will present an overview of the latest research on what resources we have available, where we are headed, and ultimately changes that will be taking place.



The two workshops are scheduled for <u>September 18 in Farmville</u> at the USDA service center (15 N from route 360 at water tower) <u>AND September 28 in South Boston at the Southern VA Higher Education Center. Both sessions will run from 6:30pm – 8:30pm. 
