Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor Moore asked Reverend Stanley Wesley of the Upper Room Ministry to offer the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Garland Perkins, of Farmville, said he felt there was a potential conflict of interest for a local realtor to be on the Planning Commission.

Jeanette McBride, of Farmville, said she did not think any realtor should be on the Planning Commission due to a conflict of interest.

Gaile McBride, of Farmville, said she was opposed to a realtor serving on the Planning Commission. She said she felt a realtor could benefit from actions taken, and potentially could affect the value of property, which could have a negative impact. She asked the Board to consider the other candidates.

Wyatt Lee Overton, of Farmville, presented a copy of a letter to the Board members and said that in 2006, he had been in contact with Mr. Park regarding the property taxes on the Longwood Real Estate Foundation properties. He stated he contacted the IRS and the Longwood Realty Foundation could not file an exemption as they had no tax exemption number. Mr. Overton said they did get a reduced rate.

Mr. Overton said that in 2002, three amendments were passed during the General Assembly, one of which was changed to allow the local government body handle tax-exempt status rulings instead of the General Assembly. He said the Board of Supervisors had to vote on the exemption, as did the Farmville Town Council.

Mr. Overton said he contacted the Attorney General's office; he was told they would not rule against another government agency. He said he felt the Foundation waited until he retired to again bring the issue before the Board of Supervisors, and that giving the Foundation an exemption was unfair to the people of the county.

Mr. Ward said he was aware the taxing authority lies with the local government. He asked if anyone asked the County about a tax exemption; Chairman Fore said no.

Mr. Ward then asked why the Board received a report and a legal opinion, and said he didn't know why the County was negotiating with the Longwood Real Estate Foundation.

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, said the County met with the Longwood Real Estate Foundation at their request for the purpose of discussing the exempt status of the properties owned by the Foundation.

Chairman Fore said the staff reacted to the request for the Board.

Mr. Ward said he was unaware of the request and inquired as to why the staff would talk to the Foundation and request a legal opinion.

Mr. Ennis said there was a fundamental misunderstanding. He said that Mr. Overton was correct in his interpretation of Section 58.1, as it was amended, puts the determination of tax-exempt status in the hands of local government. He said Section 6 (a) (1) states a tax exemption in any form – since 1870 – for property directly or indirectly owned by the State of Virginia. Mr. Ennis said Longwood Real Estate Foundation questioned if they could claim an exemption.

Mr. Overton said a ruling in the case of The College of William and Mary went into effect under a grandfather clause. Mr. Ennis said William and Mary is a state owned college, not a private university as

in the case of Randolph-Macon College. He said the Attorney General's Opinion 58.1-3657 states a tax exemption was not necessary as it doesn't apply to a university owned by the Commonwealth, as the state cannot be taxed.

After further discussion, Chairman Fore said the Board would need to add this topic to the next meeting agenda for further discussion.

In Re: Public Hearing - Secondary Highways Six-Year Plan

Chairman Fore said in the interest of time, the agenda would be altered. The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on the Secondary Highways Six-Year Plan. He said as was discussed in the Highway Work Session in February, no changes to last year's plan are being proposed due to insufficient funds. He said the latest VDOT *Revised Revenue Forecast* for the County reported even further reductions in secondary road funding, and in FY 09, it was forecast that the County would see an additional \$275,000 reduction in road funding. Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Mr. Mark McKissick, Assistant Resident Engineer, said there have been a few changes, but the numbers have not panned out for the future. He said the funding appears to be reduced 45%-75%, and the outcome is currently tied up in the General Assembly. He said VDOT would spend the funding as it becomes available. He added the Plan is officially a spending plan; if some of the projects receive no funding, no work could be done on them, and they may be dropped from the plan.

Joseph T. Miller, Leigh District, asked if a roadway reverts to the property owner when a roadway which encompasses the personal property line is abandoned. He said he owns property in Lockett District also, on Route 606 near Sandy River Reservoir, where a turnaround near the waterline is not being maintained. He added approximately halfway to the turnaround, a crossover conduit has been blocked for two years, causing the roadway to deteriorate. He said his property value would depreciate if the roads were not kept up. He also asked that a "No Parking" sign be posted at the turnaround.

Mr. McKissick said if the roadway was abandoned, the state may sell the property back to the property owner, and said there are many circumstances depending on how the property came into the possession of the state. He said there is a process in place to determine each case.

After further discussion, Chairman Fore said until funds are secured, the Board of Supervisors could do nothing. Mr. McKissick said VDOT was aiming for June to have the budget finished.

As there were no others wishing to comment, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. McKissick said the Six Year Plan includes ten projects; of those, two might be built in the next six years.

Mr. McKissick reported a contractor has been hired to pave Route 626, Peaks Road. He said if not completed, this would drop to a regular project in a few years. He said the Route 15 parallel project was scheduled to begin in 2011, and the Route 613, Miller Lake Road project was to begin in two weeks. Mr. McKissick said the bridge on West Third Street would be open by June, and several other bridge rehabilitation projects were scheduled. He said the speed limit had been dropped on Route 676, Lake Drive; the Slaydon Forest project was ready to begin; stop sign adjustments had been made in Worsham; and the Hidden Lake Road project was still in negotiation but felt positive that it would be ready in the near future.

Mrs. Gilfillan asked about the status of the safety issue at the southbound entrance of the Lowe's store. Mr. McKissick said the work order had been requested but was unsure of the status.

Mr. Simpson reported a sinkhole on Germantown Road, northbound at the foot of the bridge coming into town.

Mr. Moore asked that a curve on Route 696 be considered for repair; Mr. McKissick said it is to be corrected.

In Re: Public Hearing - School Board Appointments

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on the Prince Edward County School Board Appointments. He said the Citizen Committee Members for District 301 and District 501 have been selected, and this public hearing was being held to hear nominations from the floor to the School Board. He said that the Citizen Committee may have received letters of interest and resumes,

and would collect the nominations for the positions to be appointed in June 2008. Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

Mrs. Shepperson, Chair of the Citizen Committee for District 301, said Mrs. Harriett E. Fentress indicated her interest to continue serving on the School Board. There were no nominations from the floor for the Leigh District.

Chairman Fore said that Mr. Russell Dove, currently serving as Chairman of the School Board, has indicated his interest to continue serving on the School Board. There were no nominations from the floor for the Buffalo District.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Chairman Fore expressed his appreciation to the members of the Citizen Committees and closed the public hearing.

In Re: Public Hearing - Special Use Request, Gregory Scott

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on the Special Use Request made by Gregory Scott, who wishes to operate a mini-storage facility at the intersection of Farmville Road and County Shop Road. The Planning Commission held a public hearing on January 16, 2008 concerning this request and recommended conditional approval. Chairman Fore opened the public hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Mrs. Gilfillan asked what type of buffer would be used. Jonathan L. Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said the buffer is currently hardwood and on a high ridge. Mrs. Gilfillan suggested the wording be changed to specify the buffer must be the current existing natural buffer and must be maintained.

A motion was made by Mr. McKay to recommend approval of the Special Use Request with the following conditions:

- Shielded security lighting, arranged in a manner as not to affect adjoining properties
- Entrance from County Shop Road only
- Current existing natural buffer to be maintained along Farmville Road
- Signage not to exceed 4' by 8' dimensions

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

IN RECOGNITION OF PAMPLIN VOLUNTEER FIRE & EMS

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, wishes to enable the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) of the Pamplin Volunteer Fire & EMS to provide both non-ground transport (First Responder) and ground transport to all the Basic Life Support (BLS) and Advance Life Support (ALS) levels, with the ability to bill for services within a time frame that has not yet been established; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, acknowledges the compelling need for both non-ground and ground transport at the BLS and ALS levels to serve the Pamplin region to include areas in the County of Prince Edward; and

WHEREAS, by enabling the formation and operation of an EMS non-ground and ground transport at the BLS & ALS levels, capability can be established and can be operational immediately;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, through the adoption of this resolution recognizes that the operation of an Emergency Medical Service with both non-ground transport and ground transport at the Basic Life Support and Advanced Life Support levels will be established as an agency under the Pamplin Volunteer Fire & EMS Department and as an EMS agency to be operated within the County of Prince Edward.

In Re: Route 15 South Corridor Development Planning

Jonathan L. Pickett advised the Board that the Planning Department would like to take a proactive approach to planning for the development of the growth corridors identified in the Prince Edward
County Comprehensive Plan. A Corridor Plan is necessary to implement specific regulations concerning
the preservation of valuable historic, civic and environmental features and provide for desirable, attractive
growth and development. He said due to the plans by VDOT to widen the Route 15 corridor south of
Farmville, the need for the development plan for the future has increased, as it may stimulate accelerated
commercialization of this corridor. A Corridor Plan would ensure that adequate controls provide for
efficient use of the land, controlled aesthetics for signs, landscaping and light pollution, and allow for
proper design of controlled entrances to maintain a smooth flow of traffic and high level of service capacity
on the travel corridor. He added that under the current zoning ordinance, the County does have some
control.

Mr. Pickett asked the Board to review the proposed Commercial Corridor Plan - Initial Components and the Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan, Chapter VI, Special Policy Areas, Policy

Area: Corridor Development, and then schedule a work session in late April or May with the Planning Commission at their convenience.

In Re: County Attorney's Report

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, reported first on the status of the Boundary Adjustment Requests from the Town of Farmville. He said the plat of The Woodlands consisting of 13.95 acres was incorrect; the Town's attorney inadvertently included a parcel that was not in the request. He said he was awaiting word if the individual had been contacted.

Mr. Ennis reported the Coyote Bounty Ordinance currently set an annual maximum budget fund of \$2,500 per calendar year. He said an amendment is requested to change the wording to "\$2,500 per fiscal year."

SECTION 10-16 KILLING OF COYOTES PERMITTED, BOUNTY ESTABLISHED; PROCEDURES FOR CLAIMS

- (a) The killing of coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The Board of Supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.
- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total dollar amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per calendar FISCAL year, except by additional appropriate by the Board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under the ordinance, which act shall constitute a class one misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,500.00 and/or confinement in jail for a period not to exceed one year.

Mr. Ennis said concerns regarding filing deadlines and extensions in the Land Use Ordinance had been raised, and in comparing to other jurisdictions, found it appeared to be deficient. He said a new ordinance had been drafted for Board review. He said the current one had been adopted in 1974, and gave examples of options available to the Board.

REVISED SPECIAL ASSESSMENT FOR LAND PRESERVATION ORDINANCE

SECTION 70-31 FINDINGS OF FACT

The board of supervisors finds that the preservation of real estate devoted to agricultural and horticultural uses within the county is in the public interest and, having heretofore adopted a land use plan, ordains that such real estate shall be taxed in accordance with the provisions of §58.1-3230 et. seq. of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and of this article.

SECTION 70-32 APPLICATION FOR CLASSIFICATION; DEADLINE

- (a) The owner of any real estate meeting the criteria set forth in §58.1-3230 and 58.1-3233 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, may, on or before November 1, apply to the Commissioner of the Revenue for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property for the next succeeding tax year on the basis of its ue, under procedures set forth in §58.1-3236 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.
- (b) In any year in which a general reassessment is being made, the property owner may submit such application until thirty (30) days have elapsed after the notice of increase in assessment is mailed in accordance with §58.1-3330 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, or sixty (60) days preceding the tax year, whichever is later.
- (c) Such application may be filed any time within such sixty (60) day period immediately preceding the beginning of the next tax year in which such assessment is sought upon the payment of a late filing fee as provided in this article.
- (d) Such application shall be on forms provided by the State Department of Taxation and supplied by the Commissioner of the Revenue and shall include such additional information, including but not limited to schedules, photographs, soil maps, geological surveys, soil conservation plans and the like as may be required by the Commissioner of the Revenue and available to the applicant.
- (e) A separate application shall be filed for each parcel on the land book.
- (f) Each owner of real estate having been previously approved for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property must file annually with the Commissioner of the Revenue a revalidation application on forms provided, by November 1. A timely file revalidation application shall not require a fee. A revalidation application filed after November 1, shall be assessed a late filing fee. A revalidation fee equal to the fee required with the filing of an initial application shall be required every year.
- (g) An application shall be submitted whenever the use or acreage of such land previously approved changes.

SECTION 70-33 DETERMINATION OF USE VALUE BY COMMISSIONER OF THE REVENUE

(a) Promptly upon receipt of any application, the Commissioner of the Revenue shall determine whether the subject property meets the criteria for taxation hereunder. If the Commissioner of the Revenue determines that the subject property does not meet such criteria, he or she shall determine the value of such property for its qualifying use as well as its fair market value.

- (b) In determining whether the subject property meets the criteria for "agricultural use" or "horticultural use" the Commissioner of the Revenue may request an opinion from the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Upon refusal of the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services to issue an opinion, or in the event of an unfavorable opinion which does not comport with the standards set forth by the Commissioner, the party aggrieved may seek relief from the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County. If the Court finds in his or her favor, the Court may issue an order which shall serve in lieu of an opinion for the purposes of this article.
- (c) In valuing qualifying real estate for purposes of taxation the Commissioner of the Revenue shall consider only thos indicia of value which such estate has for agricultural or horticultural use. In addition to the use of his or her personal knowledge, judgment and experience as to value of real estate in agricultural or horticultural use, he or she shall, in arriving at the value of such land, consider available evidence of agricultural or horticultural capability; and the recommendations of value of such real estate as made by the state land evaluation advisory committee.
- (d) In determining the total area of real estate actively devoted to agricultural or horticultural use, there shall be included in the ara of all real estate under barns, sheds, silos, cribs, greenhouses, lakes, dams, ponds, streams, irrigation ditches and like facilities, but real estate under and such additional real estate as may be actually used in connection with the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use shall be excluded in determining such total area.
- (e) All structures which are located on real estate in agricultural or horticultural use and the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use and the real estate on which farmhouse or home or such other structure is located, together with the additional real estate use in connection therewith, shall be valued, assessed and taxed by the same standards, methods and procedures as other taxable structures and other real estate in the County.

SECTION 70-34 USE VALUE AND FAIR MARKET VALUE PLACED ON LAND BOOK

The use value and fair market value of any qualifying property under this article shall be placed on the land book before delivery to the treasurer, and the tax for the next succeeding tax year shall be extended for the use value. Such use value shall be reassessed from time to time in accordance with the policies and recommendations of the state land evaluation advisory council, and to comport with more accurate information as it becomes available regarding each piece of land.

SECTION 70-35 ROLL BACK TAX

- (a) There is hereby imposed a roll-back tax and interest thereon, in such amounts as may be determined under §58.1-3237 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, upon any property as to which the use changes to a non-qualifying use under this article.
- (b) The owner of any real estate liable for roll-back taxes shall report to the Commissioner of the Revenue, on forms to be prescribed, any change in the use of such property to a non-qualifying use and shall pay the roll-back tax then due. On failure to report and pay within sixty (60) days following such change in use, such owner shall be liable for an additional penalty equal to ten (10) percent of the amount of the roll-back tax and interest, which penalty shall be collected as a part of the tax. In addition to such penalty, there is imposed interest on the amount of roll back tax, interest and penalty, at the same interest rate applicable to delinquent taxes in the county for each month or fraction thereof during which the failure continues.

SECTION 70-36 MISSTATEMENT ON APPLICATION

Any person making a material misstatement of fact in any application filed pursuant to this article shall be liable for all taxes, in such amounts and at such times as if such property has been assessed on the basis of fair market value as applied to other real estate in the County, together with interest and penalties thereon, and the owner shall further be assessed with an additional penalty of one hundred (100) percent of such unpaid taxes.

SECTION 70-37 APPLICATION FEES

- (a) A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per parcel shall be required for each application.
- (b) An additional fee of \$____ shall be required for each application filed after the filing deadline.

SECTION 70-38 APPLICABILITY OF STATE LAW

The provisions of the Code of Virginia, Title 58.1, applicable to local levies and real estate assessment and taxation shall be applicable to assessments and taxation under this article, including without limitation, provisions relating to tax liens and the correction of erroneous assessments; and for such purposes the roll back taxes shall be considered to be deferred real estate taxes.

Mr. Ennis reported the Noise Ordinance Committee had prepared a draft of a noise ordinance for review by the Board. He said a limit could be placed on the enforceable hours, and certain sanctioned activities could be exempt.

SECTION 46-31 ENUMERATION OF LOUD AND DISTURBING NOISES

It shall be unlawful for any person to create, cause to be created or allow on property under the person's control or ownership any unreasonably loud or disturbing noise in the county. Noise of such character, intensity or duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any person or as to unreasonably disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person, is hereby prohibited. For purposes of this article, a tenant shall be deemed to be in control of the property contained within his or her tenancy.

The following acts shall be deemed to be loud and disturbing noise in violation of this article, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

HORN OR SIGNALING DEVICES: The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus or other vehicle except as a reasonable warning; the creation by means of any such signal device of any unreasonable loud or harsh sound; and the sounding of such device for any unreasonable period of time.

TELEVISIONS, RADIOS, COMPACT DISC PLAYERS, OR MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS: The playing of any television, radio, record, tape or compact disc player, MP3 player, digital audio player or other electrical device or any musical instrument in such a manner or with such a volume,

- (a) to permit sound to be heard across a residential real property boundary or through partitions common to two dwellings within a building;
- (b) to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet the building in which it is located;
- (c) the sound is plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from its source.

ANIMALS: The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person in the vicinity to such an extent as shall constitute a nuisance.

VEHICLES: The use of any automobile, motorcycle or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud, grating, grinding, rattling or other noises. Repairing, rebuilding, or modifying any motor vehicle or other mechanical device in the outdoors between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day. Operation of sound amplifying equipment in a motor vehicle at a volume sufficient to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the vehicle.

EXHAUSTS: The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud and explosive noises therefrom.

LOADING, UNLOADING AND OPENING BOXES: The creation of loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates and containers.

LOADING, UNLOADING TRUCKS: The loading or unloading of trucks in the outdoors within one hundred (100) yards of a residence between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day.

CONSTRUCTION: The erection, including excavation, demolition, alteration, or repairs of any building or improvement that creates noise that can be heard at adjoining property lines from sunset until 6:00 a.m. the following day except in the case of an emergency.

SECTION 46-32 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

A violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute a Class 3 misdemeanor. Each separate act on part of the person violating this article shall be deemed a separate offense, and each day a violation is permitted to continue unabated shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 46-33 COMPLAINT REQUIRED

No summons or warrant charging a violation of this article shall be issued except upon the sworn complaint of two (2) persons, each a resident of a separate household, and each alleging facts

within his or her own personal knowledge, or upon complaint by a law enforcement or animal control officer.

SECTION 46-34 EXEMPTIONS

Nothing in this chapter shall apply to law enforcement, ambulances, or other emergency behicles and personnel, aircraft or any noise or sound created thereby or to any noise or sound crated by any person to sound a warning or call attention to a bona fide emergency.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to the following:

- 1. Music, bells or chimes that are part of a bona fide religious service, observation or other such religious event.
- 2. Bona Fide agricultural activity.
- 3. Sound generated from a school or county sponsored athletic or recreational event.
- 4. Locomotives and other railroad equipment.
- 5. Lawful discharge of firearms.
- 6. Military activities of the Commonwealth or of the United States of America.
- 7. Activities sanctioned by a college or university which take place within the confines of the main campus of such college or university.
- 8. Dances or concerts conducted for the benefit of any benevolent, charitable or educational organization.

In Re: Emergency Food and Shelter Board Appointment

Chairman Fore said Prince Edward County was chosen to receive \$9,397.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in Prince Edward County. The selection was made by a National Board that was chaired by the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from the Salvation Army, American Red Cross, Council of Jewish Federations, Catholic Charities, USA National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and the United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-needed areas around the country.

A local Board made up of a member of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors, United Way of Prince Edward, Farmville Ministerial Association, Catholic Charities, Salvation Army, Farmville Area Community Emergency Services (FACES), St. Theresa's Food Pantry, Senior Citizens of Prince Edward/Meals on Wheels, a former homeless person, and individual(s)/concerned community citizens will determine how the award to Prince Edward County is to be distributed among the Emergency Food and Shelter programs run by local service organizations.

Chairman Fore asked for a member to serve on the local Board; Mr. Moore agreed and was appointed to serve on the Board.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order, stating that its purpose was to hear budget presentations from the EMS and Fire Departments for the 2008-09 fiscal year.

In Re: Fire and Rescue Donation Requests

The Prince Edward County Rescue Squad President Bill Hogan reviewed a call summary, usage and frequency of calls, adding that Saturdays were the busiest day of the week. He added they responded to 2,274 calls in 2007. Mr. Hogan said during the past year, the squad contacted Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney College to discuss safety and obtained donations for the purchase of a Mass Casualty Trailer due to the shootings at Virginia Tech and other schools. He said the trailer will serve up to 100 patients, and costs approximately \$14,000 without equipment; the equipment would cost between \$10,000 and \$12,000. He expected the trailer to be in service within the month. He said the squad is also looking to purchase a 6-wheeler and cot unit for patient transport on the Rails to Trails hiking trail. He said they are applying for grants to help cover the \$15,500 cost.

Nancy Haga stated the squad would be celebrating its 40th anniversary in service in January 2009, and are planning a few events. She said the Prince Edward County Rescue Squad is also in need of new stretchers with a larger weight capacity as many of the residents are overweight. She said they are looking at stretchers with a lift, each with a cost of \$10,000, and the squad would require six stretchers. She added they are applying for grants to help with the cost of the stretchers.

Mr. Simpson asked if the Prince Edward County Rescue Squad is currently licensed with the Office of Emergency Medical Services, and if they would provide a copy of the license to the County Administrator's office. Mr. Hogan said they were, and would submit a copy of the license.

The Prince Edward Area Firefighters Association Chief Ralph Crawley stated the Association is requesting a 10% increase in funding due to increased costs of fuel, equipment, and trucks. He said the Association located a 1986 Chevrolet van fully equipped as an air truck, with a generator and air compressor, for \$69,900. He asked the Board to consider funding \$59,900 and the Association would provide \$10,000 towards the purchase. He added a new air truck would cost approximately \$240,000. Mr. Crawley stated if purchased, the air truck would be rotated to the various departments and centralized near Hampden-Sydney.

Howard Campbell, of the **Prospect Volunteer Fire Department**, requested a 10% increase for operations and 100% increase for equipment. He said on February 12, 2008, there had been ten different calls, four of which were simultaneous. He added all of the department's equipment was out and in service at the same time. Mr. Simpson asked if the department had any First Response Units; Mr. Campbell said not at this time, but the Department did have four members attending EMT classes.

The Hampden-Sydney Volunteer Fire Department Chief Ralph Crawley requested an increase of 10% for operations and 100% increase for equipment. In response to Mr. Simpson's inquiry, he said the Department has a First Responder unit and it is licensed, and they would provide a copy to the County Administrator's office.

The Darlington Heights Volunteer Fire Department Chief Dallas Tinsley requested an increase of 10% for operations and 100% increase for equipment. He said the costs of trucks, equipment and fuel has gone up substantially; he reported the cost of fuel to respond to the 12 calls received on February 12, 2008, was \$334.76. He said that same call-usage at the current fuel prices would cost \$371.44. He added

that the pumper trucks owned by the department are well beyond the NFPA 1500, the standard for first-out pumper replacement or complete refurbish every 20 years; pumper trucks now cost over \$300,000. Chief Tinsley said the new building should be completely paid for in two years, and they have expanded the Emergency Shelter to include cooking facilities and showers. He added the Department has no First Responder Units, but does have five EMTs. He said they are in the process of obtaining licenses.

The Meherrin Volunteer Fire Department Chief Frank Adkins requested an increase of 10% for operations and 100% increase for equipment. He asked the Board for their support in the purchase of the air van. In response to Mr. Simpson's inquiry, he said the Department is licensed and will provide a copy to the Administrator's office to keep on file.

The Pamplin Volunteer Fire Department Chief Dalton Elder requested Board support for the purchase of the air van. He said the Department works closely with the First Responder Transport, and since the new ambulance went into service, there have been eight calls. In response to Mr. Simpson's inquiry, he said they are licensed to do transport and will provide a copy to the County Administrator's office. He added the Department requested an increase of 10% for operations and 100% for equipment.

Dalton Elder said that as the **Pamplin Volunteer EMS** is just starting up, they are unsure of costs, and are requesting \$10,000 for FY 2008-2009.

The Rice First Responder Unit requested \$7,500 for FY 2008-2009. The unit is not licensed and is currently looking to find a physician for the unit.

Mr. Moore expressed his appreciation to the men and women involved in the volunteer fire departments and EMS units. He said that if the County had to pay for these services, the County would have a large debt.

The Holiday Lake 4-H Education Center President and CEO Preston Wilson said the Center was built in the 1930s initially to land Navy planes. He said during construction, they found a cemetery which halted construction; the land was turned over to the state. He said the Center applied for 501-C3 non-profit status, and in 1976 took on their current name. He said the 157.8 acres is leased from the Virginia Department of Forestry; the 99 year lease will expire in 2080. Mr. Wilson said the educational programs offered are for youth and adults, in an attempt to balance the technology of today with nature. He said that 21 cabin roofs had been re-shingled last year. Mr. Wilson said 17 counties and cities are being

asked to contribute \$10,000 to an endowment fund to enable the Center to use the earnings for upkeep and

repair of the Center. He added this is a one-time request.

Brian Branch, Center Director, said over 1,200 youth from Prince Edward County attended the

district camps over the past ten years. He said that over the last two years, grants have enabled 980 Prince

Edward County 3rd to 8th grade students the opportunity to attend natural resource education programs. He

added the programs catered to the lead teachers' needs.

Mr. Moore left the meeting at this time.

In Re: Longwood University Real Estate Foundation

Mr. James Ennis, County Attorney, said his opinion regarding the Longwood University Real

Estate Foundation stood as presented at the regular monthly meeting held on March 8, 2008. He said he

contacted Mr. H. Keith Mawyer, Property Tax Manager with the Department of Taxation of the

Commonwealth of Virginia, and requested any and all correspondence wherein any factual situation was

related upon which he relied in issuing his letter regarding the tax exempt status of the Longwood

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University Real Estate Foundation. Mr. Ennis said that Mr. Wyatt L. Overton, then Commissioner of the Revenue, had specified Mr. Mawyer's opinion regarding only Virginia Code Section 58.1-3651, and that the reply was based solely on that particular section. It was not based on all the facts and in turn was not accurate. Mr. Ennis said another Code Section was not addressed, which was Virginia Code Section 58.1-3606 which states,

- "A. Pursuant to the authority granted in Article X, Section 6 (a) (6) of the Constitution of Virginia to exempt property from taxation by classification, the following classes of real and personal property shall be exempt from taxation:
- 1. Property owned directly or indirectly by the Commonwealth, or any political subdivision thereof.

Mr. Ennis said he provided to the Board an opinion from the Attorney General of Virginia, along with a copy of a case from the Supreme Court of Virginia, which is Citizens Foundation of the Richmond Professional Institute, Inc. vs. the City of Richmond. He gave a brief case history. Mr. Ennis said the final ruling stated, "Though bare legal title to property may rest in someone else, if the beneficial interest therein is vested in a public corporation created, managed and controlled by the State, then that property must be said to be owned indirectly by the Commonwealth." He said the case has not been distinguished by the Court since it was rendered in 1966; it has not been overturned, it is the law of the land, and on the basis of the Attorney General's opinion and the basis of the Supreme Court of Virginia that his opinion that the Longwood University Real Estate Foundation, which is controlled by Longwood University, is an entity created for the benefit of the University to manage property; it is indirectly owned by the Commonwealth of Virginia and not subject to local taxation. He said it is what is known as a self-executing exemption because it is specified in the Constitution of Virginia; there is no enabling legislation required to put it into effect as there would be under the Code Section recited in the letter from the Department of Taxation, which would require not only this body to pass an ordinance, but would also require a public hearing before the ordinance was passed.

Mr. Ennis said that more than one type of exemption was available, and that this Code Section is most frequently used by private entities that have a charitable or educational purpose to seek tax exemption, not entities that are extensions of the Commonwealth. He said that it is his opinion that the County cannot collect taxes with the exception of "by agreement with the University." He added Longwood University is cognizant of the impact of the loss of revenue on the County. He said the Longwood University Real Estate Foundation has agreed to evaluate each property annually and agrees to be taxed on each property not central to the mission of the University. Mr. Ennis said the Foundation has agreed in principle, and has voluntarily paid taxes on properties not central to the mission of the University in the past.

Beverly M. Booth, Commissioner of the Revenue, said the Longwood College Foundation had never been taxed, and is a different name from the Longwood University Foundation. Mr. Ennis said the Longwood University Real Estate Foundation is another entity and has a narrow function; it allows property acquisition when the opportunity arises without having to change the University's Master Plan.

Mr. Ward said he was concerned as to why the issue was not brought before the Board. He said he expected the Longwood University Real Estate Foundation to approach the Board, and instead learned that negotiations were going on with the staff.

Mr. Ennis said there was no ability to contest the issue, and no negotiations were going on. He said the Foundation's attorney first contacted the County in November 2007, because the proposed taxes on the \$20 million assessment were significantly greater than expected. Mr. Ennis said there may be other options available to lessen the impact; there are instances where universities voluntarily pay sums of money to the governing body for services in lieu of taxes, and which properties could be argued that shouldn't be exempt due to not being central to the mission of the college, and gave examples from the Randolph-Macon College case.

Mr. Ennis said that all three properties in question are used for housing for the students attending the University. He said it was more economical to purchase those than to build a dormitory; the current high-rise dormitory units need renovation at a cost of approximately \$50 million. He added he expects the Longwood University Real Estate Foundation will purchase more property as the University anticipates an increase of approximately 1,500 students over the next ten years.

Chairman Fore said that he felt the Board should accept Mr. Ennis' opinion on this matter, and

through the Commissioner of the Revenue's office, work out what is or isn't taxable and central to the

mission of the University, and then the Board could meet with the Longwood University Real Estate

Foundation.

Sally W. Gilfillan recused herself from the meeting at this time.

Beverly M. Booth said that over \$216,000 would be lost due to exemption for the three properties,

and a determination would be made by the Commissioner of the Revenue's office; following a review of

properties not central to the mission of the University may be taxed.

Chairman Fore said once the properties are identified by the Commissioner of the Revenue's

office, the Board would like the staff to pursue a written understanding, updated annually, similar to the

agreement between the University of Virginia and the City of Charlottesville and Albemarle County. A

brief discussion followed.

Mr. Bartlett said there may be discrepancies in the Budget Request booklet between revenues,

expenses and a balance sheet with net income. He said he based the information on IRS Form 990 from the

Internal Revenue website for each organization requesting donations from the Board. He has the report and

all are welcome to come and review the lengthy document.

Mrs. Sarah E. Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said she telephoned Mr. Ralph Crawley

and he expressed his sincere appreciation for the Board's prompt attention to the purchase of the air van on

behalf of the Prince Edward County Firefighters Association.

Summary: The Board will be holding a public hearing on the request of John Janson and Kanak Amin to rezone from R-2, General Residential, to C-1, General Commercial, that portion of the property of Earl and Janice Fariss presently zoned R-2. The purpose of this request is to allow for the construction of a Holiday Inn Express on the property. The county planning commission held a public hearing on the request on March 18, 2008 at which several residents of the Crestview Subdivision spoke in opposition. The planning commission voted to recommend approval of the request, but in order to address some of the citizens concerns recommended the applicant proffer the following conditions:

1) The rezoned property be used only for a motel or hotel.

- 2) A Type C buffer as described in the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance be provided. This requires a 15' buffer of one row of large evergreen trees and one row of small evergreen trees.
- 3) A walking trail be placed around the perimeter of the property for use by guests and the neighborhood.
- 4) Any elevated signage be placed on the town portion of the property, adjacent to South Main Street. Any signage on the county portion of the property be monument style.
- 5) Lighting on the property be shielded and inward focused, so as to minimize the impact on adjoining properties.
- 6) The dumpster location be positioned, and collection service hours be set, so as to minimize noise disturbance.

Project Impact Report and Staff Recommendation

Location

The site is located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Peery Drive and Williams Street. This site is immediately south of the Crestview Subdivision, adjacent to the Town of Farmville Corporate Limits, and located in Election District 701.

Proposed Uses

The applicants are seeking permission to construct an 83 room Holiday Inn Express, with construction set to begin later this year.

Comprehensive Plan

Arguments both for and against this proposal can be cited from the county's comprehensive plan. These are as follows:

Arguments For:

- 1) Project is within the county's commercial growth corridor (pages 70 & 73);
- 2) Access to South Main Street will be from existing access point (page 64, recommendation 2);
- 3) Conditional zoning can be used to mitigate impact on existing residential neighborhoods (page 85, objective 3, strategies 2 & 3);
- 4) Increases tax base and creates jobs (page 75, objective 2);
- 5) Public utilities available (page 75, objective 2, strategy 2).

Arguments Against:

- 1) Protect existing residential neighborhoods from commercial and industrial areas (page 81, objective 4);
- 2) Protect the integrity of existing neighborhoods (page 85, objective 3);
- 3) Traffic impact on existing roads (page 87, objective 1, strategy 2).

Zoning and Existing Land Use

The property is presently split into two zoning districts. The front 300' of the property is zoned General Commercial and the remainder of the property is zoned General Residential. This rezoning request covers the residentially zoned portion of the property, which contains one single-family dwelling.

Impact on Adjacent Properties

The four properties located on Williams Street, across from the project, will be the most impacted, mainly from a noise and lighting standpoint, although some increase in traffic will also occur. Noise will be greatest during the construction process, and then will be mainly from vehicle traffic after the facility opens. Lighting impacts would come from the outdoor lighting in the parking areas, as well as headlights from vehicles. Presently, only a narrow row of trees is located between the Williams Street properties and the Fariss property. Additional buffering is proposed by the applicant, and would be required by the county if the project is approved. Properties to the south and west already have significant natural buffers, however additional vegetative buffering is proposed by the applicant in these areas as well.

Traffic impacts are addressed later in the Roads / Road Access section of the report.

Utilities

The site will have access to both public water and sewer provided by the Town of Farmville. Based on Virginia Department of Health Statistics, the facility is estimated to produce an average daily usage of 10,790 gallons, which will have a minimal impact on the town system.

Soils and Flood Plain

According to soils maps, the predominant soil type in this area is Wilkes. This soil type is not conducive to septic system, but the hotel will be served by public sewer so this is not a concern. The property is not located within the 100-year floodplain.

Roads / Road Access

The hotel will use the same access to public streets as the existing single family residence. An existing 30' right-of-way exists at the front of the property. Traffic from the hotel will exit onto Williams Street to access South Main Street. Improvements will be made to the existing access point, but no additional access points off Williams Street are proposed.

The majority of traffic is likely to exit Williams Street at the South Main Street signal, although some traffic may also use Peery Drive to access the Wal-Mart area. Actual traffic projections are somewhat difficult to project, as much depends on occupancy rate, time of year, or day of week. Information gathered from the Institute of Transportation Engineers projected a peak weekday morning rate of .74 vehicle trips per room. If this hotel was full (83 rooms) that would equate to 60 vehicles during the peach hour or approximately one per minute. Currently in Farmville, the weekends tend to have the highest occupancy, due to college events. Traffic studies on weekends have been very limited (3 studies) but had a rate of 10.50 vehicle trips per room on a Saturday. This would seem to be a worst-case scenario, but at full capacity would produce 871 trips. However, as stated above, the majority of these vehicles would exit the area at the Williams Street / South Main Street signal, thus having little effect on the adjacent residential area. The Town of Farmville conducted a traffic count on Peery Drive, from 7:30 p.m. on Friday, March 14th until 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, March 15th. During this 24-hour eperiod, a total of 4,245 vehicles used the section of Peery Dive adjacent to Crestview. The staff grants that traffic is an issue for Peery Drive, but still is of the opinion the project in question will have minimal impacts on Peery Drive itself.

Emergency Services

The proposed hotel is located 2.7 miles from the Farmville Fire Department, and 3.4 miles from the Prince Edward Rescue Squad. The request is not expected to have any significant impact on emergency services. The project is easily accessible from South Main Street; and public water will be available to assist in any fire-fighting efforts.

Schools

This project will have no impact on schools.

Considerations

1) Impact on Adjacent Properties

As mentioned previously, the most affected properties will be the four located on Williams Street, directly across from the project site. While some increase in traffic on Peery Drive can be expected, the buffer issue is the staff's most serious concern.

2) Conditional Zoning

The county's recently adopted zoning ordinance gives the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors much more control over rezoning requests. In the past, an applicant could have asked for a rezoning to Commercial and put up anything that was allowed under the commercial zoning classification. The conditional zoning now in effect allows the county to approve a rezoning, but have the ability to control what is going to be built. In this case, the applicant can proffer that a hotel will be built and the county can hold the applicant accountable to that particular use.

3) Design Standards in Zoning Ordinance

The county's new zoning ordinance requires buffering between different zoning classifications. In this case, an acceptable buffer is proposed by the applicant. In any case, a buffer must be provided in accordance with Section 4-200. Should the project be approved, a final site plan must be approved in accordance with Section 4-100 of the zoning ordinance. The revised ordinance gives county staff a more effective tool in ensuring developments are of a higher quality then might have been required under the previous ordinance.

4) Economic Impact

The project will have a positive economic impact on the community, both from an employment and tax revenue standpoint. The facility is expected to employ 20 to 25 individuals in the administrative, maintenance and housekeeping professions. The tax revenue increase will be significant as compared to the taxes presently obtained for the Fariss property. Comparison of the present value of this property, as well as three neighboring motel properties, are shown below, along with Holiday Inn Express properties in South Hill and South Boston.

In addition, revenue would also come from sales, personal property and lodging taxes.

5) Public Comments

The Prince Edward County Planning Commission held a public hearing on March 18, 2008. At the hearing six residents of the Crestview Subdivision spoke against the rezoning, citing concerns about traffic, light and noise. The residents also cited the continued commercial encroachment into their neighborhood, which they have stated opposition to for many years. Specific instances have been, the residents opposition to mini-storage and townhouse developments in the past, as well as their opposition to the 300' strip of commercial zoning along the Route 15 corridor.

6) Planning Commission Recommendations

At the March 18, 2008 meeting, the Planning Commission, on a 6 – 1 vote, recommended approval of the rezoning request, with the recommendation the applicant offer the following proffers:

- 1) The rezoned property be used only for a motel or hotel.
- 2) A Type C buffer, as described in the Prince Edward County Zoning Oridnance, be provided. This requires (a 15' buffer of) one row of large evergreen trees and one row of small evergreen trees.
- 3) A walking path be placed around the perimeter of the property for use by guests and the neighborhood.
- 4) Any elevated signage be placed on the town portion of the property, adjacent to South Main Street. Any signage on the county portion of the property to be monument style.
- 5) Lighting on the property be shielded and focused inward, so as to minimize the impact on adjoining properties.
- 6) The dumpster location be positioned, and collection service hours be set, so as to minimize noise disturbance.

Staff Recommendations

The staff recommends approval of this request. Staff agrees for the most part with the planning commission with one addition and one deletion to the commission's recommended list of proffers.

Addition

Any widening of the property entrance on Williams Street take place towards South Main Street and not back towards Crestview.

Deletion

The walking path requirement is not in keeping with the proffer guidelines of the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance, which states, "a proffer must reasonably relate to the rezoning". This proffer is a nice suggestion, but does not lessen the physical impact of the development on the adjoining properties.

In summary, staff recommends the applicant consider offering the following proffers:

1) Property will be used for a hotel as stated in the rezoning application.

- 2) A Type C buffer, as described in the Prince Edward County Zoning Oridnance, be provided. This requires (a 15' buffer of) one row of large evergreen trees and one row of small evergreen trees.
- 3) Any widening of the access point onto Williams Street be done towards Main Street and not back towards the Crestview neighborhood.
- 4) Any elevated signage be placed on the town portion of the Fariss property. Any signage on the county portion should be of monument style.
- 5) All exterior lighting be shielded and downward focused to minimize the light intrusion on neighboring properties.
- 6) The dumpster location be positioned, and collection service hours be set, so as to minimize noise disturbance.

If approved, this request will bring all of the Fariss property under the C-1 (General Commercial) classification. Over the last several years, it has become increasingly apparent that this is prime commercial property, based on the prices being offered for the purchase of the land. This particular request proposes a Holiday Inn Express, which gives staff the added confidence this will be a quality project. While I am sure the residents of Crestview would like to see this property maintained in its current state, the development patterns along the South Main Street corridor argue for this property being zoned commercial. It is the intent of staff to work with the applicant to ensure this project is a good neighbor and that its affects on the neighbors are held to a minimum.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by William Porterfield. The stated purpose for the meeting was to conduct a Public Hearing for a Re-zoning Application submitted by John M. Janson & Kanak Amin as described below.

Dr. Porterfield welcomed Mr. James "Jim" Wilck to the Planning Commission. Mr. Wilck provided a brief introduction.

The first order of business was review of the February 19, 2008 minutes.

Minutes:

The minutes of the February 19, 2008 meeting were reviewed. Mr. Coleman moved to approve for file without change.

PUBLIC HEARING:

Chairman Porterfield called for the Public Hearing concerning the Re-zoning Application submitted by John M. Janson & Kanak Amin, to rezone from the General Residential (R-2) to General Commercial (C-1) that portion of the property of Earl & Janice Fariss, presently zoned R-2. This property is further described as tax map # 037 - A - 47, containing 5.84 acres, and is located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Williams Street and Perry Drive; immediately south of the Crestview Subdivision. The purpose of this Re-zoning is to allow for the construction of a motel/hotel on the Fariss property.

A Planning Department Staff Report was provided to the Planning Commission from Jonathan Pickett by letter dated March 14, 2008. Planning Department staff placed the preliminary site plan and a current zoning map indicating the proposed changes on display.

John Janson, the applicant, discussed a preliminary site-plan packet that had previously been mailed to the Commissioners, and provided an overview of why he submitted the zoning change application. He discussed the general plans for the construction of a Holiday Inn Express at the site.

Public input:

Six citizens, residents of the Crestview subdivision, spoke to the Planning Commission. Each of the six spoke against approval of the zoning application. Two of the speakers requested that the Prince Edward County Planning Commission and the Town of Farmville Planning Commission hold a joint meeting to evaluate the traffic concerns and build-out potential associated with recently issued land-use change permits. These citizens requested a community work session with both Commissions and requested a traffic impact analysis.

Staff Report:

Mr. Pickett presented data from a traffic count that the Town of Farmville conducted on Peery Drive from 7:30 pm Friday March 14, 2008 until 7:30 pm Saturday, March 15, 2008 which counted 4,245 vehicles. He explained the contents of the Planning Department Staff Report, particularly the aspects related to placing conditions on a zoning request, and a voluntary proffer option from the applicant.

Dr. Porterfield asked for questions from the Planning Commissioners. Mr. Jones pointed to some pictures portraying possible buffer styles (from the recent Town approval of a zoning change on Peery Drive.) He favored the wooded buffer with a walking path component, without the fence, and suggested this to Mr. Janson. Mr. Janson also favored the use of a buffer design that would give the residents of the community a walking path.

Dr. Porterfield declared the Public Hearing closed. He asked the Commission whether they wanted to make a recommendation at this time, or hold a joint meeting with the Town Planning Commission per the citizens' requests. Mr. Leatherwood moved that the Planning Commission finalize their recommendation . Mr. Coleman seconded the motion. The Planning Commissioners began discussing their recommendation.

There was unanimous support for the use of conditional zoning to ensure that the site would be used for a hotel/motel, no more than three storeys, as proposed. Conditional zoning allows the property owner to voluntarily proffer conditions for the development that lessen impacts on the surrounding properties. Discussion followed concerning conditions of the zoning application approval.

Mr. Wilck explained his due diligence work, trying to find out more about the impacts to neighborhoods of a Holiday Inn Express, citing a conversation he held with Ms. Jane Pritz, a Community Manager with the Brandermill Community Association, Inc. A Holiday Inn Express is located adjacent to the Brandermill residential community (Chesterfield County, VA) and has been a cooperative neighbor. He explained that he attended a meeting with residents of the Crestview Neighborhood Association and had attended the Town of Farmville's Council meeting concerning the Peery Drive Zoning request. He also suggested that the residents take an active role in making suggestions for conditions for the site design of this application, working cooperatively with the applicant.

Mr. Wilck recommended a 6'-8' masonry wall on the hotel side, using a soil berm with landscaping to screen the wall from the neighborhood or an option to use just the berm with landscaping if the wall is not desired, he supports the walkway / bike trail around the facility; use of directional lighting arranged to face the hotel property which would generate a minimal amount of lighting overspill into the neighborhood; and other things such as trash collection scheduled during daylight hours. He reminded the neighborhood association to be involved with the site plan and think about conditions they feel would make the Holiday Inn Express a better neighbor to them.

Mr. Mason emphasized the need for shielded lighting at the site, especially parking lot lighting. He asked for clarification about the distance the hotel parking lot is located from the road (State Route 684), asking if there was a plan for that vacant area. Mr. Janson said there was not a plan for that area at this time.

The Planning Commission formulated a recommendation for a conditional zoning approval restricting the re-zoned property to be used only for a motel or hotel, suggesting that the following proffers be made by the developer:

- The landscaping plan include a "Type C" buffer, as defined in the general Zoning Ordinance, with preservation of the existing woodland areas as part of the buffer.
- \$ Holiday Inn Express, or motel/hotel constructed, will maintain the landscaping.
- A walkway path be placed around the perimeter of the property for use by hotel guests and the neighborhood. This walkway be coordinated with current planning efforts for a greenway trail system in Prince Edward and the Town of Farmville.
- Any elevated signs would be installed on the portion of the property within the Town of Farmville, adjacent to South Main Street. Any signs on the portion of the property within the County would be a monument style.
- \$ Provide lighting overspill control using proper shielding and positioning of the lights.
- S Position the outdoor trash collection receptacle and arrange the service hours so that it has the least visual and noise disturbance on adjoining properties.

Mr. Janson verbally proposed a buffer comprised of evergreen shrubs and trees and to preserve the existing woodland areas in the buffer area.

Mr. Leatherwood made a motion that the conditional zoning recommendation be advanced to the Board of Supervisors with the stipulated recommendations (as listed above).

SECTION 10 - 16 KILLING OF COYOTES PERMITTED, BOUNTY ESTABLISHED; PROCEDURES FOR CLAIMS

- (a) The killing of coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The Board of Supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.
- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total dollar amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per calendar FISCAL year, except by additional appropriate by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under the ordinance, which act shall constitute a class one misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2500.00 and/or confinement in jail for a period not to exceed one year.

SECTION 46-31 ENUMERATION OF LOUD AND DISTURBING NOISES

It shall be unlawful for any person to create, cause to be created or allow on property under the person's control or ownership any unreasonably loud or disturbing noise in the county. Noise of such character, intensity or duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any person or as to unreasonably disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person, is hereby prohibited. For purposes of this article, a tenant shall be deemed to be in control of the property contained within his or her tenancy.

The following acts shall be deemed to be loud and disturbing noise in violation of this article, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

HORN OR SIGNALING DEVICES: The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus or other vehicle except as a reasonable warning; the creation by means of any such signal device of any unreasonable loud or harsh sound; and the sounding of such device for any unreasonable period of time.

TELEVISIONS, RADIOS, COMPACT DISC PLAYERS, OR MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS: The playing of any television, radio, record, tape or compact disc player, MP3 player, digital audio player or other electrical device or any musical instrument in such a manner or with such a volume,

- a) to permit sound to be heard across a residential real property boundary or through partitions common to two dwellings withing a building
- b) to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the building in which it is located:
 - c) the sound is plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from its source.

ANIMALS: The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person in the vicinity to such an extent as shall constitute a nuisance.

VEHICLES: The use of any automobile, motorcycle or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud, grating, grinding, rattling or other noises. Repairing, rebuilding, or modifying any motor vehicle or other mechanical device in the outdoors between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day. Operation of sound amplifying equipment in a motor vehicle at a volume sufficient to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the vehicle.

EXHAUSTS: The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud and explosive noises therefrom.

LOADING, UNLOADING AND OPENING BOXES. The creation of loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates and containers.

LOADING, UNLOADING TRUCKS: The loading or unloading of trucks in the outdoors within one hundred (100) yards of a residence between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day.

CONSTRUCTION: The erection, including excavation, demolition, alteration, or repairs of any building or improvement that creates noise that can he heard at adjoining property lines from sunset until 6:00 a.m. the following day except in the case of an emergency.

LOUDSPEAKERS, PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS AND SOUND TRUCKS: Use, operation or permitting the operation of any loudspeaker, public address system, mobile sound vehicle or similar device amplifying sound there from for any purpose in such a manner as to permit sound to be heard across a residential real property boundary, or through partitions common to two dwelling units within a building.

SECTION 46-32 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

A violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute a Class 3 misdemeanor. Each separate act on part of the person violating this article shall be deemed a separate offense, and each day a violation is permitted to continue unabated shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 46-33 COMPLAINT REQUIRED

No summons or warrant charging a violation of this article shall be issued except upon the sworn complaint of two (2) persons, each a resident of a separate household, and each alleging facts within his or her own personal knowledge, or upon complaint by a law enforcement or animal control officer.

No person shall be convicted of a violation of this article, unless there shall have been before the court, competent evidence that a least one (1) of the complainants, animal control or law enforcement officer had, prior to the issuance of any summons or warrant, requested the abatement of the noise complained of, and that such noise continued after such request

SECTION 46-34 EXEMPTIONS

Nothing in this chapter shall apply to law enforcement, ambulances, or other emergency vehicles and personnel, aircraft or any noise or sound created thereby or to any noise or sound created by any person to sound a warning or call attention to a bona fide emergency.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to the following:

- 1. Music, bells or chimes that are part of a bona fide religious service, observation or other such religious event.
 - 2. Bona Fide agricultural activity.
 - 3. Sound generated from a school or county sponsored athletic or recreational event.
 - 4. Locomotives and other railroad equipment.
 - 5. Lawful discharge of firearms.

6. Military activities of the Commonwealth or of the United States of America.

7. Activities sanctioned by a college or university which take place within the confines of the main campus of such college or university.

8. Dances or concerts conducted for the benefit of any benevolent, charitable or educational organization.

REVISED SPECIAL ASSESSMENT FOR LAND PRESERVATION ORDINANCE

SECTION 70-31

FINDINGS OF FACT

The board of supervisors finds that the preservation of real estate devoted to agricultural and horticultural uses within the county is in the public interest and, having heretofore adopted a land use plan, ordains that such real estate shall be taxed in accordance with the provisions of §58.1-3230 et. seq. of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and of this article.

SECTION 70-32

APPLICATION FOR CLASSIFICATION; DEADLINE

- (a) The owner of any real estate meeting the criteria set forth in §§58.1-3230 and 58.1-3233 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, may, on or before November 1, apply to the Commissioner of the Revenue for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property for the next succeeding tax year on the basis of its use, under procedures set forth in §58.1-3236 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.
- (b) In any year in which a general reassessment is being made, the property owner may submit such application until thirty (30) days have elapsed after the notice of increase in assessment is mailed in accordance with §58.1-3330 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, or sixty (60) days preceding the tax year, whichever is later.
- (c) Such application may be filed any time within such sixty (60) day period immediately preceding the beginning of the next tax year in which such assessment is sought upon the payment of a late filling fee as provided in this article.
- (d) Such application shall be on forms provided by the State Department of Taxation and supplied by the Commissioner of the Revenue and shall include such additional information, including but not limited to schedules, photographs, soil maps, geological surveys, soil conservation plans and the like as may be required by the Commissioner of the Revenue and available to the applicant.
- (e) A separate application shall be filed for each parcel on the land book.
- (f) Each owner of real estate having been previously approved for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property must file annually with the Commissioner of the Revenue a revalidation application on forms provided, by November 1. A timely filed revalidation application shall not require a fee. A revalidation application filed after November 1, shall be assessed a late filing fee. A revalidation fee equal to the fee required with the filing of an initial application shall be required every sixth year.
- (g) An application shall be submitted whenever the use or acreage of such land previously approved changes.

SECTION 70-33 DETERMINATION OF USE VALUE BY COMMISSIONER OF THE REVENUE

- (a) Promptly upon receipt of any application, the Commissioner of the Revenue shall determine whether the subject property meets the criteria for taxation hereunder. If the Commissioner of the Revenue determines that the subject property does not meet such criteria, he or she shall determine the value of such property for its qualifying use as well as its fair market value.
- (b) In determining whether the subject property meets the criteria for "agricultural use" or "horticultural use" the Commissioner of the Revenue may request an opinion from the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Upon refusal of the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services to issue an opinion, or in the event of an unfavorable opinion which does not comport with the standards set forth by the Commissioner, the party aggrieved may seek relief from the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County. If the Court finds in his or her favor, the Court may issue an order which shall serve in lieu of an opinion for the purposes of this article.
- (c) In valuing qualifying real estate for purposes of taxation the Commissioner of the Revenue shall consider only those indicia of value which such estate has for agricultural or horticultural use. In addition to the use of his or her personal knowledge, judgment and experience as to value of real estate in agricultural or horticultural use, he or she shall, in arriving at the value of such land, consider available evidence of agricultural or horticultural capability; and the recommendations of value of such real estate as made by the state land evaluation advisory committee.
- (d) In determining the total area of real estate actively devoted to agricultural or horticultural use, there shall be included the area of all real estate under barns, sheds, silos, cribs, greenhouses, lakes, damns, ponds, streams, irrigation ditches and like facilities, but real estate under and such additional real estate as may be actually used in connection with the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use shall be excluded in determining such total area.
- (e) All structures which are located on real estate in agricultural or horticultural use and the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use and the real estate on which farmhouse or home or such other structure is located, together with the additional real estate use in connection therewith, shall be valued, assessed and taxed by the same standards, methods and procedures as other taxable structures and other real estate in the County.

SECTION 70-34 USE VALUE AND FAIR MARKET VALUE PLACED ON LAND BOOK

The use value and fair market value of any qualifying property under this article shall be placed on the land book before delivery to the treasurer, and the tax for the next succeeding tax year shall be extended for the use value. Such use value shall be reassessed from time to time in accordance with the policies and recommendations of the state land evaluation advisory council, and to comport with more accurate information as it becomes available regarding each piece of land.

SECTION 70-35

ROLL BACK TAX

- (a) There is hereby imposed a roll-back tax and interest thereon, in such amounts as may be determined under §58.1-3237 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, upon any property as to which the use changes to a non-qualifying use under this article.
- (b) The owner of any real estate liable for roll-back taxes shall report to the Commissioner of the Revenue, on forms to be prescribed, any change in the use of such property to a non-qualifying use and shall pay the roll-back tax then due. On failure to report and pay within sixty (60) days following such change in use, such owner shall be liable for an additional penalty equal to ten (10) percent of the amount of the roll-back tax and interest, which penalty shall be collected as a part of the tax. In addition to such penalty, there is imposed interest on the amount of roll back tax, interest and penalty, at the same interest rate applicable to delinquent taxes in the county for each month or fraction thereof during which the failure continues.

SECTION 70-36

MISSTATEMENT ON APPLICATION

Any person making a material misstatement of fact in any application filed pursuant to this article shall be liable for all taxes, in such amounts and at such times as if such property has been assessed on the basis of fair market value as applied to other real estate in the County, together with interest and penalties thereon, and the owner shall further be assessed with an additional penalty of one hundred (100) percent of such unpaid taxes.

Section 70-37 Application Fees

- (a) A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per parcel shall be required for each application.
- (b) An additional fee of \$_____ shall be required for each application filed after the filing deadline.

Fee Structures Vary By Locality - Examples

\$60.00 per parcel

\$15.00 or 0.15 cents per acre whichever is greater

\$25.00 or 0.25 cents per acre which ever is greater

\$30.00 then \$5.00 per additional parcel

One application Fee if parcels are contiguous and titled in exactly the same name

SECTION 70-38

APPLICABILITY OF STATE LAW

The provisions of the Code of Virginia, Title 58.1, applicable to local levies and real estate assessment and taxation shall be applicable to assessments and taxation under this article, including without limitation, provisions relating to tax liens and the correction of erroneous assessments; and for such purposes the roll back taxes shall be considered to be deferred real estate taxes.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- 1. Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be a resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - Person should have at least a high school education;
 - Person should be oriented to public service;
 - Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.

Transfer of Industrial Park Parcels to Industrial Development Authority

Summary:

In April of 2007 the Board of Supervisors gave formal approval to timber approximately 44 acres at the Prince Edward Business Park with the ultimate intention of developing part of the raw land into approximately three industrial sites. The harvesting of timber is now complete.

In January 2008, the Board of Supervisors approved a resolution and grant application to the Tobacco Indemnification Commission in the amount of \$193,510 to assist with the engineering and development costs of three industrial sites at the Prince Edward Business Park. The grant application outlines the scope of work to consist of approximately 25 acres for three "ready-to-go" industrial sites at a projected cost of \$762,000. Funding awards by the Tobacco Commission will take place the 29th of April 2008.

On March 28th, 2008 the Industrial Development Authority awarded an engineering contract for \$57,794 to Hurt & Proffitt from Lynchburg to begin the necessary engineering for the development of three "ready-togo" industrial sites. Hurt & Proffitt will begin immediately with a property fly-over and soil analysis.

To achieve the best project construction and engineering oversight, the Industrial Development Authority respectfully requests the Board of Supervisors transfer the 25 acres +/- (subject to a final boundary survey) to the IDA. This procedure has been followed for past development at the Business Park, and yet allows the Board of Supervisors to still maintain control of development and the sale of property.



### 2009 Priority Legislative Positions for VACo Region 4 Meeting

### March 31, 2008

1. State Funding for Localities – The County of Prince Edward is on the long list of Virginia localities voicing their objections to the cuts in state funding for state mandated programs administered by local governments. We believe that the Commonwealth and the General Assembly cannot continue to cut state funding and yet also continue to block all opportunities for localities to generate new, equitable revenue streams, by means other than increasing local property taxes.

We strongly encourage Virginia localities to not accept the unidentified 4.2% reduction from the state. Instead, we urge all local governments to reimburse the state for your savings share, which will help us all keep the state aid programs at an unreduced level.

2. Transportation Funding – This past month, Prince Edward County held its annual Secondary Six-Year Plan public hearing. Last year's approved plan included only one regular construction project for the reconstruction of 1.3 miles of state secondary road. Between last April and this April, the VDOT estimated cost of this project increased from \$1.9 million to \$4.8 million. Based on our current allocation, it will take us from now until the year 2020 to fund this one regular construction project. So, essentially, our Six-Year Plan is a Twelve-Year Plan for one project.

Also, the County is very concerned about the VDOT policy to <u>always</u> fund federal-aid projects first. This policy has led to a lack of flexibility for localities to direct funds where the "need" exists and to projects the County can afford.

The County of Prince Edward urges the General Assembly to make transportation funding the focus of a 2008 Special Session and provide enhanced and/or new funding strategies for secondary road funding and maintenance.

Our Board does wish to thank the General Assembly for the corrective action it took this year to restore the Revenue Sharing Program to the structure that better serves the needs of smaller local governments.

- 3. **Judicial Funding** The Board of Supervisors requests that the General Assembly fund the new Judgeship positions that for the past two years have been recommended by the Judicial Council of Virginia, approved by the Senate, and recommended by the House Courts of Justice Committee.
- 4. Agriculture and Natural Resources The County of Prince Edward strongly encourages the Virginia General Assembly to invest more state dollars and agency services in the support of living landscapes/production agriculture to ensure a sustainable future where our lands can provide food for our citizens, resource materials for the production of alternative energy (such as bio-diesel and bio-mass), and conservation of natural resources and wildlife habitat through incentives such as conservation easements and Purchase of Development Rights, which also promote long-term protection of the environment of the Commonwealth.
