At the reconvened meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held in the Third Floor Conference Room of the Court House, on Tuesday the 12th day of February, 2008; at 5:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order.

In Re: Changes to the Six-Year Highway Improvement Plan

Mr. Alan Leatherwood, Resident Highway Engineer, reviewed the estimated allocations and advised the amounts will decrease. He said the secondary unpaved roads and the TeleFee are the state funds which can be used for unpaved roads or any state incidental construction items. He said the others allocations were types of federal funds which would have to be used on federally eligible roads, such as Route 626 and Route 643, which were classified as "major collectors", as they require a different standard. Those specifications include 22 feet of pavement with a six or seven foot shoulder and a four foot deep ditch. He added the costs increase dramatically for those changes.

Mr. Leatherwood said that \$250,000 could be spent on unpaved roads; all others would have to be federally eligible roads. He said the state funds had to be used to match the federal funds. He also stated nothing had been included for rural additions.

Mr. Leatherwood said Route 638 remained as first priority, because VDOT policy requires that if the County drops that project, the County would have to reimburse VDOT for the funds already expended on that project. He said a meeting was scheduled for March 19, 2008, from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. at which time the 527 impacts would be explained. He said Route 638 was surveyed but it was not a collector; Route 643 was a major collector. He said it had not been surveyed at that time, and the costs more than doubled since last year.

Mr. Leatherwood continued saying the picture was bleak, and inflation rates increase of 13% per year are built into the plan. He said surveys would begin on roads when they could.

Mr. Keith Halbohn, Transportation Contract Administrator, said VDOT's hands were tied. He said the funds could only be spent on federally eligible roads. He said state funds were used to match the federal obligation. He said the Route 643 cost was estimated to go up \$4 million; and he was asked if the residency would be able to cover it. He then said for the small amount of funding that Prince Edward County receives, it could not be funded in the Six-Year Plan. He said that the only thing they were allowed to do was to put it on roads that were eligible for federal funds.

Mr. Halbohn said Route 626 is also a major collector, and plans were to widen and overlay it.

This can no longer be done on a federally eligible road. A new project would need to be created to do so.

He said the state was attempting to maximize the Federal funding.

Mr. McKay suggested revenue sharing and said the County needs to budget funds each year for roads, and get matching funds from state grants.

Mr. Leatherwood said revenue sharing would be available if the County could provide at least \$1 million. He added if the County was willing to administer the project, the County could provide less funding, but the County was not staffed to administer the projects. He said the General Assembly was changing the tiers but was unsure of the status. He said the standards and requirements essentially stopped work on Route 643 and Route 626. He said realistically, it may take 12 to 13 years to complete Route 643

if funds were not spent on any other projects, and only includes 1.2 miles of the road from the town limits to the bypass.

Mr. Halbohn said he contacted the central office regarding Route 626 for a cost of \$360,000; if it goes to project, it would cost \$3.5 million. He was told that unless the project was federally funded, the project would not go forward. Mr. McKissick said a lot of the cost is administrative overhead, such as environmental permits and forms.

Chairman Fore said Mr. McKay's recommendation would probably be the best thing to do, but the cost and escalation of things, it would still make projects difficult.

Mr. Leatherwood said every rural county was in bad shape. He said the county could accumulate \$500,000 of local funds for two years, and then apply for revenue sharing to advance the project; that would put the County at a higher tier to get more matching funds.

Further discussion regarding possible solutions followed.

Mrs. Puckett said the Chapter 527 regulations would need to be taken seriously because when developers approach the County wanting to build a project, the County would have to know the transportation impact of the development. Mr. Bartlett said Senate Bill 738 could change that; Mr. Leatherwood said Senator Watkins' bill was trying to limit or eliminate impact fees and proffers.

Mrs. Gilfillan questioned tax rates rising when a new subdivision was built. She said she felt the development must help pay for itself, and was in favor of impact fees and proffers.

Chairman Fore asked if the impact fees could be specified for road-only projects. Mr. Bartlett said the fees could be specified for roads, education, etc. Mr. Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, said there must be a relationship between the funds and the project. Mr. Bartlett added impact fees are mainly transportation but they could be used for libraries and other things also.

Mr. Pickett said Prince Edward County did not meet the threshold for growth rate and development necessary so were not able to consider impact fees. He said there was a \$5,000 cap per lot in Senate Bill 738, and some localities charge \$15,000, and in northern Virginia they're charging as much as \$47,000 per lot.

Chairman Fore then asked about the relationship in the reduction of funds due to the other road maintenance or taking in a road under the rural addition program.

Mr. Leatherwood said maintenance was a separate issue and had been level-funded since 1990. He said the rural addition funds had not been set in the past two years, and once Slaydon Forest was complete, there may have been a balance \$100,000.

Chairman Fore said he had an inquiry about the Timberlake Drive project, off Back-Hampden Sydney Road. Mr. Leatherwood said because that was subdivided after 1990, it may not qualify. Anything subdivided prior to 1949 was covered; anything subdivided between 1949-1992 was up to local government, and anything after 1992 was 100% developer or residents. He added there was good news about the unpaved road projects; Miller Lake Road was to be advertised on February 26, 2008. He said the Route 613 project was out of their office. Route 751 was the next project that still had an issue to resolve in order to move the project forward. Further discussion followed.

Discussion turned to the Aspen Hill Road project. Mrs. Puckett said Recreational Access has not yet been requested because there is no trail, and the master plan has been from "Aspen Hill to the bridge", to "the bridge to Farmville." She said the trail has not been built, and VDOT and the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) will not accept the County's argument that it is an eligible recreational access project until the State Park is being built. She added the project should remain in the list with the intent of pursuing Recreational Access in the future.

Mr. Leatherwood said if the bond package goes through, there would be \$7.5 million for DCR for parks. He said the High Bridge Trail to Town of Farmville project was ready to begin, and VDOT would be doing the work. He added that the County could receive \$400,000 of recreational access monies per facility because it would be going to a state facility. He added that the County may receive another \$150,000 but it would require a \$150,000 match, and that a lot of the enhancement funds were being rolled into the trails and state parks.

Sally Gilfillan left the meeting at this time.

After some discussion, the Board reached a consensus to leave the Six Year Plan as it stood and consider budgeting money for a transportation fund for the County. Chairman Fore added that Mr. McKay's suggestion was good and that the Board should include a road fund in the County budget. He

said a public hearing would need to be held during the March 11th Board meeting, even though nothing had been changed.

Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development; James Ennis, County Attorney; Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development and Tourism, Beverly Booth, Commissioner of Revenue; Mable Shanaberger, Treasurer; and Travis Harris, Sheriff.

Chairman Fore called the meeting to order. Supervisor Moore offered the invocation.

Chairman Fore said "Last month we lost an outstanding citizen in Prince Edward County, in Mrs. Sarah E. Terry, and this Board .passed a resolution in her honor. We have invited her husband, Parker, to come tonight to receive this resolution and he has brought with him their son. I won't read the resolution again, but I'd like to read an excerpt from it.

'Whereas her energy, leadership, generosity and indomitable spirit will be keenly missed, Sarah E.

Terry will forever be fondly remembered by family, friends, colleagues and the entire Prince

Edward/Farmville community.' It is with great sense of honor that I present this resolution to you on

behalf of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors."

Mr. Terry thanked the Board of Supervisors and said how much Sarah loved the community, working for it, and how much she enjoyed giving back to it.

In Re: Public Participation

Stuart Raybold, of the Sheriff's Department, asked for clarification of the process with the proposed financial policy regarding grants. He said he was alarmed as a number of grants available have a very short application time-frame and vary greatly in scope. He added that while some required matching funds, those funds were covered by the Sheriff's budget. He said his concern was that it may become necessary to get Board permission to either apply for and/or use grant funds. He asked the Board to include an exemption if the grant would not use County funds to allow application for grants, and said the funds would then be put back into the budget to ensure the accounting process was complete. He said some grants have a window of less than a week or two for application and to use the funds. Mr. Raybold cited an example, stating he had recently applied for personal protection equipment from the Department of Criminal Justice Services. He said the grant had to come from the County Administrator, and Mr. Bartlett signed with concerns that the Board may require giving him the authority to do so. He said as a result of this grant, the department was able to obtain lightweight bullet-proof vests. Some have three or four months notice, and some do not.

Mrs. Gilfillan said there may have been some miscommunication that the Board would have to approve the application of grants. She said the intent was to maintain internal control of the grant funds, administratively.

Mr. Bartlett said the auditors recommend the Board of Supervisors approve all grants prior to execution of the grant agreement, which was different than application. He said he had a question as to whether he had the authority to sign as the authorizing official for the County. He added the procedure was to ensure an internal process has developed as the auditors require, and to ensure the funds are reflected in the budget once the grant is awarded.

In Re: Consent Agenda

Mr. Ward questioned the date of the Treasurer's report; Mrs. Shanaberger said the reports were always one month behind due to the approval of Accounts Payable at the previous Board meeting. She said both December and January were extremely busy, and that she and her staff strive to get all of their duties completed in a timely manner.

Mrs. Gilfillan commented that the Comprehensive Services, which was \$153,000, might be better done in-house; Mr. Pickett said that it is done in-house. Mr. Bartlett said Governor Kaine may cut reimbursement from the state in half, over a period of time, to encourage a push from residential homes to foster care. He said the cost will eventually double the County's costs.

In Re: Public Hearing - Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on the Motor Vehicle License Tax Ordinance. He said during the budget process in the spring of 2007, the Board endorsed eliminating the County decal after 2008 and increasing the County's motor vehicle license tax rates. He said the Motor Vehicle License Tax Committee met on Monday, January 14, 2008 with the County Administrator, County Attorney and the County Treasurer and proposed amendments to the County's motor vehicle license ordinance. Chairman Fore added the Committee recommended that with the elimination of the decal that the Motor Vehicle License tax be assessed on a calendar year basis (January 1 – December 31) versus the current tax year of April 15 – April 14; he said due to the anticipated change in the "tax year", the 2008 license tax would be prorated so that each taxpayer would pay only 75% of the new rate.

Chairman Fore then opened the public hearing.

Patrick Murphy, Prospect District, said he opposed the increase in tax rates. He said the (property) tax increase last year should be adequate with conservative spending and frugal measures by the Board. He added that the current rates of the motor vehicle license tax which are specific to farming, such as the farm trucks are too high already. These trucks are necessary for the trade and commerce to move the product to market, and the farmers are taxed significantly and need no other taxes inflicted upon them. He then said diesel and gas prices also diminish profits which in turn lead to the development of the land. He closed by asking the Board to vote against an increase in the tax rates.

Jimmy Adams, Buffalo District, told the Board of the tax burden he incurred in 2007, and said he never had children in the county schools, never used the rescue squad, nor the Sheriff's department, yet he paid a great amount of taxes. He said when he was in the process of obtaining the permits in the Health Department, teens were there getting free services. He said the country was in a recession, the stock market

was down, the housing market hit bottom, and Governor Kaine put a freeze on hiring and said layoffs were expected. He said the government was sending checks to stimulate the economy and gasoline was expected to reach \$3.50 per gallon by the summer. Mr. Adams said the Farmville Herald reported the County would save about \$4,000 by not printing the decals, and the following week, the Farmville Herald reported the County had over \$72,000 worth of building permits in 2007. He asked if that wasn't enough extra revenue for 2008. He closed by asking how the Board could justify an increase in the tax rates.

Dr. Edward Gordon, Farmville, asked if the license tax was separate from the DMV fees, and if residents of the Town of Farmville would be required to pay both to Farmville and the County.

Mrs. Sarah Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, said the decal would be eliminated which was a proof of payment of the tax, and the motor vehicle license tax would be added to the county tax bills and would only affect the county residents outside the corporate limits of the town.

Mr. Capezza, Buffalo District, said he agreed with Mr. Murphy and said the County had the additional money from the property taxes. He added he didn't feel drivers should be taxed for others not paying their taxes, and said he opposed the county being able to go after the personal property taxes if residents don't get the decal.

Mrs. Shanaberger said the purchase of the decal was, in actuality, proof of payment of the motor vehicle license tax, and the decal was a good collection tool. She said without the decal as proof of payment, the Treasurer's staff would have to work harder to collect delinquent taxes and the vehicle license tax. She said the Division of Motor Vehicles would be notified if drivers owe the taxes. When the driver goes to the DMV to renew any vehicle, the DMV will not sell decals until the taxes are paid. She said this also applies to plates or plate renewals. Mrs. Shanaberger said the Treasurer's staff would need to be trained to be able to release the information to the DMV immediately after payment was made.

Stuart Raybold said checkpoints had been set up to find people that had not paid the license tax in the past, and that the decal had been an ineffective way to ensure collection of the taxes. He added that the Sheriff's office had been serving civil papers from other counties which were going after delinquent taxpayers that had lived in their county. He added that the burden would be shifted from the Sheriff's office to the Treasurer's office which would have more work in going after the delinquent taxpayers.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.

After further discussion on the recommended increase in license taxes, Chairman Fore said Prince Edward County had a very frugal Board of Supervisors, and the Board would not consider an increase of Vehicle License taxes if it were not necessary. He said he heard what was said by the other Board members and the citizens, and added that he, too, is a taxpayer. Chairman Fore said just as other things had gone up, so had the cost of running the County has also gone up, and the Board had been charged with the responsibility of taking care of its citizens. He then reviewed a proposed reduction in the recommended tax rates.

Mr. Simpson made a motion to approve the following motor vehicle license tax rates, which would be in effect through December 31, 2008 and assessed March 1, 2008 at 75%, and then assessed again in the fall of 2008 for the future year of 2009:

In Re: Personnel Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett advised the Board that the Personnel Committee met on January 28, 2008 to discuss cost of living increases for the FY09 budget process, status of compensatory time balances and internal control findings reported in the Auditor's management letter.

In Re: Information Technology Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett advised the Board that the IT Committee met on January 29, 2008 to review web site activity and discussed the future activities of the committee. Mr. Bartlett thanked Mrs. Magi Van Eps and Ms. Karin Everhart for their work on the web site and thanked the members of the committee for all their hard work during the planning process. He added there were more than 60,000 hits on the site during the previous month. He said the Committee recommended that it be recessed until another matter requiring its attention was necessary.

Mrs. Gilfillan said updated technology would need to be addressed during budget discussions.

Mr. McKay said he would like to see a list of churches on the site, but realized there may be some opposition. Mr. Jones said the civic clubs could also be listed, but a line must be drawn somewhere.

Mr. McKay said he would like the people to know everything that Prince Edward County has to offer.

In Re: Noise Ordinance Committee Report

Mr. James Ennis, County Attorney, advised the Board that the Noise Ordinance Committee met on January 14, 2008 to discuss a new County Noise Ordinance. Mr. Ennis said the first draft of the ordinance was presented for Committee and Board consideration.

In Re: Boundary Adjustment Requests

Mr. Ennis reported the surveyor had presented a revised portion of the intended settlement agreement including a final plat of the Blaylock property, which he reviewed. He said only a few corrections were necessary. He said he was not aware of the Board members having knowledge of the plats; if the Board was familiar with the plat, the Board would be in position to express its intention to enter into the boundary adjustment agreement. The Board could then authorize a public hearing on whether or not to enter into that agreement. Mr. Ennis said the Woodlands property consisted of 13.95 acres and the Blaylock property consisted of +/- 67.2 acres. He said this would put the Town and the County in the position to advertise their intentions to enter into the boundary adjustment agreement and then conduct the public hearings, after which they could jointly petition the Circuit Court for the boundary adjustment.

Mr. Ennis said the first step would be to notify the Town of the Board's intention to enter into an agreement on the boundary adjustment, subject to the public hearing and approval of the Court.

Mr. Mickey Blaylock said the development would be a first-class mixed use community. He said 53 of the residences would be one-level and dedicated for the "empty-nesters" or the retirement age group, while the remaining 49 would be for young families. He added landscaping around the different areas would reflect the needs of the residents, with playgrounds for the families and green areas for the emptynesters. Mr. Blaylock said the full plan would be brought before the Board of Supervisors.

Further discussion followed regarding traffic on Scott Drive and Belmont Circle.

In Re: Tax Status of Longwood University Real Estate Foundation

Mr. Ennis said there had been questions concerning whether or not the real estate held in the name of the Longwood Real Estate Foundation was subject to the local real estate tax. He said the three properties primarily of concern were Stanley Park, Longwood Village Apartments and Midtown Square, which was a condominium unit that the Foundation owned the top three floors of the Midtown Square development; he added the ground floor of Midtown Square did not belong to the Foundation but were commercial units.

Mr. Ennis said that after significant amount of research, because those were exclusively for student housing which was central to the mission of the college. He said it was equitable title, and real estate foundations are created for the sole purpose of benefiting the college, allowing the college to avoid certain procurement issues that the college itself may not. He added they were not subject to long-term master plans; the college was constrained by what it could obtain, but the Foundation had no constraints. He said Longwood University estimated a 1,500 increase in student population in the next ten years. Mr. Ennis said that, in his opinion, those three properties could be claimed tax exempt and that other college towns had the same issue. He added that payment in lieu of taxes was still being considered by Longwood University as they were aware of the impact they had on both the county and Town of Farmville.

Further discussion followed. Mr. Bartlett said Longwood University had worked with the County before, and was aware of the impact their presence had on the county.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett said the proposed budget schedule served as a guide for the development and adoption of the County's budget. He said the meeting on March 11, 2008 would include the whole Board and would begin the budget request process.

Mr. Bartlett then reviewed the County Administrator's response to the Auditor's Management Letter for the FY 2007 Audit, which outlined actions already taken. He said a few issues were in the process of being accomplished.

In Re: Amendment to the Land Use Ordinance

Mr. Bartlett said issues had been brought up regarding the land use ordinance; he said the State Code states an extension of filing deadline may be extended twice. The first could be extended up to 60 days, with a late fee assessed, and extended again upon payment of an extension fee. He said upon the assessment notice date, some localities provide a notice of assessment; Prince Edward County does not, and the County Attorney and Commissioner of Revenue would have to be contacted. He said the bill includes an assessed value on the bill which would allow people a longer period of time to apply for the land use exemption. He added that the Commissioner of Revenue would advertise the information regarding this exemption for the citizens. He said the first step was to develop the amendment to the current ordinance and then authorize a public hearing on the ordinance.

Issue:

Employee Health Insurance Renewal

Summary: The County has received the annual renewal notice from Anthem regarding the County's health insurance Program for employees for Fiscal Year 2009 (FY09). It is recommended the County continue to participate in the Local Choice Program. Due to favorable claims experience and adequate reserves in the Local Choice Program the FY09 rates have decreased 10.8% compared to the current rates.

The Local Choice Program requires a locality to allow its employees a choice of 2 of the self-funded plan options plus the High Deductible Health Plan (HDHP). Historically the County has opted to allow participation in the Key Advantage Expanded and Key Advantage 200 Plans. A survey was conducted last year to gauge interest in selecting a lower cost alternative as the County's second plan. The vast majority of responses indicated no desire for such an option. With the reduction in rates and assuming the same two plans are provided in FY09 it is estimated the savings to the County will be approximately \$50,000.

The attachment provides information concerning the current plans available to employees and the corresponding rates. In addition, it lists all available plans and rates for FY09.

Attachments: (1) Health Insurance Renewal Matrix. This matrix provides a list of all available plans for FY09 and their corresponding rates. In addition it provides the plans currently available for employees in FY08 and their rates. (2) Comparison of Plans Matrix. This matrix compares various services available under each plan and the cost to employees.

Recommendation: Based on the information contained above and in the attachment it is recommended the Board of Supervisors authorize the continued participation in the Local Choice Program and offer employees the choice to participate in the Key Advantage Expanded and Key Advantage 200 plans (the same 2 plans offered currently) plus the High Deductible Health Plan. No employee would have to select the HDHP but could if so desired. The HDHP would provide a family plan that is \$291 less expensive per month for employees. This could prove useful to both current and new employees.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND THE CLERK OF THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, effective as of January 1, 2008, between the Clerk of the Circuit Court and the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia.

ARTICLE I - SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

This agreement extends the coverage of the County's personnel policies and procedures to all employees of the Clerk of the Circuit Court. This Agreement recognizes that employees of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and other County employees all serve the residents of Prince Edward County.

Therefore, this Agreement seeks to establish a uniform personnel system so that the Clerk of the Circuit Court's employees will have the same rights and benefits and will be subject to the same policies, procedures and regulations as other County employees, except as provided herein. The inclusion of such employees in the County Pay and Classification Plan shall not change the status of such employees as appointees of a constitutional officer who serve at the will and pleasure of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and concurrent with the term of office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court; nor shall it deprive the Clerk of the Circuit Court of control over the actions of her appointees, but shall serve as the basis for supplementation of salaries as permitted by law.

Employees will be subject to the County's personnel policies and procedures, except the grievance procedure. All employees of the Clerk of the Circuit Court, whether funded by the Compensation Board or by the County, shall be placed on the County's pay plan, shall be eligible for the same benefits, and shall receive salary adjustments consistent with those received by other County Employees. This is an endeavor to maintain parity among County and Compensation Board funded positions as it pertains to general employee compensation.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court understands that future increases offered by the State through the Compensation Board will not be passed automatically to the staff due to the fact that they would be covered under the county system. Regardless of what the county pay and classification plan states it is understood that the salaries for the Clerk of the Circuit Court's staff will be no less than the salaries approved by the Compensation Board, as is required by state law. In the event that the salary established by the Compensation Board for a given position is higher than that determined by the County's pay plan, the salary set by the Compensation Board shall be applicable to the position.

Nothing in the Agreement shall be interpreted to infringe upon the authority of the Clerk of the Circuit Court to retain control over the operations of her office, including, without limitation, the authority to:

- Direct the work of employees and deputies;
- · Hire, promote, transfer or appoint employees and deputies; and
- Discipline, suspend, demote, dismiss or terminate the appointment of any employee or deputy.

Such authority shall be exercised by the Clerk of the Circuit Court; however, the procedures shall be in accordance with the County's personnel policies and procedures. In addition, the Clerk of the Circuit Court's authority pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-1603 to terminate the appointment of a deputy is not intended to be infringed by this Agreement.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court does not agree to include employees under the County Grievance Policy or Procedure, as the employees serve as an extension of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and derive all powers from the status of the Clerk of the Circuit Court as an elected Constitutional Officer.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court does agree to abide by all applicable State and Federal laws regarding FLSA, FMLA, EEO/AA and other such applicable statutes as applied to appointees of elected officials.

ARTICLE II - TIME OF PERFORMANCE

This Agreement shall commence as of January 1, 2008 and is effective until either the Clerk of the Circuit Court's term in office expires on December 31, 2015, or the below named Constitutional Officer leaves office, whichever event occurs first.

ARTICLE III - LAWS, PERMITS AND RESTRICTIONS

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects, whether as to validity, construction, capacity or performance by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

ARTICLE IV- POLICIES

The Clerk of the Circuit Court agrees to comply with the policies included in the County's Personnel Policy Manual, adopted by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005, and which may be amended from time to time.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court and County agree that employees and deputies in the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court shall be incorporated in the County Uniform Pay Plan, as approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 20, 2005.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENT TO POLICIES

The County agrees to provide the Clerk of the Circuit Court with written notice of any change to all policies and procedures, and any new policies within thirty (30) days after adoption by the Board. The Clerk of the Circuit Court agrees to respond in writing to the County within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notice as to her agreement or disagreement with such amended/new policy. No amendments or new policies may be incorporated within this agreement without the written consent of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and the County.

This Agreement constitutes the sole Agreement existing between the parties with respect to this subject matter and there are not other written or oral understandings or agreements with respect thereto. No variation or modification of this Agreement and no waiver of its provisions shall be valid unless agreed to in writing and signed by the County, and the Constitutional Officer.

ARTICLE VI - TERMINATION

- (1) This Agreement may be canceled by either party by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other, or
- (2) This Agreement shall be suspended in the event Board of Supervisors fails to appropriate or allocate funds for the purpose of continuation of this Agreement, or
- (3) In the event of breach by either party to this Agreement, the other party may give written notice to the party deemed to be in breach specifying the manner in which the Agreement has been breached. If such notice of breach is given, the party sending the notice may suspend performance of any or all of its corresponding obligations under this Agreement, and if the party receiving the notice has not substantially corrected the breach within thirty (30) days of receipt of the written notice, the party sending the notice shall have the right to terminate this Agreement.

ARTICLE VII - PERSONNEL RECORDS AND REPORTS

The County Administrator or designee shall maintain the official time records of all employees of the Clerk of the Circuit Court. The Clerk of the Circuit Court agrees to keep and maintain current records of all of her employees regarding accumulated sick leave, annual leave, etc. and to report each pay period any usage. The Clerk of the Circuit Court agrees to provide the County Administrator or designee all relevant information needed to administer the Personnel Plan, upon request. Records and forms will be maintained and submitted in accordance with established procedures. Additionally, the Clerk of the Circuit Court agrees to provide an accounting as of December 31, 2005, of all accrued leave balances.

On February 25th, Secretary Homer communicated the cumulative effect of current reductions in anticipated transportation revenues. In this memo he referenced that primary, secondary, and urban highway construction allocations will be reduced by approximately 44%.

As a follow-up to this, the resulting impact to the state formula allocations by locality for the secondary and urban construction programs have been posted on our webpage at: www.virginiadot.org (under "What's New").

These spreadsheets provide insight into the funding outlook that will be faced as we jointly update the Six Year Programs for each locality.

These reductions will seriously challenge our ability to jointly move projects forward. Localities will have to make difficult decisions as to which projects are advanced in the secondary and urban systems. The Commonwealth Transportation Board will be required to make similar choices on the primary system. We will continue to work with you and your staff to ensure that these limited resources are maximized to the greatest extent possible.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

- Each of the eight School Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the full Board of Supervisors when the School Board members' terms expire. This vote of the Board of Supervisors shall be by the show of hands.
- 2. The School Board members' terms of office shall commence on July 1.
- 3. The criteria for the appointment of School Board members are as follow:
 - a. Each year, the Supervisor from each election district in which a School Board member's term expires shall appoint a three (3) or five (5) member Citizens Committee to review and select candidate(s) for appointment to the School Board.
 - b. The membership of the Citizens Committee shall be announced at the Board of Supervisors meeting in February and published in a newspaper of general circulation, and the voters of the electoral district encouraged to submit nominations to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - c. For the March Board meeting, the County Administrator shall schedule and publish notice of a public hearing at which citizens will have an opportunity to submit names of candidates to be considered for appointment to the School Board. The members of the appointed Citizens Committee shall attend.
 - d. After the public hearing, the Citizens Committee shall interview and seriously consider all persons who are nominated and express willingness to serve, if appointed.
 - e. At the April Board meeting, the Citizens Committee shall report to the full Board of Supervisors a list of candidates for consideration. If the incumbent is requesting reappointment and is the only citizen expressing an interest, the Citizens Committee shall only be required to submit one name, the incumbent's, for consideration. If the incumbent is not requesting reappointment or is ineligible for reappointment, the Citizens Committee shall submit one or more names for consideration. The Citizens Committee shall also provide the Board biographical information on each candidate.
 - f. At the May Board meeting, a public hearing shall be held on the candidate(s) submitted at the April meeting.
 - g. At the June meeting, the Board, by a majority vote, shall appoint one candidate to the School Board.
 - h. The Citizens Committee, in selecting the candidates, shall consider the following:
 - 1. Person <u>must</u> be a resident of the election district;
 - 2. Person should be a freeholder;
 - 3. Person <u>must</u> be willing to serve on the School Board;
 - 4. Person should have at least a high school education;
 - 5. Person should be oriented to public service;
 - Person should be involved, concerned, and dedicated to public education;
 - Person should be independent (base decisions on factual matters rather than as a representative of a group or faction);
 - 8. Person should be able to perform the duties and obligations of School Board members;
 - Person should be of integrity in all matters;
 - 10. Person should be above prejudice with regard to race, creed, sex, religion, age, and national origin.



Subject: Staff Report - Herberton Rezoning Request

As stated previously, this total of 56.61 acres will be added to the existing "Manor" development. The properties are located immediately south of "The Manor". The purpose of this request is to bring all Manor properties under the same zoning classification. The smaller parcel will be used as an entrance-way into this section, with actual development taking place on the larger parcel. Eventually, the main Manor road will access this property, but initial access will be off Worsham Road. I have placed a rezoning sign near the proposed entrance, if you have time to drive by before the meeting. The present access to the back parcel is through an old roadbed, located between 2479 and 2601 Worsham Road. This access will not be used as part of the project. Other comments relating to this request follow:

1) Adherence to Comprehensive Plan

This request is located within the Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan's development area. It also will be served by public utilities accessed through the main "Manor" property.

2) Traffic Impact

At 38 lots, the projected traffic count would be 380 trips per day.

3) School Impacts

Homes will be priced in the \$200,000 - \$300,000 range, so at least some families with school-age children are likely to reside in this subdivision.

4) Impacts on adjoining properties

Other than an increase in traffic on Worsham Road, neighboring properties should not be impacted. All dwellings will be well off the state road and not be noticeable to neighbors.

5) Utilities

This site will be served by public water and sewer and provided by the Town of Farmville's system.

6) Emergency Response

The access point is 7.0 miles from the Prince Edward County Rescue Squad and 4.2 miles from the Hampden Sydney Fire Department.

7) Public Comments

Neighboring property owners were notified by certified mail, sent out on February 1, 2008, and the rezoning signs were placed on February 4, 2008. As of today, no public comments have been received.

8) Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of this request. The main reason I did not go into more detail above, is that the applicant's proposal is basically permitted in the A-2 zoning. The request is to bring all the "Manor" property under the same zoning classification, which makes sense from a development standpoint. Rob Anderson, with Herberton, will be available at the meeting to answer questions.

Route 15 South Corridor Development Planning

Summary:

The Planning Department would like to take a pro-active approach to planning for the development of the growth corridors identified in the Prince Edward County Comprehensive Plan (pg. 63). A Corridor Plan, or Corridor Overlay Zoning District, is necessary to implement specific regulations concerning the preservation of valuable historic, civic and environmental features and provide for desirable, attractive growth and development. If authorized by the Board, full plan development would commence with a Work Session, attended by Planning Commissioners and County Supervisors, proposed in mid to late April; with plan adoption targeted for August, 2008.

This planning effort has been ignited by VDOT plans to widen the Route 15 corridor south of Farmville. Given the anchor points of Hampden-Sydney College, the Prince Edward Business Park and a large Residential Planned Community, the road widening is likely to stimulate accelerated commercialization of this corridor. The Comprehensive Plan establishes the protection of the natural viewsheds and character of the gateway corridors as priority concerns. The purpose of adopting a Corridor Plan is to ensure that adequate controls provide for efficient use of the land, controlled aesthetics for signs, landscaping and light pollution, and attractive development standards. It will also allow for proper design of controlled entrances which contribute to maintaining a smooth flow of traffic and high level of service capacity on the travel corridor.

The attached Abstract of a Corridor Plan lists example components of a Corridor Plan such as "Traffic Calming," "Access Management", and "Linkages with Scenic By-ways" which enhances tourism potential of the corridor. It also provides example Goals of a Corridor Plan.


Prince Edward County Growth Corridor Plan...Initial Components

The Prince Edward County Growth Corridor Plan will provide the framework that will guide development along the growth corridors identified in the PE County Comprehensive Plan for development. Two important concerns were noted in the Comprehensive Plan for these growth corridors: maintaining the safety and a high level of service capacity, and maintaining the natural viewsheds and character of development to protect these "gateways to Prince Edward County".

The establishment of a corridor overlay-zoning district (or Corridor Plan) is necessary to implement specific regulations concerning the preservation of valuable features (historic, environmental, civic) and development. Development standards can include uniform land use regulations, traffic calming, access management policies, aesthetics requirements, and right of way encroachments. Fundamentally the corridor enhancement plan will be a tool that addresses both functional transportation needs as well as aesthetic and character desires within major development corridors.

Components to Consider When Preparing a Corridor Plan:

- 1. Uniform Land Use Regulations: The overlay district will enhance growth and land use along the corridor. Uniform zoning regulations will need to be implemented along the corridors. These regulations might include measures such as the following:
 - Conventional zoning measures: e.g. setbacks, lot dimensional requirements, building heights
 - b. Building massing, building materials (e.g. green building criteria),
 - c. Environmental issues
- 2. Access Management: Effective Access Management Policies improve the function of the roadway, enhance safety for motorists and pedestrians, and establish an image of a consistent master planned corridor.
 - a. Driveway spacing, Driveway location and design
 - b. Joint and cross access, Shared access with driveways
 - c. Corner clearance
 - d. Intersections
 - e. Reverse frontage
 - f. Frontage roads, auxiliary lanes
 - g. Medians, median treatments
 - h. Traffic signal spacing
 - i. Bike lanes
 - j. Sidewalks, crosswalks
 - k. Transit stops
 - 1. Parking space, lots, and circulation

3. Aesthetics

- a. Visual Appeal enhancement of visual quality
- b. Commercial signage
- c. Buffers
- d. Landscaping, neighboring landscape feature
- e. Streetscape design both vehicular and pedestrian amenities

- i. Consolidated Stormwater Management Facilities

4. Right-of-Way Encroachment

- a. Enforcement of VDOT and local regulations regarding encroachment on public rights-of-ways.
- b. Incorporation of a uniform right-of-way ordinance that allows for consistent enforcement.

5. Traffic volumes and speed

- a. Safe and efficient traffic flow along corridor
- b. Ensure that adequate highway capacity is available to serve proposed projects
- 6. Linkages with Scenic Byways, etc.
 - a. Tobacco Heritage Trail
 - b. Civil Rights Trail?
 - c. Other scenic byways linkages: partnerships, funding

Sample Goals of a Corridor Plan:

- 1. Ensure safe and efficient traffic flow.
- 2. Encourage orderly development that is attractive and beneficial to community. One that considers the entire streetscape e.g. bicycles, pedestrians, public transit.
- 3. Avoid uncoordinated, strip development patterns.
- 4. Encourage efficient use of vacant land to accommodate an economic arrangement of buildings, traffic circulation systems, land uses and utilities.
- 5. Ensure that adequate corridor capacity is available to serve proposed projects.
- 6. Enhance the economic tax base and employment base for the County and Town.
- 7. Defining effective and visually acceptable commercial sign regulations along the corridor.
- 8. Maintaining buffer and landscape requirements that enhance a "sense of place," especially if the corridor is a gateway to our community.
- 9. Overlay trails and scenic by-ways with our corridors to further enhance their usability and attractiveness / tourist appeal.

approval of revisions to the County's agricultural zoning district. These revisions would limit densities, provide corresponding incentives for clustering, and reduce the number of land uses permitted by right in agricultural districts. Research in this area may determine that a second agricultural district is warranted.

- 2. As described above, the Planning Commission should prepare and recommend approval of a water resource protection overlay district for the Sandy River Reservoir watershed.
- 3. The Planning Commission should prepare and recommend approval of revisions to the County's zoning ordinance to grant the County local authority to use conditional zoning when evaluating rezoning requests.
- 4. The Planning Commission should prepare and recommend approval of revisions to the County's zoning ordinance that are designed to mitigate the impacts of new development in areas such as signage, noise, buffering and lighting.
- 5. The Planning Commission should undertake a comprehensive revision of the County's zoning map to implement the zoning and land use recommendations in this plan.

Policy Area: Corridor Development

Route 15 north and south of Farmville, Route 460, east and west of the town limits and Route 360 in the southeast part of the County are three primary highways that provide major vehicular access to the County. With the exception of commercial development along Route 460 just immediately east and west of Farmville, land along these three highways is largely undeveloped. Where road frontage development has occurred it is primarily widely scattered residential development and limited civic uses. These road corridors are critically important in two respects.

First, as major points of access to the County it is critical that these roads maintain a high level of service. Future development along these roads should be planned and designed to ensure that

63

the safety and capacity of these roads are maintained and managed.

Second, these three routes are the "gateways to the County". Users of these routes develop impressions of Prince Edward County based upon the natural viewsheds and character of development visible from the roads. Maintenance and enhancement of these gateways can be critical to the success of the County's economic development and marketing activities.

Recommendations:

- 1. Evaluate and amend the County's zoning and subdivision ordinances to ensure that future land uses allowed along these corridors are consistent with the future land use map.
- 2. Evaluate and amend the access provisions in the County's zoning and subdivision ordinances to ensure that new developments along these corridors are allowed adequate access and that unnecessary or dangerous access points are not permitted
- 3. Evaluate future rezoning and special permit requests along these corridors partially on the basis of proposed access plans and the traffic impacts resulting from the proposed use
- 4. Consider the development of a corridor design policy manual. This manual that would be used by the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors as a policy guide when evaluating the site design and architectural character of development proposals within these corridors that require Board approval.
- 5. Explore with VDOT the potential application and use of transportation enhancement funds to create formal landscaped gateways at specific points along these three corridors.

Policy Area: Village Center Areas

Prince Edward County is a community of communities. In addition to the incorporated towns of Farmville and Pamplin, there are a number of smaller unincorporated rural villages that

SECTION 10 - 16 KILLING OF COYOTES PERMITTED, BOUNTY ESTABLISHED; PROCEDURES FOR CLAIMS

- (a) The killing of coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.
- (b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The Board of Supervisors shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.
- (c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total dollar amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per calendar FISCAL year, except by additional appropriate by the board.
- (d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under the ordinance, which act shall constitute a class one misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2500.00 and/or confinement in jail for a period not to exceed one year.

REVISED SPECIAL ASSESSMENT FOR LAND PRESERVATION ORDINANCE

SECTION 70-31

FINDINGS OF FACT

The board of supervisors finds that the preservation of real estate devoted to agricultural and horticultural uses within the county is in the public interest and, having heretofore adopted a land use plan, ordains that such real estate shall be taxed in accordance with the provisions of §58.1-3230 et. seq. of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and of this article.

SECTION 70-32

APPLICATION FOR CLASSIFICATION; DEADLINE

- (a) The owner of any real estate meeting the criteria set forth in §§58.1-3230 and 58.1-3233 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, may, on or before November 1, apply to the Commissioner of the Revenue for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property for the next succeeding tax year on the basis of its use, under procedures set forth in §58.1-3236 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.
- (b) In any year in which a general reassessment is being made, the property owner may submit such application until thirty (30) days have elapsed after the notice of increase in assessment is mailed in accordance with §58.1-3330 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, or sixty (60) days preceding the tax year, whichever is later.
- (c) Such application may be filed any time within such sixty (60) day period immediately preceding the beginning of the next tax year in which such assessment is sought upon the payment of a late filling fee as provided in this article.
- (d) Such application shall be on forms provided by the State Department of Taxation and supplied by the Commissioner of the Revenue and shall include such additional information, including but not limited to schedules, photographs, soil maps, geological surveys, soil conservation plans and the like as may be required by the Commissioner of the Revenue and available to the applicant.
- (e) A separate application shall be filed for each parcel on the land book.
- (f) Each owner of real estate having been previously approved for the classification, assessment and taxation of such property must file annually with the Commissioner of the Revenue a revalidation application on forms provided, by November 1. A timely filed revalidation application shall not require a fee. A revalidation application filed after November 1, shall be assessed a late filing fee. A revalidation fee equal to the fee required with the filing of an initial application shall be required every sixth year.
- (g) An application shall be submitted whenever the use or acreage of such land previously approved changes.

SECTION 70-33 DETERMINATION OF USE VALUE BY COMMISSIONER OF THE REVENUE

- (a) Promptly upon receipt of any application, the Commissioner of the Revenue shall determine whether the subject property meets the criteria for taxation hereunder. If the Commissioner of the Revenue determines that the subject property does not meet such criteria, he or she shall determine the value of such property for its qualifying use as well as its fair market value.
- (b) In determining whether the subject property meets the criteria for "agricultural use" or "horticultural use" the Commissioner of the Revenue may request an opinion from the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Upon refusal of the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services to issue an opinion, or in the event of an unfavorable opinion which does not comport with the standards set forth by the Commissioner, the party aggrieved may seek relief from the Circuit Court of Prince Edward County. If the Court finds in his or her favor, the Court may issue an order which shall serve in lieu of an opinion for the purposes of this article.
- (c) In valuing qualifying real estate for purposes of taxation the Commissioner of the Revenue shall consider only those indicia of value which such estate has for agricultural or horticultural use. In addition to the use of his or her personal knowledge, judgment and experience as to value of real estate in agricultural or horticultural use, he or she shall, in arriving at the value of such land, consider available evidence of agricultural or horticultural capability; and the recommendations of value of such real estate as made by the state land evaluation advisory committee.
- (d) In determining the total area of real estate actively devoted to agricultural or horticultural use, there shall be included the area of all real estate under barns, sheds, silos, cribs, greenhouses, lakes, damns, ponds, streams, irrigation ditches and like facilities, but real estate under and such additional real estate as may be actually used in connection with the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use shall be excluded in determining such total area.
- (e) All structures which are located on real estate in agricultural or horticultural use and the farmhouse or home or any other structure not related to such special use and the real estate on which farmhouse or home or such other structure is located, together with the additional real estate use in connection therewith, shall be valued, assessed and taxed by the same standards, methods and procedures as other taxable structures and other real estate in the County.

SECTION 70-34 USE VALUE AND FAIR MARKET VALUE PLACED ON LAND BOOK

The use value and fair market value of any qualifying property under this article shall be placed on the land book before delivery to the treasurer, and the tax for the next succeeding tax year shall be extended for the use value. Such use value shall be reassessed from time to time in accordance with the policies and recommendations of the state land evaluation advisory council, and to comport with more accurate information as it becomes available regarding each piece of land.

SECTION 70-35

ROLL BACK TAX

- (a) There is hereby imposed a roll-back tax and interest thereon, in such amounts as may be determined under §58.1-3237 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, upon any property as to which the use changes to a non-qualifying use under this article.
- (b) The owner of any real estate liable for roll-back taxes shall report to the Commissioner of the Revenue, on forms to be prescribed, any change in the use of such property to a non-qualifying use and shall pay the roll-back tax then due. On failure to report and pay within sixty (60) days following such change in use, such owner shall be liable for an additional penalty equal to ten (10) percent of the amount of the roll-back tax and interest, which penalty shall be collected as a part of the tax. In addition to such penalty, there is imposed interest on the amount of roll back tax, interest and penalty, at the same interest rate applicable to delinquent taxes in the county for each month or fraction thereof during which the failure continues.

SECTION 70-36

MISSTATEMENT ON APPLICATION

Any person making a material misstatement of fact in any application filed pursuant to this article shall be liable for all taxes, in such amounts and at such times as if such property has been assessed on the basis of fair market value as applied to other real estate in the County, together with interest and penalties thereon, and the owner shall further be assessed with an additional penalty of one hundred (100) percent of such unpaid taxes.

Section 70-37 Application Fees

- (a) A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per parcel shall be required for each application.
- (b) An additional fee of \$_____ shall be required for each application filed after the filing deadline.

Fee Structures Vary By Locality - Examples

\$60.00 per parcel

\$15.00 or 0.15 cents per acre whichever is greater

\$25.00 or 0.25 cents per acre which ever is greater

\$30.00 then \$5.00 per additional parcel

One application Fee if parcels are contiguous and titled in exactly the same name

SECTION 70-38

APPLICABILITY OF STATE LAW

The provisions of the Code of Virginia, Title 58.1, applicable to local levies and real estate assessment and taxation shall be applicable to assessments and taxation under this article, including without limitation, provisions relating to tax liens and the correction of erroneous assessments; and for such purposes the roll back taxes shall be considered to be deferred real estate taxes.

SECTION 46-31 ENUMERATION OF LOUD AND DISTURBING NOISES

It shall be unlawful for any person to create, cause to be created or allow on property under the person's control or ownership any unreasonably loud or disturbing noise in the county. Noise of such character, intensity or duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any person or as to unreasonably disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person, is hereby prohibited. For purposes of this article, a tenant shall be deemed to be in control of the property contained within his or her tenancy.

The following acts shall be deemed to be loud and disturbing noise in violation of this article, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

HORN OR SIGNALING DEVICES: The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus or other vehicle except as a reasonable warning; the creation by means of any such signal device of any unreasonable loud or harsh sound; and the sounding of such device for any unreasonable period of time.

TELEVISIONS, RADIOS, COMPACT DISC PLAYERS, OR MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS: The playing of any television, radio, record, tape or compact disc player, MP3 player, digital audio player or other electrical device or any musical instrument in such a manner or with such a volume.

- a) to permit sound to be heard across a residential real property boundary or through partitions common to two dwellings withing a building
- b) to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the building in which it is located:
 - c) the sound is plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from its source.

ANIMALS: The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of any person in the vicinity to such an extent as shall constitute a nuisance.

VEHICLES: The use of any automobile, motorcycle or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud, grating, grinding, rattling or other noises. Repairing, rebuilding, or modifying any motor vehicle or other mechanical device in the outdoors between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day. Operation of sound amplifying equipment in a motor vehicle at a volume sufficient to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the vehicle.

EXHAUSTS: The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud and explosive noises therefrom.

LOADING, UNLOADING AND OPENING BOXES. The creation of loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates and containers.

LOADING, UNLOADING TRUCKS: The loading or unloading of trucks in the outdoors within one hundred (100) yards of a residence between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day.

CONSTRUCTION: The erection, including excavation, demolition, alteration, or repairs of any building or improvement that creates noise that can he heard at adjoining property lines from sunset until 6:00 a.m. the following day except in the case of an emergency.

LOUDSPEAKERS, PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS AND SOUND TRUCKS: Use, operation or permitting the operation of any loudspeaker, public address system, mobile sound vehicle or similar device amplifying sound there from for any purpose in such a manner as to permit sound to be heard across a residential real property boundary, or through partitions common to two dwelling units within a building.

SECTION 46-32 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

A violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute a Class 3 misdemeanor. Each separate act on part of the person violating this article shall be deemed a separate offense, and each day a violation is permitted to continue unabated shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 46-33 COMPLAINT REQUIRED

No summons or warrant charging a violation of this article shall be issued except upon the sworn complaint of two (2) persons, each a resident of a separate household, and each alleging facts within his or her own personal knowledge, or upon complaint by a law enforcement or animal control officer.

No person shall be convicted of a violation of this article, unless there shall have been before the court, competent evidence that a least one (1) of the complainants, animal control or law enforcement officer had, prior to the issuance of any summons or warrant, requested the abatement of the noise complained of, and that such noise continued after such request

SECTION 46-34 EXEMPTIONS

Nothing in this chapter shall apply to law enforcement, ambulances, or other emergency vehicles and personnel, aircraft or any noise or sound created thereby or to any noise or sound created by any person to sound a warning or call attention to a bona fide emergency.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to the following:

- 1. Music, bells or chimes that are part of a bona fide religious service, observation or other such religious event.
 - 2. Bona Fide agricultural activity.
 - 3. Sound generated from a school or county sponsored athletic or recreational event.
 - 4. Locomotives and other railroad equipment.
 - 5. Lawful discharge of firearms.

- 6. Military activities of the Commonwealth or of the United States of America.
- 7. Activities sanctioned by a college or university which take place within the confines of the main campus of such college or university.
- 8. Dances or concerts conducted for the benefit of any benevolent, charitable or educational organization.



High Bridge Trail State Park Progress

New Park Manager on site

Eric Hougland has been named the first manager of High Bridge Trail State Park.

Eric has worked with DCR for 13 years and has experience with rail-to-trail parks and has worked locally for three years. "Eric was the ideal choice for High Bridge Trail State Park," said DCR state parks director Joe Elton. "He spent a decade involved in the day-to-day operations of a rail-to-trail park and also has experience working in this community."

Hougland started his state parks career at New River Trail State Park. He worked at this linear park in Southwest Virginia for 10 years. Most recently he served as manager at nearby Holliday Lake State Park in Appomattox County. Eric is currently working out of the Virginia Heartland Regional Visitor Center in Farmville but will soon be establishing offices at the former VDOT shop in Green Bay.

Construction to Begin Soon

High Bridge Trail State Park is moving forward. Trail surface construction plans have been finalized and bridge decking and handrail designs have been submitted for review. DCR

has also entered into an agreement with VDOT for trail surface construction. Plans call for VDOT to begin grading work in the next few weeks. Stone hauling and placement will follow.

Work to begin between High Bridge and Farmville

Initial plans called for the Aspen Hill Road to High Bridge section to open first. This was to include opening the bridge. Because of the cost involved to inspect, design and construct High Bridge for safe and suitable use, a decision was made to put the available resources towards trail surface work and connect High Bridge with Farmville.

The first section of trail to be surfaced runs 6.5 miles from High Bridge through the Town of Farmville, excluding bridge work. As more funding becomes available the bridges will be decked and trail work will continue toward Prospect, then to Pamplin, next High Bridge to Rice with completion of High Bridge itself, and finally Rice to Burkeville.

Community support for the park remains strong. The Commonwealth Regional Council and Cumberland County have both made funding for development of High Bridge Trail their number one legislative priority. Other local governments also continue to support the park effort through agreements and efforts with the new state park.

Become a friend of the park

As the park continues to be developed new opportunities will continue to arise to support the park in a variety of ways. One of those ways is through the formation of a Friends group. Friends groups are non-profit organizations that are formed to support a local park through volunteerism, advocacy and fundraising efforts. Anyone interested in forming, or becoming involved with, a Friends of High Bridge Trail State Park can contact Park Manager Eric Hougland.

GOVERNOR KAINE ANNOUNCES \$4.25 MILLION IN FARMLAND PRESERVATION GRANTS

~ Fourteen localities receive funding to place lands under permanent conservation easement ~

CHMOND – Governor Timothy M. Kaine today announced the distribution of \$4,250,002 dollars to fourteen Virginia localities to preserve farmland within their boundaries through local Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) programs. PDR programs compensate landowners who permanently preserve their land by voluntarily placing a perpetual conservation easement on it.

"For the past several years, we have lost valuable farmlands to development at an alarming rate," Governor Kaine said. "Today we have taken an historic step to ensure that well-managed farmland around the Commonwealth will be preserved and available for continued agricultural use, now and into the future. These funds will benefit Virginia's farmers, the local economies and the environment."

Twenty-one local PDR programs exist in Virginia, seventeen of which have some level of local funding currently available. This is the first time that the Commonwealth of Virginia provided state matching funds for certified local PDR programs.

Eight localities received \$403,220 each: The counties of Albemarle, Clark, auquier, Goochland, Isle of Wight, and James City plus the cities of Chesapeake and Virginia Beach. Stafford County received \$299,242; Frederick County \$5,000; Rappahannock \$165,000; New Kent County \$150,000; Cumberland Canty \$100,000; and Northampton County \$45,000. Grant applicants had to report how much funding was available for their local PDR programs as of July 2, 2007, and the state funds matched that amount up to \$403,220 per locality.

"Preserving farmland is not just a theoretical exercise for me," said Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) Commissioner Todd P. Haymore. "I grew up on a farm in Pittsylvania County, which fortunately is still in the family. As farmers approach retirement, I see the appeal of turning land-based assets into a more liquid form that will support them as they age. PDR programs have the potential to allow farmers to have it both preservation and financial support, and I encourage all localities to consider carefully a PDR approach to farmland preservation."


SECOND QUARTER FISCAL YEAR 2008

Statewide Construction Quality Compliance

YTD Construction CQIP Rating



Construction quality, as evaluated by VDOT's Construction Quality Improvement Program (CQIP), measures project compliance with contract quality requirements. The evaluation is made through a critical assessment, guided by a checklist of more than 1,100 construction quality checkpoints. The results show VDOT's commitment to building quality roads and bridges while seeking opportunity for continuous improvement. In FY07, the second quarter result of 90.9 percent narrowly met the 91 percent target. In the second quarter of FY08, the 91.5 percent result surpassed the 91 percent target.

OVERVIEW

VDOT employees are justifiably proud of their work planning, delivering, operating and maintaining, on time and on budget, the best possible transportation system for Virginia's traveling public. In 2007, the employees won more than 50 awards affirming that their efforts are among the best in the country. You can read more about the awards under the Quarterly Notes in this report.

Their hard work is also reflected in the continuing solid performance figures you'll see in this report covering October through December 2007. Also during this quarter, we launched a major effort to reduce highway deaths.

Are you Virginia's next traffic fatality? It's a terrible reality that any of us could be. By the end of 2007, 1,022 people died from crashes on Virginia's roads. The Highway Safety Challenge, a partnership among VDOT and other concerned groups, seeks to reduce annual highway deaths by 100 by the year 2010 by influencing the driving behavior that is the leading factor in whether you will get to your destination safely each time you turn

the key. Five simple steps that can save lives are to buckle up, avoid distractions, share the road, drive drug- and alcohol-free, and obey the speed limits.




ALL CONTRACTS COMPLETED BOTH ON TIME AND WITHIN BUDGET



185 construction and maintenance contracts were due for completion by the end of the second quarter. Of those contracts, 146 (79%) were completed both on time and within budget.

MAINTENANCE ON-TIME PERFORMANCE






- Commissioner David S. Ekern signed all agreements with Virginia's federal and private partners on the Interstate 495 Capital Beltway High Occupancy Toll (HOT) Lanes project in December, ensuring that construction will begin on the 14-mile project this spring. With this partnership, we will deliver the first-ever dedicated HOV and transit services to the Capital Beltway and address congestion on Virginia's busiest highway. - VDOT received 51 state, regional and national awards in 2007 from industry, government and professional organizations. Among them: the 2007 Green Leadership Award, Government Category, from the James River Green Building Council for the new I-64 West Safety Rest Area in New Kent County. The facility is the first Virginia state government building to win the award. The new facility's design improves energy efficiency, reduces use of non-sustainable resources and minimizes environmental impact. These energy-savings efforts will also significantly save operating costs. The new Fredericksburg Welcome Center was built to meet the same U.S. Green Building Council's Green Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design standards. - Also, VDOT's Wounded Veterans Internship Program, the first of its kind among state DOTs, received the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) Strive for Excellence Team Award. The program offers wounded veterans who can't or don't wish to return to iobs held before serving in combat an opportunity to work at VDOT and develop or improve job skills. Since the program's inception, three interns have graduated; one works for VDOT full-time. Eighteen interns are working in positions across the state as they restart their civilian working lives. - In November, VDOT opened its newest Traffic Management Center, completing a network of five such centers across Virginia. The new facility in Salem is the hub for VDOT's highway safety and emergency response programs for motorists traveling in 34 counties from the North Carolina, Kentucky, Tennessee, and West Virginia state lines, east to Farmville and north to Lynchburg. VDOT's Traffic Management Centers are its focal point for managing traffic flow and coordinating emergency response when incidents clog the state's highways. SECOND QUARTER FISCAL YEAR 2008 PERFORMANCE


FY 2008 CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS COMPLETED ON TIME



FY 2008 MAINTENANCE CONTRACTS COMPLETED ON TIME




CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS COMPLETED WITHIN BUDGET
