ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 10-1. Adoption of state comprehensive animal laws.

The provisions of *Code of Virginia* of 1950, § 3.1-796.66 et seq., are adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth in this section.

DIVISION 1. CONTAINMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Sec. 10-2. Purposes; legislative authority.

- (a) The purpose of this division is to provide for the containment of livestock in the county and to prescribe the penalties for its violation.
 - (b) This division is adopted under the provisions of Code of Virginia, § 55-310, et. seq.

Sec. 10-3. Lawful fence.

(a) The boundary line of each lot or tract of land or any stream in the county shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock domesticated by man.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner or manager of any livestock domesticated by man to permit any such livestock, as to which the boundaries of lots or tracts of land have been constituted a legal fence, to run at large beyond the limits of his own lands within the county; and such animal shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running off the property, whether owned or rented, of its owner or manager, and not under their owner's or manager's immediate control.

(c) Any such owner or manager, after having been notified by an officer of the law that such animal is running at large, permits such animal to continue to run at large, shall be deemed to have violated this section and shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set

forth in this section.

DIVISION 2. MISCELLANEOUS ANIMAL REGULATIONS

Sec. 10-16. Killing of coyotes permitted; bounty established; procedures for claims.

(a) The killing coyotes within the boundaries of the county is hereby authorized for bounties upon the following conditions: A bounty of \$50.00 shall be paid by the county, from available funds, for each coyote killed within the boundaries of the county.

(b) All payments shall be contingent upon the furnishing of such identifying information as requested by the county's designated agent (county animal control). The board of supervisors

shall be the approving authority for payment of all claims presented.

(c) Available funds not to exceed \$2,500.00. The total amount of bounties to be paid under this division shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500.00 per calendar year, except by additional

appropriation by the board.

(d) Unlawful acts; penalties. It shall be unlawful for any person to present a false claim or to receive any money on a false claim under this division, which act shall constituted a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

ARTICLE II. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS

Sec. 10-56. Position created.

The Animal Control Officer shall discharge the duties provided for in Code of Virginia§ 3.1-796.66, et seq., and such other duties as are provided in this chapter. The Animal Control Officer(s) shall be paid as the Board of Supervisors may determine.

ARTICLE III. DOGS

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 10-91. Disposal of dead dogs.

The owner of any dog which has died from disease or other cause shall forthwith cremate or bury and dispose of the dog. If after notice any owner fails to do so, the animal control officer or other officer shall bury or cremate the dog; and he may recover on behalf of the county from the owner the cost of his service.

Sec. 10-92. Unlawful acts.

The following shall be deemed unlawful acts the violation of which shall be a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§

- 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section:
- (1) Diseased dogs. For the owner of any dog with a contagious or infectious disease to permit such dog to stray from his premises if such disease is known to the owner.
- (2) Female dog in season. For the owner of any female dog to permit such dog to stray from his premises while such dog is known to such owner to be in season.
- (3) Removing collar and tag. For any person except the owner or custodian to remove a legally acquired license tag from a dog without the permission of the owner or custodian.
- (4) Concealing a dog. For any person to conceal or harbor any dog for which the license tax has not been paid or to conceal a vicious or dangerous to prevent the same from being destroyed.

DIVISION 2. LICENSE TAX

Sec. 10-111. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog four months or older unless such dog is licensed as required by the provisions Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.85, and this division. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-112. How to obtain license.

Dogs shall be licensed as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.86, by reference, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter by reference as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-113. Amount of license tax.

(a) Pursuant to the authority of Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.87, any person licensing a dog in the county shall pay an annual license tax on the ownership of the dog according to the following schedule:

Male dog. . . \$10.00 Unsexed (castrated) male dog . . . \$ 5.00

Female dog . . . \$10.00

Unsexed (spayed) female dog . . . \$ 5.00

(b) No license tax shall be levied on a guide dog for a blind person, service dog or dogs under four months of age.

Sec. 10-114. Kennel license tax.

The tax for a licensed kennel shall be according to the following schedule:

5--20 dogs . . . \$35.00

Over--20 dogs . . . \$50.00

Sec. 10-115. When license tax payable.

The license tax imposed by this division shall be payable to the treasurer of the county, as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.88, which section is adopted and made a part of this chapter as fully as though set forth at length in this section.

Sec. 10-116. Effect of dog not wearing collar as evidence.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall prima facie be deemed to be unlicensed and a stray; and in any proceedings under this division, the

burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog.

Sec. 10-117. What dog license shall consist of.

The county dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the jurisdiction issuing the license, the sex of the dog and the calendar year for which issued, and shall bear a serial number.

Sec. 10-118. Duplicate license tags.

Duplicate license tags shall be obtained by the owner of a dog as provided by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.91, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-119. Displaying receipts; dogs to wear tags.

Dog license receipts shall be displayed and dog license tags shall be worn as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.92.

Sec. 10-120. Payment of license tax subsequent to summons.

Payment of the license tax subsequent to a summons to appear before the general district court or other court for failure to do so within the time required shall not operate to relieve such owner of the penalties provided.

DIVISION 3. RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 10-141. Vaccination required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog or domesticated cat, age four months or older unless such dog or cat has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises. No license tags shall be issued for any dog unless there is presented to the treasurer at the time application for license is made evidence satisfactory to the treasurer, showing that such dog has been inoculated or vaccinated against rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian or licensed veterinary technician who is under the immediate and direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian on the premises, and that such inoculation or vaccination remains valid for the time application for license is made. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of Code of Virginia, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-142. Rabies clinic authorized.

The board of supervisors finding that the number of resident veterinarians is inadequate to meet the need, the county health department shall provide a rabies clinic at least once per year.

Sec. 10-143. Dogs or cats not vaccinated.

Any dog or cat found in the county not vaccinated and identified as described in this subdivision shall be impounded by the animal control officer, and such dogs shall be held for a period of five days. The dog or cat may be returned to its owner upon proof of ownership, vaccination of the dog or cat, and payment of the cost of impounding the dog or cat at usual rates, and payment of any fines assessed under the provisions of this division. At the expiration of the five-day period, any dog or cat not so claimed by its owner may disposed of by giving it into the

possession of any person willing to pay the cost of impounding, vaccination and license. If not so disposed of, the dog or cat shall be euthanized in an humane manner by the impounding officer or other designated official.

Sec. 10-144. Quarantine authorized.

When the board of supervisors finds that there is sufficient reason to believe that a rabid animal is at large, the board shall have the power to pass an emergency ordinance requiring all owners of all dogs in the county to keep the dogs confined on their premises, and may further adopt such ordinances, regulations or other measures as it may deem reasonably necessary to prevent the spread within the county of the disease of rabies.

DIVISION 4. RUNNING AT LARGE

Sec. 10-166. Prohibited.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog, belonging to him or under his control, to run at large in the county at any time from March 1 to August 31. For the purpose of this division, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large while roaming or running or self-hunting off the property of its owner or custodian and not under the owner's or custodians' immediate control. Any person, after having been notified by any animal control officer or law enforcement officer that the dog is running at large, who is the owner or custodian of the dog thereafter found running at large shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this section.
- (b) This section shall not apply to any person or persons while engaging in the following activities:
 - (1) Lawful hunting with a dog or dogs;
 - (2) Law enforcement or search and rescue activity;
 - (3) A supervised formal obedience training class or show;
 - (4) Formally sanctioned field trials; or
 - (5) Bona fide hunting or field trial dog training.
- (c) A violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section; however, if the dog is a dangerous or vicious dog, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, §§ 3.1-796.128, 18.2-403.1, 18.2-403.2, 18.2-403.3, which sections are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.
- (d) Should the animal control officer or any law enforcement officer have reason to believe that any dog found running at large is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person, such officer may order the confinement of such animal by delivering a confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal and any person who thereafter permits such animal to run at large or remain unconfined, unrestricted or not penned up shall be deemed to have violated this section. Should the animal not be confined within six hours after the delivery of the confinement order or should the animal control officer or other officer, after due diligence, be unable to deliver the confinement order to the owner or custodian of such animal, the animal control officer or any other law enforcement officer shall impound any such dog pursuant to the provision of section 6-197. Upon the issuance of the confinement order, or the impoundment of such animal to appear in the general district court of the county where the matter shall be heard on criminal warrants and the animal shall remain confined until the final disposition of the court proceeding; However, for the purposes of this section the owner or custodian of such dog shall be conclusively presumed to have known the dog to be vicious or destructive if at any time prior to

the running at large of such animal the owner or custodian has received from any person a complaint that the animal is dangerous to the health, safety or property of any person.

Sec. 10-167. Unlicensed dogs prohibited.

The running at large of dogs not duly licensed and displaying tags pursuant to the provisions of this article is prohibited.

DIVISION 5. IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 10-196. County dog pound.

The animal control officer shall cause to be maintained a pound or enclosure as required by Code of Virginia, § 3.1-796.96.

Sec. 10-197. Confinement and disposition of dogs.

It shall be the duty of the animal control officer to confine and dispose of dogs pursuant to provisions of *Code of Virginia*, § 3.1-796.66 et seq.

Sec. 10-198. Fees for confinement.

The legal owner of any dog seized and confined by the animal control officer shall pay to the animal control officer a charge for the confinement of the dog, the amount of such charge to be in accordance with the fees established by the board of supervisors. All fees received by the animal control officer shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

Sec. 10-199. Unlicensed dogs.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the animal control officer, or any other officer, to capture and impound any companion animal found running at large on which the license tax has not been paid. A reasonable effort will be made to find the owner. After five days, if the owner is not found, the animal shall be declared abandoned. If the owner is known, the animal will be held an additional five days. The provisions of *Code of Virginia*, § 3.1-796.96 shall apply where applicable to the disposition of the dog. Any person, animal control officer or other officer euthanizing a dog under this chapter shall cremate, bury or sanitarily dispose of the dog. Prior to the disposition by euthanasia or otherwise, all of the provisions of *Code of Virginia*, § 3.1-796.66 et seq., shall have been complied with.
- (b) If the animal control officer or other officer exercises his option to deliver such dog to any person in his jurisdiction who will pay the required license tax and cost on such dog, the person accepting delivery of such dog shall, within five days after such delivery, furnish to the animal control officer evidence of the inoculation and licensing of such dog as required by this article; and the failure to provide such evidence shall be a violation of this article and shall constitute a separate offense.

DIVISION 6. DAMAGE BY DOGS

Sec. 10-221. Disposition of funds.

The treasurer shall keep all money collected by him for dog licenses in a separate account as part of the general fund; and such funds shall be used for the purposes designated by *Code of Virginia*, § 3.1-796.101, which section is adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth in this section.

Sec. 10-222. Compensation for livestock and poultry killed or injured by dogs.

- (a) Any person who has any livestock or poultry killed or injured by any dog not his own in the county shall be entitled to receive as compensation the fair market value of such livestock or poultry not to exceed \$400.00 per animal or \$10.00 per fowl, provided that:
 - (1) Within 72 hours of discovery of the death or injury, the claimant gives notice of the incident to the animal control officer.
 - (2) Within 60 days of the discovery of the death or injury, the claimant shall furnish such evidence of the quantity and value of the dead or injured livestock or poultry and the reasons the claimant believes that death or injury was caused by a dog to the board of supervisors.
 - (3) The claimant first has exhausted his legal remedies against the owner, if known, of the dog doing the damage for which compensation under this section is sought. Exhaustion shall mean a judgment against the owner of the dog upon which execution has returned unsatisfied.
- (b) Upon a determination by the board that a claim meets the criteria set forth in this section for compensation, the board shall approve the same and forward the approval to the treasurer. Upon payment under this section, the board shall be surrogated to the extent of compensation paid to the right of action to the owner of the livestock or poultry against the owner of the dog and may enforce such compensation in an appropriate action at law.

DIVISION 6. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS DOGS

Sec. 10-246. Control of dangerous or vicious dogs; penalties.

(a) As used in this section:

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted injury on a person or companion animal that is a dog or cat, or killed a companion animal that is a dog or cat. However, when a dog attacks or bites a companion animal that is a dog or cat, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i) if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the dog or cat as a result of the attack or bite, (ii) if both animals are owned by the same person, (iii) if such attack occurs on the property of the attacking or biting dog's owner or custodian, or (iv) for other good cause as determined by the court. No dog shall be found to be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking, or inflicting injury on a dog or cat while engaged with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog handling event.

"Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior that resulted in a previous finding by a court or, on or before July 1, 2006, by an animal control officer as authorized by local ordinance, that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner

has been given notice of that finding.

(b) Any law-enforcement officer or animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the matters at issue. If a law-enforcement officer successfully makes an application for the issuance of a summons, he shall contact the local animal control officer and inform him of the location of the dog and the relevant facts pertaining to his belief that the dog is dangerous or vicious. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may

compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of this section. If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance with the provisions of § 3.1-796.119 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The procedure for appeal and trial shall be the same as provided by law for misdemeanors. Trial by jury shall be as provided in Article 4 (§ 19.2-260 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 19.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended. The Commonwealth shall be required to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.

(c) No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely because it is a particular breed, nor is the ownership of a particular breed of canine or canine crossbreed prohibited. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog that was engaged in the performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, shall be found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog.

(d) If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section.

(e) The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within 10 days of such finding, obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer or treasurer for a fee of \$50, in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer or treasurer shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag that identifies the animal as a dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subsection shall be renewed annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained. The animal control officer shall provide a copy of the dangerous dog registration certificate and verification of compliance to the State Veterinarian.

(f) All dangerous dog registration certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current rabies vaccination, if applicable, (ii) that the animal has been neutered or spayed, and (iii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value of at least \$100,000, which covers animal bites. The owner may obtain and maintain a bond in surety, in lieu of liability insurance, to the value of at least \$100,000.

(g) While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its

owner's property, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it from biting a person or another animal.

(h) The owner of any dog found to be dangerous shall register the animal with the Commonwealth of Virginia Dangerous Dog Registry, as established under § 3.1-796.93:3 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, within 45 days of such a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction.

The owner shall also cause the local animal control officer to be promptly notified of (i) the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all owners; (ii) all of the means necessary to locate the owner and the dog at any time; (iii) any complaints or incidents of attack by the dog upon any person or cat or dog; (iv) any claims made or lawsuits brought as a result of any attack; (v) tattoo or chip identification information or both; (vi) proof of insurance or surety bond; and (vii) the death of the dog.

- (i) After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, upon learning of same, cause the local animal control authority to be notified if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; or (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; or (iii) is sold, given away, or dies. Any owner of a dangerous dog who relocates to a new address shall, within 10 days of relocating, provide written notice to the appropriate local animal control authority for the old address from which the animal has moved and the new address to which the animal has been moved.
 - (j) Any owner or custodian of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal is guilty of a:
 - 1. Class 2 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person;
 - 2. Class 1 misdemeanor if the canine or canine crossbreed previously declared a dangerous dog pursuant to this section, when such declaration arose out of a separate and distinct incident, bites a human being or attacks a human being causing bodily injury; or
 - 3. Class 6 felony if any owner or custodian whose willful act or omission in the care, control, or containment of a canine, canine crossbreed, or other animal is so gross, wanton, and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life, and is the proximate cause of such dog or other animal attacking and causing serious bodily injury to any person.
 - The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.
- (k) The owner of any animal that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to comply with the requirements of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
- (l) All fees collected pursuant to this section, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by this section, shall be paid into a special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any training course required under § 3.1-796.104:1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS

Sec. 10-301. Display or exhibition.

No person shall keep or permit to be kept on his premises any wild or exotic animal for display or for exhibition purposes, whether gratuitously or for a fee. This section shall not be construed to apply to zoological parks, performing animal exhibitions, circuses or veterinary

clinics which are properly licensed by the federal government or Commonwealth of Virginia. In no case, however, shall such wild or exotic animals be exhibited or displayed in such a manner that persons other than their handlers can pet, fondle or otherwise come in direct physical contact with such animals.

Sec. 10-302. Keeping as a pet.

No person shall keep or permit to be kept any wild or exotic animal as a pet.

Sec. 10-303. Notice required at place of sale.

Any person, who offers for sale a wild or exotic animal, as defined by Section 4-1 of this

chapter, shall post conspicuously at the place of sale or display the following notice:

"No person may lawfully keep or permit to be kept in Prince Edward County any live monkey (nonhuman primate), raccoon, skunk, wolf, squirrel, fox, leopard, panther, tiger, lion, lynx or any other warm-blooded animal, poisonous snake or tarantula, crocodile or alligator, which can normally be found in the wild state or any other member of the crocodilian, including but not limited to alligators, crocodiles, caimans and gavials."

Sec. 10-304. Penalty.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. Each day a violation of this article shall continue constitutes a separate offense.

Sec. 10-305. Enforcement.

The provisions of this article shall be enforced by the animal control officer or other officer as provided in § 3.1-796.104 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Sec. 10-306. Effective date.

(a) Any person who keeps a wild or exotic animal in contravention of this article may dispose of the animal by removal of the animal from the county, by giving or selling the animal to a zoological park, or by releasing the animal to the animal control officer. The animal control officer is authorized to release the animal to the wild, to a zoological park, or to a responsible adult, or euthanize the animal, if the circumstances warrant.

(b) This article shall be effective immediately; provided, that any person currently keeping any wild or exotic animals in the county shall dispose of same within five (5) years of the date of adoption of this article; and provided further, that such wild animals shall be registered with the

animal control officer within sixty (60) days from the date of adoption of this article.

ARTICLE V. HYBRID CANINE.

Section 10-401 Definitions. As used in this article:

1. "Hybrid canine" means any animal which at any time has been or is permitted, licensed registered, or otherwise described or represented as a hybrid canine, wolf or coyote by its owner to a licensed veterinarian, law enforcement officer, animal control officer, humane investigator, official of the Department of Health, or representative of the State Veterinarian.

2. "Adequate confinement" means that, while on the property of its owner and not under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian, a hybrid canine shall be confined in a humane manner in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to (i) prevent the animal's escape; or if the hybrid canine is determined to be a dangerous dog pursuant to § 3.1-796.93:1, the structure shall prevent direct contact with any person or animal not authorized by the owner to be in direct contact with the hybrid canine, and (ii) provide a minimum of 100 square feet of floor space for each adult animal. Tethering of a hybrid canine not

under the direct supervision and control of the owner or custodian shall not be considered adequate confinement.

- 3. "Responsible ownership" means the ownership and humane care of a hybrid canine in such a manner as to comply with all laws and ordinances regarding hybrid canines and prevent endangerment by the animal to public health and safety.
- 4. "Owner" means any person who (a) has a right or property in an animal, (b) keeps or harbors an animal, (c) has an animal in his care, or (d) acts as a custodian of an animal.

Section 10-402. Hybrid canine ordinance; penalty.

- 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian to allow any hybrid canine to run at large in the country during the period of January 1 through December 31 inclusive of any year. For the purpose of this section, a hybrid canine shall be deemed to be running at large while outside of any pen or enclosure as provided in subsection 2 of this section, however, any owner or custodian of a hybrid canine may be allowed to remove a hybrid canine from any pen or enclosure for purposes of transportation to another pen or enclosure or for the purpose of obtaining medical attention. In no event shall any hybrid canine be allowed to be set free on any property within the county whether or not the hybrid canine is under its owner's or custodian's immediate control.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to own or possess a hybrid canine unless such hybrid canine is kept and maintained in a pen or enclosure as follows:
- (a) The pen or enclosure shall contain at least 200 square feet of space per adult hybrid canine.
- (b) Any fencing used in the construction of the pen or enclosure shall be at least eight (8) feet in height with an additional overhang of fencing or barbed wire angling a minimum of three (3) feet into the pen or enclosure. Such wire enclosure shall be of such strength as to prevent the escape of any hybrid canine enclosed therein.
- (c) To prevent digging out along the fence, concrete footers at least one (1) foot wide and six (6) inches deep shall be installed along the perimeter of the pen or enclosure or a wire footing of 12-gauge wire buried six (6) inches in the ground with at least three feet of wire on the inside of the pen or enclosure, bending the remaining one (1) foot of wire up in a 90° angle and connect every six (6) inches to the bottom outside of the pen or enclosure.
- (d) The pen or enclosure shall provide shelter which affords complete protection from all elements of nature.
- (e) A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class 3 misdemeanor for the first violation and a Class 1 misdemeanor for any second or subsequent offense. Upon a conviction of a second violation of this ordinance, the owner shall surrender the hybrid canine to the animal control officer for euthanasia in accordance with § 3.1-796.119 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

After attending Farmville Town Council Meetings and reading newspaper accounts of the proposed Poplar Hill transaction, I am convinced that the Board of Supervisors and the citizens of Prince Edward County would benefit from a discussion with the sellers and buyers of the project. Accordingly, I am requesting that you put this matter on the April meeting Agenda of the Board of Supervisors. You should invite representatives from Poplar Hill CDA and Herberton to clarify some of the confusion surrounding this transaction.

It is noteworthy that the principals from Poplar Hill CDA nor Herberton attended the last two meetings when this matter was before the Board, thereby avoiding questions which were certain to surface.

The initial meeting with Herberton Representatives left with the impression that they were purchasing all of the Poplar Hill land and improvements, including the golf course. Brumfield was retaining approximately 40 acres. Subsequently, the Farmville Herald reported that the golf course would be leased. Whether a sale or lease takes place, some legal questions must be answered.

We pushed through the tax grant agreement with insufficient information and without a finalized agreement to review and question. Also, the latest two audits of Poplar Hill CDA raises a number of questions which should be resolved.

It may be of interest that the town rescinded the application for \$300,000.00 from the Tobacco Commission, which would have gone to the CDA. The Town also threatened to take legal action if the CDA refused to pay off its long standing debt.

We need to be more responsible to our citizens, especially when dealing with the CDA. To begin with, lets invite the responsible individuals to appear before this Board to explain the transaction regarding the transfer of Poplar Hill and related matters. You should request a copy of the CDA's latest audit (year 2006). Norm Krueger promised that this audit would be ready March 31, 2007.

Industrial Park Signs

Over the last months Prince Edward County has been very successful in the recruitment of a variety of businesses and industries to the Prince Edward County Industrial Park that has resulted in changing the overall dynamics of the Park's intention from industrial to general business. The existing Park signs are in really bad condition and in much need of replacement. Therefore, this is the appropriate time to replace the current signs with new more appropriate and attractive models.

Attached you will find renderings for two possible new park sign designs. They are very sleek and modern in appearance while retaining a classic look. These are just examples and the sign concept is open to suggestions and/or changes.


The horizontal option would replace the current sign at the front of the park nearest to the Town water tower. It would actually be in the shape of an arrow pointing towards the road intersection, with a concaved sign panel 10 feet long and 6 feet tall on each side, enclosed in the back with a solid top. The back of the sign would be blank and contain no message, while small drainage holes in the top would provides moisture run off.

The vertical sign would replace the current vertical sign at the corner of Commerce Road and Dominion Drive, in front of Tri-Boro Shelving. The sign will be placed on the same footprint as the current sign with a height of 8 feet tall and 42 inched wide and contain a message on all (4) four sides for best visibility from all directions.

Attractive dusk to dawn solar powered up lighting would be installed at both signs in addition to the planting of attractive landscaping at the base of each sign to improve the overall appearance of the park. In both cases, only areas with appropriate easements would be utilized,

If we cannot reach an agreement, the County retains the option to advertise for services from other engineering firms. The limit per project for engineering fees is \$100,000.

Many counties in Virginia are going to this form of engineering contract, as it provides benefits with both negotiating better prices and cutting down on the cost and the amount of lead-time to get a project started, while still allowing a county to advertise if it so chooses.

Edward County Industrial Park.

Over the past months, since the Board of Supervisors for Prince Edward County sold the last improved industrial site at the Prince Edward County Industrial Park to Paris Ceramics, the Office of Economic Development has been working on a "master plan" for the park. With the forth coming clear cutting of industrial sites 7, 10 and 11, which is to be complete by July 31, 2007, it is time to request proposals for engineering firms to assist with the development of the proposed sites and road access.

A rough estimate of the development costs provided by Draper Aden Associates is as follows:



Since this scope of work is much larger than our normal consulting services contract with Draper Aden Associates, it would be appropriate to solicit proposals from various qualified engineering companies.

ACTION NEEDED:

SUBJECT:

Timber Harvesting at Prince Edward County Industrial Park

At the November 2nd, 2006 Board of Supervisors meeting, the Board authorized the clear cutting of approximately 37.75 acres+/- at the Prince Edward County Industrial Park to accommodate the future development of "ready-to-go industrial sites." As a result of a timber analysis by Patrick Murphy, the County Forester of the Virginia Department of Forestry, the total acreage to be clear cut was expanded to 43.75 acres +/-. The increase in acreage was expanded to include a large stand of deteriorating Virginia Pine that needs to be timbered as soon as possible as per best forestry practices.

To assure that Prince Edward County was receiving a fair value for the timber, a Timber Management Consultant was hired to cruise the timber and determine the value. Telephone solicitations, for a licensed Timber Management Consultant was conducted from a list of 17 consultants provided by the VA Department of Forestry. As a result, six bid offers were received with David Sandman being the selected Timber Management Consultant with a low fee of \$275.00. The final estimated value of the 43.75 acres +/- at Prince Edward County Industrial Park by Mr. Sandman's was \$58,612.00.


Since the value of the timber had been determined, timber harvesting bids were solicited to clear-cut the 43.75 acres at the Prince Edward County Industrial Park by advertising in the Farmville Herald and the Southside Messenger, along with direct solicitation from a list provided by the VA Dept. of Forestry of 43 timber companies. As a result, at the conclusion of bid openings on Friday, March 30, 2007, an offer to purchase the timber was made by Pulpwood & Logging, Inc at the price of \$70,444.

Thinning of the remaining 100+ acres is projected to begin after the clear cutting is complete by July 31, 2007, because the access road cut during the first phase will allow access for the thinning phase.

ACTION NEEDED:

- Approve acceptance of the timber bid offered by Pulpwood & Logging, Inc. in the amount of \$70,444.
- Authorize the Board Chairman or Interim County Administrator to execute any and all
 documents associated with the sale and harvesting of this the 43.75 +/- acres at the
 Prince Edward County Industrial Park.

SUBJECT:

LOWES Project Update

On March 21, an engineering team from Dewberry, Alecia Daves-Johnson and Jonathan Pickett from the County Planning and Zoning Office, and I met with representatives from the US Corp of Engineers and the Department of Environmental Quality to discuss the proposed site plan for LOWES. Due to the potential negative environmental impact on a small water way near the proposed LOWES site, the Corp and DEQ are requesting alternative site layouts and mitigation methods for consideration prior to the issuance of a permit. The development of alternative site layouts and mitigation alternatives and the obtainment of a Corp of Engineers permit will probably delay the final closing on the LOWES project beyond the current proposed closing date of May 12, 2007. The Corp Permit is the ONLY required permit that is yet to be obtained.

At this time County staff is working with the Dewberry team to come to a solution to the issues that the Corp and DEQ have raised. It is anticipated that a resolution to the issues will be obtained by the May 8th Board Meeting when any changes, if necessary, will be discussed at that time.

Treasurers Report

February Financial Statement: Mr. Moore stated the finances of the CRC were in good order. President Fore stated the CRC had a cash fund balance as of 2/15/07 pf \$623,908.50. There was some discussion on having items in the monthly financial statement that are more typically shown on a balance sheet. President Fore stated he would check to see if the software allowed the flexibility to make this change.

Mr. Moore moved and Ms. Atkins seconded to accept the Financial Statement as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers & Committees

Chairman's Report & Executive Committee Report: President Fore stated Mr. Smyth called earlier in the afternoon to state he would not be able to attend the meeting to receive his Resolution of Appreciation. Mr. Smyth sent his apologies for not attending.

New Lunenburg County CRC Appointments: President Fore stated Lunenburg County has appointed Mr. George Ingram to serve as the County's Representative on the CRC and also has appointed Mr. David Wingold to serve as the County's Alternate.

Executive Committee Report: President Fore stated the Executive Committee has recommended the approval of the Ethics Policy that was distributed prior to the Canceled February CRC meeting. There was discussion on whether Counties or Towns have adopted Ethics Policy. Mr. Moore commented that he felt that having such a policy was a positive action. Vice Chairman Osl agreed and thanked President Fore for developing such a well worded policy. Dr. Gordon moved and Mr. Moore seconded to approve the presented policy. Motion carried.

Old Business

A. President & Staff Reports

Economic/Planning Allocation Activity Update:

Funding Reimbursement Request Submission to DHCD: President Fore stated the CRC has submitted its first request for approximately \$30,000 for reimbursement of funds expended. President Fore stated the CRC has not received payment from DHCD as of this date. President Fore stated he would be contacting DHCD early next week to obtain the status of payment. President Fore stated that once this is received, it will impact the CRC's Financial Statement to reflect the reimbursement of these expenses.

Execution of Contract with VCU Center for Public Policy to Assist with Regional Economic Development Strategy Work Sessions: President Fore stated the Contract with the VCU Center has been executed. President Fore stated he is currently arranging the meetings across the District with the Counties, as well as with the University and College. President Fore stated it has been a challenge to arrange these meetings with localities currently in the middle of budget deliberations. However, he did feel all of the meetings would be scheduled by the end of May.

Request for Qualifications – Advertising Agencies: President Fore stated the CRC's Special Appropriation Funding also included an Economic Development Initiative component. President Fore stated he has issued a RFP to seven Advertising Agencies. The seven advertising agencies reflect two from Farmville and Raleigh, NC and one each from Lynchburg, Richmond and Roanoke. RFP's are due by the middle of March. President Fore stated once they are received, he will review the proposals and narrow the field to three or more agencies for final selection.

Request for Bids – Computer Equipment: President Fore stated the CRC's new Marketing Associate, Ms. MacKenzie, has extensive experience in IT and the CRC has tasked her with updating the CRC's technology equipment. Ms. MacKenzie stated she reviewed the CRC's current equipment and immediately made a recommendation to make some upgrades to the CRC's server. This has been done and the server is now backed-up every night. Ms. MacKenzie stated the CRC's desktop computers do not have adequate memory and are currently running "very slow." Ms. MacKenzie stated after examining all of the current equipment she put together a Request for Bids that was sent out on February 14, 2007 to six vendors; two in Midlothian, two in Lynchburg, one in Farmville and one in Texas. The due date for sealed bids is March 16, 2007. Ms. MacKenzie stated the CRC is requesting state-of-the art PC's with as much memory as possible to support the GIS system. Ms. MacKenzie stated she had a listing of the exact specifications for anyone interested. Dr. Gordon suggested requesting the "top of the line" in memory due to the every changing technology.

Discussion of Regional Services with Chief Administrative Officers: President Fore stated at the last Chief Administrative Officers Advisory Committee Meeting there was a discussion on the regional approach to regional assessment. President Fore stated he did not feel the committee supported this initiative. It was pointed out that this approach was discussed previously and information was presented on Middle Peninsula's attempt at this approach that was met with political opposition. It was also stated there were a litany of problems including getting all of the counties synchronized in their scheduling of assessments to make the approach work. Mr. Walker stated he felt you had to start somewhere and the regional approach was a good idea. President Fore did point out however, that you could not force the County Administrators to participate in this venture. It was the consensus of the Council to not pursue further discussion on the regional assessment approach.

Mr. Walker raised another subject, that Charlotte County is in the process of trying to hire someone to review their zoning to make sure it corresponds with their new Comprehensive Plan. Mr. Walker stated he felt Charlotte County would support the CRC hiring someone that could be utilized also by other counties for zoning review as needed. Mr. Walker stated the CRC has made a commitment to cooperate and this would be a good step in that direction. Ms. Hickman stated the CRC did submit a request to localities in December for interest in hiring a consultant regionally to review zoning. Ms. Hickman stated she had not heard from Amelia or the Town of Farmville, however, Cumberland, Charlotte and Buckingham have indicated an interest. Lunenburg and Prince Edward have already begun this process and are not interested at this time. Dr. Gordon stated Farmville has already started the process and would not be interested at this time also. Mr. Walker requested that the Council move forward with those that expressed interest.

- B. Status Report Kemper Consulting Introduction of New Funding Request by Senator Watkins and Delegate Hogan: President Fore stated, unfortunately the second year funding legislation for Economic Development the CRC had requested was not included in the budget at the close of the General Assembly Session. President Fore stated in speaking to a representative from Kemper Consulting, there was an administrative oversight at the last minute by State staff. Kemper will try to have the legislation reintroduced through the Governor's budget amendments. President Fore stated unfortunately with transportation issues so pressing this year, some issues were missed. There was discussion on this matter. President Fore stated he would check further into the matter to find out where the administrative oversight occurred.
- C. Council Member Comments: Dr. Gordon informed the Council on the possible INS facility that is proposed for Farmville, VA. Dr. Gordon stated the Town has not reached any conclusions but will be holding a public hearing to hear more information from the developer Russell Harper of Harper



Associates. There was discussion on this subject.

New Business

A. President & Staff Reports:

- 1) Local Government Request:
 - a. Request from the Town of Kenbridge for Assistance in Preparing a Grant Application
 for the Virginia Rural Broadband Planning Initiative:
 Mr. Gilliam stated the Town of Kenbridge has requested the assistance of the CRC in
 preparing an application for the Virginia Rural Broadband Planning Initiative. Mr. Walker
 moved and Mr. Moore seconded to approve the request for assistance. Motion carried.
 - b. Request from the Town of Charlotte Court House for Assistance in Preparing EDI Grant from HUD: Mr. Fortune stated the Town of Charlotte Court House has requested assistance in preparing an EDI Grant to HUD. Mr. Fortune stated HUD has allocated the Town of Charlotte Court House, \$49,500 for the revitalization of the historic district of Charlotte Court House. Mr. Moore moved and Mr. Walker seconded to approve the request. Motion carried.
 - c. Request from the County of Amelia Adoption of Resolution for the Amelia County Route 38 Corridor Study & Request from Farmville Adoption of Resolution for the Town of Farmville Downtown Parking Study (VDOT Rural Transportation Planning Program): Mr. Fortune stated Amelia County has requested assistance in pursuing funding for a Study of the Route 38 Corridor. This project would compliment the already funded Route 153 Study. Mr. Fortune also stated the Town of Farmville has requested assistance in pursuing funding for the Town of Farmville Downtown Parking Study. Funding for both of these planning projects would be sought from VDOT's Rural Transportation Planning Program Competition. There is \$200,000 available statewide this year for this competitive program for planning funds. This year there have been several changes in the program. VDOT will be utilizing an On-Demand Consultant for the selected projects, which will eliminate the need for procurement of a consultant for each project. There also is no required match this year. Ms. Atkins moved and Dr. Gordon seconded to adopt both resolutions supporting these request. Motion carried.
 - d. 2007 VCDBG Regional Priorities Resolution and Project Listing: Mr. Fortune stated each year DHCD requests that each PDC submit VCDBG Regional Priorities along with a list of potential proposed projects for grant funding. Mr. Fortune stated in regard to the listed potential projects, while Prince Edward has listed a project, (Build out and development of building sites at P.E. industrial Park) it is still in the developmental phase and it is not clear when they will be ready to submit an application for funding. The other three listed projects are all ready to be submitted this year: 1) Blackstone Build health clinic in Blackstone to serve LMI households; Telemedicine offered through UVA, 2) Blackstone Make reconstruction improvements to Castle's Trailer Park, 3) Dillwyn-Planning grant for Business District Revitalization. Mr. Moore moved and Mr. Walker seconded adoption of the Resolution and submittal of project listing to DHCD. Motion carried.
 - e. Rural Transportation CRC Planning Program 2007-2008 Scope of Work & Resolution: President Fore stated Mr. Fortune would be reporting on the next two items for Ms. Foster who was unable to attend the meeting.

Mr. Fortune reported that enclosed in the Council's packet is a Resolution and Scope of



Work for the CRC's Rural Transportation Planning Program for 2007-2008. Mr. Fortune stated each year the CRC has to submit a proposed Scope of Work and Resolution for adoption by the CRC to submit to VDOT for approval of continued funding. Mr. Moore moved and Ms. Atkins seconded adoption of the Resolution and approval of the Scope of Work. Motion carried.

- f. CRC Grant Letter of Intent Multi-Jurisdictional Study of Transportation Access, Land Use and Zoning Issues Surrounding the Farmville Regional Airport: Mr. Fortune stated the Virginia Multi-Modal office has made available \$3 million dollars statewide in a competitive funding program for planning funds. The CRC is seeking \$40,000 in grant funds coupled with a \$4,000 in-kind match that would be made by CRC in-kind services. The project will include a study of the transportation access in and around the Farmville Regional Airport, as well as the land use and zoning. Ms. Atkins moved, and Dr. Gordon seconded, the motion to approve the scope of work for the project. Motion carried.
- f. Status Report on Ongoing Projects: Ms. Hickman reported that enclosed in the CRC packet is an update on the Ongoing CRC Projects as of January 25, 2007. Mr. Walker asked if there were enough projects to generate the needed budget for staff? Ms. Hickman stated the status of a project can change which makes it difficult to depend upon anticipated project income from year to year. However, the CRC maintains communication with localities to provide information to them on upcoming programs and grants in hopes that they will request assistance in administration and grant writing. President Fore stated he felt the CRC would be ok for the current fiscal year but may need to pick up some additional projects for the coming fiscal year.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process: Ms. Hickman reported that there were three submitted CIRPS for review:

- DEQ/Dept of Conservation & Recreation: Embankment Dam Rehabilitation at Bear Creek Lake State Park
- DEQ: VPDES Permit for Bacon District, Phenix and J. Murray Jeffress Schools in Charlotte County
- DEQ: Overton-Hillsman House Renovation at Sailor's Creek Battlefield State Park

Ms. Hickman stated the staff recommendation is for a Level One – No concern. Mr. Moore moved and Mr. Walker seconded to give the listed CIRP's a Level One – No Concern comment. Motion carried.

Council Member Comments: Ms. Atkins stated there would be two new businesses locating the Farmville Mid-Town Center in Farmville; a Barnes & Noble bookstore/Starbucks and a Virginia Credit Union. Both should be open in the summer or by the fall.

Mr. Osl stated Cumberland would be holding a Bio-Energy Symposium on March 8, 2007 from 9:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the Cumberland County High School.

Mr. Fortune reported that the RC&D Forestry Committee is looking for people to serve on the committee. Mr. Fortune passed out a brochure that contained more information.

At a reconvened meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held in the Third Floor Conference Room of the Court House, on Tuesday the 13th day of March, 2007; at 4:30 p.m., there were present:

Chairman William G. Fore, Jr., called the meeting to order.

In Re: Sandy River Reservoir

Mr. Thomas Cox stated that Draper Aden had been working with Prince Edward County approximately two years. The water withdrawal permit for the Sandy River Reservoir has been obtained. Mr. Cox said that a water monitoring study was completed and found the Sandy River Reservoir to be a high quality water source exhibiting characteristics common to water storage reservoirs in the mid-Atlantic region. Mrs. Puckett stated the Sandy River Reservoir Committee felt that the information process was at a crossroads, and the full Board needed to review the findings prior to the next meeting with the Town of Farmville's Committee. She added the next step would be for the County Sandy River Committee to meet with the Town's Sandy River Committee to continue discussion for a joint recommendation to the governing bodies.

Mr. Cox stated that the two main points were the water supply options and the monitoring study.

He said the Sandy River Reservoir would be a good source well into the future, and minor issues identified in the study are common in the region. These include organic matter, manganese, and algae blooms. Mr.

Cox said the need to protect the water source is very important, and to do this, he recommended the creation of a Reservoir Protection Overlay District. Measures should be implemented to protect the watershed as a whole.

The water supply options include construction of a raw water intake at Sandy River Reservoir, and conveyance of raw water to Farmville's water treatment plant. There are four routing alternatives along existing power or railroad rights of way.

Mr. Cox stated that options would cost approximately \$20.95 million, which would be a total cost for all facilities, adding that the Town preferred this option.

Mr. Cox said that Option 2 would entail Prince Edward County developing its own water treatment system at the Sandy River Reservoir site, and providing supplemental treated water to the Town of Farmville. He emphasized this would be a supplemental, not a continuous supply. The water lines could be placed along Route 460 Bypass and could be metered at the joining of the County and Town lines. Mr. Cox said there would need to be a definitive delineation between the County and the Town customers if this option were selected. The water could be treated at the source and also supplied to other localities.

Supervisor Gilfillan stated Option 1 could be upgraded later to be used for treated water, and that it would be a good first step. Mrs. Puckett added, with Option 1, the only potential source of revenue for the County would be the Town of Farmville as a raw water customer. She added the Sandy River Reservoir Committee discussed at length the options and financial opportunities or possibilities with each option as they would apply to each governing body; other issues to be discussed would be the revenue stream, ownership, infrastructure planning, operation, maintenance, and staffing.

Mr. McKay said that treated water could be sold to Farmville, and the County could still charge the Town for treated water or buy their lines. Mr. Jones stated charging for raw water had been questioned at the previous meeting with the Town.

A discussion followed on the Rural Development Grant and the revenue sources, and the options presented by Mr. Cox. Mrs. Puckett stated that any lending entity would want to know the revenue stream prior to awarding a grant or loan.

Chairman Fore said a redundant system is not needed. Mr. Simpson stated that there is an agreement that the County would install water lines from the pumping station to the Town limits for the town. Mr. Jones stated there would be no wasted money if the intake is installed and lines were run to the

town limits, rather than making the Town pay half for the pumping station. Mrs. Gilfillan said she pays, as a town citizen, for the assurance of knowing that during a drought, she has enough water, and for the privilege of having water that is treated and comes from pipes, instead of having to worry about a well and if it will run dry. She added, "It's an amenity of living in town."

Comments were made that out-of-town customers would pay a higher rate, and that while costs are shared now, negotiations with the Town of Farmville would be necessary in the future. Mr. Cox stated that if an authority were created, the Water Authority would make decisions based on economics. It would make money from the sale of water to pay specifically for the water costs, which would be separate from General Funds. A Water Authority also functions to protect the source of water.

Further discussion on the possible connections to the Town water system followed.

Mrs. Gilfillan asked if all agreed on the sharing of costs; Mr. Moore stated the County is not in the water business, and it would have to be shared.

Mr. Jones added if Cumberland were to be included, representatives from that area could be included in the Water Authority. Mr. Cox stated an Authority helps the communities involved make better overall decisions based on economics. Mr. Jones added that regional grant funding is easier to obtain.

Mr. Fore asked if a Water Authority would impact on the County owning the reservoir. Mr. Cox gave an example of the Rapidan Service Authority owns some of its system, but a lot of the source water is owned by Greene County and Orange County. They had elected to construct and own some of their own facilities in order to retain greater localized control. The Authority is, however, a regional authority spanning three counties. Mr. Cox added that typically, customers are Authority customers, and a permit for withdrawal would have to be transferred to the Authority, but the reservoir would remain the property of the County.

Acting County Administrator Sarah Puckett said that there would be a meeting the following week with the Town of Farmville regarding the State Water Supply Plan to start the application for grant funds, with a deadline of May 18. The planning for the Reservoir Protection Overlay District will probably start in April or May.

Mr. Cox explained how the Authority or Board of Directors is chosen, and how it would work.

He told the Board that the County would have a reduced level of control; the Directors of the Authority would be appointed, and would hire the people to run the Authority, such as the Director, Water Plant

Operator and Superintendent. The Authority would have an obligation to "break even." As an Authority, it would become a political subdivision, and would have powers of an authority if incorporated.

Mr. McKay mentioned some grant funding would be missed without a Water Authority, and the Town of Farmville and Prince Edward County would have more control if set up prior to inviting other areas to join. Mr. Cox added the memory of the drought in 2001 is fading, and it would be better to act now. The separate enterprise fund would include a water system and water facility on a pay-as-you-go basis. He said the first step of creating an Authority takes effort, but "once the Authority is established, it is quite remarkable how well things come together."

Mr. Jones said the County and Town of Farmville should work together toward this goal. Mrs.

Puckett stated this is an important step for everyone to understand how important a crossroads this is for the decision making.

Discussion followed concerning options and input from jurisdictions other than just the Town of Farmville at the onset; Mr. Jones stated there was no response from letters sent to other jurisdictions earlier.

Mr. Cox was asked to provide his recommendation; he stated the decision for the water authority is a very good one, and Mrs. Puckett's point regarding the revenue stream is valid. At some point, the costs have to be shifted to the customers of the system. Option 1 would be best, in his opinion. The Town of Farmville could upgrade and the development of the Sandy River Reservoir would act as an insurance policy. Users would pay the Authority, and the Authority would transfer the cost to the users. Mr. Jones stated that having the Authority could also provide grant opportunities. Mrs. Gilfillan added the grants would therefore reduce the costs to the customers. Mrs. Puckett reiterated that it becomes an enterprise operation instead of a General Fund operation.

Mrs. Alecia Daves-Johnson said any staff for the Water Authority could be paid as part of the Water Authority, unlike a water treatment plant that the County would have to hire staff. Mrs. Puckett stated that the Authority could contract with the Town to provide staff and employees. A discussion of other Authorities in neighboring counties followed.

Chairman William G. Fore, Jr., called the meeting to order. Supervisor James C. Moore asked for a moment of silence in memory of Larry Kanniard, who served the County as a member of the Industrial Development Authority. Mr. Moore then offered the invocation.

In Re: Public Participation

Dr. Wilkie Chaffin, of the Buffalo District, stated he had been studying the Freedom of Information Act for the past six years, and felt it was extremely important for all public agencies to follow the legal requirements. He stated each time he saw the Board of Supervisors made major violations, he would go before the Board during the public participation portion, in hopes the Board would not violate that particular one again.

Dr. Chaffin said that during a previous meeting, a comment was made regarding the Clayton Bryant land sale. He said "the Board authorized the Chairman to sell the land for \$250,000.00." Since no Board member denied it, he took it to be truth. He added that a decision of that magnitude cannot be made in closed session, and major action has to be done in open session. He then added the Board should speak with Alan Gernhardt, Attorney for the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

Dr. Chaffin also stated that in 2003, the Board went into closed session to discuss possible negotiations with the Town of Farmville about the Sandy River Reservoir. Dr. Chaffin said he sent a letter to Sarah Elam Puckett, Assistant County Administrator, stating the appropriate justification regarding *The Code of Virginia* referencing contract exemptions. The Board of Supervisors could not go into closed session negotiations with a non-government entity regarding another public agency. The County Attorney and an attorney from Troutman Sanders said no violations had occurred. However, Dr. Chaffin continued, in 2004, the *Culpeper Citizen* filed suit against the Culpeper Board of Supervisors in a similar situation, regarding the agreement with their school board. The newspaper claimed that it was not between two public bodies. In 2006, the case went to the Supreme Court, which ruled in favor of the newspaper in that case. The Supreme Court stated: "The unambiguous language in Code Section 2.2-3711(A)(30) viewed in its entirety, demonstrates that the purpose of exemption is to protect the public body's bargaining position or negotiating strategy *vis a vis* a vendor during the procurement process."

Patricia Sanders, of Meherrin, told the Board that she was interested in opening an assisted living facility in Meherrin. She stated the house is in Lunenburg County jurisdiction, and the road frontage is in Prince Edward County jurisdiction. She was having difficulty in getting the Certificate of Occupancy due to opposition regarding the flow of traffic and safety of exiting the property onto Route 630. The sight distance to the right is 610 visible feet, and to the left, 545 visible feet. Ms. Sanders contacted Mr. Edwards at VDOT and requested a traffic study and inquired if anyone had previously made comment regarding the safety of that road.

Mr. Moore questioned Mr. Alan Leatherwood, of VDOT, if he could comment on her issue.

Mr. Leatherwood stated the road is not unsafe, but her operation of a business would require a commercial entrance, requiring a minimum sight distance of 610 feet, clear free sight distance in each direction. He added the unposted speed limits on Route 630 are 55 mph and 45 mph. Mr. Leatherwood stated that he was familiar with her case and earlier that day, submitted a request for a reduction in speed limit. Traffic engineering was asked to look into the matter.

In Re: Public Hearing - Six-Year Transportation Development Plan

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the Six-Year Transportation Development Plan. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 23, 2007 and March 2, 2007 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward. The floor was opened for public input.

Mr. Leatherwood, Resident Engineer, VDOT, led a discussion of the revised Priority of Planned Work, and stated that an estimate of \$687,158.00 will be allocated, which is a reduction of approximately \$150,000.00 since the previous Friday. He added that the amount will drop over the next six years. Mr. Leatherwood said a priority list was created jointly with (the Board of Supervisors) and reviewed the list, as follows:

1st Priority:

2nd Priority:

the list and they may come back to it at a later date)

Mr. Leatherwood added that the bridges can be completed for approximately \$105,000.00, and by 2010 or 2011, approximately \$3.5 million will be spent on secondary construction. He added the unpaved roads, Route 613 (Miller Lake Road), Route 751 (Hidden Lake Road), and Aspen Hill Road are the extent of the secondary roads in the plan.

Supervisor Gilfillan asked if the allocations were expected to drop each year. Mr. Leatherwood stated that was a valid assumption.

In response to Mr. Ward's question regarding affected crossings, Mr. Leatherwood stated (VDOT) met with the High Bridge committee; in their planning stages, the funding was there. He added that DCR did not realize the funding was not available, and it is bleak news.

Mr. Ron Harriston questioned the funding cuts. Mr. Leatherwood replied there is less state funding, and those funds must be used to match Federal funding. Mr. Jones added that some roads do not qualify as Federal roads and will not be eligible for funding.

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the School Board Appointments. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 23, 2007 and March 2, 2007 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward. The floor was opened for public input.

There being no one wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Acting County Administrator Sarah Elam Puckett stated that announcements of School Board Candidates will be made during the May 2007 meeting, and appointments will be made during the June 2007 meeting.

In Re: Public Hearing - Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance

Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the consideration of the 5% Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the February 21, 2007 and February 28, 2007 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward. The floor was opened for public input.

Mr. Cornell Walker, of Prospect District; stated he read in THE FARMVILLE HERALD about the tax, and that he is not opposed to the tax but questioned where the tax revenues would go. He asked for clarification of the 75% of the revenues returned to Poplar Hill and 25% to the County for a period of 22 years. He stated the funds could be spent on roads and education, and for the Board to approve the 75% of the money going to Poplar Hill would be fiscal irresponsibility. Mr. Walker asked the Board to reconsider where the tax revenues would go.

Supervisor Ward then stated:

"On January 30, 2007, this Board was approached by a firm representing certain tax grants from the county to assist them in their purchase of the Poplar Hill CDA property and the privately owned property in the Poplar Hill project. Their intention was to appear before the Board at its February 2007 meeting, make the presentation publicly and have the board vote on the same night. Although their request would require a change in the tax code, there was no provision for a public hearing. After some urging and on the advice of Attorney Bonnie France of McGuire Woods, a public hearing was reluctantly scheduled.

Despite the scheduling of the public hearing, March 13, 2007, this Board was presented with a resolution on March 5, 2007, granting the requested incremental tax revenues prior to the public hearing. The Grant Agreement referenced in the resolution on March 5th was not made available to the Supervisors at that meeting and was only in draft form as of Monday, March 12, 2007. After inquiring about the Grant Agreement with the Acting County Administrator and the Director of Economic Development and Tourism, I received a copy of the document referenced in the resolution passed March 5th marked, "3rd Draft." According to Ms. Sharon Carney, the document was still undergoing changes.

Why do we schedule a hearing on an issue as complex and controversial as this and vote approval before the hearing? Why is this Board controlled by external pressure rather than what is in the best interest of the citizens of this county? The fact that the debt ridden and failed project called Poplar Hill is involved in the transaction should trigger skepticism on this Board. We should be deliberate and extremely careful in approaching this decision.

The Herberton Group of Atlanta, GA, the prospective purchasers of Poplar Hill, is requesting this county to amend our tax code to allow the collection of a 5% transient tax on overnight guest occupancy at the Inn, Manor House and other non-residential dwellings. With 75% of taxes collected rebated to the developer, the county would be obligated to this tax grant for up to 22 years.

The request also calls for the county to return the developers 75% of an incremental increase in real estate tax revenues on all non-residential property for a similar period of time. The public notice on this hearing does not reveal that the 5% transient occupancy tax is in response to an industry request. Nor does it reveal that the tax will apply only to the Poplar Hill developers with 75% of taxes collected returned to the developers for up to 22 years. I am sure such revelation would increase both citizen and business interest in the issue.

It appears that the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors is ready to approve this request without proper scrutiny. I question whether this is a viable economic development project or another attempt to relieve a group of real estate speculators of their debt obligations. If you refer to the newsletter published by Poplar Hill, dated October 2000, you will see a ground plan for the development of the project.

Nearly seven years later, we have no residential development, no hotel, no conference center, no renovation of the Manor House, and a bank foreclosure on the land earmarked for the location of the Inn and Conference Center. That is failure. There is no other possible description. This project has received generous support from the Town of Farmville, county, state, and federal governments. The CDA is tax exempt. Despite all of this support, it has failed.

It is also noteworthy that the Circuit Court granted authority to sell more than \$40 million in tax free bonds which should be have covered financing for the entire project. Were any of the bonds sold, and if so, where are these sales accounted for? Also noteworthy is the fact that two of the three principals in the Herberton Group were consultants or in some way affiliated with the CDA; Bob Fowler, Finance Partner and Arthur Jeffords, Golf and Resort development. Does this raise questions?

We are not informed to the extent that we can make a responsible decision on this matter. First, we need to complete an up-to-date audit on Poplar Hill by an independent auditor. Many questions need to be answered, which include:

- 1) What is the status of the debt secured by the load guarantee and has the Federal Government agreed to a transfer of this guarantee to Herberton?
- 2) "The Farmville Herald" reported in its March 7th issue that "the CDA would still exist to collect the \$1 per \$100 tax levy for the CDA District." What is this all about? Is the CDA selling to Herberton?
- 3) What is the actual debt that is being assumed by Herberton, on itemized list, not an aggregate?

I reiterate that the question concerning the sale of bonds is crucial and we should have documented answers.

We really need to adequately represent the citizens and overall interest of Prince Edward County at all times during work sessions, face to face meetings with buyers and sellers, not our staff interfering for them or trying to answer questions for them in their absence. Remember, we were going to own the CDA after 50 years. What happened?

There being no one else wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Supervisor Gilfillan asked if the proposed tax would be collected from all such establishments and asked if Ms. Carney would "give a correct breakdown on how the Transient Occupancy Tax would operate, who pays for it, who gets what, and what the tax grant is."

Sharon Carney, Director of Economic Development and Tourism, stated that the revenues would be collected from hotel/motel units outside of the town. The only abatement that they would receive would be on their own tax revenue. Other establishments would provide 100% to the County for tourism, as the revenues must go for tourism-type efforts.

Mr. Ward questioned the status of the grant agreement as a "draft." Ms. Carney stated that it is labeled a draft until it is voted upon and approved. Only then is it a "final draft." If not approved, then it would be changed for resubmission.

Mr. Ward referenced the resolution that had been passed at the meeting on March 5, asking why a resolution was necessary without approval of the tax ordinance. Ms. Carney said what was voted upon during the meeting on March 5, 2007 was contingent upon the approval of the Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance. She added she had given a presentation at the meeting on March 5, and had no authority to make a motion. She stated the Board members made the motion.

Mr. Jones asked Ms. Carney after a certain accumulation of money, would 100% of the money return to the County. She stated that the proceeds would go to an assignment of a financial institution, who may lend money to Poplar Hill Holdings. The IDA, the intermediary, would make the payment to the financial institution. If the financial obligation goes well, the obligation could be paid off early, the County would then receive all revenue. The abatement is performance based, and Poplar Hill would receive the abatement only if they make money. After a time, the County would receive all revenue. The County would put no up-front money into this project.

Chairman Fore stated that the resolution had been passed contingent on the passing of the Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance.

Mr. McKay made a motion to approve the <u>Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance</u>, seconded by Mr. Simpson. The motion carried:

TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX ORDINANCE

*Cross references: Commissioner of revenue to be administrator of tax imposed by this article.

ARTICLE VIII.

SECTION 70-183. Violations of article.

Any person violating or failing to comply with any of the provisions of this article shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. Conviction of such violation shall not relieve any person from the payment, collection or remittance of the tax provided for in this article.

Cross references: Penalty for Class 3 misdemeanor. Code of Virginia Sec. 18.2-11

SECTION 70-184. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Hotel means any public or private hotel, inn, hostelry, tourist home or house, motel or rooming, boarding or lodging house, or camp ground within the county offering lodging as defined in this section, for compensation, to any transient as defined in this section.

Lodging means the rental of room or space to any transient for compensation, by a hotel as defined in this section, or the occupancy of such room or space by such transient. If the charge made by any hotel to such transient includes any charge for meals, parking or other services or accommodations in addition to lodging or the use of such room or space, then such portion of such total charge as represents only room or space rental shall be distinctly set out and billed to such transient by such hotel as a separate item.

Transient means any person who, for a period of not more than thirty (30) consecutive days, either at his own expense or at the expense of another, obtains lodging for which a charge is made at a hotel, as defined in this section.

Cross references: Definitions and rules of construction generally. Code Sec. 1-2.

SECTION 70-184 Levied.

There is hereby imposed and levied upon every transient obtaining or occupying lodging within the county, in addition to all other taxes and fees of every kind

now imposed by law, a tax equivalent to five (5) percent of the amount charged for such lodging.

State law references: Authority of county to impose tax on transient room rentals.

Code of Virginia, Sec. 58.1-3819

SECTION 70-185. Exemptions

No tax shall be payable under this article in any of the following instances:

On any charge for lodging in, and during care or treatment in, any hospital, medical clinic, nursing or convalescent home, extended health care facility, sanatorium or sanitarium, home for the aged, infirmed, orphaned, disabled, or mentally retarded or other like facility; or in any educational institution.

SECTION 70-186. Collection.

Every person receiving any payment for lodging with respect to which a tax is levied under this article shall collect the amount of such tax so imposed from the transient on whom such tax is levied, or from the person paying for such lodging at the time payment for such lodging is made. The taxes so collected shall be deemed to be held in trust for the county by the person required to collect them, until they have been remitted to the county as provided in this article.

SECTION 70-187. Reports and remittances generally.

Every person collecting any tax levied by this article shall make out a report thereof, upon such forms and setting forth such information as the commissioner of revenue may prescribe and require, showing the amount of lodging charges collected and the amount of tax required to be collected thereon, and shall sign and deliver the same to the commissioner together with a remittance of such tax, made payable to the county treasurer. Such reports and remittances shall be made on or before the tenth day of each month, covering the amount of tax collected during the preceding month. All remittances received under this article by the commissioner shall be promptly turned over to the treasurer.

SECTION 70-188. Collector's records.

It is the duty of every person liable for the collection and remittance of any tax imposed by this article to keep and preserve for a period of two (2) years such suitable records as may be necessary to determine the amount of charges for lodging, and tax thereon as he may have been responsible for collecting and paying to the county. The commissioner of revenue shall have the right to inspect all such records at any reasonable time.

SECTION 70-189. Duty of collector going out of business.

Whenever any person required to collect and remit to the county any tax imposed by this article shall cease to operate or otherwise dispose of his business, such tax shall immediately become due and payable, and such person shall forthwith make a report and remittance thereof.

SECTION 70-190. Penalty for late remittance.

If any person, whose duty it is to do so, shall fail or refuse to make a report and remit the tax as required by this article within the time and in the amount required, there shall be added to such tax by the commissioner of revenue a

penalty in the amount of five (5) percent of such tax, or a minimum of \$2.00, if such failure is for not more than thirty (30) days in duration. In addition thereto, any such tax not fully paid within said thirty days shall bear interest at the rate of ten (10) percent per annum until paid in full.

SECTION 70-191. Procedure upon failure to collect, report, etc.

- (a) If any person, whose duty it is to do so, shall fail or refuse to collect the tax imposed under this article and make timely report and remittance thereof, the commissioner of revenue shall proceed in such manner as is practicable to obtain facts and information on which to base an estimate of the tax due. As soon as the commissioner has procured such facts and information as may be obtainable, upon which to base the assessment of any tax payable by any person who has failed to collect, report or remit such tax, the commissioner shall proceed to determine and assess against such person the tax, penalty and interest provided in this article, and shall notify such person by registered mail sent to his las known address, of the amount of such tax, penalty and interest, and the total amount thereof shall be payable within ten (10) days from the date such notice is sent.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the commissioner of revenue to ascertain the name of every person operating a hotel in the county, liable for the collection of the tax imposed by this article, who fails, refuses or neglects to collect such tax or to make the reports and remittances required by this article. The commissioner may have issued a summons for such person, which summons may be served upon such person by any county police officer in the manner provided by law, and one (1) return of the original thereof shall be made to the general district court for the county.

Acting County Administrator Sarah E. Puckett stated that she would ensure all Board members would have, with their notebooks, 23 copies of the Resume Evaluation Review form.

Chairman Fore called the session to order and called upon Dr. Patricia Watkins, Superintendent of the Prince Edward County Schools.

One recommendation is for salary increases to keep Prince Edward Schools competitive and to retain qualified staff. Dr. Watkins reviewed how the budget tied into the objectives of the Strategic Plan that the Prince Edward County School Board charted for the school district.

In Re: Public Hearing - County Zoning Ordinance

The Board of Supervisors relocated to the Circuit Court Room for the Public Hearing on the County Zoning Ordinance. Chairman Fore announced this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the County Zoning Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the March 9, 2007 and March 16, 2007 issues of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Chairman Fore stated this was the final public hearing, and the Board would not take action during the meeting, but was there to gather public input. He added the Board would meet at a later date to evaluate the comments made and would probably vote on the ordinance in June. Mr. Fore said comments would be made prior to the vote.

Chairman Fore said 31 citizens signed up to make public comment. He asked for cooperation from the audience, that if they agreed with a previous speaker, state their name, district, and say they

concur in order to help speed things along. Mr. Fore stated he was not trying to curtail comments, but to move along in a logical and efficient manner. He added that Supervisor Moore was absent as he had a conflict with another meeting for the Crossroads Board, and Supervisor Moore would return as soon as he was able.

The floor was opened for public input.

Chairman Fore asked anyone in favor of the ordinance as written to speak first. No one wished to speak in favor of the ordinance. He then asked Mr. Jonathan Pickett, Director of Planning and Community Development, to go over the changes the Planning Commission had made based on previous public hearings.

Mr. Pickett stated he wanted to clarify certain things not accurately portrayed to the public. He stated the setback in the agricultural zone is listed as 125-feet from the right-of-way on primary highways and 150-feet from the center of the road on secondary highways, and that is not correct. The correct right-of-way in the proposal is 100' from the right of way and 125' from the center of the road, respectively. The original setbacks were associated with the 5-acre minimum lot sizes proposed in the fall, and were reduced when the lot size minimum was changed. Mr. Pickett also explained if a business was open prior to the changes in the ordinance, it could continue and be grandfathered in. The only time it would be considered "non-conforming" would be if the business was abandoned for two years or more. In that case, the owner may have to re-file. If the business was damaged, it could be rebuilt. He explained further that any lot recorded could be built upon.

Mr. Pickett referred to the South Central Association of Realtors' advertisement placed in THE FARMVILLE HERALD, and stated some information was accurate, some was not, and some was incomplete.

1) "All residential lots in the County Agricultural Conservation Zone must average 4 acres with 250' of public road frontage." That is accurate. "The current zoning allows 1½ acre lot averages," which is accurate only in theory, and the vast majority of developments in the agricultural zone are already averaging over 4 acres in size. "The increase in lot size is over 250%." In theory that is possible, in reality that is not close to being the true increase in lot size.

- 2) "Setbacks will nearly double." Under the proposed zoning, the 100-foot setback would increase 25-33% in the front; the side and rear setbacks would remain the same. Some lots would lose up to 68% of their area to setbacks that is true. Under current zoning, you lose 64% of your area to setbacks if you have a 200' lot that's an acre and a half in size. There is some decrease in the amount of land you'll lose to setbacks, however if the board adopts the two-acre proposal, you'll have more buildable area square-foot wise.
- 3. "Outdoor gatherings must apply for special use permit and provide medical facilities, fire protection, security, parking and traffic control. This includes church revivals." What the ad fails to state is the definition of an outdoor gathering is 500 people or more. There are not too many of these. The Board plans to look at the church revival section and they may adjust that accordingly.
- 4. "A site plan prepared by professional engineer or surveyor must be submitted to the county for conversion of any building or property to a different use." What the ad fails to say is that single family homes and agricultural uses are exempt. Also, for smaller commercial businesses, the zoning administrator has the ability to waive that requirement for small businesses that may not have any neighbors close by that may be affected. This provision is targeting mainly commercial and industrial developments of some size as well as multi family developments.
- 5. "All site plans shall include required landscape plans prepared by a licensed landscape professional." As before, single family and agriculture are exempt, and again, the Zoning Administrator has the right to waive the site plan requirement if this type of business is not going to be of any concern to anybody around.
- 6. "The zoning permit shall be required for any alteration of any structure or establishment of any land use." Zoning permits are already required for any new construction in the county, as well as for any additions to buildings. A zoning permit is not required for renovations inside a building. The zoning permit is free and can be obtained at the time of applying for the building permit. It's currently required for most land uses in the county.

- 7. "Any exterior storage, service, maintenance, repair, processing manufacturing, fabrication, salvage, disposal shall be screened with a buffer of screens and plantings." Basically, if it is a type of project that a site plan is required, then screening of those things will be required. If the business is in operation now and you have exterior storage, you are not required to put up a fence or anything. This is for new businesses that require a site plan.
- 8. "No duplexes or multi-family housing will be allowed outside an area served by public water and sewer." This statement concerning multi-family housing is correct as defined as three or more units. The statement concerning duplexes is not correct; duplexes are a conditional use throughout the county and do not require public water or sewer.
- 9. "Farmers must have approved VDOT entrance to farm stands. This includes pick-your-own farms." That language is accurate, and I recommend that the board delete that section from the zoning ordinance.
- 10. "Home-based businesses can have no sign, no wholesale sales, no retail sales, no advertising, no exterior storage, no employees, and no delivery of products." This language is accurate. He noted the delivery of products does not include deliveries by UPS or FedEx or other carriers to residential areas. Mr. Pickett said, "The Board and I have concerns about this provision as far as its entirety; I've made some recommendations as far as the employees and wholesale sales, and also delineated the delivery with the actual words UPS FedEx or similar carriers in the ordinance to take care of that. Again, a home based business that's currently in operation would be grandfathered in anyway."

Mr. Pickett encouraged the citizens to call if they have a specific question, and said if someone files for a building permit prior to the implementation of this ordinance, it will be considered to be an application in progress and will fall under the current zoning ordinance.

Mr. Pickett having concluded his review, Chairman Fore called the first citizen.

Dempsey Jones, Leigh District, stated he was a realtor with Remax and some of his concerns were addressed by Mr. Pickett. He said that his understanding of the ordinance is that in

the A1 district, ¼ per acre density with one house per four acres, with 300-foot frontage would mean a large portion of the lot as green space. A developer can sell 60 of 100 acres but would be required to pay taxes on the remaining 40. Mr. Jones added since the last change in the subdivision ordinance, the price of lots have increased and will again, and that he had been told previously by putting a state road into the development, there could be 1½ -acre lots fronting the state road. There are now 3-acre lots on a private subdivision road; this [ordinance] would take that away.

Mr. Jones continued, stating home-based businesses are the wave of the future, and questioned the allowance to be grandfathered if in operation at this time but not if someone moves into the area. In addition, Mr. Jones said he felt church groups should be exempt from the outdoor gatherings restriction.

Mr. Jones then referenced the ordinance, questioning the restriction on the rental of accessory apartments to non-family members. He also questioned the non-conforming uses, stating under the new ordinance, the building could not be increased or modernized if damaged and rebuilt.

Mr. Jones concluded the Planning Commission is "composed of five to fifteen members appointed by the Board of Supervisors. All should be residents and at least half shall own real estate in the county.

All Commission members shall be qualified by knowledge and experience to make decisions on questions of community growth and development." He stated there are no surveyors or builders on that board. Mr. Pickett said there is a licensed building contractor on the board.

Tom Tribes, of the Prospect District, stated he lives in Michigan and was an elected trustee on the Planning Commission there. He stated they faced some of the same issues and commented on the A1 district, Agricultural and Preservation or Conservation, and said he has some experience with how it is done in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. He suggested taking the proposed zoning scheme and do a complete work-up on how the land would look if it were done as proposed, adding he was sure the Board wouldn't like it. He stated the farmland preservation issue, if the only option is a five to ten acre parcel, "all you do is... bust up farmland, and if you carry that to the extreme, there isn't any farmland left." He added alternatives should be offered.

Mr. Jonathan Pickett, Zoning Director, said clustering is not mandatory, but optional. Mr. Tribes said clustering was similar to what he called Conservation Design, putting homes in one section, leaving one section as "community property."

Maureen Green, of Lockett District, commented on the need to promote the creation and preservation of affordable housing, for current and future needs of the county, adding "the more you mess around with the set-backs and the lot sizes, the less affordable the housing will get." She said the set-backs are a problem, and small two-acre lots are affordable to some, and larger ones affordable to others. Ms. Green also questioned the home-based business issue, and asked about the restriction on employees. "If it's not causing problems,….it's nobody's business what I do in my house."

Ms. Green referred to the section regarding dwellings differing from residential use. She stated that she does not want someone telling her what she can or can't do with her house, adding that she is a builder and stores equipment at her house. She also asked if her business would be grandfathered as it stands, and what would happen if she would want to change it.

Mr. Pickett stated the purpose is to make sure homeowners did not establish businesses which weren't allowed on a stand-alone basis. These regulations are not to prevent builders, and he will recommend changes to the definition so it's more goods-related than service-related.

Ms. Green asked about a manufactured home with an accessory single-wide [mobile home], and if the owners could use the single-wide, for example, for an aunt needing long-term care.

Mr. Pickett said if the lot is large enough for two dwellings, there would be no problem. A problem would only arise should the lot size be too small, under zoning regulations, for two dwellings. The current zoning ordinance includes this regulation.

Della Boothe, of Darlington Heights, questioned the need for a professional landscaper. Mr. Pickett said that requirement is for commercial and industrial developments, not for single-family homes. She questioned the gathering regulations; Mr. Pickett said she would need a permit only if more than 500 people would be expected at the gathering.

Joyce Foster Sweet, of Buckingham, stated she owns property in Prospect, and is the President of the South Central Association of Realtors, and said that they would like to go on record as opposing the plan. She said the policies included could raise the prices of lots, which would create a major hardship for

the low- and middle-income groups to achieve home ownership. She added the plan would restrict the rights of citizens concerning the use of their own property, and does not allow enough for variances or grandfathering. Ms. Sweet said the ordinance seemed more for a metropolitan area, not a rural county.

James Lyle said he recognized the changes that had already been made, and asked the Board to consider that all can't afford \$30-40,000 for a tract of land. He added that all need a home, but not all can afford a \$250-\$300,000 house. He asked his supervisor to vote no on the ordinance.

Oliver Stiff, of Prospect District, said he had been before the Planning Commission, and the few in attendance were speaking for those that were not. He added he would be thankful for the Board to vote on this by June, and asked that the ordinance be made understandable with the public interest at heart.

Wayne Bolton, of Green Bay, stated he had not read the entire ordinance, but he was against it.

He said he is a farmer, and there is a need for more small farmers, but when it's necessary to put a VDOT entranceway in order to sell from a small garden, "there's something wrong with this picture." He added, "we should be buying local," not out of the country or state, and a lot of these regulations are "beyond our ability to pay for."

Jim Yoder, of Hampden Sydney, asked when the Board intends to vote on the ordinance.

Chairman Fore stated it's anticipated it would be in June 2007. Mr. Yoder said the Board should be held accountable.

Linda Yoder, of Prospect, stated she moved to Prince Edward County six years ago from Virginia Beach to escape the multitude of restrictions that applied to properties there. She added she came for the freedom to do what she wants with her land, and was opposed to seeing the freedoms eroded. Ms. Yoder asked the Board to vote no.

Joe Huddleston, of Farmville, asked why a new zoning ordinance was necessary and if it was a state requirement. He added he was against the proposed changes. Mr. Pickett said the Comprehensive Plan, which is the land use plan for the county, is mandated by the state, and the zoning ordinance changes were based on the Comprehensive Plan.

Linda Goubile, of Farmville, asked if the home business portion would change the procedure for holding yard sales and posting signs. Mr. Pickett stated the ordinance refers to permanent businesses, and that the home business portion will be reviewed.

Bill Benhoff, of Prospect, thanked the Board for the consideration, and while he knew it took a lot of work, he advised to "throw this whole thing out, get rid of it, and then go back to the old one and build on it rather than use this confusing document..." He also suggested the Board and Planning Commission take advantage of the professional people in the businesses in the area and to utilize their expertise.

Jack Houghton, of Farmville, stated that he has attended nearly all meetings concerning the zoning ordinance. He said the Crestview Neighborhood Association has supported the removal of 300-foot commercial zone in front of the Crestview residential neighborhood, going on five years. He stated petitions were on file. Mr. Houghton asked when the Board would keep the promise to fix that issue.

Mr. Houghton questioned the support of the ordinance, and asked who these people are, and why they don't attend the meetings. He also encouraged the Board to adopt formal qualification standards for planning commission members

Richard Altice, of Worsham, emphasized the mandatory 3-plus acre lot size would be a waste of land, adding the land needs to be used for farms, forest or open space. He also said no restrictions should be placed on small [home] businesses if they cause no problems.

Chairman Fore asked if there was anyone else wishing to comment.

Chuck Benhoff asked what the purpose was in increasing the setbacks and for clarification on the requirements. Mr. Pickett stated the primary roads would have a 100-foot setback from the edge of the right-of-way, and secondary roads would have a 125-foot setback from the center of the road. He added it was to keep people back from the road farther.

Mr. Benhoff stated the reason for the opposition was the knowledge of what [the ordinance] would grow to. He added the Planning Commission has an agenda, but it is not the character of Prince Edward County.

Ken Meade, of Buffalo District, asked why something of this nature wasn't put to vote, and said that it would be remembered when it is time to vote for supervisors.

Beulah Womack asked about the Comprehensive Plan, stating that restrictions require more restrictions, and that people are not free to develop the way they want to. She requested that the Board not approve the ordinance.

Mr. James Moore entered the meeting at this time.

Essie Green, Hampton District, stated she discussed the ordinance with her neighbors and came to the conclusion that the ordinance is about rights and the American dream. She added "Prince Edward is a low-income area, and regular citizens are being pushed aside to make room for – who?" She concluded by stating this is not what she's come to expect from Prince Edward County.

Gary Atkins, of Farmville, said that he doesn't see why the current ordinance isn't working. He stated that property prices are rising, and the funding for roads is decreasing. He asked how many houses are on a 300-foot city block. Mr. Atkins stated this ordinance should be voted down and the old one should be built upon. He also questioned why a homeowner can't have a 6-foot tall fence in the country, and that the ordinance was a waste of money and time, and asked the Board to vote no on the ordinance.

Wyatt Vaughn stated he and his church were concerned about Section 3, regarding the group gatherings. He stated under the new ordinance, a permit would be necessary and certain requirements such as medical facilities and security for a church revival. He stated it is unknown if more than 500 will attend the revivals. He added that as a Pastor, this puts extra strain on trying to host a revival.

Denise Jackson, of Meherrin, said that she has land and wants to put an addition onto her house for her ill father. Her concern was that she would have to remove the addition should something happen to her father in the future. Mr. Pickett said he can live in the house and the addition would not have to be removed as it would be part of the structure. He said the goal of the accessory apartment stipulation is to ensure the lot is large enough to support the number of dwellings. Ms. Jackson asked if after her father moved out, she could rent it to a college student. Mr. Pickett said that is prohibited.

Another citizen came forward and said that he lives in his own home, which he was able to afford under the old zoning plan. He said that if changed, young people will not be able to afford a home of their own.

Gregory Hicks, of Rice, stated that he is a property owner and business owner, and he attended the meeting on March 13th (2007). He said that if a person has a business that has been closed for two years, that person should be permitted to re-open the business, and it should be the individual's choice. He said his parents followed the American dream and instilled in him to do the same.

Mr. Hicks added that while it was said notices had gone out to all property owners, his neighbor hadn't known about the meeting. He said there are 15,000 in the county, but only the concerned show up at

the meeting, adding "you can be concerned and don't know about what's going on." He questioned the family estate exemptions, changes in assessments of the property.

Mary Whitlock said she owns property and a business, and asked what was wrong with the ordinance as it stood. Mr. Pickett said that it was very loosely written. He gave an example of protecting a homeowner from having a 24-hour car repair station or a Sheetz open right next door without having a public review process. Ms. Whitlock asked how the new zoning changes would affect that. Mr. Pickett stated there would need to be a special use permit issued and to get neighbors' input. Ms. Whitlock said she wants to know which changes would benefit the people, and said the Board had to represent the people.

Chairman Fore asked if there were further comments. There being no one else wishing to speak, Chairman Fore closed the public hearing.
