## In Re: Fire Association Capital Expenditure Financing Fund

In 2011, the Board of Supervisors approved the creation of the Fire Association Capital Expenditure Financing Fund. The County will make available up to a total of \$600,000 in low interest financing to the members of the Prince Edward Area Firefighters Association (to include Prince Edward Volunteer Rescue Squad) for the purchase of trucks and apparatus. This agreement, signed by all of the Volunteer Fire Departments and the Rescue Squad contains the procedures by which the Fire Association will request funds to be provided and for which the County will create a promissory note, and provides that in the event of a default, each member of the Association guarantees repayment of the loan.

Section 15.20954 of the *Code of Virginia* authorizes any locality to make loans to any nonprofit organization furnishing firefighting or rescue services.

At present, the Prospect Volunteer Fire Department has the only outstanding loan. They borrowed

\$187,500 in March 2016.

Mr. Brian Butler, President of the Volunteer Rescue Squad, stated that at its January 25, 2017

meeting, the Prince Edward Area Firefighters Association approved a request from the Prince Edward

Volunteer Rescue Squad for \$120,000 of funding to finance four cardiac monitors/defibrillators.

Mr. Butler reported 3,178 calls emergency calls were received, and said cardiac

monitors/defibrillators are required on every EMS vehicle according to state requirements. He said the

defibrillators are eleven years old, some are failing and four defibrillators must be replaced, at a cost of

\$37,000 each. Mr. Butler said the machines can monitor additional conditions of the patient which increases

the cost. He said the loan of \$120,000 under the terms of the Agreement which will be used to cover the

amount not covered by the state grant.

Chairman Jones asked if all will be replaced; Mr. Butler said they will still be short one unit.

Supervisor Timmons shared a personal experience, giving commendations to the Rescue Squad in

quick response times.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Gray, to approve the request from the

In Re: Electronic Meeting Policy

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, stated that at the request of Supervisor Calvin Gray, staff has

researched and developed a draft Electronic Meeting Policy, as allowed by the Virginia Freedom of

Information Act / Code of Virginia.

Section 2.2-3708.1 of the *Code of Virginia* enables individual members of public bodies to participate in a meeting through electronic communication means from a remote location that is not open to the public in the event of an emergency or personal matter, or temporary or permanent disability.

Remote participation by a member of a public body requires that the public body has adopted a written policy allowing for and governing the participation of its members by electronic communication means.

A draft policy has been developed for consideration by the Board of Supervisors; staff followed guidance provided by the Virginia Freedom of Information Advisory Council.

Mr. Ennis stated the written policy must be strictly adhered to and cannot violate FOIA; participation would be granted unless there is a violation of FOIA or if the participation would be challenged by another Board member. He stated there would have to be advance notice, the vote of the remote participant would be recorded, and the meeting must be at the regular meeting place. These remotely attended meetings are limited to two a year, or 25% of meetings, whichever is fewer. Remote attendance would be a matter of necessity and not a matter of convenience.

Supervisor Timmons asked if there is currently a policy requiring members to be in attendance. Mr. Bartlett stated there have been one or two instances in which a member attended via the computer in 2010 and the requirement for a written policy was added to the Code in 2013.

Supervisor Timmons stated the meetings are scheduled a year in advance and the constituents deserve their supervisors being in attendance.

Supervisor Gray stated all supervisors are deeply concerned about the County and their constituents but all may have a major crisis. If there are options, it gives all the opportunity to be involved in spite of emergency situations. He added the electronic devices are part of the norm now and as long as protocol is followed, they can attend that way if not in the physical sense.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion to not approve the Electronic Meeting Policy; the motion failed due to lack of a second.

Supervisor Townsend made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Wilck, to approve the Electronic Meeting Policy as presented; the motion carried:

## Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors Electronic Meeting Policy

It is the policy of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Prince Edward, Virginia, that individual Board of Supervisors members may participate in meetings of the Board of Supervisors by electronic means s permitted by *Virginia Code § 2.2-3708.1*.

This policy shall apply to the entire membership and without regard to the identity of the member requesting remote participation or the matters that will be considered or voted on the meeting.

Whenever an individual member wishes to participate from a remote location, the law requires a quorum of the Board of Supervisors to by physically assembled at the primary or central meeting location, and there must be arrangements for the voice of the remote participant to be heard by all persons at the primary or central meeting location.

When such individual participation is due to an emergency or personal matter, such participation is limited by law to two meetings or 25 percent of the meetings of the public body per member each calendar year, whichever is fewer.

Members requesting remote participation must notify the Board Chair on or before the day of the meeting of his/her inability to attend and provide the specific reason for the request, acceptable under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. The nature of the member's emergency, personal matter, disability or medical condition, and the remote location from which the Board member is participating, must be identified and recorded in the minutes.

Individual participation from a remote location shall be approved, unless such participation would violate the policy or the provisions of the *Virginia Freedom of Information Act*.

If a member's participation from a remote location is challenged, then the Board of Supervisors shall vote whether to allow such participation. If the Board of Supervisors votes to disapprove of the member's participation because such participation would violate this policy, such disapproval shall be recorded in the minutes with specificity.

## In Re: Public Hearing – Amendment to the County Zoning Ordinance

Chairman Jones announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on amendments to the Prince Edward County Zoning Ordinance. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, February 3, 2017 and Friday, February 10, 2017 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Bartlett stated Prince Edward County staff was contacted regarding the process to establish a Transitional Living Facility in the A1, Agricultural Conservation zoning district. After reviewing the current zoning ordinance, it was determined there is not a use classification that would allow this type of use in any zone in the County.

Staff developed a definition and presented an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to add the definition and the use type to the uses allowed in both the A1 and A2 zones via a special use permit. The Planning Commission held a public hearing on January 17, 2017 to obtain public comment on the proposed amendment. Only one person spoke, in opposition to amending the zoning ordinance to add the use type and to allow such a use in the A1 or A2 zones. The Farmville Area Rescue Mission (FARM) presented letters in support of the amendment.

Applicants would have to meet the current development standards outlined in the Ordinance and comply with any additional building codes or other state agency requirements.

The amendment to the Zoning Ordinance would add the following definition of Transitional Housing Facility to Article VI, Section 6-200.3, Residential Use Types:

**Transitional Living Facility** – A facility providing housing / shelter primarily to homeless or transient persons and which may provide ancillary services such as counseling and/or vocational training. Number of occupants to be determined by special use permit, Fire and Building Codes.

The proposed amendment would also amend Sections 2-100.3.B.2 and 2-200.3.B.2 by adding the Transitional Living Facility as a use authorized in the A1 and A2 zones via a special use permit.

The Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission conducted a joint Public Hearing on this matter on December 13, 2016 and referred the matter back to the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on January 17, 2017 and recommends against approving the amendment.

Mr. Bartlett stated this public hearing is on the amendment only and not a specific parcel of land.

Supervisor Wilck asked if this would apply to industrial zoned districts; Mr. Bartlett said it would not, nor commercial districts. He added that if the amendment is disapproved, the whole topic is finished, but if the amendment is approved, it would go back to the Planning Commission and then return to the Board regarding a specific location.

Chairman Jones questioned the ability of churches to provide the service in the event it is not approved. Mr. Bartlett said he was unsure and would have to research state code.

Chairman Jones opened the public hearing.

Deborah Warner stated she attended the hearing on December 13, 2016, to house homeless people. She provided copies of a petition, signed by neighbors of the property, and gathered 25 more signatures prior to this public hearing. She asked the Board to set aside the Planning Commission's recommendation so there can be a transitional living facility in the A1 and A2 districts. Ms. Warner stated packets of information regarding her organization were delivered to the Board members; they are a state corporation and non-profit entity, and this is the eighth winter of sheltering people, with no negative impact. She said her organization is an asset to the community and that picks up the pieces that no one else can pick up. She said they are not asking for funds. Ms. Warner stated from January 2010 through October 2016, only 28 people were assisted. In 2015, in conjunction with the Salvation Army, over 300 people were in crises with no place to go.

Bemeché Hicks, Lockett District, stated he is in support of transitional housing in A1 or A2 Districts; he said anyone could need this type of assistance.

Ann Lund, Farmville District, requested the amendment be approved and asked the Board think carefully about facilities in area.

Johnna Shular, President of Farmville Area Rescue Mission, stated FARM only operated three months of the year until recently and worked in conjunction with the hospital and DSS. She said she would love to see Prince Edward County be the only county in seven to have a shelter. She then asked for a process to be able to assist people as they are still receiving calls for help. She then asked the Board for their support and approve the amendment to the ordinance.

Monroe Preston expressed his support for the approval of the zoning amendment, stating he has worked for 30 years at Crossroads and is the Chairman for Salvation Army. He presented several case studies. Mr. Preston said the amendment would provide safety for those in need as they are supervised and they are not supervised when they are on the streets.

Matthew Shannon, Pastor of Beulah AME Church, stated F.A.R.M. makes a difference in people's lives. He asked that the Board support the amendment, and stated the Board's mission is to provide for all citizens, provide essential services and enhance the quality of life.

Donna Raitter said if the Board is fearful something bad will happen, they will be fearful every day. She said her fear is that someone would die; someone did freeze to death in Farmville which is one too many. She said a place in or around Farmville would be great.

Joe Huddleston, Buffalo District, asked the Board not to change the ordinance. He said a petition with 29 signatures was previously submitted. He stated he is not opposed to a house, but is against what this house would be used for. He stated there is no need in this area.

Kenneth Jackson, Lockett District, stated every month the Board meetings are opened with a prayer, and stated we all need to care about each other. He said anyone may need the help at any time; this is not about "winos" but says that not approving this tells people that the citizens of Prince Edward County will not help one another and they should go somewhere else. He asked the Board to approve the amendment to the ordinance and that this is needed. Mr. Jackson said he is thankful we have the luxury of going home tonight, to sleep in a warm bed, to get food from the refrigerator and we should not spit on those who don't.

Josh Blakely asked the Board to support the amendment, and said while it would have been easier for him and his family to stay home, his four-year old told him it is not good that people have no place to live and "we need to fix that." He said there are people in the community that want to make a difference, "we just need to get out of the way." He said it's been stated there isn't a safety concern, there have been no incidents, and there is an operation in place; just let them do it.

Deanna Bennett stated while there is a need in the County, it needs to be within the Town. She suggested the operation continue but within the town limits and not in A1 or A2.

Carly Hanback, Longwood University student, stated she and her sorority have adopted the Farmville Homeless Shelter as an opportunity to give back and help the community; she said the gratitude has been overwhelming.

Ben Campbell, Farmville District, asked the Board to approve the amendment and allow each to be determined on a case by case basis; if it is not approved, the Board is closing the door on all opportunities.

John Shular stated he is an emergency therapist at Crossroads, assessing delusional patients. He said this crisis does exist in all districts, supervised or not. He said there is no zoning when it comes to crisis.

There being no one further wishing to talk, Chairman Jones closed the public hearing.

Chairman Jones stated he initially voted to deny the change because he is not sure about having this in a residential area, but without the amendment churches cannot provide the service without the permission to do so. He added if churches in the rural areas wish to step up and help, they should be allowed to.

Supervisor Timmons stated he is not opposed to the service but should not be in the A1 or A2 districts. He said with no security or services outside of the town limits, it could create an issue the County doesn't want to get into. He said potentially, if there is an issue, it would take a good while for deputies or an ambulance to get there. He said it should be closer to services in town, and he is opposed to the change.

Supervisor Gray stated the Board needs to look at the Mission Statement; the Board must recognize the needs of all citizens. He said there is no guarantee nothing will happen in any determination of any building. Supervisor Gray said the Board must look at the expansion in the County and to disallow this would limit the County.

Supervisor Townsend stated the Board does need to consider the Mission Statement, adding that everyone counts and the Board must do what is morally right. Supervisor Townsend stated that the concept should not be excluded just because the potential location may not be the best. He said the Board is in the business of helping people.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated the Board has been told everything is perfect with F.A.R.M., but it is not, and they turned away someone in December [2016]. She said she doesn't have a problem with a transitional shelter because there are people in need everywhere; churches are a great place for this service.

Supervisor Timmons stated churches have special rules and asked if it is possible to table this issue to see if the churches are able to assist without changing the ordinance. He added the Mission Statement was misrepresented as it states the Board will *represent* all citizens. He added he would like a small subcommittee formed to find a place to meet the criteria and find a means to obtain that property.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, to table action on the zoning amendment until it can be determined that churches have an exemption to enable them to assist without changing the ordinance to serve the people on this need.

Supervisor Gray suggested reviewing both issues, the ordinance and finding a specific house or location. He said tonight's topic is to be determine if the ordinance is good for the County, it doesn't change a determination on a specific house or location of that house. He said that after it is determined that the

ordinance is good for the County, then discussion can be held regarding a particular location or area for a transitional home. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Timmons called for the motion, seconded by Supervisor Cooper-Jones, to table the addition of the proposed amendment to the County Zoning Ordinance regarding the Transitional Living Facility definition to the A1 and A2 zones with a Special Use Permit; the motion failed:

Supervisor Simpson said with Zoning and with a Conditional or Special Use Permit, these can be required to renew their use each year or two; the Board would set the stipulations of their operation.

The property is zoned A2, Agricultural Residential District. Section 2-2200.3 of the County Zoning

### In Re: Strategic Planning Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Strategic Planning Committee comprising Supervisor Wilck (Chair), Supervisor Gray and Supervisor Pride, met on February 6, 2017 to review the progress made on the three-year strategic work plan. Staff presented an update to the Committee.

Mr. Bartlett stated County staff will begin using the Road Maintenance Tracking Log immediately. The first Quarterly Financial Report will be presented to the Board of Supervisors at the April meeting of the Board of Supervisors and will cover the first nine months of the Fiscal Year (July 2016 – March 2017).

#### Critical Target Area 1 – Economic Development

- 1. Contact VDACS and Department of Forestry (DOF) to build inventory of assets
- 2. Contact regional businesses / individuals to identify impediments.
- 3. Based on findings develop a plan to eliminate impediments.

#### C. Access to broadband and other critical infrastructure

## In Re: Properties & Community Development Committee Report

Supervisor Timmons said the Properties and Community Development Committee, comprising Supervisor Gray, Supervisor Timmons and Supervisor Townsend, met Thursday, February 9, 2017 at 5:00 p.m. The Committee met with the engineering firm to review their contract language and the scope of work;

the Committee is expecting another response on February 21 [2017] with adjustments to their proposal. He said the Committee will review and bring the Committee's recommendation to the Board at the next monthly meeting.

### In Re: Personnel Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett stated the Personnel Committee, comprising Supervisor Simpson (Chair), Supervisor Pride, Supervisor Timmons and Supervisor Townsend met on January 19, 2017 to review a request from the Commonwealth's Attorney.

The Commonwealth's Attorney is requesting the salary for her County funded position be increased from the current \$25,422 to \$30,248. This is the same rate as the other two secretarial positions in her office. The incumbent was hired in February 2016 at a rate significantly lower than the prior incumbent and has completed her probationary period.

Per Ms. Clark, the employee has quickly grasped the responsibilities of the position and has far exceeded expectations.

This salary adjustment would increase County expenses by \$5,687.92 annually. If the request is approved effective February 1, 2017, the increase in personnel cost would be \$2,369.97 for the remainder of this Fiscal Year. To offset this increase, Ms. Clark is proposing her travel accounts be reduced by \$1,500. The Commonwealth's Attorney's Services Council will be reimbursing the travel expenses for four of Ms. Clark's employees to attend the annual Spring Institute. This reimbursement was not known when the budget was prepared and will result in a reduction of travel expenses. In addition, there will be a savings of \$1,130 in telecommunications expenses. Ms. Clark eliminated a state contract that provided wireless service for the offices iPads when she eliminated the use of the iPads. The savings from those two accounts total \$2,630 and more than offsets the increase of \$2,369.97 for her request.

As a reminder to the Committee, due to personnel turnover the Commonwealth's Attorney's budget is approximately \$70,000 less this Fiscal Year than last year.

The Personnel Committee unanimously recommends the Board approve this request. This will not increase the total appropriations for the Commonwealth's Attorney's Department in this fiscal year; it is merely a transfer of funds within the department.
