## In Re: Public Participation

Mitch Dilly, Farmville District, stated he dropped off two dogs at the Prince Edward County Animal Shelter and asked the Animal Control Officer if he could volunteer and assist periodically with socializing and retraining the dogs, but was told that Prince Edward County is one of very few counties that do not allow volunteers into the Animal Control Center due to liability issues. He stated he has assisted with Cumberland County shelter in the past and would like to volunteer with Prince Edward County also. Mr. Dilly stated Longwood University and Hampden-Sydney students have shown interest in assisting with efforts to clean, exercise and socialize the animals with the intent to re-home the animals.

## In Re: Board of Supervisors Comments

Supervisor Gray welcomed those in attendance and said that while the issue with the water damage is a major concern, the other lingering issues need to be looked into, such as the Sheriff's office and other areas. He said it is embarrassing to go into some of the areas in the courthouse due to their appearance.

Supervisor Timmons welcomed all in attendance.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones welcomed all and stated she was invited to a meeting of the "Journey of Hope" group at Sheldon's in Keysville; the remarkable young men in "Journey of Hope" are riding bikes to raise money for disadvantaged youth. She said they stopped in Keysville on the way from California and Nevada, cross-country, and head north tomorrow.

Supervisor Wilck reported he and Supervisor Pride met with Farmville Downtown to add comments regarding the possibility of the boutique grocery store.

Supervisor Townsend thanked everyone for being supportive of the Board.

Supervisor Simpson thanked all for attending.

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## In Re: Virginia Department of Forestry

Mr. Tom Zaebst, Assistant State Forest Manager, presented to the Board the annual check in the amount of \$75,515.00 for the County's share of the proceeds of timber sales in the Prince Edward-Galleon State Forest. He stated this is from a mix of pine and hardwood on 89 acres of timber.

# In Re: Highway Matters

Supervisor Gray requested the time schedule and locations of VDOT mowing crews.

Supervisor Pride said when the grass is cut, the debris is visible. She added the shoulders on Abilene Road have a large drop-off.

Supervisor Timmons stated VDOT hasn't yet been to Darlington Heights area for mowing. He said the trash clean-up efforts through the jail are working well through the established protocol. He reported that on Morris Creek Road from where the new guardrail was put in, north about a quarter mile to the top of the hill, there are uneven depressions or uneven pavement for about 75' in both lanes; these have been identified several times. Supervisor Timmons then asked about the schedule to begin the Rural Rustic program on Lakeside Drive; he said it was supposed to begin August 1, but hasn't yet. He then stated the entrance to the Darlington Heights convenience site has a large pothole right off Singleton Road.

Supervisor Pride added the shoulders on Abilene Road need work.

Chairman Jones stated tar and gravel has been put down, but there is a need for shoulders to be treated with "crush and run" as the drop-off is significant.

Supervisor Townsend requested a status update on the Campbell Crossing project.

## In Re: Amendment to County Fence Ordinance

Chairman Jones announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a public hearing on the proposed repeal and re-enactment of Section 10-11 of the County *Code*, to clarify that the boundary line of each lot or tract of land, or any stream in the County shall be a lawful fence as to any livestock, as defined by Section 3.2-5900 of the *Code of Virginia*, as amended; and that all livestock or poultry or other fowl shall be sufficiently confined or fenced to prevent them from trespassing or straying. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Wednesday, July 12, 2017, Wednesday, July 19, 2017, Wednesday, July 26, 2017 and Wednesday, August 2, 2017 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Jim Ennis, County Attorney, stated County Animal Control was in Circuit Court related to an appeal of a violation to the County Fence Ordinance and the judge ruled that the County's current Ordinance was unenforceable. He was asked to draft a new fence law that will be enforceable, and recommended the repeal of the current fence ordinance and the re-enactment of the proposed new Section 10-11 of the County Code. He stated the new Section 10-11 would allow for a civil penalty of \$250 for a knowing violation

whereas the old fence law classified a violation as a misdemeanor and punished in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Virginia, which are criminal code violations. This would make it a civil violation and subject to a civil penalty of \$250 for a knowing violation; the language in the new fence law makes it unlawful for any person to allow or permit any livestock hereinabove by the *Code of Virginia*, or poultry or fowl of any description, owned by him or her, or under his or her control, to stray upon any highway or public property or private premises of another, and all livestock or poultry or other fowl are to be sufficiently confined or fenced by the owner or person exercising control over the same so as to prevent them from trespassing or straying.

Supervisor Simpson questioned the fee of \$250. Mr. Ennis explained that is the cost of the civil violation if the judge finds the owner allowed or permitted the livestock to stray on someone else's property. That is a factual determination that the judge would make on whether or not the owner permitted the animal to do it, or allowed the animal to do it. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Simpson questioned if this fee is per head or if a tree knocks over a fence and they get out. Mr. Ennis said that would be part of the factual determination that the Animal Warden and the courts would look at, such as what caused the fence to be down, how long it would take from notification of the animal roaming, to how long it takes until the animals are under control. It would not be per animal but per occurrence.

Mr. Bartlett stated the enforcement would not change the County's current policy. The current policy is to first provide a warning to the landowner before a ticket is issued. The County takes into account the reason the animal is out. The only change is to allow enforcement. The Animal Control Officers have discretion as to when tickets are written according to County policy. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gray asked if there is a specific time given after the warning is given. Mr. Bartlett stated it would be dependent upon the circumstances, as in the case of a large storm. Widespread damage could keep fence repairs from happening and that would be taken into consideration. He said the main purpose of the ordinance is to maintain public safety.

Chairman Jones opened the public hearing.

David Emert, Prospect District, said he understood Mr. Ennis to say there would be a time that people would be notified that their animals are out. He said he is the President of the Farm Bureau, and he

is in attendance on their behalf; he stated the Farm Bureau opposes this proposed ordinance. He asked when this ordinance came about, and if the concern is the roads only, why can't the language dictate that it would be highways rather than the wording of a boundary line of each creek to be considered a lawful fence. He asked about the boundaries and lawful fence definitions.

Mr. Bartlett stated the Section is concerning lawful fences, and those are considered fences. He stated that his concern is about the roads, but other people are concerned about their own property.

Chairman Jones stated there are other concerns when livestock gets out, such as crop damage, physical damage to buildings, hay storage buildings and many other things. Discussion followed.

Mr. Emert said he was opposed to the ordinance the County had already and is opposed to the proposed ordinance.

Jeannette Tarlton, Prospect District, stated she raised free-range turkeys in the past and questioned if they are considered "pets" or "livestock" in the Code. She said she currently has four turkeys as pets, and asked how many she may own and if they must be confined. She said neighbors have calves and goats.

Mr. Bartlett stated there is another ordinance that deals with poultry; the Code sets forth a limit before you would have to comply with certain Zoning restrictions. He added it is the owner's responsibility to determine the type of fencing used to confine their animals.

Ms. Tarlton said a responsible owner is going to be responsible, and will take care of their animals. She said these ordinances are too hard on people and the restrictions harm the community.

Tim Dotson, Lockett District, said he opposed the proposed ordinance because if a storm comes and animals run out, then [the Animal Control Officers] go out and start issuing fines to people.

Chairman Jones said that is when the Animal Control Officers can make a determination as to what caused the animals to be out. He said if there isn't some type of ordinance, there could be no penalties even if someone lets their cows run free.

Mr. Bartlett stated the County had a "fence out" situation about 15 years ago; it was up to each individual owner to build a fence around their own land to keep someone else's animal off their property.

Chairman Jones said the County has to have guidelines and punishments for those that do not follow the guidelines. For reasonable people, it is fine. He said the Animal Control Officers would make sure it is the owner of the animal and not necessarily the property owner that could be found negligent.

Supervisor Gray said the wording is soft enough for the County and the citizens to work together.

He said there must be a concern about roaming animals and all of the citizens; he added there is no perfect code or solution. The Board must do its best for every property owner or animal owner.

Chairman Jones asked if the Farm Bureau has any type of fencing ordinances in the counties they are in. Mr. Emert said while each county has their own, there are State laws in place so counties don't have to have an ordinance. He said because Virginia is a Commonwealth, county, city or municipality law supersedes state law and can yield more penalty than what the State imposes.

Mr. Ennis stated the Counties derive all of their power and authority from the Commonwealth of Virginia. He said the state ordinances addressing fencing issues empower the counties to enact an ordinance to be enforced at the local level rather than operate under the state statute. He said county ordinance cannot have a punishment greater than state statute; it can have a lesser punishment, but not a greater punishment. He stated the old ordinance made the offense a Class 4 Misdemeanor and would require a criminal fine of \$250.

Supervisor Timmons stated it would be in a person's criminal history; a civil fine wouldn't be on a person's record. A criminal record would impact someone later on in their life.

Mr. Bartlett stated Prince Edward County has an administrative policy in place. He said an Administrative Policy could be written down and memorialized. Discussion followed on the administrative policy.

Supervisor Simpson questioned who would collect and receive the \$250 fine. Mr. Bartlett stated it would be the same as all tickets written to the County; fines and penalties are returned to the County. He said putting in too many restrictions would not allow the Animal Control Officers to have discretion.

Supervisor Timmons stated the Judge sets the penalty. He said he has neighbors that have cows which get out, and he assists them in putting them back in. He said there is a problem when the fences don't get fixed and the cows keep getting out. He said it then becomes his responsibility to fence his property to keep his neighbor's animals off his property.

A citizen asked for clarification on the definition of a fence and stream. Mr. Bartlett stated that in the State Code, any stream or river is a fence if it's a boundary of your property. He said it makes the owner

responsible if the boundary has an actual fence or not; the boundary is a fence whether there is a stream or not. He said it is your responsibility to keep your animals contained and on your property.

Mr. Ennis stated there is an element of intent with the words "permit" or "allow." He said it must be demonstrated to show the owner's intent to allow the livestock to run at large, and part of being able to show that is that you have been put on notice that the livestock is out of its boundaries, that there is a problem with your fence, and then it becomes a factual question of what steps were taken to recover your livestock, and how quickly did you react, did you make repairs or did you allow your fence to stay in disrepair, or how long they were permitted to run at large without any extenuating circumstances. This goes to show the owner's intent to allow the animals to run at large. Those words are critical to the interpretation of the statute because it's not meant to cover situations like a tree that has fallen on a fence and nobody knows about it and the animals get out. The owner isn't allowing or permitting that to happen; it's unknown to you. But once you are notified, then the question becomes how quickly the matter is resolved. He said a responsible owner is going to make an effort to recover his livestock because he has an economic interest in it. Mr. Ennis said the judge and the Animal Warden will take all of that into consideration.

Supervisor Simpson asked who set the amount at \$250. Mr. Ennis stated it is in other fence laws across the state; the selection of that amount was arbitrary and the Board can change it. Chairman Jones said that is the maximum and the judge can change it.

Jimmy Garnett said it is time to repeal the old ordinance but [the Board should] hold off on putting a new one in effect. He said the citizens have a lot of questions with no answers.

A citizen questioned how soon after being fined could they be fined again. Chairman Jones stated you don't get a fine just because a cow gets out. You get a fine if you don't do anything to fix your fences. First you receive a warning and if you resolve the situation, it's done. But if a cow gets out and nothing is done, you receive a summons for court. He said the proposed ordinance states you could be fined if the judge finds you negligent. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Gray stated he loves his animals and responsible owners take care of their animals.

Supervisor Timmons stated the reason the current ordinance is being reviewed is that it is unenforceable in court. He said that for a fine to be issued, someone has to make no effort to contain their animals, and that if you are making an effort to keep your animal protected, you will never see any of this.

Mr. Emert stated he and members of the Farm Bureau would be more than happy to work with the

County Attorney

Sharon Dotson asked if there have been multiple complaints and problems in the County that makes

this ordinance necessary. She asked that the proposed ordinance could be more explicit. She requested that

it be written so it is more easily understood.

Mr. Bartlett listed hogs, cows, horses, donkeys, mules, emu, and a bull; all were issues recently.

Mr. Bartlett then said there is legal precedence as to how ordinances must be written and that is left to the

Attorney to best write the ordinance. He said this proposed ordinance mirrors those in other counties.

Joe Huddleston asked if this pertains to all farm animals. Mr. Bartlett stated all are considered

livestock as set forth in the Code of Virginia; there is another ordinance for fowl.

Chairman Jones said what the County considers livestock is set by State Code. He said law

enforcement has to use discretion every day, and the County is fortunate to have such good Animal Control

Officers.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Jones closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Timmons made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Gray, to approve the repeal of the

current fence ordinance and the re-enactment of the new Section 10-11 of the County Code, and to develop

a written Administrative Policy.

Supervisor Simpson made a substitute motion, seconded by Chairman Jones, to allow three or four

farmers, the President of the Farm Bureau, and the County Attorney to meet to draft an ordinance, and to

write an Administrative Policy: the motion carried:

Mr. Ennis said if the proposed ordinance is changed, there will need to be another public hearing.

Rick Ewing, Library Director, sent a letter to the County indicating that Megan Miller has tendered

her resignation. The Board authorized advertising this vacancy as a four-year term of office expiring June

30, 2021, in order to properly re-align the rotation of the library board members' terms of office.

Supervisor Simpson made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Wilck, to appoint Vicky Page to a

four-year term of office expiring June 30, 2021; the motion carried:

In Re: Public Information

Chairman Jones stated he has noticed an increase in the frequency of errors in articles in The

Farmville Herald reporting various issues concerning Prince Edward County. He said that over the last few

months, he and County staff have found and reported the following errors:

- April 7, 2017 – an article stated there would be a tax increase in the FY18 Budget, when in fact there

was no tax increase.

- April 28, 2017 – the Herald reported the Board had approved an increase in funding for the Library

of \$86,000 when in fact the increase was \$6,000.

June 9, 2017 – the Herald reported Prince Edward County had a real estate tax rate of \$0.52 vice the

correct amount of \$0.51.

July 21, 2017 – the Herald published an article stating the local funds provided to the Prince Edward

County Schools would be \$5,521,814 for FY18 when in fact the amount is \$8,440,984.

Chairman Jones said the Board takes pride in the fact that Prince Edward County provides more

funding to their schools than any other surrounding county. He said the Farmville Herald prints the budget

and can refer to itself for the proper amounts. Chairman Jones said each correction is found in small print on

a back page of the paper. He said these are the newspaper's mistakes and the Board is not happy with how the corrections are shown.

Supervisor Gray said when the press makes these types of errors, the corrections need the same amount of exposure as the mistakes.

Supervisor Wilck agreed and stated if the error is on the front page, the correction should be on the front page.

Supervisor Pride stated that her photo was not included when all of the other supervisor's photos were printed and the comment from the newspaper was that there wasn't enough space; in another instance, her mileage was the only one omitted. She said her constituents asked if it was a personal thing that she has been omitted.

Supervisor Timmons said it takes time to correct the newspaper's reports; he said he sometimes has to print out the documents and take them to citizen's homes to prove that he is telling the truth and that the mistake is that of the newspaper. He said the reporters need to do a better job writing and doing research; he requested a meeting with management to find what will be done or there may be a need to find another paper in which to advertise. He said he is frustrated and to put a retraction six pages back is not fair to the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones left the meeting at this time.

Chairman Jones said he appreciated the meeting with Management but more contact with staff may be necessary. He said this must be corrected and he hopes the newspaper will stand up to its reputation.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones returned to the meeting at this time.

Supervisor Simpson said the newspaper has already set up workers to double-check the work before it is printed.

<u>In Re: County Administrator's Report – Meeting with Legislators</u>

Mr. Bartlett reported the County received a letter from Virginia Senator Mark Peake requesting to

schedule a meeting with local leaders to provide him legislative insight on issues and receive input on various

matters.

Mr. Bartlett said the Senator would like to meet sometime in August or September. In the past, the

County has worked with the Town, Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney College and Centra to host a

joint meeting for both our Senator and Delegate. This was not the case last year.

Mr. Bartlett said he contacted representatives of both Delegate Edmunds and Senator Peake and

both are interested in holding a joint meeting again. He stated he has not yet received a response from the

Town.

Supervisor Simpson left the meeting at this time.

Supervisor Gray expressed his anticipation on working with the Town and sharing the information

with the State.

Supervisor Wilck stated the delegate does not seem to be interested in coming to Prince Edward

County and has been holding meetings in Keysville.

Supervisor Timmons asked for clarification that the Legislative Committee meeting will be

scheduled with the Town to get everyone together. Chairman Jones said it will be scheduled to get as many

together as possible.

Mr. Bartlett added that the Town [of Farmville], Hampden Sydney [College], and Longwood

[University] will also be contacted to take part.

Supervisor Wilck stated there was a point where there was a rotation for the meetings to be held at

Hampden Sydney and Longwood, as far as donating a free room.

Supervisor Simpson returned to the meeting at this time.

## In Re: Virginia Resource Authority Refinancing

Mr. Bartlett reported that on June 13, 2017, the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors authorized the refinancing of portions of General Obligation Bonds and Lease Revenue Bonds issued in 2011 if the net present value savings would be at least 3%. The Virginia Resource Authority went out to the bond market on August 2, 2017.

Mr. Bartlett said that during the presentation on June 13, 2017, the savings estimate was \$532,764 for a net present value of 7.72%. The actual savings realized are \$652,417, with a new present value of 9.68%, which is well above the target rate. The savings have been structured to be back loaded as requested by the Board of Supervisors.

#### In Re: Fiscal Stress

Mr. Bartlett reported the General Assembly has directed the Auditor of Public Accounts (APA) to develop a system to detect localities in fiscal distress. The goal for the system designed is to allow the Commonwealth the ability to flag any localities that may be in financial trouble. The APA has developed a model using a locality's ratio of reserves relative to its liabilities, and the size of its cash reserves relative to its General Fund revenues and expenses to develop a Financial Assessment score. The model has not been completed and changes may and probably will occur before it is ready for use. It uses data contained in a locality's annual audit and consists of a considerable amount of data and ratio calculations.

Mr. Bartlett said that with the model as it exists, Prince Edward County's Financial Assessment score is above the County average and significantly above the score that the state is considering using as an indication of financial stress. The state is considering using a Financial Assessment Score of 15% or less to indicate a locality in fiscal stress. Prince Edward County's three-year average has been 62%. Mr. Bartlett said this is another indication of the conservative budgeting practices followed by the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors, and all indicators show Prince Edward County is financially healthy.

## In Re: Property & Community Development Committee Report

Supervisor Timmons said the Property and Community Development Committee, comprising Supervisor Timmons (Chair), Supervisor Gray and Supervisor Townsend met on July 26, 2017, to review

the Courthouse renovation project and the scope of work for each floor, ensure the architect knew the appropriate people to interview, ascertain if the County wanted the Architect to work with any other consultants on this project (the County does not), and review the proposed budget and project schedule. He said the architects conducted a needs assessment with the different departments to see what is needed and what can be done with the space available to utilize the space more efficiently.

The Committee will meet every two weeks with the architect to review progress, answer any questions and ensure the project stays within budget.

Supervisor Timmons stated the architect has been released to do his design, which is the first step.

The goal is to have the design finished by the end of this year, award a contract for construction by the end of January and finish by the end of next year.

#### In Re: Water Leak

Mr. Bartlett reported a water leak occurred and the building sustained damage on approximately 4,000 square feet on the third, second and first floors; the basement sustained minor damage. He said the insurance company was in the courthouse earlier, and ServiceMaster was hired to dry out the damaged areas. It will take most of this week before the rooms are dry; carpets, baseboards and possibly some drywall will need to be replaced.

Supervisor Timmons requested work be done in the Sheriff's Office; Supervisor Simpson requested work on the carpets be done in the Social Services area also. Discussion followed.

Supervisor Simpson said citizens have requested a hand rail for the stairs entering the building on the Town Hall building side of the courthouse. Supervisor Timmons said the Properties Committee will look at it on Monday. Discussion followed.
