June 10, 2014

At the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Prince Edward County, held at the Court House, thereof, on Tuesday, the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June, 2014; at 7:00 p.m., there were present:

Chairman Simpson called the meeting to order. Supervisor Townsend offered the invocation.

Chairman Simpson read the following into the record:

"On June 9, 2014, the Personnel Committee of the Prince Edward County Board of Supervisors met to discuss the events of June 6, 2014 which involved the County Administrator, Wade Bartlett. After meeting with Mr. Bartlett, the Committee determined that more information is necessary before making any recommendation to the Board regarding the need for sanctions, if any. The Personnel Committee will continue to gather facts in order to determine what sanctions would be appropriate if found guilty of the current charge and whether or not sanctions would be justified regardless of the findings of the criminal justice system."

#### In Re: Public Participation

**Juanita Taylor**, Farmville District, asked why the shops in town are closing and why the grocery stores raise their prices at the beginning of the month when seniors receive their Social Security or Disability checks. She also requested a bus shelter at the Greyhound station.

**Sam Campbell**, Prospect District, requested that new school board members are chosen for appointment and not reappointed. He stated the citizens will take action to change the selection of school board members to election instead of Board appointment. He then questioned Chairman Simpson on the "State of the County" speech.

Chairman Simpson said his attention has been on the budget; he may get to a speech as time allows.

**Fred Floyd**, Prospect District, requested the satellite landfill, which is currently closed on Tuesdays, to be open seven days a week. He said trash is left there when it is closed and it blows around.

**Lowell Frye**, Farmville District, stated he is in favor of fully funding the schools, library and Emergency Services.

**Kenneth Jackson**, Lockett District, expressed his thanks to the Finance Committee for their work, and stated the Committee did not call for teacher position cuts but level funding for the schools and stated the \$92,000 for debt service is money that is not needed; he asked that changes are made in the School Board membership. Mr. Jackson stated the citizens will not tolerate intoxication or cover-ups.

#### Southard Brumfield, Farmville District, stated:

Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, I'm Southard Brumfield and I appear before you today pursuant to Virginia Code 15.2-1245, to present a claim on behalf of Booth & Company for \$750,000, the amount which is still owed to Booth & Company, plus three percent interest for nine years, nine plus years, for a total of \$750,000 for the building of the sewer system under the – that serves the Manor Resort.

In November 19, 2008, the County adopted an ordinance which required that before any utility can be accepted into the County system, the owner had to demonstrate that all the contractors and builders had been paid in full. Less than a year later, the County entered

into an agreement with Herberton to do just that, accept waste from the system, without requiring Herberton showing Booth & Company had been paid in full.

But for the County's action, I believe, that Herberton would have had no choice but to see to it that contractors were paid, otherwise it could not have proceeded. Because the contractor -- the County violated its own ordinance, an ordinance adopted to protect contractors like Booth & Company. Booth & Company has implied private right of action against the County. The damages include the full amount which is still owed to Booth & Company for \$750,000.

Alternatively, Booth & Company would be willing to compromise its claim if the County will grant it whatever interest it has in the sewer system serving the Manor Resort per the terms of the settlement agreement which Booth & Company has prepared. Since the County has indicated via its Administrative Attorney that it has no ownership, such a resolution would seem to be a win-win. Booth & Company would be free to continue to pursue a claim against Herberton and the County would be free of this particular claim.

Thank ya'll for your time.

**Richard Altice,** Hampden District, expressed his concern regarding the County's financial investment of \$250,000 in the YMCA; he stated government should not fund special interest groups.

**Henry Shelton,** Prospect District, thanked Supervisor Timmons, Supervisor Cooper-Jones and Supervisor Jones for their work on the Finance Committee, and stated he hopes the cuts will be sensible and reasonable figure so taxes won't have to be increased as much.

Jane Schirmer, YMCA, requested the Board to reconsider providing the funding for the summer camp. She stated other organizations were either sustained or reduced, but not cut fully. Ms. Schirmer added the funding assists those families that are low-income to ensure all kids have an opportunity for summer camp and other activities.

**Bemeché Hicks**, Lockett District, expressed his concern regarding the condition of High Rock Road, and said there are many potholes and the road is sinking. He added Haskin Road is worse. Mr. Hicks said the trees have overgrown on High Rock Road; he asked that these issues be addressed.

Mr. Hicks then stated he hopes the Personnel Committee takes action regarding the DUI.

Mr. Hicks closed by stating when his organization requested funds from the Board of Supervisors,

they had to show an itemized report; he requested that if the YMCA gets any funding, it must show an

itemized report.

Donna Pride, Leigh District, President of the Virso Recreation Center, requested consideration of

the approval of the \$10,000 appropriation to the Center. She stated Supervisor Townsend has been

appointed to oversee and to ensure resources are not abused.

Brenda Gray, Leigh District, Virso Recreation Center, spoke in favor of the allocation to the

Center as a place for the elders and youth.

Joyce Speakes, Buffalo District, thanked the Board for their work on the budget and thanked

Supervisor Timmons for holding the Town Hall meeting each quarter. She said there has been

improvement but the County still needs employment opportunities. She then requested the placement of

signs directing people to Farmville from Route I-95. She also requested public transportation, such as a bus

to Lynchburg.

## In Re: Highway Matters

Mr. Kevin Wright, VDOT, stated he will research the location mentioned by Mr. Hicks.

Mr. Wright said the projects are progressing on schedule; VDOT staff is busy with patching roads and mowing. He added the work on Route 15 near Lowe's is close to completion.

Supervisor Timmons reported high grass in the Darlington Heights area. Mr. Wright stated the staff is mowing as quickly as they can, but there is no funding for sub-contractors this year and it may take longer to accomplish.

Supervisor Timmons then thanked VDOT for resurfacing Five Forks Road, but the edge is now very high and in some places there is as much as two to three feet drop-off. Mr. Wright stated they are aware and crews will meet there tomorrow [June 11, 2014] to reshape the ditch and pull material to create a sloped shoulder.

Supervisor McKay stated in some areas, large sections of grass are not being cut by the mowers.

Mr. Wright said he will advise the staff to check their mowers.

Supervisor Townsend said Walton's Road can be deleted from the list as it has already been paved.

Chairman Simpson asked where the state law sets forth a 35 mile per hour speed limit. Mr. Wright stated all unpaved roads are 35 mph; VDOT does not post signs for statutory speed limits.

Chairman Simpson then questioned who is responsible for providing "Watch for Children" signs.

Mr. Wright stated information was presented to the County previously; VDOT does not post them any longer.

Supervisor Timmons questioned the process for a "Farmville" sign to be placed along Route 95 as suggested by Ms. Speakes. Mr. Wright stated signs only start if the town is on the corridor, such as on Route 45, Route 15, Route 460, and along Route 360 onto Route 307. He said he will inquire as to the size of the sign onto Route 307.

#### <u>In Re: Public Hearing – Six-Year Plan</u>

Chairman Simpson announced that this was the date and time scheduled for a joint Public Hearing with the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), in accordance with Section 33.1-70.01 of the

Code of Virginia, to receive public comment on the proposed Secondary Six-Year Plan for Fiscal Years 2015 through 2020 in Prince Edward County and on the Secondary System Construction Budget for Fiscal Year 2015. Notice of this hearing was advertised according to law in the Friday, May 30, 2014 and Friday, June 6, 2014 editions of THE FARMVILLE HERALD, a newspaper published in the County of Prince Edward.

Mr. Kevin Wright, VDOT, stated the latest figures have not yet been received; however, the allocations have been reviewed and this fiscal year, the County will receive \$132,000. In 2017, the County will receive closer to \$300,000.

John Adams, Buffalo District, requested work be done on Route 661, Nursery Road. He stated it is about two miles long and has had no major work done in his lifetime. At least three businesses and big trucks for the irrigation and nursery companies use the road, along with thirteen families. He added there is a big culvert approximately 15 feet deep and no shoulders. There are no signs warning of the danger. He requested the project be taken care of quickly.

Betty Baskin, Hampden District, asked if Route 701 could be added to the Six Year Plan as the road is very bumpy, there are steep hills and curves and it is very dusty. She asked how much the community would have to put together for it to be paved, to match the state funds.

Mr. Wright said to pave a road, the cost is \$135,000 per mile; two miles would be approximately \$270,000. The road would have to meet the criteria for Rural Rustic but the County may be able to use Tele-fee funds as they are not subject to restriction. Discussion followed.

A citizen from the Hampden District questioned the dates on the Six Year Plan. Mr. Wright stated the dates will change and were set prior to funding becoming available.

There being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Simpson closed the public hearing.

This amendment would clarify that the County's program includes the Town of Farmville.

In Re: Public Hearing: School Board Appointments

School Board must act to approve any change, she has 44 years' experience in teaching and has knowledge of the SOLs and remediation. She said her experience working with the students gives her the expertise to see the student as a whole.

Supervisor Timmons questioned Ms. Leatherwood about her experience in disciplinary matters.

In Re: Request from STEPS – Community Action Agency

Mr. Bartlett stated that with the de-designation of HOPE Community Services as the region's

community action agency, there is currently no agency providing the much-needed assistance to the

citizens of Prince Edward County that a Community Action Agency (CAA) normally provides. The

mission of a CAA is to fight poverty and build self-sufficiency for strong families and communities. CAAs

offer a broad range of anti-poverty programs and work collaboratively with business and other agencies to

build a network of support.

Mr. Bartlett reported he spoke with the Director of the Office of Volunteerism and Community Service about the region's lack of service, at which time he was informed that in the near future, the Virginia Department of Social Services would be issuing a request for applications to start the process of designating a new organization to serve as the Community Action Agency for this region.

STEPS has a strong desire to serve as the region's CAA and has submitted a letter requesting that Prince Edward County support STEPS in this endeavor. The Boards of Supervisors for the Counties of Cumberland, Buckingham and Nottoway have already voted to support STEPS' request. Senator Ruff has also written a letter of support to the Commissioner of the Virginia Department of Social Services.

Supervisor Timmons asked if any other agencies have made application. Mr. Bartlett said no other agencies have and there is no other local agency in the six-county region serving the entire region.

Ms. Sharon Harrup requested the Board support only STEPS' application and said her concern regarding the Weatherization Program is that if STEPS is not selected as the Weatherization provider, the funding for this region will be carved up to include the host region. She wants to ensure that the funding allotted for this region stays in this six-county region. Ms. Harrup advised the Board STEPS currently is the local agency to handle applications for the Dominion Virginia Power VA Energy Shares which has provided approximately \$12,000 to assist with citizens' utility costs. Ms. Harrup asked for the support of the Board to be the Community Action Agency for the region and requested the Board to complete the resolution to be included in the application packet for the designation.

Supervisor Timmons expressed his disappointment over the last few years in the agencies that provide this type of services to the citizens, and that services are not currently available to citizens because of the actions of the other agencies. He requested assurance that STEPS would be there for the citizens in five years.

Ms. Harrup stated the citizens deserve a provider and reviewed several of the issues STEPS faced in the past. She said DHCD requested STEPS run the Homeless Prevention program in the region and STEPS had to have a good track record and successes to be selected to run the Dominion Virginia Power Energy Shares Program.

Ms. Harrup then explained the new software and accounting system STEPS obtained at a cost of \$40,000; VHDA provided approximately \$24,000. The accounting system enables STEPS to provide

intricate accounting of the different programs. She stated the control of the accounting has to be the

cornerstone of whoever is chosen to be the Community Action Agency for this region. She elaborated on

the capabilities of the system.

Ms. Harrup emphasized that if an agency is not selected to serve only this region, the funding will

be lost to Lynchburg and to Tri-County, and when that happens, that money is added to the whole and is

not segregated by County.

Supervisor Wilck requested assurance that the accounts for the different programs be kept

separate. Ms. Harrup explained that the new system does exactly that; the programs require the funding be

kept separately.

Supervisor Jones made a motion, seconded by Supervisor Townsend, to support STEPS, Inc.

In RE: Finance Committee Report

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated that at the May 6, 2014 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, the

Budget and approve the annual Ordinance to set the tax levies for the calendar year 2014. The Board

expenditures in the General Fund by \$482,230 and decrease revenues by \$35,877 from the budget amounts

contained in the budget presented to the Board on March 25, 2014. The result of these changes decreased

expenditures to a total of \$21,447,154 and revenues to \$21,893,507. The decrease in revenues is due to the elimination of the use of any of the fund balance. The decrease in expenditures contains the amendments required by the change in the VRS and group life rates which has been discussed previously. Actual revenue line items were increased by \$74,515. If all of these amendments are approved the amended budget revenues would exceed expenditures by \$446,353.

The Finance Committee made no recommendation concerning this revenue surplus. There are three options regarding this revenue surplus. First, the Board could reduce the proposed tax rate or rates to reduce the revenues to match the expenditures, as an example the Board could reduce the proposed real estate tax rate from \$0.50 to \$0.47, second the Board could leave the revenue thus the tax rates the same as proposed with the additional revenues placed in the fund balance to be used to help offset the anticipated shortfall expected in FY 2016, or third, a combination of the first two options. The Committee's proposed changes are as follows:

- 6. Treasurer \$6,000 reduction. Reduced land sale expense, maintenance service contract, advertising, lease/rent of equipment and DMV Stop lines.
- 7. Information Technology \$3,385 reduction. Reduced professional services.
- 8. Registrar \$1,124 reduction. Reduced part-time.
- 9. Circuit Court \$3,000 reduction. Reduced professional services.
- 10. General District Court \$3,000 reduction. Reduced professional services.
- 11. Clerk of Circuit Court \$13,195 reduction. Reduced professional services, repairs/maintenance, Jurors/witness and other operating supplies.
- 12. Commonwealth Attorney reduced \$11,130. Reduced health insurance.
- 13. Victim Witness \$348 reduction.
- 14. Sheriff \$25,587 reduction. Reduced professional services, drug testing, repairs/maintenance, postal, travel, and fuel.
- 15. Sheriff-Courts \$6,451 reduction. Reduced travel, dues, police supplies and uniforms.
- 16. Emergency Services increased \$3,448. Increased budget to show grant match.
- 17. Regional Jail & Juvenile Detention \$35,000 reduction.
- 18. Building Official \$222 reduction.
- 19. Animal Control \$519 reduction.
- 20. Biosolids \$331 reduction.
- 21. Refuse \$54,173 reduction. Reduced contract landfill.
- 22. Sandy River Reservoir \$5,100 reduction. Reduced repairs/maintenance.
- 23. General Properties \$51,656 reduction. Reduced personnel line by not funding a vacant position. Reduced professional services and electrical services.
- 24. Planning \$8,813 reduction. Reduced professional services and travel.

- 25. Economic Development \$452 reduction.
- 26. Tourism \$1,201 reduction. Reduced part-time.
- 27. Contingency \$10,000 reduction.
- 28. Health Insurance Savings \$68,448.
- 29. Transfer to VPA \$8,621 reduction. Reduced due to decreased health insurance costs.
- 30. Donations \$44,106 reduction.
- 31. Schools \$92,000 reduction. Reduced to reflect the decrease in the debt service.

Mr. Bartlett stated the proposal is not to approve the budget this evening; further work on the budget needs to be accomplished. He recommended an additional meeting be scheduled prior to June 30.

Supervisor Timmons stated the Committee discussed the scenario that if once each line item is gone through and reduced, a concern remains that the department may need further funding. It was the Committee's desire to be made a standing committee and if an issue arises, it could be brought before the Committee which would research and make a recommendation to the full Board.

If the County wants to attract businesses, have economic growth, the County infrastructure needs to be improved. The children should not suffer. Supervisor Townsend stated he does not support taking away from the school system.

Supervisor Timmons stated the cost per student is \$12,000 which is ample money to provide a top notch quality education for the children in the county. Throwing money at a problem without fixing the problem doesn't do anything but just spend money.

Supervisor Cooper-Jones stated it is time to put the school funds back into categories where the money cannot be moved without prior approval by the Board of Supervisors. She added the \$92,000 in funding in question is debt service which is being paid off. The school will still receive the full funds that were allotted to them last year.

In Re: County Administrator's Report

Mr. Bartlett reviewed a Bid Summary from Resource International, the County's Landfill

Engineers, for the Construction of Cell E. All bids exceeded both the Engineer's cost estimate and the

amount budgeted. Mr. Bartlett stated the County is currently in negotiations with the apparent low bidder

to determine if there are any steps that can be taken to lower the construction costs. Mr. Bartlett stated he

initially recommended if lower costs cannot be negotiated, all bids be rejected.

Mr. Bartlett reported Resource received a revised bit from the low bidder, which decreases the

cost to an amount less than the revised Engineer's opinion and very close to the amount contained in the

FY15 budget. The reduction was achieved by reducing the size of the new landfill cell; however, the

reduction in size to cost ratio is not proportionate.

Resource provided five recommendations; the primary recommendation is to reject all bids and

rebid in early 2015. The recommendations are as follows:

a) Allows the County's landfill operator to continue to excavate material out of the Cell E area until

the end of November 2014.

b) Perform a topographic survey of Cell E. This cost is contained in the existing refuse budget.

c) Delete Line Item 18 of the Bid Form (Landfill Gas Monitoring Wells) and perform this work as

part of Resources services in FY15.

d) Drill borings to better define the extent of the rock.

e) Rebid the project in February 2015.

f) Reject all bids.

To complete items (b) and (c) will add \$14,500 to the FY15 budget. Doing both at the same time will

allow the County to pay only one mobilization cost.

In Re: Finance Committee Report

Mr. Bartlett reported the Finance Committee is comprised of Supervisor Cooper-Jones (Chair),

Supervisor Jones and Supervisor Timmons. The Committee was originally formed as an ad hoc committee

tasked with the specific task of amending the proposed FY15 budget and bringing an amended budget back

to the full Board for approval.

The Committee has completed that task. Due to the budgetary challenges faced by the County, the

Committee desires to become a standing committee. Per the Board's Bylaws, if the Board designates a

standing committee, the Board shall specify the name, composition, and function of the committee. In

selecting members of the committee, the Chairman shall make nominations after soliciting from members

of the Board their preferences. The Board may amend the Chairman's nominations and shall confirm

assignment.

The Committee's function would be to meet each quarter and review the execution of the

approved budget. The Committee would review revenues collected and spending in the expenditure lines

to ascertain if budget forecasts were being achieved. This review would ensure the Board would have

adequate time to make adjustments to the County's budget to respond to unexpected circumstances.

Supervisor Townsend recommended the Committee consist of four members.

Chairman Simpson appointed Supervisor Cooper-Jones, Supervisor Jones, Supervisor Timmons,

and himself, Supervisor Simpson.

In Re: Virso Recreation and Community Center

Supervisor Townsend reported that during the April 15, 2014 budget work session, the Board had

considerable discussion concerning the Virso Recreation and Community Center. The Center requested

\$10,000; discussion followed during that meeting to provide \$8,000 with a required \$2,000 match.

Supervisor Townsend said he was given the opportunity to develop an oversight capability to ensure

In Re: State Budget Contingency Plan

Mr. Bartlett stated the General Assembly has not yet passed a state budget. With only 20 days left

before the end of the current fiscal year, there is little time for the General Assembly to pass a budget and

allow the Governor time to review and make amendments. With the recent revelation that revenues will be

considerably less (as much as \$1.5 billion) than originally projected, each house of the General Assembly

must revise their respective draft budgets. Then each house must vote on the other's budget which

typically each rejects. Then a Budget Conference Committee must negotiate a final version of the budget

which then must be approved on by both Houses of the General Assembly. The final approved budget is

then sent to the Governor who has 30 days to either approve or propose amendments to the Budget. Once

the Governor makes his decision if he proposes any amendments, the budget bill must go back to the House

and Senate for a vote. You can see this is a long process that would be very difficult to complete by the

end of June. Recent events in the Senate seem to suggest the stalemate could be broken and a budget will be passed. The question is will it be completed by June 30, 2014 and will the Governor agree to any budget passed by the General Assembly.

Mr. Bartlett presented a spreadsheet displaying information concerning state funding and the impact of delayed funding.

Mr. Bartlett stated the revenues from the State Compensation Board are very stable fluctuating only slightly from month to month. Also reflected are state revenues for various activities and an estimate for the period of July through October of the revenues that are normally received by the County. These include state funds, local taxes collected by the State, State and Federal funds for both the Schools and Social Services, and Prince Edward's portion of the state funding for the Regional Jail.

Mr. Bartlett said that this shows that if the Commonwealth does not pass a budget, the County will not receive approximately \$2.2 million from the state for each month from July through October. These amounts are displayed in the row labeled "Grand Total Subject to Delay." Thus, the County will have to provide these funds from our Fund Balance. In addition to these funds the County typically expends more than it receives in revenues in each of these months. The amount of the cash outflow for the months of July through October for last fiscal year (FY13) is shown in the row labeled "FY13 Cash Outflow."

Without any delay in the receipt of state funds, the County should have more than \$5 million barring any unforeseen events at the end of October. That is a key month because the County's fund balance hits a low point in October and increases in November, December and January. Last fiscal year, the County's Fund Balance increased almost \$8.5 million over those three months from the receipt of Real Estate and Personal Property Taxes.

If the Commonwealth does not pass a budget, the County will run out of cash as soon as late September and definitely by October, with a deficit of approximately \$3.5 million if no action is taken. The County will be forced to borrow funds by using Revenue Anticipation Notes. These notes can be repaid in November and the fund balance restored in December. This cash reserve will be short lived as the County begins to draw down the cash reserves in February.

Knowing this possible scenario, it would be prudent to prepare to take actions to slow the expenditure of the County's cash reserves to minimize the need to borrow funds in September or October if

this will occur. If the Board is comfortable that a budget will be passed by the end of August there is not an overriding need to make any adjustment in operations since the County's cash reserves can absorb the delay in the receipt of state funds for the first two months of the fiscal year. Whatever actions are taken should be short loved and those affected should be made whole. Indication is that governments will be reimbursed all delayed state funds once a state budget has been approved.

If the Board is concerned a state budget may not be passed by the end of September or October, then action should be taken to decrease spending. Some options to decrease spending are:

- 1) Delay all equipment and Capital purchases
- 2) Cease all non-mandated services by Social Services and CSA
- 3) Delay or eliminate the funding provided to outside organizations
- 4) Decrease the number of days and possibly hours the Convenience sites are open
- 5) Furlough various County employees which will result in reduced services to County residents examples include a) reducing cannery hours, b) reducing the days the building official's office is open, c) reducing the time the receptionist is available, d) furloughing any County funded positions in the offices of the Constitutional Officers, e) decreasing / stopping mowing of certain County properties and f) temporarily reducing employee's salaries to include employees in the Constitutional Offices whose salary exceeds the state approved salary
- 6) Only appropriate on a month to month basis to allow the Board of Supervisors to maintain maximum control over the budget process

There are no easy ways to reduce spending in Prince Edward County. The preponderance of funds in the County budget is used for personnel expenses. To reduce spending by any measurable extent will require impact on the County's workforce. Impacts that should be reversible once state funds are once again flowing.
